

Call for Park users to stick to the rules

t's our go-to place at the moment and how lucky we are to have it, but users of Killarney National Park are bending the rules and a local concerned resident has contacted Killarney Outlook with some concerns.

"As an elder, walking in park for for my daily exercise, I notice how many pairs or groups keep good distance between themselves, but rarely fall back one behind the other ("indian file") when passing a walker on the other side of the path, so that person has to step sideways off the path into ditch or muddy grass to avoid them brushing past", she told Killarney Outlook.

"Walker signs say "keep left", but I begin to think I must be wrong, as so many walkers walk on the right, and seem to believe this is the correct side", she added.

The signs in the park are very clear. They request that all users, keep left and pass on the right. Bring their litter home and listen for bicycle bells.

They urge cyclists to ring their bell and cycle at a safe speed, while they encouage dog walkers to keep dogs on a short lead and clean up after their dogs.

Another concerned citizen has raised the issue of dogs in the park. While we highlighted the



fact that many dogs were off their leads in the park in the Killarney Outlook last month, there seems to be an unwritten rule that as long as you pick up after your dog has done his business, you can leave the bag after you. One Killarney resident sent in a photograph of bags of dog faeces which was left on the steps on the walkway between Millwood Estate on St. Margarets Road and Port Road.

This seems to be an issue not only in the National Park but also throughout the town on the footpaths, which are used by everyone. We are so fortunate to have Killarney National Park on our door step for everyone to enjoy, so adhearing to these little rules can make life easier for everyone.

#### PLAN TO CREATE SEAMLESS TRANSITION

#### BETWEEN THE TOWN AND THE PARK

Killarney is a compact town with over 12,000 of its residents living within a 10 minute cycle of the town centre. This week, Kerry County Council held a public webinar to share their presentation on the new Killarney Cycle Lane Project which will include five new cycle paths.

Kerry County County is currently inviting members of the public to make submissions about the plans for the development of five new cycle paths in Killarney town. The proposed new cycling infrastructure includes cycle paths on Rock Road, Lewis Road, Park Road, the Gaelscoil Road and Deerpark Road.

David Doyle, Senior Engineer at Kerry County Council was introduced at the webinar by Brian Looney head of Digital at KCC.

Mr. Doyle brought the attendees through the project in a clear and concise way and answered questions posed during the webinar at the end. Some of the issues raised was the the speed limits on the roads concerned, the introduction of cycle lanes on main arteries and the introduction new toucan crossings in Killarney. A toucan crossing is the term for a type of pedestrian crossing that also allows bicycles to be ridden across. Since two can, both pedestrians and cyclists, cross together, the name "toucan" was chosen.



Plans in the proposed project include traffic lights at the new cinema on Park Road, the new cycle lanes on Rock Road to include landscaping and trees and a toucan crossing before the Countess Road juction with the roundabout at Park Road. The plan is about linking the town in a safe way

The plan is about linking the town in a safe way for both locals and visitors alike.

The meeting was concluded by Angela McAllen, Killarney Municipal District Manager who thanked everyone for attending.

The Part VIII process for such a development, under the relevant planning legislation, involves the public display of all relevant plans which can be downloaded from the Kerry County Council website.

#### The five proposed cycle paths are as follows:

Rock Road – Car Park northward to N22 Roundabout at Cleeny

Upper Lewis Road – St. Anne's Road junction to south of Bridgefield estate

Park Road – Park Road roundabout to the Friary Junction

Deerpark Road – Park Road junction to Gaelscoil Road junction

Gaelscoil Road – Deerpark road to Killarney Sport & Leisure Centre



#### CLLR. RAISES CONCERN ABOUT DEENAGH RIVER

At the January 2021 monthly meeting of Killarney Municipal District, Councillor Michael Gleeson asked: As the build-up of gravel, earth and general river borne material continues to grow and grow into an ever larger island, now extending into the water channel along which the Deenagh River flows through the second Eye of the Kings Bridge at the Demesne entrance, is any Public Body prepared to undertake pre-emptive work to prevent both Eves of the Bridge gradually but inevitably being, at least partially, blocked? Kerry County Council replied that the Deenagh River forms part of the Killarney National Park, MacGillycuddy Reeks and Caragh River Catchment SAC. Kerry County Council are currently liaising with the Environmental Assessment Unit of Kerry County Council in relation to the works required. Council Gleeson welcomed the reply and stressed the urgency of doing the

necessary work.

Councillor Geeson also asked if Kerry County Council would seek to determine if Irish Water has any immediate intention of completing the Reed Bed Facility in the Western Demesne.

Kerry County Council replied that the Killarney Drainage Area Plan is due for completion by Consulting Engineers in August 2021. The inclusion of an Integrated Constructed Wetland in the wastewater treatment options to be considered for Killarney Town has been suggested to Irish Water in the context of this Drainage Area Plan. Irish Water has been favourably disposed to the use of Integrated Constructed Wetlands in circumstances where these have been feasible and Kerry County Council will continue to advocate for consideration of this option.

#### Vicky for The White House?

An idea posted on social media by Castleisland councillor Charlie Farrelly, Independent is gaining momentum, Charlie wondered if it would be a good idea for Taoiseach Micheal Martin would ask Vicky Phelan if she would feel up to making the short (approx) 50min drive from her base in Maryland to the White House in Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington DC on St. Patrick's Day to present the bowl of Shamrock to the new President Joe Biden.

"I believe it would put an end to all the controversy about whether he should or should not travel during these current Covid 19 restrictions. I also believe it would be a wonderful gesture from the Irish Government", Charlie said.

The idea continues to be a soucre of much comment and has reached the national airwaves, print media and social media platforms.

# SURLIGHT DIFFICIENT SURLING Fáilte Ireland Announces Details Of New €55 Million Scheme

his week, Fáilte Ireland announced details of its new €55million Tourism Business Continuity Scheme. The announcement was made at a special virtual industry event watched by thousands of operators, providers and employers from across the tourism sector on Monday morning.

The allocation was secured by Minister Catherine Martin TD in Budget 2021 and Fáilte Ireland is responsible for developing and administering the scheme.

