

Following medical tests, it was cofirmed that some of the famiily O'Sullivan Family had a genetic condition and were fitted with pacemakers in the following weeks.

The O'Sullivan family are delighted to support the Three Peaks Cycling Challenge which will take place on Saturday, June 14. This year the event is pedalling with a purpose, the proceeds being shared with the Killarney Cardiac Response Unit, who were of great assistance when Seán Óg had a cardiac arrest.

The wonderful residents of Whitebridge Manor, Killarney, together with Heights Hotel, Killarney, have come together to raise funds to install a defibrillator (AED) within their estate, showing true community spirit, following this cardiac emergency.

On the day of the event at Killarney Racecourse, from 12.00 noon until 4.00pm, the Killarney Cardiac Response Unit, will hold demonstrations and give life-saving information on CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation). Learning CPR can make all the difference in an emergency, and the team is keen to share their skills with the public. All are welcome to attend.







The Killarney National Park Education team have once again surpassed and exceeded the Bioblitzs challenge during a very successful Biodiversity Week 2025 in the National Park. The BioBlitz challenge is a friendly competition with 86 other National Park sites across Europe. The aim is to record the highest number of species during Biodiversity week. Killarney National Park came 8th out of 86, with 647 species being recorded throughout the week. Veluwe Natura 2000 site, in the Netherlands came 1st, with 1,627 species. Killarney moved up from 9th place last year (with a total of 514 species) and experienced a huge increase this year in the number of recorders with many members of the

general public getting involved.

During Biodiversity Week - the annual celebration of nature and wildlife. Killarney National Park Education Centre Staff organised a number of nature walks in Derrycunnihy and Ross Island, where people were encouraged to take photos of all manner of flora and fauna using their smartphones and upload to the 'Obsidentify app'. The competition also raises awareness of the amazing number and variety of different species occurring in Killarney National Park. Citizen science projects like Bioblitz greatly assist the Educators and Conservation Rangers who continually monitor and record various species in the Park.

DANIEL O'CONNELL'S BIRTHDAY SPARKS FIREWORKS

What seemed like a straightforward move to mark the birthday of the Kerry born Liberator is causing sparks to fly.

A request, led by John, to name Kerry Airport The Daniel O'Connell International Airport caught the public imagination and there was even a debate on Newstalk. Maurice O'Connell of Lakeview, his great great nephew rowed in behind the suggestion.

The airport considered the request but, alas, turned it down. The Kerry brand - as in the butter - is probably more saleable these days,

I suspect!

Main Street Castleisland has also entered the fray. The Castleisland and District heritage group feel naming the county's widest street after O'Connell would be fitting, given O'Connell's frequent visits to the town. Especially as no other major street in Kerry is named after him.

But that too is meeting resistance.

The killer blow was Justine McCarthy's column in the Irish Times. "Philanderer" Dan was lying in great state in Glasnevin with other relatives, in a revamped tomb, while his poor wife Mary, a third cousin and mother of 12 children was in a neglected plot down in Abbey Island. Dan was a womaniser! And his wife had to have child after child.

Dear, oh dear. A cardinal sin these days.

A debate started online and one entry reminded me of what I heard in a first year sociology lecture in UCC in 1978: O'Connell's emancipation was about making life easier for his own Catholic merchant landowning class. He harnessed the poor masses for the movement, but he did nothing for the poor. This is true. But it is also true he was a man of his time and did his best in an age of discrimination when Britania ruled the waves.

There is an appetite now for dismantling the men of the past, particularly men. And particularly those involved in the slave trade. The great irony is O'Connell was wholly against slavery. I too have mixed views of O'Connell. But surely he was indeed one of our greatest ever historical figures. And can't we celebrate that? We really are becoming an age of the single simplistic storyline when it comes to people and even whole nations now. Something I would never have thought possible in 1978 when there were far fewer people getting to university than now. We might consider ourselves better educated these days, and more international, but we are definitely not broader minded.

KERRY GEMS

The 47th issue of Kerry Gems with three million copies printed since 1989 is out now. Edited by Diarmaid Williams, it has an editorial staff of Kevin Tarrant, Judy Tarrant and Tommy Galvin.

I look forward to it every year as the tourist guide that is also a reference book. I keep a copy handy because if I am stuck for distances between towns in Kerry or want to be reminded which island on Lough Léin is "Cow" and which "Rough", I have it to hand.

This year's map of the treasures of North Kerry is interesting. It is a two page spread from Castlegregory to Scattery Island on the Shannon and taking in Foynes flying boat museum too. I spent a day last summer exploring north Kerry and the map will be useful.

We are reminded that it was at the Marconi station in Ballybunion with its 500 ft tall mast some of the first transatlantic calls were made.

I sometimes feel too much is made of south Kerry and even Killarney and not enough of north Kerry which has a beautiful almost French Norman landscape - if Sinn Féin permit me to mention the Normans! The party is not too keen on them.

St Brendan's Ardfert was for centuries the ecclesiastical capital of Kerry and I learn that in 1580 its friary was used as a barracks by soldiers on

their way to the battle at Dún an Óir in west Kerry. Co-incidentally, last week a motion by Fianna Fáil mayor of Kerry, Cllr Breandán Fitzgerald means the treaty of Dún an Óir is to be specially marked this August. This was the agreement between Spain and Dingle in 1529 giving the beleaguered Catholic Irish special status in the Spanish kingdoms.

We are mature enough now to mark these things, Mayor Breandán said. The Spanish navy is being invited to Dingle Harbour for the celebrations. Another Fitzgerald, Cllr Fionnán Fitzgerald (FF) seconded the motion at the meeting of Castleisland-Corca Dhuibhne. The horrific slaughter of Irish, Spanish and Italians by the English at Dún an Óir led to the replacement of the Hiberno-Norman Fitzgeralds in Tralee by the English Dennys. Sometimes hundreds of years seem like a week ago in Kerry. At any rate, the Fitzgeralds are back in charge!

