The train has left the station in terms of climate change and Killarney has to act fast to get ahead of it, a prominent local businessman has stressed.

Tricel managing director, Mike Stack, is spearheading a Killarney Tourism Chamber of and Commerce sub-committee on sustainability which is aimed at trying to make Killarney the most sustainable town in Ireland with a number of projects already up and running.

He was speaking at a public meeting at promoting sustainable businesses and promoting carbon and cost reductions.

Fáilte Ireland unveiled its climate action programme at the meeting held in the Killarney Avenue Hotel which was attended by over 70 local business interests

Mr Stack outlined how his family run business is reacting to the climate challenge and they opted to go down the solar route a few years back by installing 784kw of solar panels on the roof of the factory buildings and plant at Tiernaboul.

In March 2022 they were fully operational and they will be fully paid for by March 2025 and it covers about a fifth of the electricity used in the factory which operates 24 hours a day, six days a week.

"It's not just about the big picture projects. We run projects every year to reduce the amount of waste we produce and electricity we use," Mr Stack said.

He said investing in solar, in heat pumps or wind and using less electricity, less oil, less transport and less waste is going to make businesses more profitable in time. Mr Stack said his involvement with the Chamber is aimed at trying to make Killarney the most sustainable town in the country and there are a number of projects already underway.

"We are trying to build on the success of the wonderful coffee cups initiative which really showed what a town can do when people get together and decide to drive on and do something," the Tricel managing director added.

Other issues being explored include the provision of more electric charging points in the town and addressing issues like food waste and an application for capital has been submitted to Kerry County Council to help all interested businesses to start the sustainability programme.

"Climate change is happening. There's no more time to be waiting and saying I'm going to do something this year or the year after – we have to get at it straight away," Mr Stack said.

Kerry County Council's climate action coordinator, Alex Grassick, told the meeting that the local authority has adopted a five-year climate action plan which looks at a variety of actions that can be taken across the county to meet internal targets and to support external sectors.

In 2020, the council had a target of 33 per cent improvement in energy efficiency and it exceeded that by 10 per cent.

Mr Grassick said the most important action is to identify the areas to concentrate on in terms of energy savings as if it's not measured then it's not managed.

"On a global scale, on record and in the

last eight months we've had more rainfall in Ireland than we've ever had so there are changes there and we can all see them," he said. "We have to be able to react. We have to see where our vulnerabilities are and what we can do to address those. Use less is the first thing you have to do and we have to change that mindset". The public meeting heard that there is a plan to make Killarney a sustainable destination by bringing about carbon and cost reductions. It is seeking to be the first town to provide communitywide energy monitoring, information and benchmarking and become Ireland's most electric vehicle charge destination

Fáilte Ireland, which is leading the initiative, will enhance its strategic supports under a new business resilience framework which will provide a tailored package of supports to businesses focused on building commercial and financial resilience.

The three-step programme businesses encourages to evaluate where they are currently at and make a commitment to

#### Minor injuries clinic a major bonus for Killarney

A new minor injuries clinic is to be established in Kerry with a strong possibility the soon to be vacated old District Hospital in Killarney will be the preferred location.

Killarney councillor John O'Donoghue, is the latest councillor to seek clarity and did so at last week's meeting of the Southern Health Forum. A clinic would help alleviate 'the extreme pressure' on the county's single A&E unit in Tralee, John said.

It is ridiculous there is not a minor injuries unit in Killarney, John said in a written submission.

Dr Gerard O'Callaghan Chief Operations Officer South/South West Hospital Group revealed that plans are in fact underway.

Killarney town rather than Tralee is the preferred option and logistics with regard to sharing diagnostics with Tralee if necessary can be overcome, John was told.

In the meantime Kerry's health services are unacceptable and pressure must be kept by our public representatives. While we welcome foreign workers in our health system, and need them in the face of the obstacles faced by Irish people trying to get into medicine, we must also acknowledge how the high numbers of immigrants are themselves adding to the demand. Tourists in council employees to other public sector

Killarney get sick and injured too, particularly adventure tourists. In a ward at UHK recently, I saw first hand what GPs are complaining of. Three out of the six patients were non Irish; two had absolutely no English and were relying on interpreters and apps and very patient nurses - some of whom whose English was not the best either. This all takes time. Meanwhile, the corridors were full of people, Irish and non-Irish, on trolleys.

