



or the first time since 2019, the Killarney Branch of the Kerry Hospice Foundation are hoping the sun will shine for their Sunflower Day fundraiser which takes place on Friday, 10th June.

There will be collections at various locations in and around town as well as Foley's Spar Shop, Fossa and Hegarty's Spar Shop, Muckross.

"This is our first Sunflower Day collection since 2019. It is one of our main annual fundraising events and is always well supported by the local community" Cathal Walshe, PRO., Killarney Hospice Branch, told Killarney Outlook.

The services provided by Kerry Hospice Foundation for people with life limiting illnesses at it's 15 bed inpatient unit and "Suaimhneas" Day Care Centre at University Hospital Kerry have been well documented in recent years. Also highlighted is the fact that it costs in the region of €10,000 weekly to provide these services.

Kerry Hospice Foundation has plans for further expansion of its services into the future. An outreach clinic has already been set up at Killarney Community Hospital where patients can meet with a Palliative Care Specialist. This service along with the existing services would not be possible were it not for the generous support Kerry Hospice gets from



the people of Kerry.

Now his family, parents Patricia and Simon and his brother Diarmuid have organised a walk to remember Jamie with all funds raised on the


day going to the Kerry Hospice Foundation Night Nurse Programme.

PAUL NAGLE'S HELMET AUCTIONED

FOR A STAGGERING €25,000

The helmet that Paul Nagle used during the 2021 World Rally Championship winning season was sold for a staggering €25,000 at a charity auction in Tralee on Saturday night.

The auction was part of the Déjà Vu celebration of Kerry motorsport that took place over the weekend.

Cancer charity Recovery Haven is set to be the main beneficiary of the fundraising effort.

Kerry Motor Club is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year and the Déjà Vu road run was the flagship event in the year-long celebration.

Rally stars like current World Rally Championship contender Craig Breen and five-time WRC event winner Kris Meeke participated in a tour of famous West Kerry rally stages on Saturday.

Other famous drivers in the 150-strong entry list included multiple Irish champion Austin MacHale and former European Rally Champion Patrick Snijers from Belgium.

After the road run, 300 people attended a gala dinner at the event's headquarters, The Rose Hotel.

During the dinner, items were auctioned

off. Items included paintings of famous rally drivers, motorsport trips to museums and, of course, the helmet which was signed by almost every top name associated with the World Rally Championship over the last 20 years.

Nearly €40,000 was raised during the auction with the majority of that sum going to Recovery Haven. Nagle will donate a portion of the helmet sale to his home football club, Fossa GAA too.

The helmet was sold to New York-based Irish rally driver Paul Rowley.

An additional €3,500 was raised by individual donations and bucket collections along the route.

"I don't have the words, we are humbled that we were the chosen charity for this spectacular and fun event," Recovery Haven's PR and Marketing manager Marisa Reidy said.

"We met so many wonderful people from the world of rally and they were so generous and kind. Huge thanks too to Kerry Motor Club and the work they did to bring this event to Tralee."

There will be lifeguards on duty on all Blue Flag Beaches in Kerry at weekends commencing this weekend (Bank Holiday Weekend), increasing to seven days per week on all of those beaches from the beginning of July.

Beachgoers are reminded that lifeguards are only on duty during specific times which are advised locally on each Blue Flag beach and that lifeguards cover only designated patrolled areas which are indicated by the presence of lifeguard flags.

41 lifeguards, who are fully trained, will be on duty on Kerry beaches over the summer.

Kerry County Council is reminding all beachgoers and those swimming and bathing at the county's beaches this summer to act responsibly and safely in the water at all times.

Kerry has 15 Blue Flags for 2022 which were recently awarded by the Blue Flag International Jury (FEE) for meeting a series of high standards – the largest number of such beaches in the country. These include: Rossbeigh, Ballybunion South, Ballybunion North, Ballyheigue, Fenit, Maherbeg, Kells, Doire Fhíonáin (Derrynane), White Strand, Baile an Sceilg (Ballinskelligs), Banna, Fionntrá (Ventry), Inch, Fenit Marina and Portmagee Seasonal Pontoon.

n Sunday May 15th, a Famine Mounment was officially unveiled and blessed on St. Margaret's Road in Killarney. The brainchild of local historian, Noel Grimes, the unveiling coincided with the National Famine Commemoration day 2022.

The monument which was erected as a millennium project in 2000 is at the entrance to St.Columbanus Home which was the former Union workhouse during the Great Famine 1846 to 1850.

Thousands of people from the Killarney area died during the Famine many of whom were buried in unmarked burial sites throughout the town.

