

Killarney Regatta Festival 2025

"It's all about the Boat"

he Killarney Regatta Festival was launched on Tuesday night at the Killarney Avenue Hotel. This year's event, the 237th staging of the historic regatta, will take place on Sunday, 14th September 2025, at O'Mahony's Point, Killarney Golf and Fishing Club, on the picturesque shores of Lough Lein. The occasion also marks an amazing milestone, the 70th anniversary of O'Mahony's Point as the traditional venue for the regatta.

Killarney Regatta Festival aims to celebrate and preserve the heritage and legacy of rowing the unique 'Killarney Sixes' - traditional racing boat on the lakes of Killarney, honouring the oldest traditional regatta in the world.

Acclaimed accordion sensation Liam O'Connor will be LIVE at this year's Killarney Regatta, Liam was on hand to help launch the 237th annual Killarney Regatta. Kerry Hospice Foundation is this year's chosen charity at the regatta.

The Muckross RC Ladies Crew - winners of the Killarney Regatta Ladies Junior and Senior Sixes in 1994 and 1995 were honoured at the launch.

The crew included: Margaret Cooper, Claire Fogarty (representing her sister Karen Fogarty RIP, 1996), Caroline Buckley, Eimear Fitzpatrick, Denise Casey and Deirdre O'Shea, the cox was the late Jimmy Mulligan.

The 2025 contestants for the Regatta Queen were introduced at the launch: Holly Heffernan, Flesk Valley RC, Saoirse Coffey, Fossa RC, Emma Meehan, St. Brendan's RC, Jenna Coffey, Muckross RC, Amelie Counihan, Workmen's RC. First Race of the day kicks off at 09.30 am, pausing at 12.30 noon for the blessing of Flesk Valley RC Racing Boats 'The Deirdre' and 'The Patricia'. This will be followed by the much coveted race of the regatta - The Mixed Heritage Race - Trustee of Muckross House Trophy at 13.15 pm. Last years winning crew 'Dinis Cottage' will be hoping to defend their title. The winning crew included: Mike 'Kenmare' O'Sullivan, Cox, John B. Cronin, John Beazley, Kevin Tangney, Derry Doyle, Bill Lyne and Paschal Dower.

Aside from all the family rivalries and races, that's just offshore! The onshore entertainment and fun is especially aimed at families and junior crews: Tug O'War, Potato Race, Sack Race, Charity Tote in aid of Kerry Hospice Foundation, and Liam O'Connor 'Live' - his World Debut at the Killarney Regatta.

Today, there are five active clubs in the hinterland of Killarney, training from various boat houses along the shoreline. The older rowing clubs date back to the 1800's, and were aligned to the estates and business people. The type of boat raced is unique to the Lakes of Killarney and known as 'The Killarney Sixes' - wooden in structure, wooden oar, fixed seat. The boats were originally designed and built by Salters in Oxford.



best in every voice.







Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in Killarney



TIME TO LIVE STREAM LECTURES TO STUDENTS TO SAVE ON ACCOMMODATION?



Last week, we spoke of lightbulb moments for the nation in the Rose of Tralee when an apprentice electrician rather than a college graduate snatched the title.

College education in Ireland has become the norm in a few decades. But do we need to question what has become a huge industry in institutions, accommodation, guidance counselling and media commentary?

Meanwhile, parents and children working summers and weekends are paying an absolute fortune in accommodation, travel and other expenses to underpin this gigantic runaway industry. This goes for those on partial grants or even full grants too. Because no grant covers all of it if you live outside Dublin, Cork, Galway, Limerick, even Tralee.

We need less awe, and a more hard-headed look at much of the third level racket that is borderline sacred cow in this country.

In reality this is a money making industry with lecturers and academics paid eye-watering salaries far above the European norm. And maybe even the world norm. While millions of euro is wasted in financial scandals in some of our universities.

I came across a great idea from a friend on Facebook.

"Because of the housing crisis, could universities

live stream their lectures for students. It would make life easier for commuters / students having to relocate. It would take people out of the list for accommodation. I know the university life is very important for students, but with costs at an all time high, families have to weigh that up in these unprecedented times," Marie wrote. I think this is an excellent idea. It is one that should be pursued.

It has been clear to me for some years that there is a slip in academic standards. We are not straying into the realm of Al or copying or grade inflation. But the level of skill in written reports, press releases, basic communication reports from Government authorities and even in newspapers is well below that of previous generations.

Degrees, particularly higher degrees, seem to take less and less time. Gone are the days when people had to do two years course work for an MA and then write a thesis (still the norm in France and Germany).

Is anyone looking at the teaching standards in third level institutions? In academic posts what seems to matter is esoteric research being published in obscure journals. How much teaching time, lectures and one to one or even small group tutorials do students get per university. Generally ITs are more rigorous and have more teaching time, is my own experience. There should be far more public scrutiny and transparency in teaching standards. All we have is which university here makes the world rankings which seem to rate access to facilities like swimming pools and internationalism as highly as libraries. Teaching accounts for only about 30 per cent of the overall score.

Killarney has shown the lead in the coffee cup project - but there is anyone following?

Coffee cups are littering towns and harbours

across Ireland - but few places are following Killarney's lead in trying to eliminate the waste. The recent Irish Business Against Litter survey said it is very disappointed other towns have not followed Killarney's 2022 lead. Nearly half of the litter found in Dingle harbour for instance - the Kerry harbour was one of three coastal sites across the country deemed littered - was coffee cup litter.

There are calls once more for a coffee cup levy. "The coffee cup levy seems to have died with the last Government, but these findings show that the case for it has not died," said Conor Horgan of IBAL. "Coffee cups have become a permanent addition to the suite of litter items regularly found on our beaches. It's not just their visual impact – many contain plastic, which threatens sea life and in turn our very survival. 'Coffee cup-free' coastal areas, along the lines of the Killarney model, would be very welcome," he said.

In June the IBAL survey of Killarney ranked it third of 40 towns surveyed and cleaner than European norms. "A superb performance by Killarney, as with so many previous IBAL surveys," IBAL said.

No site was heavily littered. However the area around the Deerpark Shopping Park, while generally clean, had too many food related items (sweet wrappers, cans, coffee cups and fast-food wrappers) next to Costa Coffee and cigarette butts close to Boots for the top litter grade.

Killarney Train Station also failed to meet the highest grade with a wide variety of food related items and cigarette butts, particularly along the pedestrian pathway. "It appeared to be lacking a thorough cleaning and there were minimal bins throughout," IBAL said.

While this is being addressed, the beautiful railway, the gateway to our town for many, is worth watching.