The scheme will support those tourism businesses that were not eligible for the Covid Restrictions Support Scheme (CRSS) payment or previous Fáilte Ireland continuity grant schemes.

The National Tourism Development Authority also announced its heavyweight domestic marketing plans, investment commitments in outdoor dining and urban animation and its strategic priorities for the year ahead. The event entitled 'Survive to Thrive', provided industry with details of Fáilte Ireland's plans that will help support resilience and survival in the short term and the recovery of the sector in the long-term.

The Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Sport, Gaeltacht and Media, Catherine Martin T.D., delivered the keynote address. Welcoming Fáilte Ireland's priorities, the Minister said:

"I welcome Fáilte Ireland's action plans for 2021 which I am confident will have a positive impact on the industry and will be key to helping it survive and thrive in the year ahead. I allocated €55million to Fáilte Ireland for the Tourism Business Continuity Scheme as part of Budget 2021 and this will be important to help those strategically important tourism businesses that are ineligible for other supports. The Government will continue to assess the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the economy and ensure that appropriate supports are in place. We

are now developing tourism for survival through the pandemic and recovery in the medium and long term." In his address, Fáilte Ireland CEO Paul Kelly announced the main priorities for Fáilte Ireland this year to support the tourism industry. Grant schemes to provide financial assistance, domestic marketing at national and county level, urban outdoor investment, business and employee supports with a special focus on mental health and a new digital transformation programme were unveiled.

"This has been the most challenging year tourism has ever faced. The sector's revenue has declined by a massive €6billion and tens of thousands of jobs have been lost. We are launching the first phase of the €55million Tourism Business Continuity Scheme on February 11th. This will provide those tourism businesses who have not received support through the Covid Restrictions

Support Scheme (CRSS) or previous Fáilte Ireland business continuity schemes, with direct financial assistance.

Domestic tourism will be the first to return and we plan to invest significantly in domestic marketing once domestic tourism can restart. Our research tells us that the 'Keep Discovering' campaign we launched prior to the COVID-19 pandemic resonates even more strongly with people now and we will be rolling the campaign out at both a national and county level to drive domestic tourism when the country re-opens.



#### Govt must accept role of rapid antigen testing in fight against COVID-19 says MEP Kelleher

"It is never the wrong time to do the right thing," says Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher as he called on the government to accept the need for rapid antigen testing in the fight against Covid 19...

"A number of months ago, I called for this type of testing regimen to be rolled out in appropriate settings such as factories, airports, health care facilities, and schools.

"In places where it is harder to avoid large volumes of people being in close proximity to each other, surely rapid antigen testing can lower the risk for everyone. They may not pick up all positive cases but they will pick up some, and remove the risk of further transmission," added the Ireland South MEP.

"For some reason unknown to me, the Department of Health and NPHET have failed to realise the strategic role this type of rapid test can play in catching and suppressing the virus.

"I appreciate that the accuracy of rapid antigen testing is not as high as that of PCR testing. However, the fact is, they do have a role. Many leading scientists and indeed the European Commission itself has advocated for their use.



"Moreover, the World Health Organisation in their interim guidance on this form of testing in September 2020 said, while accepting their lower levels of accuracy said, 'they offer the possibility of rapid, inexpensive and early detection of the most infectious COVID-19 cases in appropriate settings.'

"The facts and evidence around the behaviour

and effects of Covid-19 are continuously changing and it's only right that governments change their minds when that happens.

"I've written to Minister Donnelly requesting a review of the Government position. Every weapon in our arsenal against Covid-19 must be deployed concluded Kelleher.

#### CALLS FOR WORK ON THE OLD KENMARE ROAD

Cllr. Patrick Connor-Scarteen has called on has called on Kerry County Council to outline the extent of works on the Old Kenmare-Killarney road.

He also requested that the council liaise with the NPWS and put in place a plan for a proper cycleway and walkway.

The council replied that as outlined in the Update Report, the Council has been allocated a grant of €200,000 under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme to upgrade the

Old Kenmare Road in the Kenmare MD. The scheme will have a length of 4km and the trail will be finished to an acceptable standard for family and age friendly walking and hiking and possibly mountain biking. The intention is to improve drainage to reduce erosion, regrade and strengthen the road and provide a surface dressed finish where this is possible taking the constraints of the terrain into account.



#### TENANTS STRUGGLING TO BUY FOOD

#### FOR THEMSELVES AND THEIR FAMILIES

The HAP (Housing Assistance Payment) falls far short of rental costs in Kerry, according to a Fianna Fáil Councillor in the county.

Speaking at this month's Municipal District meeting Councillor Michael Cahill said "Tenants in receipt of rent supplement payments are struggling to pay bills and buy food for themselves and their families, because they have to give top-ups to landlords each month". "State payments fall far short of rental costs in Kerry and I am calling on the Minister and the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage to increase as a matter of extreme urgency, the Housing Assistance Payment "said Councillor Cahill.

"Almost half of tenants are struggling to afford bills, buy groceries or provide for childcare and school costs etc" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Many families are falling further into the 'Poverty Trap', with all the hazards and suffering that brings, because of high rental costs. My father always said rent was dead money and he was right. We must provide housing, but we must also ensure our tenants can afford at least a basic standard of living" added Councillor Cahill.

"The Simon Community recently released its "Locked Out" report which states that 'Six of the 16 study areas did not have a single property available within either standard of discretionary HAP limits in any of the four family categories, while 95% of properties available within HAP limits were in Dublin'. The charity warns that a persistent and chronic lack of affordable housing supply will continue to drive some people into homelessness. This proves the need to deal with this issue is now long overdue" stated Councillor Cahill.

Motion No.3.Cllr. M. Cahill: That Kerry



County Council call on the Minister and the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage to increase as a matter of extreme urgency the Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) as Tenants in receipt of rent supplement payments are struggling to pay bills and buy food for themselves and their families because they have to give top-ups to landlords each month as State payments fall far short of rental costs. This matter needs to be addressed ASAP as almost half of all Tenants struggle to pay the bills, buy groceries or cover childcare and school costs, etc.

