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



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Community Grieves Loss of Beloved Izzy in Tragic Equestrian Accident

There was a palpable sense of shock and disbelief when news broke on Thursday of last week that Isabelle (Izzy) O'Callaghan, a beautiful and talented young woman, had tragically lost her life in an equestrian accident at her family home in Rockfield, along the Tralee Road.

The much-loved daughter of Deirdre and Eamonn O'Callaghan, and cherished sister to James, Izzy was laid to rest on Monday, June 30th, at Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery. Her sudden passing has left her family, friends, and the wider community heartbroken.

Thousands paid their respects to Izzy's family on Sunday evening at O'Shea's Funeral Home, and again on Monday at her Requiem Mass, a powerful reflection of the love and esteem in which she and her family are held.

Speaking at her funeral, local priest Fr Kieran O'Brien described a community "numb with tragedy." He describing her untimely passing as "so unexpected and so cruel." The tragic accident occurred after she had spent the morning making hay bales with her beloved granda Jimmy.

Fr O'Brien spoke about the deep sorrow now felt by the family, marking yet another devastating loss following the death of her cousin baby Bill, eight years ago.

"She loved her horses," he said during the mass. "It's like the phrase, she would sleep, breathe and eat with them. They were her life. It was her vocation."

"From early morning to late at night, she attended

Izzy's passion for equestrian competition took her across the country and her devoted parents were by her side, supporting her every step of the way. "They were passionate, they were supportive, and they were also driven for the sake of their children". In an emotionally charged eulogy, Izzy's best friend Leah Clarke spoke of the deep bond that the girls had.

"I met Izzy through the world of horses and our friendship sparked the way a lot of people can relate to - the shared passion we had for our sport," Leah said.

"Our friendship was full of love, laughter, adventure and unforgettable memories that I will cherish forever, such as galloping down Inch Beach at full speed and uncontrollably laughing when we realised we couldn't stop the horses, making fun of each other when we were covered head to toe in mud after a long day of hunting, or stuffing our faces with chicken goujons at your kitchen table." Leah said that she was absolutely thrilled when Izzy was honoured at the Showjumping Ireland Awards in February.

"I was so proud of you when you were on the big stage receiving your award. I was even prouder to call you my best friend," she said.

Though Leah made the move to Ennis in Co. Clare to work, she and Izzy were still great friends and in constant touch despite not living close to each

Izzy was a Fifth Year student at St. Brigid's and was remembered with immense affection by her school principal, Ms. Roisin Moore. "It was with great shock and heartbreak that we learned of Izzy's sudden and devastating passing," she said. "Izzy was a quietly confident young woman, a diligent student, and someone who, when the moment called for it, spoke with conviction and clarity. She carried herself with a beautiful elegance that was both natural and unassuming." Her passion for horses was a defining part of her life. "Her face lit up when she spoke about them," Ms. Moore said. "When Agricultural Science wasn't offered at St. Brigid's, Izzy didn't let that stop her, she pursued her studies in Ag Science at St. Brendan's College with her usual determination." During Transition Year, Izzy showed her characteristic courage and ambition by arranging a placement with the Equine Unit of the Irish Army,



an experience that would have daunted many. But not Izzy. She took it on with enthusiasm and flair. "She was exceptionally kind and gentle, and deeply loved by her peers," said Ms. Moore. "Her quick wit, great sense of humour, and her fabulous, wide, and warm smile will remain a cherished memory for all of us in the St. Brigid's community."

The South West Harriers Hunt Club, of which Izzy was a proud member, also paid tribute, saying that Izzy was an inspirational young lady who adored the hunting field. She was an outstanding member of the club and was awarded the Junior Female Hunter of the Year in 2023.

We are forever grateful for her support, spirit, and friendship.

Izzy was beautiful inside and out, and she will be forever missed by all in our club."

The club honoured Izzy with a moving guard of honour at her funeral.

As the community continues to come to terms with this immense loss, thoughts and prayers remain with Izzy's family, friends, classmates, and all who knew and loved her.

PROJECT TO DETER DEER NOT ALTOGETHER FOR THE BIRDS

Someone must have been listening to Danny Healy-Rae a decade back when he sought to put up a deer crossing in Kilgarvan.

So many deer were crossing at the same location alongside the dancehall, a deer crossing alongside the zebra was needed, Danny told the council. Needless to say, the chamber fell around laughing.

"Every morning when I go out, I see them crossing the road at that spot," he said. "It is time we got a deer crossing alongside a zebra crossing for the deer in Kilgarvan," I reported in the Irish Examiner.

Not a week went by there wasn't an accident, Danny said. And the date of those remarks? June 2015.

June 2025 has just passed and little has changed. Except there are many more deer and more accidents.

Anyone who has read The Last of the Mohicans will know that once deer paths are established they are used by generations. A tenth generation of deer are now crossing near the dancehall in Kilgarvan.

New deer paths are being created now all over the district even as far as Kilcummin and signage for deer crossings is needed, Councillor Marie Moloney has said.

In despair of the National Parks and Wildlife Service erecting fencing near roads, or carrying out a sensible cull, new technology is to be tried by the council.

Two sets of technology are being harnessed, director of roads Frank Hartnett outlined in a reply to Councillor John O'Donoghue, who said he was "sick" of raising the issue.

Both are being deployed in Ballydowney - the

scene of two suspected fatalities involving deer and several collisions.

One of the "pilot" projects" is used in airports to scare birds.

The second pilot, a detect and alert scheme in use in Austria, is nearer Danny's original idea. Appropriately it is to be rolled out on the R569 Kilgarvan road. "It detects deer, it detects vehicles," we were told last Friday

When both vehicles and deer were detected a noise deterring deer was emitted; when there was no car passing the deer could continue to cross the road.

Et voilà: If Danny ever decides to give up the politics, there is a career for him in invention.

A MORE SCEPTICAL COUNCIL EMERGES SAYING THIS FAR AND NO FURTHER

I detect a change of approach in our councillors in Killarney. They say we learn more from when

we slip up than when we succeed. If we glide through life we miss out on key learning experiences.

On that note Brendan Cronin said he had never been so "burnt" by a decision as the Fossa straight. The whole saga had been a real tough learning curve. He had "serious regrets" the road was only 3 meters. The councillors were given assurances by management and when the second path was being constructed they appealed for changes, but got nowhere.

"We haven't been listened to," Brendan said.

Maura Healy-Rae said councillors needed to be better informed before they made a decision and so they could answer basic questions for the public.

"We are being slaughtered on social media as councillors," Marie Moloney said in reference to the Áras theatre primary care centre project.

Some people supported that whole project but were less vocal than those opposed, Marie also said. Nearly everyone on social media said the site was "gifted" from the friars, she said. Marie got clarification that the site was indeed bought not gifted and it was bought at market price by the council.

