The Christmas in Killarney festival, now in its 11th year, is aiming to be the top Christmas festival in the country this year with the launch of the Christmas in Killarney Tops of the Town. The festivals calendar of events was unveiled at the launch of the festival in the Killarney Plaza hotel with the brand new Tops of the Town event set to be one of this year's highlights. Grainne O'Sullivan cochair of the Christmas in Killarney committee said "This year we wanted to bring an extra dimension to the festival, a big event that will involve the entire town, so we came up with the idea of having a Christmas in Killarney Tops of the Town, everyone has such fond memories of Tops of the Town we thought it would be the prefect addition to Christmas in Killarnev".

Ciara Treacy of the festival committee also added that Killarney will really sparkle this Christmas with the town also hosting, a Santa fun run on the 5th of December, a Christmas cake competition on the 19th December, Fashion at The Europe, Dine in Killarney Restaurant Nights, Young Choon piano recital, Santa's lodge at Deenagh Cottage and Muckross house Christmas magic as well as the amazing town decorations that Killarney is fast becoming famous for.

of the goals is to maximum the potential of each child and to support their reintegration into his/her home, school and the wider community. With this in mind the funds will be used to purchase specialised wheelchair accessible equipment for a play ground" he added.

Tom has first hand experience of the work that the NRH does, following a childhood accident and he would like to thank all those involved for making the day such a wonderful success.

NEON FUN AT THE GRAND FOR GLOWHEARTS

A night of fun and nostalgia is planned for The Grand Hotel in Killarney on Friday 20th November and its all in aid of glowhearts4crumlin.

The 80s and 90s disco event is set to generate funding which will go straight to the cause.

Tickets are $\in 10$ or $\in 7$ if people dress up in neon 80s and 90s style clothes. Helen Sheehan from the Grand hotel is putting in a huge effort to make sure that the event is going to be one to remember for all who attend and its all in aid of supporting the little heart warriors in Crumlin hospital.

Glowhearts4crumlin was set up in January 2015 by six mums from Kerry who each have a child that was born with a congenital heart defect and who underwent open heart surgery in the children's heart centre in Our Lady's Children's Hospital in Crumlin.

The drive behind setting up glowhearts4crumlin was to create awareness of congenital heart defects (CHDs) in babies and children, as each of us mothers had no knowledge of CHDs prior to our own child diagnosis. CHDs in children are common affecting 1 baby in every 100 births.

"As there was no support network existing for parents of CHD children within Kerry and we each entered into the scary world of CHDs alone with no knowledge or support". Gillian O'Donoghue, one of the GlowHearts mums and Chairperson of the group, told the Killarney Outlook.

"It's one of our main priorities to provide support and help to parents who have children who have been recently diagnosed with a CHD in a effort to help guide them through the journey they will be undertaking", she added. The group are working alongside Kerry General Hospital in a effort to reach out to new parents of babies born with CHDs and to try

and improve techniques for detecting CHDs in



babies quicker, before and after birth therefore improving survival rates for these babies.

The group are busy organising fundraising activities within Kerry to raise much needed funds for the children's heart centre in Our Lady's Children's Hospital in Crumlin. This centre of excellence was built using no government funding. The funds for the construction of this centre was generated by fundraising campaigns by the Crumlin research and medical foundation in Crumlin and from fundraising campaigns by parents and private donations. The continued success of this centre relies on fundraising and donations.

From January to April of 2015 they have raised €18,000 which they divided evenly between the children's heart centre in Crumlin and the adjoining Ronald McDonald house, a home from home for parents and families of sick children staying in Our Lady's Children's Hospital in Crumlin. This year the group are solely campaigning for funds to build a new Daycare Children's Heart Centre which is to be constructed alongside the existing children's heart centre in Crumlin. As this new build is receiving no government funding all donations are hugely appreciated by the charity.



OPERATION RESUSCITATON: TIME IS CRUCIAL WHEN IT COMES TO SAVING LIVES

The life-saving skills of students at St Brendan's College together with Eugene Cosgrove, Killarney Celtic FC coach, helped save the life of their classmate Tom Geaney last year.

