

takes place from Muckross Abbey, Killarney National Park



Tomorrow, Saturday May 7th, beginning at 5.00am, the National Parks and Wildlife Services team based in Killarney National Park will livestream the dawn chorus through the park's Facebook page www.facebook.com/killarneynationalpark

Against the beautiful backdrop of Muckross Abbey in Killarney National Park, listeners will be treated to a live performance of nature's finest song birds, alongside expert commentary from the National Park and Wildlife Services (NPWS) Conservation Rangers.

The event will be live-streamed on Facebook at www.facebook.com/killarneynationalpark from 5 - 6am. Listeners can expect to hear birdsong from Killarney National Park's birdlife, including robins, blackbirds, song thrushes, wood pigeons, wrens, warblers, sparrows, and finches. The livestream will coincide with the annual 'Darkness into Light' event and provide an ideal companion to those participating the walk as well as listeners based at home who are interested in engaging with nature and the heritage of Killarney National Park.

NPWS staff led by Danny O'Keefe, will guide and identify the various birdsong. The event also brings together the history and heritage of Killarney National Park and its surrounds. Conservation Rangers will speak about the beautifully preserved cloisters and the iconic 500 year old yew tree. Buried in the Abbey are the internationally renowned Four Kerry Poets from the 17th and 18th centuries, Seafraidh Ó Donnchadha, Aodhagán Ó Rathaille, and Eoghan Rua Ó Súilleabháin and Piaras Feiritéar.

A number of local experts and musicians will also participate in the event, including:

TIME TO CUT THE HAY



The Spanish Bluebell is very pale in comparison to the wild bluebell.

There must be an optimum time to leave the dandelions flower and straight away cut the grass. We have barely managed it in Killarney, but it is great that we have the photo finish! Much of the approach roads to be frank until this week looked unkempt and neglected. Bees are one thing and we all want more food for bees and we delight in the wild flowers, but the thing is daft when we can hardly see around the bend with the height of the hay! There was a thing in North Kerry called "the long acre", when cows would be allowed out on the sides of the road to eat the fresh grass. The cows could be tethered or have a minder. Perhaps we could encourage some of our farmers onto the road sides, Not alone would this save money for the local authority, but - and it is a very important but, land released in square acres would then be available for housing.

On another note, this being May, the supreme flower month, readers have been in contact to ask how they might identify the wild bluebell from the Spanish or invasive garden variety that is threatening our beautiful woods in Killarney.

Apart from the fact the Spanish has little or no scent and it is taller, there is a marked difference in colour. The native bluebell is violet, really, tending to purple in the stem itself, just where the flower cluster is, and the flowers are all to one side on the wild bluebell. The Spanish is very pale, comparatively, and I enclose a picture I took this weekend in Muckcross where the invasive is being rooted out by NPWS staff.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING

The glaring problem and ongoing inaction regarding a pedestrian crossing for Mission Road from the Beech Road car park to the Monsignor Flahery statue to the national park /Killarney House prompted me to lodge a freedom of information request to Kerry County Council.

Documents finally released to me make for interesting reading.

Five years ago, in March 2017 Senior Executive Engineer Breda Mulryan writes to David Doyle engineer to say how this is coming up on a regular basis "now" by members.

But the real meat is in the traffic study carried out in June, 2018. Pre-pandemic in other words.

Mission road as we know is in the heart of Killarney but is also a designated national secondary route the N71.

On June 28th between the hours of 8.00 am and 6 pm some 5,595 vehicles used Mission Road and some were recorded at doing 61 km an hour, while the average speed was 40 km an hour. But what is actually glaring and deeply worrying is how seven vehicles were actually travelling at between 61 and 70 kms.

During that period 628 pedestrians crossed the road. 87 of these were children under the age of 16 and there were 34 who were elderly. 19 of those were crossing with prams. (I am tempted to say "trying to cross"). Three were disabled.

Most pedestrians – 65 per cent - favoured crossing the road at the New Street car park side and it was found that the pedestrian traffic more than justified a signal controlled or zebra crossing.

The various motions including a resolution by all members of Killarney MD submitted to Transport Infrastructure Ireland in Dublin to put in a controlled pedestrian crossing are included. This one from January 2020 speaks of "the present situation is a danger to people's well-being and is disrespectful to visitors."

Hear Hear we say. The reply from TII is worthy of study and it has to be read and reread to be believed. To summarise: if there are enough people knocked down, a controlled pedestrian crossing will be installed!

"Each year TII carries out a collision analysis of the entire national road network, in compliance with the EU Road Infrastructure Safety Management Directive. The purpose

of this exercise is to identify locations that have high concentrations of collisions. It does not, however, include the subsequent process to devise proposals to identify any appropriate road safety interventions; this is the responsibility of the relevant local authority, as the road authority for the area". It goes onto say how that a road authority can submit an option on safety grounds and have been told this, but the council has not submitted the necessary feasibility and options report.

In January 2020 the council in a reply to then Cllr Michael Gleeson who again asked why there still was no pedestrian crossing on the Mission Road to access the park during Covid when everyone was out and about, the council said the need had been established by the traffic study in 2018..

But as the N71 was a national secondary route it falls under the remit of the TII.

