

## KILLARNEY SAYS FAREWELL TO PAUDIE

There was a palpable sense of grief throughout the town of Killarney this week following the untimely death of popular local Garda Paudie Twohig, just five days after the birth of his second daughter Olivia Hope.

Paudie and his wife Garda Diane Collins received his shock cancer diagnosis just five months ago. Hours before Paudie passed away on Sunday, he and his devoted wife Diana renewed their wedding vows at Cork University Hospital.

As a mark of respect to the Garda who was much loved in Killarney, 200 members of An Garda Siochana lined New Road on Tuesday as his remains were taken through the streets of Killarney, where locals lined the streets in a tribute to the popular guard.

At his Requiem Mass in St. John the Baptist Church, Ballinagree, Co. Cork, where Paudie was baptised, made his First Holy Communion and his Confirmation, Killarney Parish Priest, Fr. Kieran O'Brien told the congregation that Paudie and Diane had three goals to reach following his diagnosis. He wanted to reach his 44th Birthday, he wanted to see Tara Grace turning two and he wanted to be there for the birth of Olivia Hope. Paudie achieved all three, passing away a mere five days after her birth.

Among the tributes brought to the altar to represent Paudie's life were a Whispa Bar brought by his great friend Colm Foley and a deck of cards by another great friend Andrew Joy.

Leading the tributes to Paudie, Flor Murphy, Superintendent at Killarney Garda Station said, Garda Paudie Twohig was first and foremost a gentleman who always had a smile on his face. He loved Killarney and the people of Killarney and his open and friendly manner endeared him to so many. I hope it is of some comfort to his wife Diane their two children, Tara Grace and Olivia, and his parents and family that Garda Paudie Twohig of Ballinagree, Co. Cork made such a positive impression on the people of Killarney. May he rest in peace.



## **FAMILY DELIGHT** AS DAVID ACHIEVES TOP 30 FINISH IN TOKYO

here were scenes of jubliation in Firies yesterday morning as Olympic Race Walker David Kenny crossed the line in 29th place in the 20km walk at the Tokyo games.

David's family, his mother Mary, father Noel, sisters Sarah, Rebecca and Laura were joined by close family members at the family home to cheer him on as he took part in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. "We are so proud of David", his sister Sarah told Killarney Outlook. "He has worked so hard to achieve an amazing top 30 place", she added David finished 29th having been ranked 57th going into the games.

His race got underway in extremely hot conditions and he put in an excellent performance in his first Olympic Games to finish 29th in a time of 1:26:54. Coached by Ireland's Race-Walking Olympic Bronze medallist, Robert Heffernan, Kenny had previously picked up silver at last month's European U23s, so had confidence on his side going in. He made steady progress throughout the first half of the race, sitting in the mid-30 placings throughout, before moving to 32nd at 10km. He continued to pick off those ahead of him over the next 5km, before breaking into the top thirty with just 2km to go, to cross the line in 29th. Ranked 56th going into the race, 22-year-old Kenny's performance showed both his talent and potential, in extremely tough conditions, with the leaders posting times over three minutes down on their Personal Bests.

"Happy enough with the performance, I came in ranked 56th so with a top 30 finish, I'm happy

Drenched in sweat.... David takes part in the 20km Race Walk. enough. A great experience really," David said afterwards. "I came through strong, probably the most mature I've raced to date. I came though strong and kept fighting towards the end, so I'm happy enough with my performance and

hopefully, more to come."

David's club Farranfore Maine Valley AC said it was a great performance by David. He smashed his world ranking to finish in 29th place in very hot conditions. We are all extremely proud of this young man. David's first trainer at Farranfore Maine Valley AC Michael O'Connor also praised the young athlete. "I am Super proud of David's performance in the race in conditions describe by Ray Flynn AAI racewalking team manager " as brutal". We are all very proud of him.



## STRONG TURNOUT

## FOR WALK IN WEEKEND

here was a huge turnout at the walk-in vaccination centre at Killarney Sports & Leisure Centre at the weekend. The Killarney Covid-19 vaccination centre was among the first in the country to offer walk-in vaccinations on Saturday. The walk-in clinic offered first doses of the Pfizer BioNtech vaccine to anyone over the age of 16.

An Taoiseach Micheál Martin announced the opening of the centres on Tuesday as part of the Government's objective to get younger member of the population vaccinated as soon as possible.