#### Local elections are hotting up should the embargo on council workers be extended to all wellpaid public servants?

It is April and the elections as well as the sweet showers of summer are on the way. Local elections are indeed hotting up. Back west, farmer Seamus Cosaí Fitzgerald has decided not to retire from his job as a politician. If Fine Gael stuck with him from day one - he came near taking a seat twenty years ago - the party might still have a TD for the next Dail election.

In the Castleisland area a strong spoken woman, Michelle Keane, is shaking up the all male council there. She seems to have a strong presence on social media, judging by the number of messages being enthusiastically shared.

In Killarney we have a retained firefighter who is challenging the Government guidelines that only public sector workers under a certain income threshold can go forward for election.

Local authorities everywhere have been reminded of these guidelines with the increase in pay from the council purse for part-time firefighters.

My wonder is why the embargo on taking a council seat does not extend beyond

The crows in Muckross are still picking away at the putty in the Victorian glass houses, it seems. I see now where an elaborate scarecrow has been erected. No offence, the very good likeness of a crow is not fooling anyone. Not even me. The last time I wrote about this here, the idea was the crows were attracted by the linseed oil in the new putty. In the absence of tourist sandwiches, and cakes, before the tourist season, they were eating the softish putty.

But Niall Hatch of Birdwatch Ireland has put forward a further theory about the Muckross crows: They may well be eating the putty, because of the linseed oil - but also because of boredom, Niall thinks.

He points to how intelligent the Corvid is as a species and he thinks the crows in Muckross are particularly smart.

'Part of me thinks the rooks are playing. They are incredibly intelligent and with intelligence comes boredom.' All species of crows are very very smart and good at solving problems, Niall said.

Crows are on the international conservation red list of endangered species in much of Europe where they have declined massively. The Corvid population are healthy in this country so far, and Ireland is one of the best places still to observe crows, Hatch says.

workers? All are paid for out of the public purse. Politicians and well-paid officials are a joined force against the beleaguered private sector. Outside of major multinationals here, who enjoy all kinds of concessions, the private sector is in reality at the mercy of the cosseted public sector.

Personally, I see little point in teachers, HSE workers, parliamentary assistants, council or any kind of public servant hot "seating

as public representatives - and being paid twice by the State. They are double jobbing in other words. I have the additional concern that teachers and others are a comfortable part of the system. They are also highly protected by their public sector unions - and unions have all but deserted the private sector. Teachers and others have a natural interest in not rocking the boat. Yes, teachers and such are fine orators, and fancy themselves no end as philanthropists for the poor people. And shure why wouldn't they! But we need people in politics to shake up, not talk down. The sums for what is a part-time position as local councillor are gob smacking. (Remember too, much of expenses and allowances councillors and other state employees get is untaxed, a privilege no private worker enjoys.)

In 2022, according to the councilors register for the year, the lowest payment in the Killarney MD to a councillor - was two euro short of 34,000 euro. The highest payment was nine euro and three cent short of 78.000 euro, in the form of a gratuity.

There is plenty of unpaid voluntary work out there if they want to serve communiites. And there is also the option of a career break. I think we might need to widen the debate on eligibility, now that the door has been opened

Meanwhile, crows along with all other birds are phenomenally busy right now. The past mornings have been a veritable dawn chorus at around 6.15 am just before it gets bright . And the singing starts up again in the evening dusk. The wet weather does not seem to impact at all on the feathered friend. When you think about it, nest construction is probably easier in the rain.. Moss is out of the ground easier and mud is also much much softer. Maybe it is time to revise our old saw about raining cats and dogs and change it to feathers and quills!

Meanwhile the National Wildlife Parks and Service said is it looking for long term solutions and is studying the crows and the scarecrow.Other historic properties have come under attack also, and the lessons in Muckross will be valuable.

shouldn't have taken this to make those changes , Darragh O Brien is the Minister for Housing and Local Government, clearly his focus and priorities weren't where I feel they should have been on delivering houses and serving the people, where he has the luxury of a full time fire service in Dublin".

### SKIN SAFE FOR SUMMER WITH PLASTIC SURGEON MR AMIR ISMAIL

During the summer months, as the weather tends to become warmer, people pay more attention to their skin. In fact, it is important to look after your skin throughout the year. Mr Amir Ismail, consultant plastic surgeon answers some common questions.

#### Do I need to wear sun protection?

YES! It is important to remember that even if your skin is not burning it is still being damaged by sun exposure over your lifetime. Wearing sunscreen can delay the signs of ageing and reduce your risk of developing skin cancers such as basal cell carcinomas, squamous cell carcinomas and melanomas. You should wear sunscreen any time you go outdoors, including when gardening and walking

#### What is SPF and which one should I use?

SPF stands for Sun Protection Factor and indicates how well a sunscreen will protect you against sunburn. SPF only gives an indication of sunscreen protection against ultraviolet B radiation (UVB) which is a key risk factor for developing some forms of skin cancer. A sunscreen with SPF 15 allows 7% of UVB rays to reach your skin, SPF 30 allows 3.3% of rays and SPF 50 allows 2% to reach your skin.