**Reply:** This is a matter for Resolution by Members. A Resolution on this matter was adopted at the January Council Meeting.

Applicants who are experiencing financial difficulty with paying the balance of their monthly rent may apply for a discretionary increase in these limits up to a maximum of 20%. Each case is individually assessed, and a decision is taken based solely on the individual household's financial circumstances.

To date since the introduction of the Housing Assistance Payment scheme in Kerry in December 2016 a total of 2133 HAP tenancies have been set up with a total of 1623 active tenancies at the 31/12/2020. There were 607 new HAP tenancies set up during 2020.

A total of 905 HAP accommodated households applied and received a discretionary top up to their HAP payment and of these, 751 have received the full 20% top-up. There are currently 131 active HAP tenancies in the Kenmare MD. For the information of the Members the following is relevant information on the current situation.

The HAP limits for all Local Authority areas are set out in Circular 10/2017.

The HAP limits for Kerry are as follows

- (1) One adult in shared accommodation €200
- (2) A couple in shared accommodation €230
- (3) One adult €380
- (4) A couple €410
- (5) One adult, or a couple, with 1 child €52
- (6) One adult, or a couple, with 2 children €550 (7) One adult, or a couple, with 3 children €575 Councillor Cahill said "The HAP limits are more than double in Dublin and vary from 50% to 80% higher in Cork. I have examined the limits across every county throughout the country and to my disbelief I found that we are in a similar bracket to Sligo, Donegal, Tipperary and Clare

The limits for County Kerry are amongst the lowest in the country and this needs to be addressed as a matter of extreme urgency."

#### Kerry Airport eligible to apply for €21.3 million

#### under new Regional Airports Programme

Education Minister Norma Foley TD has welcomed the announcement yesterday, February 4th, that Kerry Airport is eligible to apply for funding under the Regional Airports Programme which has a budget of €21.3 million for 2021.

The focus of the programme is to help Ireland's regional airports to maintain regulatory compliance in the areas of safety and security during Covid 19 restrictions.

Funding will be also be made

available to encourage airports to reduce emissions and to build resilience against the likely impacts of climate change.

Minister Foley said: "I welcome this funding at a time when our regional airport has been hit hard by the impacts of Covid 19. Kerry airport plays a crucial role in the connectivity of the region and it is imperative that Government support is provided during this pandemic."





# Castleisland man in the run for an Oscar nomination

Kerry writer and director Shaun O'Connor is in contention for an Oscar nomination, after securing a place on the Academy Awards' 2021 longlist.

His short film 'A White Horse' tells the story of a scared and confused young girl in 1970s Ireland who enters a phone booth and rings home. Her parents are waiting for the call, and the conversation slowly reveals a hidden truth. 'A White Horse' stars Cora Fenton (The Young Offenders) and newcomer Amber Deasy, and was made with the Screen Directors Guild of Ireland ARRI Take Award. Filmed in Cork city and county, the story explores how mental hospitals were once used as catch-alls for people considered 'troublesome' or 'abnormal'. Among the accolades garnered to date, 'A White Horse' won the award for Best Irish Short at the Foyle Film Festival in November 2019 recognition that has led to a coveted place on the longlist for the 2021 Oscars.

Shaun, who is from Castleisland is a UCC graduate of the MA in Film Studies Class of



2006, was inspired to explore this subject after discovering that gay conversion therapy was widespread in the British Isles in the 60's and 70's, and incredibly, is still legal in the UK and Ireland.

The director said his time in UCC had a formative impact on his successful career:

"The team and I behind 'A White Horse' are thrilled with the success of the film. Even though it's an Irish story, it's been amazing to see how much audiences around the world have responded to it," Shaun said.

"At Irish festival screenings we inevitably had people approach us afterwards to tell us how they related to the film, either in terms of their own past experiences or that of family members. To have the film speak to people like that, and also do so well on the international stage, has been incredibly gratifying.

"My time at UCC was pivotal in my filmmaking career. Doing the MA in Film Studies there introduced me to so much film history and gave me new ways to interpret and appreciate the medium. It was a formative experience.

And the college, course and lecturers have all been incredibly supportive of my work in the years since," he said.

Dan O'Connell, Head of the Department of Film and Screen Media congratulated Shaun on his accolade.

"We couldn't be happier for Shaun. Though he finished his studies with us many years ago, he is still a familiar face on campus both as a practitioner who shares his expertise through masterclasses and as a keen attendee at our many conferences and workshops. # PUBLIC URGED TO GET HEALTH CONCERNS CHECKED

With the news that one in four people did not attend a GP or hospital appointment when they needed to during the lockdown of March-June 2020, the public are being urged to contact their GP if concerned about symptoms.

February 4th this week, was World Cancer Day and the Irish Cancer Society and RTÉ's Marty Morrissey are urging people to contact their doctor if they are concerned about symptoms that may indicate cancer. The Your Health Matters campaign aims to increase awareness of the importance of early detection and encourage those concerned about symptoms



to contact their doctor. HSE data shows that the number of suspected cancer cases referred through the Healthlink e-referral system dropped by more than 50% after the first wave of the pandemic.

RTÉ broadcaster Marty Morrissey whose close friend's daughter passed away from cancer this year said, "I don't know about you but my guess is, most of us are the same. Maybe we noticed something that doesn't feel right but instead of contacting our doctor, we put it on the long finger hoping it will go away on its own. But this year, even with everything that's going on, it's important to check it out.

If it's clear that's fantastic but if it's not, an early diagnosis could make all the difference. Don't delay in contacting your doctor, they'll want to hear from you. Or try calling the Irish Cancer Society Support Line to speak to a nurse. Your health matters and so do you. Please...Make your health a priority".

Early detection is crucial to successful treatment of cancer. Contact your GP today to arrange an appointment. If you have difficulties getting through to your GP call the Irish Cancer Society's Support Line on 1800 200 700 to speak with a registered nurse. Visit www. cancer.ie for more information.