Among those to praise the young people who attended were HSE CEO Paul Reid said the health service was "blown away" by attendances at the clinics.

"Young people in Ireland have been to the fore of changing this country for the better," he said. "Now they've come out in numbers to protect themselves and us."

Also commenting on the huge turnout, Deputy Chief Medical Officer Dr Ronan Glynn said vaccine uptake by young people and attendance today at walk-in centres "are the latest examples of how people of all ages continue to act to protect themselves and their wider communities". "Quiet acts by the silent majority have defined the response to Covid-19 in Ireland," he said.

People that have registered online via the portal and have an appointment for a future date for their first dose of the vaccination will only need to bring a photo ID that shows their date of birth, along with their phone. Dr. Tony Holohan, Chief Medical Officer, Department of Health, said: "Public health doctors around the country are reporting that outbreaks are being notified to them that originated in symptomatic people attending workplaces, or eating out, or visiting friends. Please remember that you should stay at home if you have symptoms even if you are vaccinated, because you could still transmit COVID-19. Together as a country, we need to keep on top of all the positive behaviours that limit the spread of disease, and integral to this is staying at home if you have any cold or flu symptoms. Don't drop your guard, because heading into work or meeting a friend while experiencing fever, cough, cold/flu symptoms, or loss of sense of smell/taste - that could be the beginning link that sets off a chain of transmission that leads to an outbreak in your community. "The uplifting scenes we saw over the Bank Holiday weekend as thousands of our young people received their COVID-19 vaccines at the HSE's walk-in vaccination centres were extremely encouraging. "Young people have had an exceptionally difficult time throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Their willingness to come out to get vaccinated in droves is another example of the resilience they have shown throughout this challenging time. It is this same spirit of solidarity, commitment to keeping our whole community safe by getting vaccinated, and keeping to the basic safe measures such as staying at home if you feel unwell that will ultimately be our pathway out of this pandemic." Cork Kerry Community Healthcare in partnership with South/South West Hospital group are set to briefly extend the 'Walk in' vaccination clinics across Cork and Kerry this weekend. Shorter opening times will apply to the following participating centres:

Sunday August 8th: Killarney Sports & Leisure Complex,

Killarney from 10.00am to 11.00am

Anyone who wishes to receive a vaccine at the clinics must: Be aged 16 or over Be attending for their first dose, as it will not be possible to administer second doses. Bring photographic ID.

Bring their PPS number (if you have one).

For those aged between 16-17 who do not have a passport, student ID, Public Services card, please bring with you a Birth certificate and proof of Personal Public Service number (PPSN). This can be in the form of a Child Benefit letter containing your PPSN information.

### Welcomes Launch of

## Kerry Mental Health & Wellbeing Hub



ERRY Mental Health Association has welcomed the launch of the Kerry Mental Health and Wellbeing Hub which will improve the accessibility to mental health supports for young people in the county.

The Hub is made up statutory and community services that together provide a wide range of supports across 20+ issues from addiction to depression to self-harm.

The supports are tailored at various levels of need, from online information to group support, to one-to-one counselling so the user will always be able to find the right support, at the right time.

The General Manager of Kerry Mental Health Association, John Drummey, said: "We welcome the launch of the Kerry Mental Health and Wellbeing Hub and we are proud to be listed as one of the service providers on the website. More than half (53%) of the respondents to our\* recent survey of Leaving Certificate students in Kerry said they would not know where to go if they, or someone they know, needed help from professional mental health services right away. The Kerry Mental Health and Wellbeing Hub was in development when the survey took place and we hope that it will help young



people to secure the right supports when they need them most."

The Kerry Mental Health & Wellbeing Hub originated under Kerry Child & Youth Mental Health Working Group of Kerry (CYPSC) who identified a need for a central source of information on mental health supports in the county of Kerry.

CYPSC works in collaboration with all statutory and community & voluntary services in the county which provide services & supports to children, young people, and families.

The aim of the group is to identify gaps in service provision and address them through interagency working. Central to the work is ensuring that children and young people are 'front & centre' and can access information & identify appropriate supports quickly and easily.

The objective of Kerry Mental Health Association is to promote the general welfare of people and to support those with mental health challenges and their families and carers through the provision of information, by advocating on their behalf; to provide education and training programmes that promote good mental health and wellbeing; and supports those with mental health challenges.

