

WORKING TOGETHER TO KEEP KILLARNEY A SAFE DESTINATION

ollowing the actions of a number of people on the streets of Killarney on Saturday night, representatives of Kerry County Council and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce met with An Garda Síochana on Wednesday of this week.

CULTIVATING HOPE Season of Creation 2020

The Radio Kerry programme 'Horizons', the daily 'Just a Thought' and the diocesan facebook page will all highlight the theme across the Season.

This is an initiative of the diocesan Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation Committee (JPIC).



BRENDAN TAKES A TRIP *down memory lane*



An avid collector of all things old has come across what is possibly one of the earliest brochures for a Guesthouse in Killarney.

Brendan O'Sullivan from Crohane purchased the brochure on an online auction and on receiving it reaslied that the brochure for Gleison's (sic), Killarney was one of the first printing jobs undertaken by Killarney Printing Works in 1913.

Situated at No. 7 York Terrace, the brochure

offered visitors to Killarney, excellent accommodation combining comfort and cleanliness with views including Mangerton, Torc and Purple Mountains, Killarney House and Deerpark.


"Unusually for the time, No. 7 York Terrace was "Lighted with Electricity", Brendan told the Killarney Outlook, "when you think that electricity was only installed in Muckross House in 1970, it shows that David Gleeson definitely was a man before his time" he added.

"I decided to delve further into the history behind the owner of the house and it seems that he appeared in court for trespassing on the platform of Killarney Railway Station while touting for business", Brendan said.

An article in the Killarney Echo stated that a witness saw Mr. Gleeson speaking to two ladies and handing them a card, the witness ordered him to leave but "he laughed and did not go off". At the time, buses from hotels like the Lake Hotel, The Innisfallen Hotel and The Victoria Hotel would wait for guests at the station which was owned at the time by the G S & W Railway Company.

"Another interesting fact on the brochure is that it was just printed when Killarney House burned to the ground", Brendan added. "The house was mentioned as one of the views from the residence on the Lewis Road", he added. David Gleeson was married to Elizabeth Gleeson and they had one daughter, Noreen. Gleison's Killarney offered Bed and Breakfast for 3s 6d per day with Dinner costing 2s and Tea costing 1shilling.

Excursions around Killarney were also on offer

taking visitors from the northern shore of the Lower Lake across the River Laune and on to the Gap of Dunloe. Following lunch onboard while going through the Upper Lake, it was onto the Long Range, shoot the rapids at the Old Weir Bridge, proceed through the middle and lower lake and arrive at Ross Castle where a car woul bring you back after a "grand day's excursion". The same "Gap Trip" is still available on the Lakes of Killarney.

f your home was anything like mine this week, you will understand the sheer excitement from children and parents alike at the reopening of our local schools.

Thankfully the delight outweighed the anxiety of the unknown and I busied myself visiting the Junior Infants on their first day at school. With many teachers in my family, I decided to have a chat with Principal Conor Gleeson to hear how things were going, and how things went throughout lockdown for the students at Tiernaboul NS.

"When we heard the announcement that schools were to close with immediate effect back in March we prepared ourselves by contacting all the parents and continued our studies via email correspondence. The initial thought was it was precautionary and we'd be back in full swing after the Easter holidays. As we neared the time, it became apparent that we would not be going back to school so the teachers and I got together with a plan and decided to use the popular schooling app 'Class Dojo'. It was full on getting a routine going for both the children and ourselves, all the while being aware of the difficulties the children and parents may have, especially those with extra requirements. Crazy times Marie! If you saw it in the cinema you'd be sure you're watching a fiction movie" Conor told me. I totally agreed. If you were actually to sit down and come up with an incident that would stop the entire world..... you just couldn't write it! "The children of 2020 are living through history probably unknowns to themselves, and their children will be reading about this in years to come". That thought provoked the notion of a little project of my own, perhaps a Covid19 book of all the people I have met since last March. I for one, wanted dearly for this to be the last chapter! "As a team here at Tiernaboul NS, we organised a really cool project. Each child created a time capsule of their thoughts and feelings and what they were getting up to in general through out Covid19. We then buried these capsules on the school grounds and we will open them again in twenty years time on 12th March 2040. I will be long gone from Tiernaboul NS by then but if I'm still in the land of the living, it's a place I would love to be" Conor said.