Besides, nothing can be done by TII until the Muckcross Road HaHa scheme is constructed, the council told Mr Gleeson.

All I can conclude is the councillors are doing their best, but they are falling between the two stools of the TII on the one hand, and the local authority on the other. They are being pushed from Billy to Jack, or Biddy to Jilly, to be gender inclusive. Meanwhile, everyone's heart is out their mouth trying to cross that road.!

CAR PARKS

We are still on traffic management because it is the single biggest problem in Killarney and the town is choked.



This excellent suggestion has been inserted into the County Development Plan thanks to mayor of Killarney Marie Moloney, whom I have to say as her term draws to a close has done a tremendous job from the word go.

During the marathon meeting last week, Cllr Moloney has asked that in towns in Kerry under pressure for parking facilities in the town centre a policy of park and ride be adopted.

"It should be policy by Kerry County Council to source alternative parking facilities outside the towns and operate park and ride systems," she said.

There was widespread support because it is a common sense proposal and the quickest and possibly cheapest mechanism to relieve the awful congestion and the frustration in Killarney .

People are now trying to meet outside town if they can for lunch and other meetings all because of the parking nightmare which must be affecting hard-pressed restaurants and cafes.

National honours went to Killarney club man Rob Duggan and Ger Conway. Having complained of clutch issues from the word go,

Rob battled hard throughout setting multiple fastest stage times to win out by 48.9 seconds from Donegal man Kevin Eves in his Toyota Corolla Twin Cam. Conor Murphy brought his Ford Escort home in third place in what was a fantastic outing by the Killarney man.

Alan Ring went one better than his 2nd place result in the Killarney Historic Rally last November by taking the Historic win on his home rally in the Subaru Legacy. Alan and his co driver Adrian Deasy had 45.8 seconds to spare over Fergus O Meara in the Escort while Neil Williams rounded out the podium positions in third.

Meanwhile, Killarney and District Motor Club member Jason Farrell has extended his lead at the top of the standings in the Irish Junior Tarmac Rally Championship following an emphatic Junior rally win. After just 8 rally stages, Jason won the rally by 2 minutes, 20.5 seconds from Robbie O Hanlon in 2nd place. Just a sign of what is to come for Jason in the future. Local debutants Gary Healy and Gearoid Moynihan brought their Honda Civic home in 3rd, a fantastic result for them given it was their first outing on home soil. Rallying has a strong future in the Kingdom!

The rally was held in some glorious weather over the weekend, with just some showers early on Sunday morning to test the driver's skill and technique. Thousands of spectators lined the stages in what was one of the biggest crowds



CEANN COMHAIRLE AND CATHAOIRLEACH TO VISIT UKRAINE AND ADDRESS UKRAINIAN PARLIAMENT IN KYIV

The Ceann Comhairle Seán Ó Fearghail TD and the Cathaoirleach of the Seanad Senator Mark Daly have accepted an invitation from the Speaker of the Ukrainian Parliament to travel to Kyiv and address the Ukrainian Parliament.

The Cathaoirleach of the Seanad Senator Daly said, “The fact that we have been invited is recognition by the Ukrainian Government of the exceptional welcome extended by the people of Ireland to Ukrainian refugees and the assistance and funding that is being provided to those still in the Ukraine”. The Cathaoirleach went on to say, “As an EU member country, it’s crucial that Ireland plays a visible and vocal part in demonstrating EU support for Ukraine and for Ireland’s support Ukraine’s membership of the EU”.



In his invitation, the speaker of Ukrainian parliament Mr. Ruslan Stefanchuk said: “I am confident that your visit will become another strong message of solidarity and support to our state at this difficult time of struggle against the aggressor and democratic values”.

In addition to visiting the Ukrainian Parliament and making their address, the delegation will also visit some of the towns that have been decimated by the war and where atrocities have occurred, to highlight the need for those responsible to face justice for war crimes.

KERRY STUDENTS CAN APPLY NOW FOR ENHANCED STUDENT GRANTS FOR THE NEW ACADEMIC YEAR – GRIFFIN

Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD, has confirmed that applications for student grants for the new academic year are now open and changes to the grants will see significant improvements for students.

From September:

- maintenance grants will increase by €200
- the income threshold for the standard rate of grant increase by €1,000
- the distance for the higher non-adjacent student grant will be reduced from 45km to 30km

Speaking today, Deputy Griffin said: “These changes to the grants will deliver much-needed assistance to students and families across the country.

“The €200 increase in the maintenance grant will offer direct financial assistance to over 62,000 students across the country, and increasing the eligibility cut off point by €1,000 will ensure even more students qualify, and more families can access support. “Reducing the distance for the

higher non-adjacent student grant also means more students who are living away from home or travelling to college will qualify for the higher grant. This will make a substantial difference to many people. “These are real and tangible changes which will help students and families, and they are in line with the forthcoming Review of the Student Grant Scheme, which will be brought to Government in the coming weeks.”

Minister for Further and Higher Education Simon Harris TD said: “We will continue to make changes to assist students. We strongly believe there is a need to reduce the cost of education for families and we are working with Government colleagues to outline our priorities on how we can help people with these significant costs. “For any student experiencing difficulties currently, there is a significant allocation to the Student Assistance Fund and I would encourage students to contact their access offices to avail of these funds.”