## LEAVE TO APPEAL

ianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill advised that Judge Richard Humphreys of the High Court, sat this week to finalise the terms of the order he had made with regard to the Judicial Review on the South Kerry Greenway permission and CPO. The parties who lodged the Judicial Review advised that they wish to appeal this order and a date of October 6th has been set.

"While many in South Kerry will be disappointed with this further delay to the Greenway, this is all part of the legal process and objectors are entitled to use all judicial avenues at their disposal" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I am very hopeful of a positive outcome for the South Kerry Greenway project and I have marked October 6th 2021 on my calendar, as the date when the people of South Kerry/Iveragh will be finally set free from the bondage of emigration and all the trauma that has brought to the area for generations. Self sufficiency in your home place is not a state that many people in South Kerry have been used to, but there is now great hope, with the South Kerry Greenway almost 'across the line', that a new era is dawning and that business, employment and livelihoods can be available for all those who wish to live and work in this amazing part of the world" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.



#### **MULTI-MILLION EURO INVESTMENT**

#### IN KERRY HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley welcomes the announcement of almost €10 million investment of Capital funding to support Kerry Healthcare services.

In Total €9,710,000 is now being announced for Kerry Healthcare this year ensuring vital enhancements and upgrades are provided across the county.

Included in the funding is almost €5 million for significant refurbishment works for Listowel, Killarney and Cahersiveen Hospitals.

While UHK will receive targeted investment to enhance and upgrade maternity services including a state of the art obstetrics theatre and provide post Covid 19 specific care units. Minister Foley said: "I welcome the significant investment of almost €10 million in healthcare facilities throughout the county. This funding will significantly enhance the provision of vital services in Listowel, Killarney and Cahersiveen. I also welcome the significant investment in University Hospital Kerry including the welcome expansion of maternity services, theatre expansions and new laboratory facilities which will improve and enhance the already excellent facilities available.

This significant funding will provide a much need boost to existing services throughout the county. I have consistently advocated for enhanced and additional health services with Minister Donnelly and I wish to thank my Cabinet colleague for prioritising the provision of healthcare services in Kerry." The full list of projects include:

- Caherciveen Hospital will receive €2.28 million for refurbishment and extension works.
- The will also receive €50,000 for the provision of a new ambulance station in Cahirciveen.
- Killarney CNU Replacement via PPP for 130



bed facility (figure to be released later)

- Listowel Community Hospital will receive €2.28 million for refurbishment and extension works.
- Kerry General Hospital Will receive €1.7 million for a Blood Science Project (Extension & Refurbishment of existing pathology laboratory to facilitate management services tender.)
- Kerry General Hospital Will receive €750,000 for the creation of 5 No. new single ensuite rooms in an existing admin area (Rathass Ward).
- Kerry General Hospital Funding will also be made available to decant and relocate specific UHK Outpatient Services to recently completed PCC in Tralee: (To optimise patient care while minimising risks to the public, to healthcare staff, and to the wider healthcare service.)
- Kerry General Hospital In total €400,000 Maternity birthing development to include

triage assessment, 8 bed anti natal ward, 3 bedroom induction rooms, 4 birthing rooms and ancillary accommodation.

- Kerry General Hospital Almost €11 million was set aside for the provision of an additional Theatre (Obstetrics) plus upgrade of existing theatres and plant in 2020 as part of a five year Capital programme. This year €900,000 will be invested in the project.
- Kerry General Hospital €200,000 will be provided for a new addressable emergency lighting system.
- Kerry General Hospital €1 million will be provided for the reconfiguration of existing HDU to deliver five post Covid HDU compliant beds (with potential to increase to six beds).

### **FOREST LEADERS LEARN**

## THE LIE OF THE LAND



erry's first ever Forest Leader Training course began in Kilderry Woods near Milltown last month. The course was provided by Huathe, a UK based company and facilitated by The Nature Hub of The Gap of Dunloe in Beaufort. The purpose of the course is to give trainees the knowledge, practical skills and teaching skills to lead Forest School sessions for Primary School aged children, in a natural setting.

Forest School is an outdoor based discipline that provides child led learning in a natural environment e.g. woodlands, parklands etc. Like regular school, it is a long term process that takes place over the duration of two school terms. It builds up children's innate resilience and resourcefulness through connection and play in Nature. The result is more confident, independent and creative learners.