The upshot of the new approach by councillors is the HSE estates manager - the unit that deals with the HSE's extensive property portfolio must meet with councillors before they vote on the matter on July 25th or they won't vote They also want council management to make a statement saying whose decision it was to primary care centre was necessary.

Brendan Cronin said the failure to give detail and accuracy of information was "just like the Fossa road" and the councillors were the targets.

The HSE were mistaken if they thought the councillors would now simply rubber stamp the Aras Phadraig project, was the consensus.

HOTTING UP

Can Killarney expect shoals of tourists fleeing the heat? Indications are holiday makers will flee the Mediterranean in June, July and August, so intense is the summer heat.

Ireland will be a slow burner, pardon the pun, when it comes to benefiting from changing holiday patterns, is my thinking. This is because while a little cool is ok, people have to completely relearn holiday expectations to view grey skies and rain as any kind of holiday escape.

But there are hot issues to be faced, even for us with climate change. One of the big issues for heat - 40 degree heat will kill you - is concrete. Temperatures in urban environments will far exceed those in the countryside or at the seaside because of the density of buildings.

The way we build and where we build is an issue no-one seems to be addressing. We need to climate proof planning.

New homes and offices use far too much glass.

Accepted modern planning policy even in Killarney would like to herd us all into small urban spaces with tiny or no gardens. Councillors in Killarney on Friday asked that infill sites in housing estates be identified and built on to ease the housing crises. But cramming houses into each other in urban areas is not a bright idea in a hotting climate.

The concrete and asphalt absorb and re-emit the sun's radiation making cities like London or Paris unbearable.

Killarney isn't London- yet. But the dense way it is going with house building, it is heading in the same direction.

Then there is the complete lack of urban trees now in Killarney. Big trees have been taken down in Deer Park in New Road and now in Lewis Road. This is a travesty. Trees give shade and take decades to grow. Our car parks need more trees for shade. Pedestrians on roads badly need shade. You can walk from Killarney town centre now to Woodlawn Cross and all the way to Ballycasheen along a growing density of houses and there's very little shade. You have the same along the cycleways in Rock road. More green spaces between houses, smaller windows and more trees must be put on the agenda in a changing planet. No car park should be allowed to exist without shade. And certainly no footpath. Tree planting schemes for Killarney?

Chambereventtoldthateverything Ireland touches is turning to cash

The notion that there is a widespread cost of living crisis in Ireland is not true, apart from a small percentage of people who are suffering, a leading economist has told Killarney's business community.

Danny McCoy, chief executive of the Irish Business and Employers Confederation, said there is a need to take a look at the world as it is and not what people imagine it to be.

"There are people suffering in our society but what proportion of them we can only speculate on," he said.

"It's certainly not 50 per cent and I don't believe it to be 20 per cent but I'm willing to leave it at 20 per cent which means 80 per cent don't have a problem," he told a Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce members' lunch.

Mr McCoy said, despite the fact that the other 80 per cent are not impacted, there are still blanket calls for energy credits for everybody. "It's not even sophisticated enough to limit it to every household. People without an ESB metre are receiving that money as well as people with second homes. The actual disproportionate nature and equality of it continues," he remarked.

The IBEC chief told the gathering in the Great Southern Hotel that, the previous night, Irish householders had €160 billion on deposit in the Irish banking system.

"That's cash – that's not their wealth. That's their readies. There is no heavy debt," he said. Mr McCoy said financial institutions are frustrated trying to lend money and he described the current credit union and banking system as being like a library where people now come to bring books and not take them out.

"This is the reality in Ireland. We have seen a surge in our population which is great news, we are a rich society which is great news but what we are doing with the money is that we're blowing it on conspicuous consumption right against the point where we are seeing this need for infrastructure in its widest sense," he remarked. The leading economist, who spearheads the country's largest business representative organisation and lobbying group, told the gathering of over 80 business leaders that it's now very difficult to actually identify a region globally that hasn't employment rates near record levels.

That, however, also has implications for attracting talent which is very critical to the

While a lot of the problems locally sound and feel the same in terms of higher business costs, competitiveness pressures, trying to get staff and public infrastructure delivery, it has to be set against a very unique decade for Ireland and one that is talked about a lot but is actually misunderstood, he maintained.

"The reality since 2014 is that Ireland the economy has grown by 150 per cent, the economy doubled with a 100 per cent increase at the edge of Covid and since Covid, it has grown by another 50 per cent.

"There is no society, economy or population globally that has experienced that," he said.

In terms of generating corporate tax revenue, Mr McCoy added: "Like the parable of Midas – everything that Ireland touches is turning to cash".

He said the wonderful situation that Killarney recently witnessed with citizenship ceremonies and new people wanting to come to the country was in direct contrast to the generations of Irish that had to emigrate.

"We now have 2.8 million people at work in the economy, with relatively high wages versus other jurisdictions but one of the key features is the imbalance between the public and private sectors," he said.

He recalled that in 2005/2006, public sector workers numbered about 400,000 in a workforce of about 1.8 million. The public sector numbers dropped during the great financial crash but it has now come back up to about 400,000 again – the same level as 20 years ago.

"In contrast, there is a million extra people in our labour force. So there's now about one million extra private sector workers and the same amount of public servant workers as 20 years ago," he observed.

The IBE chief said the problem is as society gets wealthier, people expect to have better public services, more medical staff, more educationists, more security on the streets, more planners to get quick, decisive decisions and more regulators to make sure that things are done properly.

"It's not that the government doesn't want to hire more but it finds itself ineffectual in the market. The private sector, at this time, has the resources and is able to outbid the government, notwithstanding the fact that the government has such a large surplus relative to its peers.

"In the labour market, the government finds itself increasingly outbid by the private sector taking planners, regulators and people from public service duties," he said.

Mr McCoy pointed out that he pursued a career as an economist but he comes from a family of plumbers in Tuam, Co Galway and if he too had opted to become a plumber, he would now be a wealthy man: "Tradespeople have been rich and well off in Ireland for the last 25 years, in my experience," he said.





HSE South West confirms €2.3 million investment in cancer services

This funding will support eight new projects and create 16.5 new healthcare jobs, including nurses, doctors and oncology support staff.

The new posts include:

·Specialist nursing support for patients in the rapid access lung service

·A new family breast cancer pathway, which will aid in early detection

·A new post for a regional team supporting adolescents and young adults with cancer



Recruitment of a new patient support worker for breast cancer patients

Recruitment of a senior occupational therapist and speech and language therapist, to support an increased number of patients and families.

This investment will bring tangible improvements to cancer services, with additional staff for early cancer diagnosis clinics and extra supports for families at risk

of cancer. Additional new services will also be developed, such as the provision of special care for teenagers and young adults with cancer, and the development of personalised cancer treatment expertise. These new services will support people after their treatment ends and some of the funding will go toward the acute oncology service, helping cancer patients avoid the emergency departments. Most of these new staff will be based at Cork University Hospital, with some roles located at Mercy University Hospital and University Hospital Kerry. Recruitment for these new oncology staff members is progressing.