CASTLEISLAND WOMAN UNDERGOES LUNG SURGERY IN THE MATER HOSPITAL, DUBLIN TO TREAT RARE GENETIC DISORDER

When Eileen Harnett from Castleisland became very ill from her rare genetic condition, she also found out her diaphragm had collapsed and that she would need Lung Volume Reduction surgery.

At the Mater Foundation, the official fundraising body of the Mater Public Hospital, speak to patients from all over Ireland to gain an insight into their experiences and health journey in the Mater. This week, they spoke with Eileen Harnett, a Mater patient from Castleisland who shared her story of receiving Lung Volume Reduction surgery to treat her rare genetic disorder.

"I have a rare genetic disorder called Alpha-1 Antitrypsin deficiency which affects the protection of my lungs and liver, and in 2018 I became very ill from it. I went up to the Mater where I had a CT and profusion scan and from there the respiratory team discovered that my diaphragm had collapsed. I went to see Dr Karen Redmond and she told me that I would either need to have Lung Volume Reduction (LVR) surgery or a lung transplant, but that I would first need to work really hard to get my diaphragm back into place.

So for 6 months, I did all my strength and walking exercises. It was absolute torture but it



worked. When I went back to the Mater though, Dr Redmond told me that there was now a possibility that I had cancer as I had two new nodules in my right lung. After being tested though, they found out it wasn't cancer and I was scheduled for the LVR surgery on the 28th January 2020.

The surgery went really well but the recovery

was slow. I had to have a surgical drain in place for six months, one of the surgeons even told me that it was the longest he had ever seen someone have a drain in place. Once they removed the drain though, I started to recover fairly quickly.

Before I had the surgery I could hardly do anything and was confined to my bed. Now I can potter about in my garden and go for daily walks. It's made a huge difference to my quality of life. I'm still not 100 percent better and will need either another LVR surgery or a double lung transplant at some stage but I'm very, very lucky. I don't think I would still be here today if it wasn't for the surgery.

I am ever so grateful for everything that everyone in the Mater that has done for me, right down to the cleaners. And I am so grateful for Dr Karen Redmond, she really listened and understood exactly what I was going through."

USE POSITIVE STRESS TO MOTIVE YOURSELF FOR THE STATE EXAMS

With the state exams now just five weeks away, candidates may become anxious about their performance. A level of anxiety is normal and focusses the mind on the challenge ahead. Almost all exam candidates, irrespective of how laid back they appear, feel nervous. It's the body's way of dealing with a stressful experience. How you deal with this nervous energy is the critical issue. If you channel it in a positive direction, it will give you the vitality to cope with the demands of the exam.

A positive mental attitude is a considerable aid around exam time. Be confident in your ability to do well. Don't be discouraged by other students appearing to know more than you do. Aim to do perform to your own capability, not to compete with others. Make positive statements about yourself. Banish all negative thoughts from your mind. Think well of yourself and of your readiness to achieve success. Be determined to do your best, no more, no less. Success is a product of positive thinking. By motivating yourself towards your goals, you will redouble your effort and improve your performance. Have items in your study environment to spur you on. Place a statement of your objectives, such as your target grades, in a conspicuous place. An occasional glance in their direction will encourage you. Exam stress becomes newsworthy every year because of the assessment system used in the state exams. For the most part these exams are terminally assessed. In effect, two years of work is examined by means of written papers in June. Not enough credit is given to the candidate for consistent work over the two years. Continuous assessment is not sufficiently utilised although new proposals by Minister Foley recommend

changing the assessment procedure to significantly reduce reliance on final exams. If these reforms are adopted Leaving Cert subjects will have assessment components worth 40% and a terminal written exam worth 60% of the total marks. The major problem with the current exam system is the increased level of stress it causes in some students around exam time. Despite all that is written about exam stress, students continue to show that they are excellent exam performers and use stress as a stimulant rather than an affliction. The stress experienced by the majority of exam candidates is positive stress. It concentrates the mind wonderfully. You realise that the forthcoming exam is making increased demands of you. However, your application to study and revision provides you with the resources to meet these demands. Positive stress provides you with the motivation to prepare for the exam. It will sustain and stimulate this motivation until the exam is over. Properly controlled stress will activate hidden resources of energy and application in you. It's important to control the stress and channel it into positive energy. It's only when you haven't the resources to meet the demands of the exam that distress or negative stress becomes an issue. Exam distress is a rare occurrence in young people and can easily be confused with normal exam anxiety. The present cohort of young people is highly skilled and well able to cope with the demands of the exam. Distress, when it does occur, is disruptive and may interfere with your performance if it isn't counteracted. An effective way of managing distress is through utilising your social support network of people who care about you. If you need emotional support approach someone in whom you have

confidence. That person may be a teacher, a parent or your guidance counsellor. All you need is the advice of someone who will put the exam in perspective for you and who will help to boost your self-confidence. It all goes back to having a positive mental attitude and to realising that anxiety and stress should be channelled in your favour.