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
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FARM FAMILIES ACROSS IRELAND are invited to put forward loved one's names to list to be spoken at annual event

KERRY Airport has released the Annual Report & Accounts for the 12-month period ended 31st December 2024 reporting an Operating Profit after Taxation for the period of €1,373,300 as compared to an after-Taxation Operating Profit of €1,198,347 in the previous year.

2024 was another record year for Kerry Airport with 417,409 passengers, the third highest passenger numbers in the airport's history, for the year to the end of December.



The 7th Green Schools Flag for Global Citizenship- Energy was awarded to the Green Schools Committee. This flag application, like others, spans two years and involves revising previous themes and tackling broader environmental concerns like climate change. Green-Schools, a leading education programme, uses this flag to promote sustainability and global awareness in schools.

The Green Schools committee undertook several initiatives over the course of the 2 years. Mary O Sullivan introduced the bottle return scheme to the school. In Transition year Home Economic's class, the students purchased clothes from the Sue Ryder Charity shop and transformed the garments into new, fashionable and wearable items. Green School Ireland visited the school along with a delegation from Kenya. They spoke about the impact of Fast Fashion-how thousands of tonnes of clothing from western countries enters Nairiobi every year. 40% of it is waste and ends up in the Nairiobi dump and also in rivers and lakes.

The Transition Year students also took part in the SEAI Energy workshop and they actively took part in litter picking within the

school grounds and around the town. Geography students took part in the International Globe Air Pollution Experiment. Engineering and Woodwork students undertook various recycling projects. The first Student Photography Competition by Castleisland Museum was won by Ruby Horan for her photo of the Northern Lights. Art students gathered rocks from beaches and painted them with positive Irish sayings. They can now be seen outside the modular classrooms at the back of the school.

The school was selected by the department to participate in a government-funded energy retrofit pathfinder programme. All doors and windows were replaced with an air pump heating system. The school has now achieved an Building Energy Rating (BER) of B.




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

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Make the most of the opportunity to do well in the 2025 State Exams

RELIEF

After a long wait, there is tangible relief that the state exams are finally underway. Like many important milestones, the anticipation is often worse than the event itself. The first morning was the most nerve racking as it involved some formality. However, once the question papers were distributed and the candidates warmed to their task, the tension of the morning quickly evaporated.

COMPULSORY

The exam timetable mainly prioritises compulsory subjects during the early days of the exam. Irrespective of when you are due to finish the exam, keep in mind that you have prepared diligently for the exam. This is what you have been waiting for. Make the most of the opportunity to do well. Reap the rewards of years of study by performing to your optimum ability in each subject.

REVIEW

After three busy days of exams, the coming weekend will bring welcome relief and give candidates a chance to relax a little, to take

stock and plan ahead. Spend as little time as possible on post-mortems. Review your tactical approach over the first week. If you are totally satisfied with your strategy before, during and after each subject then you need change very little. Focus on next week's subjects and forget about the subjects that have already been examined. Your entire concentration must be on the subjects still to be examined.

LEISURE

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries for the second week and to do some subject revision. Take some active leisure to shake off the residual tension of the first week. Avail of a few good nights' rest, which is essential for alertness. Resist the temptation to study late into the night. Confine your study to daylight hours, enjoy your period of exercise and go to bed early. Defer any latenight socialising until your exam is over. Keep your fluid intake high to avoid dehydration but be moderate in your use of artificial stimulants such as tea and coffee. Keep a clear head by abstaining from alcohol during the exam

QUALITY

Concentrate on subjects being examined next week. Prioritise your revision according to the timetable. Go over the tips and predictions that have been made for the subjects you are sitting during week two. Use your study days well and study wisely by not cramming. At this stage the quality of your revision is more important than the length of time you spend at it. On the evening before each paper, spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts are fresh in your mind.

POSITIVE

You are off to a great start after the first week. Maintain your discipline during week two. Keep a good thought for yourself and stay positive. Have confidence in your ability to do well in your second week's papers. You are now well settled in and rising to the challenge. Deal with each subject as it comes and by this time next week it may all be behind you.



Indian meatballs with Tomato Salsa

- ●½ onion, finely chopped
- 1tsp chopped garlic
- •1tsp each of onion granules, ground turmeric, ground curnin, garam masala and ground coriander

- ●1 large onion, diced
- 2 small carrots, peeled and diced
- ●400g can chopped tomatoes

Method

Mix together all the meatball ingredients in a bowl, divide the mixture into 16 pieces and use your hands to form them into meatballs. Chill until needed

Add all the sauce ingredients to a large saucepan, along with 300ml water. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Blend with a stick blender until fairly smooth (or use your food processor and return the sauce to the pan).

Spray a non-stick frying pan with low-calorie cooking spray and put it over a medium heat. Cook the meatballs for 5 minutes or until browned all over. Add them to the pan containing the sauce and simmer for 10 minutes, or until the meatballs are cooked through. Divide everything between 4 plates and serve with the



CHANGE YOUR THOUGHTS -CHANGE YOUR ENERGY

The amount of energy we have in our day depends on many factors how much sleep we've had, the food we eat, movement, relationships etc. However, one of the biggest factors to how alive, motivated and energised we feel are the kind of thoughts that we think and choose to believe.

Most of us think the same thoughts day after day and therefore get the same results. 95% of the time we are on auto pilot (subconscious mind) whereby we are simply repeating patterns, habits and thoughts from the past and unfortunately most of these thoughts are often selflimiting or negative.

Stav awake

The key is to stay conscious and aware of the kind of thoughts you are thinking and consciously choose thoughts that make you feel better. A great exercise is to check in with yourself every few hours and notice your energy and the kind of thoughts or beliefs you have had. What triggers you negatively, where do you lose energy, who or what brings you down? Start to consciously choose thoughts that make you feel better. Dispute any negative thoughts by asking yourself if they are really true. Flip them over and find the most helpful thought you can think and repeat this thought throughout your day.

