

he week-long 350-kilometre multi-region wheelchair push in support of a Wexford man who was diagnosed with a lifealtering disease in October 2019, finally arrived

into Kerry on Friday evening last (April 26th). The cavalcade was led by local Gardai into Castleisland along with Denjoe O'Connor of Denjoes Takeaway on his trusty Harley Davidson followed by trucks from McAuliffe Trucking Company and Daly Transport accompanying the Push for Paul crew and support vehicles. The colourful parade was met at Castleisland Rugby Club by local supporters and was welcomed by Michael John Kearney of Castleisland Chamber Alliance, Councillor Bobby O'Connell and Pa Daly T.D.

Runners from An Riocht Athletic Club joined the Push for Paul on its final stages to assist in pushing the chair.

Upon arrival, there was a particularly warm welcome from current and former Castleisland, Killarney and Killorglin rugby players and all participated in a friendly game of tag rugby. Food and refreshments were provided by Annie and Billy O'Sullivan from Ballymacelligott, and very special thanks go to them and to everyone at Castleisland Rugby Club. The stage was sponsored by Cara and Killarney Credit Unions and Tom McCarthys Central Bar was a local vehicle sponsor.

Following an enjoyable evening in Castleisland, the Push for Paul departed the rugby club on Saturday morning and did a lap of honour of Castleisland town before heading in the direction of Killarney via Currow. The locals we encountered along the way were very welcoming and generous. On arrival in Killarney, the team proceeded through Killarney town centre where another warm welcome awaited. The greatest cheers were reserved for the grand finale arrival at Killarney Racecourse where there were congratulations aplenty. On arrival, former GAA President Sean Kelly MEP addressed the crowd and was particularly taken by Linda Murphy's message of accessibility for wheelchair users everywhere but most especially at GAA grounds. In a touching speech Linda paid tribute to all involved in the organising committee, her friends and neighbours and all who supported along the way. John Heavey of the Push for Paul Organising Committee expressed gratitude to his

colleagues in an Garda Siochana for the support as well as everyone from the main sponsors 'Envirogreen' to the start sponsors 'Pet Bliss' and finish Sponsors 'SureTank'. A great evening of entertainment and fun was had by all in Killarney Racecourse to celebrate the grand finale of the Push for Paul. Ollie Favier and his team really outdid themselves in looking after everyone in attendance with great food and a fantastic atmosphere.

The funds raised from this year's Darkness Into Light will help communities within Kerry, with the funding going directly to Pieta's services.

"The walk goes through Killarney National Park and it's very special as it brings our community together to show that there is hope and support for those who need it. We walk in solidarity, to remember all those lives lost to suicide and to show support for anyone in our community who might be struggling", Marie added.

Minister praises town that never stands still

If you build it they will come

hat was the positive message Education Minister, Norma Foley, had for business leaders when she addressed a Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce members' luncheon on Monday.

She described Killarney as "the beating heart" of the tourism industry and she said she admired the fact that businesses in the town were so progressive, forward-thinking and cohesive.

"You never stand still – there's always more to be done," she remarked.

"I want to acknowledge the extraordinary role played by individuals and the collective to ensure Killarney remains a vibrant, attractive and economically dynamic place".

The minister was speaking at Hotel Killarney which has just completed the first phase of a major €9.5m renovation with the provision of 120 superior bedrooms and family suites and a complete redesign of its ground floor operations, including a new restaurant, new bar and new lobby area.

Minister Foley said when she visited Scotland for St Patrick's Day she was very taken by the manner in which tourism providers there spoke so positively of Killarney's warm charm, its people and the excellence of the product it provides.

She said Kerry has now adopted a more cohesive approach to tourism and when Killarney is successful, the rest of the county also benefits.

"55 per cent of visitors to Killarney also go elsewhere in the county and the top three destinations after Killarney are Dingle, Kenmare and Tralee," she said, adding that an economically successful Killarney

has a far-reaching spin-off.

"While Kerry is a county of many constituent parts, there is extraordinary power and there is an extraordinary opportunity in the collective," the minister added. "Kerry has a quality of life and a quality of place that is both inspiring and unique and Killarney, in particular, continues to grow and innovate every single day".

Specifically praising the work of the Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, Minister Foley said it is a tremendously proactive organisation that works very closely with the local authority, local businesses and the hospitality sector.

"Everybody is on the one page here and everybody has a role to play. Chamber's leadership role is hugely important," she said.

Minister Foley remarked: "I've always loved The Field of Dreams and that line that says build it and they will come. I've always been conscious, in terms of tourism, that if you don't have the infrastructure to facilitate people coming then they won't come".

She said, in that respect, the opening of the new Macroom bypass has been hugely significant and the next priority is to get the planned N22 road from Farranfore to Killarney over the line as that is hugely important.

"It's a critical piece of infrastructure that needs to be completed," she stressed.

The minister also acknowledged that Kerry Airport has played its part with 420,000 passengers passing through last year which was the highest number for 15 years.

Minister Foley confirmed that the Kerry Education and Training Board has submitted a design

proposal for development of a college for the hospitality sector at the former Pretty Polly site.

"It has enormous potential. You're talking up to 4,000 full-time students as well as part-time students.

"The proposal is currently being assessed and we'll have an update on that shortly," she told the gathering of over 80 local business people.

Earlier the chairman of the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation, Pat O'Leary, outlined the progress made by that organisation in promoting Kerry under the one umbrella group involving 19 member organisations.

