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'Set for Sam' Walk

To Raise Funds for Kerry Mountain Rescue Team

ell known Musician and Fundraiser Derry Healy along with friends, will once again hit the trails of Kerry, to raise money for a fantastic cause. This time you are cordially invited to trek the Old Kenmare Road with the one and only Sam Maguire on Saturday, December 27th, departing Torc Upper Car Park, Killarney National Park, at 9.30 am

Derry and his crew will carry the coveted piece of silver along the 17 km trek, with a few stops to play music and have "a set dance around Sam" - One definite stop is the newly restored sheep shed, or locally called 'the red rose cafe' at Eskamucky Glen.

The estimated time of trekking is approximately 6 hrs. For those who just want to walk as far as Derrycunnihy Church - own transport must be organised. A return bus from Kenmare to Killarney will be organised. Details to follow.

James had been hiking with his friend John Joe Culloty and took a heavy fall after weather conditions deteriorated on the mountain range. He knew his situation was grave when the ICG helicopter Rescue 115 was overhead. James was treated at the scene by KMRT and airlifted to Kerry University Hospital by ICG Rescue 115. James sustained horrific injuries that left him paralysed on his right side. That

followed several months of treatment at the National Rehabilitation Hospital in Dún Laoghaire, with constant support from his wife Carmel and their families.

Kerry Mountain Rescue Team is entirely voluntary, with 35 active team members from all walks of life,

The operation covers the entire SW of the country, a registered charity at least 50% of their funding is raised through private donations and the Team's own fundraising efforts.

The team train regularly in a range of disciplines

such as casualty care, technical rope-work: horizontal and vertical stretcher lowers, cableways, strop rescues, hoists, helicopter winching, search management, navigation, radio communication and 4WD techniques.

All team members are qualified to Advanced Rescue Emergency Care (REC) First Aid Level, and first Aid training is undertaken on a regular basis to ensure that the skills of each team member are continually maintained, and the most up-to-date developments in emergency medicine are utilised

New "Camino Chill Áirne" Project Brings Killarney's Deep Past to Life

A new sustainable tourist initiative, Camino Chill Áirne 2025, has been developed by Thomas O'Sullivan, offering visitors and locals a fresh way to experience Killarney through history, mythology, spirituality, and place-name folklore.

The project explores the origins of Killarney itself, drawing on extensive research into early Christian

traditions. Central to this is the connection between Killarney, Cill Áirne, "the church of the sloe" and its Wexford counterpart, Magh Áirní, "the plain of the sloes," linked to St. Abban in the 5th century. O'Sullivan's work draws on sources such as Barrington's Discovering Kerry (1977) and E. Ganly's Maynooth University study The Cult of St Abban (2020), helping to re-anchor the town's story in its earliest roots. A hand-painted watercolour map forms the heart of the project, marking a 6.5-mile circular walking route beginning at St. Mary's

Church of Ireland aptly known as the "Church of the Sloes" and continuing to Aghadoe via Boithrín na Marbh, before returning along the historic Fossa Way.

Along the route, walkers

Along the route, walkers will encounter 40 curated locations, ranging from archaeological points of interest to elements of

Killarney's built environment and contemporary street sculpture. Each stop is accompanied by concise historical notes and is fully integrated with QR-code access for deeper exploration.

Emphasising "slow tourism," sustainability, and reduced carbon footprints, Camino Chill Áirne offers a timely, reflective way to engage with Killarney's landscape. 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

ALL POLITICS IS LOCAL AND REVOLVING

There is a return to the great era of John O'Donoghue - the last minister to bring real investment into south Kerry, and the late Jackie Healy-Rae who concentrated on what he knew best: roads and bridges.

The competition now is between the Cahills, Michael and son Tommy, and the Healy-Rae triumvirate of Danny, Michael and Jackie.

The Cahills are outdoing the Raes in press releases. The ratio is two to one. At times it is three to one. For every one press release I get from the Raes, I get three from the Cahills. They come in waves. Often on a Sunday night. So that on Monday morning there's a bit of life saving to be done, to reach the solid ground from under the tsunami.

Last weekend I was wading between Ballylongford lighting outages, river projects, major investments and respite. But the most interesting was a thinly disguised outright attack on Michael Healy-Rae. It got more than a few journalists ashore.

