





St Oliver's NS Killarney Bag It Bin It Campaign...

JUNIOR ACTIVISTS MAKE KILLARNEY A BETTER PLACE TO LIVE

Building on the success of the Killarney Dog Fouling Project 2023 and the good work of the Killarney Looking Good committee and the Junior KLG Schools Forum (including St. Olivers NS) the footpaths leading to St. Olivers NS became the focus of the next stage of the 'Bag It, Bin It' Campaign.

Dog fouling on public footpaths around St. Olivers was felt as a concern by students, staff and parents alike when walking to school, on class group walks and on visits to the nearby Church of the Resurrection. So the students and staff decided to take action! Under the advice of Kerry's Environmental Awareness Officer, the 2nd Class students in St Oliver's NS undertook some Dog Poo Surveys along the route that we take from the school to the Church of the Resurrection.

During the Dog Poo Surveys, each of the dog poos on the footpaths were sprayed by the students with a biodegradable yellow coloured spray – to draw the public's attention to the problem. The school then commenced an education and awareness project in the school to minimize the extent dog fouling along the paths to the school. The intention of these discussions at junior infant level, being that the infants learn this good



IN HONOUR OF THOMAS

The Beaufort community has come together to honour the memory of a young man who died tragically in an accident.

Thomas Healy was just 14 years old when he passed away leaving his loving family heartbroken.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, his brother Danny told us about the upcoming fundraiser in his little brother's memory.

"Little did we realise, way back in the cold Winter months of November and December, that what began as a glimmer of an idea to honour the memory of our beloved son and brother Thomas, would snowball into the lucrative fund-raiser it has become", Danny said. Officially launched just under two months ago, The Thomas Healy Memorial Football Blitz has become a by-word in the wider Mid-Kerry area. The talented soccer and football enthusiast Thomas, passed away tragically on 7th July, 2021 and on his 3rd Anniversary on Sunday week next, July 7th, the community of Beaufort, along with the football clubs of Mid-Kerry and the Killarney region will come together for a 7-A-Side Football Blitz. Homegrown success: Kerry Airport Flying High

Kerry Airport hosted over 419,000 passengers, the second highest in its 52 year history, in 2023. Gift shop sales were up almost 30 per cent at over one million euro and car park revenue had fetched over 666,000 euro, up from Euro 512,000.

The airport is now in good financial health and has 55 staff.

Tenders have gone out for a new arrivals hall and other improvements, but the decision to proceed will depend on value for money, chairman Denis Cregan who has been a strong guiding hand, said. (A controversial private hangar project has been withdrawn.)

The State funding of Kerry-Dublin was lost when Stobart went to the wall, but the commercial oute is going well under Ryanair.

It suits Ryanair to operate the route "at the moment", airport chairman Denis Cregan said, adding he feared it might not suit them in the future. "We must remain vigilant," Denis said.

The fact that Kerry needs an airport 'is proven beyond doubt', he said. Dublin Airport still had to come up with a solution for single screening passengers transiting from Dublin for Kerry.

This issue was raised by Killarney's Teresa Irwin, a shareholder who regularly attends the agms and asks questions of public interest.

While passengers going from Kerry to Dublin with an onward flight to board international flights did not have to be screened again in Dublin, there was no such facility on the way down, the agm heard it was up to Dublin and pressure was being applied by Kerry.

Killarney's Tom Randles and Kathleen O'Regan-Sheppard were again

voted onto the board of directors. Killarney's Kathleen is again the only female on the board with the retirement of another Killarney woman, County Manager Moria Murrell, as she switches jobs to bigger pastures in Cork.

I enjoy Kerry airport agms as there is a strong level-headed, cando Killarney input on the board of directors and indeed among the shareholders and agents, auditors and legal team.

Faigh Dinneen!

The funeral of Micheál O'Muricheartaigh afforded a glimpse into a once certain way of life that is fast changing.

The mass was in the beautiful Kerry Irish.

There was a grand oration by broadcaster Micheál O'Sé and a fine bilingual address by Aonghus, Micheál's son. Bishop Ray Browne was on the altar and so were Killarney's Canon Tom Looney and two other priests.

Several of the leading GAA figures and officers were present including Killarney's Pat O'Sullivan, chairman of the county board.

It is an Ireland that was utterly recognizable once: GAA, Catholic, Fianna Fail, Radio Teilifís Eireann, and Irish. And lots of leading men.

All the elements are battling to hold on now. Even RTE and the GAA are no longer the only show in town.

O'Sé's address was stirring, using the tropes of Irish elegy many of us would be familiar with from Irish language poetry (I cannot say " all of us" any longer!) Micheál was a "seod náisiúnta"; he was an "Ard Rí", O'Sé said.

