



The magic dust has been ordered by the sleigh-load and extra sparkle has been added to the festive trimmings as the truly spectacular Christmas in Killarney celebrations will return with a vengeance in the coming weeks.

With Santa cocooning for long spells last year, the festival had to be put on hold but that merely gave the amazing Team Christmas in Killarney ample opportunity to plan a bigger, better and more incredible party for 2021.

The first of four fabulous and colourful street parades will wind through the streets on Saturday, November 27, at 6.00pm, and the magic will continue with further fun-filled parades on December 4, December 11 and December 18.

As well as all the traditional favourites, an elaborate and spectacular new float has been added this year and it will certainly have a real wow factor as it takes to the streets.

A new route has been planned for this year's parade of floats and Christmas characters which will wind its way from Fitzgerald Stadium along Lewis Road, on to College Street, Plunkett Street, Main Street and High Street with Santa

looking forward to seeing all the boys and girls lining the streets.

Strict Covid-19 protocols will apply and, to ensure everyone's safety, those planning to attend are asked to wear face masks and observe social distancing guidelines.

Plans are also being made for a Santa's Grotto experience in the lead up to the festive season with details to be revealed very soon and the final programme for the hugely popular Dine in Killarney Christmas experience is also being finalised.

Mayor of Killarney Cllr Marie Moloney, who is a member of the Christmas in Killarney Committee, said it will be wonderful to see a bit of normality returning to the town for the festive season.

"Last Christmas was very hard on everybody who couldn't meet up with their loved ones and many people spent it on their own.

"This year, thankfully, there will be a bit more freedom for people to meet up and celebrate together," she said.

Mayor Moloney said the Christmas in Killarney festival will provide a superb backdrop for the seasonal celebrations but she urged everybody to be cautions, to wear their masks and to observe social distance requests when they are watching the parades so that everybody remains safe.

The voluntary chairman of the Christmas in Killarney celebration, Niall Kelleher, said everyone behind the scenes is just as excited as the children of Killarney and beyond and he said it is a wonderful feeling to be able to sprinkle an extra handful of magic dust and sparkle on the town this year.

"Last year was difficult for all of us but we plan to make up for it in the coming weeks with the type of spectacular celebration that has made Christmas in Killarney famous all over the world," he said.

Santa Claus, meanwhile, has confirmed that he has pencilled the Killarney parades into his packed diary and he is really looking forward to seeing everybody when he arrives.

"My little helpers have been doing their research and they told me just how hard everybody on the Christmas in Killarney Committee is working to make this year extra special. It is going to be a magical time in one of my favourite towns in the whole world," he said.

TWO MUSIC FAMILIES UNITE

FOR LIVE CONCERTS, SINGLE AND VIDEO

Those lucky enough to catch Clannad's legendary vocalist Moya Brennan, multi – instrumentalist Liam O'Connor and their super-talented musical families recently on the Late Late Show will be delighted to note details of further collaborations between the two families.

Their spirited Late Late Show appearance featured their powerful rendition of the song 'Strong In Numbers' which is also now available as a single. The participating members have also been recorded in a promotional video which not only reinforces their collective love of music but also of the natural magic of the Irish countryside. As the song's title indicates, it's a stirring celebration of the power to resist oppression, and calls for all of us to unite to create a better world for our future generations.

The two families will also be joining forces for live concerts, starting at St. Brendan's College, Killarney, Co. Kerry on December 8 for which legendary hurler Joe Canning will be the guest speaker. Joe is widely regarded as one of the greatest hurlers ever to have graced a hurling pitch. An All-Ireland Senior Championship winner, The Galway hero scooped five All-Star awards, won Hurler of the Year, Young Hurler of Year, three Leinster Senior Championships and two National Hurling Leagues.

Sadly, injury problems forced this inspirational player to retire from the game at the young age of 32, yet he still inspires young players to this day. Of course, the intriguing question on every hurling fan's lips is whether Joe will come out of retirement for Henry Shefflin, Galway's hurling manager and his former rival as a player?

The St. Brendan's College concert will be the ninth year performed by the O'Connor family with St. Brendan's College students. While dates with Moya's family are also confirmed for Boherhue Church in Cork on December 9 and Watergate Theatre in Kilkenny on December 10. Ahead of all that, internationally-renowned accordionist Liam O'Connor from Newmarket will be presented with his Pride of Cork Award for 2021 at a special ceremony on November 26 at the Clayton Hotel Silver Springs in Cork hosted by RTÉs Miriam O'Callaghan, and C102 and 96FM radio presenters Patricia Messenger and PJ Coogan.

A Cork Civic Life spokesperson said that the award recognises the outstanding contribution that Liam has made to Irish music and its promotion both locally and globally over a career spanning nearly three decades. Among many of Liam's outstanding achievements they draw attention to him being listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the world's fastest accordion player, original accordionist with



Lord of the Dance Michael Flatley and the only Irish musician to perform twice at the Ryder Cup international golf tournament.

The Cork Civic Life statement also mentions his Live CD recording at Ronnie Scott's famous club in London, his recording of the official GAA anthem with Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh which topped the Irish charts for six weeks, and his hard work , energy and time for numerous charities and organisations.

