

SALLY'S MISSION

TO BUILD A GYM IN PALESTINE

killarney photographer Sally MacMonagle has recently returned from a trip to Palestine where she was part of a group who raised funds to open a volunteer gym in the Aida Refugee Camp in the West Bank in Palestine.

"The gym will help improve the overall standard of life in the camp, and go towards fighting the large incidence of diabetes, hypertension, and mental health issues that exist in the camp because of the cramped living conditions and Israeli occupation", Sally told the Killarney Outlook

"The first step of the process was the fundraising - we made a promotional video with the help of local Killarney videographer & content producer Nial Foley as we knew that we needed to raise a total of €30,000 for the project to cover the cost of equipment, renovation of the allocated room at the Lajee Centre, and installation of the gym", Sally added.

Travel expenses for anyone going over from Ireland to help with the project was paid for by each individual themselves so all funds raised went directly to the gym.

"We held a concert last July in Cork with the help of local sponsorship from the INEC Killarney who sponsored the stage and lighting equipment. Christopher Leonard of Celtic Steps volunteered to to lights of the evening, and we had performers from Hermitage Green, Kneecap & DJs Fish Go Deep.

The team also held a raffle and for this we had prizes and sponsorship from Kerry Climbing, Dylan Hodd Artist, Reidys Bar, Kate Kearneys, Kerry Coaches & Courtneys Bar in Killarney.

"On the night we raised a staggering €17,000", Sally said. Another of Sally's roles was the responsibility for the logistics of getting the equipment delivered into Palestine which was no easy feat due to the restrictions Israel have in place. Palestine have no access to their coastlines nor airport and no international freight company will deliver directly to Palestine. So it was a massive achievement and relief to see the gym equipment finally land in the Aida Camp on the second night the group were there.

"The gym is just the medium by which we have the opportunity to show solidarity with the people here. We could have just bought the gym equipment here. We could have went in and got it from Tel Aviv or somewhere, but the whole point was that we were able to do this by not giving over the money that we've raised to Israel - so I think that we kind of bypassed the system there, which is a really big victory. I'm so glad that we were able to do it. It cost us more effort, and probably more money as well at the end of the day, but for us that's a massive victory. Israel are after building this big wall all around the

physical and emotional and social lives of the Palestinians and making it really hard for anything to come in and we worked together with the Palestinians to break that.

We spent the week installing the gym in between visiting site like Hebron & Ramallah.

Ainle O'Caireallain owner & trainer from Aclaí Gym in Cork, will be spending the coming weeks training the newly appointed coaches in The Lajee Centre

They will then return to Ireland in June to complete their 6 week intensive training course.

"We will be continuing our fundraising efforts over the coming months to cover all cost involved & also to provide a basic salary for each coach as the gym gets on it's feet. CAUTION REQUIRED BUT NOT PANIC

AS CORONA VIRUS ARRIVES IN IRELAND

This week,as cases of Covid-19 are confirmed in both the east and the west of the country, The European Centre for Disease Control (ECDC) confirmed the risk of widespread sustained transmission of COVID-19 in the EU and UK in the coming weeks as moderate to high.

While Ireland remains in a containment phase, the situation is according to Taoiseach Leo Varadkar "a fast evolving situation which is being reviewed on a day-to-day basis".

Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week, Killarney GP Dr. Fiona Gallagher said that the most important thing to do was to be cautious but not to panic.

"People need to keep up to date with details on the HSE website for advice on Covid-19 Coronavirus and read it thoroughly and regularly as the situation can change on an ongoing basis", Dr. Gallagher said.

"People need to be very careful where they get their information from - there is only one place and that is the HSE", she added.

It is extremely important to:

- · Wash your hands properly and regularly
- · Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough and sneeze, put used tissues in the bin and wash your hands.

Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

· Visit HSE.ie reguarly for further information and updates, she added.

COVID-19 is a new illness that can affect your lungs and airways. It's caused by a virus called coronavirus. Studies suggest that over 80% of confirmed cases are not severe, however mild symptoms can also make the epidemic harder to contain. Of the remaining 20% of cases, 14% of cases were severe with 6% critical and 2% of these fatal.

The incubation period – the time between infection and the onset of symptoms of the disease such as cough, fever and shortness of breath – is thought to range from two to 14 days.