For me however the singular moment and it was from Eadaoin during the commentary on the mementos being brought to the altar was

TRISH GEXES SOCIECY IRISH-ENGLISH dinneen

"Faigh Dinneen".

Myriad objects had been brought to symbolise the great man's myriad interests.

But one stood out: the 1904 Irish-English dictionary, by Patrick Dinneen, M.A, a native of Carn, Rathmore, a dictionary loved by Irish language enthusiasts. The dictionary was for Micheál's love of Irish language and culture.

Often in their house they would hear Micheál say - "Faigh Dinneen!- Get Dinneen!," daughter Eadaoin said.

Pádraig O'Duinnín, as he was also known, was a child of Carn, Rathmore who switched seamlessly between English and Irish. Much like O'Muircheartaigh himself. Much like the late O'Muricheartaigh too, he had a wide ranging, Renaissance mind that would not be boxed in, and a clear love of wit.

Pádraig attended Shrone and Meentogues National Schools and the Sem in Killarney. His BA was in classics and mathematical science, and four years after this in 1889 he was awarded an MA in mathematical science.

Dineen's dictionary entries are themselves a type of broadcast. Folklore, song, tales, history, topography, local knowledge, etymology, the classics, wit, logic, are all employed. After the funeral, I took out Dinneen and I hit on a word randomly. A word beginning with "a" -"adhbairne". This he says is a large lump, or large stone or big potato. By the end of it I had been brought with much entertainment to the root of the word - the Irish for knot, which is also the Irish for a problem, "fadhb".' Such expansiveness is typical of the Irish mind associated with Joyce, O'Rathaille, maybe even the Book of Kells, the late John O'Donoghue philosopher who lived on Mangerton, and O'Muricheartaigh's radio commentary. So, "Faigh Dinneen"! For a glimpse of the Irish. We might all do worse.

Changing Tourism

The Aer Lingus strike has concentrated minds. I saw where our own Tom Randles, a hotelier, said he lost 10,000 euro in cancellations by one party, and one can then add on the cost to the wider community.

There is little doubt now but this is a quiet tourist season in Killarney and south Kerry. Restaurants are closing early and outrightly. The cancellations of US tourists is only bringing out what was already underway. Many people have been suffering since the "hijacking" of accommodation by our own Government for the hundred thousand plus refugees they invited into Ireland, so they could look good in

Our Chamber of Commerce and our Council, management and councillors, should have called this situation out a lot earlier. Instead council management along with other heavily State and EU funded partnerships and development agencies were far too efficient; there was no stop at all to the number of beds taken up. And why would there be, with such willing State servants providing such great services? The few politicians to call out the impending crisis, like councillor Niall O'Callaghan, were shouted down and got no support from those with power.

Tourism is changing too. My question is who will provide the slack in rates for the council? Will it be the hard-pressed householder again? There should be serious resistance to any talk of increases in property tax. After all the downturn in Kerry has been brought about by State authorities themselves shutting down the wider tourism industry - and turning a blind eye to its travails.



WISE WOOL PROJECT IS

REIMAGINING IRELAND'S WOOL WASTE





Local Kerry creatives Kerry Walker and Lisa Sandow are reimagining Ireland's wool industry with the newly formed 'Wise Wool Project, funded by Creative Ireland. The project is designed to educate, inspire, and engage the community in sustainable practices and innovative solutions to wool waste.

The two women were shocked to learn from a local sheep farmer that not only was sheep's wool not valued as a product but in fact it was regarded as waste to the farmers after shearing. The project, spearheaded by Kerry Walker and Lisa Sandow, aims to transform the wool industry by reducing waste and promoting eco-friendly, circular economy practices.

Sandra Spethmann of Curraghmore Farm in the Black Valley was happy to donate bags of wool



to their creative project, and already they have been using it for art projects and workshops in the local area.

"It costs the farmer more to shear the sheep, than the wool itself is worth on market. In the 2020 census, the Republic of Ireland clipped around 7 thousand tonnes (7 million kgs) of wool, most of this wool went unused. Wool is considered a category 3 "waste product" in Ireland",says Lisa Sandow.

Irish wool is an underutilized and undervalued resource. It should be transformed into a branded value-added product for the benefit of farmers and wider supply chain. For this to happen some of the solutions could be to:

The Wise Wool project has already offered workshops in local schools, community centres

and in K-Fest and will be offering the following free events that are open to the public this summer:

Upcoming Events in the Killarney area include: Wet Felting Workshop for Children at the Anam Arts Center, Killarney July 20th from 11-1:30pm. Wool Waste Exhibition in Kate Kearney's Cottage on November 9th. The event will feature works from local artists and crafters, highlighting the skill sets, beauty and potential of repurposed materials.



