

The Dawn was Produced & Directed by Tom Cooper and filmed in the Killarney area during 1934/35 and released in 1936.


Set during the Irish War of Independence, it was the first indigenous sound production made in Ireland. It was released in the United States under the title Dawn Over Ireland.

The cast comprised 250 amateur actors from the local area, many of them Irish Republican Army veterans.

The Dawn was the first full-length that captured all the glamour, romance, and especially the glory and tragedy of the wars of independence.



KILCUMMIN COMMUNITY COME TOGETHER

TO LAUNCH THREE YEAR PLAN

The vibrant, growing community of Kilcummin has come together to launch a three year plan.

Situated in East Kerry just 5 kilometres from Killarney town and with a population of over 2,000 the popular area boasts the biggest cohort of residents under the age of 18. As such, the development and sustainability of the village will continue as it grows and develops along with its residents.

The development of the Kilcummin 3-Year Community Plan was commissioned by the Kilcummin Looking Good Committee and was part funded by NEWKD under the LEADER Rural Development Programme and Kerry County Council and the plan has been developed by Tom O'Leary & Associates. This Community Plan was launched on Monday in Kilcummin Community Biodiversity Park and it provides a blueprint for the future development of Kilcummin with a focus on priority initiatives and actions that will shape the future of the community as a vibrant and sustainable place to live. The future developments that Kilcummin Looking Good hope to implement are underpinned from research, public consultation and take into account infrastructure and different demographics and socio economic backgrounds.

Kilcummin Looking Good would like to outline

some of the main features that they hope to work on over the next three years, however this is not an exhaustive list but a snippet of what is to come and if you would like to avail of the full plan – copies are available from the Rural Development Office.

- Traffic calming at the entrances to the village
- Pedestrian crossings and the expansion and development of footpaths
- Continued lobbying for an upgrade to the wastewater treatment
- Support the development of the facilities at the GAA grounds and Mastergeeha Soccer Pitch
- Further develop the Community Biodiversity Park
- Promote and develop biodiversity in the schools and within the clubs

Although the Kilcummin Looking Good committee are spearheading these initiatives; a holistic approach including the schools, clubs and community members is pivotal to implementing these changes. It is important that we create our own identity as a village and not merely a commuter village servicing Killarney. The community has its own unique characteristics and assets that need to be sustained.

Kilcummin Looking Good acknowledge

securing funding of €25,000 under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2020 from Kerry Co Council and a contribution of €5,000 from Councillor Marie Moloney.

This has allowed the further development of the Community Biodiversity Park with new wheel chair friendly walk ways, a beautifully designed story telling circle, a 'sense of time' area, fresh peat free compost from our organic composter, new raised beds. It has also allowed for the provision of bike stands within the Village, National Schools, GAA and Soccer pitches and so much more.

Kilcummin Looking Good deeply appreciate the invaluable contribution of lan Mc Gregor (Gortbrack Organic Farm) for his work in the development of the Community Biodiversity Park and for his continued guidance and support. Kilcummin Looking Good also acknowledge the continuing excellent work in maintaining the village and Community Biodiversity Park by the employees from the local Community Employment Scheme

For many years, Christy was the man at the helm in the landmark Quill's building on the Main Street-High Street junction in Killarney and he played a very active role in the commercial life and business development of the town.



THE EASING OF IONS

Tuesday evening the Taoiseach Micheál Martin announced details of the next and final phase of our journey through the Covid-19 pandemic.

"From 6th September, we will see an easing of restrictions on organised indoor and outdoor events and mass gatherings. From that date, theatre, music and live events can take place for vaccinated people at 60% capacity indoors and 75% capacity outdoors. Religious services will be allowed to proceed at up to 50% capacity. Then, from 20th September we will ease restrictions on indoor and outdoor group activities."

HERE ARE GUIDLINES TO THE CHANGES

Family and social gatherings: If you or any of the people you live with aren't fully vaccinated -you can have visitors from 1 other household where everyone is not fully vaccinated there is no limit on the number of people who can visit together if they are all fully vaccinated or have recovered from COVID-19 in the last 9 months. If you are fully vaccinated you can meet indoors with unvaccinated people from a single household, as long as they are not at risk of severe illness and no more than 3 households are present

Weddings: Weddings can go ahead with up to 100 guests for wedding ceremony and reception. More advice on weddings is available here.

Theatres and cinemas: Up to 50 patrons permitted, with protective measures in place. **Organised indoor events (such as large conferences, concerts and shows)**: These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager. They are not permitted right now.

Organised outdoor events: A maximum of 200 attendees can attend the majority of venues. A limit of 500 people is in place for

venues with capacity greater than 5,000 with appropriate protective measures in place - including social distancing requirements.

Summer camps: Summer camps should adhere to public health measures on organised indoor and outdoor activities as appropriate, applying at the time. Currently outdoor camps can go ahead, but indoor camps are not permitted.

Outdoor amusement/theme parks/ funfairs: Can open with protective measures in place.

Drive-in cinema and drive-in bingo: Can open with protective measures in place.

Exercise and sporting activities: Outdoor training in pods of a maximum of 15 people is allowed gyms, swimming pools, leisure centres are permitted to open for individual training only with protective measures swim lessons and classes can take place

other indoor sporting activities including matches, group/team training and exercise/ dance classes are not permitted outdoor sports matches are permitted, with attendance in line with the regulations for organised outdoor events


Funerals: The number of mourners permitted at funeral services is 50 people, regardless of size of venue. Attendance at wakes in private homes and at funeral homes is for family only. Related family gatherings should strictly adhere to prevailing public health advice on household mixing, including visitors to your home and indoor and outdoor dining.