"We say, thank you for the music, thank you for the promotion of our great country throughout the world and above all thank you for never forgetting your Cork roots. We are thrilled to bestow A Pride of Cork Award on you," they state in relation to Liam's award.

Liam's recent appearance on the Late Late Show was his seventh and made him one of a select band of guests who have featured on the programme with all three hosts, Gay Byrne, Pat Kenny and Ryan Tubridy. He also appeared with Eddie Jordan on This Is Your Life hosted by Michael Aspel.

Liam's current link-up with the Grammy and Emmy award-winning Clannad singer Moya also includes Liam's son Oisín (on drums, guitar, keyboards and vocals) and daughter Saoirse (on keyboards, concertina and vocals), son Oisín on drums, guitar, keyboards and vocals, and son Cillian on bodhran and drums.

Also gifted as a composer and arranger, Oisin O'Connor's talents have already taken him into the company of several music industry stalwarts, from Ne-Yo to artists of the calibre of Brian Kennedy, Aslan's Christy Dignam and Danny O'Reilly of The Coronas. He's ventured onto record as well. His father Liam's album Live at Ronnie Scott's sees Oisin join Liam, Saoirse and Cillian for what has been described as "a mesmerising family affair". And as if his diary isn't busy enough he's also engaged as a model for the Holister and Ted Baker international clothing brands.

Saoirse has also made her mark with her beguiling rhythmic piano playing and singing. In 2011, the then 11-year-old conducted the last ever interview given by the Irish screen legend Maureen O'Hara, a substantial coup in its own right.

Their brother Cillian plays bodhran and drums and is a transition year student in St. Brendan's College, Killarney, aka as The Sem because it used to be a Seminary. It's deservedly known for providing students with a vibrant environment in which they, staff, parents and management can work together for the collective good while developing the whole person, on spiritual, emotional, intellectual, social, cultural and physical levels.

From Moya's family come her daughter Aisling (on guitar, bazouki and vocals) son Paul on bodhran, bass and vocals, and husband Tim Jarvis on cello and vocals. They are also joined by the acclaimed flute player Eamonn de Barra Liam's support for the college is generously acknowledged by St. Brendan's Collegr Music Teacher Mish O'Donoghue. Recognising the generosity of spirit shown to the school attended by his sons Oisin and Cillian, she says, "we in St Brendan's have been privileged to have benefited from Liam's expertise and many talents shared with our students over the past nine years. So many of them have benefitted from the time he has given to them in preparation for his concerts in our school Chapel. Performing alongside him, and the many special guests he has brought to these concerts, has been the highlight of their school years for many of our students. His contribution to the music department at St Brendan's over this time is immeasurable and we are delighted to see his work being acknowledged by Cork Civic Life in giving him this Pride of Cork Award."

That same sense of appreciation also comes from Aidan Murray, a former student from Carraig na Bhfear College, who sent Liam the following message regarding his Cork Pride Award, "Congrats, Liam, for this much deserved recognition. It brings me back about 35 years to heading to the school music room at night and repeatedly watching in awe at the blur you made as your fingers created the most incredible music on the box. It's fantastic that you used your amazing talent to bring so much enjoyment to so many people. Rock on!"

he 2021 An Chomhdháil World Irish Dance Championships kicked off this week at The Gleneagle Hotel and Gleneagle INEC Arena.

Competitors from America, Scotland, England, Europe and all over Ireland will compete for a world title in the championships which run from November 1 to 6. Over nineteen competitions take place over the six-day championships and winners are announced every day after each competition. The competitions are held in the INEC auditorium and The Gleneagle Ballroom. The age profile of the competitors is age 9 to over 21 years old. In excess of 1400 dancers will take to the stage over the course of the six days.

An Chomhdháil is delighted to return to Killarney

this year having been unable to run the event in 2020. This is Killarney's fifth occasion to host the An Chomhdháil World Irish Dance Championships. Strict Government guidelines will be adhered to for indoor events. Only adults with covid certificates will be permitted to enter. Dancers and spectators under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult with a Covid certificate. Face masks are mandatory.

The economic benefits of these championships will be felt right across Killarney's hotels, B&Bs, restaurants, shops and many other businesses. Studies carried out between 2016 and 2019 calculated the Championships were worth €12 million to the local economy.

An Chomhdháil, the organisation who run the World Irish Dance Championships, have an extensive branch network worldwide and is one of the most progressive Irish Dance organisations, being the first Irish dance organisation to bring in the no makeup rule for girls under thirteen years of age in 2007. Both male and female world champions will be crowned across a range of age categories from under ten through to adult.

"We are honoured to welcome the 2021 An Chomhdháil World Irish Dance Championships." said Patrick O' Donoghue, CEO of The Gleneagle Group. "We wish all the competitors the very best of luck and we hope everyone enjoys their stay in Killarney."

DINGLE PENINSULA 2030 DELEGATES

MAKE THEIR WAY TO COP-26

rom West Kerry to the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow, a team of delegates representing the Dingle Peninsula 2030 sustainability initiative are putting their money where their mouth is when it comes to sustainable travel, and making the trip in electric vehicles.