"So how were things for you Conor, outside of school during lockdown" I asked. "Do you know what Marie, I spoke to many of my neighbours I had never had the opportunity to chat with before and Denise, Jack, Doireann & I found many 'off the beaten track' trails to explore in our area. We are now the proud owners of a chicken coup at the Gleeson household, housing 11 hens and Jack & Doireann have used their entrepreneurial skills to target Nana & Grandads pockets for the sale of eggs!" Conor laughed.


"I've missed my involvement with Spa GAA. As a family, all our weekends revolved around sport in general. I am involved in helping Liam Corcoran with the U10 boys and to be fair, we've had fun setting home challenges and compiling 'pass the ball challenges' via video, I think it was Tick Tock". "Over all I think children adapt well Marie. Sometimes better than adults. All 58 kids bounced in the door here last week which is the main plus for me. We've a new drop off/pick up system in place and each class enters and exits through their own class door. We've decided no homework for the coming weeks to decrease the possibility of transmission and give us a good head start". I'm personally delighted to be back and I am very grateful to my team - The Board of Management, The Parents Council, my staff & the many parents who have helped us out. I am also eternally grateful that the Zoom PE classes have finally finished" Conor told me. I was intrigued. Zoom is a web-based video conferencing tool/ app allowing groups of people to meet up in a classroom/work/social environment when they cannot physically be together. The best thing since sliced pan in Covid times!! "You know Padraig O'Suilleabhán who teaches here Marie?? He plays with the Kerry Juniors and with South Kerry??? Put it his way, I'm sure the Mammies were far more impressed with his warm up, activity and cool down than that of my PE routine. He's ripped"!!! We laughed as I left.

Thank you for having me at Tiernaboul NS Principal Gleeson. It's great to see so many children happy to be back at school and it was great for me to meet the many Junior Infant children in our community who began their journey this week too.

€590,000 for capital works and equipment for Institute of Technology Tralee - Griffin

Some €590,000 has been allocated for Capital works and equipment for Institute of Technology Tralee, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said the funding will allow institutions address small-scale capital investment and equipment needs based on their own priorities, including health and safety works, infrastructure upgrades, ICT and equipment renewal, and energy-related upgrades.

Today's announcement is in addition to the €168 million package of Covid 19-related supports for further and higher education institutions announced on 22 July.

The grant will be allocated to individual institutions in accordance with a model based primarily on student numbers, weighted by course type and mode of student.

Funding will be provided by the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science through the Higher Education Authority (HEA).

Previous allocations under the Devolved Capital Grant have had a significant positive

impact on campus development, facilitating initiatives such as upgrading of laboratories, replacement of obsolete ICT equipment, installation of energy efficient lighting, and repurposing of existing spaces in line with the needs of students and staff.

The funding forms part of ongoing investment in the higher education sector under Project Ireland 2040. The allocation represents a significant increase from the $\in 10$ million provided in recent years. Previously limited to the technological sector, grant funding for the coming academic year is being extended to the university sector for the first time since 2011.

A further €16 million support package announced this evening by Government will help pubs, bars and nightclubs in Kerry, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said. Deputy Griffin said the funding recognises the huge economic impact on businesses in this sector and will help assist these businesses with planning and adaptation for their reopening.

Deputy Griffin said: "It has been an extremely challenging time for the owners of pubs, bars and nightclubs and their staff across Kerry.

"I am pleased to confirm that those businesses remaining closed and planning their reopening can now receive a minimum of \in 5,600 and a maximum of \in 35,000 under the Restart Grant Plus.

"This can be used to help additional expense and adaptations associated with re-opening when the time comes.

"These businesses will also benefit from a waiver of court fees and associated excise and stamp duties relating to the renewal of pub and other liquor licences in 2020, as well as a waiver of excise duty on on-trade liquor licences on renewal in 2020.

"These measures are in addition to the existing Restart Grant Plus, Tourism Adaptation Fund, the wage subsidy scheme, commercial rates waiver, liquidity supports and tax measures (such as warehousing of tax debt and reduction in VAT).

