

Help get Karin to Germany.....

ALMOST €58,000 RAISED AS TEACHER LAUNCHES APPEAL FOR FUNDING FOR TREATMENT

A teacher at St. Brendan's College in Killarney issued a heartfelt plea to help her get to Germany for treatment and is overwhelmed with the response as at the time of going to print, almost €58,000 had been raised.

26 year old Karin O'Shea is from Kilgarvan and in April 2021 she was diagnosed with Lyme disease.

The only treatment option open to Karin is to travel to Germany to get treatment and as the costs aren't covered by private health insurance or cross border schemes Karin's only option was to create a gofundme page to rasie the funds. "I was diagnosed with Lyme disease in April

2021 and need funding to get treatment in Germany and this is the only option left to me", Karin said.

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection, transmitted from the bite of an infected tick. If not treated early, the infection can spread to your joints, heart, nervous system and brain. The disease has had a devastating effect on Karin.

"I know that this will be a shock for some people to hear about how serious my situation has become. However, this is now my reality. This is a diagnosis that has deeply affected every single aspect of my life. My Lyme disease went undiagnosed for 12 years. I was given the label of Fibromyalgia and I managed these symptoms. Life was normal", Karin added.

However, in October 2020, Karin experienced a severe deterioration in health. After exhausting


every avenue with her GP and countless consultants, undergoing x-rays, scans, MRI's, hospital admissions, she still had no answers.

"I sent my bloods to Germany to test for Lyme disease. The results came back positive. They also showed chronic immune suppression.

I began attending Dr. Lambert (Infectious Disease Specialist in the Mater Hospital, Dublin). I was on a treatment plan of up to 5 antibiotics a day for several months. Unfortunately, this was unsuccessful due

to late diagnosis. This treatment also came with severe side effects and is the only available treatment in Ireland", she added.

"It has done immense damage to my immune and nervous system. I have debilitating neurological symptoms which include excruciating nerve pain, migraines, head pressure, short term memory loss, episodes of body paralyses and tremors which include slurred speech, fainting, loss of balance, extreme exhaustion, insomnia and nausea. Being aware of your own body and brain depleting daily is utterly terrifying, it strips you of your dignity. Never-ending pain is grueling beyond comprehension. Every day tasks that would typically be easy to accomplish have suddenly become near impossible. I reunite with friends and family when I'm able. These days are vital for my own mental health however they set me back physically and I am left paying for this for several days after, confined to the four walls. I am now mostly housebound".



The only option left for Karin now is to travel to St. George's Clinic in Germany for a month of intensive treatment, followed by a 6 month rehabilitation plan. The cost of the intensive treatment is upwards of €35,000 for a 4 week stay in the clinic. This does not include travel, post-treatment care, and further appointments. "My private health insurance nor the cross border scheme can assist in any of the costs involved as Chronic Lyme disease is not recognised by the Irish State. I have spent upwards of €6,000 on medical treatments already and I had to give up my job in St. Brendan's College Killarney indefinitely", the devestated teacher said.

Karin has nowhere left to turn and is asking for support to enable her to get her life back.

"I very much wish I could afford this treatment without burdening anyone else. Therefore, any donation big or small is hugely appreciated", Karin said.

I wish to highlight the plight of Karin O'Shea, a 26 year old girl from Kilgarvan, who is a personal friend of our family and is best friends of my own daughter Theresa, I even brought her to school. This girl has gone around here in this country undiagnosed with Lymes disease for more than 12 years, the problem is that the department here doesn't recognise Lymes or won't accept results of blood tests or diagnosis from Germany or other countries. Testing in Ireland is inaccurate, we have only one specialist in this country who can only offer antibiotics, Irish patients have no other option but to seek treatment abroad, which is not covered by the Cross Border or Treatment abroad scheme because GPs here are not allowed to sign off on it. There is

not enough education about ticks in Ireland, many going around undiagnosed as not everyone comes out with bul'seye rash more must be done to education people about other symptoms such as muscle pain, tiredness and headaches, as early diagnosis can make a huge difference in curing this terrible disease. This lovely girl's whole live is in turmoil she has had to give up her teaching job in St. Brendan's college in Killarney. The cost of 4 weeks treatment for her in Germany is €35,000 and she has to embark on a Go fund me campaign to help her get this treatment.

