As Europe celebrated another famous Ryder Cup victory, the Killarney friends returned home with stories, photos, and memories to last a lifetime.







KILLARNEY GLAMPING Expands with New Site at Racecourse

Killarney Glamping is set to launch a major new venture on the grounds of Killarney Racecourse, with 15 bespoke glamping units planned for the site. Five of the lodges are scheduled to open before the end of this year, with the remainder due for completion by April 2026.

The development will combine family-friendly and adults-only accommodation, carefully separated by landscaped buffers to ensure privacy. A fully accessible unit will also form part of the project.

This marks the second site for Linda and Mike O'Sullivan, who first introduced luxury camping to the region in 2012 with Killarney Glamping at The Grove in Ballycasheen. Their original location, which primarily caters to couples, has recently been recognised with Fáilte Ireland's 4-star rating for both 2024 and 2025.

Unlike The Grove, the new Ross Road site will cater to families as well as couples. Family units will be equipped with kitchenettes, bathrooms and multiple bedrooms, while the adults-only lodges will feature king-size beds, spacious living areas and high-end bathrooms.

The location offers easy access to the town and surrounding attractions: guests can walk or cycle to Killarney town centre in under ten minutes or reach Killarney National Park via nearby cycle paths. Onsite amenities will include a reception area, parking facilities and breakfast hampers, while collaborations with Ross Golf Club, Celtic Steps, and local yoga providers will give guests a wide range of leisure options.



Gardening for Nature Workshop This Saturday

The Fossa Climate Action Group will host a free workshop this Saturday focused on bringing more life into your garden.

As the Celtic year draws to a close on October 31st, the natural world begins its quiet transition into winter. While much of nature winds down, this is actually the ideal time to plan for the next growing season. Trees, for example, are best planted during the darker months, making now a perfect opportunity to begin something new.

The workshop will be led by Niamh Ní Dhuill of Transition Kerry. "Niamh is a very experienced and knowledgeable professional in the field of biodiversity and nature," said Diarmaid Griffin, PRO of Fossa Climate Action Group. "The focus will be on practical steps to make your garden more wildlife-friendly, starting with pollinators and other insects that form the foundation of a healthy environment."

The event will take place at The Nature Hub, an eco-friendly garden and forest site near the Gap of Dunloe. The site already features several biodiversity projects, including a food-growing polytunnel, a pond that has become home to tadpoles and frogs, and a living willow fence. It also serves as a venue for forest school, outdoor learning, and other nature-based workshops.

This workshop is free to attend thanks to support from the Department of the Environment and the Community Foundation for Ireland.

Kerry Rises to #12 in Global Destination Sstainability Index, Retains #1 Irish Destination

Kerry has climbed seven places in the Global Destination Sustainability Index (GDS-Index), moving from #19 to #12 out of 81 international destinations, marking the seventh consecutive year in the Top 20 and cementing its position as Ireland's topranked destination.

The GDS-Index evaluates destinations on environmental, social, and economic sustainability, covering leisure and business tourism, regenerative tourism, circular economy practices, climate action, and the legacy of events. Kerry first participated in 2018, led by Kerry Convention Bureau (KCB) in partnership with Kerry Tourism Industry Federation, Kerry County Council, Fáilte Ireland, and local tourism partners. This year, Kerry scored 82.8%, a 6.63% increase on 2024, achieving #1 globally in its population category. Performance was assessed across environmental strategy, social sustainability, industry support, and local policies. Initiatives contributing to the score included Meitheal's Sustainability Policy, Fáilte Ireland trade events, Killarney 2030 strategy, THRIVE schemes, Autism Friendly Towns, and Zero Waste Food Festivals.

KCB Manager Becky Hargrove said, "Our improved ranking reflects the shared sustainability ambitions of our tourism and event partners and positions Kerry prominently on the global stage."

Other Irish destinations Dublin, Cork, Clare, Galway, Limerick, and Belfast also ranked in the GDS-Index Top 40, highlighting Ireland's commitment to sustainable tourism. Fáilte Ireland's Sally Ann O'Brien noted, "Kerry's success reflects long-standing dedication to sustainable tourism and aligns with Ireland's Business Events 2030 strategy."

Pat O'Leary, Chairman of Kerry Tourism Industry Federation, praised the collaboration behind the achievement, and Kerry County Council's Cllr. Mike Foley highlighted its positive impact on residents and visitors.

Kerry Convention Bureau, supported by Fáilte Ireland and Kerry County Council, continues to promote Kerry as a premier destination for national and international business tourism events.

Killarney Breast Cancer Survivor Calls On The Public To Support The Irish Cancer Society's Big Pink Breakfast Campaign

Breast cancer survivor Marie Shannon from Killarney is supporting the Irish Cancer Society's Breast Cancer Awareness Campaign and encouraging the public to host a Big Pink Breakfast to help fund vital breast cancer support services and life-changing breast cancer research projects.

Every year, around 3,600 women and approximately 30 men are diagnosed with breast cancer in Ireland.

Marie Shannon (63) from Killarneywas diagnosed with bilateral breast cancer – which means cancer was found in both of her breasts - in 2023 after going for a routine mammogram. Her treatment included lumpectomies, chemotherapy and radiotherapy. Marie finished her treatment in February 2024, and her first follow-up mammogram has come back clear since then.

Mother-of-two Marie says: "When I was diagnosed, the nurse was saying, 'Are you OK?' And I was saying, 'I'm fine'. I was in denial. I didn't get a shock from it, I just put it aside. But as time goes on, I realise how lucky I was, that it was caught so early."

Marie is sharing her story to encourage people to support the Big Pink Breakfast campaign to help people like her who have been affected by breast cancer.

Marie says: "I would encourage everyone to please get behind the Big Pink Breakfast campaign, a huge amount of the funding for the Irish Cancer



Society's breast cancer support services and breast cancer research projects comes from donations made by the public. If you are at all able, please support this important cause. You can sign up at cancer.ie/pink"

Mary O'Kelly, Cancer Nurse with the Irish Cancer Society, said: "Self-examination is so important for women of all ages, even those who are eligible for screening, as this only takes place every two years. Pick a date and try to do it as consistently as you can on a monthly basis.


"It's really important that we are breast aware and know what is normal for us. If you notice any of the signs or symptoms of breast cancer and the change persists, please go to see your GP as soon

"Women can sometimes feel embarrassed or uncomfortable attending their GP with breast issues, but this examination could save your life. Your GP will perform a routine examination of your breast and if appropriate, refer you for further assessment.