Baptisms, communions and confirmations

It is advised that First Holy Communions and Confirmations should not take place at this time. Further advice will follow on resumption of these ceremonies when it is safe to do so. Baptism services may now proceed. However, they must follow all protective measures and social gatherings afterwards should be avoided.

Other religious services: In-person religious services are permitted with protective measures with a maximum attendance of 50 people.

Where the size of the premises allows for a capacity of greater than 50 this may be



Social distancing guidelines are adhered to the premises can be subdivided into distinct sections (cordoned or marked appropriately) of not more than 50 persons in each section There is a minimum of 4 metres between sections

Each section has its own entrance and exit route

There are separate arrangements for elements of the service involving close contact, for example the distribution of Holy Communion Strictly no movement of people between sections before, during or after the service the premises is well-ventilated

Galleries, museums and other cultural attractions can open with protective measures in place.

Libraries: Can open for lending services. No access to reader spaces/PCs.

Other indoor leisure facilities: Closed (for example: circuses, play centres, amusement arcades, bingo halls, leisure facilities).

Bars, cafes and restaurants: Services permitted with protective measures in place. **Nightclubs, discos and casinos**: Closed.

Hotels, guesthouses, B&Bs and other accommodation: Can open with protective measures in place. Services such as leisure facilities must be restricted to overnight guests/residents only.

Retail and personal services: Can open with protective measures in place.

Personal services such as hairdressers, barbers and beauticians can open by appointment only.



Kerry Diocesan Virtual Pilgrimage to Lourdes is happening September 2nd to 7th 2021 see the attached schedule.





LEAVING CERT RESULTS TODAY BUT BE AWARE OF THE FAST-MOVING TIMELINE





The long wait for Leaving Cert candidates finally comes to an end at 10am on this Friday, 3rd Sept. when Leaving Cert and Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) results will be issued by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) directly to candidates through the Candidate Self Service Portal (CSSP). Candidates will be able to access the CSSP at www.gov.ie/leavingcertificate.ie or www.examinations. ie. Leaving Cert results will be simultaneously issued to candidates' schools at 10am.

In any subject where candidates sat the exam and also opted to receive accredited grades, they will be credited with the better of the two results. Candidates' results will be also be transferred directly to the CAO to facilitate smooth progression to higher education.

Candidates will have access to their written exam component marks and final marks as well as their accredited marks and teachers estimated marks from 5pm on Tues., 7th Sept. That means that candidates will be able to compare their written exam grades with their accredited grades. Candidates will also be able to compare their accredited marks with the teachers estimated marks. It should lead to some very interesting comparisons!

Candidates can apply to view their scripts from 5pm on Tues, 7th Sept. until 8pm on Wed., 8th Sept. It's well worth viewing your marked scripts before deciding to appeal any subject(s) results.

Both scripts marked on paper and scripts

marked online will be available to candidates for viewing. In the case of the former each candidate will be assigned one of three sessions on Sat., 11th Sept. Session One is from 9am to 11am, Session Two is from 12pm to 2pm and Session Three takes place from 3pm to 5pm. Schools have been given the option of an additional session on Sun. morning, 12th Sept., if required. Online access to view scripts that were marked online will also be available from 9am on Sat., 11th Sept.

Any candidate who wishes to submit an appeal application against an awarded grade

- commonly called 'applying for a recheck'
- can do so between 9am on Sat., 11th Sept. and 12pm on Mon., 13th Sept. Appeals can be submitted against both the exam grades and the accredited grades. Until such time as the number of appeals is known, the SEC won't commit to a specific date for publishing the appeal results.

This year's timelines for candidates to apply to view scripts and to lodge their appeal applications are very tight. The SEC maintains that these timelines are essential to ensure that the remaining stages of the appeal process can be completed as quickly as possible. I sincerely hope that the appeal results will be issued in time for candidates, who benefit from a CAO offer as a result of an upgrade, to take up the offer this year rather than having to defer until 2022.

Round One, the main round of CAO offers, and points requirements will be available online at www.cao.ie from 2pm, Tuesday, 7th Sept., and successful applicants will also receive offer notification by email and text message, if they have selected this option. There will be no postal offer notices. CAO Round One offers must be accepted by 3.00 pm, Mon, 13th Sept. CAO Round Two offers and points requirements will be available at www.cao.ie from 10am, Mon., 20th Sept. CAO Round Two offers must be accepted by 3.00, Wed, 22nd Sept.

The very best of luck to all candidates getting Leaving Cert results today. If any Leaving Cert cohort ever deserved success, the 2021 Class certainly does after two challenging academic years.



DEVELOPMENT OF ONE-OFF HOUSING WILL CONTINUE

in Kerry to revitalise our communities - Griffin

one-off housing, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said one-off housing plays a small but important role in accommodating our growing population in Kerry and Government can give a firm commitment that are no plans in place to restrict this type of development.

Deputy Griffin continued: "There has been much discussion recently on the issue of one off housing and rural planning and reports this type of development will be banned from next March, which is untrue as the Minister for Planning and Local Government Peter Burke TD has already stated. Fine Gael's plan is to revitalise our rural communities.

"The Government acknowledge that there will always be demand for one off housing in Kerry and there remains capacity within our National Planning Framework to allow for people who

There are no plans to ban the development of [live and work in the countryside to build their homes close to their families and workplace.

"One off housing is a small aspect of the current national housing supply but there will always be demand for this development with a design and planning framework in place which is sustainable, well managed and well regulated. "Around 85% of all one-off housing planning permissions are granted each year. Before permission Is granted, these houses are held to high environmental standards with percolation, effluent disposal, sight lines and house design all being taken into account.

"All local authorities including our own in Kerry look for a social or economic reason to grant permission, such as working in rural areas or family ties here.