He said the KTIF was focusing on creating a greater profile for the county, marketing Kerry as the best in class and promoting outdoor and adventure activities. It is also working on projects to bring about the upskilling of employees, provide support for Fáilte Ireland initiatives, identify and promote sustainable tourism projects and promote digitisation. Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Niall Kelleher, told those in attendance that a new Business Watch scheme, an initiative by An Garda Siochána, is being launched for the town and it is hoped that it will have the desired impact.

Business Watch is founded on the same principles as Neighbourhood Watch with Gardaí and the community coming together to prevent and reduce crime.

The mayor availed of the opportunity to formally welcome Superintendent David O'Callaghan who takes charge of community engagement matters in Killarney and Garda Cathy Murphy who has been transferred from Tralee to Killarney to oversee community policing.

Cllr Kelleher also encouraged businesses and residents to make an extra push for this year's Tidy Towns competition with the judges due to arrive in town from June onwards.

"Killarney was just one point short of the overall award last year so, with a little push, we could well have cause to celebrate later in the year," he said.

Killarney's bid to win the coveted overall award in this year's national Tidy Towns Competition is officially underway.

The 2024 Killarney Looking Good Competition was launched this week and hopes are high that, with a little extra effort by all involved, the town could have great cause to celebrate towards the end of the year.

Killarney was named Ireland's Tidiest Large Town in 2023 but, interestingly, it finished just a single point behind overall winner Abbeyleix in County Laois.

Killarney also scooped the regional award for the south west, the county award for Kerry and a gold medal for excellence last year. It improved its performance on 2022 by a whopping 14 points, rising from 361 to 375.

The competition adjudicators were rich in their praise for Killarney which they described as a beautiful town with much to offer residents and visitors in terms of visual and recreational amenity, nature activities and heritage.

The Tidy Towns Committee, chaired by former long-serving councillor and keen environmentalist Michael Gleeson, includes senior local authority staff members, community activists, business leaders and dedicated Tidy Towns volunteers.

Over three decades after it was first initiated, to help enhance the visual image of the town, the Killarney Looking Good Competition returned with a vengeance last year – after a pandemic enforced absence ¬– with a new committee, new categories, new sponsors and ambitious targets.

The project was first launched in 1991 and it grew in stature each year, culminating in some style when Killarney won the prestigious overall award in the 2011 Tidy Towns Competition.

Now 13 years later, Killarney is hoping that it will be a lucky 13 and that this could once again be the town's glory year.

The Looking Good Competition will see awards presented in over 20 different categories and high achievers in the business and residential communities will be honoured at a gala prizegiving ceremony at the close of the tourist season.

The honours list will include the Yvonne Quill Award in memory of the late great businesswoman who was the driving force behind the Killarney

Eye on the prize.

Tidy Towns campaign for several years and the Fr Michael Murphy Award in memory of the popular priest who played a huge part in Killarney, Kenmare and Sneem winning the overall national award in 2011, 2000 and 1987 respectively.

In the business community, there will be awards for the best large and small commercial premises, best newly painted premises, best signage and the best retail award with prizes also for the most impressive hotel, public house, restaurant, café, guesthouse and best public building as well as the most improved premises.

In the residential categories awards will go to the best large and small estates, best private residence, best roadside garden, best floral display and best friendly planting award. Other categories include a green hospitality award, a corporate special responsibility award, a restoration award, best school and a special biodiversity award.

The Killarney Looking Good Competition is organised by Killarney Municipal District Council and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce with MD O'Shea & Sons the overall sponsors of the competition and O'Mahony Media Ltd the media sponsor.

The competition will run throughout the tourist season and businesses and residential areas will be monitored on an ongoing basis.



KERRY CAPTAIN PAUDIE CLIFFORD ANNOUNCES THE PITTSBURGH STEELERS FOURTH ROUND PICK IN NFL DRAFT LIVE FROM KERRY

Broadcasting live from The Europe Hotel in Killarney, Kerry Senior Football Captain and Steelers fan, Paudie Clifford, announced that Mason McCormick from South Dakota State University has been selected as the Pittsburgh Steelers fourth round pick in the 2024 NFL Draft.

The NFL Draft is an annual 3 day event, comprised of 7 rounds where each of the 32 NFL teams are able to recruit up and coming American football players and offers them spots on their roster. This year's NFL Draft took place from the 25th – 27th of April in Detroit and at it's peaks, the event is watched by over 54 million people.

This is the first time the Pittsburgh Steelers have announced one of their picks live from Ireland and were delighted to work Paudie Clifford, who was on hand this evening in Killarney with young fans to announce the fourth round pick for the Steelers.

Battle for Minor Injuries Clinic for Kerry Goes Local

The battle for a minor injuries clinic has hotted up. We recall how councillors in Killarney said they were fairly confident of securing the minor injuries clinic for the District Hospital after attending a health forum meeting in Cork.

John O'Donoghue was particularly optimistic for Killarney with the verbal assurances he got at the meeting.

He had raised the issue formally by way of motion. Well, hardly had the ink dried on this and other publications than some Tralee representatives were out pooh-poohing the notion. Now, Sinn candidate for Tralee MD Paul Daly - a brother of the TD Pa - has called on Minister Stephen Donnelly to ensure that the proposed Minor Injuries Clinic is located in Tralee.