#### Jane's Story

Jane Jackson, 46, underwent skin cancer treatment during the covid-19 pandemic "It was my dental hygienist who spotted it – a mole at the back of my neck. She suggested I have it looked at, but after speaking with my husband, Roy, we both agreed to keep an eye on it, as we thought it looked fine. However, some months later Roy noticed it had started to change so I made an appointment to see my GP. Despite the pandemic I was seen the same day I made the call. The GP immediately made an appointment for me days later at the

dermatology department of the local hospital. I was anxious about how seriously the GP was taking this, and I was also very worried about going to the hospital in the middle of the health crisis.

It was decided at that appointment that the mole be removed immediately and sent for testing. Days later I was called back to the hospital and was told that the mole was a cancerous melanoma and that I had stage 1b skin cancer. I cried when I was told. My doctor was so kind and apologised for her mask and that social distancing meant she couldn't comfort me and that I couldn't have someone with me. Since then I've undergone further

testing and had more skin and lymph nodes removed. I now have to have full skin checks every 12 weeks as there is a 70% chance of recurrence.

My advice to others who are concerned about symptoms at this time is to just get them checked out with their doctor. Melanoma can spread quickly, so I'm glad it was caught when it was, but if I had acted when the mole was first noticed I could have saved myself a lot of pain and anxiety. Once you make the call your doctor will start the process for you. They'll make sure you receive the treatment you need, regardless of the current situation. All you have to do is pick up the phone."

#### It's 'Time to Talk' with ALONE

LONE, the organisation which supports older people, is encouraging older people to reach out and strike up a conversation especially if they are feeling particularly isolated at the moment due to the extension of COVID-19 restrictions.

The organisation has campaigned in this area for many years and are highlighting the concerns they have when it comes to loneliness, as its effects take hold and expand across a wider and new cohort of older people. ALONE are concerned by the increased impact loneliness is having which they can measure in their increased demand for their supports. Today, they are asking the public to continue to make time to talk and stay in touch with their older relatives, neighbours and friends.



#### Supporting older people to age at home

While ALONE acknowledges that current guidelines are in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and protect vulnerable groups, ALONE have already reported an increase in a wide range of mental health impacts among older people. The organisation has relayed the message that although we may be socially distanced, we don't want anyone to feel

socially isolated. With many of these growing issues having been identified pre-pandemic, older people have now been experiencing prolonged periods of isolation and limited social contact for almost one year. ALONE would like to remind older people that their services continue to be available to any older person who needs advice or support during this time.

#### Primary Schools and Home Schooling

Hi! My name is Grainne Kelliher, I am 12 years old. I am in sixth class at Fossa National School. Like you, I am learning from home for the second time since March 2020. Home-schooling seems more organised second time around. Teacher posts daily work on Google classroom with explanation notes, videos and helpful online sites. We can post a comment or question on Google Class and she always responds. We present a project at our weekly Friday Zoom meeting.

This is new to us and gives us the opportunity to be virtually together as a class. We get the chance to catch up at the end of these sessions.

I really look forward to that, it is great fun! It also motivates me to keep working as there are so many distractions at home. When in school we would learn and say a prayer everyday together in preparation for our Confirmation, it was exciting looking forward to it. Now we are preparing individually at home and it does not feel the same. I am lucky that I can do my school work from home with help from my Teacher and parents.

However, school is much more than reading and writing, certain home-school activities are harder to achieve or not possible when both parents are working (one from home) and not always available to assist. Also, the fun we have in class, games at break-time, competitions, sports days, Green School activities, dress-up days, shows and school tours are important to me but not possible while learning from home.

Most of all, I miss the contact and it feels much harder second time around.

#### Lockdown from an **Alexandria Carlton** point of View

This time last year, I didn't know what the word "lockdown" was but now it's all I hear about. Sixth class in lockdown was a daunting thought at first but now that I have grown accustomed to it, it's not so bad. Lockdown 1 with my family was a bit wild. It was stuffy with 3 kids all trying to manage homework and assignments. Now in lockdown number 2, it's calmer, a bit calmer anyway! My sister is in fifth year, so she is busy with studying. My brother is in third year, so he has lots to do with work and studying in such strange times like these. He doesn't seem to be too stressed anyway!

I am in sixth class and the workload is manageable. Since I had a full term of sixth class completed in school, I had time to be comfortable with harder work. It's cruel isn't it.!! My teacher, Mrs. Murphy asks for a photo of our work. On Fridays, we do zoom calls. We often do projects

during the week and present them on Friday. The first project we were assigned was on WW1. That one was quite interesting, I enjoyed doing it. We also did a Kerry project just last week. That was much easier as I already knew a lot about my own county. I like the zoom calls as they let me catch up with my classmates.

Something that I miss about school is P.E as well. It's fun to get outside with friends to exercise and get fresh air. I can still go outside for walks with my dogs and things, but it's not the same as doing it with friends. It's the little things I miss. Moving on from boring schoolwork (sorry Mrs. Murphy!) activities I like to do to keep myself busy in these awful times are art and gaming, yes gaming! I have been doing art for as long as I can remember. I have a whole row of drawers beside my desk just for paints. I like painting everything, from landscapes to people. It's something fun that I enjoy doing casually. I paint and I draw. Recently, I have been drawing more. I try to be as creative as possible.

I play gaming with my friends Dean and Ciaran. We play a lot! I love gaming just like my brother. And I'm definitely very quiet whilst doing it as well!

I like to keep in contact with my other friends Eabha and Trina just by texting them and sending them funny videos. I really wish I could do something with them but unfortunately, I can't. I also like to go horse riding which has been temporarily cancelled. I used to go every Friday. I loved doing so much and I can't wait to get back to it. It can be upsetting that I can't, but I know it's for everyone's safety.

In conclusion, lockdown sucks. Don't like it and it's frustrating, for everyone. Bring on the vaccines!

#### MORE THAN 50% OF CANDIDATES GET BETTER RESULTS IN DEFERRED LEAVING CERT,

but what's the plan for the 2021 State exams?