- On Saturday May 7th (09:15 – 11:15) – for people aged 12-29 for 1st & 2nd vaccination doses and for booster vaccinations. 12-15 year olds must be accompanied by a parent/guardian.
- On Saturday May 7th (12:00 – 16:00) – for people aged 30 and older for 1st & 2nd vaccination doses and for booster vaccinations.

Walk-in clinics are open for 5-11 year olds over the next few days as follows:

- On Friday May 6th (9:20 – 11:10) – for children aged 5-11 for 1st & 2nd vaccination doses.

Getting your child vaccinated is a decision between you and your child. If Parents have any

questions regarding your child's vaccination then please speak to staff at our vaccination centres, they will be available to provide you with further information.

It's important that you do not go to a vaccination centre if you have Covid-19; if you have symptoms of Covid-19 or if you have been told to restrict your movements.

It's also important to check your eligibility online on hse.ie before you self-schedule your appointment, bearing in mind that if you are in the 16+ age group you need to wait three months (at least 90 days) after your first round of Covid-19 vaccination before you can get a booster and if you had Covid-19 since you were vaccinated, you should get your booster dose at least three months after your positive test result.

If you are in the 12-15 age group you need to wait six months (at least 179 days) after receiving your second dose of Covid-19 vaccination before you can get a booster and if you had Covid-19 since you were vaccinated, you should get your booster dose at least six months after your positive test result.



EYES IN THE SUN

Too much sun can damage the eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems. There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B. Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

UV-A
can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye.

UV-B
The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

Macular Degeneration
UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people.

Cataract
UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium
Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea.

Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

Skin Cancer
Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

Corneal Sunburn
Corneal sunburn, called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

Protecting your eyes from the sun
If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.



The recent Circuit of Ireland winners won four of the six stages on Saturday but six stage wins saw Devine and O'Sullivan trim the gap back to 3.1 seconds before the Caragh Lake decider, where the leaders were a touch unlucky to swing a fraction too wide on a left hander and slide off, leaving the way clear for the winners. Second placed Josh Moffett was a full minute behind but that's enough to see him stretch his lead at the top of the thrifish Tarmac Rally Championship standings.

Not surprisingly, Rob Duggan and Ger Conway were the local headliners, winning the national category in their Ford Escort with a time of 1.43.50.5 to see off a strong challenge from Kevin Eves and Chris Melly. The achievement is all the more notable considering that the winners had to contend with oil and clutch issues during the day.

KERRY VERSUS CORK



There isn't really too much to say in terms of a preview. The blip in 2020 aside, Kerry have very much had the upper hand over our neighbours in recent years. I suspect that the controversy over the venue has been manna from heaven for a lot of journalists. There wasn't too much they could say about the actual game.

At least the venue is settled now – I don't think players on either side will have been too distracted by it. For me, a big issue that isn't being mentioned too much is the fact that a lot of the supporters who fail to get a ticket will also not be able to watch the game on television – Sky have the broadcasting rights to the game. I'm no naysayer and I do understand that revenue is important for nurturing the roots of the game, but to me that broadcasting deal was an outright betrayal of the basic principles of the game. As for the nonsense

about it would allow the diaspora in England and Australia to be able to watch the games.... well, it turned out very predictably that neither was all that interested. A terrible decision, even worse than the change of minor to U17, which was also opposed by the vast majority of the grassroots.

Pairc Uí Rinn is a very tight ground for supporters, but the pitch is actually quite a decent size – it's as long and a bit wider than the Fitzgerald Stadium in that regard. I expect that Kerry will enjoy having the space to operate.

Ian Maguire is unlikely to be back, and I rate the midfielder very highly. Mark Keane could slot in well for him (despite his cameo in the forwards in 2020, Keane made his name with as a midfielder) but he, like the Cahalanes, opted for hurling instead and it's football's loss. In fact, Cork rather inexplicably lost or cast aside some good and experienced footballers (Luke Connolly in particular could be wayward, but he was unpredictable and always had the potential to be a game-changer). Stephen Sherlock has lifted some of the colossal scoring burden off the magnificent Brian Hurley's shoulders, but Cork just don't have enough teeth for a game of this calibre. I expect them to play with a packed blanket defence, but they can't transition fast enough to attack.

Kerry hammered Cork last year; there is no point in dressing it up. And Kerry look to be in even better shape now than then. We won Division One comfortably, while Cork needed a massive slice of luck in their last game against Offaly to stay up in Division Two. I'm less enamoured with the fact that we didn't concede many goals from play, a regular failing of ours in recent years, during the League – check it again, we actually coughed up a fair few goal chances. But both Jason Foley and Tadgh Morley have grown into real linchpins

and the defence is well settled. Mike Breen is a loss, but we have very strong back-up for the jerseys now. Diarmuid and a much-improved Jack (I don't think he gets the credit he deserves) should edge midfield – I still expect David Moran to be staking a claim for a starting berth later on in the championship. Up front I expect Dara Moynihan's ability to win dirty ball to edge Stephen O'Brien's pacy threat for a starting jersey – Adrian Spillane was quietly become a mainstay of this team. Seán O'Shea to return on the forty, with the incisive Paudie Clifford taking an unlucky Paul Geaney's corner forward berth. I stress that I am only guessing; I have and want absolutely no inside info on the team.