The difference between SPF30 and SPF50 is therefore minimal and hence an SPF of 30 or more is recommended.

#### What about the star rating on sunscreen?

This relates to protection against ultraviolet A (UVA) radiation. Damage to the skin by UVA radiation causes ageing of the skin and wrinkles. Five stars offers the highest protection.

#### What about make-up with SPF in?

I wouldn't recommend using this as the sole form of sun protection. Often a very thick layer would be required to get adequate protection and we often fall short of this. It may be better to consider make-up with SPF as a second line of defence once sunscreen has already been applied.

#### What if I am still getting burnt?

It is important to apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outdoors. Tests which indicate a product's SPF are determined using a generous amount of sunscreen, so it is important to ensure a thick enough layer of sunscreen is applied. Sunscreen often needs reapplication every two hours and is affected by sweating, swimming or being rubbed off on clothing.

It is also important to check the product is still in date otherwise the active ingredients may be less effective.

Do I still need to wear sunscreen on cloudy days? Yes, this is because clouds don't block the harmful UVA and UVB rays from penetrating your skin.

#### Should I be concerned about my moles?

Any existing moles or freckles that have changed in size, shape, colour or have started to itch or bleed should be checked by your GP. If your doctor has any concerns regarding your skinyou may be referred to a specialist dermatologist or plastic surgeon who will be able to advise further. If your doctor is happy your mole does not look suspicious you can opt to have it removed privately.

Where can I go for more information about moles?





#### SKIN SAFE ADVICE

Protect the skin with clothing, including a wide brimmed hat to protect the ears.

- · Ensure scalp coverage if hair is thinning
- Don't forget eye protection
- · Avoid peak exposure between 11am and 3pm if it's sunny
- Use a sunscreen with at least SP30 and high UVA protection
- · Reapply sunscreen every 2 hours · Stay hydrated

#### **CONTACT LENSES**

Most people who need to : wear glasses can wear contact lenses.

#### There are two main types of contact lenses:

 soft lenses which mould to the shape of your eye

 rigid gas permeable lenses (RGP lenses) which are fitted closely to the shape of your eye and are less flexible.

Most contact lenses fitted in Ireland are soft lenses. They are available as single-use daily, fortnightly and monthly disposable lenses, and more specialist lenses that are designed to last for longer.

#### Which type of contact lens is best? Contact Lenses

The type of lens that is best for you will depend upon several factors. These include how often you want to wear your lenses - for example do you want to wear them just for certain activities such as sport, or do you want to wear them most of the time, instead of glasses?

As soft lenses are initially more comfortable than RGP lenses, they are ideal for people who only want to wear lenses occasionally. RGP lenses are a little more uncomfortable than soft lenses at first, so they take a bit more getting used to

Are contact lenses safe? Modern contact lenses are very safe, as long as you follow advice about how to wear and look after them. and have regular check-ups. It is possible that anything that touches your eye could introduce an infection.

I need to wear different glasses for distance and reading - can I have bifocal or varifocal contact lenses? When you reach your forties it is common to find that you need a different prescription for reading than you need for distance.

#### There are three main options to correct presbyopia with contact lenses:

· You may choose to have contact lenses to correct your distance vision, and wear reading glasses over the top when you need them.

• You may have multifocal contact lenses.

• You may wear lenses to have one eye corrected to see in the distance and one eye corrected for near vision. This is called monovision.

Each of the different options has advantages and disadvantages and we can help you decide which is best for you.

Admittedly, the Shannonsiders came down understrength, but it's doubtful that even with a full deck, they would have lived with the Killarney side who clicked through the gears as needed.

With the Kerry Ladies footballers limbering up for the National League final on April 7th, Niamh Ni Chonchuir, Lorraine Scanlon and Siobhan Burns were all on the easy list but in total eleven players saw court time and with the final of this competition due to take on Saturday April 13th in the National Basketball Arena in Tallaght, St Pauls should be at full power for that joust.