Headed "Government Deals for Independent TDs", Cahill thundered how ""some of our Dáil colleagues, like to 'run with the hare and hunt with the hounds' but we should all be able to see through them at this stage".

Politics for some people is like they are taking part in a stage show, involving a lot of play acting, Michael Cahill went on, saying there were no deals for the independents.

"It's one of life's mysteries that there are people who feel the need to be first with any bit of news that's doing the rounds, claim credit for bringing it to pass and then get deeply offended if anyone else knows a little bit more than them. But live and let live, I suppose," stated the Rossbeigh man stoically. "There was little stoic about it.

The outrage stemmed from the fact the Raes broke the embargo on the inclusion of the 500 million euro N22 Farranfore to Killarney project in the reviewed national development plan and ran to the media with it before the Cahills. This can only be good for Kerry, you would think. Competition is the spice of life. The more jeweller shops in one street, the more jewellery sold, and the better the value.

However a word of caution is necessary: while we could indeed paper the walls with the press releases from Rossbeigh and Kilgarvan, there's no road built yet and no third level college has opened in Killarney.

CITIZENS WITHOUT ENGLISH

The last citizenship ceremonies of the year at the Gleneagle were as ever impressively managed. Traffic wise the introduction of the shuttle bus to the town and station relieved a lot of the pressure.

This time the words of the national anthem in both Irish and English went up on big screens. No one sang along. Nothing much to say about that

Nothing much to say about that -people here with generations mightn't sing it either! But it brings me to the question I put to Minister for Migration Colm Brophy: What are the plans for a language test? Most countries have language and or civics tests.

This is to ensure integration as well as to test commitment.

Some new citizens I approach at these ceremonies have little or no English. A group of Brazilian meat workers here with a decade needed an interpreter; a nurse manager at a clinic in Dublin originally from Kerala - this is not an

English speaking part of India - had poor English.

Minister Colm Brophy, said the matter of qualifications for citizenship was "constantly under review".

"The vast majority of people getting citizenship here today are proficient in English," he said.

A language test could be in English, or in Irish to overcome the difficulty of two official languages.

The category of workers we are attracting might need addressing too. Yes, we know of the healthcare workers and how our system would be the lesser without luring them often from their own communities where they are badly needed.

More and more of the new citizens meet are IT workers. They arrive to study computer science and fill lucrative jobs in mainly American operations. All this a time when Al is about to replace IT - which must surely be a concern.

LAW ITSELF NEEDS REVIEW

In May this column highlighted the problem with Judicial Reviews. How the legal system was constipated and needed a laxative and how running to the "law" was holding up so many things in Kerry alone - even trips to the Skellig Rock. Now JRs are the talk of the country. Efforts to pull genie back into the box are underway nationally.

But it is late in the day. Our running to the inefficient and costly legal system for endorsement and decision is a symptom of malaise across our society. We run to solicitors now the way we ran to priests a few decades back. To solve everything. The creep of the law is now such, it is devouring even its host. Lawyers in Kerry have been so busy trying to deal with matters, they have let slip the court house. No longer are big trials held here . Now everyone in Kerry - accused, victims, witnesses, public, quards, solicitors themselves have to go to Limerick, Cork or Dublin. And so much for the right to be judged by one's peers.

Jury trials need looking at here as in the UK where

they are being pulled for lesser crimes. First of all, there is the fact they are not representative any more. No self-employed person can commit the time. Ditto employees of private companies. And mainly they are made up of people working in public service, or retired persons.

there the Then is open encouragement throughout the Irish legal system to plead guilty as early as possible. This is to speed up court lists and not just to get a better break. But people need to fully understand that there may be more than meets the eye in throwing in the towel. It's not just a lesser penalty that may be at stake.

The person pleading guilty gets no say, rarely gets any word of defence, and is swallowing whole what the other side is saying. This is compounded by the further public hammering in by often exaggerated victim impact statements. We might need to stand back and take a review of the whole legal system, and our engagement with it

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

ELECTION BATTLES IN POST-CIVIL WAR KERRY THE FOCUS OF NEW BOOK FROM LOCAL HISTORIAN

The drama and violence of election battles in the Kerry constituency during the 1920s and 1930s are the focus of a new book which was launched by Minister Norma Foley at O'Mahony's Bookshop in Tralee on Friday evening. "From Bullets to Ballots: Politics and Electioneering in Post-Civil War Kerry, 1923-33" by Dr Owen O'Shea is a deep dive into how the divisions over the Treaty dominated politics in Kerry and beyond for generations. It describes the violence which erupted during election campaigns, the role of the clergy and newspaper editors in influencing voting, how candidates secured support, and how the ordinary voter experienced electioneering during this turbulent time.