Council back to school time

A glance back at the agendas of the Killarney Municipal District over the past couple of years has identified a number of outstanding issues. As term time begins for our councillors in mid-September, the following issues are bound to reemerge.

The awful congestion on Mission Road: Kerry's only non-Government TD Pa Daly ranked the road as the most congested in the county recently. There is hardly a local meeting where the Mission Road is not mentioned. So what are the plans being advanced by councillors and management is a key question?

Last year I wrote elsewhere about the many multi-million euro projects set for Killarney including a theatre and a multi-storey car park. Alas and alack! We know now what happened to these projects.

So, back to the drawing board. What are the plans for the Áras Phádraig deemed derelict by council management. Is there any talk of actually doing it up? I had a suggestion and I think it is a valid one. "Extend and do up the Áras, don't knock it." Make it into a modern small theatre with practice and meeting rooms. Going back to what it was, in other words. **Affordable housing:** Still not one affordable house in Killarney under construction while the buy out of housing developments for social

housing continue apace by Kerry County Council and the various housing bodies. Killarney and Kerry is well behind most other local authorities on affordable housing. We are a lovely people, all social and no affordable in Kerry. Discrimination against a whole sector of our society - working people above a very modest income threshold - is really what is happening. It beggars understanding.

The Killarney Waste Water Treatment Plant: A clearly outlined case by public representatives and the local council to Uisce Eireann and the four Government TDs for the upgrade is much overdue.

And finally, the much vaunted third level tourism college in the Pretty Polly: Where is it? The Kerry ETB was the lead body in this. We haven't heard a word in months.

Killarney Shortlisted in Race for Ireland's Greenest Place 2025



Killarney has been officially shortlisted in the prestigious Ireland's Greenest Places 2025 competition, recognising its outstanding environmental leadership and community-wide sustainability efforts.

One of three nominations from County Kerry, Killarney is competing in the "Town" category, alongside Skerries (Dublin) and Ballina (Mayo), with the potential to also claim the overall national title.

Under its ambitious Sustainable Killarney 2030 Vision, the town has become a national leader in environmental action. Killarney made headlines as the first town in Ireland to eliminate single-use takeaway coffee cups - an initiative estimated to have prevented over 1.5 million cups from entering landfill.

Local environmentalism runs deep in Killarney. The town has embraced pollinator-friendly initiatives, supported by a network of green spaces, and is home to the Wander Wild Festival, which encourages a stronger connection to nature through sustainable outdoor experiences. Businesses have also stepped up, with many actively monitoring and reducing energy use as part of the town's shared

climate goals. Killarney's nomination comes as part of a strong showing for Kerry in the competition, with Castlegregory/Maharees shortlisted in the Village category and the Dingle Peninsula named in the Community category. Kerry's three nominations are second only to Dublin, which leads with four.

Launched by The Irish Times in association with Electric Ireland, the competition aims to highlight local action on climate and sustainability. More than 120 projects were submitted nationwide, with Killarney standing out for its collective engagement, long-term environmental planning, and clear evidence of cultural and behavioural change.

Judging is now underway, with final decisions to be made in the coming weeks. Whether Killarney takes the top prize or not, the town's place on the shortlist confirms its growing reputation as a model for sustainable living in Ireland.



The Water Rescue Team offers crucial search-and-recovery services across local lakes, rivers, and coastlines, often working alongside the Coastguard, Fire and Ambulance Services, and Kerry Mountain Rescue.

"When we set up the choir almost three years ago, we emphasised the importance of the community aspect. We've sung at MTU's Dochas Centre, Tralee Food Festival, Lasta Festival in Siamsa Tire, and Kilcummin's Jingle and Mingle event. But the Friary Christmas Concert will be our first major performance in Killarney itself, and our members are both excited and honoured," Choir Chairperson Tom O'Shea told Killarney Outlook.

Tom also spoke about the choir's strong social connection, which is as important as the singing itself: "There's solid research showing that social bonds are key to health and wellbeing. Our members feel connected, valued, and part of something meaningful. We mark the end of each

As in previous years, the letters Q, U, X, Y, and Z are excluded from the list, in



accordance with international storm-naming conventions. The naming system aims to raise awareness and improve public safety by making it easier to track and communicate severe weather events.

- Western Australia League Player of the Year 2025





Parents and guardians should ensure their child is getting to and from school safely and with road safety in mind. This includes them being visible to other road users, looking for a safe place to cross, using controlled crossings properly and being vigilant on their route to school. Parents, guardians and students themselves all have a role to play in ensuring a safe route to school for everyone. Motorists are also being reminded of the hazards and risks around schools with large numbers of young children in the vicinity and traffic congestion.

There are 15 School Warden Crossings throughout the county which are operated and managed by School Wardens who do a wonderful and very important job every day to assist students across the road safety. A school warden is employed by the council, and they operate under Section 96 of the Road Traffic Act 1961, which empowers them to stop and hold traffic to allow children to cross the road safely. Drivers are required by law to stop and remain stopped if the stop sign is displayed. Failure by a driver to do so is an offence for which they can be prosecuted and receive penalty points and a fine.

As part of Kerry County Council's road safety strategy, the Road Safety Officer will include visits to primary and secondary schools throughout the county during the school term to deliver road safety education programmes to school students.



Ní Mhurchú calls for a get-tough approach on speeding as Garda speed vans collect over €32 million euros nationally in 30 months. In Kerry, Garda speed vans only collected €482, 080 in the same period.

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has called for a get-tough approach to those who are caught doing excessive speeds on our rural roads. The MEP has called for a greater concentration of speed vans at accident black spots and on our rural roads in Kerry where speeding is dramatically impacting on road safety.

The EU Transport Committee MEP made her calls as Gardaí released figures to her showing that €32,437,002 has been collected in fines from Garda speed vans between January 2023, and June 8th, 2025. In the same period, only €482,080 was collected in Kerry by Garda speed vans. By comparison, over €3.3m was collected in nearby Tipperary. Garda figures released to Ní Mhurchu also show that Gardaí paid out over €44m euro to private speed

camera operators between the start of 2023 and up to August 18th, 2025, meaning that the Garda speed van system is operating at an overall loss. Dublin and Tipperary were two of the highest grossing counties for the Garda speed vans in the period with Cork and Kildare following closely behind.