"If you are concerned about breast cancer, call the Irish Cancer Society's Support Line on Freephone 1800 200 700. You can also find out more at www. cancer.ie"

This October the Irish Cancer Society is encouraging people to host a Big Pink Breakfast in their homes, workplaces, communities and colleges to raise funds to support breast cancer support services such as free counselling, transport to treatment, Night Nursing and much more. Funds raised will also be used to fund ground-breaking breast cancer research projects.

Symptoms of breast cancer include:

- A lump or thickening in your breast or armpit.
- A change in size or shape of one breast like one breast becoming larger than the other.
- A change in the skin of your breast, like puckering or dimpling (the skin may look like orange peel).
- A breast abscess (infected boil) this may appear as a red, tender area on your breast.
- A change in your nipple, like a pulled-in, sunken or flattened nipple.
- An unusual discharge (liquid) from one or both of your nipples.

The discharge may be blood stained or watery.

- A change on or around the nipple like a rash or flaky or crusted skin.
- Swelling in your armpit or around your collarbone.
- Breast pain alone is not usually a symptom of breast cancer.

9 out of 10 breast changes won't turn out to be breast cancer, but it's important to go to your GP if you have any symptoms and get them checked out.

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in Killarney



ALL THE PRESIDENT'S WOMEN?

Visits to Killarney last Friday by Heather Humphreys and Jim Gavin saw two contrasting campaigns. Heather took to the jaunting car with great glee at Kenmare Place. Jarvey Jimmy Coffey kept his hand on the halter while the presidential hopeful was accompanied by a very confident 16-month old Bláithín Connor-Scarteen - a fourth generation politician in waiting no doubt!

The Fine Gael hierarchy, ex TD Brendan Griffin, former Kenmare councillor Patrick Connor-Scarteen, and Senator Mike Kennelly and his daughter Councillor Aoife were out in force. By contrast, Jim Gavin's visit to Killarney was a low key shuffle into Radio Kerry for a pre recorded interview followed by a short walk about. Accompanied only by a lone campaign worker, none of the FF hierarchy past or present came into view.

Fianna Fáil seem to be going through the experience of Fine Gael in Kerry in the recent Dáil election: the local grassroots council is not happy.

Catherine Connolly has not visited Kerry yet, but she has a strong campaign online and in the media and is going down well locally from what I gather.

But that so-called TV debate on Monday night did nothing to reassure me about the next presidency. In the first place, the candidates should have been standing up and Virgin Media did not rise to the dignity of the occasion.

The polished well-turned out Maria Steen and the other articulate younger candidates who stood before Kerry County Council and had far more engagement and fluency with Irish questions. Connolly - who I felt could do with a

loan of Steen's Hermes blue bag to lighten her up - was too focused on Gaza and everything dark.

She hadn't a single good thing to say about the country she wants to lead.

I saw no clear vision for Ireland from any of them. Apart from stereotype clips about a united Ireland which most people I know apart from Sinn Fein - care little about.

The only "love" of the country and positive message I heard came from an emotional Heather Humphreys - Ireland had made her what she was and she loved this country. A wow moment.

By the way, have Sinn Fein done itself any favours with the middle ground in backing Connolly, a candidate who comes across as inclusive of Hamas, pro-Russia, and anti-American and anti-European? The suspicion will be that Sinn Fein is showing its true colours.

A buddy in the media remarked to me about all three after the tv debate "are they going for president of Ireland or Palestine?"

Time for our council to get support to cut the hedges

Hedges are a regular topic on meetings of Kerry County Council and there is a hue and cry by the Healy-Raes and others.

In July, Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae pleaded with management to allow a pilot scheme in line with nearby Limerick; in September, Johnny made a strong case for cutting the Ring of Kerry ditches. Kerry should look at Clare and other counties and cut the hedges higher up, Johnny said. The council was cutting the blackberries and the ferns but nothing higher. "The "Ring of Kerry is 112 miles long. Wherever they are being cut, I promise you it's not on the Ring of Kerry," he said

A "span new" lorry hit off a stump on the Killarney to Killorglin Road and sustained €5,500 damage.

Kenmare's Teddy O'Sullivan Casey call to "urgently" cut the Ring of Kerry hedges last Friday drew a rare admission: the council hasn't the money to cut the hedges. It has seen no increase since 2018 from the national budget doled out by the TII, Transport Infrastructure Ireland, despite looking for increases.

"The TII allocation for ordinary maintenance of national secondary routes has remained static since 2018, with no increase... The budget is insufficient to cut all of the hedges on the N70 Ring of Kerry."

There you go! All the councillors now have to do is approach Government ministers Healy-Rae and Foley, and Michael Cahill TD to get money to cut the hedges.

PRETTY POLLY HOSPITALITY COLLEGE: THREE YEARS ON, LAMENTABLY LITTLE PROGRESS.

It is a full three years since then minister for higher education Simon Harris gave a commitment to Kerry education college in High Street that we would see a third level hospitality college attracting thousands of students in Killarney - All under the umbrella of the Kerry ETB.

Well not much has happened since, I regret to say. I put in queries and apart from the fact I needed a dictionary to understand the various abbreviations, there are three things which I feel confident in stating:

No one is mentioning the Pretty Polly site, so it is not at all clear that this is still the preferred location. The Department of Higher Education speaks of "sites" in Killarney.

Secondly, the preliminary case for the Killarney college is still not completed by the lead body the Kerry ETB and other agencies, three years down the road.

It will be up to the Minister in charge to give the go-ahead.

To help the reader make sense of what I got from the Kerry ETB:

Kerry ETB is the Kerry Education and Training Board

DFHERIS: The Department of Further and Higher Education, Research,

Innovation and Science

SOLAS is "The State agency that oversees the building of a world class Further Education & Training (FET) sector in Ireland"

FET is Further Education and Training.

"Kerry ETB in compliance with the Department of Public Expenditure, National Development Plan Delivery and Reform (DPENDR) Infrastructure Guidelines, have submitted a Site Acquisition Proposal to SOLAS under the FET College of the Future Major Projects Fund. The Proposal is being reviewed by SOLAS and DFHERIS in consultation with Kerry ETB.

Subject to Ministerial approval Kerry ETB expect to be able to proceed shortly with the purchase of a preferred site.