KERRY COUNTY **COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built






This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



GLAUCOMA

WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

Symptoms

The danger with open-angle

or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open-angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

TREATMENT

Open-angle glaucoma usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with open-angle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.

SHOULD YOU BE CONSIDERING **SWITCHING YOUR MORTGAGE**



A comprehensive display by Mayo ended Kerry's hopes of reaching the All-Ireland U16 'A' Ladies final last Thursday evening.

Weather conditions were more akin to the middle of pre-season than a championship summer but despite playing with the wind in the first half, Kerry struggled to cope with the relentless workrate from the Mayo ladies and Lauren McHale's goal was the difference between the sides at the break.

Doireann O'Neill levelled it for Kerry but it was all Mayo as they built up a commanding lead by the end of the first quarter. Aoife Meaney and Lily Hession both pointed before Mayo found the net on 13 minutes when Stagg's free dropped in front of goal. Kerry goalkeeper Anne O'Shaughnessy failed to clear and Lauren McHale palmed it in, and another Stagg free created the opening for a McHale single as Mayo lead 1-4 to 0-1.

Kerry responded well through a free by captain Muireann Teahan and chief threat Naoise O'Donoghue before McHale kept up her tremendous half with another great point



after holding off two Kerry defenders.

Mayo played the majority of the second quarter with 14 after Sophie Tiernan was shown a yellow card but Kerry failed to make the numerical advantage count for much, with two points from O'Donoghue (one free) all they could muster as Francis Regan's side kept the ball with a composure beyond their years to lead 1-5 to 0-5 at the break.

ALL IRELAND QUARTER-FINAL: KERRY 0-15 DERRY 0-10

Oh lads, wasn't that brilliant? Five points to spare over the National League champions. The spectre of Mickey Harte - and let's face it, we did have a superstition about that mild-spoken master tactician - exorcised in decisive fashion. Down to the last four and Derry, Mayo, and even Dublin all gone from the championship without us even having to lift a finger. Does life even get better than this?

Unfortunately, we do have to talk about the football. I don't particularly want to, and I know ye don't want me to, but honesty compels... and honesty compels me to say that the football was of a quality that would see a dog owner face criminal charges if their dog left it on the pavement behind them.

It was awful. It really and truly was. And the worst thing is that Kerry didn't too anything wrong. Kerry played the right way to win the game. It is a simple and unfortunate reality that the right way to play winning football is to play negative football. Naïve purists will tell you that Kerry, with the forwards that we have, should have gone all out and charged at Derry or rained down ball on top of them. Except that we have been there, and Derry would have absolutely loved that. Stay in a mass defence, lure Kerry forward, swallow them up with bodies in defence, and hit them on the counter. Anybody trying to blame Jack O'Connor for the football Kerry played on Sunday - and it was ugly - can be telling me what they would have said if we had played openly and expansively....and lost. I don't blame Mickey Harte for introducing negativity as a tactic it works, and 'twas easy for the aristocrats like ourselves to be sneering at the proletariats, but they won their All Irelands fair and square.

The trouble is that it is still winning football. Be fair to Dublin, they played the blanket the same as we do ourselves, but they played football along with it. The likes of Tyrone in their heyday, with arguably the best forward line in history, worked tirelessly to shut down any hint of open football. Donegal were worse - Michael Murphy, greatest forward of a generation, played in midfield more often than not. Derry have relied almost totally on one accrual forward, Shane McGuigan, for several years now. I thought that the emergence of Lachlan Murray meant that an actual game of football might break out last Sunday. Small fear of it.

Kerry played Derry at their own game. Leave them have their short kick-outs; we have no great interest in what they do out the field. Odhran Lynch wants to wander out to midfield with the ball? Leave the crathur off. Sure, he isn't harming anybody.

It was more like game of basketball. You take the ball out against our zone defence. You move the ball around until an opening arrives or you cough up a turnover (imagine basketball without a shot clock). Then it's the other teams' turn. There was some high fielding, but it was more by accident of circumstance than tactical intention.

Actually, I lie. There was one great flurry of excitement. Right at the state Derry swashbuckled right through us, lovely direct football, only for McKinless to angle his shot inches wide of goal. Brilliant ambition that deserved and almost got a reward.

Kerry with an uncontested short kick-out, and the ball carefully worked up to David Clifford for a point. Craftsmanship, but no artistry. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch went close with another chance. Conor Glass levelled up by shooting from long distance over Kerry's packed defence. Fair play to him; I hope that teams, including us, do it a lot more often.