Bottom line? Cork are always dangerous underdogs, and this won't be the rout that many people are expecting, but John Cleary will have done well standing in for Keith Ricken if Cork are competitive to the finish. I can only see one winner here.

ALL IRELAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

Momentum is starting to build and games are starting to come thick and fast. It feels unnaturally early in the year, but remember that you'll have a good few extra games next year. I still say that this is the right time-frame with maybe a few tweaks.

Obviously, one result last weekend stands head and shoulders above the rest. All Ireland champions Tyrone were not just beaten, but walloped by Derry. Incredibly, it was just Derry's second win in the Ulster Championship in an entire decade! Now, Derry had a very good League (they were unlucky not to get promotion in the finish and played a lovely brand of football). I'm not surprised to see

Derry coming good. During Kerry's sequence of All Ireland minor wins, Derry were the team who gave them the most trouble outside of Munster. Conor Glass in midfield had the same stellar reputation as Kerry's David Clifford, and for the same reason. Himself and Shane McGuigan were the main stars of a St. Pats Maghera team that put it up to the Sem in a Hogan Cup final – Glass's controversial red card turned that game. His return from Australia was a huge boost to Tyrone. That said, I did not see them beating Tyrone, let alone by this margin. The Red Hand will be hugely disappointed with their display here. Once again, their discipline was open to question, with Brian Kennedy and Conor McKenna both picking up unnecessary red cards - Kennedy might have been a touch unlucky, but he did kick out and the decision was correct. Tyrone are deadly once they go in front – it's very hard to break down the massed ranks of their half back line. However, it's a very different proposition once they go behind, and this was a case of the biter bit, as Derry hit them at pace for scores early on and then quite simply shut up shop, frequently having fifteen men back in their own half.

Mind you, the back door could actually suit Tyrone better. They would have faced two tough games in Ulster against quality opposition and then had a four week break to the quarter-final. This way, they'll have two qualifier games (again, assuming they win) spread out more evenly and almost certainly against easier opposition – mind you, they could be drawn against Mayo in one of those qualifiers. That would be interesting, I suspect both teams' training schedule was timed to peak later on.

The qualifiers will be very interesting. You currently have Tyrone, Armagh, Mayo, Clare, and Louth in the mix, to be joined by some other big guns next weekend, including the winners of Kerry and Cork. The Chinese famously had a blessing "May you live in interesting times". It also doubled up as a curse. There's a couple of teams, not least the reigning All Ireland champions, who will understand the sentiment!

No real surprises in Leinster. Wexford's reward for a thrilling first round win over Offaly against the odds was a twenty point hammering by Dublin. Hardly a shocker. Likewise, Wicklow's thrilling victory over a fancied Laois earned them the lions' den of Meath, who promptly filled their scoring boots. Kildare also saw off Louth comfortably. Westmeath are the only surprise package in the Leinster semi-finals, and I don't see them troubling Dublin either. I'd fancy Kildare to beat Meath – the Royals have improved massively from where they were, but they still flatter to deceive and it seems to be an ingrained problem at this stage. Westmeath are the wild card, but I can't see them stopping the blue juggernaut that is Dublin, who will have the scent of an All Ireland in their nostrils now that both Tyrone and Mayo are in the qualifiers.

U20 KERRY V TYRONE

Hard to tell at this remove. Kerry have been very jittery in both their games so far, only pulling away late on – their fitness is certainly

impressive. I have to say that I think these players should have been lining out with their clubs early in the county league, and not just for the clubs' sake. Regardless of the quality of training and challenge games, you need competitive games to stay sharp. They have been very defensive – maybe a bit too much so. Heinrich tends to blossom in a traditional centre back role, I don't want him dropping too deep. Kerry's full back line of O'Callaghan, Dineen, and Nagle are well able to fend for themselves – with both Clare and Cork dropping a forward back, Nagle was actually able to come out the field and was excellent. Ruairí Murphy in midfield has been Kerry's best player for me, while Seán O'Brien hasn't been far off him. Cillian Burke is another to excel, but I'd much prefer him as a target-man inside rather than number ten – a straight swap with sublime passer Kevin Goulding might well benefit both players. In fact, Declan O'Sullivan will have some tough decisions to make in the forwards. The subs against Cork like Jack O'Connor, Jordan Kissane, and Gearóid Hassett all staked strong claims to starting jerseys this time out, albeit with the caveat that Cork were beginning to run on empty at this stage.

I won't pretend that I know a lot about Tyrone. I did see the Ulster Final – fair play to TG4 for showing the games for free – and one thing that struck me was that this Tyrone team are not a blanket defence team by any means in modern terms. Of course they do drop players back when not in possession, just like we do ourselves, but they actually play a traditional style of football and play it well. I hope I'm wrong, not least because I consider this grade to be far, far more influential than minor in terms of winning All Irelands, but I think Kerry will be up against it next Sunday. Then again, given that it's a knock-out competition, teams tend to improve with every game they play and we have two decent tests under our belt. If we can play to our full potential....but that's always the 'if', isn't it?