"Pubs are an important part of the social fabric of Kerry and the measures announced today are another support to help them come through this very challenging time and be able to reopen when the time is right," Deputy Griffin concluded.

Tánaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment Leo Varadkar said: "It's been a really difficult few months for pub owners. Our publicans are making a massive sacrifice to protect their communities and the government is determined to help.

"This package, in addition to the grants and subsidies already available, will help pub owners with expenses to do with getting ready for re-opening. The increase in the Restart Grant Plus means pubs that are remaining closed will receive a minimum of \in 5,600. We want to make sure that our pubs are in a position to reopen as soon as it is safe to do so."

OPEN LETTER FROM ACTING CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER

to parents and guardians of school children and to teachers and affiliated school staff

To parents and guardians of school children in Ireland,

am very aware that many of you are worried about the reopening of schools and the associated risk of COVID-19 for your children.

This concern is natural and is to be fully expected after a period of six months during which we have all had to adapt to the challenges posed by COVID-19.

The decision to reopen schools has not been taken lightly and has been based on guidance produced by international bodies including the World Health Organization (WHO) and the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC); scientific evidence regarding the risk of COVID-19 in school children and staff; the experience of other countries that have not closed, or have reopened, their schools; our own experience having reopened childcare settings and summer camps since June; and evidence regarding the importance of school for the overall health and wellbeing of children.

International evidence shows us that childto-child and child-to-adult transmission of COVID-19 in schools is uncommon. In addition, our own experience to date in Ireland, and indeed that reported internationally, demonstrates that for the overwhelming majority of children who are diagnosed with COVID-19, their symptoms will be mild.

The importance of schools for the overall health and wellbeing of children cannot be overstated, and the risk of COVID-19 has been carefully weighed against the very real harm that can be caused by sustained school closures. Schools

play a fundamental role in the social life of children; they are where children are educated, make friends, share interests, learn social skills like self-confidence and empathy, and participate in sport and cultural activities.

Of course, as we continue to navigate our way through this pandemic, there are no zero risk options for reopening schools or indeed any other environment; the aim, therefore, is to reopen in as safe a way as possible by ensuring that all appropriate public health measures such as physical distancing, hand washing and respiratory hygiene are implemented where appropriate.

Schools are at the heart of our communities and the best way to protect them is to keep the level

of COVID-19 in the community low. As parents and guardians, you can play a key role in this, both through your own actions and through the influence that you have on your family and friends. If all of us continue to make small changes to the way we live, we can - together starve this virus of opportunities to transmit. While it is okay to send your child to school or childcare if they only have a runny nose or a sneeze, if you have any concerns that your child has symptoms of COVID-19 - fever, cough, shortness of breath, loss of taste or smell – then please keep them at home until you have spoken with your GP by phone. Lots more information is available at gov.ie/backtoschool and hse.ie.

There will be cases of COVID-19 among children over the coming days and weeks, as there have been throughout this pandemic to date. But when this happens our public health teams in the HSE will respond and liaise closely with the school involved and ensure that all necessary measures are taken to protect other students and school staff.

Finally, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for all you have done to keep your family and our communities safe over the past seven months. I also want to thank all teachers, principals and school staff who have worked so hard to ensure that our schools are ready to reopen – it is just one more example of the incredible solidarity that has defined the way in which people all across the country have come together to play their part in getting us through this pandemic.

Emergency Card Scheme for Family Carers Ireland launched

A Family Carers Ireland's Emergency Card Scheme was launched this week by An Taoiseach, Micheal Martin.

Family Carers Ireland (FCI), in partnership with An Garda Siochana, the National Ambulance Service Community First Responder Schemes, The Irish Red Cross and The Order of Malta have developed a new Emergency Card Scheme for family carers. When a family carer has an unplanned hospital

admission there is a risk that the person who needs their care and support could be left at home alone and uncared for. The Emergency Card Scheme is intended to give peace of mind to family carers as well as ensuring that the person they care for remains safe in such emergencies.