In parallel, Kerry ETB is preparing to submit a Preliminary Business Case for the FET College project that will be developed on the preferred site. Following evaluation of Kerry ETB's submission, a recommendation on whether to allow Kerry ETB to proceed through Approval Gate 1 (AG1) will be made"

The department of higher education in a nutshell said it is waiting for the Kerry end of things to complete a preliminary business case with Solas etc.

"Substantial engagement has taken place between Kerry ETB and Kerry County Council regarding suitable sites in Killarney."

Brothers Honoured with Garda Youth Community Safety Award

Two Killarney brothers, Gary and Conor O'Sullivan, have been named winners of the prestigious Lee Strand Kerry Garda Youth Community Safety Award. The presentation took place on Friday night at the Rose Hotel, Tralee, where the O'Sullivan family was celebrated for their courage, resilience and commitment to raising community awareness about CPR and heart health.

The award comes after a life-changing incident on April 6th, 2025 – a day the O'Sullivan family will never forget. What began as an ordinary morning turned traumatic when the brothers' elder sibling, Seán Óg, suddenly collapsed at the family home in Whitebridge. Acting without hesitation, Gary, Conor and their father, Seán, immediately began CPR, keeping Seán Óg alive until paramedics arrived.

The quick response not only saved Seán Óg's life but also led to the discovery of a genetic heart condition within the family, Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy (HCM). Both Gary and his mother have since been fitted with defibrillators, alongside Seán Óg.

Rather than retreat after the shock of this diagnosis, Gary and Conor turned their experience into a mission. They began speaking out locally and nationally about the importance of CPR and defibrillator training. In addition, the brothers have spearheaded fundraising initiatives supporting Killarney First Responders, Brú Columbanus, and the Michael Lenihan Heartsafe Campaign. Their efforts also funded the purchase of a defibrillator for public use at Whitebridge Manor Estate, adjacent to the Cork Road.

Proud aunt Anne Holland nominated her nephews for the award, praising their determination to transform a personal trauma

into a positive force for others. "They stepped up, felt both grateful and thankful, and changed the narrative to positivity," she said. "Through their energy and efforts, they are helping others and potentially preventing other families from experiencing what they went through."

Now in its 27th year, the Kerry Garda Youth Community Safety Awards honour young people who make their communities a safer and better place. This year, the O'Sullivan brothers' bravery, advocacy, and dedication made them truly deserving recipients.

NEW CORRIDOR POSSIBLE WITHIN FIVE YEARS

The new Kerry-Cork corridor, which will involve the construction of a major road from Farranfore to Killarney, could commence within a five-year period, Kerry County Council CEO, Fearghal Reidy, has said.

Addressing a Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce luncheon, Mr Reidy said €2 million was provided to advance the project last year with another €1 million approved this year.

"Don't hold me to this but with a fair wind and no surprises or objections, you could expect the contract to commence in about five years. That would be a gamechanger for this region if we had all that in line. It is very important as we are now a university county," Mr Reidy said. The CEO told the gathering of Killarney business leaders in the Great Southern Hotel that transport and connectivity was another big priority for the local authority.

Negotiations have taken place with Irish Rail regarding the provision of more frequent rail services for Kerry, and there has been significant investment in local and national roads and active travel.

"You can really see it here in Killarney," he said. Mr Reidy pointed out that when extensive work was carried out on Rock Road, all the existing cables were moved underground and that was funded by Kerry County Council.

"We hope to do that with other active travel projects going forward," he remarked.

Mr Reidy said it was hoped that the first phase of the South Kerry Greenway would be operational within the next six months, and there is an ambitious overall greenway strategy planned to connect the entire county.

"Kerry will be a top class greenway destination," he said.


The provision of housing was a key priority for the council, and while there are plans to add to the housing stock, rezoning would also be considered, and negotiations with landowners, developers and development agencies will continue to bring forward viable propositions. Climate action is another priority, and it was encouraging to witness how communities united at times of extreme weather events. Mr Reidy said such cooperation is essential in Kerry towns and villages.

"As a visitor, you really feel better if you feel you are part of a community effort to address climate change and when you see the measures introduced by the hospitality sector and others," Mr Reidy said.

"Our customers expect us to take responsibility for climate action seriously," the CEO said, adding that Killarney was to the fore with projects like the coffee cup initiative and Tidy Towns.

Mr Reidy said it was encouraging to hear Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce praising the work of the council's outdoor staff, and he said he is extremely proud of the local authority's operational teams.

"I walked the streets of Killarney at 8.15am this

morning and the outdoor staff were cleaning, planting and doing brilliant work. Killarney has a great reputation for its Tidy Towns work and for being so well presented," he said.

Mr Reidy said, going forward, there is a real need for partnerships between state agencies, the council and local organisations, including Killarney Chamber.

"Let's understand the priorities of residents, visitors and investors so we can meet their expectations. Killarney Chamber does such a brilliant job here," he added.

He stressed that there is a need for one strong voice for business in the town that will always

be listened to and make sure that they are heard.

Mr Reidy said if the Chamber disagrees with something, they should make it known that they disagree, but if they are in favour of something, they should also voice an opinion. "It's your right to tell us if you disagree with something and if you feel something would be better with tweaks then tell us about those tweaks as we want to hear all views," Mr Reidy said.

When the BBC Archive shared a clip from its vaults on Saturday 26 September few could have predicted the reaction it received from members of the facebook page Killarney Down Memory Lane.

The clip shows broadcaster Cliff Michelmore meeting five-year-old Bridget Gleeson from Killarney, introducing her as a pint-sized golf prodigy in the days leading up to that year's Ryder Cup. More than half a century later, the footage once again captured hearts, this time on social media.

The clip, posted on Facebook ahead of the 2025 Ryder Cup, was quickly was reposted on By Diarmuid O'Rinn on Killarney Down Memory Lane, drawing hundreds of likes, comments, and reminiscences from locals proud to see one of their own remembered.

Among those who appeared in the comments was Bridget herself to confirm her identity. "I'm the little girl in the clip and thankfully I'm still alive and well," she wrote with good humour,

adding, "I did get a bit bigger and I did finish school! I did not turn pro but I did play at senior international level before I had to retire due to back injuries." She went on to explain how she had turned to pilates during her recovery and now teaches it to help others "keep moving and doing what they enjoy for as long as they

Bridget also said that the film also features her late father, who passed away 13 years ago. "Amazing seeing my dad in this clip also," she wrote. "Thank you so much for all your lovely comments." She also revealed that last Frida was the first time she had ever seen the video! The Ryder Cup may be about the great names of the game, but for a brief moment, a fiveyear-old from Killarney, Bridget Gleeson-Healy stole the spotlight!