LADIES GAA

Kerry will face Tipperary in the curtain-raiser to the Kerry v Cork game in Pairc Uí Rinn. Brilliant for them – the Kerry ladies deserve more support from the general public than they get at games. I have no time for patronising nonsense, if the games were poor quality (and a few years ago, the standard was poor) I'd say it, but Darragh Long and Declan Quill have assembled a strong backroom team and quietly and carefully built a very good team. From the outside it can often appear that we are heavily dependent on the magnificent Louise Ní Muircheartaigh for scores, but in actual fact Kerry have developed some outstanding sharpshooters in the likes of Siofra O'Shea and Hannah O'Donoghue (both were carrying injuries from the National League and I don't know the state of play) and Danielle O'Leary. The Rathmore sharpshooter was always something of a prodigy, but she has added consistency to her game – she carried her impressive club form into a phenomenal display off the bench in the Division Two League Final. Erica McGlynn is another who has staked a real claim to a jersey, while experienced

campaigners like Lorraine Scanlon, Aishling O'Connell, and Anna Galvin are a match for anyone out there. Tipperary have some fine players themselves – keep an eye out for Anna Rose Kennedy and Emma Morrissey. However, Kerry's promotion back to Division One will be a huge confidence booster and I expect Kerry to lay down a marker here. Cork and then Dublin have completely dominated the All Ireland series in recent years, while Meath were an absolute and magnificent bolt out of the blue (Kerry were beating that Meath team in the League before they burst through to win a stunning All Ireland). I don't expect Kerry to go all the way this year, but I do hope and expect that they will be knocking on that door.

KERRY HURLERS FIND THEIR GROOVE

MCDONAGH CUP:

KERRY 6-25 MEATH 0-13

After their last couple of games had gone badly awry, Kerry got back on track with a good win over Carlow. Last weekend they were understandably favourites against a struggling Meath, especially in Austin Stack Park, but the 'favourites' tag is weak currency in Kerry hurling after those two defeats against Down. Kerry looked a whole different proposition this time out, though. Meath, respectfully, were poor enough, but Kerry would have beaten better teams with the hurling they produced this time out.

It was all but over after just five minutes. Niall Mulcahy found Shane Conway with a great pass from the start and he neatly drilled it past a hapless Charlie Ennis. Minutes later the former Fitzgibbon star was on the end of a great Kerry move to slot goal number two. Eric Leen sliced through the porous Meath defence and laid off to Colin Walsh for Kerry's third – the game was just five minutes old.

Meath finally got off the mark with a free and added two points from play, but Niall Mulcahy and Colum Harty (2) replied in kind. In fact, Harty was just millimetres away from scoring a fourth Kerry goal. Kerry were totally on top in defence and with the likes of Fionán Mackessy, Gavin Dooley, Eoin Ross (the full back is making a habit of scoring these days!) and Pádraig Boyle finding easy space, Kerry opened up a 3-8 to 0-5 lead. It has to be said that they left a fair few chances behind them as well, with four wides on the trot (on another day that would be fatal) but Mackessy and Boyle finished the half strongly to leave Kerry in front by 3-10 to 0-7.

Further goals from Maurice O'Connor off the bench and a late one from the outstanding Niall Mulcahy served only to emphasize the gulf in class between the teams. Meath look a virtual certainty for a relegation berth. Kerry, remarkably, are now in second place in the table behind red hot favourites Antrim, and will be at home in their next game to Offaly. That one will almost certainly decide which of the two reach the final.

One man who would have loved this display was Teddy Hennessy of the great Ballyduff family. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dílis.

BOXING

KATIE TAYLOR RULES THE WORLD

We all know that words like 'legend' and 'icon' are tossed about far too easily when it comes to sport. As far as I am concerned, you need to be still relevant to conversations about your sport a century from now to achieve that status. When you consider it in those terms, there are very few Irish sports people who qualify. In football, you have Dick Fitzgerald, Larry Stanley, Tommy Murphy, O'Connell, and Seán Purcell. Hurling would have the triumvirate of Ring, Mackey, and Keher, maybe Shefflin or DJ. Lynch and Barry Murphy as dual players. Irish soccer? Roy perhaps in Ireland, but certainly not on the world stage and unfortunately Saipan is likely to be the main feature of that conversation. World Cup winner Jack Charlton certainly, but his Irish adventure would only be a small chapter in that story. Athletics? You can make an argument for Ronnie Delaney, Coghlan, Treacy, Sonia...but in world terms a century from now people will have heard of Usain Bolt and that's about it. Rugby? Jack Kyle, Mike Gibson, Moss Keane, Willie John, Brian O'Driscoll. Paul O'Connell maybe. Golf? McIlroy and Harrington have a chance, and only a chance.

In boxing (which brings me to my laboured point) Gorgeous Gael Jack Doyle, certainly. Jack Dempsey was as much Cherokee as Irish, we have an unfortunate tendency to try and claim people on very thin grounds. Oh, and Katie.