It's the talk of the town.....



Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

THE ICONIC STRAWBERRY TREE

The biggest Strawberry Tree in Ireland may not be in Killarney at all, I was shocked to discover last week.

It is at the back of Newman House, the original UCD, where the great cardinal and founder of the Catholic University composed "The Idea of A University". (We could badly do with re-reading that fine essay, to recover the ideals we once aspired to for third level education).

I had gone to the building which is now the Irish Museum of literature on the southern side of Stephen's Green to muse over writing. I left thinking about trees.

Then again trees and academies and literature are never far from each other. James Joyce dreamed up Molly Bloom under the branches of the Strawberry Tree, I would guess. His graduation picture is taken under the neighbouring ash tree.

Moya Cannon who was well known at Killarney poetry readings during her time as writer-in-residence here is reflected, readers of The Killarney Outlook will be interested to know.

Back to the trees: we are constantly of late hearing from environmentalists about the "majestic" oak woods of Killarney and the "ancient" yew woods and how important they are in the European context.

Yet the delightful strawberry tree is far nearer, and I would say dearer, to the old stock of Killarney.

We have a fine old hotel The Arbutus Hotel called after it; during the 1990s one of the best rated restaurants in Ireland was The Strawberry Tree in College Street; and in the 1950s and '60s the children here had no more favourite drink than the locally made Arbutus Orange, direct from the Killarney Mineral Water Factory.

There is a lovely café table under the giant arbutus in Dublin and their big problem each morning is brushing away the gold and red berries, the waiter told us as we sat out in the fine weather of last week.

The berries, out now, along with the flowers, are perfect for jams as well as drinks - and

even alcohol in Portugal.

It has a beautiful red peeling bark and is closely related to of all things the rhododendron, I discovered.

It is as native a tree as any, was far more widespread once upon a time and was used for making charcoal. It is listed as of



the seven shrub trees in medieval Ireland. But there is very little about it. It is as overlooked in Irish history as it is now in Killarney! It might be time to start planting it in the back garden.

For years, to be a biddy was not exactly a term of endearment. A "right auld biddy", could be applied to women of all ages. And to men too, at times.

There was no equivalent term for men. I have no recollection of "a right auld paddy", for instance.

I am not suggesting we should all go around disparaging men, simply to balance things

The new balance is in a new respect for Bridget and this St Bridget' Day/ Biddy's Day has been more marked than usual.

Next year, 101 years since women were airbrushed out of the foundation of this State, and everything else, it is to be a bank holiday. Remarkably few secondary schools in Munster, outside a scattering in Kildare and Leinster, are called after her. With the exception of our Killarney St Brigid's I know of no other in Kerry. What a proud day that will be in 2023 for the Killarney secondary school and all those who sail in her.

But I hope the celebrations of St Bridget's Day next year will not be too serious and pofaced.

I predict there will be a lot of debate about whether to call her Bríd/Brigid/Bridget and how her name must be properly spelled. The Tuiseal Ginideach and all the grammatical regulations will all be thrashed to bits, too, no doubt.

This week already, there are attempts to paint her as a "a major figure" in pagan festival of Imbolc; She is also been shown as a fearsome, dreadfully sad and severe icon. But in the folk memory in the shadow of the Reeks where she still lives a bit, the true Bridget always had a bit of "diviliment", and fun, attached to her. And her anger was never for long.

The funny approachable Bridget of Bridget

Jones's Diary might be nearer the true picture.

TOURIST MATTERS FOCUS ON SHORT TERM LETTINGS

The council have confirmed to Councillor Brendan Cronin that on foot of the planning enforcement warning letters to 183 Airbnbs in Killarney MD, last year, two planning applications have been made to change the use of a dwelling to a holiday home for short term letting. Some 94 files are closed for various reasons. And the remainder - in other words 87 properties - are active and "are being pursued" by the local authority.

I have been trying without much success to isolate exactly how the council is going this whole business. I still am not sure how the properties have been selected, or whether they are wholly within what is no longer the old urban area.