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It is a great option for people with poor eyesight, allergies to make-up or just unsteady hands. A subtle line can help define your eyes and make lashes appear fuller or a thicker line with a flick adds more drama. Eyes are numbed before the procedure to alleviate pain or discomfort.

Swelling, redness, flaking and



scabbing can occur post-treatment. Water, makeup and sweating around the eyes must be avoided for several days and healing ointment applied. A touch-up is typically needed 4-8 weeks after the initial session, then maintenance every 1-2 years.

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FITNESS TIPS FOR BEGINNERS

Nobody in the gym is judging how much weight you can lift, everyone is too focused on themselves.

If you don't understand something, never be too shy to ask for help.

Results don't happen overnight, take things very slow.

Track your progress, what weights, reps, sets your doing for example.

What you see in the mirror is not what everyone else sees. We are our own worst critics.

You can still make progress without the scales moving. Don't get too hung up about weight.

Focus on correct form. Trying to use heavier weights with poor form will catch up with you in the long term.

What works for one person might not necessarily work for you, Focus on your own path.



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HOW TO TREAT EYE ALLERGIES

Allergic conjunctivitis commonly caused by sensitivity to grass and tree pollen, dust mites or animals. It is far more common in those with a history of allergies or those who have a family history of allergies.

Symptoms

Allergic conjunctivitis usually causes pink or red itchy eyes. The eyes are normally watery and other allergy symptoms such as sneezing and a runny nose may be present.

The seasonal type of allergic conjunctivitis will vary with the time of year and weather conditions. Those with more general allergies, such as an allergy to dust mites, will most likely have symptoms throughout the year.

TREATMENT

You can treat allergic conjunctivitis by:

- · Avoiding the cause of the allergy (if possible)
- Using cold compresses (such as clean cotton wool balls soaked in cold water) to soothe the eyes

Avoiding rubbing your eyes as this will make the symptoms worse

There is also a range of medicines that may help. Some are available over the counter at the pharmacy and other stronger medicines need a prescription.

Mast-cell stabiliser eye drops

such as sodium cromoglicate (Opticrom) do not work straight away. Instead, they take a few days to start to work. These drops are good if you know when you are likely to develop an allergy and so you can use them to prevent symptoms

Antihistamine eve drops such as antazoline sulphate (Otrivine-Antistin) provide a more immediate effect. They won't prevent an allergic reaction, but instead treat the symptoms once the allergy has started.

Antihistamine tablets work in the same way as the eye drops, but will also treat other allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and sneezing that is caused by the allergy.

You should not wear contact lenses if your symptoms are severe or if you have been told that your cornea is affected. Do not put drops in your eyes while wearing contact lenses.

Remember:

- Avoid rubbing your eyes, as this may make your symptoms worse
- Use a cold compress to soothe your eyes
- Wearing glasses or sunglasses may help to shield your eyes from pollen

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Kelly calls for European energy independence in wake of Russian gas phase-out

MEP for Ireland South, Seán Kelly, has called for the European Union to go beyond the planned phase-out of Russian gas imports by 2027 and set a more ambitious goal: full energy independence.

Speaking in the European Parliament recently, MEP Kelly warned that Europe's current status as a price-taker on global gas markets undermines its competitiveness and strategic autonomy.

"The past few years have exposed just how vulnerable Europe becomes when it fully dependent on imports, particularly autocratic regimes, for something as fundamental as energy," Kelly said.

"We were warned about Nord Stream and Russian dependency for years. It took a brutal war on European soil for the penny to drop."

The European Commission's recent roadmap to eliminate Russian fossil fuel imports by 2027 has been welcomed by MEPs across the political spectrum, but MEP Kelly believes this alone is not enough to secure Europe's longterm energy future.

"This isn't just about Russia. It is about sovereignty. Europe doesn't control the price of gas, yet gas still dictates the price of electricity and is a core input to our industrial economy. That's a strategic vulnerability. We must become masters of our own energy and competitiveness."

The MEP pointed to renewable energy as the only viable route to true energy independence for the EU.

"Accelerating renewable energy can deliver independence. Wind, solar and other clean sources are home-grown, stable in price, and free from geopolitical manipulation. They give investors certainty, citizens lower bills, and governments security of supply. Europe needs to double down, not just on phasing out Russian energy, but on phasing out dependence itself." "Let's aim higher. Let's set a clear ambition: a Union that no longer relies on imported energy, and no longer lets the global gas market dictate its economic competitiveness."



Kelly concluded by urging fellow MEPs and EU institutions to take seriously the lessons of the last three and a half years.

"If we fail to act now, and if we don't learn from the chaos we've just endured, we will be doomed to repeat the same mistakes. Energy sovereignty must be at the heart of Europe's future"

Minister Foley welcomes confirmation of over €2.1 million in community recognition grants for groups in Kerry

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of over €2.1 million in community recognition grants for groups in Kerry.

The Community Recognition Fund was first introduced in 2023 to recognise the huge efforts made by communities in welcoming and supporting people coming to Ireland.

There are 23 projects in Kerry that will receive funding worth over €2.1 million.

This includes €500,000 for internal finishes in the Dereen Sports Complex in Killarney, €95,000 for upgrades to equipment in Tralee Harriers Athletic Club, €150,000 for Kerry Mountain Rescue, over €62,000 for Rugbaí Chorca Dhuibhne, €59,000 for a community playground at Caherleaheen national school and €50,000 for the renovation of a café at Blennerville Windmill.

Minister Foley said: "These grants are an official acknowledgment of the warm welcome that communities across Kerry have provided to people coming to Ireland from Ukraine and other countries. I am pleased to see that the latest tranche of Community Recognition grants will fund equipment, sports and community facilities throughout Kerry.