"Civil War politics in Ireland has endured for generations and I wanted to explore that phenomenon: this is the first time the subject has ever been examined in a single constituency or county," said Owen.

"The Civil Was lasted longer in Kerry and was more bitter and divisive than in any other county. As a result, politics and election campaigns in the county were hugely influenced by the bitterness and hatred which the war created. Elections brought underlying tensions to the surface and were often occasions of violence fuelled by inflammatory speeches from election platforms," said Owen, whose book is based on four years of research for a PhD at the School of History at University College Dublin.

The book, which has been published by UCD Press, has been described as 'a first class piece of scholarship' by Professor Bill Kissane of the London School of Economics, who is a relative of Eamon Kissane, a Fianna Fáil TD from north

KERRY HERITAGE AWARD 2025 PRESENTED TO SHEILA MULCAHY

The Kerry Heritage Award – which is presented each year by the Kerry Archaeological and Historical Society – has been awarded for 2025 to a historian, author and founder of a west Kerry secondary school, Sheila Mulcahy. The presentation of the Kerry Heritage Award was made at a ceremony at the Rose Hotel in Tralee on Sunday afternoon. The award is presented annually by the Society to recognise individuals who have made a significant contribution to heritage and history in Kerry.

A native of Cloghane, Sheila Mulcahy studied French at UCC and during postgraduate work in Paris, she became a close friend of Killarney native, Janie McCarthy, the famed heroine of some five escape lines during the Second World War.

In 1956, Sheila married Waterford man Aidan Mulcahy and accompanied him to Nigeria. Having established a mission school in conjunction with the SMA fathers, they returned to west Kerry and created Meánscoil an LeithTriuigh in their family home and property in 1961. From the initial enrolment of 40 students in Pearse Hall, Castlegregory, their school has developed into the present-day campus in Castlegregory, where 160 students are on the roll.

In 2005, Pope Benedict bestowed a great honour on Aidan and Sheila, creating them Knights of the Order of St Sylvester in recognition of their immense contribution and service to community, the Church and education in Africa and Kerry. The following year the new school was officially opened.

Sheila was part and parcel of the re-establishment of Cloghane as a Gaeltacht. Furthermore, she was instrumental in the cultivation of our culture as evidenced in the celebrated CD, 'Tobair na Sinsir: the Ancestral Well'. Sheila's work continues in the Active Retired Group and as organist

and director of the Parish Choir in St Brendan's Church, Cloghane. Sheila is a former member of the Council of our society and continues to play a key role in promoting the history and heritage of her locality.'



Bots, and eventually advanced text-based coding by sixth class. The blend of hands-on robotics and screen-based coding helps students understand sequencing, digital communication, and logical thinking.

Children also work with a range of other robotics resources, including Dash, Botley, and VEX, extending digital learning across the curriculum. A 3D printer donated by I-Form has enabled pupils to experiment with design, engineering, and model-making.

Two after-school STEM clubs, launched last year, provide additional opportunities for creative exploration. Students have embraced stop-motion animation, podcasting, and greenscreen technology, culminating in a vibrant technology showcase where they presented their projects to the wider school community. The award builds upon a growing list of accolades for Firies N.S., including recognition as a STEM School of Excellence and a Digital School of Distinction. The school attributes these achievements to a committed and visionary staff, a supportive parent community,

and students whose enthusiasm drives innovation every day.

Caring For Kerry - The Kerry Specialist Mental Health hub

The HSE South West Caring for Kerry campaign continues this week with a reminder that the Kerry Specialist Mental Health hub offers a fast and comprehensive alternative to the emergency department for those in need of emergency mental health care.