The Huskies might have come to Killarney with a slightly diminished hand, but in Scout Frame, they had the Leagues top scorer and Ashley Harte leading the way in assists The ageless and lionhearted Lynn Jones hit the opening salvo from beyond the arc as Sofia Paska and Khiarica Rasheed settled quickly into the groove. At 12-3 ahead, that forced the visitors into an early timeout, and Frame struck straightaway . But Rheanne O'Shea was also starting to heat up , with Leah McMahon and Meabh Barry giving fresh impetus off the bench to push it out to 16-5. Aisling McGann has been the Huskies markswoman from distance all season, and she duly delivered with two before the buzzer to make it 16-11.

As has often been the case this season St. Pauls exploded out of the blocks in the second quarter with O Shea netting early. Denise Dunlea announced her arrival before Sofia Paska was central to two nice baskets. She took delivery of a wonderful Rasheed pass to net and then combined with Jones for the latter to pounce. The Huskies needed to get Frame into the game, and she answered the call, but Rasheed, Dunlea from three point land, and Paska pushed it out to 36-24. Leah McMahon then produced her own razzle dazzle to get the score of the half, and despite Harte and Frames' promptings,



the Paska- Rasheed axis ensured it was a 44-31 halftime advantage.

The third quarter really saw St. Pauls drive on, hitting thirty-six points in the period to open up an unassailable 80-50 lead. It featured five three-pointers, three coming from the hot hand of Game MVP Denise Dunlea, with Rheanne O'Shea getting in on the act as well. The Huskies, through Orlaith Woods, Frame, and Harte, were not too shabby from beyond the arc either, but they had no answer to the power play of the hosts. The quarter finished with Barrys basket sandwiched by two O Shea efforts.

Liadh Tobin, Aisling Counihan, and Mary Kate Smith were all called to arms in the final quarter where a brace of threes from Rasheed early on made it 88-56. Not surprisingly, the game lost a bit of intensity, and Scout Frame had a productive quarter hitting 12 points. Fiona O Connell and Aisling McCann also contributed to what was a flagging but spirited Huskies' final push, which helped bring their total to 75. Mary Kate Smith , Paska, and O Shea kept the pedal to the metal while Leah McMahon had the final say for the home side to record a twenty-one point victory.

This cup final was a repeat of the league semifinal meeting in which Killarney emerged 7 – 3 winners after a titanic struggle in difficult conditions down in west cork, so both teams were aware they were in for a tough contest, and so it proved. The weather at Virgin Media park was dry, but with a strong breeze into the Dolphin end which Killarney opted to play against in the first half. For 25 minutes of the first half both teams showed good running and handling skills and tested each other out with their kicking games, but defences were also ferocious and well organised, so despite Clon dominating territory the match remined scoreless.

Then a training ground move off a Killarney scrum created space for open side Clodagh Foley to show her strength and trickery to spin through three Clonakilty defenders and dot down under the posts, with Fia Whelan converting. Clonakilty responded well but conceded a breakdown penalty 10 metres from the Killarney try line. Co-captain Lily Morris immediately took the quick tap, broke the defensive line, and turned on the gas to sprint the length of the field for the second Killarney try, also converted by Whelan. A period of sustained Clonakilty pressure saw them camped in the Killarney 22 at the end of the first half. The Killarney girls repelled wave after wave of attack but with the clock deep, deep in the red Clon scored their first try, unconverted, to leave the half time score at 14 – 5.

Early in the second half Killarney produced the best spell of attacking play of the game. Speaking after the game Killarney coach Josh Whelan said: "To give credit to Clonakilty, we were under pressure for large parts of the game, but our line-out and 22 exits were excellent and that helped us a lot. The fitness and attitude in defence of the girls really held

The penultimate test saw the rain ease but the roads remained wet in places, and Cronin remained on the back foot. "Matt made a really clever decision coming out of service, he brought two wets with him. We couldn't get temperature into our tyres in the drier sections, the wet sections just cooled the tyres completely", he reported.

on the fourth, to leave the gap at 1 The gap stood at eight seconds going into the final stage, and Cronin opted to play the safer option. "There was too much in it starting the stage, we said we'd try to hold second and get the points", he conceded. "It's been a sprint, but it has still been a really tough rally", he added, in reference to the event's one-day format. "It's a good result for us in terms of the championship. Matt made an inspired decision for the second loop and gave us the jump, it was a good call by him".

## NATIONAL LEAGUE FINALS DIVISION ONE Dublin 2-21 Derry 3-18

(Derry win 3-1 on penalties)

It has been hailed as an absolute classic, and it was certainly the best game of the year so far. Fair play to Derry; it's been a long time since they had silverware on the board and Mickey Harte has once more stamped his credentials on gaelic football. He's far too much of a gentleman to mention it, but his native county may well be regretting his fairly abrupt and enforced departure.