I have been trying to get the context and to find out the full rundown on properties that have planning permission to operate for tourist letting, not only in Killarney but in the whole of Kerry.

I have also been trying to get the numbers in the various categories of B&Bs, guesthouses and hotels which would seem like basic planning information.

I resorted to a Freedom of Information Request. And indeed, there are no numbers because no planning register is kept by Kerry County Council which "captures" this, to use the council's parlance.

"There is no register available of properties that have planning for short-term letting nor is there a requirement to have one. For 2021, a total of 49 properties registered with Kerry County Council. There is no breakdown per Municipal District," was the response on the short-lets.

I still can't fully understand what is going on

It is probably fair to assume that the warning letters in Killarney have led to the first ever planning register tor tourist accommodation and that all 49 are in Killarney.

The recent meeting of the council in Killarney heard from the head of planning enforcement how the letters have been sent in Killarney because council has "a statutory duty to enforce short term letting arrangements".

Killarney is a rent pressure zon the letters went to properties that could be available for long term letting, and the council was taking a reasonable approach, Ger O'Brien said.





SKILLED PERSONNEL URGENTLY **NEEDED** IN BOOMING ECONOMY



/hat a difference a year makes! Just twelve months ago unemployment figures made for shocking reading. 20% of the national workforce was out of work. Kerry's unemployment rate of 25% was the worst in the country. Kerry's workers were also worst hit by the pandemic with a staggering 45% on State benefits. Counties, like Kerry, which are highly dependent on tourism and retail, were devastated by the lockdown.

Lo and behold, the Central Bank's first quarterly bulletin of 2022 paints a much rosier picture and forecasts a budget surplus in 2023, two years earlier than had been predicted. The Central Bank forecasts that the Irish economy will boom for the next three years as we leave the pandemic behind. The economy has gathered strong momentum and is expected to provide full employment by 2024, much earlier than previously expected. Employment is set to grow by about 7% to 2024, driven by a record number of women in the workplace, probably as a result of wage increases and more flexible working conditions. It is expected that the jobless rate will fall to 5.8% in 2022, to 5.3% in 2023 and to 4.6% in 2024, which the Central Bank defines as full employment. The Central Bank did strike a note of caution as the country gets close to a position of full employment. Labour shortages are already beginning to emerge and the job vacancy rate has reached the highest level on record.

The acceleration of social media platforms, artificial intelligence, data analysis, automation and digital communication during the pandemic has forever changed long established business practices. Many more business transactions are taking place online so the demand for courses in analytical and digital skills, e-business, software and coding skills has increased.

The critical need for housing and infrastructure will result in strong demand for courses in civil, mechanical, electrical, environmental and structural engineering, architecture, quantity surveying, valuation surveying, property management and auctioneering.

Front line healthcare workers - Doctors, Pharmacists, Nurses, Physiotherapists and allied health care staff were the heroes of Ireland's battle with the virus. Demand for all courses in health sciences will be at an all-time high this year.

Civil and Public service jobs showed how resistant they are to unpredictable economic circumstances. Every civil and public service worker remained on the State payroll while thousands of private sector workers depended on a variety of pandemic payments. Thankfully, after two difficult years, private sector employment, in areas like tourism, retail and hospitality, should make a strong recovery in



FULL IN-DEPTH REVIEW NEEDED OF IRISH TOURISM OFFERING says MEP Kelleher

- Average spend is not as high as it could and should be -

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that the re-opening of society and the economy should prompt an in-depth analysis and wider discussion on Ireland's tourism offering into the future.

"Data from before the onset of the Covid 19 pandemic indicated that tourism contributed just over \$6 billion to the Irish economy. While this is an important source of income for businesses, communities and the State, we need to look at how we compare to other countries to ascertain if we are maximising our potential.

"Iceland, a small and quite isolated country, received €2.9 billion in 2018 from tourism with just over 2 million visitors. Ireland, while having 9 million visitors, only received double that amount (€5.8 billion).

"Something is going wrong in the sense that visitors to our shores aren't spending as much as other people visiting other markets. This needs to be investigated and a plan put in place to ensure that our massive tourism numbers bring increased spending.

"We have an amazing tourism offering - there is no doubt in my mind that we can match any country in the world but something is not working if we aren't generating as much income as other countries.