After much anticipation, Amelia Counihan of Workman's Rowing Club was crowned the 237th Killarney Regatta Queen, adding her name to a long line of young women who have proudly carried forward this celebrated tradition.

Workman's Rowing Club shared their pride and congratulations saying the "The crowning of the Regatta Queen is more than a title, it is a celebration of history, community, and the spirit of Killarney rowing. Amelia embodies everything that our tradition stands for: dedication, pride, and grace. Congratulations to her and all the remarkable young women who represented their clubs."

From its origins as a gathering of local rowing enthusiasts to its place today as a cherished symbol of community, the Killarney Regatta has witnessed centuries of history. While weather may have prevented the races this year, it could not dampen the energy, pride, and continuity of a tradition that has thrived for over 237 years, and promises to continue inspiring generations of rowers and supporters for many more to come.



Good news for some CAO applicants as 3,935 individual subjects upgraded in Leaving Cert appeals

UPGRADE

The results of the 2025 Leaving Certificate Appeals were released to candidates through the Candidate Self Service Portal on www. examinations.ie at 11am on Friday, last, 26th September. The timely release of the appeal results dovetailed with the issuing of the final round, Round Five, of college offers by the Central Applications Office (CAO) last Tuesday, 30th September. The lucky applicants to the CAO, who were entitled to an offer of a college place, following an upgrade, received the offer in Round Five.

APPEALED

10,048 of the 60,939 candidates who sat the traditional Leaving Cert appealed against 20,764 individual results. This was a 43% increase on 2024 when there were 14,287 individual subject appeals. A further 4,507 candidates did the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) exam but less than ten of them appealed their results. No results were downgraded. 16% of traditional Leaving Cert candidates appealed against one or more subject results compared to 12.8% in 2024. The 20,764 individual subject appeals represent 4.7% of the total number of 437,710 grades issued in 2025.

MAXIM

While the final number of upgrades of 3,935 represents less than 1% of all Leaving Cert results awarded this year, more importantly it also confirms that 3,935 of the 20,764 individual subject appeals were upgraded. In other words, 19% or almost one in five of every individual subject appealed was successful. Those statistics again confirms the old maxim that if you have any doubts about the marks awarded, then it's well worth applying for a recheck. The appeal fee was only €40 per Leaving Cert subject and was refunded if the appeal succeeded.

ASSURANCE

Each year, the State Examinations Commission

(SEC) uses the appeals process as a further quality assurance check on its marking processes in the Leaving Cert. As a result, there was a pleasant surprise for 42 candidates, who had not appealed their results, but received an upgrade in the quality insurance check. The upgrades arising from these quality assurance measures are also notified to the CAO and updated on the Candidate Self-Service Portal. Hopefully, the CAO made college offers to some or all of the lucky 42 applicants in Round Five.

VIEWING

Candidates who appealed their exam results may view their remarked written exam scripts. The viewing of remarked scripts will take place online if at all possible. The deadline for applying to view remarked scripts was 5pm on Monday last, 29th September. Candidates may also refer their exam appeal to the Independent Appeals Scrutineers (IAS). The function of the Independent Appeals Scrutineers is to ensure that all of the exam appeals processes outlined by the SEC have been carried out correctly. The deadline for applying to the Independent Appeal Scrutineers is 5pm on Friday, 10th October. The Independent Appeal Scrutineers process will take place in November 2025.

JUNIOR CYCLE RESULTS

The State Examinations Commission (SEC) has also announced that it will release the 2025 Junior Cycle results on Wednesday, 8th October which is roughly the same time as last year. They will be made available to students in their schools on the day. More students will be awarded Distinction and Higher Merit this year after changes were made to the Junior Cycle grading bands. There is the same number of grade bands as before but the top four grade descriptors - Distinction, Higher Merit, Merit and Achieved - are being evenly distributed in bands of fifteen percentage points. Good luck to all candidates getting Junior Cycle exam results on Wednesday.


Students examined the geology, impact of erosion and coastal protection features. It allowed students the opportunity to bring their learning from the classroom out onto the coastal environment.

UTILITY TRUST ST PAULS WOMENS SUPERLEAGUE SEASON PREVIEW

Utility Trust St Pauls kick off their Superleague campaign with a trip to the scene of their best performance last season when they head to Mercy College to face the SETU Waterford Wildcats. The Wildcats had of course topped the league standings heading into the playoffs but they fell foul to a hugely determined Killarney side who of course went on to contest the Superleague Final in Tallaght. And while that day in the National Basketball Arena saw them lose out to Killester it certainly sowed the seeds for optimism for the upcoming season.

The summer has been a busy one with the recruitment of Maisie Burnham, Tara Cousins and Lovisa Hevinder.

Maisie comes to Killarney following an honour laden time in the Liberty High School where she also excelled at Volleyball. She went to Eastern Washington University where she led the team in scoring in the 2020/21 season with over 14 points. This average has been recorded in history's pages as the most by a Freshman.

She moved onto to the University of Portland where she really found her feet with the team, and as her time progressed with the Pilots her stats went North, peaking in the 2024/2025 season where she averages 16.3 points per game.

Cousins, a guard, stands at 5ft 8 and went to High School in the New Hope Academy. She later went to the University of Delaware and in the four years there she built up some very impressive stats.

After an initial settling in period, over the next three years she started 86 of their 87 games, and by the conclusion she led the team in scoring averaging 11.2 points per game. She was the heroine in their win over Hofstra, hitting 21 points and picking up the Player of the Week Award. She was also named in the ALLCAA Second Team of the season.

Lovisa Hevinder becomes the first female Swede to ply their trade in Killarney as the Stockholm native comes to the league via the University of Texas at Tyler Athletics where she spent her college career. Indeed on February 1st this year she set a new record for the Patriots, when she netted her 213th three pointer in their win over Oklahoma Christian. She was a regular starter in her final year where she contributed 7.2 points per game , 5.5 rebounds per game and dished out 82 assists, an accumulation of four years of effort and honesty. This was duly recognised as she was named to the LSC Athletic Performance All Conference Team

She has represented her native Sweden at underage level and memorably played a leading role in their U16 European championship win in 2018. Standing at just over 6ft, Lovisa will be looking to bring her height and athleticism to the fore in the





forward position.