Dingle Peninsula 2030 is an initiative, led by Dingle Peninsula Hub, to transition the peninsula to a low-carbon society for a more environmentally and economically sustainable future. The initiative encompasses projects across energy, transport, agriculture, marine and tourism.

On 1st November 2021 the representatives of Dingle Peninsula 2030 departed Dingle for Glasgow to participate in COP-26, the UN Climate Change Conference. Travelling by electric vehicle they will visit communities in Ireland, Northern Ireland and Scotland who are working on similar sustainability and transition initiatives, to share learnings. The delegates will be sent on their way by the Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council early on Monday morning as they begin their sustainable energy journey to Scotland. The journey is being sponsored by Kerry Co Co as part of the Covenant of Mayors and by ESB Networks. The first stop on the journey will be Tullamore, Co Offaly for a two-hour lunch and learn session hosted by Green Offaly, a not-for-profit countywide Green Regeneration enterprise. A number of local transition initiatives will be showcased at the event.

As the team continue their journey, they will then meet with Prof John Barry of Queen's University Belfast; he is co-chair of the Belfast Climate Commission, which works with communities, authorities and industry to translate climate policy into action 'on the ground 'and bring about transformative change.

In Scotland, the team plans to visit the town of

Bothwell who have developed a 20year sustainability strategy for their community. They also hope to visit Knockraich Farm and Courtyard Cafe to learn about direct-toconsumer milk vending machines, a sector that is primed for growth in Ireland, reflecting growing consumer interest in locally-sourced food and drink.

The Dingle Peninsula 2030 team will participate in a side event on "Transforming climate solutions for business, cities and civil society in Europe & Latin America"at COP-26 in Glasgow on 2nd November 2021. The event will showcase stories of positive actions from around the world, bringing together voices of different stakeholders to illustrate how impact is being made at a global scale by an engaged network with common principles and goals to achieve a sustainable world.

"RESTRICTIONS FOR BASKETBALL EXTREMELY UNFAIR"

eputy Danny Healy Rae has raised the new restrictions for children playing basketball with various ministers.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, Deputy Healy-Rae said it had come to his attention that on Thursday 28th October Basketball Clubs got notification from Sports Ireland directing them that only children who have been vaccinated can attend and participate in basketball matches, this is a form of blackmail as many involved in this sport do not have the vaccine or cannot get it for personal reasons, this is grossly unfair to deny these children play this sport as these are the same children who take part and mix in other sports and also attend school together and socialise together without any requirement for proof of vaccination,

children under 12 who are not vaccinated are also not allowed participate, clubs have registered and fees have been paid up for these members, putting club volunteers in this position where they are expected to check if children have been vaccinated before they can train and play games is extremely unfair and clubs have concerns regarding the legal implications of this measure from a data protection and GDPR perspective.

WALK IN VACCINATION CLINIC OPEN TODAY

Walk-in vaccination clinics will take place at the Kerry Vaccination Centre (former Borg Warner site) at Monavalley, Tralee today,

• Friday November 5th; 12noon to 8pm.

You can get your COVID-19 vaccine at a walk-in clinic without an appointment. You can go to any walk-in clinic, it does not have to be near where you live.

Dose 1 and dose 2 walk-in clinics are open on specific days and times at vaccination centres. If you show up outside of these times, you will not be vaccinated.



Anyone aged 16 and older can attend a walk-in clinic alone.

Children aged 12 to 15 must attend with a parent or guardian. A parent or legal guardian will need to give consent for their child to get their COVID-19 vaccine. Children attending alone will not be vaccinated.

Dose 1 clinics: You will be offered the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine at a dose 1 walk-in clinic. You will need 2 doses for the best protection. The walk-in clinics list which vaccine they offer. You will get an appointment for your second dose at a vaccination centre near your home. Or you can go to a dose 2 walk-in clinic when th

Dose 2 clinics: You can go to any dose 2 walk-in clinic as long as your vaccination is due and you have proof of your first dose. For example, your vaccination record card. It does not matter where you had your first dose - even if you were vaccinated at a GP, pharmacy or in another country. You will not be vaccinated at a dose 2 clinic if you do not have proof of your first dose. If you lost your vaccination record card, go back to the GP or pharmacy where you got your first dose to get proof of vaccination.

Booster dose: Walk-in clinics are for first and second dose only. You cannot get a booster dose at a walk-in vaccination clinic.

Getting 2 different vaccines: If you had a first dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine and you do not want a second dose of AstraZeneca, you can choose to get an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine dose instead. This will mean that you are fully vaccinated



MINISTER HARRIS GETS A RAP ON THE KNUCKLES FROM THE CAO FOR PREMATURE 'PORTAL' ANNOUNCEMENT



The announcement by Higher & Further Education Minister Simon Harris that a single portal for CAO, Further Education and Training (FET) courses and Apprenticeships would be launched on the 5th November took many organisations by surprise, not least the CAO. According to the Minister, applicants will be able to choose between higher education, further education and apprenticeships through a single CAO portal for the first time.