"Minor injuries clinics see patients who have sprains, breaks, sports injuries, cuts and other serious but not life threatening injuries. These types of cases cannot be treated by a GP or a pharmacist, but they also clog up A&E departments when more serious and life threatening problems need to be treated as a priority.

"The ideal location is Tralee as it is close to UHK with its facilities and also with closer access for patients from North Kerry and West Kerry. Any other location does not make sense," Paul said in the statement released from his brother's office.

To be fair to Paul, and Sinn Féín, I too have been talking with medical people and they tell me the District is in bad shape for gardens in many European cities - can hold

modern medical purposes. They also can't see how a minor injuries clinic will work in Killarney without x-ray and other diagnostics. But a court would work, they feel.

I return therefore to my old vision for the District which by the way got good support from people: Turn it into a court complex for Killarney and install a museum in the old courthouse.

It makes perfect sense to have a more discreet location for a courthouse. Then to use the existing historic building with its natural acoustics as a small museum, given its central location, methinks. The issue might be raised on the door step with the council candidates now. Someone has to come up with a plan because the HSE will not.

Stories from Gardens

A press release that came into my box from the OPW - a very under rated organisation that does very creative work, by the way made me recall a very lovely mortuary card I got with a picture of Muckross House and Gardens and at the time I thought what a lovely idea. Much visited public gardens have great personal stories. Now during heritage week 2024 the National Botanic Gardens is calling on visitors to share their stories and memories of the gardens for an upcoming exhibition, 'Stories from the Gardens' to be held in August. I have come to love the botanic gardens in Glasnevin and it truly is an astonishing place. Few other capital cities - and I have sought out the botanic



a candle to Dublin's botanic gardens. Even Kew I find noisy and too overflown by planes from Heathrow to get any good out of it. The small botanic gardens in Nantes would be lovely too but as with London you have to duck your head on the higher parts not to get chopped off by the wings of a plane! I kid you not.

Now the OPW is asking if you visit the National Botanic Gardens for a walk every day or if you had your wedding photos taken here? Do you recall a happy memory of the gardens from your childhood? Have you a story about a famous person you met here or to a recent historical event? Maybe the connection is familial, maybe a relative worked here over the years or you are just a big fan of a particular tree or plant and come to see its progress through the growing season? Whatever the story, they want to hear it!

The exhibition will showcase a selection in August the fascinating social history that has shaped the National Botanic Gardens over the years. 600,000 visit the Botanic Gardens each year - many more visit Muckross. Now would not a visitor's story book be a great idea for Muckross too?

A Snapshot of Kerry Today and a Future Gift

Speaking of stories, A County Kerry Anthology 2024 launched recently at St Brendan's College, Killarney has much to recommend itself. Called Futures from the Past, it contains reflections on then and when, as it were, the past and the future. Hot off the press from the launch in the Sem, Cathal Walsh gave me a copy of this snapshot in time which is being in aid of the Kerry Hospice.

The Hospice is among the myriad other good works Cathal undertakes. The 27 contributors take a look at the past and then the future. Mostly this is the past of 60 years ago. The anthology begins with a reflection and a tale from Fr Dan O'Riordan on how learning along with maturing is indeed lifelong and how human relationships are at the heart of life. Poems make up some of the contributions, but others are more academic. "Sixty Year Story" by Jerry Flynn tells us he was in fifth class in 1963 and recalls the Catholic Ireland of 1963 as an altar boy. He dropped the communion wafer and had to spend an hour washing the spot on the floor as penance.

Mary Shanahan has a nice piece about working in a school in Liverpool in 1963 when Thalidomide scandal broke. That year there was Beatlemania, Civil Rights and Blowing in the Wind too, she reminds us.

Sport as you might expect from a book associated with the Sem is prominent and we get a nice piece from Andrew Sheehan on his sporting hero Lionel Messi centring on dedication and inspiration. When he is 64, there will be more balance between nature and humans, Andrew expects. Brian O'Daly has penned a lovely piece again called Sixty Years Ago, focusing on the season of autumn and escaping the stale air of the city for Dingle and the sea. Other contributions deal with the futuristic.

It is a lovely book to dip into - and my only quibble is how it would have been nice to include a small biography of each writer. Two or three lines would do in order to assuage curiosity. Perhaps a reprint might consider the bios?



Project Ireland 2040 strategy.





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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

Round trip..... Cuach KP -*The Cuckoo is back from Africa*

After spending the winter in the rainforests of the Congo Basin in Central Africa, the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has confirmed that Cuach KP, one of the first Irish Cuckoos to be tagged as part of a Cuckoo Tracking Project, has landed home in Killarney National Park.

Cuach KP, along with two other Irish Cuckoos, was tagged in Killarney National Park in May 2023. He is the first to successfully make the 9,000km journey home for the summer months. On arrival into Ireland on Monday, KP made a short stop in Fermoy before making his way back to Derrycunihy, in Killarney National Park, the place where he was originally tagged before his release.

While the Cuckoo has been well-studied during the breeding season, very little is known about the routes they take once they head off on migration or where in Africa they spend the winter months. The Cuckoo Tracking Project was set up by the NPWS together with the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) last year to better understand their migration patterns and the habitat pressures on the Cuckoo population. The birds were given names and fitted with satellite tags so that their movements could be tracked.