There were four points, two apiece, in the opening seven minutes. Derry promptly added three points, only for Dublin to reply with 1-1, Odhran Lynch punching a poor clearance straight to a grateful Colm Basquel. The scores kept coming - how often do you hear that about a gaelic football match these days? - with Derry equalising with three points to Dublin's two. By half-time, the scores were deadlocked at 0-10 to 1-7; that's fair scoring for a first half. The pace didn't relent in the second half. It was Dublin's turn to kick the first two points but a foul on the lively Ethan Doherty saw Shane McGuigan slotting home. Paul Cassidy was just wide with another dangerous effort. Dublin were getting turned over by quick Derry counters and Eoin McEvoy got in for another. That left Derry four points up but Dublin, unsurprisingly, began to pick up the pace, with Tom Lahiff, Ross MCGarry, and Con O'Callaghan all splitting the posts. Derry have a bit of steel about them these days, though, and replied in kind with a Conor Glass brace and another from Eoin McEvoy. Paul Mannion and Paddy Small trimmed the gap again but Lachlan Murray's mark had Derry three points in front. Derry tried to play down the clock, but that's harder to do against Dublin than any other team (including us) and it meant that they left the door open, with Seán McMahon, Ross McGarry, and a Con O'Callaghan free forcing the game into extratime

Fresh legs were needed and Niall Toner kicked two points for Derry, but Killian O'Gara did likewise for Dublin. Still deadlocked at the small break. Eoin McEvoy kicked another great goal to put Derry in front but once again Dublin dug deep, Con O'Callaghan cleverly finding Greg McEneaney for an equaliser. That goal led to a bit of a schmozzle – in fairness, you couldn't call it a 'melee', but you wouldn't exactly be nominating candidates for mensa either. Paddy Small picked up a second yellow card for a reaction (Brian Fenton had already departed on a second yellow earlier); there were plenty worse offenders out there. It wasn't any major talking point regardless.

Derry have that bit more experience with penalty shoot-outs and McGuigan, Glass, and Doherty all slotted their efforts and Dublin were less clinical. In the end, Derry were worthy champions and will definitely be looking towards the summer with real confidence.

It was certainly a hugely entertaining game. Was it great football? I'm slightly less convinced than most. That wasn't a full strength Dublin team and I'd still be much more afraid of the losers than the winners here. Derry absorb opposition attacks incredibly well and break at speed then, while the likes of Glass and Rogers will always give them a strong say in the middle third. Ethan Doherty has really stepped up, but McGuigan is mostly a lone predator waiting for support - more vulpine than the ursine Colm McFadden as frontman on Donegal's great team of a decade ago, but in the same principle. Dublin were happy to go toe to toe here and take their lessons, and they still came within a heartbeat of victory. I suspect that they would be more cagey and patient if the teams met in the championship. There is also the cold reality that Ulster is simply a lot more draining than Leinster (or anywhere else), and that will be as big an obstacle for the new champions as any other.

Obviously the big two are best pleased with the league. Dublin never really showed their full hand. We all know the team to beat, especially Kerry after that trimming in Croke Park. That said, I'd genuinely be happy enough. We only lost out to Dublin on scoring average, and we were never at full strength ourselves. Cillian Burke and Joe O'Connor are real finds. Barry Dan, Paul Murphy, and Killian Spillane might not have nailed starting berths, but they'll be there at the finish in crunch games. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch back in harness is very welcome news. Injury to linchpin Jason Foley is never good news, but at least it's at the right time for him to recover - I have absolutely no interest in the messing about before the quarterfinals. Ignore the fake drama. At worst case scenario, we lose to Cork in Munster. Which makes absolutely no difference long term. Avoiding that pre-quarter-final energy-drainer yokemebob is far more important.

Monaghan and Roscommon take the drop, and I think it's a fair reflection. They'll be hard to beat when it counts, but I think they will be beaten.

## DIVISION TWO Donegal 0-15 Armagh 0-14

As a man correctly observed to me, "That was a good Division Two game, but you wouldn't mistake it for Division One". Fair enough. It was a cagey affair for three-quarters of the match, two defensive teams mirroring each other. Donegal did at least try to open the play. Armagh, whom we are told couldn't train because of a bug during the week, certainly didn't look themselves. Armagh have been desperately unlucky in recent years (you'd be as well off mentioning penalties to Gareth Southgate as Kieran McGeenev). Donegal were just a point ahead but pushed four clear in the third quarter. Then Armagh introduced Rian O'Neill and let him off the leash. Seeing O'Neill ply his trade in midfield last year was a decision to me that reeked of fear, tantamount to Dublin bringing out Con O'Callaghan or Kerry bringing out David Clifford. The last ten minutes were an absolute joy. Both of these teams have genuinely great talent and deserve to be at the top table. But - and I take no joy in saying it, but gaelic football does have an entertainment value problem - imagine if they had the selfconfidence to go out and play like this for seventy minutes? Not naively, not hopeful but wasteful punts into ready defenders, but just going out intending to win instead of to avoid losing? Unleash the shackles and let loose those dogs of war?