Deputy Mayor Cllr. Niall Kelleher unveiled the monument and highlighed the importance of knowing and passing on the history of the area.

The monument was officially blessed by Fr. Kieran O Brien, Brother Pat Lynch of the Franciscan Friary, the Venerable Simon Lumby of St Mary's church of Ireland and Rev. Alison Gallagher of the Methodist church. Also in the photo is Noel Grimes a local historian who's initial idea it was to erect the monument.

MAJOR BUILDING PROJECT CONFIRMED FOR THE SEM

There is good news on the school front for "The Sem" St Brendan's, the school set up in 1860 to ensure a stream of young men entered the priesthood.

The direction of the austere, grey stone and dark corridor school -doubtless designed to keep temptation away from the gaze of young men and keep their heads in the books - has changed somewhat since its foundation.

There is now no boarding and even women young girls may be present and correct. And the new school hopefully will be a bright place and a modern place with facilities to at least provoke a sin of envy!

The Department of Education tells me it "can confirm that a major school building project for St. Brendan's College, Killarney has been approved funding and has been devolved for delivery to the Joint Managerial Body (JMB)."

The brief for this project includes the extension, refurbishment and repurposing of existing accommodation to accommodate a long-term projected enrolment (LTPE) figure of 750 pupils and also includes a 3 classroom base for children with special educational needs.

"The execution of a Service Level Agreement (SLA) between the Department and the JMB has been completed. The JMB completed the procurement of a Design Team for the project in February 2022. This team will now design the buildings, obtain the necessary statutory planning permissions, and move the project onward to tender and construction in due course. As this project is at an early stage of architectural planning, it is too early in the process to provide a timeline for completion of the works."

The refurbishment cannot come soon enough after an incident last



week when emergency services including ambulance and fire were summoned to the school because of a ceiling collapse . Apparently this occurred in and around the central administration part of the building and one person, not a pupil, was injured. The fear according to emergency sources when alerted was that the roof in what is now a very old building had collapsed. But the damage transpired to be confined to part of the ceiling. Alert pupils dialed the emergency services, I hear. have tried in vain to get a response from the school using modern 21st century communication tools such as email, and emailing a number of addresses, not to mention the late nineteenth century tool of the telephone.

But there has been no acknowledgement and the emails have not come back and my mobile has not rung at time of writing.

There must be a very good reason for the lack of response: Or else the light of modern communication and openness needs to dawn in the dark corridors of the 19th century Sem.

A CULTURE OF FIGHTING

The emergence of a fight video in a Killarney lane - just weeks after news broke of a fight club in a second level school - is very disturbing. The fight club school has so far not been named.

The lane fight in daylight as we will call this recent Killarney fracas only emerged after a video was obtained and published by Radio Kerry. It has caused quite a bit of upset.

Fighting such as this in Killarney is associated with late night drunken brawls

Or is it? The Chapel Lane when I went to school was "the" location for fisticuffs. It was where the boys with an issue to resolve would square up against each other at lunchtime or after school.

I can still see Tim Healy, principal of the vocational school, running across the street to put an end to any outbreak with the kind of verbal dressing down that was worse than any slap!

The difference of course is the fights then had cause - just wars if you like - and they were in the mode of the Queensbury rules, with nothing below the belt and certainly no gang kicks on the ground.

What is going on of late seems to have no rules and no cause and no end other than violence itself.

That any young man can see fit to kick someone on the ground in a gang is not Killarney to me. I wonder where the sense of honour has gone and what is being taught at home and indeed at school. I understand teenagrs from a number of schools were represented including from outside Killarney, which suggests there is a culture county wide.

I wonder is our over-concentration and some might say obsession in Ireland with the war in Ukraine something to do with the vicious violence that has erupted since the end of Covid?

And is it time for a hard long look at this culture of fitness for fitness sake that has evolved with some decades? The mayor of Killarney, Marie Moloney, has led the condemnation and concern about the upsurge in violence in broad daylight and has remarked this is not just in Killarney. And she is right in calling for more garda resources to ensure gardai are not just deployed at night in Killarney but are around too during the day.

DUNDAG

What a contrast between grubby sordid incidents among some teenagers and the news that 41 lifeguards dedicating their strength to look after people are starting on our beaches from next weekend!

There will be lifeguards on duty on all Blue Flag Beaches in Kerry at weekends commencing next weekend (Bank Holiday Weekend), increasing to seven days per week on all of those beaches from the beginning of July.

"Beachgoers are reminded that lifeguards are only on duty during specific times which are advised locally on each Blue Flag beach and that lifeguards cover only designated patrolled areas which are indicated by the presence of lifeguard flags," council spokesman Owen O'Shea said.