The new scheme can be broken down into 4 simple steps:

Step 1. Family carer completes FCI Emergency Care Plan with or for their loved one outlining

their care needs, likes, dislikes, medication requirements etc.

Step 2. The Family Carer nominates two people who will step into their caring role in the event of an emergency and provide FCI with these details as part of their Emergency Care Plan

Step 3. Completed Emergency Care Plan is sent to FCI and family carer receives their Emergency Card which they carry at all times. The card includes a Freephone emergency helpline number.

Step 4. In the event of an emergency, and where a person's named emergency contacts are unavailable, Family Carers Ireland will determine the person's needs and either mobilise:

A red response (for a person who needs a high level of support), where a member of An Garda Siochana will visit the person and decide if the person requires transportation to the emergency department as a place of safety; or A green response which will include contacting a pair of volunteers from either the National Ambulance Service Community First Responder Schemes, The Irish Red Cross or The Order of Malta to sit with, and to support the person until a home care package can be organised. During this emergency period FCI may also provide up to 72 hours of in-home emergency support where appropriate. The Emergency Card Scheme has been funded by Irish Life and with the support of Dormant Account fund administered by Pobal. A social story (accessible storyboard) to explain the scheme has also been developed with the support of Sensory Space. Síle met up with local beekeeper Micheál Ó Ceallaigh who guided her along the traditional pilgrimage routes of Saint Gobnait, and was also



LEAVING CERT 2020 CANDIDATES DESERVE VERY GOOD RESULTS ON MONDAY

The long wait for 61,000 Leaving Cert candidates finally comes to an end on Monday, when the results of the calculated grades process will be published.

Leaving Cert results will be issued to candidates via the calculated grades student portal on Monday at 9am. Log into the portal using your candidate examination number and personal identification number (PIN). Leaving Cert calculated grades will be simultaneously issued to students' schools at 9am.

Leaving Cert candidates have been through an emotional mill since last March. They have suffered the distress of uncertainty and indecision. They have ploughed a lonely furrow in a bubble of virtual reality. They had no closure as they completed their second level education. They had no opportunity to sit the Leaving Cert exam. Leaving Cert exam results, which are normally available in mid-August, were delayed until 7th September. These resilient young people have endured more angst than any Leaving Cert Class that went before. If any Leaving Cert cohort ever deserved success, this current class most certainly does. It is my fervent hope that Monday's calculated grades results will bring joy unconfined to each and every Leaving Cert candidate after the anxiety and mental anguish they have

suffered during the past six months. At this stage, they are entitled to move on to the next stage of their young lives. At a press conference on Tuesday afternoon, Minister Norma Foley announced that the previous performance of individual schools in past Leaving Cert exams was not used in the standardisation of calculated grades. That was a very egalitarian gesture by the Minister and was warmly welcomed in education circles. It was also revealed that about 79% of grades are at, about 4% are above and about 17% are below the school's estimate. But the devil will be in Monday's detailed results.

A written Leaving Cert exam will be provided from 16th November if the prevailing health environment allows. That exam will be open to all 2020 candidates. It will take place in the evenings and at weekends. Candidates taking the November exam who are also receiving calculated grades on Monday will be credited with the higher of the two grades. They will also be able to combine grades from both results for college entry requirements and points. But the November exam will be of little use to the 61,000 young people whose sights are firmly focussed on moving on this year.

Because the Leaving Cert results aren't available until Monday, 7th September, CAO applicants will have to wait for Round One, the main body of CAO offers to be issued at 2pm on the 11th September. Already this year, on 18th July, CAO issued offers in Round A to 5,800 deferred applicants, mature applicants, applicants who have completed an Access course and applicants who need to make visa arrangements before they can take up a college place. Another early round, Round Zero was issued on 8th August to 4,411 applicants who were not competing with those awaiting 2020 examination results or who were assessed on other criteria. In total, 78,168 applications were received by the CAO this year.

That means there will be more than a threemonth gap between the issue of Round A college offers on 18th July and the final round of college offers, Round Five, which will be in mid to late October. Best of luck to all candidates receiving Leaving Cert calculated grades results on Monday. Go néirí go maith libh go léir. In the next article, I will analyse the Leaving Cert calculated grade results and give some advice about accepting Round One offers.