"The average tourist spend per day in Ireland is €72, according to Tourism Ireland. This compares poorly to an average spend of roughly €140 in Iceland.

"We need to know why our incoming tourists aren't spending as much as visitors to other countries. High visitor numbers mean very little if they aren't spending money and supporting and creating jobs.

"This is the time to start investigating and analysing. Consumers, and their preferences, have been affected by the pandemic. Their priorities have also changed I believe. I think Tourism



Ireland and the Irish Government should take the time and investigate where we are, re-evaluate our markets and potential visitors, and plan to grow our tourism market and tourism spend," concluded Kelleher.

FUNDING TO RESUME FOR KERRY MOUNTAIN RESCUE TEAM



he ASTI has said it will support the new arrangements for the Leaving Certificate 2022 and in particular the changes announced to this year's written exams.

A critically important change announced today is the introduction of measures to ensure that aggregate Leaving Cert results in 2022 are no lower than last year.

"This will provide students with a level playing field as they progress to the next stage of their lives," said ASTI President Eamon Dennehy. The ASTI called for additional adjustments to written examinations in line with 2021. These adjustments will now be implemented.



"Our 2022 Leaving Certificate students have come through extraordinary challenges and much uncertainty over the past two years. It is essential that these students are provided with a Leaving Cert examination which is student-centred and responsive to the challenges they have experienced during the pandemic."

It's also important to check your eligibility online on hse.ie before you self-schedule your appointment, bearing in mind that you need to wait three months (at least 90 days) after your first round of Covid-19 vaccination before you can get a booster. If you had Covid-19 since you were vaccinated, you should get your booster dose at least three months after your positive test result.



WHOLEMEAL BROWN SCONES

Ingredients

175g/6 oz Coarse Wholemeal Flour 175g/6 oz Cream Plain Flour 1 level teaspoon Odlums Bread Soda Pinch of Salt 50g/2 oz Butter or Margarine 1 tablespoon brown Sugar 220ml Lee strand Buttermilk 1 egg to glaze

For Topping

Jar of Follain jam

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C. Lightly dust a flat baking tray with some flour.
- 2. Put the wholemeal flour into a large mixing bowl. Sieve the cream flour, salt and bread soda into the bowl. Mix the ingredients together with your fingers, or a wooden spoon.
- 3. Next rub in the butter/margarine, then mix in the sugar and mix together.
- 4. At this stage, put the lightly dusted tray into the oven to preheat.
- 5. Finally stir in buttermilk to make a soft dough. if u think the mix is too dry you can add a little bit more milk, Turn onto a lightly floured surface and gently knead for a few seconds.then Cut out scones with a scones cutter or a flour dusted plastic cup
- 6. Put the scones on the preheated tray . Brush with a little milk or egg to glaze (for a golden finish). Bake for about 15 mins or until risen and golden brown. Cool on a wire tray.

WARM ROASTED PEPPER & GOAT'S CHEESE SALAD

SERVES: 2 (APPROX 600 KCAL PER SERVING)

Ingredients

2 red peppers

1 fresh rosemary sprig

3 garlic cloves

40g sun-dried tomatoes (well drained)

2 tablespoons rapeseed oil (30g)

½ lemon

1 teaspoon wholegrain mustard (5g)

½ teaspoon honey (2.5g)

120g goat's cheese

75g baby spinach leaves

salt (optional) and freshly ground black pepper

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F. Cut the peppers in half, then remove the seeds and cut into slices. Break the rosemary into tiny sprigs and lightly crush the garlic cloves. Finely chop the sun-dried tomatoes.

Put the red peppers, rosemary and garlic in a large baking tin lined with parchment paper and drizzle over half of the oil. Toss until evenly coated and then season with salt (optional) and pepper.

Spread out in an even layer as possible and then roast for 20 minutes until cooked through and lightly golden, turning at least once or twice to ensure they cook evenly.

Meanwhile, make the dressing. Squeeze the juice from the lemon - you'll need 2 teaspoons and put in a screw-topped jar. Add the wholegrain mustard and honey. Season with salt (optional) and pepper, then shake well to combine.