What is interesting also is how this county had no problem recruiting enthusiastic young women only too eager to head out and help others. This is in stark contrast to other

counties I hear where there is difficulty attracting candidates. Kerry has 15 Blue Flags for 2022 which were recently awarded by the Blue Flag International Jury (FEE) for meeting a series of high standards - the largest number of such beaches in the country. include: Rossbeigh, These Ballybunion South, Ballybunion Ballyheigue, North. Fenit. Maherbeg, Kells, Doire Fhíonáin (Derrynane), White Strand, Baile an Sceila (Ballinskelligs), Banna, Fionntrá (Ventry), Inch, Fenit Marina and Portmagee Seasonal Pontoon.

I still think it is high time we developed a beach - with lifeguards - at Dundag in Muckross which is such a popular swimming spot all year round now. It is many years since the idea was put forward and it is still worth pursuing.





CURRANE ANGLERS ARE NEEDED

FOR CITIZEN SCIENCE SURVEY TO EXAMINE FISH STOCKS

nland Fisheries Ireland (IFI), the state agency responsible for the conservation and protection of freshwater fish, habitats and sea angling resources is asking anglers who have fished the Currane catchment in Co. Kerry for their views. A new online survey has been developed to gather anglers' knowledge - the survey method called FLEKSI was developed by IFI to help give an insight into the status of the fishery. Over recent decades populations of sea trout and salmon throughout Ireland are facing serious challenges from various ecological changes. IFI's Currane STAMP programme is already assessing fish populations within their freshwater and marine phases to report current status and provide scientific advice

to support the development of appropriate conservation management measures.

The data gathered in the FLEKSI survey has the potential for citizens to get involved and provide important insights to guide fisheries management in the future. This survey is for all anglers who fish in the Currane catchment for various species. all responses will help us to build an understanding of the history and ecological status of your fishery.

FLEKSI, which stands for Fisher's Local Ecological Knowledge Surveillance Indicators aims to capture anglers' knowledge and hands-on experience to help track changes in fish stocks and ecosystems.

The Currane catchment in Co. Kerry is Ireland's most important sea trout fishery,

with a long history of high-quality fishing, particularly for larger sea trout. The fishery is renowned internationally and has been the cornerstone of sea trout and salmon fishing in the southwest of the country since the 1900s. The FLEKSI survey will give anglers on the Currane catchment an exciting opportunity to share their knowledge as citizen scientists and to make a valuable contribution towards fisheries management on the fishery.

Likewise Junior Cert candidates should do the same in English, Religious Education, Irish, History, Geography and Maths. On Monday, concentrate on the tips and predictions for subjects being examined the first week. Don't cram on the days before the exam as this may cause confusion and fatigue.

Spent an hour or two on Tuesday skimming over your notes for Wednesday's exams and leave it at that. Some relaxed leisure will be more beneficial than spending the day cramming material that you may not recall anyway. You need a clear and alert mind going into the exams on Wednesday morning.

On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts and ideas are fresh in your mind. Heavy study sessions on the night prior to any paper are not a good idea as you will be exhausted the following morning. Instead, relax and get a good night's rest. Put all thoughts of the following day's exam out of your mind. If you find it difficult to sleep, try a little non-academic reading for a short while. Over the next few days check your equipment and assemble your exam materials - black or blue biros, pencils, ruler, eraser, drawing instruments, calculator and so on. Have at least two biros or fountain pens in case one doesn't work properly. It's time, too, to organise your personal needs such as a watch and tissues.

A few nerves are normal on the first day so be prepared to deal with it. A relaxation exercise or maybe a shower to freshen up will do the trick. Eat a nutritious breakfast as you'll need the extra reserves of energy. Finally, go through your equipment checklist before leaving home. On Wednesday morning arrive at the exam centre at least a half hour before the exam begins. For all subsequent exams be present about fifteen minutes before the appointed time. Spend the few minutes before entering the exam centre on your own in peace and quiet. At all costs, avoid groups that are involved in last minute revision. If you need to, use the bathroom before you enter the exam centre. Be in your seat a few moments before the exam is due to begin. Synchronise your watch with the clock on the wall and use your watch or the clock to help you pace your work. Check your seat and desk for firmness and stability. A shaky desk will torment you and distract you during the exam. When the answer book is distributed, fill in the required details and read the directions. When you receive your question paper read the instructions carefully in case there is any change of format. Don't be put off by your first glance at the paper. It's new and it will look unfamiliar at first. Once the exam begins, keep to your prepared answering plan and address the questions which are asked.