"We are so fortunate to have an array of natural spaces here in Kerry including privately owned woodland, Coillte Forests and Nature Reserves. These are natural amenities that we can

utilize in a sustainable way using the Leave no Trace principles", Diarmaid Griffin from Fossa, a trainee on the course told Killarney Outlook.

The next stage on the journey for the nine trainees is the completion of workbooks that compound the practical learning. Followed by a six week pilot that will be led by Forest School Leader Trainees. This is a great opportunity for schools across the Kingdom and beyond to offer an introduction to Forest School to their pupils for free. Other youth groups could avail of this opportunity too once they have insurance.

"Children require the freedom to develop their knowledge of the world around them and a qualified practioner to guide them on that journey in a structured way. This leads to physical, social, mental, spiritual and emotional development and wellbeing. It's a holistic approach" Kerry Walker of the Nature Hub said

#### KERRY AIRPORT ANNOUNCES 2020 RESULTS

KERRY Airport has released the Annual Report & Accounts for the 12-month period ended 31st December 2020 reporting an Operating Loss after Taxation for the period of €144,996 as compared to an after Taxation Operating Profit of €1,020,341 in the previous year.

Gross Revenue in 2020 reflects the severe decline in passenger numbers from a high of 369,836 in 2019 down to 82,959 in 2020. This equates to a 78% fall and is reflected in the subsequent 60% reduction in Total Revenue.

This year (2021) has continued the downward trend and passenger numbers in 2021 will reflect similarly to those of 2020. However, the roll-out of vaccinations, which has accelerated, and the EU Digital Covid Certificate may well see a return to better revenues in late summer. The Company remains fully financed from its own resources and does not rely on external sources of finance.

Commenting on the financials and the on-going operations of the Airport for the year, Mr. John Mulhern, CEO of Kerry Airport said: "It is difficult to reflect on 2020 without a profound sense of 'what could have been'. Were it not for the total collapse of air travel resulting from the Covid-19 pandemic we would have undoubtedly continued our journey of

growth. Sincerely, I must convey huge praise to the management and staff of Kerry Airport who, despite it all, came to work, worked tirelessly, and kept us going."

He also thanked the Chairperson, Mr. Denis Cregan, and the Board of Directors, for their continued selfless support and direction, and the elected representatives in Kerry and the Department of Transport for their unwavering support throughout. Commenting on the continuing challenges presented by the Covid-19 pandemic, John Mulhern said:

"Whatever regret that we feel is tempered with great sadness for those who have lost their lives, lost loved ones and suffered from this virus physically and financially as well as great awe for the heroic efforts by so many to protect and care for us. In fact aviation, and indeed Kerry Airport, was called upon on many occasions to support that effort through enabling prompt access to Dublin and elsewhere for essential travel including for those requiring specialised healthcare. Kerry Airport is very proud that it managed to remain open throughout the pandemic to support emergency services."




## Kerry Short Film Bursary 2021

### €10,000 AWARDED TO HAVEN

The 2021 Kerry Short Film Bursary of €10,000 has been awarded to 3 Hot Whiskeys Productions for their short film "Haven". The film follows the interactions between an Irish farming woman and a child newly arrived to Ireland as they become increasingly aware of each other. This Bursary is funded by Kerry County Council & the Arts Council of Ireland to support & encourage filmmaking within the county.

The successful team consists of Producer Hugh O'Donoghue, Director Mo O'Connell & Writers, Rehan Ali & Ivan Cush. The panel were impressed by the strength of this application and its very current story. While it was the strongest application, the team were encouraged to further develop the script with experienced story consultant, Eilish Kent. The final draft was signed off in late July by the awarding panel. Haven will go into production in Kerry this summer for delivery in 2021. Siobhan O'Sullivan, Kerry ETB Film Development Officer, is "delighted to see this timely film receive funding in the county" and will assist the team in finding locations and local crew.

The funders of the bursary, Kerry County Council in conjunction with the Arts Council of Ireland, are clear about its impact. Cathaoirleach, Cllr. Jimmy Moloney, described how important it is "to showcase Kerry as a filmmaking location while encouraging emerging talent". Kate Kennelly, Arts Officer, agreed emphasising that



the bursary "gives filmmakers the opportunity to establish their filmmaking voice while shooting in Kerry." Kerry College Monavalley, a centre of excellence for film skills training, will also provide support to the production. Con O'Sullivan, Manager Kerry College, recognises that "gaining film bursary funding is a great opportunity for those building their careers in

the industry".