Remove the cooked peppers and crumble over the goat's cheese, then return to the oven for 5 minutes. Transfer to a bowl and toss with the spinach, sun-dried tomatoes and dressing, then divide between plates to serve.







GLAUCOMA?

WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?


Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests. Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

SYMPTOMS

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision)



is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open- angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.


TREATMENT

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with open-angle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.

The Cavan champions came to Tullamore with real ambition, but they evaporated like mist in sunlight once the Kerry champions hit high gear – and that certainly didn't take long. The game was just four minutes old when Mikey Murphy, who had a storming performance as a third midfielder, laid off to Shane O'Sullivan for the first goal. Pádraig Doyle slotted over a point before O'Sullivan struck again, this time receiving from John O'Leary for another simple finish. Cornelius Buckley made it 2-2 to 0-0 and Denn were already reeling on the ropes.

Ben Conaty opened their account in the 12th minute but Seán O'Keeffe snapped a piledriver over the bar after a good layoff by O'Sullivan. Denn were already well outclassed but in fairness to them, they were game, with Oisín Kiernan and goalkeeper Mark Fegan (after Thomas Edward O'Donoghue was fouled) trimming the gap. It was to no avail, with Conor Herlihy teeing up Shane O'Sullivan for his second and Gneeveguilla's third goal after twenty minutes. Pa Warren added another goal and the game was all but over. That said, Paul O'Leary did have to be alert to clear off the Gneevequilla goal-line before Beany Gaffney, Denn's best player, picked off a point. Cornelius Buckley closed out the first half scoring.

In fairness to the Cavan side, they came out with all guns blazing. Patrick O'Riordan did really well to save a Seán O'Donoghue piledriver, but Cavell Keogan was on hand to slot home. Ben Conarty added a point and Thomas Edward Donohue, Denn's intercounty player, pointed a free, with Shane O'Sullivan notching a point for Gneeveguilla. Denn were much more competitive with the wind, having rejigged at the back, with goalkeeper Mark Fegan adding another free to make it 4-5 to 1-7. However, Gneeveguilla calmly soaked up the pressure and hit back, with Paul O'Leary and Cornelius Buckley slotting frees. Oisín Kiernan and Thomas Edward Donohoe kept Denn's fading hopes alive but once Jack Cremin struck goal number five, it was all over as a contest. Cornelius Buckley closed out Gneeveguilla's scoring, while Denn deserve credit for finishing strongly with frees from Donohoe (2) and Mark Fegan.

Focus on Kilmeena

Make no mistake; this is a very good side. Like Gneeveguilla, who were denied by a late penalty in the 2020 Kerry Junior Final, Kilmeena could consider themselves unlucky to lose out in the County Final that year. Like Gneeveguilla, they made amends with a great display in the 2021 version, with the West Mayo outfit beating Cill Chomain by an unflattering 1-10 to 1-7 margin.

It was their first title in 19 years, but a young and pacy team showed no fear whatsoever, having clocked up big totals along the way.

They put Sligo champions St. Patricks to the sword on a 1-18 to 0-5 scoreline,


Next up were the Offaly champions in the All Ireland semi-final, and again Kilmeena emphasized their quality with a 1-18 to 0-6 victory.

Make no mistake; these are the two best teams in the competition, and Gneeveguilla will have their work cut out to do this - it will be very tough – this is a virtual certainty to be Gneeveguilla's hardest game so far. Croke Park is a big, wide pitch and it can be unnerving – hopefully Gneeveguilla's experience at minor, U21, and junior grades will stand to them. Pace and accurate kicking will be crucial – but neither side is lacking in either department. Both teams play open football and are fearless in attack.

Hopefully on Sunday night Gneeveguilla will be returning to the Kingdom with an All Ireland title, the ninth Kerry team to do so.

STUMBLING START FOR KERRY NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE:

Kerry 1-10 Kildare 0-13

To listen to some of the after-match reaction, you'd think that Kerry had been walloped in much the same fashion as Dublin had been the night before. Their performance wasn't actually anywhere near that bad - Kerry were the better team overall and led all the way through until the final minutes. But underdogs Kildare will certainly have come out of St. Conleth's Park the happier of the two sides, having overhauled a four point deficit to fully deserve a draw. A top team shouldn't be letting that happen, but Kerry had too many players off the pace to be described last Sunday as a top team. St. Conleth's Park is a tight pitch, which suited Kildare better, although it probably played a role in crowd delays that saw the match delayed by fifteen minutes.