An accomplished theatre actress for roles in ELECTRA, AS YOU LIKE IT, and more, some of her awards include the Laurence Olivier Theatre Award for Best Actress in 1990 and 1994, a CBE for Services to Drama in 2001 and a 2002 Tony nomination for her role in the Broadway production of MEDEA. She made her feature film debut in Jim Sheridan's MY LEFT FOOT (1989), and select titles in her prosperous screen career include the HARRY POTTER series (2001-2010), THE BUTCHER BOY (1997), THE TREE OF LIFE (2011), AMMONITE (2020) and most recently HOT MILK (2025) and PARK AVENUE (2025). 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Familiar Face is the new Postmaster in Dingle



A post office in one of Kerry's busiest tourist towns has been saved from the threat of closure by the appointment of a new postmaster.

The contract to run Dingle Post Office has been awarded to Niall Kelleher, a native of Rathmore and now living in Killarney, who already operates a busy post office business at Fair Hill, Killarney.

He takes up the Dingle role from July 1st and the PO is based at Fitzgerald's HomeValue Store on Main Street. The previous operator, Eileen Fitzgerald, had tendered her resignation to An Post and the contract was advertised on two occasions before An Post approached Mr Kelleher. The previous occupant agreed with An Post to a short transition period to facilitate the successful applicant with the existing premises should they wish to avail of same.

Niall Kelleher comes from a family that is steeped in the business of running a post office as his mother, Julie, has been the postmistress in both Rathmore and Millstreet since 2015. He opened the post office branch at Fair Hill, Killarney in March 2023 and it has been a

big hit with customers, offering a very important and accessible service to a huge population on the eastern side of Killarney. The new Dingle Postmaster, who has been a member of Kerry County Council since 2014, said the post office has a vital role to play, particularly in rural communities.

"It is a significant responsibility to operate a post office but, very often, it is one of the last commercial lights remaining switched on in many communities," he said.

"Dingle is a thriving, attractive place where the population multiplies dramatically in the summer months and a town of its stature and importance most certainly deserves its own post office," he added.

The post office, which will open Monday to Friday from 9.00am to 5.30pm and from 9.00am to 1.00pm on Saturdays, has been located at the rear of Fitzgerald's HomeValue Store since 2007.

It is understood that the post office is likely to move to a new location in a number of months.


The trio is riding to raise awareness for organ donation and funds for the Irish Kidney Association (IKA). John Paul, originally from Kiskeam, received a kidney from Barry in 2018 and a pancreas transplant in 2020 after years of living with Type 1 diabetes. Barry, a nurse based in England, was a perfect match and made the selfless donation following months of testing at Beaumont Hospital.

This will be the first time the brothers cycle the 170km route together. Edel, a healthcare assistant at University Hospital Kerry, completed the event last year. They'll be joined by friends and family, including John Paul's brother-in-law and school friends from Ireland and abroad.

At the heart of the legendary Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle is the Irish Kidney Association (IKA), the grassroots charity that founded the event 43 years ago. In the early years of the iconic cycle, the IKA played a pivotal role in staging the event but also in raising crucial awareness and funds for kidney patients in Kerry. 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Irish Sprinting Gets High-Tech Boost Ahead of 2028 Olympics

A new collaboration between academia and industry could give Irish sprinters a competitive edge at the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Elite athletes, including Killarney sprinter Sarah Leahy, are taking part in a groundbreaking study at Lero, the software research centre based at the University of Limerick. In partnership with Irish sports analytics firm DANU, researchers are investigating the impact of super spike sprint shoes using cutting-edge wearable smart sock technology.

The project, led by Lero and the University's Sport and Human Performance Research Centre, aims to analyse real-world data to assess how super spikes affect sprint biomechanics, from speed and ground contact time to muscle activation and ankle movement.

"Gaining a fraction of a second could mean the difference between finishing off the podium and winning a medal," said Professor lan Kenny, who raised questions about whether athletes choose super spikes for performance or sponsorship reasons.

Shane Hassett of Lero highlighted that the research will compare biomechanical changes

in gait when wearing super spikes versus traditional spikes, using athlete-specific data.

DANU CEO Oisín Lennon praised the collaboration, noting UL's early support in validating their technology. "It's incredibly

rewarding to see our system now driving research that could reshape elite sprint performance," he said.

The research team is continuing to recruit top Irish sprinters as part of the ongoing study.

I am pleasantly surprised to see in the reply that there are currently only 3 houses in Killarney vacant for longer than a year and that the Council plan to dispose of these before long.

Based in Camp, New Wave Wild Adventure Therapy will use the funding to expand nature-based therapeutic programmes for


marginalised youth. The initiative blends outdoor experiences with psychotherapy to improve mental wellbeing.

"Supporters need viable travel options, and we're committed to making that happen. We're flat out working behind the scenes."

The Cahills are calling on fans to "make their voices heard again" by showing continued interest and pressure for more transport options, ensuring Kerry supporters can bring their pride, passion, and power to Croke Park on July 12th.

REDUCE STUDENT FEES



WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

Swimmers who have qualified for Irish Summer National Championships in July continue to train 6 days per week alongside Kingdom Swimming Club in Tralee.





SPF(Sun Protection Factor) is essential to prevent your skin aging and skin cancers. You should look for a "Broad Spectrum" Sunscreen to protect against UVA - Aging rays and UVB - Burning rays and protection from HEV – High Energy Visible light. This is blue light emitted from sun, screens, laptops and phones.

A higher factor like SPF 50 will give you more protection against sunburn but not unless you reapply it every 2 hours while in the sun.

Factors 15 - 50 offer similar protection against UVA rays and DNA destruction which is the most important. Spf50 blocks out 98% of UVB rays while spf30 blocks out 97% and spf15 blocks 93%.



Apply your sunscreen 20 minutes before going in the sun and reapply every 2 hours after for full protection. Remember to use water resistant sunscreen if you are in water or sweating from exercise.

Do not just rely on your SPF wear a wide brimmed hat and sunglasses with UV protection. Clothing with built in sun protection is great with sunscreen especially for children.

The retina needs a constant supply of blood. It receives this through a network of tiny blood vessels. Over time, a high blood sugar level can damage these blood vessels in 3 main stages:

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WHAT PLANS ARE THERE FOR THE DISTRICT?

Deputy Danny Healy Rae Raises issue in Dail Eireann



Deputy Danny Healy Rae has raised the option of the District Hospital in Killarney being used for respite when the new hospital opens in the town and if not, what are the plans for the building?

Speaking to Killarney Outlook, Deputy Healy Rae said "The HSE responded to the question and I am disappointed that no clarity was provided on further respite services which is simply not good enough with the demand there is for respite".

The HSE replied that The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. Construction of the new Community Nursing Unit in Killarney is substantially completed but we await a final completion date from the PPP Company and HSE National Estates. Based on the information available to the Older Persons Service Management Team from our Estates colleagues it is estimated that the completion date is likely to be during Q3 2025.