"Kerry County Council is an independent Planning Authority and all local authorities continue to adjudicate on planning matters in relation to new housing within their

jurisdiction, in line with their statutory housing policy.

"Government currently has a range of policies in place to ensure there is compact growth in rural Ireland and to breath new life into our towns and villages in Kerry.

"Part of this work includes updating the Rural Housing Planning Guidelines which are currently being prepared and they will continue to allow for the development of homes in rural areas in Kerry, while highlighting the need to manage certain areas around cities and towns in order to avoid over-development in those areas.

"Minister Burke expects to receive these guidelines shortly, with a draft going out to public consultation later this year. I would urge people in Kerry to make their views and known in order to inform an integral part of our housing policy."



Ireland South MEP, Seán Kelly, has called for Department of Health to ensure that all excess supply of vaccines be sent to third countries to avoid unnecessary waste.

"The start of the year was particularly tough for the country, but since supply issues in the early stages of the vaccination deployment were ironed out it has gone from strength-to-strength. Much of the credit must go to the health authorities and the government for this, as well as the excellent cooperation and efforts of the population. The numbers speak for themselves in this regard, and it is something we all should be proud of", Kelly said.

"The difficulties and worry caused by the new Delta variant are plain to see, yet we must not forget that there are many countries that do not have the same access to vaccines as we do".

"We therefore need to utilise every drop, and if we have over supply, we must export the excess to help those in need. There is no sense in having a situation where vaccines are destroyed just because they were kept beyond their expiration dates", he added.

"It is positive that the HSE have started counting the remaining Janssen doses in mass vaccination centres, but at this point the priority in the national policy must be avoiding waste with excess going to countries with low rates of deployment."

ADVANTAGES OF REMOTE WORKING SHOULD BE **EXAMINED CLOSELY**

Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District and Deputy Mayor of Kerry, Councillor Michael Cahill has called for the advantages of Remote Working to be examined closely, before abandoning the practice totally, post Covid Pandemic.

"Working from home for many people has been a new experience forced upon them by the restrictions imposed due to Covid-19. It appears to have many advantages over the traditional jobs where everybody commuted, mainly to the large towns and cities" stated the Fianna Fáil man.

"Obviously, we have had less traffic on our roads since this byproduct of the pandemic kicked in, with the

resultant reduction in pollution. But we have also seen more life returning to our rural communities, with a higher local spend in shops and Post Offices, etc, helping to keep them viable and open" said Councillor Cahill.

"Companies may have reduced overheads and workers reduced expenses. Workers are reportedly suffering less stress and are more productive in their roles and it appears, on the face of it, to be a win win for all involved. Of course I accept that not all businesses are suitable to the practice" said the Rossbeigh Based Councillor.

"I would hope that, before we discard the practice of part or full time remote working, when the 'former normal' returns post Covid, we look at all the pros and cons. Then we may be in a position to plan a better way forward for both employer and employee" added Councillor Cahill.



STRAWBERRY AND RASPBERRY SQUARES

Ingredients

175g butter

175g caster sugar

2 eggs

Zest of one orange

50ml milk

175q plain flour

1 teaspoon of baking powder

100g raspberries

100g strawberries

Icing sugar for dusting

9 inch tin for baking

Method

- 1. Mix the butter and sugar until fluffy
- 2. Add in the 2 eggs one at a time mixing in between.
- 3. Grate in the zest of one orange and mix
- 4. Pour in the milk and mix
- 5. Sift in the plain flour and baking powder and mix together
- 6. Fold in the raspberries and quartered strawberries
- 7. Pour the mixture into the lined and buttered 9 inch baking tin and Place the rest of the raspberries and strawberries on top of the mixture
- 8. Bake in a pre heated oven @180°c fan for 35 minutes, leave to cool down fully and then dust with icing sugar.

With a hand blender blend the mix and then add the pre cooked spaghetti mixing it all together until your spaghetti is fully covered with sauce. Garnish with some fresh basil leaves. When Can You Access Your Pension & What Are Your Options When You Want to Retire?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

Contact Lenses

Most people who need to wear glasses can wear contact lenses. There are two main types of contact

lenses:

- · soft lenses which mould to the shape of your eye
- · rigid gas permeable lenses (RGP lenses) which are fitted closely to the shape of your eye and are less flexible.

Most contact lenses fitted in Ireland are soft lenses. They are available as single-use daily, fortnightly and monthly disposable lenses, and more specialist lenses that are designed to last for longer.

Which type of contact lens is best? Contact Lenses

The type of lens that is best for you will depend upon several factors. These include how often you want to wear your lenses - for example do you want to wear them just for certain activities such as sport, or do you want to wear them most of the time, instead of glasses?

As soft lenses are initially more comfortable than RGP lenses, they are ideal for people who only want to wear lenses occasionally. RGP lenses are a little more uncomfortable than soft lenses at first, so they take a bit more getting used to

Are contact lenses safe?

Modern contact lenses are very

safe, as long as you follow advice about how to wear and look after them, and have regular check-ups. It is possible that anything that touches your eye could introduce an infection.

I need to wear different glasses for distance and reading - can I have bifocal or varifocal contact lenses?

When you reach your forties it is common to find that you need a different prescription for reading than you need for distance.

There are three main options to correct presbyopia with contact lenses:

- You may choose to have contact lenses to correct your distance vision, and wear reading glasses over the top when you need them.
- · You may have multifocal contact lenses.
- You may wear lenses to have one eye corrected to see in the distance and one eye corrected for near vision. This is called monovision. Each of the different options has advantages and disadvantages and



KILLARNEY'S PARALYMPIAN

t took pure determination and perseverance for Jordan Lee to get to Tokyo. He didn't do it on his own – he is the first to credit his family and his friends and especially his coach Tomás Griffin (no stranger to the highest level of athletic competition himself). But there must have been many times, especially with the uncertainty and doubt of covid, that there must have been a small inner voice advising him that there were better options. But that voice got short shrift – Jordan may have been born with a damaged left arm, but he also has a focus and resolve far beyond that of most people, and it came to the fore during the long wait.