Kildare looked that little bit stronger and faster right from the off, taking good points through Paul Cribben (his display against Coláiste na Sceilge in 2009 remains the best exhibition by a colleges player that I ever saw) booming over and midfielder Kevin Flynn adding another. Kerry struggled a bit in midfield - Adrian Spillane battled very hard, but I am more convinced than ever that Seán O'Shea isn't suited to the role. It isn't a big concern for me given that Kerry were missing David Moran, Joe O'Connor, Diarmuid O'Connor, and Jack Barry. I'd have been inclined to bring on Greg Horan earlier and switch Seán to wing forward - isn't hindsight great? Neither wing forward will have been happy with their displays on Sunday.

Kerry' two best players without question were Paudie Clifford and Gavin White. Gavin's drives forward can sometimes be an over-used tactic, but on this occasion he had Kildare sweating every time he touched the ball, and he did trojan work to break the game-line, with Killian Spillane adroitly pouncing to finish to the net. Killian has really upped his work-rate without sacrificing his attacking instincts. Sean O'Shea kicked a good point, but the razor-sharp Jimmy Hyland kicked a beauty in reply. The match programme had a big picture of Jimmy on the front cover, and you could see why.

A foul on David Clifford, who seemed to roam out to the forty, saw Seán O'Shea kick a good free. Paudie Clifford added another with his left leg. Jimmy Hyland replied before before another surging run by Gavin White resulted in another free and another score for Seán. Paudie Clifford set up Tom O'Sullivan for a trademark score – Tom brought the ball forward superbly, but really struggled to deal with the dangerous Hyland, few defenders could have handled him in this form. Dan O'Donoghue excelled on Paddy Woodgate, and while I have questioned

Jason Foley at full back in the past, he made a great hand of Daniel Flynn.

David Clifford was quiet overall, but scored one of those points that only he can. 1-6 to 0-4. Kerry weren't playing to their full potential (I suspect that they are in the middle of heavy training for the summer) but they were well in control of the scoreboard. In fairness, Jimmy Hyland was the best player on the pitch, and he picked off two more points (one free after being fouled himself) to put a goal between them.

David should really have passed to Dara Moynihan instead of kicking it wide himself, but made amends by kicking another spectacular point. By then, though, Gavin White was off injured, stumbling awkwardly after being fouled at full pace (no malice or intent). There is no doubt in my mind but that Kerry would have won comfortably if the talismanic speedster had stayed on.

A Kildare defender tipped the ball toward his own goal, but the keeper gathered comfortably, and a snapshot by David wasn't far wide. Kerry hadn't played great by any means, but could be reasonably contented trooping in at the break. Half-time Kerry 1-7 Kildare 0-6

I'd give Kerry a hesitant 7 out of 10 for their first half display. Second half? Maybe 5. There was a wind against us, but not a strong one. We just didn't hunt it enough, and I didn't see any Kerry player really look to take the game by the scruff of the neck.

Again, it would be very easy to get carried away with the criticism. The fact is that I'd take a game like this several times over before another facile McGrath Cup win. Kildare asked questions that we need to answer, no harm finding out now. Jack Savage came on at half-time and looked lively. Paul Geaney, quieter than he had been in recent games, albeit with a very limited supply, put Kerry five points clear.

Then it all started to go wrong. Paddy Woodgate, a newcomer who has really impressed me, kicked a good point. Kildare always had good footballers but limited scorers – God be with the days when John Doyle would kick 90% of their scores from play. Now they have a trio of shooters up front in Woodgate, Flynn, and Hyland – I think any notion that they will be the

whipping boy of Division One are way off the mark. With Kildare pressure forcing turnovers, Kevin Flynn coolly kicked his second point of the match.