All eyes on Caoimhe as she represents Ireland in the European U23 Rowing Championships

n exciting summer of rowing is reaching its crescendo this month with multiple events at home and abroad bringing an end to the extended rowing season of 2024/25. Ireland's top national senior crews are currently preparing for the World Rowing Championships which will take place in Shanghai, China at the end of September. Closer to home, Muckross and University of Limerick rower Caoimhe O'Sullivan has been selected as part of the Irish U23 squad to compete in the European Rowing Under 23 Championships, that will take place this weekend in Racice, Czech Republic. Caoimhe will race as part of the Womens Eight crew, one of just two Irish crews involved in the contest together with the Mens Eight. Caoimhe, a native of Headford in Killarney, is no stranger to international competition. In 2021, Caoimhe raced as a junior for Ireland in the Coupe de la Jeunesse for Under 19 rowers while in 2023, Caoimhe was selected as part of the Senior Womens squad for Ireland at the Home International Regatta. Caoimhe has also won a number of Irish Championship titles racing with her university club UL

This weekend's racing in the Czech Republic sees Ireland's Womens Eight race in a field of just five crews with competition from hosts Czech Republic as well as Austria, Spain and Romania. The five Womens Eight crews will have a preliminary race (10:35am Irish time) on Saturday 6th September to decide the lane draw for Sunday's final race (11:14am Irish time).

Caoimhe's Czech campaign follows an already successful rowing year for her home club Muckross RC, with five of its members already donning the green jersey. In July, Rachel Fuller returned home from the Home International Regatta in London as a double gold medal winner for Ireland. At the Homes event in London, Rachel was also joined by fellow Muckross rowers Ethan O'Neill and Daniel Daly who competed as part of the Irish Mens squad. In early August, Muckross junior rowers Cian Scannell and Ronan Fahy also represented Ireland, racing in the Coupe

de la Jeunesse for European juniors. Cian returned home as a bronze medallist in the Mens Double event. Hopes are now high for further success in the Czech Republic and for Caoimhe and Irish Womens Eight crew.

Back at home in Muckross, rowers are also busy preparing for the final local contests of the rowing season. The countdown continues to the historic Killarney Regatta, which sees local rivalries reignited for the town's oldest sporting contest. The annual Killarney Regatta will take place at O'Mahony's Point, Killarney Golf and Fishing Club on Sunday 14th September. This weekend also sees the staging of the Kenmare Endurance Regatta, which will involve crews competing in coastal rowing boats over 2km and 4km races.

Families continue to seek back-to-school support from SVP despite extension of free books scheme

The Society of St Vincent de Paul (SVP) has received almost 3,500 calls for help with back-to-school costs this year, as parents looked for support with expensive uniforms, voluntary contributions, school administration fees, electronic devices, mock exams and Transition



Year charge:

From 2023 to 2024, SVP recorded a notable 26% reduction in calls during the back-to-school period, largely due to the introduction of free school books for primary and post-primary pupils. This year, despite the scheme being extended to senior cycle students, the charity has seen just a 3% decrease in calls as families struggle to meet other education costs.

"While free books are a welcome step, the reality is that education in Ireland is still far from free," said Niamh Dalziel, Research & Policy Officer with SVP. "Parents are cutting back on essentials or going into debt to meet school costs. Chronic underfunding forces schools to rely on families, creating a system that is deeply unequal."

SVP is urging Government to address the underlying funding gaps in education through

Budaet 2026.

The charity's key recommendation to improve educational equity, as set out in the Delivering an Equal and Inclusive Budget submission, include:

- · Removal of mock exam and correction fees.
- · Provision of funding support for electronic devices in schools where they are mandatory.
- · ncrease of the capitation grant by 25%, with a higher rate of 30% made available to schools that implement the Department of Education's guidance on affordable school uniforms.

"An inclusive education system removes financial barriers and stigma, and gives every child the chance to thrive," said Dalziel. "Budget 2026 is an opportunity to make free education in Ireland a reality."







Minister Foley Welcomes Confirmation That CHILDREN AGED 5–8 CAN NOW TRAVEL FREE ON PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation from her Cabinet Colleague, Minister for Transport, Darragh O'Brien T.D that children aged 5 to 8 will now be eligible for free travel on all Transport for Ireland (TFI) services.

From this week, some 263,000 children nationwide can travel free with a TFI Leap Card.

The scheme applies to all TFI public transport services, including Local Link, Dublin Bus, Bus Éireann, Go-Ahead Ireland, larnród Éireann, and LUAS.

Children under 5 already travel free, and this expansion ensures no child is charged for public transport until their ninth birthday.

Minister Foley said: "This is a really positive development for families in Kerry and right across the country.

Providing free travel for children up to their ninth birthday eases the financial burden on households and makes public transport a far more attractive option for families.

It also delivers on a clear commitment in the Programme for Government to make transport more affordable, more accessible, and more sustainable.



Government is committed to better connectivity, sustainable transport, and easing the cost of living for families - today's announcement is another step in that direction."





MTU is collaborating with Kerry ETB and Cork ETB to provide an ever increasing number of degrees in Nursing, Arts, and Science. The initial year of study is in a campus of Kerry ETB or Cork ETB, depending on the course of study, and then progressing on to MTU. University College Cork and Cork ETB are offering an honours degree in Social Work while Kerry ETB and Cork ETB together with UCC are offering an honours degree in Occupational Therapy. In fact, Tertiary Degrees are now offered by 14 ETBs in over 19 FET campuses, partnering with 6 HEIs

over 11 campuses. More third level colleges are collaborating with ETBs throughout the country to further expand the Tertiary Degree scheme. This is a wonderful development and will, no doubt, continue to provide many students with an alternative route to a degree.

APPLY

Applying for a third-level tertiary course is uncomplicated. An applicant can apply directly through the course information page of the NTO website, www.nto.ie. The website currently provides a full list of courses for 2025/2026 entry. Alternatively, a person can apply through the local ETB website or the college providing the course. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the ETB and complete the remainder in higher education colleges. Tertiary degrees are available in a wide variety of disciplines.

REGISTERED

From day one of a tertiary degree course, students are registered at both the ETB where they are commencing their course and the partnered third level college. This provides the student with access to dual supports and services including libraries, sports, and other campus facilities as well as academic, health and wellbeing supports.

REQUIREMENTS

You don't need the same leaving cert points for a tertiary course as a person applying for the same degree via the CAO. Different tertiary course programmes have different entry requirements. An applicant may be required to submit proof from other agencies to show s/he is eligible and meets the entry requirements for the course s/he is applying for. Refer to the course information section in the course page of the NTO website for those details.

EXCITING

Tertiary courses are an exciting new pathway

to a Bachelor's degree. The course information section in the course page of the website details the qualification available. Applications for the 2025/2026 academic year remain open until late September.