With a Summer 2021 opening planned, the Killarney Brewing and Distilling Company is offering a major €25,000 sculpture commission to Kerry artists.

The 62Ksq ft brewing and distilling enterprise plans to install an eye-catching, unique and creative work outside its state-of-the-art visitor center and production facility currently under construction on the Ring of Kerry road at Fossa. The announcement of the lucrative sculpture commission for the spectacularly located site overlooking the Gap of Dunloe is a timely boost for Kerry artists hard-hit by the coronavirus pandemic.

"In an effort to add further aesthetic depth to the new world-class facility, we are looking for a stunning piece of art that will both complement the structure and excite the visitor," the company directors said. "The sculpture will take centre stage directly in front of our facility and will greet visitors as they approach on foot," "We are excited to offer this proposal to the local artists of Kerry to see if we can find that special sculpture and keep the creation on home turf," they said. "Collaborative partnerships among artists are also welcome."

The deadline for receipt of applications is Friday, September 25, at 5pm. It is anticipated that the project would commence during 2020 and be completed by March 2021. JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

Another week, another whirlwind of sporting action, and there is a lot of good news on a lot of sporting fronts. Alright, let's not pretend that it's been a great week for Killarney in general. But let's keep that in perspective; things could be an awful lot worse. Thankfully, those that I love are healthy. I have a roof over my head and I have food in the fridge (note to myself; it's probably time to learn how to cook).

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Some of the games were brilliant; some slightly less so. But in all fairness, they were all fantastically entertaining, and the County Board have done a great job in ensuring that we all got to see them, albeit not in persona. There were some small issues – having to buy package deals instead of single games should have been announced beforehand instead of being sprung on people, and unfortunately the end of the most exciting one of all got cut off. Ah look, I'm not saying that it's not something that shouldn't be corrected, but all the same, let's not be confusing molehills with mountains. One of them looks like a small rodent kind of creature, and one of them looks like Carrantouhill.

With the semi-final draws made, East Kerry will meet St. Brendans and Dr. Crokes will meet Mid Kerry.

St. Brendans 2-17 Killarney Legion 1-9

I called three games right out of four (quite happy with it, thank you very much. I'm not saying that I am a genius.....but I wouldn't argue the point with you either). This is the game that I got wrong. You have to hand it to Seamus Murphy and his selectors; their tactics were absolutely perfect. I thought there would be an over-reliance on Ivan Parker for scores. In fact, Danny Sheahan was on top in that duel, but Parker actually moved out to open space for the likes of Diarmuid O'Connor and Jack Barry to burst into with their pace. Both struck for goals and O'Connor also had three points. Most people had Diarmuid as man of the match, but I thought Jack Barry was constant effective motion. I'll admit that I have questioned his decision-making with Kerry on occasion; too many lung-bursting runs ended in a wild hit-andhope effort, but he looks more considered now. Padraig Lucey battled his heart out; one of my players of the championship.

At the other end, Killarney Legion seemed to rely a bit too much on James O'Donoghue. I thought a few lads passed to him at times when they were within shooting range themselves. Legion have good players and work hard, but the scoreboard only shows end product, not graft.

East Kerry 2-13 St. Kierans 1-14

"Uneasy lies the end that wears the crown". That was Billy Shakespeare, a decent lad and a good writer (fellow playwright Kit Marlowe was only a bowsie) but weak on sports. He had a point. East Kerry are the reigning champions and hot favourites, but they struggled for answers in light of hard questions from St. Kierans. In fact, East Kerry could and probably should have lost this; St. Kierans simply left too many good scoring chances behind. Eddie Horan was absolutely awesome. James Walsh, who was one of the most promising young players in Kerry, looks back to his old confident self. For East Kerry Paudie Clifford was unquestionably the star of the show. Most of the players seemed a little bit lethargic; Paudie was a dynamo. Still, there was only one player on the pitch (or the county, or further afield) who could have placed that goal chance while off balance. The fact that David's late red card, rather than the phenomenal skill to score that goal, was the main talking point says a lot, and none of it nice, about GAA punditry. East Kerry haven't been lighting up the Championship like most of us expected; but there's a lot of dry powder there yet!