Scores were hard to come by at this stage, especially for Kerry. To be honest, we were badly lacking in a bit of finesse in the face of Kildare pressure (they were very fit), but again, it's early days. It'll come. Paudie Cliiford kicked his second score, but Paul Cribben replied with another long distance monster. Tony Brosnan managed to wriggle his way through and pick off a great point under pressure. Kerry four points to the good, and ten minutes to play. I repeat, a top team shouldn't be coughing up that lead, especially not in points.

I got a definite sense of retreat from Kerry at that stage, attempts to hold onto that lead rather than extend it. With ten minutes plus injury time to go, going on the back foot is always a mistake, and so it proved. Woodgate kicked two points in succession (1f). In the end it was the Jimmy Hyland show, with two more points to level matters, and Kildare fully deserved it.

Not the best of openings for Kerry, but I saw flashes of real potential. Of course, Dublin in Austin Stack Park is a game that will tell a lot, and probably define the League for one side or the other.

KERRY APPOINT PERFORMANCE COACH

Performance coaches and sports analysts are a relatively new phenomenon in GAA – Liam Griffin's Wexford in 1995 were the first team I heard of with one. Caroline Currid has since gone on to help Limerick, Tipperary, Tyrone, and Dublin, all of whom have high praise for the former Sligo footballer.

Players spend hours and hours training the body to win games, but the mental aspect is just as important, and it's now recognised by almost every professional sportsperson on the planet. In that context, then, Kerry bringing former Clare hurler Tony Griffin, who previously worked with Jack O'Connor in Kildare, is a real coup.

AROUND THE GROUNDS

Obviously it was a happy outing for Paul Galvin with Kildare; they will be delighted with their start. It was even better for Kieran Donaghy with Armagh. They absolutely put Dublin to the sword in Croke Park, their first win there in five years and first win over Dublin there in a decade. Early goals from Rian O'Neill (the best player I saw over the weekend) and Jason Duffy (a beautiful lob of Evan Comerford) put them in the driving seat and they never gave Dublin a sniff. Dublin had a lot of established stars on view, but Armagh out-thought and out-fought them. Dessie Farrell is under real pressure heading to Tralee next weekend.

Pat Spillane came off the bench for the last ten minutes of Sligo's game with Wexford and played a crucial role as they managed to win it at the death. An interesting one is Sean O'Cionnell from Cordal, who has been quietly on the Kerry radar in recent time after starring at minor and U20, lining out at centre back for Tipperary

Good week for Donie Buckley as well, whose Monaghan side earned a draw with All Ireland champions Tyrone. I didn't get to see it, but it sounds like Monaghan were unlucky (or rather, inaccurate) in not winning. That said, 0-9 apiece is poor scoring, and goalkeeper Rory Beggan with 0-3 was Monaghan's top scorer, including one from play. Goalkeepers coming out seems to be a feature of modern football, and not one that I approve of.

U20 AND MINOR MUNSTER DRAWS

In the U20 Munster football Championship, Kerry have abye into the semi-final and will be away to the winners of the quarter-final between Clare or Tipperary. Given our recent minor record, Kerry will be favourites for that game and it is likely to suit Declan O'Sullivan's team much more than a winner-take-all meeting with Cork in our first game, as happened last year, with Kerry losing by a point.

It's the same story in the Minor. Last year, because of covid, it was a straight knockout competition, and again we lost to Cork by a single, solitary point. This year it's much more convoluted, but gives an minimum of two games. Tipperary, Clare, Waterford, play off in one group. Kerry, Cork, and Limerick play off in the other, with Kerry opening at home to Cork and then away to Limerick. The winners of the group go straight to a semi-final, while 2nd and 3rd place in each group will play off in quarter-finals.

PROPOSED CHANGE TO U19

Those games may well be among the last of the U20 and U17 age groups, with a motion going to Congress to have one underage grade at U19. Change is certainly necessary – the U17 grade in particular has been a disaster with predictions that it would lead to a big increase in dropout at 18 and 19 (most such players aren't making their club senior team and have no meaningful games) being borne out. Accordingly, it is proposed to have just one grade at U19.

I've been asking ever since they made that initial change, and I'll plaintively ask again. What was wrong with the old U21 and U18 age groups, especially since the increase of transition year in secondary schools means that most U18s are in fifth year? It wasn't broken; they only did damage by this attempted fix.