Over the course of Cuach KP 's extraordinary 9000km journey to and from the Kingdom, he covered two continents and several countries. Eamonn Meskell, Divisional Manager at Killarney National Park said:

"We're delighted that Cuach KP has found his way home to Killarney during the first year of this monitoring project. Cuckoos are such an intriguing bird and one that we associate with the arrival of summer. All of us at Killarney National Park are now hoping that the two other birds tagged as part of this project will follow and join him here over the coming days."

Ranger, who set up the Project in conjunction with BTO said:

"Satellite tagging gives us a clear picture of the Cuckoos journey for the first time, to Africa and back to Ireland. KPs journey was a round trip of nearly 9000km ending with an epic sea crossing from northern Spain direct to Ireland across the Bay of Biscay. Big sea crossings haven't been recorded in Cuckoos in Europe before, so that's a really interesting twist."

Reports from the satellite tagging system indicate that other Cuckoos from the project are also on their way. Cuach Torc is currently in the vicinity of Brittany. Cuach Cores was the last

of the three to leave. The latest reports suggest that Cores left Algeria yesterday and is already making quick progress.

Cuckoos, or Cuach as gaelige, are a summer migrant to Ireland. Adult birds are resident here from April to early July, having spent the winter on the African continent. They are a unique bird in Ireland as they lay their eggs in other birds' nests and have no involvement in raising their young. Across Ireland, the Cuckoo has seen a 27% reduction in breeding distribution between the first national census, Bird Atlas (1968-1972), and the most recent Bird Atlas (2007-2011).





There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems. UV-A

can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye. UV-R

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

Macular Degeneration

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people. Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea.

Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

Corneal Sunburn

called Corneal sunburn, photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

Protecting your eyes from the sun If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

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



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

information on its website in relation to the forthcoming elections to Kerry County Council. Elections for the six Local Electoral Areas in Kerry will be held on 7 June 2024.

Information about key dates, the Register of Electors, the nomination process for candidates and other relevant information is provided to ensure that voters and election candidates are fully informed about all aspects of the election process.

Eligible electors who are not registered to vote must do so before Monday, 20 May. Those wishing to be included on the Postal Voters List or the Special Voters List must register by Saturday, 11 May. The Council operates a Freephone Number for any queries about the Register of Electors which can be contacted on 1800 245 380 during office hours.

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Kerry County Council : The period during which candidates can submit their nomination papers is Saturday, 11 May and Saturday, 18 May. Arrangements for the receipt of nominations will be made with individual candidates and the political parties by the Kerry County Council Returning Officer, Martin O'Donoghue.

The Council webpages on the local elections also includes important information for candidates about legislation dealing with election expenditure, data protection, and election posters. For example, election posters cannot be erected before 8 May and must be removed within seven days of polling.

This site will continue to be updated with further information about the local elections in the coming weeks, including a full list of candidates in each of the six Local Electoral Areas following the close of nominations. Cllr. Brendan Cronin is again calling on Kerry County council to urgently rectify the present highly dangerous situation where there is no public footpath linking the new Madams Height housing development to the existing footpath on the N22 which is 200 meters away even though it is clearly shown in the original planning application. "The present situation is that a footpath from the new development comes out to a dead end at the public road forcing pedestrians onto the carriageway facing oncoming traffic. Back at a Council meeting in March 2021 I requested the Council to construct this vital section of footpath for pedestrian safety on this very busy dangerous road and 3 years later nothing has still been done which is totally unacceptable", Cllr. Cronin told Killarnev Outlook.

"Kerry County council have collected substantial development levies from the Madams Height development and in the general Aghadoe area for providing, local community infrastructure, I am appealing to Council Managment and engineers to use this funding to construct this vital section of footpath before someone is seriously injured", the Cllr. added.

KILCUMMIN FOOTPATH SAGA IS DRAGGING ON

In this week's Kerry County Council Meeting, Cllr. John O'Donoghue has called on Kerry County Council to provide an update on the provision of a footpath from Páirc Chuimín to Kilcummin village as it has dragged on for years now which is unacceptable for the residents of the Estate.

"This was one of the first Notices of Motion I had on the agenda when starting in the Council in 2021. I am also aware it is a saga which has rumbled on for much longer than that. Páirc Chuimin, with over 80 houses, is within walking distance of Kilcummin village, yet residents are unable to walk their children down to school or up to the football field as the road is simply too dangerous", Cllr. O'Donoghue said.

"In a time where Active Travel is so widely

encouraged, this is a glaring example of people being willing to engage, but unable to do so due to a lack of infrastructure. Were this to be a temporary problem, it might be more understandable but it has dragged on for years now, and for the poor unfortunate residents of the estate, it is simply unacceptable. I recently viewed the brochure published at the time the estate was built and one of the first pages was filled with a list of all the wonderful amenities within walking distance of the estate for would be home owners", he added. Unfortunately, the reality is that while these may be within walking distance, none of these amenities can be accessed through walking or cycling, and certainly not by young children. While I accept it was a private development, and that were a similar planning application made for a project of this scale now it would have to include greater provision of linking footpaths, there is little to be gained by dwelling on the past and reflecting on what might have been. The residents of the estate are in the situation that they are and the onus is on us as a Council to sort it out. It is a scandal that parents living so close to the school do not feel safe allowing their children to walk to school and it is imperative that we as a Council make this one of our number 1 priorities going forward. We have been hearing talks of negotiations for years now, but the residents of Páirc Chuimin have had enough of talking, what they want now is action. We must sort this situation out and people need to see progress soon.