Now St Brendan's College has joined forces with a new local project, Operation Resuscitation Killarney, which will be offering training to schools, sports clubs and individuals to help save lives. The project, which will be launched this month, highlights the fact that time is crucial when it comes to saving lives. Forty teachers and 60 transitionstudents at St Brendan's College underwent training with the Operation Resuscitation's volunteer trainers on Wednesday, completing a two-hour American Heart Association CPR and AED program.

"Today is the first step in a process of making Killarney and surrounds the safest heart town in Ireland and Ireland the safest heart country in the world," said Dr John Geaney of Operation resuscitation Killarney.

"Currently, Ireland's survival rates are 6%. Other regions have a 26% survival rate. We can save 400 additional lives in Ireland every year – that would be at least three lives in Killarney – if we work to raise our survival rate to be on a par with the world's best."

The Operation Resuscitation project has come about because of the huge generosity of volunteer trainers including Mary O'Connor,



CALL FOR INCREASED LOCAL GOVERNANCE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT INVESTMENT IN SOUTH KERRY

There is a significant need for increasing the levels of local governance and investment in Rural Development in South Kerry. These are some of the strongest messages to come out of a major survey of both civil society organisations and individuals launched in Listry Community Centre last Friday night. The report, Rural Vibrancy on North West Europe - the case of South Kerry, written by Dr. Brendan O'Keeffe of Mary Immaculate College/University of Limerick, was conducted as part of the INTERREG Rural Alliances project in which South Kerry Development partnership was involved. More than 100 civil society organisations and 1,000 individuals throughout South Kerry were surveyed in the preparation of the report providing one of the most significant pieces of research into rural vibrancy ever undertaken in Ireland. The report was launched by Irish Times Dáil Correspondent Michael O'Regan.

The report highlights that civil society in South Kerry is characterised by high levels of vibrancy, dynamism, vision, determination, innovation and knowledge capacity. However, it shows that this vibrancy is being stifled by increasing levels of bureaucratization in the delivery of publicly funded programmes such as LEADER which is creating a barrier to innovation within the sector. In addition, the report highlights that the provision of public services in many communities in the region fall well below the levels as laid down in the national spatial strategy. It calls for investment

to be made prioritised in the weakest areas in this regard, notably the Iveragh region with a specific aim of safeguarding existing services and rolling out new services such as broadband. A number of contributions from the floor at the launch were strongly supportive of the findings and recommendations contained in the report and called on all public representatives and policy makers to bring about the changes identified in order to enable regions such as South Kerry develop and thrive into the future. There were also very strong calls for the levels of LEADER funding available in Kerry to be significantly increased and they were critical of the changes made to the operation of the programme which they felt would dramatically slow down the delivery and amount of funding available under LEADER for community initiatives in South Kerry.

RACHEL IS ON THE ROAD TO SUCCESS

Tralee Community Training Centre is a community based project that supports young people between the ages of 16 and 21 who have either not completed mainstream education or who did not realise their full potential and want the opportunity to get better recognised qualifications and Rachel Ward from Killarney is one of their success stories.

Rachel came to the Community Training Centre in September 2013 having completed her Leaving Cert but not achieving as good a results as she had hoped for. Rachel's sister Donna had previously attended the CTC and had progressed on via the FAS Training Centre to work full time in the local Classic Hair Studio salon. Like her sister Rachel had a genuine ambition to succeed in the hairdressing industry and was already working at weekends with Donna in the salon. Rachel's ambition, motivation and determination were clear throughout the course and as her self-confidence and skill grew her pleasant personality became evident when working with the public during Salon Days in the centre. She also took the opportunity to do a work placement during the course at Classic Hair Studio where she received glowing feedback. The salon were impressed enough to give her extra work experience and are supporting her now that she has progressed from the Community Training Centre and successfully gained a place on the FETAC Level 5 Hairdressing course at the Kerry ETB Training Centre.

Trainees undertaking the Hairdressing course at Tralee Community Training Centre work towards an industry recognised qualification provided by the British awarding body VTCT and their Level 2 Diploma in Hairdressing Services which when completed gives the young people the necessary academic qualification to enable them to progress on to further training and hopefully ultimately full time employment in the industry.

The centre runs four courses which are: - Catering, Construction Skills, Hairdressing and

Technology. All courses work towards Q.Q.I. (formerly FETAC) Major Awards at Junior Cert and Leaving Cert equivalent levels. Trainees also study Communications, Mathematics, Personal Effectiveness, Work Experience, Health Related Fitness etc as part of their training. The centre also provides those trainees that require it extra support in literacy and numeracy as well as professional counselling if they wish.