If you finish a paper before the time is up, do not leave the exam centre. Recheck your work and extra information may come to you. Attempt an extra question only when you have thoroughly answered the previous questions. Once an exam is over, spend as little time as possible on a post-mortem. Focus on the next paper and when the entire exam is over, forget about it and enjoy your summer. There is no advantage in dwelling on what might have been. Be happy and satisfied that you have done your best. Good luck to all candidates starting exams next week.

PREPARATION FOR

SOUTH KERRY GREENWAY

The staunchest supporter of the South Kerry Greenway has warned that we must not get complacent just because the legal obstacles to the project have been surmounted.

Councillor Michael Cahill has called for all ancillary works, public toilets, parking and safe entry/exit be put in place at both Glenbeigh and Caherciveen down to Renard Point, start and finish of the route.

"When developing a "world class project, no cost should be spared and this should apply to the South Kerry Greenway, big time. We must develop the entry and exit points to be prepared for secure car and bicycle parking, safe flow through access, and take account of local requirements and all of these measures must apply to Glenbeigh, Cahersiveen down to Renard " stated the Deputy Mayor of Kerry and Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District.

"Both ends of the Greenway, for different reasons, are already under pressure, traffic wise, before the additional footfall that the South Kerry Greenway will create. We must prepare



now in order to be in a position to cater for the huge numbers of people who will wish to avail of this fantastic facility on a daily basis" said Councillor Cahill.

"Lack of basic infrastructure such as public toilets, parking, safe entry and exit, could spoil the feel good factor that this 'Gamechanger' facility will no doubt provide for all who use it and now is the time to put these things in place. It would be silly not to get working on all these preparations straight away" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Irish Water too need to get off their laurels in regard to what I keep describing at 'County Kerry's biggest Tourism project ever' by providing a new Sewerage Scheme in Glenbeigh Village as the existing one is at capacity and planning applications continue to be refused and this is prohibiting important development. The same applies to the extension of the Cahersiveen Sewerage Scheme to Renard Point" said Councillor Cahill. "From the beginning I have called for all ancillary works and accommodations to be put in place for landowners and the exact same should be done for Greenway users, passing and local traffic as well" stated the Fianna Fáil man.

"We must get "Greenway ready" added Councillor Cahill.

WHY SHOULD YOU REVIEW YOUR PENSION?

- 1. To check the performance of your pension and what funds you are invested in. This is VERY IMPORTANT, for example, if your pension is investedin high risk funds your total pension fund could substantially reduce over a short period of time and if you are coming close to retirement this could result in you having much less of a pension when you retire.
- 2. Is your pension on target to reach the income you want on retirement? This should be checked on regular occasions, at least annually, if your pension is not on target changes can be made to help and try to put your pension back on track again.








Is my skins pH important and how does it affect my skin?

HOW TO TREAT EYE ALLERGIES

Allergic conjunctivitis is commonly caused by sensitivity to grass and tree pollen, dust mites or animals. It is far more common in those with a history of allergies or those who have a family history of allergies.

Symptoms

Allergic conjunctivitis usually causes pink or red itchy eyes. The eyes are normally watery and other allergy symptoms such as sneezing and a runny nose may be present.

The seasonal type of allergic conjunctivitis will vary with the time of year and weather conditions. Those with more general allergies, such as an allergy to dust mites, will most likely have symptoms throughout the

TREATMENT

You can treat allergic conjunctivitis bv:

- Avoiding the cause of the allergy (if possible)
- Using cold compresses (such as clean cotton wool balls soaked in cold water) to soothe the eyes

Avoiding rubbing your eyes as this will make the symptoms worse

There is also a range of medicines that may help. Some are available over the counter at the pharmacy and other stronger medicines need a prescription.

Mast-cell stabiliser eye drops such as sodium cromoglicate (Opticrom) do not work straight away. Instead, they take a few days to start to work. These drops are good if you know when you are likely to develop an allergy and so you can use them to prevent symptoms

Antihistamine eye drops such as antazoline sulphate (Otrivine-Antistin) provide a more immediate effect. They won't prevent an allergic reaction, but instead treat the symptoms once the allergy has started.

Antihistamine tablets work in the same way as the eye drops, but will also treat other allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and sneezing that is caused by the allergy.

You should not wear contact lenses if your symptoms are severe or if you have been told that your cornea is affected. Do not put drops in your eyes while wearing contact lenses. Remember:

• Avoid rubbing your eyes, as this may make your symptoms worse

- Use a cold compress to soothe your
- · Wearing glasses or sunglasses may help to shield your eyes from pollen







KERRY CRUISE PAST LIMERICK

No-one was predicting that Limerick would sweep into Killarney like whirling dervishes and promptly put Kerry to the sword. But to be honest, this was an even tamer capitulation than I had expected. Limerick never merged from their defensive shell, and weren't going all in on challenges as far as I could see. I don't mean that they weren't trying, but they were doing so without hope or conviction. As a consequence, I don't think Kerry can take too much away from this one.