The general public is advised to follow advice from the HSE and the Health Protection Surveillance Centre to protect their health.

Most up-to-date advice or links to travel information are available at www2.hse.ie.

The use of facemasks is another issue concerning the public and the following advice has been issued by the HSE.

Don't use a face mask if you feel well and do not have symptoms - there's no evidence that using masks is of any benefit if you are not sick.

Use a face mask if you:

Have or may have coronavirus

Are in close contact with someone who has or may have coronavirus

Are a healthcare worker in close contact with people who have or may have coronavirus

This week the decision was taken at the Intermediate School in Killorglin to cancel a trip for 40 students to Rome in a move which the school said wasn't taken lightly but one that simply had to be made. St. Brendan's College in Killarney had already made the decision to cancel their annual trip to China over the virus. Chemists across the county are reporting a huge surge in the demand for hand santiizers

Meanwhile agencies in Kerry have issued their

A statement from Kerry Airport earlier in the week stated that "Over a number of weeks, Kerry Airport has had meetings with and updates from the relevant Government agencies



including the

Departments of Health, Environment, HSE and the Irish Aviation Authority regarding the ongoing containment polices for COVID-19.

The situation is and remains changeable and the airport is prepared. We are grateful to all agencies for their ongoing support. The management team are reassured that the risk to Kerry Airport remains low, however we are prepared with robust operational procedures and action plans should the situation change", John Mulhern, CEO Kerry Airport PLC stated.

Earlier in the week, the government were not advising that St Patrick's Day parades or other large public events be cancelled and this has not yet changed, however the situation will be constantly reviewed.

PETER RELEASES HIS **Third book of poetry**





They have organised a climate





around the national park. They have also educated the First Year students in the school about the whole project. One of the biggest actions they have taken, is banning single-use plastic bottles in the school to cut down on plastic and

have added filtered-water taps to encourage students to use reusable bottles. Dr Annemarie Fuller from the Green Party has been working very closely with the group. She has advised the boys to focus on making a long term impact, which encouraged the students to apply to win Solar panels for the school, a dream they had from the start but felt it unrealistic.

The group is now working on their Eco Unesco project, a national school competition, Their idea involves a school uniform renewal scheme for the school and they also wish to become the first TerraCycle school hub in Kerry which is a system gathers hard to recycle waste that helps people make profits, while also helping the environment

On Monday the 2nd of March, 2,500 people took part in the first of the ceremonies, where they take part in the first of the ceremonies where they take an oath of fidelity to the State and commit to observe it's laws and respect it's democratic values.

The ceremony continued on Tuesday where another 2,500 people will take part. Almost 1,000 of the people taking part are from the UK, over 700 from Poland and almost 500 from Romania.

Due to HSE guidelines and the fears of The Coronavirus, participants were asked not to shake hands and to observe practices of not sneezing close to others in line. A small number of people wore face masks at the ceremony with 60 people unable to attend.

This is the third year that a large citizenship has been held outside of Dublin.

Since 2011, 151 such ceremonies have been held and 132,000 people from 180 countries have become citizens.





I suppose an easy way to explain is eating to satisfy an emotion rather than a physical hunger. The difference with emotional hunger and physical is that emotional hunger is often suffer, a rapid impulse to eat or over eat, and physical hunger is gradual. The other difference is that emotional eating can not be satisfied with food, often making you feel worse in fact, and physical hunger is satisfied with food so we feel full after. Have you ever wolfed back your dinner only to realize your still hungry and go for the chocolate and crisps after eating... still feeling unsatisfied but unwell?

What struck me when I did a lot of research and study on this topic is that emotional eating isn't always the obvious. Trigger like.... stress eg, cause I broke up with my boyfriend, or I had a fight with my boss at work, or I'm on a deadline to get a job finished and I'm so stressed out!!!!! Emotional eating can be triggered by something as simple as always rushing around. For example the body is in constant fight or flight, no physical signals of hunger strike but you may be hit late on in the day with an overwhelming urge where you feel I have to eat now or I'll faint, then you grab your meal usually quickly and usually not the healthiest and eat it too fast and are still not satisfied!!!! PRESBYOPIA

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading.

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want to wear glasses.