CANCER ON THE GO Tommy Frank O'Connor

Cancer is bad news. Early reactions to diagnosis vary from denial to desperation, trepidation to terror.

I was diagnosed with prostate cancer in December 1999, almost sixteen years ago. My days were full, my nights stretched to accommodate my many interests. I did not feel ill and I had no time for cancer. My wife and other professionals helped me to face the reality of my situation; common sense prevailed and I had the surgery needed to remove the enemy.

Most people reading this piece know or know of someone who has cancer. I prefer the term — living with cancer — it does not have to take over one's life. It will, if allowed to. Negative thoughts, fears and uncertainties can clog up one's perspectives preventing us from seeing the real picture. And that picture is that most people who are diagnosed with cancer nowadays go on to live normal, active lives after surgery and/or whatever treatments their professionals may prescribe. Equally as important is the back-up available from Recovery Haven and Palliative Care. Their different but complementary roles provide help not just for the patient but for the family in making sense of this invasion from hell. Recovery Haven has support groups for women and men. Their professional team is backed up by over ninety volunteers who provide therapies such as Reiki, Massage, Pilates, Mindfulness, Listening and so on. All of these are available free of charge.

There is an aura about Recovery Haven that instils hope; many of the volunteers are themselves living with cancer and they help

BALANCING EXCITEMENT WITH EXPECTATION IS KEY - WALSHE

Legion's vice chairman Enda Walshe admits he is in the same boat as everyone else when it comes to next Sunday's county final.

"It is real unknown territory as it is the first time in a lot of people's life times to in the final." However, he does see one challenge that lies ahead of him. "It is very important to balance the hype, balance the excitement and balance the expectations of trying to win the final as well."

Walsh has seen first hand the buzz around the club especsically with the young children.

"There is a fierce buzz in the club, a pile of kids in the club have instantly recognisable heroes in the lads that play for Kerry and It's very easy for us in the club to link the ting together."

Still aside from the players, another group play their part for the club off the field for the club.

"We have got a great response from the businesses in the town, we have been out there over a few nights trying to get support as there is a lot of costs involved in the getting a team to the final. People are helping put up flags and buntings and there is as much as an excitement with the adults as there is with the kids and maybe even more in some quarters."

Walsh believes that the role of the county players will have a crucial bearing on Sundays final.

"They set the tone in the dressing room for the players. They are serious players for us when the game is on and that rubs off on the other players. It gives fellows a bit of pride to be playing with fellows of their calibre and helps the whole team push on together"


first time since 1946, his preparations are to see him deliver another master class despite the fact that his co commentary is South Kerry's Gary O'Sullivan. Therefore, will that cause any trouble on Sunday? "Ah no Gary and myself gel well together and it might be difficult after the game but certainly not during it as we will call things the way we see them fair and balanced." Weeshie himself has first hand knowledge of South Kerry in many ways, having made his debut for Legion against South Kerry in the county championship in 1957 and even though that game ended in a defeat, he sees the Killarney club as favourites ahead of what he feels will be a very tough examination of the young side

"South Kerry are an experienced bunch, they have a lot of South Kerry tough, hard, good ball players and they know how to win. If you were to look at all the divisional board teams over the last 20 years, they are probably the most successful divisional team that has come out of Kerry.

Even though I believe, the Legion will go in as favourites, for the simple reason that they are a club team playing good football and they beat some good teams along the way. The fact that they are playing South Kerry will make it more difficult."

So what must Legion do to deliver a win? As always, the view is balanced. "It will all boil down to the management of the team and the players themselves to keep themselves separated from the Hype that is going on. If they can divorce themselves from the hype that inevitably will be around they have a great chance"

LEGION'S BID FOR COUNTY GLORY

LEGIONS PLAYERS'TOGETHERNESS WILL BE VITAL

Even at such a young age, James O'Donoghue should feel the weight of pressure and expectations but despite the heavy load on his back, he sees it very much a positive and heads into Sundays clash against South Kerry full of excitement even if he admits to being a little nervous.