In 2021 the focus was on a strong creative connection with Kerry. At least one of each application's core creative team (Writer/Director/Producer) had to be from or living in Kerry.

Producer, Hugh O'Donoghue, is from Killarney and is "incredibly honoured to be chosen by Kerry County Council and Screen Kerry for this Bursary. I look forward to working with such a talented team on such a powerful project in my native county." Hugh has written, produced & directed a number of short films shot on location in Kerry.

Director, Mo (or 'Maureen') O'Connell has made several no-budget award-winning short films & a multi-award-winning no-budget slacker comedy feature film called, "SPA Weekend". Writer Rehan Ali moved to Ireland from Pakistan in 2005 & became fascinated with filmmaking, setting up a community-based amateur film production company in his early teens. He has co-authored a book calling for an end to direct provision. Writer Ivan Cush's recent short film, Silence, had its premiere at the Tribeca Film Festival in June 2021 and screened at the Galway Film Fleadh in July 2021. This is a talented team with an interesting story to tell. They fought off tough competition to win the 2021 Bursary award & Screen Kerry commends all of the shortlisted teams on their applications.


#### FUNDING FOR KILCOOLAGHT RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

#### Vanilla baked cheesecake with baked strawberries

#### Ingredients

For the base

250g digestive biscuits

75g butter

For cheesecake mix

675g cream cheese at room temperature

150a caster suaar

3 teaspoons of vanilla extract

For the baked strawberries

Zest and juice of 1 lime

50g caster sugar

1 punnet of strawberries

#### Method

#### For the vanilla Cheesecake

Preheat the oven to 170C or 150C if using a fan oven. Grease and line the base of a 20cm round springform tin with parchment paper. Wrap 2 sheets of tinfoil around the outside of the tin. In a food processor or in a zip lock bag blend the biscuits into fine crumbs. Add the melted butter and mix well. Press the crumbs into the base of the tin and chill for 10-15 minutes. In a large bowl, whisk the cream cheese with the sugar until smooth. Add the eggs, one by one, whisking well after each one to ensure well combined. Add in the 3 teaspoons of vanilla extract and whisk until smooth. Pour the mix into the prepared tin and bake in the oven for 35-40 minutes until the outside of the cheesecake is set and there is a slight wobble in the middle.

Remove the cheesecake from the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 1 hour, before chilling in the fridge for at least 3 hours or until completely set.

#### For the Roasted Strawberries

Preheat the oven to 170C or 150C fan. Place the halved strawberries in a baking tray or dish with the zest and juice of the lime and the sugar. Toss well to combine and bake for 10-15 minutes until softened slightly. Cool completely before spooning over the cheesecake. Dust with icing sugar to serve.

1 red chilli finely chopped

1 onion chopped

1 tablespoon ground coriander

1 teaspoon ground turmeric

200g fresh spinach chopped

400g potatoes, peeled, cubed and par boiled 1 thumb size piece of ginger grated

#### Method

Heat the oil in a large pan, add the cumin seeds and allow to brown then add chillies and garlic. Fry for one minute then add the onions and fry for another 7 minutes. Add the ground coriander and turmeric stir well and then add the spinach. Cover the frying pan and cook for 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper and finally add the parboiled cubed potatoes and fresh grated ginger. Fry for another 5-6 minutes and your dish is ready. I garnished with some fresh coriander. This is so tasty and easy to make, it can be served as a side dish or as a main meal.



## Using Your Pension To Pay Less Tax

Pension contributions can provide a way of paying less income tax. Up to Revenue Limits, contributions to a pension qualify for relief from income tax. This effectively means that, where the higher rate of income tax is 40% and you are a higher rate taxpayer, a €100 contribution to a pension will only have a net cost to you of €60 (had you not made the contribution, the other €40 would have gone to the government as income tax).

Pensions carry another tax benefit: they grow free of tax, unlike deposit accounts in Banks etc (which are generally subject to tax on interest in the form of DIRT Tax) or investment in property or shares (where rent or dividends could be liable to income tax and gains in value are subject to

When your pension benefits are drawn down, a Retirement Lump Sum of normally 25% of the value of your pension can usually be taken either completely free of tax. The rest of the benefit, is usually taken in the form of a retirement fund or a pension for life, is taxable. However many people will find themselves in paying much less tax in retirement than when they were working and making pension contributions, and so will often not pay a lot of tax on their pension income when they retire.