Cavan made the jump up with surprising ease and must be quietly delighted. Cork and Meath are two former superpowers slowly but surely getting back to themselves. I imagine that having the neighbours they do hasn't done them any favours. Cork in particular showed real steel after an awful start. That said, they are a challenge for contenders, including us, rather than long-term contenders in their own right. It's no great surprise to see Fermanagh drop straight back down, to be honest, but Kildare? They have far too much talent to even be in that conversation, and yet here we are. The malaise extends far before Glenn Ryan's tenure; the modern idea that managers can work miracles and are responsible for everything is far too often just an easy cop-out from real analysis. The 2018 and 2023 U20 All Ireland champions are on the good side of the Leinster draw, but they would be no bad bet for the Taillteann Cup. I'm quite serious.

## DIVISION THREE

Taillteann Cup champions Westmeath have been quietly doing their business right and beat Down to take top spot. Both of them are going up, and deservedly so. I had certainly expected Sligo to be there or thereabouts, given their exploits at minor, U20, and with Summerhill College, Dunmore CS, and St. Jarlaths (not the force of old, but still a real force). No doubt in my mind; Sligo are rising. Limerick and Wicklow make the drop; it is what it is.

## DIVISION FOUR

Laois should never have gotten sucked into Division Four and it would have been a major shock if they didn't burst straight out of it. Sure enough, they sauntered through it with plenty to spare, apart from one point defeat to Leitrim. The O'Rourke County (the clan were prominent in the Nine Years War) are a county I like. Wexford came to Mounthawk Park on the back of a really good win over Bray Wanderers and would most likely have fancied coming away with all three points, but this is a very different side to the fledgeling outfit of last year and, most significantly, Kerry no longer leak soft goals through the occasional lapse of concentration. The new signings this year have been in marvellous form, but it has to be said that the players from last year have obviously gotten much cuter and sharper, having adjusted to the pace of the higher standard.

Kerry got on top early on and took the game to the Model County representatives. Ryan Kelliher got on the end of a good early through ball but just couldn't keep the finish down. It was a warning note, though, and just ten minutes later Seán O'Connell, one of the real leaders of this team, pounced to deftly rob an unwary defender and smoothly direct an unstoppable shot into the bottom corner. Last year those were the goals we were conceding; not ones we were scoring. The game was being played at a brisk pace, impressive to watch, but it maybe came at a price as two Wexford players and an impressive Samuel Aladesunasi had to come off after picking up knocks. Wexford had a tentative penalty shout late in the first half but the referee wasn't having any of it. Just before the break, Ethan Kos had to be very alert to block a very dangerous chance from Aaron Dobbs. Kerry went in with a goal advantage, but Wexford were very much still a real threat.

Five minutes after the restart Wexford got their equaliser, and it was a textbook goal. Aaron Dobbs rose high to a pinpoint cross and connected perfectly with his head to steer it past a hapless Antonio Tuta. Superb finish, to be fair.

Wexford keeper Owen Mason made a good save to deny Ryan Kelliher and Daniel Okwute's effort from a narrow angle sailed wide. Kerry were the better side here overall, but just couldn't quite finish a number of promising moves. Wexford lost a player to a second yellow under the constant pressure, but they earned their hard-fought draw fair and square.

There's a reason that UCD have been winning so many games of late, though. There didn't look to be too much danger as Ciarán Behan lined up a shot, but he caught it superbly and found the net.

Kennedy Amechi and Ryan Kelliher replaced Victor Udeze and Cian Brosnan at halftime in an attempt to salvage something in the second half and just twelve minutes into the second half they caught a real lifeline. Daniel Okwute did very well to open up space on the right. With his initial cross blocked, he tried a rasper towards goal. It didn't look too dangerous, but the unfortunate Cian Moore, widely recognised as one of the best goalkeepers in the division, had one of those nightmare moments that

UCD had another couple of big chances towards finish, Ciarán Behan heading just wide and Micheal McCullagh unable to keep his shot under the crossbar. Two good chances, though, and I suspect that Conor McCarthy will be happy enough to come away with a point.