"We're obviously a little bit nervous but we're really excited too. It feels great; it is such a new feeling for us. The last county final I was in was the Under 21, we won it and it was this team. So we have come up together as a team and while it is a new experience for us to be in a final at senior level. We already know what it is like to win a county title together as a team"

This O'Donoghue sees as key for Legion and it can be seen on their great run of games as the team produces free flowing football having already scored 8-43 in their four games of which O'Donoghue has contributed handsomely with 4-11.

"We knew the way the county championship was set up once Kerry drew with Cork in the Munster championship. We knew that it would be game after game and that has really suited us as a team and gave us a real momentum and we have kicked up the gears as we have played regularly."

Having lost the All Ireland Final to Dublin, O'Donoghue is certainly one of the few county players to have brought "form" into his club side but he does not view this as anything special and welcomed the return to club football quickly.

"While there is no compensation for losing an All Ireland, being in a county final gives you a reason to chance focus really quickly and gets your mind concentrated on another championship. To have another chance of winning and make up for the All Ireland defeat is something you can really get struck into."

WINNING THE COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP IS A

MARATHON AND NOT A SPRINT He may well have royal South Kerry blood but Legion manager Peter Keane is out only out for "his "players" on Sunday. "I suppose it would have been a little easier if it were Kenmare and not South Kerry but it is what it is and I'm only worried about my players on Sunday and getting them over the line." Keane who guided St. Mary's Cahirciveen to an All Ireland Junior club title is set to replace Jack O'Connor as Kerry minor manager is only looking ahead to Sunday's game and despite the fact that it is only his second season in charge, He has already hit some important milestones with the club. Having taken the team out of Division two last season, they are still

very much in contention for a place in this year's league final. "When we got involved, they were in division two, so the target was really to get out of two and back to one and to start playing more clubs teams of a county championship standard.

We had a huge result last year when we beat the Crokes in the county championship, that was a big plus for us, and it was very disappointing after when we lost out to Dingle. Especially to lose in a game that went into four minutes of overtime and we conceded a goal and lost by a point.

That was a sickner. We would have had ambitions after beating the Crokes last year to push on.

Still Keane believes the magic formula has more to do with graft and his panel strength than any magic dust he may be sprinkling.

"Last year we would have had Conor Keane and Podge O'Connor with us in Division two but they subsequently this year would not have been available to us due to their involvement in Kerry, so we won a good share of the games in Division 1 this year without county players. Therefore, it is very much about our strength in depth that we can still compete to a very high level even without such a loss of quality players to the county panels having come from a lower division last year.

Having answered many tough questions from Rathmore, Feale Rangers, Kerins O'Rahilly and Mid Kerry. Is there one last battle in his young side? "Well winning the county championship is more a marathon than a sprint and I think we are certainly in a very good place on Sunday but we are not taking South Kerry for granted. They are an exceptional side who know what it is like to win. They have shown a lot of character too along the way"



LEGION HOLD EDGE IN DECIDER

KERRY O'SHEA LOOKS AHEAD TO SUNDAY'S GARVEY'S KERRY SFC FINAL BETWEEN KILLARNEY LEGION AND SOUTH KERRY

SOUTH KERRY V LEGION

Killarney Legion and South Kerry face off in Sunday's eagerly awaited Garvey's Kerry SFC decider at Fitzgerald Stadium Killarney (throw-in 3pm).

The County Senior Football Final is a special day when the cream comes to the top and champions are crowned.

GAA fans from all over the county and beyond look forward to County Football Final Day and whether the game is held in Tralee or Killarney, the occasion is special as is the pomp and pageantry that goes with it.

When the 2015 championship began in May, 22 teams started out, all of them with dreams of winning the Bishop Moynihan Trophy. This was eventually whittled down to the final two.

Again this year, we have a club (Killarney Legion) and a district (South Kerry) fighting for the ultimate honour.

Killarney Legion and South Kerry were not expected to qualify for this year's final but they have executed some great football and they fully deserve to be finalists.

Both sides are steeped in the traditions of the game, and both sides have produced some great footballers down through the years.

Killarney Legion, formed 86 years ago, have lived in the shadow of the success of their great town rivals Dr Crokes and to date, have just one senior title to their name. That came in 1946, when they defeated Tralee's John Mitchels.