This is a very significant funding announcement by Government for Kerry. By investing in facilities and organisations that facilitate integration and community participation, we are building stronger communities"

Kerry groups and organisations previously received over €1.7 million in funding in the last round of the community recognition grants earlier this year.

Cashless Paywalls

The continued practices of showing our own native sports on Streaming services and the refusal of cash at the venue turnstiles, is a cause of huge frustration for many of our population, including our senior citizens, according to Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People, Michael Cahill.

"I feel that this action is discriminatory towards those amongst us who are not au fait with computerisation, bank cards etc. I believe strongly that our sports bodies and our broadcasters must make a better effort at including our senior citizenry and anyone not fully up to speed with Paywalls and Bank Cards" stated Deputy Cahill.

"The Group 2, Round 2 All-Ireland Championship football match between Cork and Kerry, will not be shown live on TV and cash will not be accepted at the turnstiles. This, I believe denies access to our native games, to a significant and highly respected percentage of our people. Sporting bodies not alone receive funding from attendances at fixtures and from broadcasts, but they also depend on Government and EU financial support. They must, I believe accept the responsibility to provide access for all and not put large sections of our population at a disadvantage, when it comes to viewing our National Games" said the Kerry Teachta Dála.

"Equality of access to our National Games must be provided for everyone" added Michael Cahill TD





KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

with the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.




This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.


This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.







Daniel Okwute and Alex Dunne were back in for selection as Daniel's one-game suspension had been served and Dunne was fit enough to feature after a slight injury. Kerry FC were as ready as they could be for the game, besides the obvious injury of Ryan Kelliher, who will be kept on the sidelines for some time FIRST HALF



KERRY 1-28 CORK 0-20

It was a tricky one to judge. On their last meeting I honestly thought Kerry would win with a bit to spare and without having to show their full hand. Except that Cork were magnificent and Kerry had to go very deep into the well to come out of it. Good. I firmly believe that Cork football being strong can only help Kerry in the long term and I do feel that we came along a little bit too soft a road last year. It wasn't what caught us (missed two goal chances, coughed up a soft one, and ran out of stamina) but it didn't help either.

Except that after that thrilling battle against us, Cork then put up a fairly dismal showing and lost to Meath. I think it's pretty clear that we all under-estimated Meath at the start of this year – to be honest, I was at least a decade overestimating them after Seán Boylan left, and you can only do that for so long. Look, good for the Royals, but Cork didn't show half the battle that they gave Kerry. So which Cork was going to show up this time?

Kerry started against the strong wind and, quite rightly, used a very slow, very careful build-up before Paul Geaney neatly picked off the opening score. A foul on Maurice Shanley – Cork's runners from the back posed problems for us last time out – saw Mark Cronin slot a free in reply. A foul on Paul Geaney saw David Clifford open his account.

Then came a Cork disaster. Micheál Aodh Martin tried for a short kick-out. David promptly snapped it up on the intercept and straight in – he doesn't miss from there. Goal for Kerry, and an awful one from Cork's perspective. I'm not knocking Martin, a great servant to Cork, and that was his only mistake all day, but underdogs aren't going to survive by giving one like that away.

Joe O'Connor was beginning to stamp his class around the middle but Cork took the next score, Seán Walsh laying off to Paul Walsh for an excellent point. I was impressed with both of them.

David Clifford smoothly clipped over another point. Joe O'Connor made another great catch and a subsequent foul on a lively Micheál Burns saw David made it 1-4 to 0-2. Kerry looked well in control here.

And then they didn't. Cork began finding the wings on the kick-outs and winning more of the breaks. Brian Hurley with a free – Brian was Cork's best forward for a decade, but I don't think he was fully up to speed after his injury lay-off. Well marked too, mind you. Paul Walsh



with a superb two-pointer.

Shane Ryan with a short kick-out. Last year short kick-outs were de rigeur. In the new game, with three forwards up, they are far more risky. Chris Óg Jones intercepted, sliced in, and thankfully Shane stood up well to block his goalbound effort. A let-off, even though Brian Hurley did pop over the rebound. Cork turned over the kick-out and came again; once more Shane came to our rescue with a great save to deny Mattie Taylor. Cork were well on top now, no denying it. Cork had two goes at twopointers, clearly a planned strategy - I didn't think either was the right option. Three scores (1tp) from seven attacks on the trot, including two great goal chances. Thin enough reward. Mind you, Kerry had lost Barry Dan O'Sullivan by that stage and both Paudie Clifford and Paul Geaney appeared to be struggling.

Seán O'Shea sent over a very difficult free from a tight angle. There was some debate about whether it did actually go between the posts – ah, lads, ye are hard up for conversation if ye are trying to make a controversy over that one! Colm O'Callaghan, another Cork player to stand out, notched a point and Chris Óg Jones fitsted over another one after a great burst of pace after a Paul Walsh turnover. Level pegging, 0-8 to 1-5.

Kerry raced in and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch look for the goal – plenty of power but no great finesse in the shot and Martin saved well.

Brian Hurley (f) and Paudie Clifford traded scores. Mattie Taylor had another chance at a goal but hesitated on the shot and Kerry got back in time, albeit at the cost of another handy free for Brian Hurley. but Paul Geaney replied. He was definitely hobbling now, though. This isn't good. Three players lost to injury in the first half? And with the crowded schedule (still very much over-crowded), injuries are hugely costly nowadays.

Cork finished the half very strong, Colm O'Callaghan with another great score and then Brian Hurley nailed a brilliant two-pointer. Ouch.

There was a bit of a mess as the players trooped off for half-time. Now, to read some reports, people were scandalised. Women fearful (you know damn all about Cork or Kerry women, they'd be more likely to jump into it), babies crying, men straining at the leash. Jaysus. It was more shaping than shifting, a lot of face-offs and jersey tugging, but no actual punches. I'm not condoning it, not at all. Lose a player to a red, with the injuries we have anyway, and we'd be struggling against Meat. Lose that and we are in a guarter-fiaal and there are going to be some very big dogs in that yard. So like I say, it wasn't a smart move on either side (I have no idea what started it and I don't particularly care) but it isn't any headline story either.