GPs can refer patients directly to the hub for direct, same-day access to the expert care, so that Kerry people in need of urgent mental health support are assessed quickly, and directed to the right care promptly. Assessments are carried out by a Consultant Psychiatrist and Clinical Nurse Specialists in Mental Health, which means patients get specialist decision-making expertise as soon as they arrive.

Mr Aidan Murphy, Acting Area Director of Nursing, said: "The Kerry Specialist Mental Health Hub can see you faster and get you same-day access to the care you need. We hold emergency appointments each day, which patients can access with a referral from their GP or clinician. This allows us to review urgent cases quickly." An analysis of attendances at UHK ED shows that more than half of



people who present there with mental health difficulties could have been seen on the same day at the mental health assessment hub.

Mr Aidan Murphy, Acting Area Director of Nursing added:

"Referral to the hub means that the patients are not going to be waiting in the emergency room for extensive periods of time, like they normally might be without our service. We are encouraging GPs to refer patients to the hub, and patient to take up referrals if they're offered. If your GP refers you to the hub, please know that it is an excellent option for high quality, fast care."

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ANGIE BENHAFFAF NAMED LIDL FAMILY CARER OF THE YEAR 2025

A lifetime of courage, devotion and extraordinary love recognised at national award

Since that day, Angie has remained at their side through 75 surgeries, months spent in hospital far from home, and countless medical emergencies. She has slept on hospital floors, gone weeks without rest and fought tirelessly for the care her sons need, all while creating a warm and joyful home for her daughters.

Despite the relentless demands of caring, Angie has raised her children to face their challenges with confidence and possibility. Today, Hassan and Hussein are award-winning para athletes who have represented Ireland four times, bringing home multiple gold and silver medals in wheelchair basketball and athletics. Alongside caring for her family, Angie has also raised more than €105,000 for children's charities, showing the same determination and generosity that define every part of her life.

Now in their 18th year, the Lidl Family Carer of the Year Awards recognise and shine a bright light on the vital role of family carers in homes and communities across Ireland. Every week,


TO TAKE PLACE IN FAHA THIS DECEMBER

Winter Exercise Staying Active Safely in Cold Weather

As the days grow shorter and colder, it's completely normal to find exercise harder to stick with. Many people take a break during winter, only to face stiffness, dips in fitness and a greater risk of injury when they jump back in. The positive news is that a few simple tweaks can turn winter into a really valuable time to build strength and resilience.

Warm up properly, it matters more in winter.

Cold muscles need gentle preparation. Spend a few minutes walking, jogging or moving dynamically to warm up, boost blood flow, and get your body ready for a safe, enjoyable workout.

Layer up but avoid overheating.

Dress in light, removable layers to stay comfortable. A sweat-wicking base, warm middle layer and protective outer layer keep you cozy, while gloves, hats and good socks make early or evening workouts easier.

Stay visible, stay safe.

Dark mornings and evenings make visibility essential. Wear reflective clothing or lights when walking, running or cycling so others see you clearly.

Adapt your training, don't abandon it.

If conditions are icy, windy or wet, adjust instead of stopping. Shorter outdoor sessions, home workouts, resistance bands, stairs or indoor classes keep you moving consistently.

Watch for early signs of overuse.

Aches that worsen, swell or change your movement should be checked by a GP or physiotherapist to prevent injury.

Keep it enjoyable.

Exercise should feel manageable, not punishing.

Training with a friend, joining a class, or setting small goals keeps motivation high and makes winter activity more fun.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.


















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DRY EYE

WHAT IS DRY EYE?

People with dry eye either don't make enough normal (lubricating) tears or the ones that they make are of poor quality, causing the tears to dry up too quickly and the front of the eye to become dry and irritated. As a result, dry eye can be uncomfortable and cause the eye to produce the watery type of tears. This only helps for a short time – leaving the eye uncomfortable and gritty.

If your eyelids are sore and red, you may also have another condition called blepharitis. Blepharitis is a condition that affects the eyelids making them sore and inflamed. If the eyelid glands become blocked, you may have a condition called meibomian gland dysfunction. It is quite common to have a combination of these conditions.

Dry eye doesn't tend to cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. Severe cases do have a risk of causing long-term damage, but fortunately these are rare.

Risk factors

Dry eye is much more common in people over the age of 50. This is often because the glands that make the normal tears, and particularly the oily part of the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older. Also the tears tend to spread across the eye less well with age.