Minister Harris said the portal will give parity of esteem to all study options and allow students to apply directly for higher and further education courses. It will also include information on the growing number of apprenticeship options. In a new change, applicants will receive offers for courses from both sectors on the same day in mid-August. Minister Harris said that when applicants log onto the CAO website on 5th November, not only will they see the traditional CAO options but; they'll also, for the first time ever, see FET options and lots of information and options on apprenticeships.

According to the Minister, the 'portal' will broaden the conversation around careers and deflect the obsession with the CAO and the points race. While the numbers attending third level are impressive Minister Harris fells that there are a lot of students who might not be aware of all the options available to them.

Minister Harris announced that work is also being advanced to build a 'fully integrated' further education and higher education system

which will allow students to transfer seamlessly from one to the other. It is part of a broader plan, he said, to enhance the status of the further education sector and create more diverse pathways for school leavers. The number of apprenticeships on offer is also due to expand next year with 62 programmes across areas ICT, Insurance, Finance and Logistics.

All very positive you might say! Except it was the first the CAO heard about the new allembracing portal and they immediate clarified the de facto position as distinct from the premature announcement by Mr Harris. The CAO pointed out that its website will not be accepting further education or apprenticeship applications for 2022. Applicants will continue to apply for FET courses and apprenticeships using the traditional channels, and the CAO website will continue to accept applications for courses in Irish Higher Education Institutions only. The CAO website will, however, display further education and apprenticeship options on its website as a jumping off point for applicants to go to www.fetchcourses.ie and www.apprenticeship.ie.

As the CAO statement clarified, SOLAS, the State agency responsible for further education and training has arranged to have links to FET Courses and Apprenticeships on the CAO website for the opening of the CAO on 5th November. www.fetchcourses.ie will bring applicants to a new area where they can research and apply for over 500 Post Leaving Certificate (PLC) courses. www.apprenticeship. ie will bring students to an information and guidance resource for apprenticeships. This development is a very welcome step forward.

SOLAS intends to continue working with the CAO in the coming years to further develop this and it is hoped that there will be more integration of CAO courses, FET courses and Apprenticeships on a single portal in the coming years.

The current position is that

- 1) CAO will accept applications for courses in Irish Higher Education Institutions only
- 2) Applicants will be able to apply online for individual FET courses via the new page on www.fetchcourses.ie. They will be able to set up a fetch courses account to do this on the FET website.
- 3) The requirements for Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses will be as per previous years.
- 4) The application process for PLC courses interviews etc will also remain the same. Upon submission of an application, students will be contacted by their selected PLC course provider and arrangements will be made with them directly.
- 5) For apprenticeships, the starting point will continue to be finding employment with an approved apprentice employer. A new page on the apprenticeship website, www. apprenticeships.ie, will provide guidance on how to do this and also a freephone number for further advice.

135TH ANNIVERSARY OF DR. CROKES

With plans to mark Dr Crokes 135th Birthday on hold due to Covid, Eamonn Fitzgerald looks at key moments in the club's history to mark the occasion which was on Tuesday November 2nd 2021.

Background on Dr Crokes GAA

- Dr Crokes founded at Fair Hill , Killarney, November 2, 1886
- One of the oldest GAA clubs in Ireland, founded just 2 years after the founding of the GAA at Thurles in 1886.
- The founders were 19 men, who were termed 19 Dangerous Dreamers by Canon Tom Looney an eminent historian and club vice-president.

Founding members

Jack Crowe, Paddy Crowe, Con Courtney, Denny Courtney, Jim Gallagher, Jim Gallivan, Mick Gleeson, Con Guerin, Dan Guerin, Jack Kissane, Martin Kissane, John Langford, Mike Looney, Jim McGuinness, Michael Moriarty, Maurice Moynihan, Jim O'Leary, Michael O'Sullivan, Bob Roberts.

- Michael Davitt , founder of the Land League informed a meeting in Castleisland 1885 that 1,600 families in Kerry had been evicted in the previous 3 years. The Irish Land League leaders were doing their utmost to undo these wrongs and there were 8 branches of the Land League on the Kenmare estate(Killarney) alone. Killarney was in turmoil and evictions were common occurrences. Hence, the founders met in candle light secrecy to found the club at Fair Hill.
- Andy Mulcahy, a native of Kilkenny and a sterling Gael was a charge hand at the Gas Works, the property of the Rail Company at Fair Hill. He provided a room for the meeting beside where the Outlet Centre now stands and warned them that they would have to conduct business only with candlelight, to avoid the notice of the RIC.

Challenges

Dr Crokes faced many challenges in its fascinating 135 year journey, but it survived the Evictions ,the Land Dispute, the Spanish flu, the 1916 Rising, the War of Independence, the bitter Civil War, two World Wars, the TB and Polio scourges and now the Covid-19 pandemic, which challenges every one

worldwide. Through it all Dr Crokes survived both on and off the field.

Achievements

Dr Crokes have won more Kerry SF c'ships(13) than any other club, followed by Austin Stacks ,while East Kerry have 8 titles.