Sure enough, Joe gets a ten minute break for his troubles, and Joe has been David's only rival as our best player in the first half. We have no Diarmuid O'Connor, no Barry Dan O'Sullivan, and now no Joe O'Connor for a while.

Three points down. We could bring on Seán O'Brien. We could move Mike Breen out and bring on Tadhg Morley. We could try Graham O'Sullivan in midfield; he's basically playing as a third one anyway. Or we could bring out Seán O'Shea, which is what Jack O'Connor opts to do. I'm not really worried as such just yet – I just haven't felt any sense of jeopardy about our group – but I'm getting there.

Mark Cronin opened the second half with a handy free. 0-14 to 1-7. But David Clifford responded with the kind of two-pointer that only maybe eight players in the country could have kicked. Seán O'Shea added a two point free. I'm rapidly realising by now that I hadn't given enough respect to the strength of that wind in the first half.

Kilian Spillane came on for Paul Geaney at the break and there was a reason he was the replacement. Two of the subs were simply superb for Kerry. Killian took a lovely point himself but much more important was his movement. He was giving players outside a fantastic option and it was giving Kerry real depth and width. In the middle, Mark O'Shea took a little time to find his feet in that tough first half after he came on, but he was becoming more imperious with every passing minute. Graham O'Sullivan, who had worked hard in the first half but a lot of it was unglamorous tracking and support play, was really standing up in the trenches.I'm not gone on auxiliary wing forwards, but certainly we need him there to bolster midfield and he's producing the goods.

Kerry gave away 50m for impeding a player. There was general agreement among managers and pundits alike afterwards that the option of conceding two points is too big a punishment. I may be a lone voice, but I don't care. The penalty has to be at least commensurate with the crime. Otherwise, committing the infringement is hugely beneficial for a team; it slows up the opposition attack and allows for a blanket defence to be set up. God, I saw far too much of it in the past couple of years and of course teams were doing it deliberately. I would, I can't imagine who wouldn't? The worst example of it that I saw was actually the Ladies All Ireland Final between Kerry and Dublin. I'm not begrudging Dublin their win -Jennifer Dunne was spectacular that year – but they choked Kerry's momentum by disputing every free. So no, I want the punishment to be severe, to really cost teams if they try it. As for 'accidental'? I'll allow for it in a Primary School playground, but elite players? Give over.

Killian with a second point. Kerry got a free that was brought forward for dissent and David opted for the two pointer. Seán O'Shea with an even better two point free, real quality. If he was born over the border, Cork would be a far more potent team; that kind of threat is all they are really lacking. Seán slotted a free well run by Joe O'Connor on the burst. Another Cork delay of a Kerry free-kick, and up stepped Seán O'Shea again for the two pointer. 1-21 to 0-16, and Kerry with nine unanswered points on the

Chris Óg Jones (f) and Ruairí Deane pointed for Cork. By rights they still had plenty to play for, having opened up goal chances and with two pointers capable of eating into a big lead at speed, but it never looked like they had the belief or conviction.

Graham O'Sullivan won a free for Seán O'Shea and then fisted over himself after David passed off to him. On another day he might have thought about the goal, but there was no need

One last bit of real drama as Colm O'Callaghan was fouled in the box. A few Kerry supporters will argue that it wasn't a foul....just stop, lads, alright? Clear penalty, and we all know it. Mark Cronin stepped up, placed it low into the left corner....but it kind of summed up Cork's day when he failed to put enough power on it and Shane Ryan dived to save. Cork gathered the rebound, but Brian Ó Beaglaíoch smothered the shot with a textbook block. That should be used in training videos.

Mike Breen got down to block a raiding Brian O'Driscoll.Mark Cronin did have one last point for Cork, but it was moot by then and sandwiched anyway by elegant two pointers from Tony Brosnan and Tom O'Sullivan. Dylan

They actually hit 1-4 on the trot, but man of the match Dennehy settled things down with a St. Kierans' goal. John Kelliher replied in kind and Callum Cronin neatly slotted a penalty before the finish.

St. Kierans versus Austin Stacks. A repeat of last year's County Minor Final. I'd say a lot of people remember the ending to that one, with St. Kierans snatching it in dramatic fashion as Austin Stacks' 64th minute goal was disallowed. You'd fancy Stacks' here, simply because they have a very strong underage record and an awful lot of players from last year's winning squad. But St.Kierans have steel and obviously one player in particular looks like one of Kerry's most exciting prospects. I'll be looking forward to this one.

Kerry faced off against a Carlow side who had run them to within a point in the National League, and I'll admit that I was a little bit worried coming into the game. Kerry hadn't played a competitive match since the National League, and a bit of momentum would be required; you won't beat the likes of Carlow from a standing start. Moreover, Kerry would be facing a very strong breeze in Austin Stack Park for the first half. I was certainly a bit apprehensive - which will tell you more about my judgement than Kerry's quality.

Kerry were absolutely imperious here. Sharp in the tackle, working non-stop, controlling the sliotar with their first touch and, by far the most important thing, taking some really superb scores. They have really put a lot of work in, and it showed.

Patrice Diggin had Kerry on the scoreboard straightaway with a long free straight over the crossbar in the teeth of that wind. In fairness, Carlow almost struck back straight away, Caoimhe Jordan going on a great run and unleashing a dangerous shot, but Niamh Leen read it superbly and cleared it off the goal-line. Carlow had to content themselves with a'45 converted by Eleanor Treacy.