Still, Legion have produced some brilliant names down through the years. Names like Johnny Culloty and the Lynes of Cleeney spring to mind, and of course the present day Kerry heroes James O'Donoghue and Jonathan Lyne. Two of the Legion team that won the 1946 final are still hale and hearty. They are John Joe Sheehan and the legendary Micksie Palmer.

Micksie subsequently played in the 1954 county final with his native Kenmare District but they were beaten by Kerins O'Rahilly's.

South Kerry won their first title in 1955 and have gone on to win nine titles, the last of these in 2009.

South Kerry are the most successful district side in Kerry down through the years. They have produced household names who need no introduction to Kerry GAA fans.

When one thinks of South Kerry, one thinks of, Jerome O'Shea, Mick O'Connell, Mick O'Dwyer, Jack O'Shea, the one and only John Egan and of course that ace free-taker and glittering star Maurice Fitzgerald.

Both sides are determined and focused to add to their past success, and are in this year's decider completely on merit. This game pits two former teammates John Sugrue and Peter Keane against each other as they are now the respective managers of their sides

Both Peter and John have starred for South Kerry in the past and have won County Championship honours together but friendships will be put aside for the hour as they bid to lead their side to championship glory.

To get to the decider, Legion defeated Mid Kerry, Feale Rangers, Kerins O'Rahilly's and Rathmore, while South Kerry recorded wins over Kilcummin (twice), Dingle and Kenmare District. Both sides have leaders in key positions and the role of the leader is always very important in the modern game.

South Kerry have household names in players like Bryan Sheehan, Killian Young and of course Declan O'Sullivan, who came off the bench to help swing their quarter-final win over Kilcummin. Legion on the other hand have goalkeeper Bian Kelly Podge O'Connor, Jonathan Lyne and of course James Donoghue to drive them forward.

O'Donoghue's role will be crucial in the overall outcome. It will be interesting to see who South Kerry will deploy to curb the effectiveness of the Legion talisman.

South Kerry will probably try to limit the effectiveness of O'Donoghue.

With O'Donoghue, Legion also have rising Kerry star Conor Keane in their ranks.

Apart from Bryan Sheehan and Killian Young, South Kerry have natural forwards in Denis Daly, Aidan Walsh and Paul O'Donoghue.

All three were very effective in their side's win over Kenmare in the semifinal and all three will have to be at the top of the game if John Sugrue's side are to advance.

Sunday's decider promises to be an intriguing contest between two sides who are at the top of their game.


Legion go into the game as marginal favourites. They have superior scoring power and in a very tight contest, this may well be the difference.



KILLARNEY ATHLETIC

This week we conclude the articles on the history of the Killarney Athletic. The articles over the past 24 weeks have been presented as a snapshot of the club as we celebrate its 50th anniversary. We have a covered a wide range of highlights about the club to date, but as the author of the articles I have just taken the liberty to recall a few of my own particular memories of involvement with the club.

GREG COLLINS: My first memory of taking an interest in soccer refers me back to Greg Collins. Greg who also lived in O'Kelly's Villas could be best described as a 'fanatical' soccer person who not only followed the game with a passion but played the game with an even a greater passion. He played mainly as a goal keeper with the Harrington teams in the Desmond League and was an ever present powerful defender with Athletic in the early years of the Kerry District League and often prided himself after a game that "his opponent and the ball never went past him together". Greg also had a big personality off the pitch and regularly entertained his friends and others with his singing and his own unique 'one liners'. Greg was much older than most of us who took up on the invitation to play a game with him either in the then Mercy Convent outdoor basketball court or in the 'Mon' field on the New Rd. So Greg was the man that very much promoted and encouraged many of us to join and play soccer with Killarney Athletic. Included in that group were Denny and Donal Hayes, Frankie and his brother Denis O'Sullivan RIP, Tom O'Shea, Gerard Looney, John Casey and myself.