Killian Spillane is one definite take-away, he has proven that he is still a real contender for a starting jersey. Confidence is key for scoring forwards and Killian looked in top form here, opening Kerry's account with a beauty. But when David Clifford returns, as he of course will, and against more ambitious opposition, I suspect that his older brother will still be starting ahead of him.

Josh Ryan replied with a free, but the Kerry procession was only starting. Diarmuid O'Connor and Jack Barry were well on top in midfield, and the pace of Paudie Clifford and Stephen O'Brien was able to put nicks in Limerick's defensive line. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, Tony Brosnan, and Seán O'Shea fired over. Tony Brosnan was just millimetres away from a goal. lain Corbett pulled one back – Corbett is a fine footballer - but Paul Geaney, Paudie Clifford, and Killian again (a great score) stretched Kerry's lead. Kerry were already cruising although I did think they were carrying the ball unnecessarily far with options in front of them and some of the shot selection was overambitious. That's a minor quibble, certainly not a criticism. Josh Ryan kicked Limerick's third point, but Kerry finished the half strongly with points from Gavin White, Killian again, Seán O'Shea, and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch.

Half-time Kerry 0-12 Limerick 0-3. The lead should have been bigger, if anything.

And it very soon was. Paul Geaney, Tom O'Sullivan, Paudie Clifford, Stephen O'Brien, Tony Brosnan, Seán O'Shea.....Kerry players were queueing up to shoot and profiting from it. This contest was well over, and everybody knew it. Ian Corbett pulled another one back - great footballer, but nobody was paying too much attention by now. Especially when Killian Spillane got in (great pass by Paul Geaney, and good movement from Killian) and produced a neat finish for the goal that Kerry had always been threatening.

I remember great Munster Finals. We had great battles with Cork down the years - I can understand Cork's resentment when Mick O'Dwyer would inform the losing dressing room that they were the second best team in Ireland, but it wasn't a patronising statement; it was more often than not the literal truth. I was there when we were beaten by Clare - we

weren't at our best by any means, but that was a genuinely great Clare team who were full value for their win and played superb football. This one....this one will be forgotten very quickly.

Kerry ran their bench, with Adrian Spillane and Micheál Burns looking very sharp and David Moran his imperious self. In the end it was a 23 point gap, and most people felt that Kerry had an extra gear in them if needed.

The big take-away, and a very serious one, is that this facsimile of a contest is the only one that Kerry will have for the bones of two months - and that's not including as one-sided a League Final as I can remember. The League in general was a bit too easy for me after that opening humdinger against Kildare (and their subsequent progress tells us something. It's no fault of Kerry's but we are entering the knockout stages cold, and it's a big worry for me. The harsh truth and an anomaly in the system is that Kerry would actually have been better off losing to Cork and going into the back door. We'd have had more games of a higher intensity, and that's what we need.

Just under 15,000 made their way to the Fitzgerald Stadium for what should be one of the marquee games of the summer. They didn't get value for money, and they didn't learn very much.

Rumours of Dublin's demise after last year's semi-final defeat and a dismal League campaign were greatly exaggerated, to say the

Ciarán Kilkenny scored the first goal after just five minutes. Cormac Costello pounced after a Dean Rock effort came off the post and Costello reacted fastest to gather and finish. Luck? No, predatory alertness. His second was a great

finish. John Small, racing up from wing back (Dublin work the channels brilliantly) gathered a good ball from Bugler and smashed it to the net. Eoin Murchan found space for a driving run (yes, I thought of the 2019 replay as well) before laying off to Costello, who in turn gave it to Con O'Callaghan for the finish. 5-5 to 0-4, and the half-time whistle hadn't sounded vet. DERRY WIN IN DULL FINAL

Ulster Final: Derry 1-16 Donegal 1-14

This was much, much closer than either the Munster or Leinster Final. In theory, then, it should have been a much more entertaining game. Nope. This was the worst of the lot.

Look, there is a popular cliché of Ulster football as dour and defensive. It certainly sees more flare-ups of indiscipline than other provinces, but it's also much more competitive than the other provinces. It has produced the likes of the two James McCartans, Oisin McConville, Jamie Clarke. And, of course, Peter Canavan. Brilliant footballers who would grace any stage.