#### The solution - focused approach to coaching Part 1

#### Different approaches to coaching. Today's topic is on Solution Focused Approach.

- The primary emphasis is to assist the client to articulate and define a desired future, and will help client to develop thinking and take action pathways that will result in the client achieve or approach their desired future state
- Asking questions that focuses on the client's strengths and helps the client to build solutions rather than focusing on their problems
- Change the viewing to change the doing. Change will occur when the coach facilitates the client in taking a different perspective of what is going good for them. Reframing is a process of looking at the situation from a different perspective. Looking through a new lens can foster a different understanding of the situation and often opens up new ways of thinking and new ways of behaviour.
- S. F approach does not seek to resolve past injuries, or effect character change. S.F will help the client to find their own resourcefulness and bring this in line with the clients intended goal.
- Explicit goal setting is a huge part of the solution focused approach as S.F is outcome focused so it is important to identify preferred outcomes and specific goals so that the client can have a clear idea about where they are going and take specific action steps in order to reach their goal.
- Scaling is used to subjectively measure experience, and can be used from 1 to 10 scale to see how close or how far away the client is from the intended goal they set out to do. Scaling can be used (a) to identify processes towards their goal, (b) clear up any fuzzy goals, (c) identify resources available to the client and (d) will articulate small steps towards the goal.

#### When was your last Sight Test?

As well as an eye health check, : a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

#### Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

#### Diabetic retinopathy

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.

## LATE COMEBACK ISN'T ENOUGH FOR KERRY MINORS

Munster Minor Semi-Final: Cork 1-15 Kerry 1-14

Ouch. Kerry have lorded Munster minor football since 2013, picking up five All Irelands, four Hogan Cups, and umpteen U16 titles along the way. Without being pedantic, the failure of the County Board to carry that investment over to U21/U20 is a big part of the delay in bringing that into senior level – that isn't intended to take anything away from an awesome Dublin team or that many players and managers who have invested a huge portion of themselves in those Kerry U21/U20 teams.

That era of minor dominance looks to be over, at least for now. The Kerry 2020 minors ripped through all before them until they ran into an impressively obdurate and skilled Derry who took what scoring opportunities presented themselves - I do feel that some Kerry players, possibly carried away a small bit (hey, every last one of these guys is a lot more grounded than I ever was at that age) by the big score lines they had racked up along the way, eschewed the basics of the game for the spectacular. Arrah, it happens – we tend to be blasé about reaching All Ireland Finals; it's a massive achievement in its own right.

The 2021 Kerry minors, unfortunately, are not going to reach that hallowed stage. They ran into a very, very good Cork team in their very first outing and, with no second chances in the era of covid, that was deireadh an sceál. Biter bit, one might say, in 2015 and 2018 in particular really good Cork teams fell to Kerry before they could fully find their feet in the competition. In 2019, Cork went down to Kerry twice but, with a back door system in place (a huge improvement, in my opinion, for all teams), but grew with every single game and ended up as the last team standing – ironically, I do feel that Kerry had the better overall team that year.

No question about the 2021 minors. None. A good team, featuring a lot of talent and proven character, but they were definitely second best to Cork on the day. Cork as a GAA county were in the absolute doldrums a few years ago, but they completely revamped their Rebel Óg Programme, just like Kerry revamped their juvenile development system in 2011, and Cork are now seeing the huge growth that we started seeing five or six years ago - funnily enough, that senior demolition of Cork by Kerry's seniors shouldn't worry Cork unduly; I feel that they are already most of the way through the transition they needed to correct that. And certainly, looking at the 2019 and 2020 minor teams, they have plenty of fuel on

the way to stoke their fires!

Kerry's engine simply never fired in the first half. Cork had an awesome midfield duo and lorded the area – they gobbled up 10 of Kerry's seventeen kickouts on their way to a 1-9 to 0-6 half-time lead. In actual fact, Cork should have led by more - they clocked up a whopping seven wides and dropped two efforts short. Kerry had actually led by 0-4 to 0-2, Eoghan Hassett (Kerry's best player) had two frees, while Luke Crowley and Jack Clifford. Cork managed to nudge a point in front at the first water break. The second quarter was disastrous as the floodgates swung wide open - Cork were simply strong enough to shrug off Kerry tackles - and three Cork points were capped by Michael McSweeney's goal – it had been on the cards for a while.