BEING PART OF ATHLETIC: | started playing with the club as a 15 year old in the mid '70s along with Colm O'Donoghue and Donal Brosnan RIP and the make-up of clubs in the Kerry District League at the time basically consisted of having a senior team. Some attempts were made to run a youth league but most of the clubs were dependent on youth players to make up their numbers with the senior team, thus it was difficult to get or expect players to play in a youth league on a Saturday and with the senior team the following day. My first games with Athletic were in a youth team in 1975 and I also played with the Athletic 'B' team that was formed that season and managed by Billy Doyle. I recall James Gleeson RIP gave me my first start with the Athletic 'A' team after dropping Tom 'sossy' Mullins RIP something 'sossy' never let me forget. But in truth there was no one could replace 'sossy' as a player when he was at his peak and he really was a great character and 'true blue' all his life. James Gleeson too was an absolute 'gent' of a man who also encouraged the promotion of underage football in the club and his tragic death was a great shock to all of us who knew him. I also remember playing against John O'Regan who was a tough player with Tralee United and he took over as secretary of the

KDL at that time. That is true longevity as John remains at the helm of the KDL and the driving force of Kerry soccer today.

GREATEST INFLUENCE: Without doubt Denny Hayes and Billy Doyle were the greatest influences that encouraged my interest and involvement in the club. Denny was one of the best players to play in the KDL and also contributed hugely to the promotion of underage football in the club and was a great servant to the Kerry Schoolboys League in the 1990/2000s. Billy was one of the most dedicated and enthusiastic Killarney Athletic people you could meet and contributed a huge amount to the development of the club as an administrator and team manager. Denny and Billy obviously recognised my interest in the club and that is probably why I have spent most of my time of involvement not just as a player/ coach/manager but also in the administration side of the club since I first joined the committee in 1976.

LOCAL RIVALRY: There is no doubt in my view that local rivalry is a very healthy thing in sport and the competitive encounters between Athletic and Celtic during my time of playing were fantastic. Billy would always say when things were not going too well with the team that "we badly need a derby match" and sure enough when the Killarney derby was fixed "fellows would appear for training that we would not have seen for weeks on end". Killarney Celtic deserve great credit as they have developed a great club since they were formed in the '70s and like Athletic have had some outstanding individuals who have given great service to the promotion of the clubs and soccer in Kerry. But if I was to single out one of the great 'unsung heroes' of Celtic from the '80s it would have to be Billy Morris.

PLAYING HIGHLIGHTS: Playing with Kerry in the Oscar Traynor Cup in 1980 was a real honour for me and we came mighty close to causing a major shock against the Cork AUL in Turners Cross but lost out to a late goal after dominating the match. Michael Conway RIP (Castleisland) and Tom Johnston RIP (Callinafercy) were two outstanding soccer players in the KDL and were also part of that team. My Athletic teammate Tom O'Shea was also in the side that year and 'Tommy' was a very good player. I always enjoyed and took great pride in playing for Athletic, although we lacked the consistency to win league titles mainly due to the fact that many of our 'better players' were also dual players and only committed for part of the season. That said, we had some very good teams and I have previously mentioned many names in the articles.

MANAGING TEAMS: I volunteered much of my time as a coach and manager of underage teams starting back in 1981 and was pleased to have lead the club through its most successfully period of football development in the 1990s and early 2000s, a period we have fairly well covered in the articles. It is striking to me though as I read the FAI 2015 'Player Development Plan' that much of the 'proposed changes' to the way players are to be coached and developed in the future are a return to same principles that were recommended in the '90s. These were principles the club adopted and implemented at the time through the support of FAI Directors of Football Joe McGrath and Jimmy McDermott. I concluded my management and coaching of teams in 2010 and it was great to have some players in that squad who I had coached from under 10 level.

CLUB CHAIRMAN: I served as club chairman from 1992 to 2008 and enjoyed every bit of it 'while learning a lot' from the experience. The purchase of the Woodlawn pitch in 1993 and the 15 year development of the ground was a significant contribution that could only have been achieved by the support and commitment of many. The 7-a-side was also at its highest level of interest and popularity in the '90s due to the support of many already mentioned in the articles. Witnessing the end of the Áras Phádraig Pitch in 1999 was not only a loss to the club but was indeed a sad loss for the wider community. The achievements of Diarmuid O'Carroll and Brendan Moloney in signing with Glasgow Celtic and Nottingham Forest as professional soccer players and having the two Michael Moloneys and the two Murphys i.e. Bryan and Ronan capped for Ireland was some achievement and honour for the club.

DON HARRINGTON: Meeting and getting to know the man who formed the club, Don Harrington and indeed his late wife Monica RIP, was a privilege for me as we share many things in common through our involvement with the club in different eras. His autobiographical account of 1965 and the period thereafter that featured in the articles forms a critical part in tracing the club's history back to its true foundation 50 years ago.