But....but nowadays, the likes of Canavan and McConville would hardly be allowed to flourish. Because the bottom line is that Ulster teams play extremely defensively. It's always blanket defence without possession (and every other team, including ourselves, has copied them in that regard) but it's very often blanket defence when you have possession as well. Always counter-attack, but never attack. Efficiency and power seem to be the bywords; flair and panache are worthy of mistrust. Am I being

Last Sunday Michael Murphy, arguably the best attacking footballer of a generation, was deployed in midfield or behind it. Hah?

I've liked the look of Derry for a while. A lot of those players gave both the Sem and the Kerry minors right good rattles, and did it with style along the way. They weren't defensive teams – in fairness Conor Glass would have no problem taking anybody on. McGuigan had an unnerving but admirable habit of always, always looking for the goal chance before considering other options.

You can call it innocence and argue that an unwillingness to do something unpredictable is a sign of their maturing as footballers. I won't agree with you.

This was a close, hard-fought final. Eventually, with the scores deadlocked and Donegal in possession, they decided to trust their fitness more than their football, and held onto the ball instead of attacking. In extra-time, Derry were

just as fit as they were (and both teams were very, very fit) and deserved to win it. In the end Donegal's last roll of the dice was a predictable Michael Murphy thunderbolt into a crowded square – they had left much better attacking opportunities go a-begging earlier.

You'd have to be pleased for Derry; they were in the doldrums for a very long time. But the last time they won it, Joe Brolly was provoking everyone by blowing kisses to the crowd (it was never malicious, but it was never as funny as he thought either). Be fair to Brolly, he had panache, and it's been lacking in Ulster for a while. The GAA has a real problem if this is what they are serving up for entertainment.

GALWAY TRIUMPH IN CONNAUGHT

Connaught Final:

Galway 2-19 Roscommon 2-16

Connaught finals have actually been more negative than Ulster finals in the recent past, but they have always had the potential for better entertainment. Galway, in particular, have always had a reputation as open footballers, willing to throw caution to the wind. That reputation goes back generations, to at least the sixties. When you think of Galway, you think of Donnellan in full flight or Joyce dancing through the gaps. I thought Galway played like that in Pádraic Joyce's first year in charge – I had very, very high hopes for them – but amid accusations of naivety they seemed to retreat back into a shell.

This was the Galway I wanted to see. For that matter, the Rossies as well. Just like we all have a soft spot for Mayo nationally, in Connaught there's something eminently likeable about Roscommon. Always up against it; never really caring.

Some people had Roscommon as favourites here on the basis of their league wins over Galway, especially that absolutely thriller of a Division two Final. Not me. I actually thought that Galway were fractionally the better of the two sides that day. Regardless, I don't rate the League all that much in terms of championship ground. The old giants tend to rise as the ground hardens and Galway are one of those. In the end they had three points to spare and it could have been more. Shane Walsh was the main man - a real powerhouse up front and a very good finisher. But they needed those first half goals. Are Galway among the top contenders? I'm not convinced yet, to be honest, not on a day when the space is choked off by multiple defenders.

Roscommon took 2-16 off them. But I think that says more about Roscommon's attack than Galway's defence – Roscommon is going to be a bad quarter-final draw for some-one.

BACK DOOR GAMES

Kerry, Dublin, Derry, and Galway are into quarter-finals. Limerick, Roscommon, Donegal, and Kildare await the winners of next weekend's games.

Tyrone and Armagh is going to make the headlines. Champions Tyrone have seen a lot of players drop out, but those players had few realistic chances of game time. I'm surprised to see Ruairi Canavan joining his older brother on the panel; obviously a great talent but is he physically ready for senior at this level? It might be part of a long-term development process. Certainly, in the short-term Tyrone should have the credentials to win this, but Armagh have become a bit of a bugbear for them. Discipline will be important, and frankly I agreed with the red cards shown on their last couple of meetings (mostly overturned). Armagh have slightly better attackers – Rian O'Neill is a natural superstar – but Tyrone are simply harder to beat and I expect them to have the edge.

Cork v Louth. The biggest county against the smallest. To be honest, I thought Cork held us a fair while without ever going handle after hatchet. If they were at full strength, I'd definitely favour Cork, and I still give them the advantage. Missing Flahive, Meehan, and O'Driscoll, though....that's a big ask. And Mickey Harte is the joker in that pack, the League Finals proved that Louth are absolutely humming. Nonetheless, I think the likes of Sherlock and O'Mahony will get scores that Louth can't.