TIPS ON SLEEP AND IMPORTANCE

WEEK 2: Last week we covered the WHY of the importance of sleep. This week we cover the How as to Sleep hygiene best practices. Please read of following top tips.

- 1. Keep a regular schedule. Our bodies like regularity. Try to go to bed and wake up at the same times. With a regular schedule, your body will know when to release calming hormones before bed, and stimulating hormones to wake up.
- 2. Keep alcohol and caffeine moderate. Both will interfere with sleep. Try to avoid caffeine within 8-9 hours of your bedtime.
- 3. Eat and drink appropriately. A regular to smallish-sized meal about 2-3 hours before bed, one that is balanced in nutrients, can help facilitate sleep. Try not to drink too much liquid in the hours before bed, which will help you avoid waking up for bathroom breaks.
- 4. Do a brain dump. Take a few minutes to write out a list of whatever is bugging you. Whatever is in your brain, get it out and on to paper.
- 5. Turn off electronics. Digital devices stimulate our brain. We recommend unplugging from all screens at least 30 minutes before bed. This includes television, computers, and smartphones. The screens release a blue light that prevents our brain from preparing for sleep.
- 6. Stretch / read / de-stress before bed. Consider trying some yoga poses, reading, or meditation. 7. Go to bed before midnight. This is better aligned with natural light cycles. 8. Set an alarm to go to bed. Work backwards and add buffer time: If you need to wake up at 6 AM and want to be in bed for 7 hours, start moving towards bed around 10:30 PM with lights out by 11. The Hidden Challenges of Living with Crohn's and Colitis: Q&A with Dr Orlaith Kelly

Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis are two types of Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD), chronic autoimmune conditions that affect an estimated 40,000 people in Ireland.[i] Beyond the physical symptoms, the conditions place a considerable emotional and financial strain on individuals and their families.

Recent research, 'Uncovering the Hidden Cost of Crohn's and Colitis', carried out by Crohn's & Colitis Ireland (CCI) and Johnson & Johnson, highlighted the extent of these challenges. Six in ten people with IBD face financial difficulty, and 75% reported experiencing anxiety or depression.

Following the publication of this research, Dr Orlaith Kelly, Consultant Gastroenterologist, Connolly Hospital Dublin, addresses some of the key questions about the lived experience of IBD, including its psychological toll, based on clinical expertise and the latest research insights.

Q: What is Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD), and how does it develop?

Dr Orlaith Kelly explains that "IBD is a chronic condition that includes Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. It causes inflammation in the digestive tract, which can result in structural damage to the intestines over time. This inflammation can lead to serious complications, such as bowel obstruction, ulcers, and an increased risk of colon cancer.

The exact cause of IBD isn't fully understood, but it's believed to result from a combination of genetic, environmental and immune factors. Essentially, the immune system mistakenly attacks the body's own intestinal tissue, leading to ongoing inflammation.

IBD is not caused by something a person did, and no one is to blame for developing it. It typically develops in young adulthood but can occur at any age, and symptoms can vary from person to person."

Q: What are the main signs and symptoms of Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis that people

should be aware of?

"Both Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis are forms of Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD), and while they affect different parts of the gut, their symptoms often overlap. People may experience persistent diarrhoea (sometimes with blood or mucus), abdominal pain or cramping, fatigue, low energy levels, rectal bleeding, or unexplained weight loss. These symptoms can come and go, but when they persist or worsen, it's important not to ignore them.

Crohn's disease can affect any part of the gastrointestinal tract, from the mouth to the anus, whereas ulcerative colitis is limited to the colon and rectum. Because these are chronic, lifelong conditions, early diagnosis and the right treatment plan are key to managing symptoms and avoiding complications. If you're experiencing any of these signs, I would strongly encourage you to speak to your GP or a specialist. Early intervention really can make all the difference."

Q: What are the emotional and psychological impacts of living with IBD?

"IBD deeply affects mental health and emotional wellbeing. The recent research carried out by Crohn's and Colitis Ireland and Johnson & Johnson shows that 75% of people with IBD experience anxiety or depression, and two-thirds feel socially isolated. Managing daily symptoms like fatigue, pain and digestive issues, can be overwhelming and unpredictable, often disrupting work, school and personal relationships."

Dr. Kelly explains that "These conditions are not just 'tummy troubles', they are chronic illnesses that can affect every aspect of daily life: emotionally, physically, and socially. This can leave people feeling invisible and misunderstood. 96% of people surveyed said fatigue is a major challenge, and 81% find managing daily symptoms difficult."

Q: What are some of the financial challenges that come with living with IBD?

"Living with IBD often means dealing with ongoing, hidden costs that many others don't face like regular medications, specialist foods, and frequent travel to medical appointments. These added expenses can place a real strain on individuals and families, particularly when flare-ups interrupt work or require people to take extended time off.

We know that people in Ireland living with IBD spend, on average, over €3,250 each year managing their condition. Nearly half have avoided seeking medical care because of the cost, and more than a quarter have delayed taking their medication

to make it last longer. This kind of financial pressure doesn't just affect day-to-day life; it directly impacts a person's ability to manage their condition effectively. When people are forced to delay care or stretch their medication, it increases the risk of complications and can lead to worse long-term outcomes."

Q: How does IBD impact social life, work and relationships?

Dr Kelly explains: "IBD has a farreaching impact on day-to-day life, with over 70% of people living with IBD report that the condition affects their overall quality of life and ability to take part in social activities. We see patients making significant life adjustments such as reducing work hours, changing jobs, even avoiding social situations out of fear they won't have access to a bathroom. These limitations aren't always visible to others, but they're very real and exhausting to live with.

Around two-thirds of people say their condition has influenced their education or career choices, and many also face difficulties maintaining personal relationships, especially during flare-ups."

Q: What needs to change to better support people living with IBD — and what's your message to the public?

"IBD is a lifelong and incurable condition, but with the right care, support and understanding, it can be managed. These conditions don't just affect the gut during occasional flare-ups, they can also cause inflammation in other parts of the body, such as the joints, skin and

eyes. They require daily attention and can have a major emotional, physical and social impact. That's why we need a more holistic approach to care.

At a policy level, recognising IBD within the Chronic Disease Management Programme would give patients access to structured, multidisciplinary care, including dietitians, IBD nurses, and mental health professionals. Unfortunately, despite being a chronic and often disabling condition that affects over 1% of the population, IBD is still not formally recognised under schemes such as the Long-Term Illness Scheme. This lack of recognition and state support is one of the key factors contributing to the financial hardship faced by many people living with IBD.