The State Examinations Commission (SEC) released the results of the deferred Leaving Cert, Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and Junior Cycle exams on Tuesday. Although 2600 candidates registered, only 2202 turned up for the deferred exams. 2155 of those were Leaving Cert candidates. The candidates sat an average of two subjects each. 1136 candidates, or just over 50%, were awarded higher grades than their calculated grades in one or more subject. Of the overall grades awarded, 39% were higher than, 28% were the same as and 34% were lower than the calculated grades awarded in September.

Candidates who sat the Leaving Cert exam have access to an appeals process. They can access their actual marks and component marks from 9am, Wed. 3rd Feb. They can apply to view their scripts from 9am, Wed., 3rd Feb. to 5pm, Thurs., 4th Feb. They can view their scripts from noon, Tues., 9th Feb. to noon, Wed., 10th Feb. They can apply to appeal their results from 9am, Tues., 9th Feb. to 5pm, Fri., 12th Feb.

The SEC has provided the Central Applications Office (CAO) with the Leaving Cert results for candidates who haven't Calculated Grades. For candidates with Calculated Grades and who also sat Leaving Cert 2020, the CAO was notified of the higher subject grade achieved between the Calculated Grade and the written exam. Leaving Cert students who are entitled to a higher CAO offer on foot of these results, will receive a deferred college offer for the 2021/22 academic year. Colleges making improved offers to students will be in contact with them during the week commencing 8th February.

In order to take up a deferred offer, students must submit a 2021 CAO application. Formal CAO offers of deferred places will be issued in July. If a student, who has started first year of a course, is now entitled to a higher CAO offer following the written exam and chooses to accept this offer in the 2021/22 academic year, she/he will remain eligible for free fees and SUSI funding, as appropriate, for the first year on the new course. Meanwhile, it appears that a decision on the format of this year' state exams is imminent. The longer the schools remain closed the less likelihood of the standard Leaving Cert exam going ahead in June. Leaving Cert students missed out on about twelve weeks of in-person teaching last year and have not returned to school at all after Christmas. With the virus still rampant it's unlikely that students will be back in class for a few more weeks.

The Junior Cycle exam is likely to be a casualty of the coronavirus again this year as it would be impossible under social distancing regulations to accommodate both Junior and Leaving Cert candidates simultaneously. Taoiseach Micheál Martin gave a strong indication in media interviews last Sunday that a hybrid combination of calculated grades and a modified written Leaving Cert exam is the preferred option of Government. It seems that three options are under serious consideration. The first is the hybrid combination of calculated grades and a modified written exam. The second is a calculated grades model fairly similar to last year while the third option seems to be a standard Leaving Cert exam, but deferred for a few months. However, students and their families need immediate clarity to reduce their anxiety and stress levels.

Meanwhile, applications to CAO have reached record levels. By normal closing date of 1st February, 79,303 applications were received by CAO, well ahead of the 73,035 at the same time last year. With the addition of late applications to

CAO later in the year, the number of applicants in 2021 will be well over 80,000.

#### A Thought and Feeling





#### When Can You Access Your Pension & What Are Your Options When You Want to Retire?

## **BREATHING PROPERLY** WHEN RUNNING Part 2

On longer runs I would use the 1'2'3'4 technique which is for every four steps count 1..2..3..4 & repeat, again it keeps your breathing nice and steady, keeps you focused, takes your mind off everything else.

Also if you're running with a partner and chatting loads that can have an impact on your breathing so save the chats for the warm up & cool down.

Take notice of your stride length. Notice if it is too long, almost overreaching. This can cause havoc with your breathing as your body is reaching outside of its natural parameters and it's difficult to control a nice breathing pattern pace. We would advise keeping your steps within your body range, or think of it like running with your entire body rather than running with your body following your legs. Make sure your legs are underneath you, your core is engaged and your shoulders are over your hips. Sometimes we refer to it as pretending you are jogging on broken glass or hot coals, so you have a nice medium length stride that doesn't make you land hard and allows you to control the movements of your diaphragm and breathing.

Make sure your clothing is well fitted but not so tight around your ribs that you cant breath properly. This is especially the case for women when choosing a sports bra. Wearing a high impact shock absorber is good but not too tight that it interferes with your running efficiency.

## REDUCING THE STRESS OF THE NATION DURING COVID

Hundreds of hours of free training are being offered by members of the Irish Society of Alexander Technique Teachers (ISATT) to help people deal with the tidal wave of stress caused by COVID.

ISATT members work extensively with people dealing with stress and anxiety, especially in the field of stage performance, helping them learn very effective coping skills. Amongst actors who have praised the technique are Hugh Jackman and John Cleese.

The Alexander Technique is an internationally proven method which teaches people how to change faulty postural habits, thereby enabling improved mobility and posture while relieving tension and stress.

As a result of covid, ISATT members were prompted to offer free stress and anxiety webinars after reading that a reported 170,000,000 doses of antidepressants had been prescribed in the first 9 months of last year.

Niall Kelly of ISATT says, "The increase in prescribing rates is being largely attributed to the challenges that have been posed by the repeated lockdowns, and the disruption in all of our lives. Unfortunately, there is also a reported reduction in, or absence of, psychological counselling services to the public. Working collectively, we have put together a specific programme that can help people in dealing with the extra every day stress that has crept into our lives."

A panel of Alexander Technique teachers will provide a number of 30 minutes online sessions free of charge. They will focus on four crucial coping skills for managing and reducing anxiety and stress, regardless of the source. ISATT is also setting up a podcast to increase the availability of the sessions, both as audio webinars and recorded podcasts. Niall Kelly added, "People should always follow medical advice, and anyone prescribed medication by their doctor should complete their course. These webinars are designed to help people before they reach a stage where medical intervention is needed. #### **RATHMORE PARISH COVID-19 - UPDATE**

The new Covid regulations will remain in place until March 5th 2021. These regulations have the following implications for religious services,

- 1. Public worship may take place only online or through the use of remote means.
- 2. Baptisms: Save for cases of emergency, baptisms are postponed until further notice.
- 3. Church Opening: Churches remain open for private worship. All those attending church for private worship or for the purposes of cleaning the church must wear face masks or face coverings.
- 4. House visits/First Friday visits should not take place save for cases of emergency or where it is necessary to minister to the sick or dying.
- 5. Updated guidelines on Funerals Attendance at funerals is to be restricted to 10. We too look forward to when that number can be increased. 6. No removal to the church the evening before. People not attending the funeral liturgy should avoid congregating immediately outside the church building or around the hearse. Guard of Honour should not form or congregate on church grounds. 7. For the sake of the great majority trying to keep to the public health guidelines, we ask people, difficult as it is, not to approach the bereaved in the church grounds or cemetery to sympathize. 8. As per the public health guidelines regarding social and family gatherings, there should be no wakes or large gatherings for prayers in the house of the deceased nor gatherings in cemeteries. 9. Support for the bereaved can be expressed through social media as an alternative to attending the funeral. Often it is possible to link to a local church for a funeral ceremony via a webcam/Facebook Live. 