They will of course join an Irish contingent who will have learned plenty from their league journey last season . Lorraine Scanlon is now a fully fledged Irish International and will lead the Utility Trust St Pauls challenge . Rheanne Kelly was the previous incumbent but following the news that she and husband Brian are expecting their first child, Rheanne will now be cheering on from the sidelines as she leaves the role in the capable hands of Lorraine. Previously a member of the Kerry Ladies Gaelic Football team, she is rightly acknowledged as one of Kerry's finest sports people. Denise Dunlea will use the experience of last season's captaincy to remain an influence while Siofra O Shea will have gained huge confidence after a winter on the hardwood. Leah McMahons final quarter performance in that Tallaght decider gave a glimpse into the future while at the other end of the spectrum, the recruitment of Emma Costello is a shrewd move. Emma has a world of experience having played top level basketball with Tralee, Castleisland and Killester and will be a great sounding board for the Club's young guns. There will be a thread of youth again in the squad with some of the younger squad members bound to benefit from the coaching handed to them by James Fleming and Shane Horgan.

The opening round fixture is set for Saturday October 4th at 7pm in the Mercy College and four of the first five fixtures are away from home. That run will be returned though with five home fixtures in a row thereafter. The Wildcats are led by the Hickey sisters, Irish Internationals Kate and Sarah and will provide a stern examination for the new look St Pauls side.







Minister Foley welcomes new emergency communications system to boost rural safety in Kerry during extreme weather events

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has today welcomed a new emergency communications system to boost rural safety in Kerry during extreme weather events

The Mission Critical Communications system will act as a system of 'last resort', allowing first responders to be able to continue to communicate in emergency situations, like extreme weather events such as Storm Eowyn last year, where power systems fail.

The system has built by Vodafone Ireland in partnership with the Office of the Government Chief information officer.

It will help emergency services including Gardaí, fire services, ambulance teams, and civil defence communicate and coordinate more effectively, even in the most remote locations. Minister Foley said: "This is forward planning to build up our resilience for the future to respond to extreme weather events. Right throughout the country, including in Kerry, it is critical to have communications systems in place to keep



people safe during storms and other extreme weather events. I welcome this Mission Critical Communications system, which will provide very positive support at critical times."

Key benefits for rural communities include: Faster emergency response:

First responders' teams can talk, text, share live video, and send maps instantly, even during storms or in areas with poor mobile coverage to help reach people in need quickly.

Priority access for responders:

The new Mission Critical Communications system ensures first responders always have a reliable connection, even when networks are busy.

Funding was provided from the EU's Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF), the main pillar of the European recovery plan, NextGenerationEU, which provides financial aid to Member States to combat the economic and social effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The new Mission Critical Communications system was successfully tested this week in Westport, with emergency teams from Ireland and across Europe taking part in live trials, which once fully operational will have a transformative impact on rural safety in Ireland.

CALL TO ABOLISH VAT ON WEIGHT LOSS DRUGS

Cllr. John O'Donoghue has raised an issue at the recent Killarney Municipal Disctict meeting that the council would write to The Ministers for Health and Finance and ask that the VAT be abolished on weight loss drugs due to their ability to combat such a wide variety of diseases.

"I was approached recently by a healthcare professional regarding these drugs and their high cost. As well as helping with weight loss, they have a huge amount of additional benefits as they help alleviate and in many cases prevent, many of the secondary health issues associated with obesity. Doctors are seeing a huge reduction in the likelihood of patients on these drugs getting such ailments as diabetes as well as seriously lowering the risk of strokes, heart attacks and other vascular complaints. Currently the high price of these drugs is putting them beyond the reach of many, and were the VAT to be abolished, as is the case with many other medicines, this would help somewhat with the high costs involved. The saving to the exchequer in the long run would quite likely far outweigh the initial cost as less people would ultimately have to go the hospital for procedures. A health system where the best treatments are only available to those

who can afford them is far from desirable, and this would help eliminate the two tier health system and I call upon the relevant Ministers to abolish the VAT on these life saving treatments in the upcoming Budget", Cllr. O'Donoghue said.



"As the recent National Oversight and Audit Commission scrutiny report on Kerry County Council identified that we have the second highest personal liability claim payouts per capita among all Local Authoritys in the country for the period of the report, to ask have Kerry County Council identified the reason for our payouts being so high?", he said.

Cllr. O'Donoghue noted the reply and thank the Council for it. I see that the inflated payout rate in Kerry related to a historical payout in 2023 and am glad to see that our rate of payout for personal liability claims, although still extortionate, are back to a rate more in line with other Local Authorities and indeed compares favourably to most. There is an onus on us to be prudent when it comes to our finances, as they are after all public monies, and I thank the Council for clarifying the issue.



ALL STAR NOMINATIONS

It's that time of year again where the All Star nominations are announced. The nominations are rarely controversial and don't exactly stir up any frenzies. There's a simple reason for that. Some people might not be aware of this, but the selection of All Star nominees is by a selection of highly regarded national sports journalists. Not me, obviously – I assumed I'm on a banned list somewhere. Myself and Jimmy Kimmel – the powers that be fear us.

My point is that I would be in conversation with those journalists, and sometimes the conversation would turn to likely nominees. The point is that those conversations happen from quite early on. They pick ot players wh impress them from the opening rounds onwards. It's not like they review the championship after it's all over and pick their best fifteen. A single brilliant display in the later stages might push you into the conversation, but overall excellence is the usual criterion. For example, I thought Michael Langan struggled to impact the All Ireland Final, but he was an awesome force up to that stage and deserves his Footballer of the Year nomination. The Electric Ireland Minor Team of the Year used to be selected by a three man committee, highly respected people, but it used to be very obvious that it was picked after the All Ireland Final. A good semi-final and final could put you in there, even if you had done nothing else all year.

My usual rule in conversations like this applies; I apply it to any team selection. Do not even think about telling me who should be in.... without telling me who should be taken out.

The actual selection is by the inter-county players themselves, and it's a better way than selection by committee. You always used to have a forced 'controversy', and it always felt to me like an attempt to generate media coverage more than anything else. Brian Whelehan, the undoubted Hurler of the Year in 1995, couldn't win an All Star. A year later Jason Sherlock became the first modern media GAA superstar, electrifying far more than his native Dublin.... no All Star, though. No Cork forward in 1990 despite winning the All Ireland. There will be controversies this year as well, or at least, the pretence of one. At the moment the selling point seems to be that Donegal have more nominations than Kerry. Well, begorrah and begob, ready the placards and let's march in unison to demand justice.