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing alasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it.

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.



One of the top performers was Spa footballer and Kerry selector Cassandra Buckley. Kerry midfielder Lorraine Scanlon top scored with 25. Team Tom McCarthys will now meet Ulster university again next weekend in another nail-biter to decide the League semi-final.

GAA CONGRESS

Transfers proved crucial as New York's Larry McCarthy saw off the strong challenge of Jarlath Burns to become the next President of the GAA. 



Know Your Rights:

Question

I have run my own company for several years, but things have become very difficult lately. I've always understood that being self-employed meant that I didn't qualify for unemployment benefits but I heard that there have been changes lately. Will I qualify for social welfare if my business goes bust?

Answer

You may qualify for the new Jobseeker's Benefit (Self-Employed) (JBSE), if you are no longer self-employed.

To qualify for JBSE, you must have lost your self-employment involuntarily and not because of a temporary shutdown or seasonal closure. However, you do not have to cancel your registration for taxes with Revenue to qualify.

You must also be:

- Aged between 18 and 66
- Unemployed you can work as an employee for up to 3 days per week and still be considered unemployed
- Capable of work if you have an illness or injury, you may qualify for a different social welfare payment and should talk to your GP and local Citizens Information Centre or INTREO office.
- Genuinely seeking full-time work

You must also satisfy the social insurance (PRSI) contributions conditions. You need:

- At least 156 weeks of Class S contributions or at least 104 weeks of paid Class A or H PRSI since first starting work
- 52 weeks of Class S contributions paid in the governing contribution year. This is the second-last complete tax year before the year in which your claim is made. So, for claims made in 2020, the governing contribution year is 2018.

If you do not qualify for JBSE, you may get Jobseeker's Allowance. If you have 260 or more Class S PRSI contributions, you can get JBSE for up to 9 months. If you have fewer than 260 Class S PRSI contributions, you can get JBSE for up to 6 months. If you are over 65, you may continue to be paid until your 66th birthday, even if your claim is due to end before that date.

The maximum rate for JBSE in 2020 is €203. You may be entitled to an increase for your spouse or partner, and children.

You should apply as soon as you are no longer self-employed. To apply, you fill out a UP1 application form and bring it to your local Intreo Centre or local Social Welfare Branch Office.

COMPASSION

Compassion is an essential component of human existence. If we are to accept our humanness then we need to develop compassion. What do we mean exactly by compassion and where does it originate. Compassion can be understood as the emotional response when we perceive suffering, and it can involve an authentic desire to help. It literally means to suffer together. The latest research findings from a number of scientists has shown that our brains are "wired up to respond to others' suffering". Nancy Eisenberg, is a leading academic in the field of Compassion who has published widely and has found that compassion is part of our basic human nature. This means that our temperament or what we what we are born with, the way we self-regulate our emotions and what we experience from our parents in their parenting practices all contribute to the way we develop our empathy, compassion and helping behaviour. In other words we are born with empathy for others, the recognition that if we see upset in others we will respond with kindness and the concept compassion takes that further by wanting to help alleviate the suffering and pain in the other.

The Dalai Lama captures this beautifully when he says "So long as we are human we need compassion. Compassion brings inner peace and whatever else is going on, that peace of mind allows us to see the whole picture more clearly. So, in our education we need lessons about developing warm-heartedness and finding inner peace: "

We all understand compassion for others, but an essential ingredient for increased mental health is compassion for self. In the same way we recognise someone else's suffering and we want to respond by making it better, the next level is to have compassion for ourselves, to recognise our own pain and to understand our own humanness. A question that is very useful to ask ourselves is if someone else told us this story, the story about being angry or hurt or disappointed would we have compassion for them? Then why not for ourselves? A good question indeed. Some of the ways to develop compassion for oneself are to liter ally feel warm to oneself rather than hurting oneself with selfcriticism. Remembering the common humanity which means we acknowledge our suffering and personal failure is part of the shared human experience. And lastly, developing self-compassion requires that we take a balanced approach to our negative thoughts without trying to suppress or deny them. The key here is balanced, so if we do have a negative thought about ourselves, we develop the habit to balance it with a forgiving thought, a more compassionate one. Remembering that it is in our mind that we can be developing the more compassionate thoughts.