Then Kerry went to work. Amy O'Sullivan made an absolutely wonderful catch and smoothly popped it over the crossbar. Shortly after she hit a rocket towards goal – Catherone Kavanagh made a great save but Kathryn Ryan nipped in to tap the rebound over - a little bit of luck might have seen it end up in the net. No matter; Kerry were building a head of steam here. It wasn't that Carlow weren't winning possession. It was just that Kerry's defence, marshalled superbly by the outstanding Niamh Leen, weren't letting them do anything with A superb turnover by Patrice Diggin saw Amy O'Sullivan clip over again and she soon added another.

Kate Lynch scored a beauty. Ellen O'Donoghue sent a beautiful ball into the danger-zone, but it just dropped a foot too close to the alert keeper before Amy O'Sullivan could get there.

No matter. A Kerry goal looked inevitable at this stage and it duly arrived as the helpless keeper couldn't quite hold onto a long ball down on the square and in nipped Amy O'Sullivan to deftly poke home. 1-6 to 0-1. Kate Lynch took a second majestic point. Patrice Diggin drew a good save out of Caoimhe Kavanagh but Amy O'Sullivan was on the prowl now and soon darted in again for goal number two. Ruth O'Connor added a point and, although Eleanor Treacy did close out the first half with a Carlow free, at 2-8 to 0-2 their prospects looked fairly bleak.

In fact Carlow did come out fighting. Aimee Nolan ran directly at Kerry but just couldn't get power into the shot and Aoife Fitzgerald turned it away safely. The resultant '45 was dropped in, and corner forward Eibhe Lawler latched onto it, but again Aoife Fitzgerald was able to parry and Ruth O'Connor carried it clear. It's fair to say that Carlow dominated the first ten minutes of the half, showing admirable resilience in the circumstances – but ultimately, it either goes on the scoreboard or it doesn't count. Mind you, Kerry had three wides on the trot themselves as they adjusted to that wind (they only had two wides in the entire first half) but normal service was soon restored. Patrice Diggin notched another long free and quickly added a point from play. Good work by Amy O'Sullivan set up Shannon Collins. Patrice had another free before sub Amy McCarthy scored with practically her first touch. Patrice Diggin and Kate Lynch made it 2-15 to 0-2. Emma Conway became the second sub to score on her introduction. Eleanor Treacy did point one last free for theu fortunate Carlow - it should be pointed out that they were missing some key players – but Kate Lynch and Patrice Diggin wrapped up a very comfortale win in the finish. On a personal note, it's brilliant to see no less than seven girls from the East Kerry are on the panel, Kate Lynch (Clanmaurice), Kathryn Ryan, Hannah Ryan, Áine Devlin, Tiarna Dineen, Chloe McCarthy (all Killarney), and Siobhán O'Mahony (Sliabh Luachra), with Kate and Kathryn playing superbly.

A marker laid down? Too early to tell. But this

was certainly excellent stuff by Kerry and that scoring difference could well prove very important later on. It's not quite 'leath na hoibre' but it's definitely a tosach maith, gan amhras! Next up is a trip to Down next, and that one will tell a lot more.

I don't believe that it would be appropriate for me to discuss that in a sports column. That's not a sports story; that's something much worse. My deepest sympathies and my best wishes to all involved; I have no further comment on the matter.

My Thoughts on the Premiership Season

I only dabbled in it. The Premiership – though it didn't go by that name back then – was a big part of the conversations in my teen years. I only ever attended about five actual matches, one of them on a school tour and two of them were stag parties – however much we may like to criticise Ryanair, often with justification, the cost of flights prior to their market explosion was prohibitive, to say the least.

It wasn't even that we could watch a lot of the games. I wasn't of the generation for whom the FA Cup was the huge highlight, pretty much the only game broadcast live. But we didn't have much either. And let me point out that where a lot of Ireland had access to British TV channels, Kerry didn't. They had gloriously mad stuff like Eastenders, whatever that was. We had Glenroe. I mean, I genuinely remembering discussing whether Biddy and Miley would ever get it together. Secretly, we thought she could do better for herself, could you imagine having Dinny for a father-in-law? Meanwhile, the whole world was agog about who shot J.R. Ewing? As for his brother Bobby's dream? J.R. was a rogue, no question about that, but Bobby was some gobdaw. Frankly, some-one should have shot him. Don't even get me started on Miami Vice. I mean, we had Bosco and wanderly Wagon. Judge the puppet dog taught a lot of us how to cross the road safely. Let's just think about that for a minute.

For those of a younger generation, this stuff actually happened. This is long before the internet and social media. Trust me, it's not even worth googling.

Sports stars were known by everybody, but not necessarily celebrities. The most famous sports star of them all was Shergar, unfortunately. Pat Spillane being on the international tv show 'Superstars' and acquitting himself well was incredibly exotic.

English soccer was a sort of a conversation substitute. Every kid was expected by their peers to follow an English team (no, the cold truth is that the unmarketed and FAI-neglected League of Ireland was for hard core fanatics only) and to know the big names. Rush, Souness, Shilton (Pat Jennings, obviously, was miles better, and so was Neville Southall), Brady (Liam Brady was a really excellent players, but like Paul Scholes, the myth has grown far beyond the actual abilities of the players), young guns like Tony Cottee (the first million pound player; it seemed to weigh him down), Lineker (like Rush, he did nothing special, but he was really good at doing it often), the sensational Paul Gascoigne (incredibly brilliant but flash, we don't know his vulnerabilities but we knew he could twist the likes of Souness sideways, but never dominate their dour certainty).....lads, we were judgemental little divils. We had a certain adorable confidence of youth. We all knew Ajax, for example, but I'm pretty sure at least 60% of us, including me, thought it was in South America.