A century from now, when they talk in world terms about womens' boxing, they will most certainly talk about Katie Taylor. Her gold medal in the first Olympics to allow the sport made that pretty likely. Headlining Madison Square Garden, itself an icon of boxing, guarantees it. Womens' boxing needed this one if it was to evolve, and it needed this to be a good fight. It exceeded all hopes

I don't mind admitting that I thought Katie was very much up against it in this one. I hadn't seen much of Amanda Serrano's previous fights, but what I did see had me worried. Katie is very, very strong aerobically, good footwork, and lightning fast hands. What she doesn't have is a knockout punch per se. Serrano does – where Katie gives multiple adder stings, Serrano is a cobra. I felt that if it went the distance, Katie could edge it on points, but given the whirlwind energy they both bring to the ring, I didn't expect it to go the distance. It very nearly didn't!

Katie allowed Serrano to hold the centre of the ring early on, picking her off with quick and accurate shots and neatly dodging Serrano's missiles. Katie was forcing her opponent to move a lot – I wondered if she was planning on tiring her out. In fairness to Serrano, she came fearlessly hunting from the off – there was going to be no shadow-boxing or testing the waters here! Katie was devastatingly accurate, though, and landed some big punches in the second. Even when Serrano did manage to pin her to the ropes in the third, Katie had the strength to hold her off. The Dubliner was well on top at this stage.

The fourth was tougher, though. Serrano was



taking every punch and shrugging them off, boring back in relentlessly, and it began to tell. Katie still won more telling punches in that round, but it was much closer and Serrano was visibly growing in confidence.

The pendulum swung hugely in the fifth. Serrano landed a couple of big ones early on and Katie looked shaken. Once she got pinned to the ropes, it was Serrano who was landing thunderbolts and the champion was in real trouble. Trading punches toe-to-toe is Serrano's preferred style and she kept pressing in close. It took everything Katie had, plus maybe a smidgin of luck, to survive the round. She's tough, though. Katie has outclassed most of her opponents so well (honourable mention to Jonas in particular as an exception) that she has rarely taken this kind of pounding, but she took it and gave back change with the receipt. She was under the same pressure in the sixth, but she had taken the best that Serrano could throw and come through the storm – albeit barely. Certainly she went back to bobbing and weaving rather than slugging it out, and it was more successful – I suspect that her corner had advised her to go back to the original gameplan. The seventh and eighth rounds were a little bit messy, a little slower in tempo (still top quality, though) and more short flurries of action rather than a constant press. Both boxers were obviously feeling it now. Katie had her second wind by the ninth and, something of a trademark of hers, was able to lift it a gear. Serrano was still very dangerous, but again Katie's hand speed and accuracy were telling and she seemed to grow in confidence after landing a couple of big ones early in the round. Serrano was less aggressive now; it was Katie who was doing the hunting. Fair play to Serrano, though, she tried to return everything she got with interest, but Katie's technique was that little fraction better and she was firmly back in the driving seat by the end of the round, albeit without ever looking like forcing a stoppage.

Serrano must have known that she needed a knockout in that tenth and final round, and she went for it. To my surprise, and perhaps a little consternation, Katie met her head-on and they both went looking to finish it early. I was

amazed – Katie must have known that she was ahead on points, and I'd have been telling her to slow it down and to stay far away from that big right hand of Serrano's. I'm not sure that it was the wisest strategy at that point, but it was definitely the most entertaining. This was fantastic boxing, regardless of gender or weight or anything else. This was as good as you could ever see in the ring. It was very close – Serrano might even have shaded the round by a tiny fraction, but that wasn't enough.

One judge had Serrano winning it by two rounds – I wouldn't agree, but it was close enough all through that it wouldn't have been a huge controversy. The other two saw it the same as me, though, and there was a massive roar from the crowd when Katie's hand was raised in victory.

Promoters Eddie Hearn and Jake Paul both spoke of a willingness to set up a rematch (of course they did – the boxing public would flock to it after the quality and excitement of this fight. Paul did try and claim that it was "a draw at best" – the crowd made their feelings known on that bluster very quickly. Interestingly, Hearn immediately mooted Croke Park as a venue, noting that it would be a shame if Katie finished her career (this was her 21st win as a professional) without boxing at home. Given the amount of money and public interest involved, I can't see the GAA authorities who welcomed the likes of Ed Sheeran and the NFL with open arms saying no!

BASKETBALL IMPRESSIVE KERRY SHOWING AT BASKETBALL IRELAND AWARDS

Basketball has a long and proud tradition in basketball since the late forties and early fifties. That fell into brief abeyance for a few years in national terms, but came back with a real bang and the game is now very strong in both clubs and schools throughout the county. Having the likes of legendary NBA skills coach Drew Hanlen visiting St.Pauls in Killarney, arranged by James Weldon, is testament to the ambition and the work being put in on the ground. The Basketball Ireland Awards 2022 reflect that.

Aaron Calixte was practically an automatic selection for the SuperLeague Mens' Player of the Year – no surprise given Tralee Warriors double delivery, with John Dowling the SuperLeague Coach of the Year.

Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra won the Boys A School of the Year, while Gaelcholáiste Chiarraí won the Girls B School of the Year. Tomás Kennedy was a shoe-in for the Boys U16 Player of the Year, while an award that will be extremely popular is the recognition of Sliabh Luachra's Jim Hughes as the Boys School Coach of the Year.

NATIONAL TEAMS

As well as picking up the Boys A schools Player of the Year Award, Tomás Kennedy of Tralee Imperials has been selected on Pat Price's Irish U16 Boys team and he is joined by Joshua Osayanrhion of Tralee Tigers.