The timeline for when the building is expected to become operational is dependent on handover of the new building by the PPP Company and subsequent registration by management at the unit. Registration cannot be applied for until full handover of the completed building has taken place. We anticipate that the time frame from submission of the application to inspection byHIQA will be approximately six weeks.

Once the building is officially registered, we will be in a position to move from St. Columbanus to the new building and it is envisaged that there will be a phased transfer of residents from St. Columbanus and Killarney Community Hospital into the new facility. Transfer of services to the new unit will take place as soon as possible following completion of the operational phases outlined above.

The new Minor Injury Unit which is planned for the Kerry area will be located in the grounds of the St Columbanus Home / Killarney Community Hospital campus. The space requirements and needs of the services in the Kerry area are currently being reviewed by HSE Estates in conjunction with service management and Public Health. We await the outcome of this review and it will inform any decision on the future use of the remaining available space on the Killarney Community Hospital / St. Columbanus campus.

Councillor Cahill Leads push for Tidal Swimming Pools Along Kerry Coastline



Fianna Fáil Councillor Tommy Cahill, the youngest member of Kerry County Council and representative of the Kenmare Municipal District, has welcomed the commitment from Kerry County Council to explore the feasibility of tidal swimming pools at suitable sites along the Kerry coastline.

At the May meeting of Kerry County Council, Cllr. Cahill tabled a motion requesting that the Council "explore the feasibility of providing tidal swimming pools along the Kerry coastline." In response, the Council confirmed that while a feasibility study for the entire coastline is not viable, it is open to undertaking targeted feasibility studies where appropriate sites and funding streams are identified.

"I'm absolutely delighted with the Council's response and willingness to move forward on this," said Cllr. Cahill. "This is a significant step in the right direction for public health, tourism, and community life along our coast. I want to thank James Nolan, Director of Services

for Planning, Environment, and emergency management in Kerry County Council for his engagement on this matter and for confirming that they will explore the feasibility of tidal swimming pools at some seaside locations".

Tidal swimming pools, man-made sea-fed pools built into the coastline, offer a safe and sheltered environment for swimmers of all ages and abilities, particularly when open sea conditions are too rough. With sea swimming experiencing a surge in popularity year-round, Cllr. Cahill believes such infrastructure could have lasting benefits for both locals and visitors. Cllr. Cahill has identified a number of logical and promising locations across Kerry for potential development, including:

Rossbeigh, Cromane, Kenmare Bay, Fenit, Derrynane, Ventry, Waterville, Kells, White Strand, O'Carroll's Cove, Inch, Ballinskelligs, Coumeenoole Beach, Ballybunion, and Cuas Crom amongst others.

He also pointed to the successful example in Belmullet, Co. Mayo, where a tidal pool has become a much-loved feature of the community and a draw for visitors, and highlighted the international popularity of such pools in places like Australia.

5,848 PEOPLE CAUGHT NOT WEARING THEIR SEAT BELT WHILST DRIVING IN 2024

72% increase in Kerry in people caught not wearing seatbelts

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú, a member of the EU Transport Committee, has called for a get tough approach on two of the leading factors in road deaths in Ireland, non-wearing of seat belts and use of mobile phones whilst driving.

Astonishing figures provided by Gardaí show that almost 6,000 motorists were caught and fined in 2024 for not wearing a seat belt whilst driving. Ní Mhurchú has described the figures as truly shocking that some people continue to take unnecessary risks on

According to Ní Mhurchú, "On the 1st of February, 1979, Ireland introduced legislation that made the wearing of seat belts mandatory for front seat passengers and drivers. 46 years later, and almost 6,000 Irish people are caught not wearing a seat belt. There is no excuse. I do not understand why someone would not buckle up."

ST. FINAN'S HOSPITAL

At the recent Kerry County Council Killarney Municipal Meeting, Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised the following issue.

Given that the Office of The Planning Regulator details the obligations falling upon the owners of Protected Structures to maintain their building, and detail that harm must not be deliberately caused to the protected building including harm caused through neglect, that we would write to the HSE and ask them to detail any works carried out to maintain St Finan's since

Any private owner of a property which is a protected structure would be required to spend money maintaining their property or face fines, yet here we have at the top of our town probably the most famous vacant building in the country at this stage. To my uneducated eye, it appears to be completely abandoned and left fall into a state of disrepair and as far as I am concerned the State and the HSE cannot have it both ways. If it is a protected structure, they are legally obliged to maintain it, otherwise they need to dispose of it and allow it to be developed for other uses. A private individual would not be allowed to behave in this manner and our State bodies need to be held to the same level of accountability. In recent days I believe workmen have been in there which is suspicious timing as my NOM would have been public knowledge with the last week or so. I look forward to the reply from the HSE as this farcical saga continues!

Welcome changes to carer's allowance will benefit almost 200 Families in Kerry

for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed changes to carer's allowance which will benefit almost 200 families in

From Thursday, July 3rd, Minister for Social Protection Dara Calleary will increase the amount of income that people can earn without affecting their right to qualify for the means-tested Carer's Allowance payment.

The income disregard will rise from €450 per week to €625 per week for single carers, and from €900 per week to €1,250 per week for carers with a spouse or partner.

New figures show that the changes will immediately benefit 196 family carers



in Kerry who are currently receiving the carer's allowance and will receive higher payments due to the increase in the income disregards.

This reform will also extend eligibility for the Carer's Allowance to more people in Kerry than ever before, once the new rules come into effect on Thursday, July 3rd.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL VACANT PROPERTIES

Kerry County Council (KCC) has confirmed that it is currently reviewing documentation for the proposed disposal of 30 properties in its portfolio, in reply to a query raised by Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill. The Rossbeigh Deputy was questioning if there were properties that might be brought in to use for housing purposes, following renovation.

"Kerry County Council confirmed to me that these properties include;

12 properties have not been in use for a period of 5 years or less

8 properties have not been in use for a period of more than 5 years but less than 10

10 properties have not been in use for a period of more than 10 years


They also confirmed that there are complex issues relating to each of these properties which make them unsuitable for refurbishment and return back into social housing stock" stated Deputy Cahill.


"30 properties is a significant number of units to be removed from possible re-use and I wonder if all possibilities have been considered. If they are not suitable for refurbishment, should they be levelled and rebuilt? Are they to be sold as agricultural land?" asks Deputy Cahill.


"Some of these (10) are out of use for more than 10 years, which seems to be an inordinate time without any action taken. We need to deal with prospective housing units with a great deal of urgency or move them on quickly if they are not suitable for purpose" said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People and on Tourism.

"I will be making further enquiries in conjunction with my son Cllr Tommy Cahill, about these properties, to see if there may be an alternative solution and a possibility of returning any of them to Housing Stock" added Michael Cahill TD.