Last Sunday morning, Jordan faced the very best athletes in the world at his discipline, the T47 Paralympic Jump. Jordan cleared 1.74m but couldn't clear 1.79 and eventually finished in ninth place.

Let's get something clear. That's ninth. In the entire planet. The dominance of our domestic gaelic codes sometimes blunts our understanding of genuinely elite sportsmen – trust me, ninth in the world is very much elite.

The final results more or less matched the current world rankings, with Roderick Townsend (US) taking gold, Nishad Kumar (India) taking silver, and Dallas Wise (US) taking the bronze. Townsend set a new world record of 2.15m, while Kumar and Wise both cleared 2.06m, itself a new Asian record.

Afterwards, Jordan released the following statement on social media.

Officially A PARALYMPIAN/OLYMPIAN!

3 and a Half Years of Hard Relentless work to get here. 9,090m Jumped (Height Over Mt Everest), 121,340Kg Lifted in the Gym (3 x times the weight of an Aircraft), 18,700 minutes of Physio Treatment, & 243,360 minutes of Training. That is exactly what it took to get here. Something that didn't just happen Overnight.

Obviously exceptional disappointed with my own personal performance today as it was far below standard but that's just the way sport can be sometimes. That's not the true reflection on the athlete that I am at all whatsoever. I put on that Irish Vest with so much pride, not just representing myself, but My Family, My Town of Killarney, My County of Kerry, & My Nation of Ireland

Massive thank you of course to the guy who stood by me from Day One when we first started this High Jump Journey. My coach & friend Tomas Griffin Wouldn't be here today jumping in the Olympic Stadium without you. Your sacrifice, leadership & commitment to helping me everyday is so incredibly appreciated.

My Loving Parents, My Incredibly supporting Family, & my Understanding Friends. The encouragement & support I receive from you definitely doesn't go Un-Missed & it means so



much to me, you will never know how grateful I am for that!

Pain is Temporary, it may last for a minute, an hour, a day, or even a year, but eventually it will subside, but becoming an Olympian, stays by your name forever.

"100% Or Nothing"

IRELAND IN TOKYO

It's been a good Olympics overall for Ireland,. They finished with two golds (mens'lightweight double schulls and Kellie Anne Harrington in womens' lightweight boxing) and two bronze (women's four in rowing and Aidan Walsh in mens' welterweight boxing).

The opening of the Paralympics saw our own Jordan Lee carrying the flag alongside weightlifter

Ireland's medal haul rapidly swelled. Jason Smyth, of course, got most of the headlines. He is quite possible the best athlete ever to emerge from this country. He picked up his sixth Paralympic gold medal by just one hundredth of a second

Katie George Dunlevy and Eve McCrystal won silver in the B 3000m and added gold in the B time trial, retaining the title that they won in Rio. Hand cyclist Gary O'Reilly won bronze in the mens' H5 time trial. Nicole Turner took silver in the S6 50m butterfly swim. Damien Verecker took bronze in the B2 mens' B 4000m Individual Pursuit in cycling, and Kieran Norris did likewise in the PTVI1 triathlon.

Of course, it's not just about the medals. Every single member of Ireland's team had to come a long distance and overcome hard challenges to get here, both literally and metaphorically, and they all did Ireland proud.

CRISTIANO RONALDO RETURNS TO MAN UNITED

Got to be honest, I was not expecting that one. Whatever else he is, Cristiano Ronaldo is a born



winner. And whatever else they are, the current Manchester United team, while they have slowly improved under the stability of Ole Gunnar Solskjaer's tenure, are not winners. That tag belongs very much to their 'noisy neighbours', and that's where Ronaldo was expected to end up.

Is this a good move? The last player that United brought back is Paul Pogba, who looked like he was coming into his prime, and you'd have to say that he has had far less of an impact than was expected – I still think that the fluidity of the Italian style allowed him space to sprint into for goals, and you aren't getting that off any English midfield.

Financially, there is no question about it. E20 million fee and E20 million in wages for a player who has five Ballon d'Ors, scored more than

50 goals a year for six straight years, and has scored 134 goals in 176 Champions League games. I'm not going to list the honours he has won, we'd be here all day. Suffice to say that he is absolutely brilliant, one of the greatest players of all time. Mind you, I still rate Lionel Messi higher - they have roughly the same number of goals at club level (674 to 672), but Messi has a lot more assists (226 to 139). You could argue that Barcelona passed the ball far more than Real Madrid, but Messi was a key implementer of that style. He also does more out the field, whereas Ronaldo is all about the goals. It'll be interesting to see how both fare at their new clubs.

Financially this is a no-brainer. A club legend already, this is like the dauphin coming to claim Eric Cantona's crown at Old Trafford. Never mind shirt sales - and remember that people laughed when Jurgen Kinsmann went to Spurs for £2 million, only to make as much again on jersey sales with his name on them alone (he also scored 10 goals in his first 11 games). When it was announced that Ronaldo was coming back to United, their share price jumped straightaway by 8%. In other words, they made quarter of a billion euro on the deal before Cristiano has kicked a ball.

I'm not worried about his age. He has always kept himself in rigorous shape, followed a strict diet, works out for four hours a day punctuated with rest periods, and doesn't have any accumulation of old injuries. 36 years old? Fair enough. But he scored 38 goals between club and country last year. He is one goal away from the all-time international record.