Dr Croke club players have won well in excess of 100 All Ireland senior football medals. Topping the list to win the Sam Maguire with Kerry was Dr Crokes' Paul Russell, Mangerton View ,an outstanding wing back. Dick Fitzgerald and Colm Cooper won 5 each. Cooper also won 7 All Stars and is a selector for the present Croke senior team along with fellow Croke and Kerry star Eoin Brosnan. Club players, Tony Brosnan, Gavin White, Mícheál Burns, David Shaw have been members of the Kerry senior team for the past 3 years and will be hoping to feature in Jack O'Connor's new Kerry team in 2022.

• Kerry last won the Sam Maguire in 2014, jointly captained by Dr Croke stars, Fionn Fitzgerald and Kieran O'Leary. Gooch also collected his 5th medal. Crokes were Kerry county champions in 2013, so they had the nomination of the Kerry captain for 2014.




CALL FOR MINISTER FOR RURAL IRELAND

1 red onion chopped

220g sweet potato (peeled weight)

1.5 tablespoon tandoori curry paste

1 clove garlic crushed

1 tin chickpeas drained

1 tablespoon frozen coriander

40g panko vegan breadcrumbs for coating

Salt to season

For the Bed of Asian Greens

1/2 a sweetheart cabbage thinly shredded into strips


1 teaspoon sesame oil


1 teaspoon chopped garlic cloves

Firstly peel and chop the sweet potatoes and boil for about 7 minutes drain them and mash them and set aside until needed. In a large pan put 1 tablespoon of the oil, the onions and the tandoori curry paste fry for about 7 minutes on a low heat until the onions are nice and soft. Add the garlic and stir then add the chickpeas and frozen coriander and mash the chickpeas down into the pan until they are broken up. At this point take the pan off the heat and add it to the cooled mashed sweet potatoes. If necessary mash another bit to make sure chickpeas are all broken up. Then put your panko breadcrumbs on a large plate and mould the potato and chickpea mixture into little balls and flatten them out (I made 10 with this mixture). Press the rounds onto the panko breadcrumbs and in a pan with the other teaspoon of oil fry on each side for about 3-4 minutes or until golden brown. For the Bed of Asian Greens put the teaspoon of Sesame oil in a wok and heat to high add the garlic and shredded cabbage and fry for 3-4 minutes on high heat stirring regularly so it wont burn. Now put the cabbage on your plate and place your Tandoori Chickpea Cakes on top.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. 

DRIVING AND VISION

It is important that you can see clearly to be able to drive safely. Conditions that may affect your visual field and driving include strokes and brain tumours, as well as eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma (if you have them in both eyes).

Make sure you have regular sight tests and if your optometrist tells you that you must not drive, you must stop all driving immediately. Driving when you are medically unfit to do so is a criminal offence, and you may be prosecuted if you are involved in an accident.

Driving glasses

If you have been advised to wear glasses for driving, make sure you wear them, even for short trips and keep a spare pair in the car. 



After 15 minutes of this final, many may have thought a shock was on the cards. East Kerry, looking to become champions for the sixth year in a row, were off the pace. Struggling to break down Mid Kerry's packed defense, shots were falling short, and passes were mislaid. Mid Kerry had opened up a three point lead, with scores from Brendan Casey, Mikey Moriarty, and Jason O Connor. O Connor's effort could easily have been a goal, with his shot barely going over the crossbar. They were defending with discipline and breaking with speed. Just as the water break was about to arrive, Darran Ryan's effort hit off the post, and went over. They had survived the sluggish start only two points behind. Now was the time to push on. Center forward O Shea was becoming more and more influential. opened the scoring with a sweet strike early after the resumption. KERRY COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP ROUND 1 AUSTIN STACKS 1 - 7 EAST KERRY 1 - 5

After two years of dominance, East Kerrys's reign as County Champions ended on a wet and windy night in Tralee, against a hungry Austin Stack's side that brought a cohesion and drive to the battle, that saw them survive a late charge from the champions.

With the wind at their backs in the first half the Tralee men came out fast and opened the scoring when center forward Fiachna Mangan shot over from far out. Mangan doubled the lead after being set up by the ever green Kieran Donaghy. Full back and Captain Dylan Casey then came forward to fire over a huge score from long range. There start could have been even better, with Donaghy hitting the post after rounding Brendan Kealy, and only a last ditch goal line clearance from Paul Murphy prevented another goal. A red card to Niall Donoghue made the hill they had to climb even steeper, with Stack's pocession game taking them to the water break with a seven point lead.

East Kerry got two guick scores from a David Clifford free and a Paudie Clifford 45. O Shea grabbed his second score in reply, and as the clock passed 60 minute's, the game looked over. David Clifford was then sent from the field to leave them to finish with 13. Like all champion team's they kept going, and found a glimmer of light through an exceptional goal. With all the Stack's players behind the ball, Paul O Shea let rip a shot that flew past a flood of bodies and into the top corner of the net. Paudie Clifford pointed straight from the kick out, and the margin had been brought back to two. One final ball dropped in around the square, but it was caught by black and amber hands. With that the final whistle went, and the back to back champion's had exited at the opening stage.