I can actually understand it. Kerry really burst into life late on and nobody could live with them at that stage, but Donegal had come a longer road and fought good battles all the way. Ulster is the hardest province to get out of. Donegal showed great consistency in a lot of games. I have no problem with what county got most nominations. I am surprised that Meath's Conor Duke didn't get a nomination, but meh, I'm not likely to lose any sleep over it. As for Michael Murphy being a FoTY nominee? Listen, I'm on the record repeatedly as saying this has been the best footballer of a generation (just ahead of Dublin's James McCarthy) and did some amazing things this year (that late catch in the Ulster Final with the game on the line....) but Footballer of the Year? No chance. I'd have Michael Langan well ahead of him, not even close.

CAMOGIE ALL STARS

The camogie All Star nominees were also released his week. Interesting to note that in this code as well, the losing All Ireland Finalists Cork have 11 nominees, while winners Galway only have 10. And nobody is interested in making a song and dance about that, thankfully.

More importantly, the Soaring Stars winners (i.e., Intermediate and Junior All Stars) have been announced, and Kerry have four winners. GoalkeeperAoife Fitzgerald, corner back Rachel McCarty, midfield dynamo Patrice Diggin, and back to back winner Jackie Horgan up front. I will say that I personally am amazed that Niamh Leen at centre back was not included; I thought she was superb all through the year.

THE RYDER CUP

Samuel Ryder was from Lancashire, son of a nurseryman (gardener, nothing to do with childrens' rhymes) and a prosperous seed merchant. He was aware that 'Golf Illustrated' magazine had helped the invitation of professional US golfers to the British Open in 1921 (remember that professional sports was a fairly new concept in a game previously reserved for the wealthy). That led to the first international golf game between the two in Gleneagles. In 1926, after another meeting between the two countries, Ryder offered to put up money for a Gold Cup, and the first 'Ryder Cup' was played at Worcester in Massachusetts. You've never heard that story. You know why? That's the most mundane muck I've ever come across. There isn't one single memorable fact in that story.

No, I'm re-writing that. As Maxwell Scott said to Tom Stoddard in one of John Ford's best movies, "When the legend becomes fact, print the legend".

Samuel Ryder pretended to be a seed merchant, but he was actually a dashing and daring highwayman, having learnt the trade from his friend the Scarlet Pimpernel. However, once his torrid affair with the young Queen Victoria (give me a little artistic license to work with) was revealed by hard-boiled detective Winston Churchill (okay, a lot of license), he needed to flee the country. More importantly, to smuggle out all his pirate gold (that's right, he wasn't a highwayman, he was a pirate. Sorry about that). He had the brainwave of melting all the gold into little spheres and painting them to look like golf balls. Aha! Fooled everyone, those being less suspicious times (and Sherlock Holmes not being as bright as his biographer claimed). He initially fled to Ireland, but began to lose funds because it turned out that we were way better at golf (and smuggling) than he was, so he decided to go to America. But why? He decided to make a gold cup and set up a golf competition, in order to justify getting all these



surprisingly heavy golf balls past customs. And that's how the Ryder Cup (should have) really started.

The Ryder Cup is golf's showpiece. All the other events are individual and based purely on performance v monetary reward. But the Ryder Cup does have an echo (albeit hugely overblown) of patriotism about it. It represents an ideal in a very material domain, and is worth celebrating for that alone. The team element and the strategic match-ups always feel like forced elements in the story. Not insignificant, but nowhere near as paramount as commentators pretend. But in a world of LIV golf and that Soccer Club World Cup nonsense, seeing Rory McIlroy calling out Patrick Cantlay on his caddie's behaviour and the pair genuinely bristling at each other in Rome (in a car park, no less; you'd think it was an Irish wedding) was somehow genuinely refreshing. Except Cantlay was only fishing for cheap headliners and I don't think he expected Rory to call him out on being a showpony. What makes me think that? Well, Cantlay refused to wear the USA team cap in protest at not being paid to play (he denies it now; he didn't deny it at the ime). Look, I'd have sympathy when it comes to expenses. But pay for play? Every single one of you is a multi-millionaire already; that's why you don't have to buy a ticket. Look, I expect the USA to win (and Donald Trump to claim credit, of course). Home advantage really is huge in this competition and US supporters tend to be....vocal.

But the US players are getting \$500,000 each to play, with \$300,000 of it going to charity. Look, charitable causes are of course worthy of support, but when money to charity is included in something like this, it's a PR gesture. It says "we know that this is completely contrary to the whole purpose of the competition, but our players are too self-centred to care". I'm extremely old-fashioned, I suppose, and LIV really lifted the facade of dignity from golf (the Irish Open in Trump Doonbeg, with the world class Lahinch half an hour away? That's criminal, and for once that isn't a dig at the man himself). I really think, whether it's the US or European team, getting selected should be an honour. I know that most of the players have succumbed to public pressure from the likes of the great Tom Watson and agreed to pay all the money to charity, but we have all seen yere true colours. The game made you rich. You haven't enough personal pride to want to stamp your name of this event out of all of them? Fair enough. Off with you lad, leave it after you.

As for the conduct of the American 'fans'...look, these people voted for Donald Trump. It was pointless to hope for anything better. Killarney

is a popular holiday destination for US golfers; the vast majority are ashamed of the conduct at Bethpage. Those people were somehow missing the whole point of the Ryder Cup. Or patriotism, for that matter. The best way to show pride in your country is by behaving as if you have some. Not that I would ever define myself as 'European', I'm Irish. That's not xenophobia in any way; the likes of Rhadisat Adeleke and Seán Óg Ó hAilpín are every bit as Irish as I am, if not more so.

I was avidly European during the Ryder Cup. The hype during previews was obviously and clumsily manufactured, but once the actual play started? Loved it. Cheered unabashedly. Frankly, I'm the same way watching the scoring during the Eurovision Song Contest. If you don't, then I am sorry to inform you, but you don't have a soul.