We are capable of it, as Tony Brosnan guickly demonstrated with a fine score. 0-2 to 0-1. I thought Tony was absolutely outstanding. Composed on the ball, always looking for a forward option, decisive. To the manor born.

Diarmuid O'Connor with a ball in towards David Clifford. An aberration, surely, given that David was marked by two players. Except that David rose high above them to claim and shoot a magnificent mark. Something called football - I hope ye had a good view, because ye won't be seeing much more of it today.

Shane McGuigan with two well-worked scores. In fairness, his movement is clever, Jason is struggling with it, and Derry are well-practised at looking for their main shooter. 0-3 apiece.

Paul Murphy fisted off the post from a tight angle. Gavin White's follow-up and Tadhg Morley's subsequent one are blocked - I thought maybe Tadhg should have fisted over for the point. Interesting to note that it's three Kerry defenders on the attack. This game is all about the channels, not the individuals. McGuigan and Murray that made the blocks. Derry's best attackers on their own goal-line. The great Dr. Eamonn would have been bulling. His teams always and ever played better football than this.


McGuigan with a free after Ethan Doherty is fouled. The game is being played at half pace. Both sides are content to pick off points without exposing any risk. It's actually a bit claustrophobic. Efficiency without ambition.

Tony Brosnan finds an overlapping Brian Ó Beaglaíoch for a fisted point. At the other end Murray cuts in along the end-line a bit too easy for my liking, but it comes to nothing. Derry have the nest attack and at least four players have decent chances to shoot - but they are conditioned to pass, embarrassingly so, and eventually Conor Glass has a shot but is wide.

I could have saved my money and gone to Taylor Swift instead. I'm just saying it.

Paul Cassidy with a high ball down on top of Kerry – Derry have two shooting forwards, but this isn't either. Reassuringly, Kerry deal with

it comfortably. At the other end, though, Joe O'Connor fumbles the ball – with the slow pace of the game, it looks bad. Ethan Doherty's miss of a relatively simple chance is less obvious but much more costly.

Tom O'Sullivan with a long ball into Seánie O'Shea, who rises high to fist it back down to Joe O'Connor for a point. That's two long 'gamble' balls into Kerry forwards and two points scored.

Kerry concentrate on setting up their defensive screen rather than advancing to tackle Brendan Rogers in possession, so he calmly slots it over the bar. I genuinely hope that's the future of football. 0-5 apiece.

Brilliant score by Paul Geaney. Absolutely fantastic. That was just a great footballer trusting his talent. More of the same please. McGuigan - Derry are relying on him as their lone forward threat, but he is doing the business - replies. David Clifford and Tony Brosnan are both unlucky with close chances. Level pegging at the break, but I would say that Kerry are slightly the better of two poor enough sides, both of whom are tactically constrained. There's a few token efforts at a bit of schmozzling as players walk off - it feels more like play-acting for the crowd than anything else.

HALF-TIME KERRY 0-6 DERRY 0-6

A clumsy enough foul gives Shane McGuigan the first opportunity of the second half and he puts it over. Diarmuid O'Connor, though, cuts inside cleverly and shoots over. This was a game where the likes of Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, Paul Murphy, and Gavin White looked great slicing into gaps, but it was hard work by the likes of Tony Brosnan, Paudie Clifford, Dara Moynihan, and Diarmuid that opened those gaps. David Clifford has come out, but I suspect it's to open space for thers more than anything else. Michelangelo might get all the praise for the roof of the Sistine Chapel, but there were blocklayers involved too.

No, I'm sorry. Mentioning an artist like Michelangelo in the context of a game like this is an appalling misuse of metaphor and I apologise.

Great effort by Seán O'Shea, but again it's just barely wide of the post. Paul Geaney has a poorer miss, that should really have been over. Kerry are beginning to get on top. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch goes on another great run and wins a free for David Clifford. Derry can't handle overlapping pace and Ó Beaglaíoch has bags of it. Kerry with a penalty call as Seán O'Shea goes down - referee David Coldrick dismisses it, and he's absolutely right.

Paul Cassidy with an equaliser from close range. 0-8 apiece, but it's too slow and laborious to be described as 'tense' or 'exciting'.

Cillian Burke on for Kerry, and he has an instant mpact. He lays off to Paudie Clifford for a shot that is just wide but then bursts forward to set up Seán O'Shea for a point. He's big, he's direct, he's a bit too raw to be infected by the cautionary malaise that seems to have infected more experienced players on either side. In short, he's a breath of fresh air.