We also need greater access to psychological support and more public understanding of what it truly means to live with this condition. Peer support groups and resources from organisations like CCI can be incredibly empowering, helping people feel informed, connected, and more in control.

Listen to the lived experiences of people with IBD. Don't underestimate what they're carrying, both physically and emotionally. They deserve the same dignity and support as anyone living with a chronic illness."

THE DEER HUNTERS

A call has been made by farming representatives in Kerry that the Department of Agriculture Food and the Marine should incentivise hunters to control deer numbers in the county, by introducing a 'Bounty', according to Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill. The deer population in Kerry has risen enormously in recent years, so much so that there isn't a field, garden or road in the county that hasn't been visited by them, according to the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Tourism and Older People.

"Everybody is aware that the Red and Sika deer have moved far beyond the confines of Killarney National Park, roaming freely through Kerry, damaging crops and gardens and are a real threat to life and limb on our roads. "Similar 'Bounties' were previously successfully introduced for other culls such as foxes and seals and I have submitted a Parliamentary Question to the Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Martin Heydon in



Dáil Éireann, to do so in this instance of rampant deer numbers" stated the newly elected TD for Kerry.

"I believe that it is important to incentivise hunters to control deer numbers and assist in preventing accidents/tragedies in County Kerry by introducing such a "Bounty" added Michael Cahill TD.

Deputy Cahill Voices Strong Support for School Secretaries and Caretakers in Ongoing Dispute

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has publicly declared his support for school secretaries and caretakers as industrial action continues across the country in a dispute over pay equality and public service status.

Deputy Cahill expressed his solidarity with striking school staff, calling for immediate and meaningful engagement from Government to resolve the dispute. The issue, which centres on calls for pension parity, critical illness leave, and bereavement leave, has seen school caretakers and secretaries on picket lines rather than in the schools they help keep running.

Speaking today, Deputy Cahill said, "School caretakers and secretaries are the backbone of our school communities. It is deeply unfair that they work side by side with public servants such as teachers and SNAs every day, in the same buildings, yet do not receive the same entitlements or recognition. That must change. This is something I have previously raised as a councillor and now as a TD."

Deputy Cahill confirmed that he has raised this issue within the Fianna Fáil Parliamentary Party, and is urging for the issue to be resolved immediately. He added, "We want to see this dispute resolved quickly and fairly. I have made clear to my colleagues in Government that this is a matter of justice and dignity for some of




the most essential, yet overlooked, workers in our education system. The Government must engage constructively with unions to bring about a solution."

Cllr. Tommy Cahill, son of Deputy Michael Cahill, also voiced strong support for school secretaries and caretakers, stating, "In my former career as a primary school teacher, I saw first-hand the critical role school secretaries and caretakers play in the day-to-day running of a school. The work of school secretaries and caretakers are vital to the functioning of our education system and to the wellbeing of the children and staff who depend on a safe and well-maintained environment each day. As recently as Saturday, we raised this issue

with An Taoiseach Micheál Martin on his visit to South Kerry and strongly encouraged him to give school secretaries and caretakers what they deserve."

Deputy Cahill concluded by saying, "I have had correspondence and direct engagement with local school secretaries and caretakers on this matter. This situation cannot be allowed to escalate further. These workers are not asking for anything unreasonable, they are asking to be treated with the respect and equality they have long deserved. I will continue to push this matter at every level to ensure their voices are heard and acted upon. I look forward to a resolution in the coming days."







Kerry FC were on the road for the first Friday night in six weeks as they made the long trip to Louth to play Dundalk FC for the final time this season.

Kerry FC came into this one on a high, having won last week's game against Longford Town at Mounthawk Park, making it two wins from two, along with the fantastic Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup victory against Cobh Ramblers. For the league leaders, Dundalk FC, they returned to Louth following their emphatic 7-0 win over Treaty United in Limerick, which saw a hat-trick from League of Ireland veteran Daryl

For Colin Healy's men, Youth academy graduate Ryan Perez made his first senior start today and what a test it would be for the young man.

Horgan.

A small crowd made their way up from the Kingdom, hoping the team on the pitch would have something for them to cheer about on the way back from County Louth.

The game began with Dundalk enjoying their customary early possession, but Kerry, disciplined in their defensive shape, settled quickly. In the seventeenth minute, Gbemi Arubi carved out the first real chance for the home side, forcing a corner that Kerry scrambled clear after a nervy moment for goalkeeper Matthew Connor when the ball flew over his head. Moments later, Dundalk thought they had taken the lead when the ball ended up in the net, only for referee Lucas Keating to whistle for a free-out to relieve the pressure.

Then, twenty-two minutes in, came the moment that set the crazy tone for the evening. Joe Adams, alert in midfield, found Ronan Teahan with a clever pass. Teahan's first touch was immaculate, his balance impeccable, and his finish exquisite. The midfielder drove at the Dundalk defence, skipped past a challenge, and struck low into the near post and past a couple of Dundalk defenders to give Kerry a stunning 1-0 lead ever so slightly against the run of play. The goal visibly rattled Dundalk, though Vincent

Leonard nearly restored the goal disadvantage five minutes later with a curling effort that went narrowly wide. Kerry, however, were not content to sit deep. Robbie Cleary's acrobatic attempt from a Teahan cross just before the half-hour mark drew a somewhat comfortable save from Enda Minogue, a reminder that the Kingdom were intent on asking their own questions.

Still, Dundalk's pressure inevitably mounted. Connor, who would go on to play a crucial role throughout, denied Arubi with a strong stop on thirty-four minutes in. But the Kerry goalkeeper's involvement soon turned more dramatic. On the thirty-ninth minute mark, the referee pointed to the spot after Connor took out Arubi in the box. Booked for the incident, he could do nothing as the experienced Daryl Horgan calmly converted the penalty to level the score at 1-1, although Connor was not far off.

If Kerry's travelling support feared a collapse, they need not have worried. Within sixty seconds of the restart, Kerry were ahead once more. A superb delivery into the box from Ewan Lee found Robbie Cleary, who rose highest and powered a header into the net to restore the Kingdom's advantage. The sheer audacity of Kerry's response left the home crowd stunned, and as the half-time whistle blew with the visitors 2-1 ahead, the belief among the away fans was palpable.

Whatever was said in the Dundalk dressing room at the interval had an immediate effect. Within seconds of the restart, captain Daryl Horgan struck again, latching onto a loose ball in the six-yard box and driving a low shot beyond Connor to make it 2-2.