It also keeps him out of Man City's clutches. If one of their greatest stars had gone to the other side of the city, United's brand would have been completely devalued. The botched attempt at a European Super League (sadly, I think that was only the first volley in a long war; there's too much money on the table) means that owners have a new wariness about the feelings of supporters (though not enough to stop fleecing them, of course. Let's not get carried away). Man City were expected to be in the market for one of the four hottest properties in the transfer market, Messi, Ronaldo, Kane, and Haaland. Instead, they still don't have a recognised key striker bar the young Liam Delap (that might actually be great for Ireland, experience for Delap up front would help a national team that can't score goals). City's biggest purchase has been Jack Grealish. Which brings me to the football side of things. And here's where it all falls down for me. Scoring goals hasn't been Man United's problem. They scored 73 goals in last year's Premiership, the second highest. However, they also conceded 44, and Cristiano isn't going have much impact there. United need a better centre half pairing and a defensive midfielder. A new Jaap Stam, Nemanja Vidic, Rio Ferdinand.

Getting Ronaldo is a brilliant coup, and probably has more to do with the Portuguese captain keeping half an eye on his legacy as his playing career begins to wind down. I don't see an ambition for future trophies in this move. For me, it once again unsettles Man United's team formation and I see it as posing problems for Solskjaer. In purely football terms, this is a retrograde step. But since when has that mattered?

IRELAND'S WORLD CUP **QUALIFIERS**

By the time that you read this, Ireland will have played Portugal away and be about to face Azerbaijan and Serbia in Dublin. Ireland are at their absolute nadir in international soccer these games are really dead rubbers. Frankly, they will privately be giving out a lot of free tickets, because the Irish public have no great interest in these games. Let's be honest, most Irish soccer followers could probably name more Portuguese players than Irish ones at this stage. If the All Ireland Final had remained as its original fixture, you'd see tumbleweeds blowing around Lansdowne Road this weekend. On paper at least we should lose to Portugal (Ronaldo could take the all-time international scoring record here), beat Azerbaijan (provided we can actually score, which is our greatest difficulty) and Serbia should be tight - lose that one and we will be in full-blown crisis, if we aren't there already. If we win all three games, it would give us a chance of qualifying for Qatar.... but that would actually be worse. Remember the Euros in Poland in 2012? Hammered in three games, conceded nine, scored one? In Qatar, we'd make that 2012 Irish team look like Pele's Brazil or Cruyff's Holland. I expect more flak to be coming Stephen Kenny's way over the coming week, mostly because he's an easy target. He's got sow's ears, how is he supposed to turn them into silk purses? Who exactly is going to volunteer to take his place? This is a long term fix, and I see no signs of that happening.

Red Hand Swats Down Kerry's Hopes

Jimmy O'Sullivan Darcy looks back at the All Ireland Semi-Final:

Kerry v Tyrone

Pre-Match

Kerry are overwhelming favourites for this one. Dublin's second half collapse against Mayo has blown the gates wide open – Dublin pose serious doubts in Kerry, Mayo simply don't, and I strongly suspect that Mayo's first half misfires are more indicative of their form that their second half surge. Bookies are offering six to one on Tyrone. It sounds like no pundits are putting money on them.

A point that many people don't understand. Bookies don't calculate based on team form or scoring rate. The odds change depending on how much money is laid on each team; bookies are never really going to be losing out. In very simplistic terms, six to one means that six times as much money has been put on Kerry to win than Tyrone.

This is absolutely crazy. Tyrone didn't care in the slightest about that National League game against Kerry and anyone who thought different is simply deluding themselves. Tyrone cared about Ulster, easily the toughest provincial championship for decades now, and beat strong teams to win it. That's their form line, and the people making Kerry overwhelming favourites should think about that. The Munster Championship was soft butter by comparison. I'm genuinely worried here.

How much covid was in the Tyrone camp and how it spread should be an issue for Croke Park, not Kerry (we all know that Croke Park will run a mile from that debacle). I do think Kerry were right to offer to play the game. No point in coming in cold to an All Ireland Final. Friday night and the team is named. I still say that Croke Park should mandate that earlier for both teams.

any change to the named team should be a substitution used. Cut out the cute hoorism on all sides. But maybe that's just me.

I like the named team. I'm presuming that Paul Murphy and Mike Breen will switch – Paul is a tight man marker and incredible going forward, but he isn't a blocker and we will need to close that channel through the middle (it's been a failing of Kerry teams at every grade for over a decade). Eamonn Fitzmaurice was the last 'stopper' I remember at six for Kerry.

Diarmuid O'Connor at ten. I'm happy with it, a midfield runner who can shoot. With Tony injured, the bench is as good as it can be, and we all know that they'll be needed.

Saturday

I'm not travelling up, so I can relax in the morning. Cups of tea as the nerves build. Tyrone team named. No great surprises and anyway, we won't know the real match-ups until the ball is thrown in. I watch the minor, absolutely convinced that Tyrone are going to blow Meath away. Cracking game of football, hugely enjoyable. And a dramatic twist at the ending, tinged possibly with all the cruelty that sport can muster. First shock of the day. Not any kind of omen, though, I'm not into any such superstitions. I know full well that the next match will be very tight.

Word is that Stephen O'Brien has a knock and Dara Moynihan will be starting. No problem. I rate Stephen hugely with his cutting pace, but Dara is a player who will always see Tyrone's intensity and raise the ante.

Kerry jersey on (getting a bit tight around the belly there). I start listening to the prematch analysis. No insights and a bit too much 'banter' for me between Pat Spillane and Sean Cavanagh. Fighting their counties' corners – leave it out lads. I'm more interested in the football. I'm not trying to be mean, but thank the stars that Joe Brolly isn't there.