Some general health conditions can cause dry eye as a side effect, such as autoimmune diseases and hormonal changes. The condition is also more common in windy, cold, dry and dusty conditions.

If you're concentrating on your computer or smartphone for long periods of time without a break. this may also make your eyes feel dry.

Air conditioning and central heating can make dry eye worse too, as can some medications and general health problems.

Smoking has also been linked to dry eye as it may both cause the condition and make it worse.

Symptoms

People with dry eye may get some or all of the following symptoms.

- · A sandy or gritty feeling
- Sore eyes
- Uncomfortable and sometimes painful eyes
- An itching or burning sensation
- Short-term blurred vision

Watery eyes, as if you are crying (having watery eyes can mean you are producing poor-quality tears and actually have dry eyes)

TREATMENT

Most cases of dry eye tend to be a long-term condition, meaning that you'll need ongoing treatment.

There are lots of different types of drops and gels that can help your eyes feel more comfortable. The best ones don't have preservatives in them, or if they do they contain very gentle preservatives, which helps to reduce irritation. They may also contain an ingredient called sodium hyaluronate, known to be very effective in treating the condition.

It's important to use the correct type of drops. The wrong drops are unlikely to cause any harm, but they won't help as much. If your drops aren't working or you're not sure which drops to use, you're a sight test can help determine the best treatment options.

Healy-Rae's welcome funding increase for rural wastewater projects, including additional investment for Beaufort

Minister Michael Healy-Rae and Deputy Danny Healy-Rae have today welcomed the announcement by Minister for Housing James Browne TD of an additional €14.3 million in Government funding for rural wastewater projects under Measure A8 of the Multi-annual Rural Water Programme including increased funding for the long-awaited wastewater scheme in Beaufort, County Kerry.

Under today's approval, the Beaufort project will now receive €7 million, an increase from the originally allocated €6.7 million. This will allow the scheme to move forward to delivery, ensuring the community finally receives the modern wastewater infrastructure it urgently needs. Minister Michael Healy-Rae said:

"This is a hugely important step forward for Beaufort. For far too long, this community has been held back by the lack of proper wastewater services. Today's announcement gives the green light for this project to

proceed, and I want to acknowledge the work of Kerry County Council and Uisce Éireann in reassessing the costs and getting us to this stage. I will continue pressing to ensure the project is delivered without delay." Deputy Danny Healy-Rae added:

"Beaufort has waited long enough. This investment is essential for public health, the environment and for the future development of the village. We welcome the Government's uplift in funding and we will keep working to ensure the people of Beaufort see shovels in the ground as soon as possible."

Minister Michael Healy-Rae concluded:

"This is about fairness for rural communities. Projects like Beaufort are vital to allowing villages grow sustainably, improve water quality and support new housing. Today's announcement is a positive milestone for Kerry and for every area included in this programme."

Cahill Welcomes Major Housing Progress Across Killarney and Killorglin

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has welcomed the significant progress being made on major housing projects in both Killarney and Killorglin, describing the developments as "hugely important for the future of Kerry". He also said that the scale of demand highlights the need for more social and affordable homes across all parts of Kerry, particularly Killarney, Mid Kerry and South Kerry.

KILLARNEY: 249 Homes Underway at Cronin's Wood & Major Active Travel Project on Park Road

249-House Development at Cronin's Wood

Just 1.8km from Killarney town centre, construction is progressing on a 249-unit residential development consisting of 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5-bed homes. "These houses and apartments are enormously welcome news for Killarney, East Kerry and indeed all of County Kerry," Deputy Cahill added. "They are badly needed given the high

numbers awaiting housing locally." He paid tribute to Kerry County Council staff, elected councillors and contractors KPH for "their fine efforts in getting this development delivered".

The development also includes:

- A purpose-built childcare facility (417 sq. m)
- 510 residential parking spaces
- 18 creche parking spaces

KILLORGLIN: 94 New Homes at Banshagh

Deputy Cahill also highlighted the significant delivery of homes at Banshagh, east of Killorglin on the Tralee Road, where 94 housing units are being constructed "Twenty-six units have already been completed, and another 24 will be ready for occupation this month," he confirmed. "The remaining 44 will be delivered between March and August next year."