Dozens Of Businesses Across The County Will Be Forced To Close Their Doors

A Kerry County Councillor has accused the Rates Valuation Office in Dublin as being out of touch with reality, following the recent announcement of the doubling and trebling of Rates Bills for businesses in the county.

Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill has claimed that the Rates Valuation Office in Dublin will force dozens of businesses across the county to close their doors

"In a time in business where huge challenges exist to keep the doors open, with enormous rises in overhead costs, energy, wages, supplies, etc, the Valuation Office has seen fit to send out bills to people showing a 100%, 200% & 300% increase in Rates. This is against a background where towns and villages are seeing many businesses closing weekly because they cannot survive" stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"I have been contacted by numerous business people in Killorglin, Cahersiveen, Killarney, Kenmare and in my own Parish here in Glenbeigh on this issue, some saying they will need to borrow money if they are to pay these

inflated Rates bills, others admitting that they cannot continue to trade under such a burden. The real world is here on the streets of our towns and villages, where small businesses exist, run by real people for real people. It is incredible that people in the Valuation Office can sit in their lvory Tower to issue crippling Rates increases on those who are the backbone of our economy" said the flabbergasted Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Small businesses need to be nurtured in our local economies, they need to be supported while trying to recover from lockdowns and energy price hikes. These massive increases in Rates bills will cause an economic wipeout in every town and village in this county" stated Councillor Cahill.

At this month's Local Authority meeting, the Fianna Fáil Councillor again called on Kerry County Council to make the case on behalf of their clients, the business people of Kerry, to the Valuation Office as a matter of extreme urgency. Councillor Cahill also raised the matter



with the Finance Minister, Michael McGrath at a recent meeting in Kerry.

Speaking at both meetings, Councillor Cahill took the opportunity to raise with Minister McGrath and Kerry County Council the rise in Commercial Rates and said that it will eat up the benefit of the Increased Cost of Business grant, announced recently by the Government. He also raised the need to return to the 9% Hospitality VAT rate to ensure no further businesses are forced to close down.

"Minister McGrath assured me he will bring all of my concerns to Cabinet including the massive increase in Commercial Rates and the VAT issue" added Michael Cahill.

CONDITION OF RURAL ROADS AN HUGE ISSUE ON THE **DOORSTEPS**

During his canvassing for the upcoming local elections, Cllr. John ODonoghue has shared an issue which comes up repeatedly on thedoor steps and that is the condition of many of our rural roads. The Local Improvement Scheme currently has a waiting list of over 600 applicants at a time where we have been informed that the scheme over the next two years will progress as follows: €1,545,758 for 2024 which will allow for the next 26 roads on the list, and €1,023,479 for 2025 which



will allow for the following 11 roads on the list to be completed. At a rate of 26 roads per year, which is an increase on previous years, it will take over 25 years for those at the bottom of the list to have their road completed. Many of our public rural roads are also in desperate states of disrepair. The Council maintain as many roads each year as they receive funding for, but it is imperative a major funding increase is put in place for Kerry roads. The centralised nature of governance in Ireland means the Council does not have its own funding pool to complete this work, but are instead forced to go cap in hand to the Government begging for the necessary money. This is very wrong considering the high costs associated with operating a motor vehicle. People in Kerry often do not have a public transport alternative and a decent driving surface should be a given. We regularly hear from Dáil Éireann how important rural Ireland is to them, it is time the Government put its money where its mouth is and fund a road network which is fit for purpose.

"Total breakdown in the eye services in University Hospital Kerry (UHK)" **Deputy Michael Healy Rae**



Deputy Michael Healy TD is looking for answers from the Minister for Health in relation as what he has called "a total breakdown in the eye services in University Hospital Kerry (UHK) which he has planned to raise as a Parliamentary Question with the Department of Health today (Friday 26th April 2024)

"I am calling on the Minister for Health to resume the ophthalmology services (eye services) in the University Hospital Kerry (UHK) as soon as possible. "With patient numbers increasing and the growing incidence of

chronic diseases, I appreciate there can be an enormous strain on the current model of eye care delivery but closing down the services are not the answer.

UHK "Eyecare services in have completely ceased since December 2023 due to contractual issues which need to be updated. The changes necessary have been agreed with the acute services but not by the community services. There is massive problems and clinical issues arising to patients out of this debacle." Deputy Michael Healy TD stated.

It's available to people who cannot get sufficient funding from commercial banks to purchase or build a home. It is available to first-time buyers and fresh start applicants to purchase a new or second-hand property, or to self-build. Carers need to be shown more respect



show carers more respect.

It is far past time for the Government to give Carers the respect they deserve and to abolish the means testing of the Carers Allowance, according to Councillor Marie Moloney.

"Caring for someone is a 24 hours 7 days a week and the maximum payment they can receive from the Department is €248 per week which equates to just under €1.50 per hour. No such thing as minimum wage for Carers and the lack of respite care does not make their job any easier" said Cllr Moloney.

Carers are saving the state a lot of money by caring in the home. I have been dealing with a lot of people who have to access fulltime residential facilities which costs both families and the state a lot of money.

While there is Carers Benefit, which is not means tested, but this is only payable for 2 years but caring for someone can go on for a lifetime for some.