That's five draws on the trot for Kerry FC. As Roy Keane pointed out in his biography 'The Second Half', constant draws and an average of a point per game isn't enough long term. You'd actually be better off winning and losing every second game (an average of three points instead of two). But draws compared to the constant rat-a-tat-tat of defeat of last year? This is a genuinely astonishing improvement by Kerry and that first win can't be too far away.

# **INCREASE IN FUEL PRICES** is not an April's Fool Joke, it is crippling people and businesses.

Cllr. Marie Moloney has criticised the fuel price increase whoch took place on April 1st.

"If the Government is serious about helping businesses and workers, they need to be absorbing the increase in fuel prices", she told Killarney Outlook.

The increase in the price of fuel has a knockon effect on everyone. There is not a business who does not have deliveries to their premises and thus their delivery costs increases. At the

moment businesses are buckling under their costs, rents, rates, energy, increased cost of goods and now facing increased delivery costs. We are regularly seeing shops, restaurant and coffee shops closing down. The



Government must help struggling businesses and an increase in fuel costs is not the way forward.

This increase is also crippling hard pressed workers who are dependant on their cars to get to work. People living in Rural Ireland do not have access to public transport so a car is a necessity not a luxury. People are under a lot of pressure with the cost of living, some with mortgages and other the high cost of renting. The cost of fuel is constantly creeping up at the pumps and this

extra increase is just adding more pressure on people. Time for the Government put their money where their mouth is and help the people who put them in Government.

## Time to ban vaping and move towards a tobaccofree society

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that the Irish Government should completely ban the sale of vapes and move towards an incremental ban on all forms of tobacco smoking

Kelleher, a former Fianna Fáil National Health Spokesperson, was commenting on the 20th anniversary of the ban on work-place smoking by the then Health Minister, Micheál Martin.

"I am aware of, and welcome, the Minister for Health's commitment to ban the sale of disposable vapes to under 18s. However, I think we, as a society, should be looking to go further.

"Vaping is now becoming very popular among younger people, even among young people who never previously smoked. We know that e-cigarettes contain heavy metals, which are toxic to humans, such as nickel, tin, and lead. They also contain flavourings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to serious lung disease. No good comes from vaping.

"Furthermore, we need to move to a point where we incrementally ban smoking for future generations. Other countries have started this process. For example, no one born after 2009 will be allowed to smoke in the UK. "I appreciate that this may appear to be a nanny-state type of ban but the impact of smoking both on individuals and on wider society are

really clear - smoking kills and it costs taxpayers hundreds of millions of euro each and every year in terms of additional healthcare costs.

"The role of government is very clear to me. We must make the world safer for our citizens. We should at all times reduce risks to their health and wellbeing.

"As a former smoker myself, I know how hard it is to give up cigarettes, but I also know how liberating it can be once you break the habit. We owe it to future generations to never let them become hooked in the first place," concluded Kelleher.



## **Letting Register Troubles**

ter by Fáilte Ireland, does not have universal support throughout the country, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill from Rossbeigh, Co Kerry.

"The fact that this new Register is to focus on just one type of letting, i.e. Short Term, has brought it into disrepute with those offering such a service. Many of them believe that it is discriminatory towards Short Term Letting and that they are being held responsible for the shortage in Long Term lettings" stated Councillor Cahill. "Many of those in the AirBnB sector see this as a means to force them away from Short Term Letting, but they advise that they have no interest in, or intention of getting involved in Long Term Letting. They have found their niche, they say, they pay their taxes and they feel they should not be forced out of business" said Councillor Cahill.

"Legitimate business should be allowed to carry on and other tactics need to be employed to encourage and attract people to offering Long Term Letting. We need not use a sledge hammer to crack a nut" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

Tourist accommodation in Ireland is made up of a mixture of types, that suit different categories of visitors to the different areas of the country. There are Hotels, Guesthouses, Bed & Breakfasts, Houses, Apartments etc,. and in more recent years, Airbnbs. Councillor, Michael Cahill believes that all of these accommodation options

are essential to the success of our Tourism Industry here in Kerry and that there should a level playing field for each type of business. "These are all legitimate business operations, adding value to our tourism product, different potential customers preferring a particular option for themselves, depending on their circumstances. Some may wish to avail of the many additional facilities of a hotel, some less so, without pools, bars, prepared meals, etc,." stated the longstanding Councillor.