Some lads were allowed to stay up late to watch 'Match of the Day'. I hated them. I'd tried to pretend that I'd seen it. Some chance – my parents wouldn't let me go to 'Raiders of the Lost Ark' in case it frightened me. Of course it would have – but I would have been a god in primary school for at least a month. Well worth it

Back then knowing this kind of thing, and being generally in accordance with your peers while able to defend 'your' team in banter were vital social skills. I don't know did the arrival of Sky Sports and the hype break a kind of illusion. An rud is annamh is iontach – what happens if it's no longer 'annamh'? More likely, I was just growing up and my days were filling up with more immediate tasks. With so many games on, and at inconvenient times (I've made no secret that gaelic football and local live games are my first preference) it just no longer held my attention. And the truth is that all of my generation (and at least two generations before us) knew without being able to directly prove the problems with the FAI long before they went on the public record. FIFA wasn't much better - it turned out to be an awful lot worse. Certainly in the last couple of years too many tournaments have been devalued by inclusion of more (i.e. not as good standard) teams. Middle Eastern oil money has harmed soccer's standing an awful lot. I'm sure Roman Abramovich wasn't the first billionaire to buy a soccer club as a status symbol, but it felt like it. The single most popular debate in soccer punditry is whether Lionel Messi or Cristiano Ronaldo is better. The actual answer is that they ceased being players and just turned into brands long ago, and branding vastly supersedes actual ability in a media-saturated market. That Ronaldo got a transfer, the rules having been blatantly changed to suit Gianni Infantiino's sad attempt at gobbling up the revenue from club football.....I'm not surprised by Infantino, but I am genuinely disappointed in Ronaldo. There is a point where you are just selling off your own self-esteem. And anyone who thinks that AI, the ability to lie even more convincingly in online marketing, will actual improve matters.....I wish you joy of that. I'll grant that we were a lot more innocent and naive as kids (and society back then turned a blind eye to awful things that should have been dealt with, let us not forget that reality either) but I genuinely think that we were better off. We believed in magic, not product placement. Anyway, humble apologies for that rant out of nowhere. Ye are actually getting off very lightly. I almost started talking about 'Sports Stadium' on Saturdays, shortly after the childrens programme 'Anything Goes' . Presenter Mary Fitzgerald, 'Mary Make-And-Do' was far superior but a lot less dramatic than MacGyver. We learned from her that flour and water make a decent glue - I think my parents would have shot her if they got the chance.

All of that was actually meant to be a very short introduction, about two sentences, leading into a quick glance at how each team got on in this year's Premiership season. That was meant to be the meat of this piece. Instead ye are getting one sentence per team, in reverse order, and sure, that's plenty.

Southampton

like a lot of teams, came straight up to go back down. There's such a huge financial disparity between premiership and championship. I have nothing but sympathy. It's pitchforks v tanks in military terms.

Ipswich

Back to back promotions, but again their fate was sealed from early on. Did their best but it was never happening. Liam Delap was definitely a huge shining light, and he'll be playing at the top level somewhere again next year.

Leicester

Leicester lost their six opening games. Lost nine games in a row without scoring. Three came up, and the same three go back down. Why Ruud Van Nistlerooy agreed to become manager amazes me. I know the Premiership is a separate entity to the actual league premiership pundits decrying the idea of a European Superleague might want to examine why the Premiership was formed at the start of the nineties. Here's a hint; 2% of Premiership earnings trickles down to lower leagues.

Tottenham Hotspur

You finished 17th in the league and you are finishing the season with an open top parade? 17Th? I know. Winning the Europa Cup after 17 trophyless seasons, and beating Man United to do it.....but 17th? No. That's the most Spursy thing I have ever heard of. I like Ange Postecoglou, but 22 defeats on our way to 17th place? And they are playing in the Champions' League next year? Stop. I feel dizzy just looking at the reality of this. Right now we have o idea what next year's manager or a lot of his team will be. 17th is bad. Strangely, I feel they could actually do okay in the Champions' League, quite capable of a quarter-final spot. But the league is the yardstick and I don't see any quick

turnaround there.

Wolverhampton

Gary O'Neill did brilliantly in his time with them, but the wheels had come way off the wagon by Christmas. I thought that they would be very lucky to survive. In the end they had a bit to spare, but I repeat, the three promoted teams just had a harder climb. Are Wolves on the road back? This ain't no Game of Thrones episode. Frankly, without the absolutely stunning Matheus Cunha (Man United? Seriously? Without Champions League? They must be paying a bucketload for a rising star to go there) I suspect that next season will be at least as hard.

Manchester United

Many many years ago, long before you were born, my child, they strode the world like giants, flame and fury in their eyes.....nowadays you would swat them with a rolled up newspaper. Zero confidence, dropping market share, staff cutbacks....the fact that they lost to the ASEAN All Stars in Malaysia isn't the interesting part of the story. The fact that the media are pouncing on it with hubristic glee, as with the vitriol poured at the likes of Meghan Markle, is more significant. There's a certain element of schadenfreude about it. Amorim and his players are being held to a standard they didn't set, and with Champions' League allure, the road is only getting tougher.

West Ham United

They shouldn't have sacked David Moyes and it cost them. A change of manager saw them climb the table but they have a lot of work to do. Mid table is the extent of their ambitions, and rightly so.

Everton

For most of my life, Everton were 'the other Liverpool team'. We didn't perceive them as 'scouse' any more than you would consider 'D4' to be 'Jackeen'. They had a really awful season. And back came a prodigal son, David Moyes, riding to the rescue. I felt saddened by it. I like David Moyes; he always struck me as a decent man. But this return would obviously only tarnish the memory of his glory days with the club. Except.....nine games. Four wins, five draws. A win in the final game at Goodison Park. I'm telling ye, Man United refused to really buckle in for the man who took over after Alex Ferguson. If they had, they might be in a better place themselves. Everton still have plenty of work to do. They have been flirting with trouble for a few years now. There's only so often you can roll those particular dice.

Crystal Palace

In Premiership terms you'd consider them minnows (you are still talking billionaire money, just to keep it in perspective) and for me, they are one of the happy endings. The FA Cup is a trinket for the really big boys, but for Palace, winning that trophy makes this a season that will shine in their memories and be passed from generation to generation. In more

practical terms, it gives them European football next season, and that will attract top level players, sponsorship, and revenue. Good for them. Again, Eze has to be an absolute shoe-in on anybody's Team of the Year.