SNOOKER

Ronnie O'Sullivan has often been compared to Stephen Hendry, whose seven World titles he matched last weekend by triumphing over Judd Trump. In truth, I think you could make an equal argument that he is more like Alex Higgins or possibly Jimmy White, whereas Hendry bears better comparison to Steve

Davis. Those two were cool and calculating at the table, eschewing risky brilliance for methodical excellence. Ronnie, like Alex and Jimmy, is capable of weighing up a shot and recognising that it's an extreme risk....and then shooting it anyway. And the thing about Ronnie, unlike the other two, is that he almost invariably pots those shots. Judd Trump tried to play it slowly and safely – it was the wrong strategy. You can't play safety against Ronnie, you simply have to focus on building your clearances. If you leave it behind you, chances are that Ronnie is going to pot it. The 1th frame was a very clear example, Trump should have bagged that one but didn't. Ronnie is no stranger to controversy and has dipped into hot water more than once. He was rightly called out for making an obscene gesture after missing a black earlier in this tournament two weeks ago and was again accused by the referee of the same thing in



the eighth frame after failing to get out of a snooker. Ronnie made a robust denial and in fairness, I find it difficult to believe that this obscene gesture was somehow missed by all the tv cameras at the biggest event in snooker, pretty much all of which were focussed on him. That would have thrown an awful of players off their game – snooker is mentally gruelling, with enormous pressure on every shot – but this guy is different gravy. He seemed to thrive on it and he became the oldest player to win a World Championship. I wouldn't bet against him for next year, either.

KILLARNEY CAMOGIE WIN BACK TO BACK DIVISION 1 FÉILE TITLES

Kerry held their county Féile Tournament over the weekend with seven clubs competing across two divisions. Killarney played Tralee Parnells Friday night in their opening game and came away with their first win. On Saturday the final two group stages were played with only one win needed to secure their spot in the Division 1 Final on Monday. First game was against Cillard. Cillard started off the brighter converting a goal and a point in the opening 10 minutes. Killarney composed themselves and chipped away to reduce the deficit. A few positional changes in the second half was the nail in Cillard's coffin when two excellent goals from play saw Killarney take the lead and the game. With enough done to secure one of the final spots, Killarney fielded a younger team against Causeway in the afternoons final game. Another close game with only points separating the two sides at the finish. The final on Monday was a repeat of the 2021 Féile final with Killarney and Causeway headlining. 

HANGING BASKETS

Using containers, pots and baskets full of summer bedding plants can give you brilliant colour from now right through the summer to early autumn.

There are a wide range of different types of hanging baskets but the main thing to go for is the size because the larger the basket, the more compost you can fit into it, giving the flowers more compost to grow in thus prolonging their lives. When filling a hanging basket the first thing to do is to place a liner at the base of the basket. Then place your basket on top of a pot as this will give you a steady base when planting. Half fill the basket with compost and a slow release fertilizer. Then plant some bedding plants at the base and sides of the basket such as trailing lobelia, pansies and nasturium. All you have to do is to push the root of the plant through the square in the basket, push it through the liner and into the compost. Then fill the basket almost to the top with compost, place your remaining plants around your chosen centerpiece plant such as a geranium or fuchsia. Pick three good trailing plants, like trailing petunia, geranium or fuchsia. Fill in between with other bedding plants such as begonias, busy lizzys or pansies. Some of the plants at the bottom of the basket may look a bit shook after planting but when watered in well they will look perfect in a few hours. Don't hang your basket out in its position for a couple of days after planting and water regularly.

Yet, many believe and teach that God makes people sick because He wants them to carry a cross to please Him, or to teach them a lesson. This is simply not true and not Scriptural.

God desires 'above all else' that His children 'prosper (have total peace in every area) and have good health, even as our souls prosper' (3 John 2). The soul area is the place in our innermost being where we process our thoughts, emotions and feelings. It is separate from the spirit, but both spirit and soul are eternal. When a person dies they leave behind their 'earth suit' – the physical body, but their spirit and their soul lives forever. Jesus revealed in John's Gospel that any person who believes in Him – trusting in Him for Salvation, becomes 'born again' (John 3:7-17). This means the person's spirit which became separated from God because of sin, becomes reconnected to His Holy Spirit by simply believing that Jesus, the Son of God, came to this earth as a human being just like you and me – but He never sinned. He then took upon Himself the sins of every person, and paid the price due for those sins which is death (Romans 6:23). God raised Jesus from the dead – Him having overcome sin and death, as a promise and guarantee that He would do the same for everyone who calls upon the Name of Jesus for Salvation.

Everywhere Jesus went people brought the sick, the lame, the tormented, the blind, the deaf – the incurables, even the dead, and He healed them all (Matthew 15:30-31; Luke 7:21-23). Have you ever read the Scriptures dear friend? If you have not already – please buy yourself a Bible or email us and we will send you one – and seek the Truth of God's Word for yourself. All through the accounts of Jesus' ministry, healing is a core principle. Why would Jesus heal all those sick people who came to Him unless it was God's will to heal them? More on this next week...