ALL IRELAND QUARTER FINALS

Kerry's All Ireland campaign this year has taken a fairly meandering path, to say the least, with more than a few twists in the tale. We impressed in patches during a topsy-turvy National League, most notably coughing up a 12 point advantage to Dublin on our own ground. Just when it looked like we were slipping away from the pack leaders, they seemed to start concentrating more on their looming provincial championships than the league. The last thing they wanted was an energy-sapping National League Final; I still feel that it kind of fell our way a bit by default.

Then came the Munster campaign. It's not exactly the minefield that is Ulster, is it? I myself think that's why you had four Ulster teams in the last eight. I expected no great shakes out of Munster again. Cork hadn't exactly rattled the cages in Division Two. It's easy to forget, you see. They rise, they would always rise to Kerry, and both sides are better of for it. Our first encounter was definitely one of the games of the year, and the Munster Final itself not far off it. Mind you, Leinster has been an easier cakewalk for almost twenty years, but this year....ah, yes, no schadenfreude, please.

Group stage. Roscommon handled very comfortably, to be truthful. We were coming along a soft road. Didn't mean that we were bad, just untested. Meath in our second game was surely going to be no more than a bump on the road. I felt that they had caught Dublin on a bad day.

If so, they caught us on an even worse one. Outplayed, outthought, outfought. A bad, bad day. Defeat is one thing. Defeat like this?Definiyely holed, and quite possibly, probably even, below the waterline. We beat Cavan fairly comfortably the weekend after to secure a quarter-final berth. More energy spent, more attrition, on a team that looked fairly cooked already. And then the draw. Armagh. The team that blew us away last year and have looked the strongest panel this year. Yes, lost to Donegal in the Ulster Final, but that was basically a rivetting coin toss. Armagh missing a few key players, Kerry more than decimated. I can't see it happening.

DUBLIN V TYRONE: Dublin have been dark horses for me. You could say that their story is similar to ours, losing the Delaney Cup in a bad defeat to Meath raising all the questions. But I felt that Dublin were holding a little bit back and, of course, their ongoing theme is the will he/won't he of Con O'Callaghan. I fancied Dublin for this one. That's not disrespecting



Tyrone. They are definitely looking like the next team to dominate the All Ireland Championship, and not in any blanket defence manner either. What they have coming on stream....if they could all click together this year and the Canavans and McCurry unleas their firepower...but I expect Dublin to control a slower tempo and just pick them off.

GALWAY V MEATH: Galway have been knocking so hard on the door in the last couple of years and just barely falling short, that you could say that they 'deserve' an All Ireland. At full strength, they are enormously formidable. But it's been a long road, and they have been losing players to knocks and niggles at every step. Meath look almost like a force of nature this year. Blew both Dublin and Kerry aside with ease. And yet lost to Louth. No weaknesses and very well organised – Brennan should be in the running for Manager of the Year – but I wouldn't say that they have a marquee player either. I can see Galway winning this one....but this being the last game that they win.

DONEGAL V MONAGHAN: The fact that there are four Ulster teams in theAll Ireland quarter-finals tells you where the powerbank of gaelic football currently resides. Both teams know each other well. Monaghan can match anybody in scoring, but their concession rate is too high. Donegal, surely.

KERRY 0-30 ARMAGH 1-21

Great. Micheál Burns is a late withdrawal, apparently a tweak. There's a lot more hope than belief among the Kerry fans. Mind you, I have no problem with having Mark O'Shea start instead. Micheál has always been a forward, Mark has mostly played midfield. Breaking ball would be vital in the middle third.

Armagh with the first attack, wide. Kerry respond, nice bit of pace about it, Seán O'Shea kicks the opening point. Better again, Dylan

Casey rises to gather the long direct kickout. Dylan Casey winning a cleanly contested Armagh kick-out? Marker laid down. Kerry work it well and Seán O'Shea makes the two pointer look easy. In fairness, this is not the tentative Kerry that I had been expecting at all.

Armagh get off the mark. Oisin Conaty with a burst of pace. Worryingly, we got no hand on him at all. Armagh call up Ethan Rafferty for a two pointer free. He doesn't miss many of those – but he misses this one. Oisín Conaty notches his second point, though.

Good kick-out and fast kicking move by Kerry. Dylan across to Conor, great goal chance.....not a great effort, to be honest. Easily recovered. It worries me, underdogs need to nail every chance they get.

Good score by Brian Ó Beaglaoich. Tiernan Kelly with a goal chance for Armagh, but Shane Ryan makes a great save. David Clifford has an uncharacteristic wide at the other end. Seán O'Shea, of all people, gathers in the Kerry defence to scramble clear. Frenetic stuff now. Kerry's players around the middle are doing brilliant, contesting everything. I think Armagh expected us to try and go around midfield. Not a bit of it; Kerry are quite willing to go toe to toe and well able for it as well. I must admit, I had not expected this.

Gavin White. Heads up football, one look, straight between the posts. Armagh with a bad miss, and David Clifford punishes them with a point at the other end. Poor enough kick-out by Rafferty, Kerry grab possession, David fouled. Easy free for Seán O'Shea. 0-7 to 0-3.

Armagh are the ones trying to avoid long range missiles into midfield now, playing short kick-outs and working the wings. It was effective, too. Jarly Óg Burns kicked a really good two pointer. Rian O'Neill took a point – I felt that Rian was beginning to show for things and look dangerous. Mind you, Seán O'Shea had been deadly right from the start and showed it again

with another point.0-8 to 0-6, Seán had kicked 0-5 of our tally.

Tom O'Sullivan limping off. I never watched that zombie tv series 'The Walking Dead', but I'm guessing this is what an episode is like. Diarmuid, Barry Dan, Paudie, Paul G, Mike Breen, Tony, Micheál, now Tom. Mend and make do. Big ask of Evan Looney now. He has impressed at underage, was one of if not the main breakout star of the County Championship, and doen well off the bench for Kerry. But picking up All Star Oisín Conaty? This is a test.

O'Neill is wide from a very tight angle; I'm not sure that shot was on. Graham O'Sullivan had a better chance and executed it perfectly. 0-9 to 0-6.

Oisín Conaty with his third point. Armagh stirring themselves. Joe McElroy with a fine score. That's alright, Kerry, steady the ship.

Kerry don't steady the sip. Kick-out is a fraction too short by Shane – his first non-immaculate restart. Even then the situation was manageable if Dylan Casey had attacked the ball rather than waiting for it. As it was, in nipped Rory Grugan and a very calm finish saw the net bulge. 1-8 to 0-9, Armagh in front for the first time.

A test of Kerry's nerves now. If they get rattled, Armagh know how to squeeze situations. But Kerry are as cam and focussed as ever. Seán O'Shea with another well-taken point followed by a two pointer. Kerry back in front. Dylan Geaney with a point; he wasn't too far inside the arc that time. 0-13 to 1-8

Ethan Rafferty with a two point free, steers it over perfectly. Joe McElroy closes out the first half with a last Armagh point.