First Quarter

David Clifford with a good point right from the throw-in. Great start. His brother gobbles up the kick-out and Dara Moynihan sends a mark to David, who doubles his tally. He's on form here, Ronan McNamee isn't stopping him today. Kerry win the kick-out again but Seán O'Shea is bottled up by Michael O'Neill. Kerry are turned over and cough up a soft '45 (Tom O'Sullivan should have dealt with it, one of his very few mistakes on the day), Niall Morgan sends it over. Stephen O'Brien is busy already but he is blocked by Frank Burns and down come Tyrone again, Mattie Donnelly with a mark and a point. 0-2 apiece, but Kerry look the better team; I'm a little bit reassured.

Ooh. No. Peter Harte just waltzed through the Kerry defence at his ease before splitting the posts. Bluntly, that was awful defending. A team is always going to cough up scores. But you have to make the opposition work for them – that point came gift-wrapped. All my worries are bubbling to the surface. David Clifford gets off a good pass under pressure to Seán O'Shea to level matters, but back come Tyrone with Mattie Donnelly. Kerry are taking short kickouts comfortably, with Morgan sending his out to midfield, where David Moran is a colossus.

But Tyrone's defence aren't being drawn

out Tyrone's defence aren't being drawn out the field, and Kerry are coughing up turnovers in the tight space up front. Kieran McGeary hits the first wide of the game but Conor Meyler evades another poor attempt at a Kerry tackle and lays it off for Ronan McNamee to score

Paul Geaney hits a wide he would have expected to convert. David does well to get in on goal but the chance is quickly swallowed up – ambition is a good thing, but he should have taken the point that time. A foul on the very hardworking Stephen O'Brien sees Seán O'Shea pull one back. Tyrone lead by 0-5 to 0-4.

Second Quarter

It's already very obvious that Kerry won't be blowing Tyrone out of the water, but we are fractionally the better team here. Sean O'Shea sets up David Clifford for a score – David isn't as influential in play as he was in the Munster Final, but his kicking is simply majestic.

Kerry goal! Super move. Dara Moynihan to Paul Geaney, who could have rounded the keeper himself but opted to give it to Stephen O'Brien. Bit of a dramatic dive when he could have sidefooted it home, but no big deal....wait, overruled for squareball! Correct call by David McColdrick.

I'll just say it now and get it out of the way. I was unimpressed with McColdrick, who let a lot of illegal challenges on and off the ball go throughout. It had no bearing on the result (in fact, I feel that Kerry got scoreable frees that weren't being given at the other end for similar challenges), but he wasn't a firm hand on these reins by any means.

That was a real blow but it got worse minutes later. Peter Harte drew the defender before releasing to Sludden in a well-practised move, on to Conor McKenna, and the ball was in the net. Well-taken, but lads, ye need to be able to close off those runs. Kieran McGeary is narrowly wide with a good effort. Dara Moynihan wins a free for Seán O'Shea to cut the gap toa point. Tyrone are growing in confidence though, Frank Burns with a wide before Darren McCurry tees up Pádraig Hampsey for a score.

David Clifford replies with a free and good pressure on the kick-out yields another for Seán O'Shea. Level pegging. Just before the whistle, Niall Morgan has a chance to put Tyrone back in front, but it's massive distance....jaysus, lads, you have to applaud that kick.

Half-time Tyrone 1-7 Kerry 0-9

Third Quarter

Niall Sludden fouled, and Darren McCurry duly fires over. Paul Murphy finds Paul Geaney, but he's quickly bottled up and it's a free out. David Moran rises high to catch Morgan's kick and sets up David Clifford. The same player adds a free after being fouled by Peter Harte and we're level again. Kerry catch a real break when Niall Sludden is black carded for a blatant and, frankly, fairly stupid pull down on Paul Murphy. Right, Kerry, time to go straight at them....

Killian Spillane is caught for over-carrying. Tyrone have a morass of strong bodies at the back at all times and we can't break through them. Seán O'Shea almost gets in on goal, but Michael O'Neill very deftly takes it off him – a great piece of skill. Paul Gaeney tries one that was never likely to go over and Killian Spillane is blocked by Peter Harte. Seán O'Shea puts over the '45, but are Kerry starting to panic here? Paudie Clifford calms things with a good score (Conor Meyler had a good game, but I don't agree

with the pundits who claim that he snuffed out Paudie, I thought Paudie was one of our better players on the day. The Sunday Game are choosy about what clips they select!). Darren McCurry replies after Mattie Donnelly is fouled. Kerry have just scored two points to one in the ten minutes that Tyrone were down to fourteen men - it's not enough. Yes, Tyrone did slow it down, and they were absolutely right to do so. It was up to us to use the extra space and break their defensive line, but Tyrone's tactic was the same as Cork last year, they simply refused to be drawn out and leave any space behind them for Kerry to attack. All that said, Kerry were a point ahead at the water break after Seán O'Shea punished a foul on Stephen O'Brien (Stephen didn't have a great game by any means, but he worked his socks off all through).

Fourth Quarter

Darren McCurry levelled matters with a good score before picking up a black card for a block off the ball on Gavin Crowley. In fairness to McColdrick, that's a foul that's ignored too often. Like Sludden, it was an unnecessary card but again Kerry couldn't punish it – a long delay because of a head injury to Tiernan mcCann didn't help, but you absolutely always must stop the game for a head injury. It was Tyrone who were doing the hard running at this stage and Kerry seemed to be feeling it.

In the 65th minute Seán O'Shea sent in a good ball and David Clifford rose high....but Niall Morgan's fist was faster and he cleared it. Imagine how different the narrative could have been? Worse for Kerry, their shooting star is clearly hampered afterwards. Tom O'Sullivan picked off a precious score to put Kerry two points clear. We're getting out of jail here, really, Kerry have a lot of work to do before the final.....