#### **RTE SPORTS** PERSONALITY OF THE YEAR

Well, we've had our first little whiff of sulphur and scandal in sports for 2020. Was Katie Taylor a worthy winner of the RTE Sports Personality of the Year Award? Should we be marching in the streets? Or writing strongly worded letters to the Irish Times, at least? Possibly looking for a quick mention in the Dáil? I think we should.

Sam Bennett demands justice - not in an in-your-face kind of way, you understand, he actually comes across as quite a classy individual, but it's not really about him anyway. Look, by the time that you read this, the whole ball of media-driven nonsense will have thankfully evaporated into the ether.

RTE is actually a good service, considering how they are pinched for resources compared to the BBC (who are brilliant, easily the best in the world). The RTE Sports Personality of the Year, like the IRMA Awards and, oh may we be spared, the IFTAS.

RTE tends to have its inner coterie, well paid and not always shining talents - Amy Huberman comes across as a lovely person, but she contrasts with the likes of the great Dermot Morgan or lesser luminary Brendan O'Carroll in terms of comedic talent, but RTE have given her contracts the boys never received from the national broadcaster. I'm honestly not having any digs here.

RTE do most things right, but the idea that their Sports Personality of the Year Award was some kind of institutional and authoritative statement is simply nonsense of the sort Joe Brolly, a nice but over-exciteable man, used to spout during GAA games.

The 2020 candidates were good choices. Meath jockey Colin O'Brien won the Irish Oaks and the 2000 Guineas as well as the Breeders' Cup on Tarnawa. Champion flat jockey for the second time. You can't argue with those credentials, in all fairness.

Ciaran Kilkenny is one of the most talented footballers in that awesome Dublin team, he scored 1-20 from play in five championship games. He's also a brilliant and dedicated hurler (I remember talking about him when he was fourteen, genuinely). His nomination was a formality, in my opinion, and frankly I am a big admirer of him as an individual.

Likewise Gearoid Hegarty in the hurling. Kilkenny were so dominant for so long it was actually detrimental to hurling as a spectacle for the general public; but the emergence of the likes of Galway, Clare, resilient Waterford, etc have probably made it the most consistently exciting sport of them all in recent years. Hegarty lit up the hurling championship

like few players ever have this year (I'll whisper it, Tadhg De Burca was an actual sporting highlight of the year in his own right for me; I honestly just loved watching him this year). Hegarty was an automatic on the shortlist.

Sanita Purspure added a European gold to her two World titles.

I keep going back to that in rowing; Kerry have Olympians in the sport and World Champions. Monika is right up there with Sanita (they tried doubles together; they literally operate at an elite level of talent). I was lucky enough to have the late and great John Kelly talk to me about the history of rowing in Killarney and it dwarfs anything else we have got (yes, including GAA) in terms of tradition.

John had that wonderful joy and appreciation of Killarney's sporting and cultural traditions and I never met a more generous man for sharing his fabulous wealth of knowledge. Thanks to him in particular, I've always had and always will have a soft spot for the rowing, tough sport that it is.

All of those were worthy contenders, and noone had any issue whatsoever about that. The soccer team that failed to qualify for...eh well, anything, and the rugby team that came third out of six nations can't really complain.

I did think that the gymnast, Rhys Cleneghan, might be in with a shout, but 2020 was obviously an in between year for him like so many others. We had no golfer really click on any headlights this year either; it happens.

The last contender aside from the winner was cyclist Sam Bennett. This guy had some year. I mean, truly phenomenal. Won and held the Green jersey, the first Irish cyclist to do so since Sean Kelly in 1989 all the way on the Tour de France. Coincidentally, the only two Irishmen to achieve the feat both hail from Carrick-on-

The holding of the green jersey was as impressive as the getting it in the first place; Bennett showed character there when a lot expected the relative Irish unknown to fold pretty easily, he did the exact opposite before winning the final stage at the Champs-Élysées. This is a true annus mirabilis.

Katie Taylor is someone who lifted this nation. In terms of overall impact as a female athlete (and 2020 was meant to be the year that we both celebrate and promote female sports), I put her second only to Sonia O'Sullivan (in fairness, if I start listing the Kerry legends, we'd be here all day, I'd reckon Niamh O'Sullivan would top my own list) in national terms.

But Katie, in my own opinion, did not have a 2020 that really put her in brighter headlights than usual, despite fastening her grip on her deserved world number one rating and sealing her grip on a belt that's nearly bigger than she is. She did it with the same brilliant class as always.

Those were two great fights, real deals, against Delfine Persoon and Amanda Serrano, two class acts in their own right. But I didn't feel any boxing world shaking.

Sports Personality of the Year? It should obviously have been Bennett. Instead, just to nicely salt the little barb, they actually managed somehow to even get his photograph wrong. In fairness, that's bad. That's the kind of mistake that really, really doesn't do any Irish sport any favours.

Cue outrage. The usual have-a-go heroes ready to stand and call for heads to roll. Cycling, they thunder, deserves better than this. We have a lot of these people, unfortunately, and far too few Sam Bennetts. As you might imagine, the kind of guy who is a dedicated professional and is actually a big deal in a big out-there world where real achievements make him stand out, did not so much as flicker a hair at RTE's faux pas.