Half-time Armagh 1-11 Kerry 0-13.

Armagh out fast out of the blocks. Conaty driving at pace again, and a lay-off to McMullen for a point. Joe O'Connor with a good response for Kerry but Rian O'Neill kicks a two pointer. Oisín Conaty and Rian O'Neill add two more points and suddenly its 1-16 to 0-14 in Armagh's favour. This could be sliding away from us....

"There is a tide in the affairs of men, which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune; omitted, all the voyage of their life is bound in shallows and in miseries." I wouldn't regularly be quoting Billy Shakespeare (to be fair, he never quoted me much, either, out of professional courtesy) but every now and then, he has the perfect

phrase for a particular moment. And this was such a sliding doors moment. Kerry could battle manfully to an honourable defeat now. They had stod toe to toe with the All Ireland champions. Not just our big guns, everybody. If Armagh were to push at us and pull away on the scoreboard late on, nobody would be blaming Kerry, giving our injury list.

Except that this is no gladiatorial era. The only person who really decides if you are worth a Kerry jersey is yourself. I think it's fair to say that we didn't really have a settled first choice starting fifteen. In a number of positions, it was kind of the current front-runner of the two or three options, rather than nailed on starter if fit. Fifteen minutes later Kerry were as dominant as they have ever been in any game. It was utter astonishing, perfect synchronicity and execution, and up against the reigning champions, no less.

Joe O'Connor, arguably the best midfielder overall this year, boomed over a great kick. Seán O'Shea kicked yet another two pointer. There was a particular roar for Paudie Clifford splitting the posts. Kerry were simply gobbling up Ethan Rafferty's kick-outs. Armagh weren't doing much wrong. Kerry were just doing all of it far better. David Clifford with a two pointer. Let's just remember that Kerry don't do two pointers and are totally reliant on David Clifford – ah, lads, in fairness, I'll freely admit that I was completely wrong in my expectations for this game, but I was never in my life so stupid as to come out with nonsense like that. Seán O'Shea with a free. Another well-worked

Kerry move, Mark O'Shea giving it to David Clifford for a point. Mark is flagging now, jaysus but he put in some shift. So did Seán O'Brien. Even with everybody else playing really superbly, Micheál Burns is absolutely electrifying when he replaces Mark. They just can't live with him at all and he soon fires over. Brian Ó Beaglaoich pops a point after yet another Armagh kick-out clean-out. Gavin White, the captain leading the team, kicks his second point - most defenders would have looked to lay that off, but Gavin knew that it was going over. Paudie and David Clifford Added to their respective tallies. It was all Kerry now. I'm watching Kerry football a fair amount of time, and I dont think I've ever seen us this dominant

against top quality opposition. And yes, I was at that famous 'startled earwigs' game against Dublin (another one I predicted wrongly, by the way). That was not this.

I don't blame Armagh at all. This was just too fast, too sudden, from two many angles. Ethan Rafferty did tryto vary his kick-outs, of course he did, butthe only variance was whether it landed in Kerry hands or out over the sideline. 0-28 to 1-16. Fourteen points in fifteen minutes without a single wide.

Andrew Murnin with an Armagh goal chance. They needed it, but an imperious Jason Foley intercepted to put it out for a '45 converted by Rian O'Neill. David Clifford replied with a two pointer. Armagh sent a ball ito the Kerry square in hopes of a goal, but Shane Ryan judged it perfectly and emerged with possession. Fittingly, Seán O'Shea closed out a victory that was even more unexpected and meaningful than Meath's dismissal of Dublin in the Leinster Championship.

Kerry were being written off. Now, I do believe that Kerry management can't be too hard on a lot of us for that – they kept their hand well hidden – but there was a bit of knife-twisting and personal criticism in some of the hastily written obituaries. Lessons learnt? Not at all. As incredibly wonderful as this display was, that bread has been eaten and in Kerry, we tend to quickly forget eaten bead. This win just piles on more expectation for the next game.

Are Kerry able to beat Tyrone? Ah, let's face it, people. There were four big games last weekend. I predicted three of them wrongly (I though Armagh would win with a bit to spare and Dublin and Galway would get over the line as well). Which means that statisically I had a slighter better chance of just tossing a coin for each game. Do ye really want my prediction for the semi-finals? Ye really don't.

By half-time, Monaghan had carved out a 1-15 to 0-11 lead. Seven points....last year a team with that lead could stifle a game. It would be unpretty (we saw plenty of it!) but it would be effective. This year? It's basically similar to a hurling scoreline, and just as susceptible. Honestly, I still had Donegal as favourites for this one in my own mind.

I never expected it to be comfortable. But Donegal took full control now that they had the wind and quickly reeled off four points on the trot. Monaghan scored two points but Michael Langan struck for a goal. By the 50th minute it was 1-18 apiece. Still anybody's game, but Donegal had just outscored Monaghan by 1-7 to 0-3.lt really wasn't any surprise to see Donegal reel off another eight points on the trot, 1 tp from Langan, to put the game to bed. David Garland kicked one last great two pointer for Monaghan, but it was their last act in this year's All Ireland championship.

One small thing. After the game, a gracious Jim McGuinness emphasized that neither he nor any of his players had known about the statement issued by the Donegal County Board during the week regarding the six day turnaround and the lack of player welfare consideration. A County Board issuing a



statement about the senior team without input from the senior team management? That is no way to conduct matters.

TYRONE 0-23 DUBLIN 0-16

Both are former nemeses of ours. One took the mantle of 'greatest team to ever play the game' from our Golden Years team (I still say our four in a row side from the late '20s to the early '30s.....ah, look, today is not the day for that discussion. Dublin have inarguably been the best team of the modern era; we can all surely concede that much. And I fancied Dublin to win this. I suspected, like most people, that Con O'Callaghan would be on sooner rather than later. For me, Tyrone have three deadly forwards in the two Canavans and McCurry – except that I have never seen all three click together at the same time.

McCurry with the opening score, a two point free. Cormac Costello with a goal attempt parried away, but Cluxton nailed the '45. Peter Teague with a two pointer. Cormac Costelloe with a free and then fists over. I might be wrong, but both sides seem a bit cagey. Too afraid of making a fatal mistake to open the full throttle. Peter Harte made it three scores apiece. But all of Tyrone's are worth two each and Dublin already have three wides. 0-6 to 0-3.

Cormac Costello scored his third point and Brian O'Leary added another. After a slow build-up by Dublin, O'Leary levels matters. It's interesting. Both sides are keeping players up alright, but neither is actively trying to create space to exploit the new rules. Deep defences relying on turnovers. But both sides, especially Dublin, seem to be making small mistakes that would have been uncharacteristic of them in recent years. Mind you, it's slick and rainy conditions.