Killian Spillane on. Same thing. Taking his man on for an outrageous effort at a score would give most modern managers conniptions except that Killian is a master of this craft. A fantastic score, and he is probably the only player on the pitch who would have even attempted it. Wouldn't it be great if skill like this was encouraged instead of nullified in modern gaelic football? Arrah, I'd be as well off wishing for world peace if I'm going to be wasting wishes.

Brendan Rogers with a point. Derry's best player on the day, a real warrior. 0-10 to 0-9.

Kerry are beginning to spring their bench and lift the pace a bit. They have spent fifty minutes staying with Derry and avoiding any sucker punches. Now they are lifting a gear. It looks intentional. To say that Derry are feeling fatigued after their much harder road into this game is an easy cliché, but it's not one I agree with. This game wasn't tiring out any legs. There was an awful lot more jogging than sprinting. I honestly think that Kerry had always planned to open the throttle at this stage and once they do, Derry just don't have the same quality of

Tony Brosnan with another well-worked point. Kerry two ahead. Conor Glass with a foul on David Clifford and Seán O'Shea puts a goal between the sides. I'm still worried. Derry are perfectly capable of playing the kind of football that produces a goal and if they have it in them, this is the time to show it.

Ciaran McFaul decides to have a long range pop at a score. A panic decision? I don't know, but the ball sails wide and that's precious seconds gone. Kerry win the kick-out and play keepball. Quite right, too. It may annoy spectators, but when you have a three point lead, the clock is on your side.

Derry should be coming out and forcing Kerry to work the ball but instead, Derry seem to be waiting for Kerry to attack. This reminds me of the All Ireland Club Final in 2017. Dr. Crokes were two points up...so Slaughtneil retreated

completely into their own half to lure Crokes forward and win a turnover. And Crokes, an experienced team, took one look at this and asked themselves why they would go into that packed defence and risk a turnover. So they didn't, and just played it around until the clock ran out.

Likewise with Kerry here. They didn't need to score: they just needed to stop Derry scoring. Eventually Tom O'Sullivan has a shot at a point. It's long range, but he has scored from those positions before. Not on this occasion, and Derry have possession. Except that Shane McGuigan has a long range effort and it goes wide. That's another hammer blow for them. Seconds are precious now.

Cillian Burke with the ball. Once again, he's simply fearless and bursts forward, drawing the foul. That's not an easy kick by any means, but Seán O'Shea doesn't need it to be easy. Kerry four points in front.

Odhran Lynch coming up the field. That's a good kick and a good score. He has just scored more than four of Derry's starting forwards. That's a modern trend and a lot of people are praising goalkeepers for it. I wonder...has anyone stopped to think what it says about starting forwards nowadays?

Regardless. A goal in it again. Kerry still need to finish the job.

Derry, rightly, press the Kerry kick-out and force Shane Ryan to go long. Cillian Burke rose highest to break it to an alert Paudie Clifford and it ends up with Dylan Geaney shooting over. That's his first senior championship point for Kerry in Croke Park and he makes it look easy. It won't be his last.

Conor Glass with one last high ball into the Kerry square, but Diarmuid O'Connor plucks it out of sky at his easy and clears his lines. Kerry are in full control here and it ends up with Gavin White cutting in to fist over.

Kerry by five points in a knock-out (at long last! A game that actually means something!) match. No red cards, no injuries, an impressive bench to close it out. For Kerry, this was the perfect football match.

Apart from the actual football. No point in blaming Kerry, or Derry for that matter. Teams are going to play to win and the best way to win is not pretty nowadays.

That's up to Croke Park to fix, and even with Jim Gavin's input (which I support), they have a fair job in their hands.

Armagh up next. Another dour and defensive side. I'm worried about them. I have been worried about them all along. McGeeney turned them into a top four side several years ago; they just couldn't get the rub of the green. Big, strong men, and (if they trust them, which I doubt) forwards like Rian O'Neill who could cut us open. I don't think Armagh can outplay us, but I think they can outpower us physically. They play good football and they definitely play it on the edge. If you didn't like the football on display in this quarter-final (and of course you didn't; nobody did), I wouldn't bother bringing sparklers to this one either.

GALWAY 0-17 DUBLIN 0-16 THE SHOCK OF THE CHAMPIONSHIP

Moreover, the elimination of the one team I absolutely feared. I was quite happy with Kerry's National League (I count those medals as ballast for stormy waters ahead, not currency) apart from one game. The game where Dublin, who were no more showing their full hand than we were at that stage, still absolutely took us to school. Con O'Callaghan shredded

us that day in Croke Park, but I actually think that Dublin would have beaten us without him. And like I say, that was without throwing the handle with the hatchet. Dublin didn't look great at any stage during the championship – Louth running them to within four points in the Leinster Final was more about Dublin than Louth, with no disrespect intended towards a county that can no longer be considered 'Wee' in GAA terms. I always felt certain that Dublin, just like Kerry, were keeping a bit of powder dry for the latter stages.