However, Deputy Cahill concluded by saying we must do more for the



squeezed middle."There are young couples out there with decent jobs who are above the social housing threshold but simply cannot afford the price of a house in today's market. Kerry County Council must expedite the delivery of an affordable housing scheme. I was delighted to be informed by my son Councillor Tommy Cahill, Chair of the Housing SPC, that at the December Housing SPC

meeting an Affordable Housing scheme is finally being looked at and expressions of interest will be sought. This is not before time and I want to pay tribute to Niamh O'Sullivan, Housing Director and Ger O'Brien, Senior Housing Executive for the work they and their teams are doing to bring this forward to the housing SPC. This is a prime example of how effective and efficient SPC's can be."

Permanent Oncology & Haematology UHK

An update received from the Minister for Health on the latest position regarding the provision of a Permanent Oncology and Haematology Unit at University Hospital Kerry, states that "University Hospital Kerry and HSE Capital and Estates are prioritising the preparation of the capital submission for the proposed Oncology day treatment ward and outpatients unit at University Hospital Kerry."

Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill raised the issue in Dáil Éireann with Minister Jennifer Carroll Mac Neill TD recently as cancer patient numbers in Kerry are continuing to grow with many needing to travel from all over Kerry to hospitals in Cork and elsewhere daily for treatment.

"We all know of family members and friends who are quietly travelling the daily round trip to Cork University Hospital, Bon Secours and South Infirmary Victoria Hospital in Cork for intensive treatments. The travelling involved is an extra burden on them of course. A permanent Oncology Unit in Tralee with increased capacity, would go some way to alleviating some of the pressure and stress for some patients" stated Deputy Cahill, a member of the Joint Health Oireachtas Committee.

"The present Interim Oncology unit was completed at UHK in 2024 at a cost of €2.44m, which includes 14 day treatment cubicles, is praised by those who need to use it. But all involved accept that the Permanent Oncology Unit, with increased capacity is required, with over 5,000 patients treated in University Hospital Kerry last year. I will continue to press for its progression" said Deputy Cahill.

"The Minister confirmed that the prioritisation of the capital list will be a matter for the HSE Regional Executive Office and the Regional Director for Planning and I will continue to call for support for this project, in order to get it across the line" added Michael Cahill TD.

Cahill welcomes major national investment but calls for urgent, strategic respite expansion in Kerry

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, welcomes major national investment but calls for urgent, strategic respite expansion in Kerry Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed the publication of Minister for Children, Disability and Equality Norma Foley's NDP Sectoral Capital Plan 2026–2030, which delivers €795 million in capital investment over the next five years.

Deputy Cahill said he is particularly delighted to see significant increases in funding across key areas, including:

- €278 million for Specialist Disability Infrastructure – doubling current capital investment
- €188 million for Child Protection and Tusla
- €188 million for Early Learning and Care
- "These are major and very welcome national investments," Deputy Cahill said. "The doubling of disability infrastructure funding is especially

important, as it will support new residential homes, respite facilities, day services and multidisciplinary units. This is the type of long-term planning and resourcing families have been calling for."

However, Deputy Cahill stressed that Kerry must see targeted, strategic investment in respite and adult day services, noting that many families are under severe strain.

"I want to be absolutely clear: while this national announcement is extremely positive, parents and carers in Kerry are at the end of their tether due to the lack of adequate respite services. We urgently need dedicated capital investment for respite and adult day care services in all parts of the county. I have raised this repeatedly in the Dáil and I will continue to stand firmly with families who need these supports."

Deputy Cahill acknowledged the dedicated work underway in St Mary's of the Angels

and Cúnamh, two vital services in the county, but emphasised that both require expanded capacity and additional resources to meet growing demand.

"St Mary's of the Angels and Cúnamh are doing exceptional work for children and adults with disabilities, and they are deeply valued in our communities," he said. "But they need to be supported to grow. Kerry families need more respite beds, more day service places, and modern, fit-for-purpose facilities. I will continue working with Minister Foley and Minister Emer Higgins to ensure Kerry gets its fair share of this investment."

Deputy Cahill said he would be engaging directly with the Department and the HSE to ensure that the new national funding translates into visible, tangible improvements for families in Kerry.