Darragh Canavan and Costello exchanged scores before Harte landed another Tyrone two pointer. Rory Brennan had a goal chance blocked and Costello's effort was saved at the other end. Both sides missed chances before McCurry tapped over a free to put Tyrone in front but Killian McGillis canceled that. In fact, Dublin had a chance to take the last shot of the first half, but turned it over and Tyrone's McCurry pointed instead to give them a 0-11 to 0-10 half-time lead. A small thing in itself, but indicative.

Conditions were obviously very difficult for

both sides. Cormac Costello did have a chance at a goal but skinned it wide. Finally Paddy Small scored to bring the sides level. However, Canavan, Daly, and Devlin promptly put Tyrone three points ahead. I was a bit surprised at how the GAAGO commentators were talking about how Dublin were in real trouble and being completely dominated. I felt that Tyrone were playing slightly better than Dublin, but neither side would be overly happy with their contribution. Three points isn't a big lead nowadays, I felt that Dublin could easily turn this tide and Tyrone had plenty of gears left to find as well. Tit for tat football. Ciarán Kilkenny trimmed the gap to one, Tyrone opened it again. With five minutes left, was a one point game.

And then Dublin suddenly couldn,'t get out of their own square without being turned over. This was the Tyrone I thought we would be seeing at this stage. Clinical, ruthlessly efficient. Score after score. Dublin, who had two missed goal chances, no less than ten wides, and six dropped short, had still been in this. And then, with brutal certainty, they just weren't, as Tyrone finally opened the floodgates to blow them away. End of an era? Their epitaph has been written in haste a few times already but this does feel like a turning of the page. Dessie Farrell stepped down as Dublin manager with an understated and admirable dignity.

MEATH 2-15 GALWAY 2-14

Galway. Astonishing amount of talent but it's their endurance that will be tested today. Meath. The football story of the year (be fair that one Dublin victory in the hurling will shine for a long time). Took out Dublin. Took out Kerry. Can they take out another of the top tier? Slow start. Again, conditions aren't easy. Nice dummy solo by Shane Walsh and he opens Galway's account. Meath respond superbly and Connor Gleeson just about manages to tip a rocket over the bar. Jordan Morris just wide - hawkeye called it, but it was definitely wide. Matthew Costello with a great score. I know Freyne is Meath's top scorer, but it's Costello who makes them tick. Matthew Thompson replies, though. Rob Finnerty with a Galway point. Meath get caught in defence but Galway couldn't punish it. Jordan Morris with a great score - he looks very dangerous today, Bryan Menton with another, and Kinsella gives Meath

a 0-5 to 0-3 lead. Galway fist over to stay in touch.

The pendulum is swinging wildly now. Meath with a point. Tierney and Kelly for Galway. 0-6 apiece. Just before the whistle, JohnMaher fists over to give Galway a 0-7 to 0-6 lead. Kind of a strange first half. Galway seem to be playing a patient, probing game, while Meath are faster and more ambitious in their shooting, but not any more effective. Ball handling isn;'t great either, but once again I suspect that you'd have to be on the field to understand the wet slickness of ball and grass. Plenty of slippages. Matthew Costello with a free to level matters at the start of the second half. Shane Walsh with a great effort at a two pointer but it's just eide. Matthew Costello does point and Meath are in front

Matthew Tierney inexplicably left in a load of space and he coolly measures his point perfectly. Jordan Morris replies – Morris is clearly the dangerman.

Rob Finnerty squares things but Costello nudges Meath in front again. They miss a two pointer free for Galway infringing the three up rule but Jordan Morris picks off another point. Meath leave a goal chance behind them but then race in again and this time Conor Gray neatly drives it to the net. Morris with another point. 1-12 to 0-9.

Long road home for Galway now Shane Walsh with a vital two pointer. Galway come again, substitute Cillian McDaid firing home a goal. Just one point in it again – a shorter road than I had thought! Damien Comer is another to have an immediate impact off the bench, winning the free to level matters. They come again and, astonishingly, Maher sets up Liam Silke for another goal.

Eoghan Freyne with a badly wanted point for Meath. Goal chance - brilliantly saved by Conor Gleeson and the '45 curls wide. The danger is averted though, Meath turn over the kick-out and race in, Mattew Costello setting Jordan Morris up for the goal. Suddenly Meath are on fire. Cathal Hickey taps over to put them two points up. Jordan Morris with another score, but Galway cancel it out through Damien Comer. All on the line now, but you'd have to say that the momentum is with Meath. And one last point not only puts them a goal in front, but obliges Jordan Morris to attend the All Star banquet. Frankly, from what I've seen of it in recent years, he'd have been better off without, but after this display he will surely be in that conversation.

Shane Walsh with one last glorious two pointer for Galway. Once again, they knocked hard on the door....and once again, it refused to open for them.

Meath into the last four. I'm pretty certain that no-one, even within Meath's stormy ranks at the time, was predicting it. I certainly wasn't!

SOCCER INTERNATIONAL FRIENDLY

USA 4 IRELAND 0

Ireland weren't at full strength and missing

some of their top guns. But this was very much a US team building exercise as well. The fact of the defeat is immaterial; the manner of it is significant.

Ayoung US team totally dominated proceedings in Culver City (where virtually all the western movies of the early 20th century were filmed). They hit the post in the very first minute. The attack was actually a fraction offside, but that was more luck than intent by Ireland's defence. Minutes later Courtney Brosnan made a great save from Alyssa Thompson. To be honest, the 20 year old destroyed us down the left and could have claimed a hat-trick. She is going to be soccer's answer to Caitlin Clark, and I know I am basing it on one showing, but what a display. The US went ahead in the 18th minute when Avery Patterson powered a header home. It was a great ball in – the US were sending in some really measured crosses and diagonal passes, especially an excellent Sam Coffey.

Caitlin Hayes did battle hard in a beleaguered defence. Chloe Mustaki was hurling herself about - a bit reckless, but at least it disturbed USA's rhythm. Ruesha Littlejohn was our best outfield player, but possibly the only one who would have made the US team - and this was an experimental US side. Just before half-time our main tormentor, Thompson, latched onto a nice through ball to make it 2-0. The second half was hardly even exhibition standard. Ireland were simply outclassed. The US had left three very good chances behind them before Yazmeen Rvan scored her first goal for her country in the 66th minute. Again, Ireland could be grateful to Courtney Brosnan for some great saves, with Alyssa Thompson scoring the USA's fourth goal late on.

Look, it's never wise to read too much into friendlies, and certainly neither team was anything like ful strength. But this was still a worrying toothless display by Ireland.

JOHN GILES THE VOICE OF IRISH SOCCER FALLS SILENT

He was as Irish as it gets. Nine of them shared a two bed house – and 'house' is generous – just off Ormond Square. He was born in 1940, a diet of coddle and poverty, German bombs still falling. Dozens of kids playing soccer in crowded spaces with rubber handballs – they all had immaculate first touches. Wasn't much choice! They were all good (an awful lot of these kids would go on to backbone the League of Ireland in its 1960s heydays). One of them was clearly better.