At no point did I see this coming. Dessie Farrell made some changes to his starting team, bringing in some modern legends. Galway, much as I respect Pádraig Joyce, played their best football this year in the Connaught Final and barely scraped over the line against Mayo that day. As far as I was concerned, Dublin would have beaten the best of Galway and Mayo together. And they weren't even facing the best of Galway - the Tribesmen have been nursing injuries all year. I expected Dublin to win this without needing to reach for top gear. It looked like that early on. Galway were struggling for a couple of brilliant scores, whereas Dublin were picking theirs off with relative ease. It always felt like they were biding their time before landing a goal and pulling away. It hadn't arrived by half-time, with Dublin leading by 0-11 to 0-7, and Galway had actually done well to stay within four points. Shane Walsh was doing well but Damien Comer was clearly not 100% and Seán Kelly had already hobbled off. It wasn't a case of whether Dublin were going to win; it was a case of by how much. Dublin had the better of the third quarter as well, but Galway were still hunting and hanging in there. McDaid kicked two fine points - McDaid was a genuine contender for Footballer of the Year in 2022 and this looked like a throwback to those days. Dublin were iust a point ahead now. Interestingly - and I was treating more as an intellectual exercise than anything significant - the likes of Jack McCaffrey, James McCarthy, and Mick Fitsimons were beginning to fade out. If you are Galway and you are seeing the likes of Basquel and Lahiff replacing Mannion and McCaffrey.... good players and proud Dubs, but it's not like for like, is it?

And I still expected Dublin to pull away. Have

they a psychological hold on me? Possibly. They were so great for so long, and begrudgers be damned, that's what they were, that I wouldn't be surprised. Galway, though....even at their worst, you can't get into Galway's heads. They are as confident as Mayo are stubborn; neither side ever give anything up easily. And somehow, Galway kept just picking off those points. Dublin were still ahead by three with five minutes remaining but they looked rattled. Far from looking like scoring a goal, they looked anxious for it to be over. Johnny Heaney with his first look at the posts meant Johnny Heaney with his first point. Dublin players looked afraid of making a mistake; Galway players looked like they wanted the ball all day. I still thought it would go to extra-time and Dublin would regain composure. Instead, up stepped Tomo Culhane to write his name in history.

Have we seen the last of the likes of Cluxton, McCaffrey, Fitzsimons, Mannion, James McCarthy? Maybe. There's never an easy way for great ones to step off the stage, and they were great.

Fair play to Galway. No-one gave them a chance, so they took it for themselves. And I have to say fair play to Dublin. On a tough day, there wasn't one hint of an excuse or a whinge. They stepped on the field like champions; they stepped off it like champions.

DONEGAL 1-23 LOUTH 0-18

Derry's rise and fall in a matter of months under Mickey Harte is the compelling narrative of the year so far. Galway have the result of the year – for that matter, that Connaught Final has been the game of the Year so far for me, albeit because there is a scarcity of contenders. Donegal's resurgence under Jimmy McGuinness, however unpretty the play, is utterly compelling. Two years ago Donegal were riven by internal strains and going absolutely nowhere. Then McGuinness came back and suddenly a battle-hardened side were felling giants in Ulster. Louth deserve their place in the sun.

Mickey Harte's departure was assumed by most of us to be the end of an adventure and Ger Brennan would have a rebuilding job on



his hands. Except that somebody forgot to tell Brennan.

It wasn't a good game to watch. Both sides opted for containment. Louth didn't really have a choice and Donegal have never really considered any other option. They still picked off an opening 0-5 to 0-1 lead, even if Ciarán Keenan should have done better with a goal chance for Louth. At 0-7 to 0-3, I felt that Donegal were going to slowly and carefully pull away. Except that they didn't. Louth wouldn't let them. There's no denying Peadar Mogan the man of the match award, but I thought Tommy Durnin stamped his name in lights for Louth. It was 0-11 to 0-8 in Donegal's favour at half-time in another game of blanket v blanket. Not great to watch, but Louth were still in this game.