ANNIVERSARY HIGHLIGHTS: It's been great to be a part of celebrating the club's 50th anniversary and to share so many fond memories with many former teammates, rival opponents and of course the present generation of Killarney Athletic people who will carry the club forward into the next 50 years.

Without doubt the 'Revisit of the Half Moon' and the Gala Night Social were the outstanding occasions of the year but the weekly articles too have highlighted all that's been great about Killarney Athletic and we hope they will encourage more people to help out and support the club into the future.

Thanks to Toirdealbhach Ó Lionáird who has been the other half of the 'production team'.

We want to sincerely thank in particular those who have given voice to the articles by the fantastic coverage they have given us and Killarney Athletic by their publication week in, week out since June of this year. Those people are Aisling Crosbie, editor of the Killarney Outlook, Eve Kelliher, editor of the Killarney Advertiser, and John O' Mahony editor of www. killarneytoday.com.

BATTERY BREAKDOWNS

MOST COMMON CAUSE OF BREAKDOWN AT ANY TIME OF YEAR BUT PARTICULARLY IN WINTER

Battery faults are the most common cause of breakdown.

Batteries can die at any time of year but it's more likely in winter when cold temperatures hit car batteries with a triple-whammy:

power output drops

ability to accept a charge drops, so the battery doesn't recharge as quickly when you're driving
load increases – lights, blowers, wipers, heated seats, rear-screen heater etc are all used more.

Add in the fact that many cars stand unused over the Christmas holiday and it's no surprise that the first day back to work after New Year is always one of the busiest of the year for the AA. Battery problems can be avoided. The garage that services your car should check that clamps and connections to the battery are secure and free from corrosion, but there are a few simple tips you can follow to reduce the chance of your battery letting you down in the depths of winter;

AGE: If the battery is more than five years old and there's any sign of it struggling to start the car, get it replaced. Some will struggle on for a bit but many won't. It's much better done at your convenience than as a roadside emergency.

CHARGE: If you mostly do short journeys or leave the car standing for days at a time, invest in a modern battery conditioner/intelligent charger. These can be left connected to the battery indefinitely and can prolong its life without overcharging it.

LOAD: Check that everything electrical is



turned off when you park up – even an interior light, boot light, or radio left on overnight can kill a battery when it's cold.

Give the battery a chance

Switch off everything electrical and dip the clutch to reduce the load on the battery when you start a cold car.

BASIC CAR CHECKS

LIGHTS: Clean all exterior lights regularly and check for blown bulbs and cracks in the lens.

OIL: Cars can consume as much as a litre of oil every 1,000 miles. Check the oil level regularly (your handbook will show you how). Don't wait for the red oil pressure warning light to come on - engine damage may already have occurred by then.

WATER: Overheating is a common cause of breakdowns, especially in hotter weather. Check the coolant level regularly (the handbook will show you how) and if the level always seems low, check for leakages. Top up the windscreen washer fluid too.

ELECTRICS: Battery problems are the number one cause of breakdowns at any time of year. Renew an old, tired battery before it lets you down. Also make sure that your electric radiator cooling fan starts running when the engine gets hot – you can check this by running the engine with the car stationary.

RUBBER: Incorrectly inflated tyres are not only unsafe, they wear out faster and can increase

fuel consumption by around 5%. If you're driving with extra passengers or luggage, remember to increase your tyre pressure accordingly (see your handbook).

BUDGET 2016 – CAPITAL GAINS TAX

Capital Gains Tax (CGT) is a tax on gains arising on the disposal of assets (land, buildings, shares etc.). A disposal means a transfer of ownership in an asset whether by means of sale, gift, exchange or otherwise and includes a part disposal of an asset.

TAX RATE

The current rate of capital gains tax applying to gains on disposals is 33%.

EXEMPTIONS & RELIEFS

The following are some of the main exemptions and reliefs

- Private residence
- Transfer of a site from parent to child
- Retirement relief

Capital gains tax does not arise on death, the assets are deemed to be acquired by the beneficiaries at market value at date of death.

ENTREPRENEUR'S RELIEF

Budget 2016 introduced an "Entrepreneur's Relief" from 1 January 2016. A capital gains tax rate of 20% shall apply to gains arising on the disposal of business assets subject to an overall limit of €1m.