But Kerry's character shone through yet again. Straight from the ensuing kick-off, Teahan picked up possession in midfield, strode forward with purpose, and unleashed a swerving strike from distance that dipped viciously into the net. It was a goal worthy of any stage, and it restored Kerry's lead at 3-2, sparking wild celebrations on the sideline and in the away end. It could be argued that Enda Minogue could have done better, but the swerve on the shot proved to be too much to handle.

Unfortunately for Kerry, the breathless nature of the game continued to favour Dundalk's firepower. On the fiftieth minute mark, substitute Keith Ward found space in the box and drilled home the equaliser for 3-3. Three goals in just five minutes left both sets of supporters scarcely able to catch their breath. The frenetic pace eased slightly thereafter, but Kerry FC continued to pose a threat on the break. Manager Colin Healy introduced Cian Brosnan for Ryan Perez to add fresh legs, while Arran Healy replaced Oran Crowe midway

through the half as Kerry rotated to keep up

with Dundalk's relentless tempo.

The hosts gradually began to dominate possession, but Kerry's defensive shape and Connor's reliability in goal kept them at bay. The goalkeeper got down sharply to deny Horgan as the hour on the stopwatch loomed, while Norman Garbett and Dean Ebbe both spurned golden chances in the final fifteen minutes. Connor also showed bravery to claim a dangerous header from Conor O'Keefe with thirteen minutes to go, and when Ebbe fired wide from inside the area with just ten minutes left, the sense grew that Kerry FC might just cling on.

As the minutes ticked down, Luke Palmer was introduced for Cleary to add energy up top, and though Dundalk threw everything forward, Kerry defended valiantly. The fourth official signalled five minutes of added time, but the Kingdom's backline held firm through wave after wave of attacks. When the final whistle sounded, Kerry's players collapsed to the astroturf in exhaustion but also pride, having earned a famous point against the league leaders.

There was a real sense of joy that this was the first time in the three years of the club's short existence that they managed to get a point off the league leaders, but also a sense of disappointment that they led three times and could not hold out for all three points—a real piece of progression in itself.

With Kerry FC now just six points off the playoff places, it's really starting to feel around the club like this season could be a special one, especially with so many important games ahead in both leagues and cup competitions. ADMINISTRATIVE AFFAIRS



PAYMENT FOR MANAGERS

"The greatest amateur sports organisation in the world". That's always been the GAA's greatest branding. From the very start, players weren't paid for their endeavours. Now, even back then, I'm sure the best players were well minded. But there are enough stories about people not being compensated for missing work, travelling expenses....meals after training meant a packet of digestive biscuits if you were lucky. And that's in the successful counties. Back in the early seventies, Kerry had a good few players who had to drive back to their bases in Cork after training, pretty much on empty bellies. Dr. Jim Brosnan agreed to provide steak. That was right at the start of the Golden Years team. Obviously it's not the only factor, far from, but you won't convince me that it didn't help. Dublin in the seventies more or less had to face down their own County Board (before Jimmy Gray came in - that Chairman had as much to do with Dublin's rise as Heffernan couldn't he have left well enough alone?) to get decent treatment. Players were expected to be like Victorian era schoolchildren, seen and not heard. I'm not suggesting that players were never paid; that's nonsensical and everybody knows it. Plenty of players switched clubs for various named reasons, and there were obviously unnamed reasons as well. Micksie Palmer, to his great credit, was cheerfully open about some of his transfers. It's well-known that it was worth a good players' while to head off and play in America over the summer holidays. Don't mind the Tony Keady Affair in 1989, when a great Galway hurler got a twelve month suspension for playing under a false name. Everybody knew that hundreds more were doing the same, he was just a scapegoat. The GAA was attempting to draw a line on the sand...good luck with that, Ozymandias. Loads did it and still do it; I'd have done it myself if any of them wanted me (they didn't). Players get sponsored cars, appearance fees etc - I believe Jason Sherlock was the first player to

officially have an agent – being an inter-county player can be highly rewarding. But there isn't a one of them that put in all that work -and I'm not sure that people understand exactly how much commitment being an inter-county player requires, and not just on the training field but in every single aspect of your life – for the possibility of financial reward much later on. No, players being paid to play is not an impossibility, but I don't believe that it exists in sufficient numbers to be a significant problem. Managers, though.....that's the crux of the issue. Astute management – and man management as much as game management - is vital to success now. Admittedly there is a modern media myth about manager cults - "change the manager and automatically change results" nonsense. You think Ruben Amorim, whose unwillingness to change a failing formation was certainly an issue, was the root of Old Trafford's problems? But good management is crucial, and in professional sports, the best can command the highest salaries. Interestingly, the top players, almost always scorers, get paid way more than the people hired to tell them what to do.

There is absolutely no way that the early coaches were getting paid. It was a patriotic privilege. Jerry Collins, Dr. Eamonn...no way. Remember, these were coaches, not 'managers'. They had no say in team selection or tactics; that was the role of the elected and all-important 'selectors'. Honest to God, the FAI was run like that until well into the sixties, and some of the team selections....the phrase 'lions led by donkeys' was originally applied to the British in World War 1, but I think it fits.

Dick Fitzgerald coaching Clare is an interesting one. I have never seen the slightest indication that he was paid, but a Killarney-based man is travelling to coach in Clare back then? You can quadruple any modern travelling time. I don't know how sustainable that would be on a voluntary basis, so I would be surprised if remuneration wasn't part of that discussion.

By the way, sports science has certainly evolved at a pace commensurate with the Computer Age, but the popular notion that it suddenly blossomed out of nothing around the early sixties....would ye ever give over. I've a training manual for athletics from the early 1900s somewhere at home and, honest to God, you wouldn't go far wrong to follow those instructions nowadays.

Somewhere around the late sixties, early seventies, things started becoming more professional. Did the visit of Harry Beitzel's touring Aussie Rules side in 1967 have an impact? I don't think so. I think it was more than the success of Ulster counties helped foster a growth in coaching courses rather than a

reliance on an assumed innate talent. That was also happening in other sporting codes. Also, the simple fact that a stagnant economy was finally beginning to improve meant that it was affordable. Add in a broadening of education in general and improvements in communications technology and you had quite a cocktail.

The GAA was always big business. By the late seventies it was actually huge. Even today, actually think about it in terms of real estate as well as turnover, let alone ticket receipts. The more successful you were, the more money came into your club/county (I honestly don't believe that administrators were pocketing money for themselves; I really don't). A bigger piece of a bigger pie. Of course you are going to pay for expertise. You'd be a fool not to.