"I don't agree that different regulations should apply to any option being made available to our visitors, as long as everybody is on the same hymn sheet, providing safe, comfortable accommodation and are complying with the present laws. Tourism provides employment and income for our people and tax returns to the Exchequer" said Councillor Cahill.

"Here in Kerry, it is more visitor accommodation that is required, not less and we should welcome new entrants to a market which I see growing enormously with the opening of facilities, such as the South Kerry Greenway. Not everyone can afford to get involved in Tourist Accommodation with the traditional forms of Hotel or B&B for example, but the Airbnb model does offer an opening to people to rent one or two rooms or a renovated cottage, etc.," said the Fianna Fáil man.

"The more varied offerings and options we here in Kerry have for our potential visitors, with different levels of holiday budgets, the more people will visit here to sample the delights of our county" added Councillor Cahill.

WANTED

Most herbs are very easy to grow. They can be gown in the garden in vegetable beds or raised beds or in containers like a window box on a window sill. There are a lot of different types of herbs, but the most commonly grown herbs for culinary use are the likes of basil and dill which are annuals and have to be sown every year, parsley and chervil which are biennials last for two years while herbs like fennel, mint, tarragon are perennials.

If you want to grow mint, make sure you plant it in a container and not in the ground as it is a very invasive herb.

Even if you are not using your herbs for culinary use, it is important to pick them regularly, otherwise they tend to go to seed very guickly.

"The Lord God is my Strength [my source of courage, my invincible army]; He has made my feet [steady and sure] like hinds' feet and makes me walk [forward with spiritual confidence] on my high places [of challenge and responsibility]" (Habakkuk 3:19 Amplified Bible).

Welcome back dear student, last week we saw how Jesus, the Lord of Hosts is strong, mighty, and invincible in battle (Psalm 24:8). On studying the word 'invincible' in the Bible, God's title 'The Lord of Hosts' is translated: Invincible Warrior or Champion. At various stages in life people feel invincible, especially the young. It's great to live unafraid and feel you can accomplish anything, but sometimes feeling invincible can foster reckless behaviour ending in catastrophe. Life is fragile and everything can change in a moment. Self-reliance as promoted by gurus - that universal (god) power is within yourself is untrue and will never sustain long term. It wrecks a person's confidence in a crisis to find that they were not invincible after all. And when confidence is lost, strength to fight is gone. Therefore, faith must be fed constantly (Romans 10:17). This is why we need to know our Champion - our Advocate, and Mighty Warrior - the Lord of Heaven's Armies and His promises. What a great comfort to know that Jesus has your back instead of having to rely on your own power! We all make mistakes - we are human beings, and God knows all our insecurities and our weaknesses. Yet flaws are not what He focuses on, for His ways are higher than ours. His unbreakable Covenant of Love has been paid for in full with the Blood of His Son Jesus. The Lord is your greatest Cheerleader. Knowing that Jesus is for you and not against you, that He has forgiven you, calls you His friend and that He is backing you, gives one confidence to keep going and not give in to sin, fear, or the threats of the enemy. It's a confidence that will not be shaken, though everything around may be shaking (Hebrews 10:35; Hebrews 12:27) Because of the strong foundation built upon the Love of Jesus Christ you will be able to stand firm in the midst of every storm.

People talk about angelic protection: angels are often wrongly depicted as whimsical fairylike creatures. Jesus is called the Angel of the Lord in the Old Testament - note the capital 'A' (Exodus 20:20-22; Daniel 3:28). He is nothing like a fairy! Jeremiah saw the Lord standing with him when he was struggling... "but the Lord stands beside me like a Mighty (Fierce) Warrior, before Him my persecutors will stumble. They cannot defeat me. They will fall and be thoroughly humiliated. Their dishonour will never be forgotten" (Jeremiah 20:11). The Lord always shows up for His people! He fights the battle whilst making our enemies fall (Exodus 14:13-31). Read about Moses, Gideon, David, Jehosophat, Esther, Daniel, Nehemiah just to name a few. All cried out to God for help, believing that God's supernatural Power was the only answer, acknowledging, in humility that in themselves, they had zero power to defeat their enemies (2 Chronicles 20:10-17; Psalm 60:12). Conversely, there are also plenty of examples in the Bible of those who felt they were un-beatable as they attacked or oppressed God's people (2 Kings 6:14-23). But they soon found out the Truth. The Lord of Hosts watches over those whose hearts are His, and He defends them (2nd Chronicles 16:9). And it's no weakling that causes our enemies to fall - it's the Invincible Warrior Himself - Jesus Christ - He Who "is the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). Hallelujah!