Dr. Crokes 1-16 Templenoe 0-11

Let's not be pretending; Crokes aren't the force of old. But they aren't dealing from a full deck at the moment, either. Deadly Jordan Kiely is a huge absentee up front, while Daithí Casey always strikes me as the kind of player who is only fully appreciated in absentia, he's a massive loss. Tony Brosnan was again the shooting star, the second of his eight points was pure magic. Micheál Burns was absolutely outstanding, he has been having a great run of games and this was his best performance of them all. My man of the match, though, goes to the under-stated Johnny Buckley. He doesn't do anything spectacular. He just does literally everything right, and any time he wants a ball in midfield, no-one can stop him getting it. Mark O'Shea is a serious operator, as well. Gavin White finished off a goal after being out with injury and that was one of those unstoppable fast-flowing Crokes' moves that you couldn't even stop by building a wall (quick shout out to Donald Trump, how's things, Don? Tell Vladimir that I said "hi"). Templenoe left no pride behind them, and Killian Spillane is some predator. Peter Keane will have had several reasons to enjoy this particular game.

Mid Kerry 1-13 Kenmare Shamrocks 1-12

Here's a small secret; I have a soft spot for both sides. Kenmare don't have a huge population, but they have plenty of quality and even more heart. On a day when Seán O'Shea was clearly hardly able to take the field, talented young Dan McCarthy and all of Stephen O'Brien's huge effort didn't quite click onto the scoreboard (he has been awesome in every other game this year. He wasn't poor by any means here, just not quite as effective) Paul O'Connor really stepped up. I sometimes think that the emergence of Seán and Stephen has made a few people forget that Paul O'Connor has been one of the deadliest predators in Kerry for fifteen years now. He definitely proved it here and was my man of the match.

Mid Kerry is a relatively small district and the last few years haven't been kind to them. But the clubs have been putting down strong roots behind the scenes and getting a harvest in a stream of young players to supplement the likes of Stephen Cahillane, Pa Kilkenny, Colin McGillicuddy, Ronan Murphy, and Gavan O'Grady. They looked a beaten docket for a long time here. Kenmare were superb, especially O'Connor, but I just think that they have played a lot of very, very hard games in a short space and time and it finally caught up with them. There's no doubt about the catalyst for change. Former Kerry minor captain Jack O'Connor is still just 18 years old, but wow! He won a penalty (great conversion by O'Grady) and scored the best point of the day. It came down to an absolutely gripping finish. Unfortunately, the steaming service broke down at the crucial moment, a real shame, because it was fantastic. Paul O'Connor shot for goal when a point might have been the better option (an easier call in the Press Box than an adrenaline-surging field after 65 gruelling minutes when the tension is crackling) and Sean O'Shea's effort curled just wide. Mid Kerry's defensive composure in those frantic few minutes is worth noting; that's very hard to do. They'll be underdogs against Dr. Crokes; but they have teeth.

COUNTY JUNIOR QUARTER-FINAL

Fossa v Skellig Rangers,

Saturday, 5.00pm, Killorglin

Tough one to call, in fairness. Skellig are a tough outfit and very hard to beat. Both sides lost their third group game (to Gneeveguilla and St. Senans respectively) but had already qualified by then, so they weren't exactly throwing the handle with the hatchet in those games. Skellig have Diarmuid and Ciarán Keating (Ciarán was an incredible talent until injury intervened) and a host of O'Sullivans (The 'Loveys' and the 'Glen' being two separate families) and all of them are good. Fossa will have to dig, but with the Clifford and O'Shea brothers on board, I expect them to score enough. Listry v Brosna, Sunday, 7.00pm, Strand Road

Ronan Buckley has been immense both for the club and for East Kerry and the likes of Anthony Kennedy, Sean O'Shea, and Paul O'Donoghue have been impressive. Barry Keane and Ruairi Murphy are young guns that manager Marc Ó Sé has called on successfully and both know how to bisect the posts.