He played in the Dublin Schoolboy Leagues. That was hugely popular, and the Ormond Square kids (The Leprechauns -somebody had notions!) were good. So good that 13 year old Johnny Giles got a trial with the Ireland U15s, and a man named Billy Behan was watching. The famous Man United scout made his opinion known and a year later 14 year old Johnny was on a boat to England, his Mam having pinned a pound note inside his jacket. At 17 years of age he signed a professional contract for a pittance – Busby was a great manager, but parsimonious. He was on the verge of making the first team



panel when the Munich Air disaster happened and he lost a lot of friends, especially Liam Whelan. He and others were fast-tracked up and he made his debut against Spurs. They were hammered. Kids against grown men. But carbon was rapidly becoming steel.

He made his Ireland debut against Sweden very shortly after. And scored.

He wasn't earning a lot but he married Anne the same month that Nobby Stiles married his own sister Kay. Johnny actually replaced the injured Nobby to play in the 1963 FA Cup Final and win. Back then, an FA Cup medal didn't just outweigh the league; it outweighed a World Cup medal. Seriously.

Busby had settled on Giles being a utility player off the bench, and Busby was authoritarian. Despite the false mythology, he never cared for his players, only the results, and even then in a spendthrift way. He was a brilliant tactician and motivator, but his loyalty was to a club and ownership that would callously disregard him too in the fullness of time.

Giles may have been young, but he was raised in a tough school. Busby, who couldn't imagine anyone willingly leaving Old Trafford, was in for a bit of a land. Giles doubled his wages by signing with second division Leeds and instantly helping them to promotion. Leeds would beat Man United in the '65 FA Cup semifinal but lose to Liverpool. That was the year that Ireland beat Spain to force a play-off for a berth in the World Cup. The FAI saw banknotes and happily conceded venue to Paris instead of London. Typical FAI. Giles ever forgave them, which was typical Giles.

It was Leeds' glory years. League Cup, FA Cup, two league titles, two Fairs Cups (i.e. Europa). Barely pipped for several more. Giles wasn't just on that team, he was the heartbeat. He could do everything that Bremner did, and he was a lot cleaner. Billy was no hatchet man, but he did play to the gallery. Giles didn't, and I'd rate Giles higher (Billy was faster but hadn't the same passing distance). Do not mistake that for Giles being any paragon of virtue, he was no saint or shrinking violet either!

Roy Keane was the best Irish midfielder ever? He was up there – but John Giles really could do everything Roy did. Less foreign players, definitely, but no financial disparity either. Funny enough, both had reputations as hard tacklers, which they were – but both were actually best at reading and directing the play. In 2024, John Giles was voted in as Ireland's Best Player of the Past Fifty Years.

All through, he was a passionate believer in Irish soccer. Not the FAI; he was always an intelligent man. But he tried very hard for his

country as a great player, a player-manager with his hands tied by administrative officials who, to be gentle about it, didn't administer. And plain old Irish begrudgery. Remember the Walk of Dreams? John was passionate and sincere about a great project - the FAI were only passionate about the disappearing money. Giles, and the more intemperate Dunphy, tried bringing an English team to base themselves in Dublin or to reform Shamrock Rovers to proper standards, not the mend-andmake-do standards of a League of Ireland that was appalling mismanaged by the FAI (still is, to listen to some of the nonsense regarding transfers etc. this year). It was laughed down. Nobody inside the Irish game wanted to have to live up to those basic standards; that would have required both probity and ambition.

Many of you will remember that great lament 'Coronach' from poetry in secondary school. Giles, so long a beacon of sense in Ireland's soccer landscape, has stepped back from the microphone. There is no-one out there – and I mean this sincerely – who could do the job a fraction as well in terms of expertise or candour. Maybe, with the multiplicity of media platforms and revenue streams nowadays, no individual can dominate the landscape to that extent anymore. Johnny Giles didn't talk a good game, he lived and breathed it. Many thanks for all the memories.

A LION REMEMBERED

The rugby team, quite rightly, are making a

lot of the headlines right now. But there was once a soccer team from Britain called Lions. The Lisbon Lions.

The Lisbon Lions....I haven't the room and ye haven't the interest for a full narration of that great story here. Suffice it to say that a bunch of working class heroes (in fact, most working people earned more

than soccer players in that era) called Glasgow Celtic, all from Glasgow itself (Bobby Lennox was a whopping 30 miles away), made it to Lisbon to contest the 1967 European Cup Final. None of your 'Champions League' nonsense. Inter Milan were the hottest of favourites. But the Lions won it 2-1, and it ushered in an international dimension to club soccer that laid the foundation for the modern era. The FA Cup was everything that counted. No offence to the Galloping Major beating England 6-3 and Ramsay's Wingless Wonders in '66 and all that. It was the Lisbon Lions who made club players and owners start to dream big.

John Clark, who sadly passed away this week, was a key player on that side. He was also a Scottish international and played Brazil in a friendly in the build-up to the 1966 World Cup. Many years later (1986 I think,but I am not sure), a number of that Lisbon Lions side



were in a New York lift going up to their hotel rooms when another guest joined them. Edson Arantes de Nascimento. Younger readers will not have heard of the Lions, or Galloping Major Puskas, or Ramsay – but you will surely recognise Pele.

And the man that many consider the GOAT – don't mind the Messi/Ronaldo stuff, that arises in every generation, it was Maradonna and R9 before them and Cruyff and Breckenbauer before that. Puskas and De Stefano before the man himself. But Pele? Modest man that he was, the legend recognised John immediately and engaged him in warm conversation. John's fellow Lions wanted to ask for autographs but were star-struck until Pele exited to his floor.

At which point John turned to his colleagues and said "What a lovely man. Does anyone know who he was?"

I promise, true story.

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

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
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




















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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

BULBS

Even though its only July, you can start thinking about planting bulbs. Most bulbs are suitable for growing in containers especially the likes of tulips, daffodils, lilies and aliumns. When planting up a container of window box with bulbs, plant them at about three times their depth and about one bulb width apart and don't forget to water them especially when the foliage is out and they are growing. When planting bulbs in the garden dig over the area well where you are planting and add some compost. Always plant your bulbs in groups of about six depending on the type of bulbs. If you would like to add some colour to some areas of the garden for Spring and into Summer, it would be advisable to grow your bulbs now in small pots and grow them on until early spring. You can then plant them in their pots in the areas you want and after flowering you can dig them up and keep them until next Spring.

"Do not despise these small beginnings ______: for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin, to see the plumb line in Zerubbabel's hand" (Zechariah 4:10).

Welcome back dear student, change starts with small steps. Sometimes we get overwhelmed at the task or season ahead. A trick of the enemy is to keep people trapped using the power of suggestion to bring folks down before they even start - 'this is too big', or 'you'll never cope', or 'how could you ever do this - look at your past?'