Taking on an inter-county team has required the commitment of a full-time job for at least three decades now. And the workload isn't getting smaller. Any of you who read this column on a regular basis (thanks, but jaysus, ye are hard up for entertainment) will know my feelings about the increased amount of games. There should be no group stage in any All Ireland and group stages in both our Club and County Championships gives players no breaks.

Managers have to pretty much supervise every training and video/discussion session. Plus micromanage a hundred other things that players might not even notice. That's at club level now. Of course managers are being paid, and we have all known it for a long time. They absolutely should be. Nicky Brennan acknowledged it as a problem in 2009. A different GAA Uachtaráin a year later declared that an investigation "couldn't even find the tables, let alone find under the table payments". Even at the time, and this was when every second week was unveiling a new scandal in Irish society, that statement drew particular derision. Yes, managers are being paid, and deserve to be paid. So I'm obviously in favour of Jarlath Burns' suggestion (I don't think it can be given as concrete a term as actual 'proposal' just yet) that inter-county managers receive €20,000 pa as a salary, right? Especially as it would be taxable. The Revenue Commissioners always took a pretty lax view of sports organisations traditionally, and no politician was ever going to push for investigations into as popular an organisation as the GAA (the opposite, in fairness; the GAA has always been head of the queue for Government grants). Those days are over. Yes, the massive failures of another Irish sporting organisation, and I do mean absolutely massive, didn't help. But I think all the political scandals and the 'brown envelope' culture has had an impact. People got tired of the old nod and wink culture. Every county either has or is undergoing an audit, I believe Donegal are the latest to make a settlement. Under the table payments? Certainly not gone, but getting harder to conceal. And no harm. Accountability, believe it or not, isn't a swear word

Paying managers €20,000 pa would improve nothing. It would only top up the salaries involved. The competition to attract the best would not change in the slightest, the cost would just go up. It's a populist gesture that only purports to deal with an issue rather than actually dealing with it.

You want to deal with payments to managers? No problem. You can't be a manager or part of the sideline of a county/club unless you have been a member of that club/county for at least two years. Hire in all the trainers you want, but they can't be with you on match day. That would solve the problem at a stroke.

But that would not be populist. That would be both effective and unpopular. That's why that discussion isn't going to happen. But until it does, spare me the nonsense about payments to managers.

AUSSIE RULES COMPENSATION

Right. That's one little rant off my chest (thank you. Why, yes, I do feel a lot better). But since I'm on a roll, let's have another. And let's face it, it will be a regular topic of discussion over the next year in regard to at least two Kerry players, probably one more if I am reading the wind right. This self-righteous notion that GAA clubs should be compensated when players sign for AFL clubs. Why?

Yes, it does happen in soccer. But you do understand that's because a player is moving from one (amateur) to another (professional) club under the one overall sports organisation (FIFA). A player moving from GAA (remember, 'greatest amateur sporting organisation in the world') to.....a completely separate sport, is a bit different. Very different.

Should the compensation go to the county or the club? What if, as is often the case in Kerry, a footballer hurls with a different club? E.g. Finuge/Lixnaw, Ardfert/St. Brendans? Should the hurling club get half? What if the lad played a bit of soccer or rugby or basketball, the scut? Should they all get a piece?

Funny how there isn't the same furore when ladies footballers make the transition, as a lot have nowadays (the respective calendars match up reasonably closely). Less money and less influence in the ladies' game, to be honest about it, but I also think that having come from a lower financial, supportive, and structural base, they are simply more pragmatic in terms of cutting their cloth to measure. Less inclined to.....how shall I put this....excrete in a bovine manner?

Long ago, I toddled my way into primary school, after my mother got tired of her three year old arguing that string theory contradicted too much about quantum mechanics. A lovely woman there eventually taught me how to read and write. Now, many years later. I actually got a job (yes, of course I lied on my CV) that involves reading and writing. Guess how much my employer paid to



that school or that teacher? And look, I know that their profession is teaching, but this idea of a debt to a completely unconnected company/ organisation just because you hire some-one? Stop.

And since I'm not making friends among the devotees of the game anyway, Inmay as well say it. Any young lad/lass who asks me for advice in regards to AFL offers? Go for it. A huge opportunity and a great adventure. Yes, it might be lonely. It might not work out. But it definitely won't if you don't even try. Jaysus, at worst you will have a free year in Australia. Amid all the tears and the lamentations and the wailing about AFL desperadoes robbing the flower of Irish youth merely to enrich their greedy selves with filthy lucre, just like the Saxon invaders (they were more Norman by then) did in centuries past.....lad, you slogged on training grounds and hard matches often enough and you were often lucky if you got a cup of tea. Don't mind the guilt trip. If you get a chance, go for it and good luck to you.

HALF A BILLION FOR INTEGRATION?

It was a bit of a throwaway remark by Jarlath Burns at a Summer School so let's not get too excited. But it did definitely catch my attention. The GAA are committed to full integration between the GAA, LGFA, and Camogie Association by the end of 2027. Great idea, long past overdue, I've supported it for years. People playing gaelic games are people playing gaelic games. Facilities, coaching, etc. should certainly be pooled. Yes, as the big dogs in the room, the GAA would be the main contributor. But the overall sport, and Irish society, would benefit hugely. It's no-brainer.

And look, if you oppose it, that's okay too. This idea that it must automatically make you a misogynist....can we leave those histrionics to

the likes of Marjorie Taylor Greene, who may or may not in fact be a woman?

But what the President of the GAA said – again, it was more off the cuff than a formal statement – was that it would cost the GAA upwards of half a billion euro. That's a 'b', not an 'm'.

Half a...sorry, what? Half a billion is what you pay the President of the US in 'unsolicited political donations totally separate policies favourable to your oil-rich dictatorship regardless of America's interests because you are so impressed with his hair'.

"It's going to cost them over half a billion as an Association to do that. In two years' time, if we do full integration, does that mean that the Wexford County Board are going to be funding hurling, football, LGFA and camogie - four teams? Equity is something that's going to be very important. A camóg getting into her car and driving to training, it's costing the same as a GAA player."

Wexford do, in fact, field teams in all of those sports, Mr. President. We have just been talking about pooling resources. It's not like Wexford LGFA and camogie are going to abscond with their funds and watch the games on clubber in Bali. And I'm glad you mentioned 'car', because for a minute there I thought camogie players were hiring Lear jets to go to training.

'Half a billion euro.' That's the sort of figure that gets bandied about when bidding for an Olympics or a World Cup or the like. Usually along with a promise that it will generate that in tourist revenue. Which it never, ever, in all the history of mankind, does. And the figures are always rounded upwards, and predicated on all tourists that year only coming for the one event

Lok, half a billion euro......sure, why don't we just build a Childrens' Hospital instead? A really small one?