Cllr. Marie Moloney has called on the government to 🗄 I have also come across a number of people caring for a loved one, who have lost their Carers Allowance when their spouse/partner passes away. While both are alive their savings are divided by two in the means testing but following the death of one then it's not divided by two and all the savings count as a means against the Carer who is now deemed to be in excess of the guidelines for Carers Allowance. They can lose both their spouse's income or pension and their Carers Allowance in the one go. If the means testing was abolished they would not lose the Carers Allowance.

I am writing to the Minister for Social Protection and the Minister for Finance asking them consider doing away with the means testing of the Carers Allowance in the next Budget. Life is difficult enough for Carers without having to worry about being means tested, said Cllr Moloney

Garda Recruitment **Drive Urgently Needed**

With just over 14,000 Gardaí in the country, 261 of whom are stationed in Kerry, a major recruitment drive is urgently required to ensure sufficient numbers are available to police our roads, streets and borders, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill.

"Tragically, death and injury on our roads is on the increase and additional Gardaí are needed now to be visibly present, to man checkpoints and to help make our roadways safer for everyone. Crime continues at an elevated level and again more Gardaí must be deployed to reduce burglaries, etc," said Councillor Cahill.

"It has been announced that more Gardaí are to be utilised to patrol border areas to prevent illegal immigrants entering the country by land from the UK and this will further reduce the police numbers for other tasks" stated Councillor Cahill.

"We all know that Garda visibility is key to reducing traffic violations and other infractions of the law. The recent riots in Dublin drew heavily on off duty members to support their colleagues, but is not tenable for any protracted period of time" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"We need increased numbers of Gardai to be recruited and trained, to protect this country now" added Councillor Cahill.

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

KERRY FC LOSE OUT TO BRAY LOI Division One

After a run of seven games unbeaten in the League, it is now back to back defeats for Kerry FC following a 2-0 loss away to Bray Wanderers

on Friday evening, a result that keeps Conor McCarthy's team in ninth place in the division with nine points – five ahead of Longford who have two games in hand.

The table still means very little at this early stage of the season but the win moves Bray into third, but from Kerry's perspective, it won't get any easier next week when First Division leaders Cork City come to Tralee, with the Rebels winning 2-0 away to Finn Harps on Friday night. After a string of positive performances – even last week's 2-1 loss to Athlone Town – it was a decidedly flat Kerry team that took on Wanderers, perhaps the long journey to the east coast sapping some of their energy. That said, the visitors managed to hold out for 67 minutes before the Seagulls took the lead, which they doubled 11 minutes later.

Cristian Magerusan was only too delighted to be on the pitch rather than the treatment room, and he bagged the opener just two minutes after coming on in the second period. Peter Grogan wrapped up the points with his fourth goal in his last four games.

It was a very, very tepid first half, with neither side making any real threats on the opposition goal, but Bray's quality shone through in the end with their options from the bench eventually proving telling.

Kieran Cruise scored the opener last week but it was his defensive prowess that might have led to the first goal against Kerry. He won the ball back deep inside his own half and launched a Bray counter-attack that resulted in Shane Griffin slotting through for Grogan. However, the attacker's cross/shot failed to trouble Antonio Tuta and was cleared by the Kerry defence.

Harry Groome liked to influence things in the final third for Bray but he almost had a negative impact the other end on 16 minutes. He was too casual on the ball and it was pinched off him by Sean McGrath. McGrath fed Victor Udeze who drove into the box but his shot was thwarted by a superb sliding block from Kilian Cantwell who spared Groome's blushes.

Udeze started in the Kerry attack alongside Kennedy Amechi, with Ryan Kelliher on the bench and Daniel Okwute not in the squad. And although he didn't get on the pitch in Bray, there was encouraging news for Kerry FC with Valerii Dolia making the journey and taking his place in a match day squad for the first time since signing before the season.

A Kerry corner kick lead to the next opportunity. Sean O'Connell's in-swinging left-footer found Daire McCarthy – the deepest man in the area – but his header flew over from an acute angle. Grogan had another sniff of goal in the first half. Evan Osam played the ball down the line and Cruise's clever dummy took two Kerry men out of the game as it rolled to Grogan. He then twisted and turned his man as he entered the penalty area but his low drive was gathered safely by Tuta at the second attempt.

Both managers made a change at the interval. Kelliher was thrust on as the central striker for Kerry whilst Cruise made way for Zach Nolan for the hosts.

Wanderers wanted a penalty in the 57th minute. Ethan Kos and Grogan competed for

a header with the latter then going to ground and holding his head. Referee Robert Dowling allowed play to continue though and it struck Andrew Spain. Grogan and team mates screamed for a penalty but their appeals fell on deaf ears.

Ryan's second roll of the dice saw him introduce Magerusan and it only took him two minutes to show his head coach what he was capable of. Bray attacked down the right and while Sean O'Connell had initially dealt with the threat for Kerry Max Murphy re-delivered and Magerusan's touch was subtle but did enough to divert it past the hapless Tuta.

The concession of the goal seemed to sap a lot of the fight and energy out of the visitors and Bray were only too happy to apply further misery.

Magerusan was played through on 79 minutes. His effort was blocked by Tuta but rebounded into the path of Grogan who wasn't going to miss from six yards and has now scored in matches in a row for the Seagulls.

There was still 11 minutes for Kerry to do damage but that never looked likely as an assured and confident Bray defence dealt with their threat with the minimum of fuss.