It started reasonably innocuously. There was catcalling early on, and Rory McIlroy did get booed on his appearance, but it felt more like banter than rancour. A few muppets trying to live up to a tough guy version of New York got louder as Europe began to really dominate, especially Rory, the mood got uglier. At one point Rry did make a gesture towards the US fans; frankly, I don't remotely blame him. Now, I didn't watch it all through. Not a hope; that was a busy weekend on many fronts. Like a lot of people, almost certainly a majority, I followed the scoring and the major highlights on my phone. It did feel like Shane Lowry was off his game, more a foil to Rory than a contributor in his own right, but he certainly wasn't afraid to match the ire of the US supporters. At the end of Day One, Rahm and Straka had beaten Scheffler and Spaun comfortably, Fleetwood and Rose (he was excellent) had beaten DeChambeau and Griffin, and the Irish pairing had tied with Burns and Cantlay - Rory hadn't been able to convert a late chance for birdie. Justin Thomas (seemed like the best player overall to me) and Young had beaten Aberg and Hoejgaard well. Still, Europe ahead by 5.5 to 2.5, that's a great

The atmosphere got much worse (honestly, well beyond the bounds of acceptability) on Day Two. Right from the start, the MC riled up the crowd to abuse McIlrov – and ves, there was no way that could have been mistaken for banter or humour of any kind. She did apologise and step down later that night. I suspect that US PGA officials insisted on it; this whole debacle reflects very, very poorly on them. And while I try very hard to fall in with the usual faux dramatic outrage and it was highlights, i.e,. the worst examples, that I saw, I use the word 'debacle' advisedly. The presence of State troopers should not have been necessarybut it was, and not because of the fleeting appearance of the US President. Bethpage is the first public course ever to host the Ryder Cup. I don't see how that could have been a factor personally I think the US embrace of patriotism and the hard right (including what I consider to be an unacceptable level of xenophobia it's a hallmark of a particular political doctrine, but that's a different conversation) most likely played a big part. Golf was always considered an expensive, upper class pursuit where

personal dignity and honesty mattered most (that included a certain amount of snobbery, racism, and misogyny, to be truthful). This.... wasn't that.

Hatton and Fitzpatrick beat Cantlay and Burns. Spaun and Schauffle beat Rahm and Straka for a badly needed US victory. They were the only ones, though, with Fleetwood and Rose comfortably defeating the US big pairing of Scheffler and DeChambeau. US captain Keegan Bradley (does anybody else think that 'Bradley Keegan' is a more sensible name?) must surely have been banking on a win there. Bradley appears to be the scapegoat for the US' poor showing overall. There is also loads of nonsense being talked about Europe being a great team while the US are great individuals but poor team-mates. Amateur psychology at it's finest by pundits who had all expressed approval of Bradley's selections in their previews. It did seem to me that Europe's big guns did perform and America's didn't, but 'why' does not deserve any glib answer.

All that mattered on Saturday was Rory and Shane beating Thomas and Young. Europe in front by 11.5 to 4.5.

As far as I was concerned, that was that. The US would pick up points in the singles, but they would be doing well to reach respectability. All we (by now I was firmly committed to 'we') needed was a mere 2.5 points to wrap it up. Injury to Hovland meant his forced withdrawal with injury meant that his match was automatically halved. I was fairly blasé. Hubris. It makes fools of all of us.

Because Sunday...well, Day Three is called Moving Day by a lot of golfers (in four day tournaments, the third round is where you make your move up the leaderboard....or not). And the scoreboard certainly started to move here, and not in a good way for Europe.

Cameron Young took control very quickly against Justin Rose. The US ahead in four matches, five more halved but with US tails rising. Rory was only hanging on against Scheffler; Europe's talisman looked tired. Aberg was leading Cantlay and Fitzpatrick (another to absolutely excel) on top against De Chambeau, but this was suddenly starting wrack nerves. Mine, most definitely, but a few European golfers as well. America's chances were still remote, but now in a sense of 'winning a local church raffle' rather than the National Lottery. Justin Rose with three birdies in four holes from the 13th to the 16th but Young wrapped up the win on the final hole. Justin Thomas won in similar fashion. DeChambeau was five down at one stage but suddenly opened his sails and was level by the 17th and halved the match, a brilliant comeback. Scheffler beat Rory by one hole; it could have been more. Lads, this is not going well..

Aberg beat Cantlay. At last, Europe on the scoreboard. America with the next two points, Schauffle beating Rahm well and Spaun 2 and 1 against Straka. Oh lads, we cannot lose from here or the US supporters will feel that misconduct is completely justifiable in future. And regardless, losing from this starting position would make the European players immortal....and not in a good way.

Shane Lowry one down on the 18th. I like Shane, I like him a lot, but I don't see him as the one to turn it around. Except that Shane, arguably the most vocally passionate of all Team Europe, did exactly that. A beautiful chip to five feet away. Big pressure on the shot, but Shane was equal to it and drained the shot. Europe guaranteed a draw and retention of the Cup.

Griffin did put another American point on the board but the sense of drama had passed and the last matches were safely halved to wrap up a 15 – 13 win. A memorable victory – not a memorable occasion. Dear God, are they really going to host a Soccer World Cup?

The PGA reports are describing it as the best Ryder Cup of all time. That is literally how they describe every single Ryder Cup. Was it really that good? I didn't think so. Completely one-sided for the first two days. Plenty of drama on the last day but that was because Europe made it tougher than it should have been. Not a great occasion for golf at all, but I expect action taken by the PGA on both sides of the Atlantic to enforce higher standards. I expect a much better competition in Adare in two years time. I certainly hope so.

NFL IN CROKE PARK

I have to balance any criticism of US fans in Bethpage with the highest praise for those in Dublin last weekend - I have to point out that the Steelers back-up quarterback Skylar Thompson getting mugged in Dublin is worse than anything that happened at the Ryder Cup. There was the usual whataboutery by have-ago heroes about Croke Park hosting American Football. Lads, it's not a military or political parade, alright? It's a bridging of sporting cultures with arguably our biggest tourism (since Brexit) and trading market. Yes, I do have economic criticisms of America's export/import policies, but this is not that fight. I absolutely supported Colin Kaepernick's taking a knee during the National Anthem. That is the whole point of having political freedom; anything less is tyranny. But this is not any million men march; this is a sports match. The only issue is the GAA's restriction to no more than three non GAA events in a year, a constraint they fully agreed to in their planning but have subsequently chafed against (remember the GAA trying to blame everybody else for the Garth Brooks concerts' mess? They got greedy). The atmosphere, not just in Croke Park, was fantastic. I wasn't at the game but I've spoken to plenty who were, including many who brought their kids. And they loved it. The American supporters brought vibrancy, noise, colour, and craic (our version, not theirs). In practical terms, it's a good way to expand their own sport, and create a bigger market niche, and yes, simply make friends.