It's not a big deal, it's not a controversy. But Sam Bennett has got as much personality and quality as anyone in Irish sports, and that should be the simple lesson that we all come away with



### **KERRY CAPTAINCY**

It isn't common – in fact it has been extremely rare over the course of Kerry's sporting history, for one club to have the captaincy of two Kerry senior teams. This year, however, Rathmore have that rare honour, with Paul Murphy captaining the Senior Men and Aislinn Desmond captaining the Senior Ladies.

In fact, their great East Kerry Championship rivals of the past decade, Dr. Crokes, also had that honour relatively recently, with Gavin White and Amanda Brosnan the respective captains.

It would probably have happened in camogie back in the day – you'd also have had husband and wife possible captaincies with the likes of the famous Geaneys Mary and Dr. Dave in Castleisland or that great North Kerry duo of Mick Finucane (gaelic football, though Mick was a genius at many sports and a gentleman with every one of them) and his first wife Peggy, a great camogie player.

Killarney Legion certainly had the honour of dual captaincy - in fact, it's

sometimes forgotten that the great Johnny Culloty in his annus mirabilis of 1969 when he lifted the Bishop Moynihan, Neilus Flynn, and Sam Maguire, was not the only dual player on that great Killarney team – if nothing else, his brother Mickey was as stylish a hurler as you could hope to see as well. Look, I never bought into this idea that having the Executive rather than the County Champions select the captain would have any real impact on Kerry's prospects against Dublin – it quite frankly struck me as a lame attempt at misdirection, they have clearly been beating us with football, not magical leadership. Kerry have had no shortage of leaders; do you think that this will be the first year that Paul, or of course Aislinn, inspire their teams?

#### JOE PAT PRUNTY


There have been some absolutely brilliant lrish sports books over the years.

I believe that I have mentioned the likes of Kieran Shannon's 'Hanging from the Rafters' and English's 'Stand Up and Fight: When Munster Beat the All Blacks' before. Joe Pat Prunty would seem initially an odd choice for a book, and in fact the recent book on his life 'Joe Pat Prunty: A Lifetime of Football, Fields and Faith', covers a much wider and I must say, more interesting range than just sports (all the good ones do) but it is a brilliant addition to the canon nonetheless. I don't bother with damnation of faint praise or any of that, by the way. I have had no hesitation in calling out some of the recent sports autobiographies by Kerry footballers as fairly poor (Donaghy and Galvin's are exceptions to the general rule of blandness; Denis Coughlan of Cork's is a recent classic). The rest? Don't bother, and I sincerely mean that.

Joe Pat grew up on a 50 acre farm in Offaly in the 1930s – those of you with the slightest awareness of Irish history will be aware of how much fun and how easy a living that was at the time! It was even less fun in a wet, boggy Offaly than in the likes of Kerry. Joe Pat was already skilled at getting the best out of bad ground as a young man in his twenties and he kept learning all his life; it was to stand him in good stead.

The 1950s brought a transformation. TK Whitaker and Sean Lemass' economic reforms opened up farming markets, De Valera's nonsensical economic war with our biggest market and closest neighbours was finally abandoned.

Irish farms found external markets, supermarkets started to make shopping that much easier for a rising middle class who could now afford it, and machinery like



the tractor made life so much easier. Joe Pat Prunty, a man steeped in that way of life but with the rare ability to see beyond it, was a man made for such times.

He was working two tractors full time for local farms by now, beat the great ploughman Bill Cassidy in a National Ploughing competition which (then as now) is still a great way for farmers to stay up to speed with the latest machinery, and bought a machine for clearing ditches.

Meanwhile, the new Irish prosperity was leading to a social boom as well. With the awful drag of emigration no longer the only future for Ireland's young people, sports clubs, especially of course the GAA (soccer was mostly city-based and the FAI were as sharp and efficient back then as now, let's just be nice) were central. Take a look at how many GAA clubs were actually founded in the late fifties, early sixties; they simply couldn't keep the people before. JP Prunty was a great

GAA man himself, winning four Fermanagh championships with Roslea Shamrocks. In 1959 he was part of a Junior team who shocked none other than Kerry in the Home Final. That Kerry team included two well known local names, none other than Jackie Looney of Dr. Crokes and Jimmy Redpath of Killarney Legion.

His business was growing. He joined with inventor Cecil Moffat to invent the Mini-Trencher, which could pack ground and make better ditches than ever before. Agriculturist John Mulgueen showed him how to experiment with sand to make for soil that could take pressure - less crucial for crops or cattle but vital for playing pitches. It was, quite literally, a revolution. Over the next four decades, Joe Pat Prunty would be responsible for transforming hundreds of pitches all over Ireland and England. He was awarded an MBE by Queen Elizabeth for his services in sport, that's not something they do lightly. Could you imagine Joe Pat Prunty joining Freddie Flintoff or David Beckham for a pint? Funny enough, now that I actually think about it, yes, I actually could. He was that sort of man.

It was Michael O'Connor, who as Chairman of Bord na bPairceanna in the seventies, ensured that a lot of pitches were purchased and invested as GAA trusts. It was a move that was decades ahead of its time and, like many most successful projects, never got the praise it actually deserved over the years.

It was Michael and Dan Kelliher (whose expertise was fashioned in some of the most famous grass in Ireland, that of Muckross House and Gardens) who met with Joe Pat Prunty in Wynn's Hotel in Dublin. Decades earlier, one 'Small' Jer O'Leary, another great Crokes stalwart, had met with one Frank Dineen among others in Wynn's Hotel and helped broker the GAA purchase of the old

athletic grounds on Jones' Rd. You know it nowadays as Croke Park.

Dan Kelliher was kind enough to speak to me about his and Michael's historic meeting with JP Prunty. "The Prunty Pitch cost over £70,000. It was a huge decision and fair play to the committee. Myself and Michael O'Connor brought up sample sods to the committee to explain what we were talking about. Shortly afterwards we signed the contract in Wynn's Hotel in Dublin and it was all systems go. Joe Prunty did the design and the late John Mulqueen was the soil scientist -we became great friends after."