Mayo v Monaghan. Jaysus. I'd be slow enough to call it, but I think Mayo might just about have enough on their home ground. What will be really interesting is to see if they have a full panel available; I think we haven't seen Mayo at their best this year yet – which might be a great sign for them going forward. I'd pay absolutely no attention to that League Final against Kerry, they were missing a lot of good players. Monaghan are a really tough footballing team in their own right, even if a bit reliant on the maestro for scores. If Mayo can beat them, as I think they will, it'll certainly sound alarm bells for me.

No offence to either, but Meath v Clare is not in the same category. On paper Meath should win this one, but Clare are a tough side to put away – they gave us plenty of battles but no real frights in recent years. But respectfully, I can only see the winner of that one falling at the next hurdle.

TAILLTEANN CUP

I didn't get to see any of last weekend's games. There was simply too much on. It's a real pity, because from the sounds of it, they were much better fare than what I did get to see. I know that the GAA promised to give this competition adequate coverage; the issue is that it was always a promise they couldn't keep, simply because the media decide what sells and that's what they publish; the GAA have no great say in that. Personally, I think that this competition is the way to go - I think that teams can have realistic targets for silverware. In the old days a shock victory for a weaker county (and don't bother with the patronising 'so-called;' some counties actually are weaker) was only a guarantee that another behemoth would be on the way.

The quarter-finals have been confirmed. Leitrim are at home to Sligo – personally, I think Leitrim could go all the way. Fermanagh are at home to Cavan, who are the general favourites for the competition. New York enter the competition

and will travel to Offaly - you'd surely bank on the Faithful for that one. Carlow will host Westmeath - that's two very good teams, and could be the best game of them all. I fancy Westmeath to just about shade it.

As I say, it very much sounds like the Taillteann Cup has thrown up much more entertaining games than the Sam Maguire. Ah well, we're at the business end of both now, hopefully there are some cracking games in store.

NO JOY FOR KERRY LADIES Munster Final: Cork 2-11 Kerry 1-9

Kerry are still waiting for a Munster title, but they have been edging closer year after year (I especially think that Division One football next

Spring will sharpen our edges nicely). This was actually a good, battling performance by Kerry, without ever really threatening to knock Cork off their perch.

Anna Galvin and Orla Finn, two of the best players on the pitch, traded early points. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh picked off a free, but Libby Coppinger replied. RUGBY Heineken Cup Final: La Rochelle 24 Leinster 21



The winners take all the plaudits. They will invariably be praised for getting all their decisions right and teams will slavishly copy their manager next year. The losers, of course, deserved to lose.

Sport, as opposed to sports reporting, is never that cut and dried. The fact is that Leinster were the best team for most of this game, while La Rochelle were playing second best. A late yellow card appeared to have certainly scuppered their chances. But the French outfit dug very deep and Leinster simply didn't.

Do not get me wrong. This is not the schadenfreude of a Munster supporter. Love it or loathe it, Ireland's chances in the World Cup will be largely dependent on these Leinster players and a win here would have been great overall for Irish rugby.

Leinster made all the early running. La Rochelle handled it well, but did cough up a penalty and Billy Keane's godson did the needful. He soon had a second one for offside - La Rochelle were struggling with Leinster's direct running - and it was 6-0. It didn't last long, though, as the French side got in for the opening try. I know it's easy to be critical while sitting down in front of the TV (with tea and chocolate hobnobs, just to set the scene) but I really thought Rhule skipped past tackles too easily. All the top teams have this kind of pace; you have to make contact. West easily converted and La Rochelle were ahead, 7 to 6.

La Rochelle were the side in control now, but again Leinster's defence were equal to the task. Leinster got a penalty – I wasn't quite sure what happened, to be honest, but I knew what Johnny was going to do before he did it. They went close enough to a try themselves with a good break by Henshaw (used right, I really think he could be the best in the world, but is so often forced to snuff out small fires) but the defender got there first. Johnny also had a cheeky go at a drop goal. It didn't work, but I liked the confidence, almost audacity, to try it.

Leinster had to defend with everything they had before Barnes awarded then a penalty to relieve the pressure. They needed it. Just before half-time, Van der Flier makes a burst that ends up in a penalty for Leinster.

You'd have to strongly favour the four-time champions at this stage. That said, La Rochelle have done better in the second half of almost all their games.

As they show instantly, the lively Priso winning a penalty straightaway and West converting. Leinster settle and win a handy enough penalty for Johnny. 15 - 10 to Leinster. It had the feel of a 'next-score-wins' game and I expected Leinster to score next. They did, another move started by Henshaw and another penalty for Johnny. 18-10 with 25 minutes to go.

Then Leinster got sloppy. There's no nice way to say it. Johnny tried to sell an unnecessary dummy and no-one was buying. Keenan should have kicked it out but didn't and was swallowed up. That wasn't hard to deal with, lads, ye got a bit cocky.