Kerry and Bray face Cork opposition next: Kerry host table-toppers Cork City at Mounthawk Park next Friday, while Bray travel to the Rebel county to take on Cobh Ramblers.

There's one obvious and huge anomaly in the system. The loser of the Connaught Final is going to be in a group with Roscommon, Cavan, and Dublin (let us roll with the assumptive winners of Leinster). The Connaught winner, on the other hand, gets Westmeath, Derry, and either Armagh or Donegal.

Is it just me, or does the loser of the Connaught Final not have the better draw?

Kerry are strong favourites to win Munster and Dublin are virtual certainties to win Leinster. I'm not forgetting 1992 – I was in the Gaelic Grounds myself that day and Clare fully deserved that win, but with all due respect, when you are going back almost two score years for a cautionary tale, you are really reaching. The circumstances are different. The games are more frequent, more intense, and far more analysed nowadays. Clare have always given us plenty of frights in Ennis (I've always believed that we were meeting them early in the Munster Championship while we were still completing our initial 'heavy' training) and Mark Fitzgerald isn't going to fear any team, but I expect Kerry to win Munster.

Certainly, this draw will incentivise them. Win, and Kerry will most likely be in a group with Louth, Monaghan, and Meath. There's nobody to be taken for granted, but there's no Division One team there and any sleeping giant is really comatose. We would be looking to top that group, and I maintain that topping the group and avoiding that pre-quarter final extra game is a massive advantage.

Lose on Sunday, and it's a different landscape. Tyrone, Cork, and Armagh or Donegal? Cork gave us a serious fright in last year's group and the first half of the Munster semi-final. Cork would be the fourth seeds. The easiest game. Cork. Yeah, let's not go there.

MUNSTER MINOR CHAMPIONSHIP Kerry 0-12 Cork 1-6

There are too many GAA games nowadays that serve no purpose, and this has to be up there as the most meaningless of them all. Everybody heading to Austin Stack Park last Tuesday knew full well that both sides were going to be in a Munster semi-final regardless of the result. This had all the drive, intent, and purpose of a challenge game, except that it came with an entry fee.

I genuinely don't think that either side played dummy teams. It's hard to tell – back in the days when minor was U18, you had County Minor Championships, development squad history, and post primary competitions to roughly gauge the upcoming talent around the county. Now? Your guess is as good as mine. What exactly was that change to U17 about? Delays to senior club games because of intercounty minors being held? Because we have a split season now, and I'm a fan of it overall, despite Central Council cramming in far more games than necessary or, frankly, interesting into it. A pre-quarter-final round. Really? Was it about burnout? Well, let;'s have the Kerry and Cork minors face each other in an absolutely meaningless game for the sake of it.

This wasn't a bad game. There was some very good football, played in patches. Both sides have very good players. Kacper Robak, Killian Dennehy, and Gearóid White really caught the eye for Kerry. Cathal McCarthy was probably my man of the match for Cork, Seán Whelton always looked dangerous, and Danny Miskella showed, albeit in patches, a lot of potential. But the game never burst into life. It always felt more like players doing a job interview than actually doing a job, that's the hard truth of it. Gearóid White opened the scoring and he laid off to Joey McCarthy to make it 0-2 to 0-0. Cork were actually creating more chances early on but weren't able to take them. I suspect that their forwards will be a lot sharper if (who am I kidding? It's 'when') we meet them again. Seán Whelton converted a free after Humphrey Canty was fouled, but that was the only impact on the scoreboard. 0-2 to 0-1 for the bones of twenty minutes. Yes. Conditions were fairly miserable, but seriously? Ye charged an entry fee for this? Gearóid White set up Ruairí O'Connell to make it 0-3 to 0-1. 



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Positive stress is a great motivator for the State Exams

ANXIOUS

With the state exams now less than five weeks away, candidates may become anxious about their performance. A level of anxiety is normal and focusses the mind on the challenge ahead. Almost all exam candidates, irrespective of how laid back they appear, feel nervous. It's the body's way of dealing with a stressful experience. How you deal with this nervous energy is the critical issue. If you channel it in a positive direction, it will give you the vitality to cope with the demands of the exam.

ATTITUDE

A positive mental attitude is a considerable aid around exam time. Be confident in your ability to do well. Don't be discouraged by other students appearing to know more than you do. Aim to perform to your own capability, not to compete with others. Make positive statements about yourself. Banish all negative thoughts from your mind. Think well of yourself and of your readiness to achieve success. Be determined to do your best, no more, no less.

SUCCESS

Success is a product of positive thinking. By motivating yourself towards your goals, you will redouble your effort and improve your performance. Have items in your study environment to spur you on. Place a statement of your objectives, such as your target grades, in a conspicuous place. An occasional glance in their direction will encourage you.

NEWSWORTHY

Exam stress becomes newsworthy every year because of the assessment system used in the state exams. For the most part these exams are terminally assessed. In effect, two years of work is examined by means of written papers in June. Not enough credit is given to the candidate for consistent work over the two years. Continuous assessment is not sufficiently utilised although proposals to have assessment components worth 40% and a terminal written exam worth 60% of the total marks will significantly reduce reliance on final exams. The major problem with the current exam system is the increased level of stress it causes in some students around exam time. Despite all that is written about exam stress, students continue to show that they are excellent exam performers and use stress as a stimulant rather than an affliction.