Kerry did pull back a goal straightaway on the restart. Three points between the sides. It gave me a jolt of hope – albeit there was a small smidgin of luck about the goal, well-taken by Hassett – I knew that if the supply lines opened up, Kerry had forwards who could go to town on it.

Except the supply lines never opened up. Cork simply shrugged off the goal as if it had never happened. The whole way through, they played as if the scoreboard was blank – it's an impressive feat of collective concentration at senior, let alone minor. By the second water break it was 1-13 to 1-6.

At this stage I assumed it was all over. These Kerry minors are tougher characters than I am though. Hassett was the wellspring of their comeback as he reeled off six points on the trot. A one point game. Kerry with a last minute free....wide. It happens. And being honest about it, just like the Kerry U20s that bowed out in their first game against Cork by a single point, itv was the better team that won on the night.

Does anybody think this is a tragedy? Allow me to make a point. All of these players, on both sides, had to work very hard and sacrifice a lot just to get on that field. It's an elite few who do it. Any one of them could be sitting in a stolen car last Friday night, or breaking into someone's house, or swallowing/smoking/injecting something for a false sense of adventure.

A one point loss while doing your county proud? That's not a tragedy. That's the exact opposite. I honestly hope they know that.

# OLYMPICS 2020 Rowing

#### Skibbereen Glory

Paul O'Donovan and Fintan McCarthy became Ireland's tenth gold medallists at the Olympics. Cork native Dr. Pat O'Callaghan won gold in the hammer (having won two national titles with a home-made hammer made out of ballbearings anda bicycle pedal) he won gold after borrowing the Swedish competitors hammer in 1928 in Amsterdam. Four years later he retained his gold medal in Los Angeles in Ireland's 'Magic Hour – Bob Tisdale (born in Sri Lanka to a Tipperary family) had won the 400m hurdles just 56 minutes earlier.

Landy and a hugely talented field in 1954 in Melbourne in the 1500m. It was a seminal event for an entire generation, the moment when Ireland really recognised iot's international status independent of any British association. Michael Carruth was a very good boxer in Barcelona 1992, but Cuban coach Nicky Cruz was the mastermind in his Welterweight Gold; he was treated shamefully by the IABI subsequently. Wayne McCullogh won silver and it ushered in a golden era of Irish boxing. Billy Walsh was another of the shining lights of that era as a coach, and another who was shamefully cast aside as others tried to snatch credit for the glory he had earned. Walsh is now a US coach (again, with phenomenal success) - an, in an ironic twist, he coached the boxer

who denied Kurt Walker, whom he recognised as a major talent before anyone else, a medal. Aidan Walsh and Kellie Harrington are, at time of writing, guaranteed to be Ireland's latest Olympic boxing medallists. By now you probably know it's colour.

Michelle Smith (later de Bruin) won three golds and a bronze in the swimming pool in Atlanta. Like many Irish people, I thought the US were being petty when they asked guestions that were later very obvious and necessary. Later on, her medals were tainted (irretrievably, some of us would say) after she appeared to do the reverse of a famous trick trick Jesus pulled off at the Wedding Feast of Cana....we will simply state that the record books still show her name, but her recent attempts at self-justification rang very hollow indeed, will move on rapidly. Katie Taylor, a little soft-spoken slip of a thing, was hard as nails and had the whole nation behind her as women were finally allowed to compete in boxing....and she took gold in incredible style.

Ireland's 10th gold medal was as sweet as any of them. Paul O'Donovan had his brother Gary beside four years ago when they made history by winning silver. This time Fintan McCarthy, another scion of Skibbereen, had taken Gary's place in the boat, but it made no difference; the Skibbereen pairing were just as good and a fraction better – the kind of fractions that win Olympic medals and make names immortal. The Womens' Four of Aifric Keogh, Eimear Lambe, Fiona Murtagh, and Emily Hegarty won bronze – the two boys achievement may overshadow it, but stop and think for a minute about four Irish women being third in the entire world at such a tough discipline.