Healy-Raes Welcome €650,000+ in CLÁR Funding for 10 Kerry Community Projects

Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae TD and Deputy Danny Healy-Rae TD have today warmly welcomed a major funding boost for County Kerry under the 2025 CLÁR Programme, announced by Minister Dara Calleary TD.

Kerry will receive over €650,000 across 10 community projects, supporting schools, sports clubs, community groups and Kerry County Council to upgrade facilities, improve amenities and deliver new recreational infrastructure across the county. Minister Healy-Rae said:

Call for Blister Packs Charges to be covered by Government



There can be dangerous outcomes for people taking numerous medications daily, because of the confusion that can arise between the different tablets, the numbers of them prescribed and at which time of the day each should be taken and older people especially and their Carers are more vulnerable than most to this, according to the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism, Michael Cahill TD.

The Kerry Dáil Deputy is anxious that our Health Service Executive (HSE) and the Department for Health would liaise with representatives of Irish Pharmacists to put a system in place where our older citizens can avail of this service at no charge.

"People of any age can be confused by the sheer numbers of pills prescribed and there is a severe danger of harm involved if somebody forgets to take their medication or takes too many. There is a Blister Pack service available in most pharmacies, where the medications are issued in separate daily doses as prescribed, making it easier to keep track of what has or has not been taken" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Some Pharmacies need to charge for the service, as not all are equipped with automated prescribing systems and it would be a shame if every older patient could not avail of it due to the cost. I have been contacted by constituents from all corners of the county, from West Kerry, Castleisland, Kenmare, Killorglin, Waterville, Tralee, Killarney and East Kerry and so on, in regards to this matter. Many have confirmed to both my Secretary and I that they are now being charged €30 per month for this service and I am calling on the Minster for Health, Jennifer Carroll MacNeill to put the wheels in motion to deliver this excellent service free of charge to patients, especially our older citizens" added Michael Cahill TD.



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

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

good young footballers in Tipperary, Clare, and especially Cork, that are losing the incentive for the big ball, and that hasn't done any team emerging from Munster across the football grades any favours at all. Regardless, the first half of the Corn uí Mhuirí is simply about getting there. Every team in the quarter-final pot has two months of improvement and there are some cracking quarter-final draws in story. At the moment pot one will contain St. Francis Rochestown/SP Inbhearr Scéine, Clonakilty CC, Pres. Milltown, and Tralee CBS. Pot two will contain IS Killorglin, St. Pats Castleisland, St. Brendans Killarney, and Rochestown/Inbhearr Sceine/Clonmel. Teams that emerged from the same group cannot be drawn against each other.

Group One

St. Francis Rochestown currently top the group on five points. Inbhearr Scéine have three, but that game against Clonmel to go, and could catch up with the Cork side. Head to head doesn't come into play because the two sides actually drew with each other. Accordingly, it would come down to goal scoring between them. Note – not overall scoring difference, just the goals scored in their own meeting. Inhearr Scéine scored two in that game (2-7 to 0-13) which means that if Inbhearr Scéine can beat Clonmel, they would top the group with Rochestown second. A draw would put Inbhearr Scéine through in second place, while a Clonmel win would put them through in

Group Three

Three Kerry schools in this group, which means that one of them was guaranteed to lose out. As it happens, that turned out to be the reigning champions Mercy Mounthawk. Aidan O'Shea's side were simply down too many bodies. They opened with a draw against Cashel but lost out to St. Pats Castleisland in a real thriller before being knocked out by Tralee CBS. The Green, who have been down bodies themselves but have shown the depth and scoring power required, have been the form team and won all three games. In fact, first and second place turned out to have been effectively decided in their opening clash with St. Pats Castleisland, Tralee CBS winning that one by 2-13 to 0-14. They finish top and second, with Mounthawk and Cashel losing out on qualification.

Kerry FC are delighted to announce the signing of Galway United midfielder Vincent Borden ahead of the 2026 campaign.