I don't want to go too much into it, but the decision to play the Munster clash between Kerry and Cork at Pairc Uí Rinn because of an Ed Sheeran concert in Pairc Uí Caiomh is patently ridiculous. Moving their hurling clash with Clare to Semple Stadium is bad enough, but at least that's a decent venue. Pairc Uí Rinn simply isn't. Common sense genuinely dictates that the game should go to Killarney, and that's not me wearing any local pride jersey. It's blindingly obvious – Pairc Uí Rinn will do well to hold 17,000 people at best.

There will be a series of Cups to compete for over the series of matches along with gold medals for the winning team & silver for the runner up team in each match.
















What documents will I need to bring?

If either of you is not an Irish citizen, you may be asked to provide a Letter or Certificate of Freedom to Marry or other documentary confirmation of your

civil status from your country of origin You will also have to provide information about the intended marriage,

- Details of the proposed solemniser of the marriage
 The names and dates of birth of the two proposed witnesses
- A PPS number is required for all parties serving notice of intention to marry, who have or will have a current or a future address within the State You will need to download and complete the Data Capture Form, which

Is there a charge?

You will have to pay a notification fee. The non-refundable notification fee is €200. There is a reduced notification fee of €50 for same-sex couples who

What happens at the marriage notification appointment?

When you and your intended spouse meet the Registrar at the Civil Registration Service office, you will be required to sign, in the Registrar's presence, a declaration that you are free to marry and know of no lawful impediment to your proposed marriage.

The Registrar will issue an acknowledgement to both of you and the

proposed solemniser of the marriage confirming the date of receipt of notification. This does not give you permission to marry. You will also have

to pay the notification fee of €200.

If all the information required has been supplied and there is no impediment to the marriage, the Registrar will issue you with a Marriage Registration Form. This is an important document. You will need this to get married and

If you, your intended spouse, the witnesses or the solemniser has a limited knowledge of English, you must provide an interpreter. The interpreter must

What is the Marriage Notification Form?

Couples require a Marriage Registration Form (MRF) to get married in Ireland. It is like a marriage licence as it gives authorisation for a couple to marry. will give you an MRF. You must then give the MRF to the person who will be solemnising your marriage. The MRF is also needed to register your marriage after you get married. If you bring all the required documentation to your marriage notification appointment with the Registrar, the Registrar

If the marriage does not take place within 6 months of the date of marriage given on the MRF, a new MRF will be required if you still intend to marry. You

FOCUS ON EARLY SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS

Now is a good time if you are planning a new garden or trying to add some colour to an established garden to plant some early flowering spring shrubs. One of the best known shrubs is the Camellia and these popular shrubs are starting to flower in most places at the moment. The Camellia is a very



aluable shrub in the garden as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green leaves and showy blooms from early spring. A lot of people think that Camellias are a difficult shrub to grow, but in fact they are no more difficult than Rhododendrons or azaleas, and most varieties on sale now are

hardy. When choosing the spot to plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix plenty of moss peat with the earth, rather than on its own around the plant, as it will tend to root out quicker. Camellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Camellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Camellias only to prune out old dead wood, clean up the old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of the plants every spring with some moss peat. There are a lot of other good spring flowering shrubs, here is a list of just a few: Forsythia, Cythisus, Corylus, Berberis, Darwunnii, Ribes and skimmia

COMMON PHONE CHARGER A STEP CLOSER

Charger clutter could soon be a thing of the past, with the news that the European Council has backed proposals for a common standard. The new law aims to ensure all smartphones, tablets and similar devices, recharged by a wired cable, use a USB Type-C port, regardless of brand and make.

The Council have also proposed an image to show if a charger is offered with a device, and a label to indicate charging specifications. Welcoming the news Ireland South MEP Deirdre Clune says "the delivery of a common phone charger will be more convenient, save money for consumers and reduce electronic waste.

These proposals will significantly reduce the number of chargers in homes and could save €250 million a year on unnecessary charger purchases.

Electrical and electronic equipment continues to be one of the fastest growing waste streams in the EU. Figures suggest that reducing production and disposal of new chargers could reduce electronic waste by thousands of tonnes a year.

The proposal is currently being considered by the European Parliament where I expect it will get approval in the coming months."