Killorglin's Monika Dukarska and Aileen Crowley qualified for the B final in the W2 rowing and made a brilliant start, sitting in second place after 500 metres, but unfortunately couldn't maintain that pace and finished for eighth place. In an elite competition for the best rowers in the world, that's not bad going! Rhys McClenaghan slipped at a crucial moment to slip out of the medals in gymnastics, but to come so far in so obscure a sport in this country (it's incredibly challenging, believe it or not, gymnasts and dancers (especially ballet) are probably the fittest people alive. Aerobicly they are actually better than either boxing or swimming. Biathlon is another unusual one that really tests some-one - ski-ing pumps up the heart-rate, but you need rapid recovery to slow it enough to shoot accurately. Nice to see Simone Biles get a bronze – Biles, in opening up to the pressure and mental strain that she was feeling, showed an awful lot more character than the eejits who tried to showboat and call her out. I'm a big fan of Naomi Osaka for the

Rory McIlroy and Shane Lowry started fairly well, went into a slump, and made a remarkable recovery to just barely lose out on Olympic medals. Look, my best wishes to both of them, but I believe that having sporting millionaires compete at the Olympics robs it of it's ethos.

Phil Healy lost out in agonising fashion, reaching fourth in her heat and in qualification with just one heat to go – only to lose out as seventh fastest fourth place finisher with just six going through.

Likewise Thomas Barr could feel hard done by in the 400m hurdles. He ran his second fastest time ever but was simply in an incredibly strong heat and didn't qualify. Barr has broad shoulders; after losing an appeal he just shrugged and smiled. That's a tough man.

The 4 x 400m Mixed Relay team of Cillin Green, Sophie Becker, Chris O'Donnell, and the aforementioned Phil Healy set a new national record in their semi-final and finish eighth in the final – again, that's a phenomenal achievement.

If any one man is the reason why Crokes are a Senior County Championship team (and of course a lot of people shared that load, but in this particular instance, a cogent argument can be made that one man is) it's John.

Crokes' faced Abbeydorney last Sunday. They didn't win it, Abbeydorney prevailed by the smallest of margins.

Winning is always a fine aspiration. It isn't always the point of any endeavour. And certainly not this one.



Damien carried his imperious form from the first 18 of the semi-final into the decider again as he was 7up after 18 holes once more.

Murphy fought back to bring the deficit to four but Damien managed to see things out for a 4&3 victory to ensure his third title. It's Kerry's fourth victory in the competition overall taken with his club-mate Derry McCarthy's 2004 win on home turf. Damien now has seven major individual honours in the game with his three National Matchplays now matching his three Irish Opens alongside the 2018 National Senior Strokeplay win. The win also meant that for every weekend that Pitch & Putt Ireland have run a National Championship since competitions were allowed

resume there has been a Kerry winner on each of the three weekends they have been held. Michael Conway of Tralee and Listowel's Jake Shine won the delayed 2020 National Intermediate and Junior Mens Strokeplay Champions back in June while the weekend before Damien's latest success, Tralee's Ella Moynihan had won the National Girls Matchplay Championship in Glenville, Dublin.

Speaking of Michael Conway he gave defending Mens champion Kieran Earls of Bruff a major fright in the first match of the first round before eventually losing out by 4&3. Jason Cregan was the best of the rest of the Kerry contingent last weekend, reaching the Last 16 where he was defeated by Damien's quarter-final opponent Peter O'Donovan 5&3. Another Tralee player, Jason O'Regan, reached the Second Round where he was defeated by St Patricks Martin O'Neill 3&2 while Gavin Carroll of Castleisland missed out on the chance to play Damien in the Second Round itself after he was defeated 5&3 by James Foley Jnr. The other Kerry player in the field, Listowel's Killian O'Gorman was defeated in the First Round by Louth's Barry Thornton 7&6. There is a slight lull in fixtures now as the National Strokeplays take place towards the end of the month. The U16's head to Lakeside in Templemore on Saturday August 21st for their event while the qualifiers for the Adult Strokeplays in September are due to take place the following weekend in Tralee.

All involved in Kerry Pitch & Putt could do with a few weeks to savour the success of the last two months however!




Welcome back dear reader.... "I called on Your name O Lord, from the lowest pit, You have heard my voice; do not hide Your ear from my sighing, from my cry for help" (Lamentations 3:55-56 NKJV). When trapped down in a pit there is only one way out, that's up! Last week, we saw how God ministers His love and peace to us by singing songs of deliverance over us to calm all our fears (Zephaniah 3:17 NLT). 


Heaven needed Mam: So many things of mam I miss Her gentle hug and tender kiss I still can feel her warm embrace And picture still her loving face