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate an the builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

A disappointing opening quarter performance left Utility Trust St Pauls with too much to do, not ideal when you're going toe to toe with a quality side like Killester. To be fair they did improve their defensive output in the second quarter to hold the reigning champions to just 12 points but unfortunately they struggled to get their offensive game going. Not to be deterred they did persevere and with five minutes to go they actually shaved the gap down to five, 55-50. The opening quarter saw Killester set the tone early with Clarke, Bagdanivicene and Haiby helping them into a 10-3 lead. Maisie Burnham had got her side off the mark but they were struggling offensively against the aggressive Killester defence. Tara Cousins changed things up, netting again from outside and that served to give her side abit of momentum, albeit temporarily. Despite a Bencic three early in the third quarter the Cougars actually made the better start to the second half. Adedeji, walking on the foul trouble tightrope, Olanipekun, who had a great duel with Oisin Spring at this juncture, and Conway helped to close the gap to six, 62-56, midway through the quarter but Kellys incisive runs were helping to keep the scoreboard ticking over. Sheehan hit a timely three while Kelly, Grant and Carroll helped to bring the Lakers total upto 79. But Conway, who hit a very silent 35 points, and Adam Linehan kept their side in touch, with the Cougars only ten adrift as the teams turned for home.

Conway again gave the visitors a good start to the final period and even though Kelly and Grant netted the Cougars did manage to narrow the gap to six, 83-77, with Conway

and Olanipekun the main protagonists. Feeling their breath on their necks the Lakers again kicked into gear, Sheehan hitting a nice jumper and Grant hitting from downtown. Conway was still doing his utmost but a Kelly three sparked a spree with Grant and Sheehan following suit. Josh Vermiglio scored from the corner but Kelly had the honour of netting his side's 100th point with a breakaway lay up. Sheehan and Kelly put the icing on the Derby cake win with Linehan and Conway helping to bring their sides total to a very respectable 90 points. The cushion allowed Coach Luke O'Hea to give Adam O Neill, Cillian O Leary, Cathal Spring and Dara O'Sullivan game time, the latest products of the Club's underage system.



"The Lord passed in front of Moses calling out... Yahweh! The Lord God of compassion and mercy! I am slow to anger and filled with unfailing Love and Faithfulness. I lavish unfailing Love to a thousand generations. I forgive iniquity, rebellion, and sin. But I do not excuse the guilty, laying the sins of the parents upon their children and grandchildren; the entire family is affected – even to the third and fourth generations" (Exodus 34:6-7).

Welcome back dear student, as we approach Christmas, let's get to know the Lord, and understand what are we celebrating? To first know God, we must return to the fear of the Lord, for He is Awesome. Moses knew God as his Friend, yet he revered Him (Exodus 33:11). God is Holy and sin cannot enter His Presence. Mankind is not holy, for when Adam and Eve sinned our spiritual connection to God was broken through their disobedience. Sins also get handed down generationally — known as iniquities. He would send a Saviour. He looked and found there was no man to bridge the gap between our sins and God's holiness to save us, so He stepped in Himself and came down as one of us (Isaiah 59:16-17; 1 Timothy 2:5). Enter the Son of God - the Lord Jesus. The difference was, no man was His Father - God was. The ancestral line comes through the Father, so that is why Mary was a virgin when she gave birth to her first-born - Jesus (Isaiah 7:14; Luke 1:31-35). He was conceived when the Holy Spirit fell upon Mary, growing up to become Messiah – the Lamb with God's sinless bloodline.

God's Word is Truth, and He is true to His Word. He watches over His Word to see that it is performed (Jeremiah 1:12: Isaiah 55:6-11). Every prediction about the Messiah was fulfilled in Jesus. Christ is not His surname; it is His calling — it means Anointed One. "God anointed Jesus with the Holy Spirit and with Power, and He went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil for God was with Him" (Acts 10:38). Jesus' Name is Immanuel, which means "God with us". We had no way of overcoming the devil and his works in our own efforts. So, Yahweh - God Almighty, sent His Son to take our sins, to wash us clean from the effects of sin, bringing freedom from cursed generational iniquities, so we could be forgiven and reconciled to God, and brought into His family (Galatians 3:13). Simply by acknowledging and repenting for our sins, believing, and confessing aloud that Jesus is Lord, we become 'born again' into God's family, never again to be separated from His Love (Romans 10:9; John 3:7-16). Folks are battling multitudes of problems and chaos in the world: but you can have Peace in Christ friend. And a place to belong in God's family. The commercial driven, alcohol centred Christmas is a sham. God's Love for you is real. (Romans 8:31-39). This is the Good News - the reason we celebrate Christmas.