Fulham

This year, they have always been solid, not spectacular. They never really looked like contenders but nor did they ever look like getting relegated. Not generating headlines is often a good thing. It's like a sticky defender. If neither they nor their opponent are mentioned in commentary, then they have done a great job.

Brentford

They were almost the opposite to Fulham. I still believe, with no disrespect to Brentford, if you asked a lot of people to list all twenty teams this season, Brentford is the one that most of them would struggle to remember. And yet, their season has been one of the most thrilling of them all. I must admit I never caught the sense of drama in the overall context, but for Brentford supporters, this year? Brentford had one of the worst defences....but also one of the best attacks. They do say that managers love order but supporters love chaos. In the end Brentford finished 10th and deserved it. They were in contention for Europe for quite a while. They would probably be advised to be more pragmatic next season....but I hope they don't.

Bournemouth

I'd say well happy with themselves. They certainly should be. Narrowly missed out on European football next year but they rattled a lot of more prestigious cages on their way to their highest number of league points. A club on the rise.

Brighton and Hove Albion

A hard one to judge. Eighth place is quite good compared to expectations, but they seemed to beat all the big guns and then inexplicably drop points that should have been in the bag. If they can hold onto their better players and develop a bit more consistency, they could go higher next year, but I suspect that they are at their peak or very close to it already.

Nottingham Forest

I think we all knew that they would be decent, but I for one never expected them to be up among the top contenders for most of the season. They were relegation contenders for the last couple of years but the opposite this year. They seemed to run out of steam late on, but they will play in next year's Conference League, a return to European football after three decades.

Aston Villa

No tangible reward, but one of the teams of the season. Unai Emery has fashioned an old school but brilliant football team. Superbly durable and consistent, hard-working, tough out. I like them. They beat Bayern Munich and Paris St. Germain and reached a Champion's League quarter-final.

Newcastle United

They are the Mayo of the Premiership. They never quite win tangible things, but they are always contenders and they have the most loyal supporters in England (one can argue that because of the Geordie accent, they can only communicate properly with each other, but let's not be churlish). Fifth place and a berth in next year's Champions League would have been a great season anyway. But winning the Carabao Cup after a trophy drought of seventy years? Glorious bedlam. Look, it's the Carabao Cup – clubs with better histories would hardly put it on their roll of honour. But it's silverware and what's more, it doesn't look like there will be a seventy year wait for the next trophy.

Chelsea

In the past five years Chelsea were spending with abandon and seemed to be making a bit of a fool of themselves. Eight year playing contracts, that kind of nonsense. But this year Maresca had them looking more settled and more assured. Unlike Newcastle, winning the Conference League wouldn't count for me as a major achievement – it would be a little bit like Shamrock Rovers winning the Leinster Senior Cup. They were right up there for most of the season but looked like slipping out in the last couple of games. Fourth place is a fair reflection, puts them in the Champions' League on merit (yes, Spurs, that was a dig), and gives them a stepping stone. They could be on the rise.

Manchester City

Pep Guardiola has never finished below third in his managerial career. Now, he has only ever managed at the very top clubs. Manchester City....well, I'm just going to say it. Those 115 charges. We all know that nothing is going to happen there. Possibly a token fine at most – and every fine is 'token' with that kind of wealth. I don't like sportswashing to cover up human rights abuses (once again, the name to look up is Jamal Khashoggi). Most people think that Man City let themselves down badly by finishing third, considering the amount of money they have spent. I think they let themselves down, very badly, long before that, and off the pitch rather than on it.

Arsenal

Runners-up and a Champions League semi-final. This is a highly competitive multi-billion pound league and that's a great year for any team. Yes, it's their third year in a row finishing runners-up. But the very weird narrative out there that Arsenal are under-performing and always the bridesmaid, never the bride.... people, ye know that I've spent plenty of time spoofing myself, but that kind of nonsense? I respect myself and my readers (my thanks to both of you) too much. Sport, amateur and professional, is simply not always about being the best. It's about being the best that you can be. Kudos to Arsenal, they did that.

Like Manchester United in a former incarnation, you can love or hate them but you can't ignore them. The most iconic song, the boot room, the Kop named after one of the last battles of a fading empire, the tragedies, the culture (it's been called the real capital of Ireland, while scouse is a dialect named after a Scottish stew). They were brilliant. I'm not a Liverpool supporter, but if you come across a team of the season that doesn't include Van Dijk and Mo Salah, somebody's mocking you. Arne Slot stepped seamlessly into Jurgen Klopp's shoes. They just got virtually everything right and had

the title sewn up long before the finish.

Champions League Final

Sorry, now, but I just couldn't get into it. The competition is just way too drawn out and PSG, in particular, always feel souless to me. They don't reflect Parisian culture. But this? I'd have been drawn to a contest – there's no arguing the brilliant quality of some of the players in the Champions League – but 5-0? 2-0 after twenty minutes? No. This isn't a contest. This is a financial procession.





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

TREES FOR SMALL **GARDENS**

There are a lot of trees suitable for smaller gardens and they come in all shapes and sizes, evergreen or deciduous.

There are a lot of things to consider when choosing a tree for a limited space, the most important being the eventual height and spread fo the tree.

Some ornamental small trees can still reach a height of 20/25 feet

Sometimes even these small trees can be too big for a small garden but there is still a lot of choice

Examples would be a weeping tree which never gets too tall and is very easy to prune back if need be. On the other hand you can choose a tree that is columnar in shape and it won't spread out too much. There is also the option of standard trees. These trees are usually about 3ft to 4ft in height and grow from the top to ground level, staying at the height you plant them at.

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"He did not retaliate when He was insulted, nor threaten revenge when He suffered. He left His case in the hands of God, Who always judges fairly" (1st Peter 2:23).