Donegal put on the press in the third quarter, a bit more speed and a bit quicker with the one-tows to get into the danger area. Slowly but surely (very slow and very sure - caution was still the byword) they pulled six clear. A flurry of points, including a couple of superb scores by Sam Mulroy, kept Louth in it until Donegal's goal. A strange one, an overhead fist to McBrearty, who hit the woodwork, only for Eoghan Ban Gallagher to follow up from close range. Almost a volleyball goal, but they all count. That was enough; Donegal eventually pulled away to win by eight points, but they left a lot of admirers behind them as they departed the championship. I'd have said at the start that the likes of Cork and Kildare have more quality and would be pushing the frontrunners; I would have been wrong.

ARMAGH 2-12 ROSCOMMON 0-12

Allow me to sum up the quality of this game very simply. After sixteen minutes, Armagh had two points. Roscommon had none, and two players off injured. Both teams had kicked a couple of wides and Armagh had missed a good goal chance. Both teams seemed nervous; I feel that both are capable of much better than they showed here. In fairness, Barry McCambridge kicked 1-1 after Roscommon got turned over by Armagh's blanket, but the Rossies will rue a lot of shooting chances gone astray. They trailed by 1-3 to 0-4 at half-time, Listowel's Conor Cox with two frees, but also lost Ruaidhrí Fallon to a red card. Two yellows, both justified.

Roscommon played the better football in the third quarter, but again struggled to put it on the board. At the three quarter mark Armagh were ahead by 1-7 to 0-7, maybe flatteringly so. Kieran McGeeney made a big call, taking off Rian O'Neill. Two minutes later they had kicked 1-1, Conaty pointing after breaking at speed and Conor Turbitt pouncing on a stray kick-out to hit the net. Roscommon kept going but kicked another three wides on the trot and hit the post. At this level, that's always going to come with a price tag and Armagh had just enough to see it out.

They weren't impressive. If Roscommon were more accurate (I definitely think nerves didn't help) they could have taken this one. Nonetheless, Armagh have finally seen off their quarter-final hoodoo. They are capable of much better than this; I just hope they don't realise it



any time soon.

Kerry will face Armagh on Saturday 13th at 5.30pm in Croke Park. Great. Another late drive home – I am not paying Dublin overnight prices. At least there will be an interesting curtain-raiser, with Laois facing Down in the Taillteann Cup Final.

HURLING COUNTY HURLING PRELIMINARY QUARTER-FINALS CAUSEWAY V DR. CROKES (AUSTIN STACK PARK, TONIGHT, 7.00PM)

The County Hurling Championship has been a bit stop/start so far, given that none of the ten teams were going to be eliminated in the group stage. It wasn't a successful experiment; I don't think any team lined out at full strength in any game and there was more speculation than excitement among supporters. Tonight, though, sees the real deal. Dr. Crokes are likely to welcome back Conor O'Hare, who was outstanding against Ballyheigue, but Charlie Keating is likely to miss the game.

They put up a decent battle against Kilmoyley even without that duo, with Mark Heffernan, Tom Doyle, and Nathaniel Doncel outstanding. Dr. Crokes have followed the modern trend of moving Michael Lenihan back to the half back line to direct operations, but for me he would be more influentuial as the fulcrum of attack. Causeway have been missing Jason Diggins and Muiris Delaney, while sharpshooter Gavin Dooley is an injury doubt after coming off against Crotta O'Neills. Nonetheless a team that includes the likes of John Mike Dooley, Keith Carmody, Brandon Barrett, and especially Dan Goggin has to be hotly fancied.

St Brendan's V Tralee Parnells (Abbeydorney, tonight, 7.00pm)

St. Brendans lost all three of the group games to Ballyduff, Crotta, and Causeway, but I definitely suspect that they were keeping a bit of powder dry and will be a tougher proposition than results indicate. It may be a year or two early for their young guns to fully blossom, but they have some serious talent coming on stream. Dual players is a big issue, as it is for most clubs, with St. Brendans having a good few players involved in Wednesday night's County U21 Football Final against Austin Stacks and players who played in the Hogan Cup Final for Mercy Mounthawk. They will be led as always by the evergreen Daithí Griffin. Eric Leen is one of the best defenders in Kerry and Gary O'Riordan is on his way to becoming that. St. Brendans have one of the youngest forward lines out there, with Fionán Egan (his dad John will likely line out in the half back line), Seán Brosnan, Earnán Ferris, and especially Liam Óg O'Connor (remember the name - that lad really is something special). I don't see St. Brendans getting to the latter stages this year, but I can't really see them losing out to Parnells either.

That said, Tralee Parnells are far from a pushover. They are new to the senior grade (and more than welcome) and have already been beaten by Lixnaw and Abbeydorney and are on a bit of a learning curve. Mind you, they almost pulled off the biggest championship shock in years, only losing out to Lixnaw in the dying seconds. They have some very good hurlers, the likes of Darragh Maloney, Tadhg Brick, Morgan Madden, the Shanahans, and sharpshooters Gearóid O'Doherty and Oisín O'Brien. Former, though, they are too dependent on that dup for almost all of their scores, and I suspect that St. Brendans will prove a bridge too far.