The Fitzgerald Stadium was the first Prunty Pitch in Munster. It remains the most iconic. We owe Pat Joe Prunty an awful lot.

There is a growing push to revive a project to build a social and historical museum at the Fitzgerald Stadium. I won't lie; I cross-referenced the numbers visiting Muckross House and gardens and the County Museum in Tralee before and the decline in visitor footfall over a decade was alarming,

to say the least. We do need to accept the fact at the start that this project will not be remotely self-sustaining. It won't even come close; I have no doubts about that.

But so what? Why does money always have to be the bottom line? Killarney has always been flaithful in regards to investing in tourism and generally that policy has reaped good long term benefits.

I would, of course, love to see the likes of the Aras Padraig back hosting a revived Tops of the Town and the likes - they were fantastic days and recent talent shows have demonstrated a huge appetite for such things. A museum that celebrates our sporting past and GAA glories (I've seen more than one well-known bandwagoner suggest piggy-backing his preferred sports onto the project, that kind of greed can rapidly kill a project like this stone dead) would be hugely welcomed and would, in my opinion, fill a void that has been shamefully neglected in Kerry.

Have you heard the stories of how Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan eschewed tactics and just stuck to rigid positioning? Because it's nonsense; he was a far more astute man than that. Kerry famously had one of the first managers of any GAA team in Mick O';Dwwyer in 1975 - elected selectors outranked trainers up to that point. And it was an effective system in many ways. Do you know the many, many incarnations of the County Championships and how players could play themselves onto the Kerry team with their displays (I often think that our development pathways are actually a bit too streamlined nowadays)?

All of these are debates that I think could enhance our appreciation of the contribution of the GAA to our social as well as our sporting history (and the links to politics, educational development, the clergy, gaelic language and culture. People have no real idea how much the GAA influenced Kerry society, and a local museum would help to remind us who we are....and help us to re-ignite that fire; we could do with that kind of warmth nowadays. I really hope this project gets off the ground; a lot depends on the County Board, of course





## LONELINESS

As social beings, we are hard wired to connect and most of us feel the need for rewarding social contact and relationships. Loneliness is the feeling we get when our need for this type of contact is not met. This is especially significant at this time when we have been asked to stay at home. Loneliness of course is not the same as being alone. We may choose to be alone and live very happy lives without much contact with others. Or indeed we may have much online social contact, and yet feel very lonely. Loneliness can have a significant impact on our mental health and can contribute to mental health problems, such as anxiety and depression. Loneliness can have many different causes and affects people in different ways. Some people feel ionely due to their personal circumstances (e.g. moving to a new area, loss or bereavement). For others however, loneliness can be a deeper more constant feeling that comes from within.

Connecting with the world around us can be a great way to combat loneliness. This may be having a small conversation with the cashier when we pay for our groceries or saying hello to someone we meet in the street. Phoning or sending an email to family and friends can be a good reminder that we do have people in our lives.


Our brain can try to make sense of the feeling of loneliness by telling us things such as 'It is because nobody loves me' or 'There is something wrong with me. These thoughts are not facts - and can make us feel worse. Thus it is important to accept how we are feeling without overreacting. When we feel lonely, the tendency might be to withdraw into ourselves and this can be counterproductive. The healthiest thing to do if we are feeling lonely is to reach out and cultivate friendships. Reaching out can be difficult and at times we will resist it. However, think of it in the way you might approach exercising - whilst we may feel tired or lazy it is a beneficial thing to do. We need to tackle loneliness one step at a time. It may involve finding a new hobby or joining a club or exercise class. Another skillful way to combat feelings of loneliness is to volunteer as it's a great way to meet new people and also to learn new skills.

Loneliness is a profoundly human emotion and a signal that our need for connection is going unmet.

As children many of us were terrorised by the threat of the 'boogie man' but we can still be dealing with that type of fear only now it arises in a different format.

The sense of out of control fear and overwhelming stress in the atmosphere right now because of Covid, is aggravating difficulties preventing good sleep. If this describes you listen, you are not alone. This is something many people struggle with during difficult seasons in life. It is a horrible feeling to be woken up by a nightmare, or to not be able to drift off into sleep because of fretting and being consumed by irrational fears that seem so real.

So how do we deal with fear? Bring it to God. Talk to Him and ask Him to reveal His love and peace to you. This will come through the study of His Word. Fear is the opposite of faith so work on your faith in God. How? By taking His Word which is His promises to you and applying them to your circumstances. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God." (Romans 10:17) A good place to start strengthening your faith and displacing fear is in the book of Psalms. King David wrote many of these inspired by the Spirit of God, but they were not all written when he was in a positive frame of mind. Very often they were cries from the heart when he was overwhelmed with terror. "What time I am afraid, I will trust in You" (Psalm 56:3).

Pray - Lord Jesus, I ask You to come into my life as my Lord. I ask You to fill me with Your peace. You are my Shield, the Lifter of my head. I will lie down and sleep sweetly for You will protect me. (Psalm 3:3-6; Proverbs 3:24). I renounce all fear and trust You instead. In Jesus Name I pray, Amen.

#### FOCUS ON EARLY SPRING

Now is a good time if you are planning a new garden or trying to add some colour to an established garden to plant some early flowering spring shrubs. One of the best known shrubs is the Camellia and these popular shrubs are starting to flower in most places at the moment. The Camellia is a very valuable shrub in the garden as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green leaves and showy blooms from early spring. A lot of people think that Camellias are a difficult shrub to grow, but in fact they are no more difficult than Rhododendrons or azaleas, and most varieties on sale now are hardy. When choosing the spot to plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix plenty of moss peat with the earth, rather than on its own around the plant, as it will tend to root out. quicker. Camellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Camellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Camellias only to prune out old dead wood, clean up the old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of the plants every spring with some moss peat. There are a lot of other good spring flowering shrubs here is a list of just a few: Forsythia, Cythisus, Corylus, Berberis, Darwunnii, Ribes and

## CALL FOR CLAMPDOWN ON RUBBISH DUMPING