Disaster., Mattie Donnelly to Darrafgh Canavan and a rasping shot, Shane Ryan did brilliantly to save it, but Cathal McShane fisted in the rebound. From two points up to one point down. David wins a free and Seán sends it over, but Tyrone are bouncing now and Kerry are lagging. My heart is sinking a bit here. Both sides miss chances before McShane sets up Darren McCurry. Kerry reply through David Clifford. Paudie Clifford looks around for an option but there isn't any, the best he can do is fist it wide from a very tight angle. Tyrone are minding the ball now, letting the clock run down, before Mattie Donnelly has a go from long distance. Not a great decision, as it gives Kerry time to hit a

winner, but we can't exploit it.
In the studio, Seán Cavanagh makes an attempt at arguing against the black cards. Worse, Pat Spillane rises to the cheap bait. I'm sorry, but I can't be listening to this nonsense. There's no analysis or insight here.

Extra-Time

Diarmuid O'Connor looks the pick of Kerry's subs and wins the throw-in. Tadhg Morley cuts in but Darragh Canavan makes a great steal. Kieran McGeary draws a foul and Cathal McShane puts Tyrone in front. A hospital pass to Paul Murphy is punished when Mattie Donnelly gathers and McShane picks off another point. Tyrone are rampant now. A high ball by Kieran McGeary is dropping towards Kerry's back post....we know after last year that this needs to be dealt with. In fairness to Jack Barry, with a man behind him, he can't take the chance on letting it

go out and he swings a volley at it....straight into the path of Conor McKenna, who fires a rocket into the far corner of Shane Ryan's net. That stings Kerry into action. They are hurting now, but they're not going down without a fight. Paul Murphy splits the posts. Tommy Walsh sets up Diarmuid O'Connor for a point. McShane, who looks like the freshest player on the field, replies in kind but Gavin White bursts forward and it pays dividends when Seán O'Shea slots overa free. 3-14 to 0-20 at the turnaround.

A great catch by Gavin White allows Paudie Clifford the chance to take his second score. Kerry are piling all the pressure on Niall Morgan's kick-outs and it's working as Paul Geaney hits a point. One point game.

Niall Morgan has a free and a '45 to close it out, but can't take either. It leaves Kerry with one last chance. With time well up, Tommy Walsh looks up and has a go....left and wide.

Game over. Dream over. Ah well.

What do Kerry Need to Do?

First of all, calm down. Kerry were just one point away after extra-time. That's basically the exact opposite of a hammering, but you wouldn't get that impression from the reaction. Kerry were not bad here. It was the favourites tag that was put on them that makes it feel like it, and how anybody fell for that nonsense genuinely mystifies me. I'd swap any ten National League medals for a celtic cross. The League is only a shaper, not an objective. Tom O'Sullivan, Gavin White, and the Clifford brothers were good here, and Diarmuid O'Connor excelled when he came on. We were good here, albeit not good enough.

I'm sure a lot of the talk is about Tyrone's remarkable recovery from covid. I don't care. They had fifteen players on the field, just the

same as we had.

At the same time, things need to change. We need a stopper at centre back. Tim Kennelly, Connie Murphy, Eamonn Fitzmaurice....any player who ran directly at them soon found themselves going backwards. I think Jack Sherwood has the height, muscle, and ability for the role; I also think we discarded Mark Griffin much too soon. Mike Breen looks like a player who can fill that role (Gavin White has the strength, but he's too effective on the wing; I'd be slow to move him.

When defenders followed our forwards up, we scored a whopping 21 goals in six games. Gavin White, Paul Murphy, and Tom O'Sullivan gobble up that space. Peter Crowley was superb at it. But every successful team in the last decade is willing to occasionally cough up that space in League games but they won't give it to you in championship. We're fine at slicing open Division Two and Three teams, but at the higher levels.

Our path through Munster has been too easy - Dublin had the same problem in Leinster for years but gradually developed a slighter harder edge but that win over Kerry against the head in 2011 showed tougher steel. Cork, despite that win last year, aren't at the top level. Looking at their underage and U20 in recent years, I think that might be changing. Frankly, I hope so. A huge problem for the GAA is that there is an elite group of teams (this year's final four plus Donegal - I thought Galway were close to making that breakthrough but that clock is ticking) in football. They are generally beating the other teams too easily and it's starting to hurt the overall popularity of the game. Having new winners this year will help.

Defensive tackling. I'm sorry, but it has been a glaring weakness for over a decade. High balls into the goalmouth cause us panic. Direct runners glide past us far too easily. I don't need defenders to win every tackle, but I do need them to slow the attack down. Block the path to goal. I'm certainly not trying to twist the knife into management whom I know personally to be absolute gentlemen, but Donie Buckley is widely recognised as the best coach in the game at that. Whatever happened there (I have no idea) cost Kerry badly.

Strength and fitness. I honestly thought that this was a problem we had solved. And I know that there was a five week break. But yet again, when the game came to the crunch, Tyrone had the legs and the muscle, while we were starting to cramp up. It looked to me (and this is just an uneducated guess) as if they were over-trained. We haven't dominated the last ten minutes of any crunch game for a very long time.

There's a lot of talk about Kerry going for goals instead of taking points. Yes, it could have changed the outcome here, but I'd be very careful about not throwing out the baby with the bathwater here. I like when going for goal is a Kerry player's first instinct.

We aren't far away, and we don't have too much to fix. Very few teams have the array of talent that we have. For the most part, age is on our side. We also have good young players coming in, although we know now that minor success does not automatically yield a senior crop.

We aren't far away at all. But we are a bit

We aren't far away at all. But we are a bit further away that we thought. There are lessons to be learned.