The Kingdom Warrior racked up another win, beating Serhii Ksendov in Liverpool to move another step closer to a rematch with Jamie Morrissey – his previous two bouts with the Limerick man were arguably the best Irish boxing matches of the past decade and put both fighters firmly on the map. Just an old-fashioned centre half. I'm going to kick something, preferably the ball. There's a lot to be said for it. I'd have him ahead of Maguire any day. Maguire is great at attacking the ball but he is badly caught once it goes behind him. That said, he didn't deserve the waves of hatred he got, either. You'd think he married a Royal while not being completely Caucasian or something equally heinous.

England have a lot of talent. Maybe too much talent. England's famous 'golden generation' won nothing because they were trying to shoehorn good players into unfamiliar roles and had too many similar types. Gerrard, Lampard, and Scholes in the one midfield? Great with the ball, lost without it. History appears to be repeating itself. Except that Southgate, obviously the worst manager in the world by a country mile (I'm Irish, lads, I could tell ye a few stories on that topic...) hasn't actually lost a game as I write this. Imagine the vitriol when he actually does. Worse, imagine if they win the thing. Sure, they rode their luck against Slovakia and have looked disjointed. But it wasn't as bad a display as pundits claim. Kane should have done better with that header and that was a cracking shot by Rice (granted, about the only thing he did in the game - he's a very decent player, but world class? Stop).

It's a bit like watching a horror movie. You just know all of this is going to end badly, but you aren't going to look away until it does.








"He who pays attention to the Word of God will find good. And blessed, happy, prosperous and to be admired is he who trusts confidently in the Lord" (Proverbs 16:20 Amplified Bible).

Welcome back dear student, focus! We talk a lot now about our span of attention, or the lack of it. Concentration is difficult when the mind is cluttered; it can lead to one feeling overwhelmed and constantly exhausted. Too much information is distracting. Our minds and hearts struggle to cope with the bombardment of material coming at us, especially the negative stuff. Social media experts have tapped into this by producing video reels that hold a person's attention for only fifteen or thirty seconds. People are being groomed to only engage for short bursts of time in a completely passive manner. It's dangerous because all kinds of evil can be happening whilst people are unaware - unable to give their attention to what's really important, as they're being diverted by various distractions. The Word of God declares that whatever we give our attention to reaps a reward — either good or bad. Constantly watching or listening to bad news etc.. can magnify negativity in a person's mind. The media rarely reports good news - as bad news sells, and gossip sells even better.

God exhorts us to pay attention to and learn His Word diligently, and then follow through by putting the Word into practice, for it has the power to bring His Life to one's entire being - including healing for the whole body (Proverbs 4:20-22). He told Joshua that in order to achieve success and prosperity (complete wholeness) Joshua needed to focus and meditate upon the Word of God - by declaring His promises every day and night being 'consistently consistent'. The Lord assured Joshua that if he obeyed, victory in every area of life would result (Joshua 1:8-9). It's the same for us. God never promised an easy ride — in fact Jesus warned '...in this life you will experience distress and suffering (because the devil tries to bring destruction) - but be of good cheer for I have overcome the world: so let My Joy and My Peace fill you with Hope instead' (John 16:33 paraphrased). The outcome of learning and proclaiming God's promises is that Hope is released. We all need Hope! Negativity and sin both destroy Hope. The Lord exposes that "hope deferred makes the heart sick" (Proverbs 13:12). So this is why people get depressed, or it can be a factor in how the body breaks into 'dis-ease'. Lack of Hope, which is ultimately lack of knowledge of God's goodness, breeds sickness, failure and death.

The enemy is clever — he watches people to see what are the triggers that cause them to fall and come under his power. I'm not even necessarily speaking about falling into blatant sin - but falling for his manipulation. When we give more attention to the opinions or wishes of others rather than what God's Word tells us, it's easy to get distracted and separated from the Truth. Controlling people can be operating a spirit of Jezebel, which is a subtle form of witchcraft. It's where their demands are put upon another – a person is tricked into submission without knowing how to extract themselves from that situation. It may not be abusive or, it can be very abusive and cruel. Feeling powerless is the result. But God promises that if we put Him first - and refuse to bow the knee to anyone other than the Lord Jesus Christ, our adherence to His Word will bring the courage to change: to see success instead of failure; deliverance from hopelessness, and peace in place of turmoil. God is good all the time!