My own inclination was to favour the Pittsburgh Steelers over the Minnesota Vikings. Pittsburgh has very strong Irish connections (yes, more per capita than either Boston or New York). Was the original Quiet Man, Seán Thornton from Maurice Walsh's book'Green Rushes' (the movie was very loosely based on a far less clichéridden short story in it) back from Pittsburgh? I

know he spoke of the steelworks. Maybe it was Philadelphia....I am not supporting the Eagles, end of story there. No offence to Taylor Swift or her in-laws. Actually, imagine the tourism boost of Taylor attending an Eagles game with the Kelces in Dublin?

As for Minnesota? Plenty of Irish went these in the 19th century, but it would have stronger roots in Scandinavia. Hence their adoption of the name 'Vikings' in 1960. Just think of our own history with the Vikings. "From the fury of the Northmen, Good Lord, deliver us" was the supposed prayer of the medieval age (it's a modern myth, but the sentiment would undoubtedly have been real). The Vikings were the biggest military power during the Dark Ages. Not just Scandinavia - the likes of England, France (Normandy just means 'land of the northmen'), Russia (the original 'Rus' were viking invaders), Iceland....they did actually attempt to settle America. And they were as much settlers and farmers as actual vikings, by the way. But any time in history that Vikings came to Dublin, it wasn't good for the Irish. Dublin was itself a Norse settlement and at one time the biggest slave market in Western Europe (no comparison to Eastern Europe - it was the vikings who gave the Slavic peoples their name and you can guess why). Ivar the Boneless, son of Ragnar Lothbrok

Remember Brian Boru and Brodar? That wasn't actually a battle between native Irish and Vikings at all. Both armies were mixed, with plenty of blood relations on both sides.

Look, I haven't heard stories of Minnesota fans plundering the docks last weekend. The Steelers did have their 'Terrible Towels' which is iconic in the sense that.....no, I've got nothing. You played an important game in 1975, so a DJ called for all the Steelers' fans to show up with yellow dishcloths? And went on to beat the Colts and eventually win the Superbowl? I'm sorry, what? Like I say, its a meeting of Irish and American sporting cultures, and some things just don't translate for me. The 'Terrible Towel' is one of them.

It was actually a great game. I didn't see it – I was at the Ladies semi-final and subsequently riveted by the Ryder Cup drama – but it sounds like the Steelers won a classic. But for once, and I say this rarely enough, the actual occasion was greater than the game and will have a greater significance in time to come. Kudos to all involved.




THAT WHAM BANG **BOTTLED BIRDIE** AT BETHPAGE!

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

The highlight of the mission came on the final evening, themed "Celebrating Community." Groups from across the parish participated, reflecting the unity and vitality of Killarney's faith community.


The week was fondly remembered as a joyful and uplifting occasion, one that renewed parish pride and deepened faith.

HERBACEOUS PERNNIALS

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of them, the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in spring and will grow and flower right through the summer and into the autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials in late autumn and early winter, they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the winter some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late autumn and early winter, cut the majority of them down to ground level and mulch over with some compost. Some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuschias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level. Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons.

Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread. When planting a Herbaceous border, always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant tha you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Pernnials flower from April until October/ November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every fdew years in the winter to lif and divide the plants that are suitable for this.

"But the Wisdom from above is first of all pure. It is also peace loving, gentle at all times, and willing to yield to others. It is full of Mercy and the fruit of good deeds. It shows no favouritism and is always sincere. And those who are peacemakers will plant seeds of peace and reap a harvest of Righteousness" (James 3:17-18).

Welcome back dear student often, when people are dealing with a crisis, or have to make a difficult decision they wonder 'how will I know what the right thing to do is?' This Scripture gives a key. We must seek God's Wisdom by asking Jesus to direct us onto the right paths - His path. Then by faith we receive - that means we trust Him and step out and take action. "My sheep hear My voice, and they follow Me" (John 10:27). Jesus noted that His sheep 'do not follow the voice of the stranger' (John 10:5). Having discernment to recognise the difference between God's voice and the enemy is vital, and it comes from spending time in God's Word and in prayer, talking and listening to Him — basically, getting to know Him (Hebrews 5:14). When we lean upon God He is Faithful to lead us to safety. Studying the lead verse above, the first result of God's Presence is Righteousness or purity, for God is Holy. When Isaiah saw the Lord in a heavenly vision the reaction of this man of God was how sinful he was (Isaiah 6:5). That is the state of all the human race — 'for all have sinned and fall short of the Glory of God' (Romans 3:23). All but One - for Jesus never sinned. That's how His sacrifice was accepted by God to pay the penalty for all our sins. The Sinless Blood of Jesus now lays upon the Mercy seat in Heaven before God's Throne. The innocence and purity of that Blood speaks Mercy on behalf of all believers in Jesus. It is because of Jesus that we can now come into the Presence of God reconciled as His children (Hebrews 4:16). So, Righteousness - or holiness, is the first aspect of the Presence of God.

The second is the level of Peace you get in the midst of the circumstances. Jesus is the Prince of Peace, and God's counsel brings Peace (Isaiah 9:5). When people go to the High Court they need a Senior Counsel to represent and advocate for them. The Holy Spirit is God's Attorney, His free gift to every believer! He is named 'Paraclete' in Greek which means the Advocate, the One Who stands beside you; the Comforter, Helper and Guide — the One Who leads us into the Truth (John 14:16-17). Holy Spirit is our powerful Partner and Friend. When the devil is involved in any situation, there is confusion, bitterness, jealousy and evil of every kind (James 3:15-16). But when the Spirit of God is in control, purity and peace result. This is how you can judge what the right move is. Is this decision from a pure heart? Do I have peace that this is the right thing to do? Others may not be happy, but we must obey God, not appease man (Acts 4:19).

The world promotes self-gratification, but in Jesus' Kingdom the opposite is true. God is not the author of chaos or confusion, but He is the God of Order and Love. This is another key into recognising what spirit is in control here. Is there order or chaos? Jealousy, bitterness and strife, or Gentleness, Mercy and Peace? It's a good exercise to write these things down in a 'pros and cons' type layout, and the answer becomes very clear (Proverbs 4:5-7). Seeking God's Wisdom will always preserve and protect you friend.