And paid a big price. La Rochelle kicked it to the corner, won the throw, and powered over the line. Copybook stuff. West converted and it was 18-17. In Alex Ferguson's heyday, this was known as 'squeaky bum' time....

Silly trip by Lavault on Gibson Park. Yellow card and off he goes. Talk about an unforced error! Penalty for Leinster, and Ross Byrne nails it (must have been a nervous moment for the apprentice jedi, but he did well). 21-17. Not exactly breathing space on the scoreboard, but the extra man should surely count for a lot.

La Rochelle were doing all the pressing now. And, agonising for Leinster, they get over in the 79th minute.

Heartbreak, especially after being in front for so long. I'm genuinely sympathetic, but a cold and clear eye will say that Leinster simply made too many mistakes when it counted. La Rochelle couldn't be accused of deftness of touch or brilliance, but they did all the small things right most of the time. Leinster only made a couple of mistakes, but it's rugby...they can be and were hugely costly.

Ronan O'Gara was suitably gracious in victory. And this is some victory for a star player who took the long and patient route to coaching, learning his trade thoroughly.

The question isn't whether Munster or Ireland would welcome him back with open arms. The question is whether they will be able to afford him?

CHAMPIONS LEAGUE FINAL

Goal surely, even if not the prettiest. Hang on. No goal. Benzema was still offside when Valverde got a touch on the ball...but surely it came off a defender after that? SUMMER FLOWERING SHRUBS

From now until late autumn there is a large range of flowering shrubs in all different sizes and from evergreen to deciduous for you to choose from. Some can have a short flowering time and others can flower right through the summer.

Remember when choosing your flowering shrubs that you find out the flowering period as this can determine the position that you are going to plant your shrub. A good example of a deciduous flowering shrub that will flower for a long period over the summer is a shrub called Potentilla. It comes in a good range of colours also, including white, yellow, orange and red. It is a medium to small sized shrub and if you have a small space, Potentilla Red Ace is quite a compact one and would be suitable.

As with most flowring shrubs, the flowers will go off as the season goes on so remember to dead-head every few weeks.



weed.



hard heart hinders us from receiving healing. Often it's wrongly perceived that someone who is hardhearted must be a ruthless, cruel person, but this is not always the truth. People who have endured difficult things in life can develop a hard heart in certain areas hidden deep inside. A person who has been wounded or betrayed by another can make an inner vow to never trust anyone ever again. This then twists their perception to always view people or situations through that lens. Another instance can be if someone has prayed to God for a certain thing and then it doesn't work out the way they had planned, the disappointment they feel can develop a hard heart towards God and His Word. For the person with the hard heart life is continually skewed, and the walls they build up just keep getting higher - keeping out those they want nothing to do with, but those walls also hem them into a lonely, helpless place. This is not God's will for anyone and His Holy Spirit will bring transformation (John 15:7-15; Romans 12:2). The first step to overcome hard heartedness in any area is humility (James 4:6-10; 1 Peter 5:6-8). To acknowledge 'I have a problem, and I want to overcome it'. The best Person to approach for healing is the Lord. He is merciful, faithful and His loving-kindness endures forever (Psalm 100). "....And it will be said, Build up, build up, clear the way. Remove the stumbling block out of the way of the spiritual return of My people. For the High and Exalted One - He who inhabits eternity, Whose name is Holy says this, 'I dwell on the high and holy place, But also with the contrite and humble in spirit. In order to revive the spirit of the humble and to revive the heart of the contrite overcome with sorrow for sin (Isaiah 57:14-15 Amplified Bible). Repentance and humility opens the door for God's healing for every human being who, for whatever circumstances, has felt far from God. "...I have seen his wilful ways but I will heal him. I will lead him also and will restore comfort to him and to those who mourn for him....and I will heal him (making his lips blossom anew with thankful praise)" (Isaiah 57:18-19 AMP)

Life can be very lonely for those whose hearts have been hardened for whatever reason. Even though there may have been great wrongs done to us, we still have a choice to make - 'what will my response will be?' If I decide to live embittered and resentful my life is not going to be either peaceful or blessed. But when I bring the pain and the sorrow and anger to the Lord Jesus and I am honest before Him, His Holy Spirit will lead me through His Word to identify the areas that I need to repent, or release and make right, including breaking down those walls of hostility that I have allowed to be built (Hosea 10:12). This may leave me feeling vulnerable, but God promises "...do not fear anything for I Am with you. Do not be afraid for I Am your God. I will strengthen you and I will help you. I will uphold you with my Righteous right hand (Isaiah 41:10). God WILL do it - because He loves you.