KERRY 12'S GIRLS SHINE IN THE HEAT IN CLARE





MAKE HAY WHILE THE SUN

This article explores what the links are between the proverb 'Whan the sunne shinth make hay. Whiche is to say. Take time whan time cometh, lest time steale away." And no, there are no spelling mistakes, this was written in about 1546, and yes, we can still learn from things written way back then.

In the past farmers could only look at the sky or feel the wind to predict the weather, plus it took much longer to cut, dry and gather the hay and so if it was sunny it was just common sense to make hay while the sun shone. But now, years later what is the link with this and mental health? If you make hay while the sun shines, it means that you take advantage of the chance to do something while conditions are good. In other words, you make good use of your time or make the most of an opportunity while you have the chance.

So the key word here is opportunity, so often we regret later in life that we did not take the opportunity that was presented, maybe fear held us back, maybe we did not feel confident enough. Or maybe we did not trust our judgement, and we let somebody else's voice be louder in our head and heart than ours. So we need to take stock of the situations that present themselves and realise when an opportunity has arisen that we could make the most from, or more than we have believed was possible. It may need us to be creative, to allow our minds to day dream the possibilities so that they can become realities.

The other important aspect of the hay and the sunshine and mental health, especially in Ireland and in farming, is that hay is baled for when the winter comes and to feed the animals that are safely tucked inside the barn to protect them from freezing. Now sometimes we have store up that 'sunshine' or good moment or opportunity to see us through the difficult times in our life. Imagine if we could 'bale' up a happy feeling or moment for when the winter or sadness or painful times crosses our paths. Even better would be to actually plan for the future by taking advantage of the current opportunities. An example of this would be to keep thinking of how we can do positive things, surround ourselves with positive people and things and that way ensure we have a safety net for when things may become difficult.



Season of Creation 2021

Act now to 'Restore our Common Home'

The Diocese of Kerry joins dioceses across Ireland and Christian churches globally in calling for action, to Restore our Common Home during this 'Season of Creation'. The Season of Creation runs from September 1st to October 4th when Christian churches around the world focus on prayer and action to protect the natural world or creation, 'our common home'. This time can be described as the churches' eco time. It closes on the 4th of October, the feast day of St Francis of Assisi, Patron Saint of Ecology. It is a timely call to awaken us to the urgent need to heal our relationship both with creation and with one another.

The words 'Our Common Home' are those used by Pope Francis in his letter 'Laudato Si' on Care for Our Common Home', addressed "to every person living on the planet".

All fifty- three parishes across the diocese are being encouraged to mark the Season in some way. Parishes have received copies of the Season of Creation Leaflet 2021 – Restoring our Common Home, which explains the theme and gives suggestions of practical actions to be taken in the areas of: caring for God's creatures; biodiversity; energy; avoiding food waste and reducing plastic pollution. Parishes have also received the necessary resources to include the theme in Sunday Masses during the 5-week Season. The Season of Creation Leaflet 2021 is available on the diocesan website www.dioceseofkerry.ie and the diocesan Facebook page.

This year, the long awaited First Communion and Confirmation Ceremonies can provide an ideal opportunity for care of creation events, for example, bulb, hedge, and native tree planting. This links well with the The Easy Treesie Project. The diocesan aim is that each parish plants a native Irish Tree on church grounds in time for National Tree Day in October.

The Radio Kerry programme 'Horizons', the daily 'Just a Thought' and the diocesan Facebook page will all highlight the theme throughout the Season.




Welcome back dear reader have you noticed all the butterflies? It's amazing they are everywhere! When I see butterflies, I am reminded of two things - my first pregnancy, and God's restoring love. During the first trimester the doctor was concerned that there was a chance of miscarriage. It was such a deeply distressing time. At an ultrasound the baby was too small to see on the screen, so we had to wait a week because there would be such growth in the size of the baby from week seven to week eight. Sleepless nights ensued, but praise the Lord for His Word. I spoke Psalm 139 and Psalm 91 among other Scriptures over my baby. There is a wonderful lady called Germaine Copeland who wrote a book called 'Prayers that Avail Much' and I would speak those Scripture-based prayers over my child day and night.

When I returned the next week, the doctor said "let's not even chat, let's just check the baby!" I was shaking and his next response was "O thank God! Look, there is your baby's heartbeat and, it's beating just fine!" What does this have to do with butterflies? It was only a few weeks later around week twelve that I noticed butterfly-like flutters in my tummy. I read the books to check 'what is this now?' It was this new little life bouncing around in that hidden world, safe and joyful. I cannot explain the gratitude I feel to God for the gifts He has given me. Friend, there is a stain on our world. It's called abortion. And for many women and young girls it is promoted as the only remedy to a crisis or problem pregnancy. I could not see a visual of my baby that first week on the screen. But only seven days later, I saw this tiny little heart beating and even though I was scared of practically everything back then, I knew that God would help me. And He did.

"Children are a heritage from the Lord — a reward from Him" (Psalm 127:3). So many people look upon crisis pregnancies as a curse only solved by termination, but they are eliminating their own heritage. My baby was not a clump of cells. No, a living breathing person whom God was embroidering was growing in my womb. He knit you together in your mother's womb too. He has high hopes for you. You are no accident! God has placed you upon this earth to experience wonderful things with Him, that only you can accomplish (Jeremiah 29:11). Do not let convenience or whoever is influencing you to consider wiping out one of His precious gifts. Many couples yearn for a child to foster or adopt. Yes there are challenges in life, but God will strengthen you, as you pour out your heart to Him (Psalm 62:8). There are many good agencies to help through crisis, and the greatest Friend of all is only waiting for you to call upon Him. "Whoever calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans 10:13) 'Because He lives' you can face tomorrow.