Integration is not going to cost the GAA half a billion euro. My reading of the situation? A note of caution, I absolutely could be adding two

plus two and getting seventeen. Remember where I mentioned the lady who taught me reading and writing? She tried to teach me sums as well, God love her. She really was a lovely woman, but I'd say the biblical Job had an easier time of it than she did. But regardless of the actual numbers involved, I strongly suspect that the GAA are getting cold feet about this. Largely because facilities are under fierce pressure already. Playing schedules have increased a lot at juvenile level (it's gotten ridiculous at senior, you'd almost miss the days when 'burnout' was a buzzword). Clubs are trying to protect their main pitch, but teams at all grades need to train.

I don't think this is going to cost anything like half a billion euro – the notion is frankly preposterous. But I think that'll be the excuse offered for the GAA dragging their feet. I have huge respect for Jarlath Burns, don't get me wrong, but he wouldn't be saying anything like this unless he was certain that it chimed with overall supporter sentiment.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS SENIOR CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Rathmore v Austin Stacks

Rathmore were under the cosh early on, going down by 1-5 to 0-0, but managed to finish the first half with three points. Cian Purcell had Stacks' goal, and he and Paddy Lane were their biggest scoring threats, with Greg Horan doing trojan work outside. Rathmore, with Andrew Moynihan and Ciarán Collins outstanding, grew into the game. Brian Friel's goal on the three quarter mark closed the gap. They still trailed by four with ten minutes left, but a good run by Mark Ryan led to a penalty expertly converted by Collins, with Paul Murphy and Shane Ryan kicking late points to seal a great victory, 2-12 to 1-13. Rathmore march on.

Na Gaeil v Dingle

I didn't originally have Na Gaeil listed among the powerhouses, but they are really firing on all cylinders this year. To be fair, Dingle were missing an awful lot of top guns. They trailed by 1-10 to 0-2 at the break, with Diarmuid O'Connor once again scoring a cracking goal for the Tralee outfit. O'Connor is waiting on a shoulder operation, but you wouldn't know it from his play. For that matter, I bet Jack O'Connor hasn't discarded Jack Barry's phone number. They were the main drivers for Na Gaeil. Paul Geaney only came on in the 18th minute but led a ferocious comeback with six two pointers (3tpf). I think because of the presence of David Clifford and Sean O'Shea nowadays and Colm Cooper and James O'Donogue previously, people forget how good a forward Paul actually is, one of the very best of a generation. They got the gap down to just a point on two occasions, but Na Gaeil held on to win by the minimum, 1-15 to 0-17.

Fossa 2-11 Beaufort 0-15

I'll say about this game what I said about Fossa's Premier Junior Final win. Listry had been the better team that day, but Fossa had the brothers and, contrary to all the known laws of gods and men, an incredibly rare few individuals can be good enough to win a team game. I had Beaufort down to win this with a bit to spare -I actually had Beaufort or Glenflesk to win the Intermediate outright, which shows you what I know. Beaufort are good, really good, all over the field. Fossa are decent, but I didn't see them matching them around the field. An Ghaeltacht 0-21 Gneeveguilla 1-16

All four losing teams in the Intermediate had hard luck stories last weekend, which is a great sign in itself of the quality of the competition. Gneeveguilla were well on top for sixty minutes of this game, leading by 0-15 to 0-8 at the break, and full value for a five point lead heading towards the final whistle. Except that up stepped PJ Mac Láimh and Conor Ó Corduibh with points and Cathal Ó Beaglaíoch with two massive two pointers. Just like that, An Ghaeltacht were in front. Down again they came, Gavin Ó Cinnéide fouled in the square, and Éanna Ó Chonchúir had the luxury of tapping a penalty over the bar. The weather was brutal, the football was brilliant, the result was frankly cruel. Some games go that way. Gneeveguilla didn't hit a single wide all game; they couldn't have done much more.

Killarney Legion 1-21 Glenflesk 0-14

Ah, yes. Exactly as predicted....we shall move on. I make no bones about saying I had Glenflesk as strong favourites. But, for the first time in a long time, this was Killarney Legion playing as a collective rather than an assembly of talented individuals. Glenflesk will be disappointed, especially around a middle third where Gammell, Lyne, and Alade dominated, while Ryan O'Grady was unmarkable up front. Legion led by double scores, 0-10 to 0-5, at the break. Glenflesk did trim the gap back but Darragh Lyne scored a cracking goal. Legion brought on James O'Donoghue and, well, they do say that class is permanent.

Kilcummin 1-14 Listowel Emmets 0-16

Yet another nailbiter. Listowel were very slow out of the blocks, trailing by 1-4 to 0-0. Mark O'Shea scored the goal but it was his brother Paul who was the main creator, and Paul was outstanding for Kilcummin. For my money,

though, Joe Joe Grimes was the man of the match. He really led Listowel all through. He played midfield for Cork – well, I can name a good few footballers who played for Cork before winning AllIrelands with Kerry.....just throwing the notion out there, because yes, he was that good.

A strong finish to the first half meant that Listowel trailed by 1-8 to 0-7 at the break. They were much more assured in the second half and actually led by two before a Matt Keane brace. Late on, Kevin O'Gorman managed to find Shane McSweeney and the big man shrugged off one last tackle (quite legally) and fired over the winner. He has been kicking points on this field for over two decades (the field is now being re-sod), this was as important as any of them.

PREMIER JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Ballymac 1-17 Ballyduff 0-7

Without either Podge Boyle or Michael Slattery, Ballyduff just didn't have the firepower. Niall Collins rocked them with a goal from the throwin. They led by 1-5 to 0-3 at the break – frankly, a poor enough scoring return. However, they did find their kicking boots in the second half and eight points on the trot pretty much put the game to bed. Adam Segal was absolutely superb for Ballyduff, but one team had played in Division One this year and the other in Division Four, and it wasn't hard to tell which was which.


Listry 1-24 Ardfert 1-23



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

ith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dia up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45.000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers




This is a photo of an item on a snaa list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green grea. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.



CAOIMHE'S BUSKING DEBUT

Looking like a little homeless waif, she set out her stall, Across from The Plaza, at the Church of Ireland wall. Her Da sat at The Plaza, surveying the scene, For this was the debut, of his little busker queen. She placed a cap between her feet, and then began to play, Little polkas on her fiddle, hoping passing folk would pay. The Da had placed a fiver there, to start the ball rolling, And she could not believe it, as the Euros started pouring. 