Paul Walsh has made all the headlines recently. He was fantastic for the Kerry minors and for Abbeyfeale in colleges football and he has brought all that talent into senior ranks, as evidenced last weekend with St. Kierans. But Tom mcGoldrick has been a phenomenal scorer for Brosna and the Kerry Juniors for a long time now – he was the main man as Brosna won the most roller-coaster magical club All Ireland I have ever been privileged to witness.

Gneeveguilla v Ballymac, Saturday, 5.00pm, Castleisland

Both sides sailed unbeaten through the group stage. It's a tough call, both sides have put up uge scores along the way. But Gneeveguilla have a slightly bigger panel and the likes of Pa Warren, Padraig O'Connor, John O'Leary, Con Buckley, Shane O'Sullivan, and Conor Herlihy should just about tip the scales in Gneeveguilla's favour. They's have to be very wary and work hard, though.

Evergreen Aidan Breen will be the biggest danger, but Tomás O'Connor, Darragh regan, Josh O'Keeffe, and Padraig McCarthy are other real threats.

A lot of the FAI Council have complained that they weren't aware of the terms of the deal, with a claim by Chairman Roy Barrett (whose Government-supported appointment is currently under scrutiny) being clearly refuted. They are also unhappy, but reluctantly accepted at this week's EGM, that 6 of the 12 FAI Board members be independently appointed (given the appalling mismanagement that saw them somehow misplace a whopping E50m, I'd much prefer if all 12 came from outside the catastrophically failed FAI) and members with over ten years' service will be standing down in 2022. That includes Kerry District Secretary John O'Regan, who was a staunch John Delaney supporter.

There are happier events in soccer. Shamrock Rovers have been drawn against none other than AC Milan in the Europa League. It doesn't get a lot bigger than that. Lionel Messi is in the middle of a turbulent departure from his lifelong club Barcelona. Should Rovers consider making a move? I know Messi is no longer a young player. He had growth problems as a teenager. He still lacks height. He isn't great defensively, to be truthful. He hasn't lit up the World Cup. His country have never even qualified for the European Championships! But, look, I have good instincts in these matters, I think the lad could be worth a punt...

Normally that would be a huge payday, with a home and away leg and lucrative tv rights. Unfortunately, covid restrictions means that there's only one game, with Rovers at home in Tallaght. It'll be behind closed doors, and the away side retain the international tv rights, which leaves Shamrock Rovers denied a huge payday. That might incentivise them, though. Zlatan Ibramahovich and co. had best prepare for a culture shock! Mind you, the likes of Zlatan could be a culture shock for Tallaght as well...

AC MILAN IN IRELAND

Long time AC Milan supporters might be a bit worried about this game. After all, away back on November 5th, 1975, they came to a place called 'Athlone' to play the locals in the European Cup. Amby Fogarty, who had been best man at Brian Clough's wedding, was managing Athlone and doing really well. They welcomed the Milanese giants, who included Cesare Maldini and Giovanni Trappatoni on their coaching staff, and the teams were led into St. Mels' Park through mud and puddles by the Athlone Pipe Band and...a goat as a bizarre mascot. Athlone, who had managed to get time off from their regular jobs for the game, actually played well against the Italians, who were obviously discomfited by the relatively crude setting by their standards. It was a very rough and tumble game, which suited the home side. In fact, Athlone should have won, with John Minnock striking a great penalty, but Italian World Cup keeper Albertosi managed to save it. Athlone Town 0 AC Milan 0.

Athlone went to the second leg in Italy, stayed in the same hotel as the famous actor Omar Sharif ("a very nice man" John Minnock recalled later) and set out for the San Siro. They actually held out Milan for 62 minutes but then conceded three

fast goals. The draw in Athlone was probably the greatest achievement by any Irish soccer club. It was at the tail end of the glory days for such clubs, with domestic attendances already declining rapidly as the GAA was expanding in Dublin city, carried on a blue wave inspired by one Kevin Heffernan and a green and gold one by a team of bachelors led by Mick O'Dwyer.