Austin Stacks deserve full credit for this win. On a day where pretty football was not on the agenda, their game plan got the results it deserved. 

Austin Stacks East Kerry

And there it is. Suddenly, dramatically, the 2021 County Championship is blown wide open. Look, of course I'm from East Kerry and I'm proud of them. That's a great team and a great set of players. They lost Spa players and gained Kilcummin players - that was far from the hardest thing that they had to deal with, and they dealt with everything. Even when they were outclassed and nearing the endgame, they were still defiant. They were giants and unbowed at the finish, and they will be back. But the truth is that an early elimination of the holders and hot favourites blows any Championship wide open, and there's never a

Austin Stacks deserved this. Deserved it? Be fair, they were well on top.I'm not suggesting it was scintillating football (of course they played a defensive style; are you really trying to pretend that you wouldn't have against East kerry?), but they were clearly the side that wanted it more. I don't think we need to go through the scoring. Suffice to say that Stacks did a lot of it; East Kerry didn't. East Kerry's forwards, all of them very formidable players, just never got going. Paudie Clifford is an exception there; Paudie once again played his heart out. Paudie's greatest strength is simply that he gives absolutely everything, time and again, and just keeps coming. If a young player copies just that one trait, they'll always be important players for their teams.

But the defence deserve credit for that. Dylan Casey has been talked about as a Kerry senior prospect, and this kind of marking job on David Clifford (with scarcely any supply and his team overwhelmed in every direction, what miracles were you expecting from David?) isn't going to hurt that. But Jack O'Shea was superb as well, and has been for a while. I'm old-fashioned as regards marauding defenders (ye'll play a bigger part in winning this game by doing yere own job right) but he's sticky. Tentative maybe on that, but he certainly played a big role here. Conor Jordan as well....one of those underrated but effective Stacks warriors who just gets it done. Neatly, unobtrusively....but done. Likewise, Joe O'Connor was the pick of midfield. Extremely athletic, physical and aggressive in a positive way, great at driving forward....ah, yeah. He has quietly slipped into real midfield contention for Kerry as far as I am concerned. But take note that Greg Horan, another one of those undervalued but invaluable players, was nigh on as impressive.

They only led by 0-5 to 0-2 at half-time; this wasn't any demolition job. But inaccuracy was their only difficulty, plus Shane O'Callaghan's

bullet crashing back off the crossbar. Fiachna Mangan had the first two scores and Dylan Casey another. Wayne Guthrie slotted a '45. Kieran Donaghy was the best player on the pitch on his 60th County Championship appearance, beating Ger O'Keeffe's previous record for the club of 59, involved in everything. He got the fifth point himself. Darragh Roche and David Clifford scored frees for East Kerry.

Jack O'Shea pointed and Fiachna Mangan goaled. East Kerry lost a player to a red card. Believe it or not the next score didn't arrive until after 50 minutes - this wasn't pretty - and it was a David Clifford free. Paudie notched a '45 but Jack O'Shea replied. David Clifford departed after his second yellow. Paul O'Shea got a late East Kerry goal and Paudie Clifford added a point. In the end it was 1-7 to 1-5, but that scoreline wasn't remotely reflective of the game.

Thethrone is empty. Austin Stacks have probably pushed themselves into top contenders - but the real jostling starts next weekend, and the truth is that the entertainment factor for many of us has just doubled.

Kerins O'Rahillys 1-16 St. Kierans 0-9

I can't get any handle on St. Kierans. I like them, I admire them, I just don't understand them. The players are there (I know the Horans are a huge loss), and I know for a fact that they put the work in. But the truth is that trying to get collective training and unison with a team drawn from three districts is...well, I think it's actually suitable for discussion by Eamonn Fitzgerald's Committee regarding North Kerry, as such teams are involved.

Rahillys in the County League were hard to read as well. My usual take on them these days is they won't win the County Championship, but it'll take a real contender to take them out, and this year seems no different.

This game is further blurred by a one man show. Yes, Conor Hayes re-affirmed his burgeoning talent. David Moran yet again sent out a reminder that lads planning to write his footballing epitaph would want to bring extra cartridges of ink. But this was all about Tommy Walsh. You forget, don't you. You forget just how colossal and how dangerous he can be when let loose. Brian Leonard, fully deserving of his place on Kerry's panel last year, couldn't land a glove on him. I still, even now, don't think him suited to the current inter-county game, but he wasn't just man of the match, he was heroic. If Grecian Hercules had thundered onto Kerry shores, stomping around on those famous Twelve Labours of his, Tommy would have just clipped him round the ear and told him to clear off.

It was 0-9 to 0-5 at half-time, and St. Kierans had done well to hang in that much. Tommy, Jack Savage and Conor Hayes had 0-3 each. James Walsh had scored a beauty to open St. Kierans account and Paul Walsh's free closed their first half effort but they were barely clinging on.

Tommy again, Conor again, Tommy, Barry John Keane with a good score....0-14 to 0-7 at the water break. St. Kierans needed a goal to spark their challenge. Instead, after more minors from Tommy and Conor, it was Jack Savage who hit the net for the coup de grace, and it was hardly even needed by then. Rahillys just had the power and brought the power; they deserve to be in at the business end.