POSITIVE

The stress experienced by the majority of exam candidates is positive stress. It concentrates the mind wonderfully. You realise that the forthcoming exam is making increased demands of you. However, your application to study and revision provides you with the resources to meet these demands. Positive stress provides you with the motivation to prepare for the exam. It will sustain and stimulate this motivation until the exam is over. Properly controlled stress will activate hidden resources of energy and application in you. It's important to control the stress and channel it into positive energy.

DISTRESS

It's only when you haven't the resources to meet the demands of the exam that distress or negative stress becomes an issue. Exam distress is a rare occurrence in young people and can easily be confused with normal exam anxiety. The present cohort of young people is highly skilled and well able to cope with the demands of the exam. Distress, when it does occur, is disruptive and may interfere with your performance if it isn't counteracted.

NETWORK

An effective way of managing distress is through utilising your social support network of people who care about you. If you need emotional support approach someone in whom you have confidence. That person may be a teacher, a parent or your guidance counsellor. All you need is the advice of someone who will put the exam in perspective for you and who will help to boost your self-confidence. It all goes back to having a positive mental attitude and to realising that anxiety and stress should be channelled in your favour.



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PLANTS FOR SHADE

Most gardens have a shady spot, a north facing wall, under a tree or in the shadow of the house.

There is a huge range of plants to suit shaded areas including broad-leaved foliagea plants, to spring flowers and ever green flowering shrubs. Ferns are probably the first plant you would think of when it comes to shade — you can choose from a wide range of ferns from dwarf, medium or large. Ferns look very natural when planted under a tree or beside a wall. Most ferns will die back for the winter so if you want all year round foliage you will need to plant something evergreen near the ferns i.e something low growing like the Viburnum Davidii which is a great plant when planted in groups of three. Another good evergreen plant for the shade is the Heuchera which comes in lovely shades including dark to light purple and green to light green.

There is also a wide range of flowering plants for shade. A good example is an Astilbe, an Astilbe has a good range of flower colours and foliage to choose from. An Astilbe has a good range of flower colours and foliage to choose from. Sometimes when an area is shaded, the ground can be quite dry – even in the winter time. A good plant for this would a plant called Vinca Minor which is an evergreen flowering ground cover plant. But remember to water until established.

"...But I am like an olive tree flourishing in the house of God; I trust in God's unfailing Love for ever and ever. For what You have done I will always praise You (for You have rescued me and kept me safe). In the presence of Your faithful people I will hope in Your Name, for Your Name is Good." (Psalm 52:8-9)

Welcome back dear student, the olive tree in the Bible symbolises: (1) Hope and Safety in God's Promises - the dove brought back an olive leaf to Noah after the flood (Genesis 8:11). (2) Peace – 'extending an olive branch' for reconciliation. (3) Longevity – there are olive trees in Israel hundreds of years old. (4) Eternity – its leaves are evergreen, and its wood is strong and enduring. (5) Fruitfulness – the oil is a precious commodity valued for thousands of years to light lamps, cook with, and for medicinal purposes. (6) Prosperity and Provision – the olive tree thrives even in desert conditions – it is robust and deep rooted, producing abundant harvest (Jeremiah 17:8). (7) Fertility and Blessing – God promises the people who walk in His ways will be blessed with children and will live to see their children's children (Psalm 128). (8) Salvation – Isaiah chapter eleven prophesies the coming of Yeshua – Messiah Jesus (the Shoot of Jesse), bringing God's Wisdom, Counsel, Power, and the Knowledge of His Glory to this earth.

Jesus taught that a tree is known by its fruit (Matthew 7:15-23). Note in the Scripture above that the olive tree is symbolic of a person flourishing in the Presence of God, in intimate relationship with the Lord, and this relationship is based upon His unfailing Love or Lovingkindness - known as 'Chesed'. The Hebrew Word (pronounced Hess-ed) means covenantal, unbreakable Love and Mercy. In ancient times 'Chesed' was entered into by two parties as an everlasting agreement, always sealed in blood. The stronger party upheld the Covenant supporting the weaker partner, even at great cost to himself. The Lord Jesus brought us the New Covenant – based upon God's Mercy and Loving kindness, not works (Hebrews 8:8-12; Ephesians 2:4-9).

The New Covenant was sealed with the precious Blood of Jesus, God's Son, Who gave His Life so that whoever will believe in and obey Him, will be saved from the consequences of sin - which is death and separation from God forever in hell (Romans 5:5-6; Romans 6:23). His Blood still speaks for us upon the mercy seat in Heaven. God doesn't require one to gain favour with Him by just being 'a good person', or doing nice things for others, but through believing only in His Son Jesus the Messiah, acknowledging Him as Lord, and repenting of and turning from sin (John 3:16; Mark 16:16; John 14:6). God's Chesed is spoken of throughout the Scriptures. It's vital to understand the true meaning of this Covenant with our beautiful God. He is the stronger partner! He knows our weaknesses, yet His Love is unconditional (Psalm 103:14-18). 'Agape' Love is quite different from 'fickle' worldly love. In order to save us Jesus laid down His Life, putting into action the greatest Gift ever given - forgiveness and right standing with God. Messiah means 'Anointed One' - the Anointing was done with sacred oil from the olive tree. To produce oil, the olive must be pressed upon with incredible pressure. The Lord Jesus was pressed with suffering beyond what any human being ever endured to deliver the Promise of His Spirit for us (Isaiah chapter 53; Luke 22:44). 


NOVENA TO ST. CLAIRE