KERRY'S ONLY SENIOR SOCCER CAP

I suspect that if I were to run a poll (I'm not going to, that sounds like hard work) asking who is Kerry's only senior mens soccer cap, a lot of you would say 'John Egan' straight away. Not at all – John Egan is a namely son of a namely father (he has pedigree on both sides, by the way, Mary Egan was as good a footballer and a better soccer player than her husband or any of his brothers and there's a young cousin of John's who wore a Kerry jersey just last year), but he was born and bred in Bishopstown, Co. Cork, and he is rightly proud of those roots too.

The answer is John O'Connell. He was a great Shamrock Rovers and later Dundalk player in the late fifties and early sixties, when domestic soccer was the most popular sport in urban Dublin. He was capped twice by Ireland, the only Kerry native ever to have that honour. Tony O'Connell had no strong roots in Kerry, though, his family had left for Dublin while he was still a baby.

O'Connell was massively influential in Irish soccer. He was a successful businessman and could afford to buy out his own contract from Dundalk in order to become Bohemian's first ever professional. He later invested hugely in the Gypsies, as Bohemians are known, and became their Life President.

Mind you, a Killarney native was very nearly capped more recently. Michael McElhatton was born 1975, the same year as Athlone Town's exploits, in Killarney, where his parents ran a fruit and veg shop (I don't recall it; I was only two years old and very feral at the time). He started off with Derby County, where his family had settled, before Harry Redknapp signed him for Bournemouth. He stayed on when Tony Pulis took over. Former Irish international and current one Matt Holland gave him great encouragement at the time and he was called up for the Irish U21s as Southampton were arranging a £500,000 for this exciting young midfielder. Then a medial ligament snapped in his knee, he received poor medical treatment and worse advice, and his international chance faded away. It took him a long time to get his career back on track with Rushden and Diamonds, but just when he was attracting headlines and international attention again...the knee went again. Michael McElhatton only lived in Killarney for two and a half years, but he has always been very proud of his native town. The welcome mat should always be laid out for one of our unsung heroes.

KERRY LADIES RUGBY TEAM

The announcement that Kerry are putting in a Kerry Ladies Rugby Team with the goal of eventually competing in the AIL is hugely welcome news. Kerry has produced some of Ireland's greatest rugby players and the sport has very strong roots. Ladies sport, thankfully, is at long last starting to get the recognition it deserves. There aren't too many people now who remember when basketball started in St. Marys' Parish Hall back in fifties (the late Weeshie Fogarty was a basketball pioneer in Killarney and one of those who believed that women could compete in sports when it wasn't always popular to do so). They had to wear trousers, because skirts would have been scandalous. As for the idea of women wearing shorts? Go away now and wash out your mouth with soap and water. It sounds ridiculous now. It was always ridiculous - women had to work as hard as any man just to survive in those tough times, but misogynists somehow thought that they were too delicate for sport? - but that was how it was, and you didn't dare deny convention in that Ireland. The likes of Mick Fitzgerald in Castleisland and Alex Rintoul in Fossa did a lot more than just inspire and promote womens' sports and Kerry people of all genders owe them a big debt.

I'm pretty sure that when Kathleen Mills started playing camogie, or the Downey sisters, or even more recently Kerry's own Mai Costelloe started playing camogie, there were plenty of objectors (not all of them men, either). Knowing the fibre of the same players (I know none of them personally), I doubt if any objections lasted long or had much impact.



Girls are well able to play rugby, and play it well. Rugby clubs in Killarney, Tralee, castleisland, Abbeyfeale, and many more have been proving it for a long time. So have the likes of Ciara Griffin, Ciara O'Connor, Ruth O'Reilly, Louise Galvin, Lorraine Scanlon, Edel Murphy, Sharon Lynch, and many more. Siobhan Fleming hails from the same small area as Moss Keane, Mike Galway (he was never 'Mick' among his own people) and the Doyle brothers Tom and Mick. Guess which one of them is a Grand Slam winner? I wish the Kerry Rugby Team all the best going forward and will hopefully be there to support them.

KERRY PITCH AND PUTT

Deerpark's Damien Fleming continues to make the headlines. Last weekend he made it three Scratch Cup wins in as many weeks at Rocklodge before qualifying in Newmarket for the National Strokeplay Qualifiers in Newmarket. 