South Kerry 2-16 Feale Rangers 0-5

South Kerry are one of these sides that nobody is paying too much attention to, and we may be embarrassed about that later on. I'm not saying that an expected victory over a struggling Feale Rangers is a huge surprise. Honestly, I think the amalgamation of the North Kerry sides is actually overdue, and I think a revamp of all the divisional teams boundaries is well overdue, I still think the last Committee to examine and revamp the County Championship should have grasped that nettle.

But the manner of South Kerry's victory, the combination of defence and attack.....hmm. It was even enough possession wise early on. But the returned Éanna O'Connor (2), playmaker Niall Ó Sé (2), and Conor O'Shea had South Kerry ahead by 0-5 to 0-0. Jack McElligott got Feale Rangers on the scoreboard but young Darragh O'Sullivan (a name to remember) pointed. A brilliant pass by man of the match Niall Ó Sé fed Dylan O'Donoghue for a goal. They also hit the post in this period, while Jack Daly and Niall added points. Darragh Lynch's free can't exactly be called a lifeline for Feale Rangers, not when his team still trailed by 1-8 to 0-2 at half-time.



No disrespect to Feale Rangers - I was there in 2007; I'd never doubt their heart, but this was an easy test for South Kerry and no more than that.

Killarney Legion 1-13 0-16 AET Killarney Legion win 5-4 on penalties)

Not the most significant result last Saturday (stop dancing around. You know the big result the same as I do). But the closest and most exciting game. The football wasn't perfection; the stakes were too high and the nerves were too stretched for that, a derby atmosphere only stoking those fires. But by God but it had passion and heart and courage of the highest order and you could not have asked a single thing more of either side. Pure sport.

Legion came out with intent. A sharp Jamie



Just an interesting one. With the quarter-finals decided, one could argue that the scales have tipped back towards club sides. Six clubs - Stacks, Rahillys, Crokes, Legion, Dingle, and Templenoe - are still there while just two divisional sides, St. Brendans and South Kerry, remain. Personally, I expected East Kerry and last year's finalists Mid Kerry to still be there (confession time; I loved watching Mid Kerry's style of play last year and they were my lightest of dark horses this year).

I don't actually think it's a long-term change. I just think it's further affirmation that divisional sides are slow to get going (hard to congregate for collective training after the league and club championships) but more durable with a back door (bigger panels reduces the impact of injuries. Positions will revert when the back door returns - personally, I would love if it never did, I relish the energy and excitement of a straight knock-out. But a back door brings revenue, and revenue is needed, so let's get real about it, the back door will return.

The real issue for me - and I strongly suspect that East Kerry's defeat will be used as an excuse not to grasp it, is the nettle of shifting populations, rural/urban divide (the primary schools are the best and simplest guide) that make a review of the divisional teams in geographical terms only close to imperative.

Updated Game and Spectator Rules

Following the release of new guidelines by Basketball Ireland, domestic games can only take place where all players, coaches, and

officials can prove that they have valid Covid Certificates or proof of having recovered from covid. If anyone does not have such certification or proof, then games can only take place within the pod system, as before. These rules do not apply to International or National League Games.

Venues will be allowed 100% capacity provided spectators can provide a covid passport or proof of covid recovery, can be fully socially distanced (pods are acceptable), and they wear masks. Please note that all are requirements, it is not a matter of just ticking any one of those boxes. Also, Basketball Ireland haven't asked this, and certainly shouldn't have to, but I'm going to ask on my behalf, because there's always one.

Please, please do not be the showboating tosspot who starts acting up and spoils this for all the rest of us. This sport has waited an awful long time, much longer than most, to get back and it needs that ticket revenue and those supporters badly.

And look, a public statement from a Kerry club this week (I'm not naming them; I don't want to be drawing attention to it) disappointed me in printing out the UN Rights of a Child and the Irish Constitutional Provisions against Discrimination in regard to its disappointment about the ongoing safety requirements.

Look, I believe that exercising reasonable precautions to save children during a pandemic doesn't deserve to be equated with discrimination or cruelty to children. You can argue the balance of those precautions, of course, but to me, that implicit accusation should be fully withdrawn and apologised for.

LEAGUE OF IRELAND

Clubs would have gladly taken up the initiative and, in GAA at least,m have shown a proven ability to do so - better than administrative committees in many cases. Basketball Ireland seem to be streets ahead of the pack in this regard. Rugby is mostly on pay per view channels, so as far as I am concerned, good luck.

Treaty United, the newcomers who have Kerry connections and a team I'd like to see in the flesh (I literally never had the chance, and you can call me an armchair supporter if you like what were we supposed to do in recent times?) finished fourth in Division One and have a playoff game against UCD next weekend. I can't really see them winning promotion, they aren't quite at that standard yet - which is maybe no harm, a run of defeats in the Premiership could erode player's confidence, their growing numbers in support, and sponsor's confidence (any league within the FAI has to be selfsufficient; that was true long before Delany and co. chewed long and hard on their own tail. But even if they don't break into the Premier, Treaty United have so far done everything right, established a secure pitch location and facilities and a proper funding structure (hello? Did anybody, anybody at all, in the FAI hear that astonishing phrase? Proper Funding Structure!) and a decent long term squad and reliable long-haul management right from the start. Laying down real roots. A magnificent start.

Gardening with Killarney Outlook

WINTER AND SPRING BEDDING PLANTS

Between now and the summertime there is still plenty of time to put a bit of colour in the garden with some winter/spring flowering bedding plants. It is probably best this Spring to use them in containers and baskets as the ground is saturated from the amount of rainfall we have experienced.

The first thing you have to do is choose the type of container you want. There are lots to choose from i.e. Terracotta, glazed, plastic and wooden. Now that you have chosen a pot, the first and most important thing to do is sort out the drainage. All terracotta and glazed pots should already have drainage holes in them. Plastic ones probably won't so you will have to punch some holes in them. Next you need to put some gravel or aero board broken up over the holds of the pot and then cover with some landscape fabric like Mypex. Now it is time to add some compost and ideally some slow release fertilizer mixed with it. Then choose some plants. Firstly choose a center piece and always make sure that center piece is evergreen and suitable for the size of the container. This way you will only have to change the bedding plants from season to season. Here is a list of good winter/spring bedding plants for containers: Primroses, Polyanthus, winter pansies, cyclamen, ornamental cabbages and trailing ivy.







KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

NON-GEOGRAPHIC NUMBERS

Question: What are non-geographic numbers?

Answer: A non-geographic number (NGN) is any number beginning with 1800, 1850, 1890, 0818 or 076.

NGNs are used by Irish businesses, charities and other organisations to deliver services like helplines. Calls to 1800 numbers are free. Calls to 1850, 1890, 0818 and 076 numbers cost the same as calling a landline, and are included in 'call bundles' that include landline calls. This means that, when you call an NGN, it is either deducted from your bundle, or charged on a per-minute basis.

What is changing?

From 1 January 2022, there will only be 2 NGN numbers: 1800 and 0818. Organisations using 1850, 1890 or 076 numbers are now updating their contact details.

Why are the changes happening?

Many people avoid calling 1850, 1890 and 076 numbers because they think they are confusing and expensive. ComReg is reducing the number of NGNs to simplify NGNs for consumers

From January 2022, there will be just 2 NGNs – 1800 (Freephone) and 0818 (Standard rate). This makes call costs easier to understand.

What happens if I call an 1850, 1890 or 076 number in 2022? From 1 January 2022, all 1850, 1890 and 076 numbers will be withdrawn from service and you will not be able to use them. You can check an organisation's website and social media channels for their new contact details.

THE IMPORTANCE OF COMMUNICATION

When people come along to counselling, and begin talking about their problems, it sometimes becomes apparent that some of their difficulties may be down to the challenge of communicating with the other people in their lives.

This can apply to any of us. Whether discussing issues in our relationship with a partner or other family member, or with friends or colleagues, we are quite likely to say 'He knows how I feel about this', or 'She knows how difficult I find that', or 'I'm not going to ask them for help because I shouldn't need to ask, they should just know what to do', and so on. Sound familiar?

All this ignores a fundamental reality – we cannot assume other people know what we think, or how we feel, or what we need, unless we tell them. We are all equipped with a degree of intuition, and some people can be very 'tuned in' to the thoughts and feelings of others. But we cannot always rely on intuition alone. For example, someone may long for their partner to open up about a shared difficulty in their lives, while the partner may want exactly the same thing, but feel they 'shouldn't go there' because they think this would be unwelcome. Two people, who long to connect with each other, may grow further apart because of a gap in communication.

Of course we all need, and are entitled to, our privacy. We don't have to wear our heart on our sleeve all the time. What we are thinking about here is building bridges and sustaining connections with the significant people around us, rather than seeing those connections weaken through a lack of communication, with all the misunderstandings, frustrations, conflict, hurt and loneliness that can ensue.

As children, we may have been fortunate enough to have an adult around who tuned in to our feelings and tended to our needs, before we were old enough to put those feelings and needs into words.

Even if we don't realise it, perhaps a bit of us still quite naturally longs for that sort of automatic understanding from others. But, as adults, we probably need to play our part in making ourselves known and understood. The counselling process can offer a safe space where we can start putting things into words, gradually find our own voice, and become more confident about making ourselves known to another person.





Fear came upon them because of their rebellion. 'Rebellion is the sin of witchcraft' (1st Samuel 15:22-23). This occurs by obeying the devil, drawing on his limited evil powers instead of God's. What all this resulted in was curse, turmoil and separation from God not only for them, but their descendents too. Mankind needed a Saviour. And God promised that He would come through Eve's Seed (Genesis 3:15). The good news is God sent His Son Jesus to forgive, redeem and reconcile us back through His sinless blood (1st Peter 1:18-25). Jesus' perfect sacrifice means we can have peace with God through inviting Him in - making Him Lord, and obeying His Word amen!