CGT PAYMENTS

The tax year is divided into two periods for CGT payment purposes, as follows:

- Initial period, 1 January 2015 to 30 November 2015 payment due by 15 December 2015
- Later period, 1 December 2015 to 31 December 2015 payment due by 31 January 2016

Know Your Rights: THE NEW PASSPORT CARD

QUESTION

I heard there is a new passport card. Does it replace the passport book? How can I get one?

ANSWER

No, the new credit-card sized Irish passport card does not replace the passport book. You can use the new passport card for travel within the European Union, the European Economic Area (Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) and Switzerland. For all other travel you must use your passport book.

To apply for the passport card you must be aged 18 or over when applying. It is not available for children. You must hold a valid Irish passport book and the personal details you provide when applying must be exactly the same as those on your passport book. The card is valid for a maximum of five years or for the time remaining on your passport book if this is less than five years.

You can apply for the passport card online on the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade website, dfa. ie, or you can use the Department's passport app for smartphones and tablets. The card costs \in 35 and there is an additional delivery charge of \in 5 if you are applying from outside Ireland.

WHEN MAKING THE APPLICATION YOU WILL NEED:

- Your valid passport book
- Your photograph in digital form
- (it must meet the required passport standard)
- A debit or credit card

You can track your application's progress on the Department's website using the application number issued when you apply.

SouthWest Counselling Centre WHEN A RELATIONSHIP BREAKS UP

The ending of a relationship can be a very painful time whether you are the one who has ended the relationship or not. It may have come as a great shock – which can be very upsetting. Even if it had been coming for a while, the grief that accompanies a break up can be devastating. Following a break up we may feel overwhelmed with feelings of loss, grief, anxiety, loneliness, guilt and sadness and it may feel as if our lives will never be the same again. We may find that we have one good day, only to feel flooded with sorrow the next. This is very natural and part of the grieving process. If we were the one to end the relationship we may experience feelings of guilt, loneliness, sadness and/or relief. Whatever you are feeling, it is important to allow yourself time to grieve. Healthy grieving means experiencing our feelings, whatever they may be. Gradually we come to accept the loss and re-adjust to a life without that person. It can be difficult to move that person from being at the centre of your life to somewhere peripheral. This is made all the more challenging if you have children together or work in the same office. Minimal contact - however tough - is advisable.

At times grief can feel like a physical pain – so working with our body can help to release the sadness. Gentle movements such as stretching, walking dancing, yoga, massage or tai chi can all help our mind and body to express our grief.

Although your grief may feel very intense it will change over time. It is important to remind yourself that the heartbreak will heal. Gradually you will begin to notice that you're not checking your phone as much anymore, you have a night out where the sadness isn't present or you're not crying all the time. It is vital to notice these changes – as no matter how small they may seem – they signal change and herald a new beginning.

Grief can be a very isolating experience, so it is important to seek support and reach out to others. You may choose to talk to friends or consider speaking to a counsellor to help you through this time. Remember you don't have to go through this alone. Other great sources of support include spending time with family, walks in nature, pets, reading a good book, watching a movie or going to the gym.

TESTICULAR CANCER

WHAT IS CANCER?

Cancer is a disease of the cells in the body. What all types of cancer have in common is that the cancer cells are abnormal and multiply out of control. A malignant tumour is a lump or growth of tissue made up from cancer cells which continue to multiply. Malignant tumours invade into nearby tissues and organs, which can cause damage. Malignant tumours may also spread to other parts of the body.

Some cancers are more serious than others. Some are more easily treated than others (particularly if diagnosed at an early stage). Some have a better outlook (prognosis) than others.

WHAT IS TESTICULAR CANCER?

Testicular cancer is a cancer that arises from a testis. Around half of all cases occur in men under 35 but testicular cancer rarely occurs before puberty. It is the most common cancer in men aged 15-44 years. Almost all testicular cancers are classed as germ cell cancers as the cells which become cancerous are those involved with making sperm. Germ cell testicular cancers are divided into two main types (depending on the exact type of cell causing the cancer): • Seminomas which occur in about half of cases. They most commonly occur in men aged between 25 and 55 years.

 Non-seminomas which usually affect men aged between 15 and 35 years.
 In most cases testicular cancer develops for no apparent reason but there is an increase in risk to those who have undecended testes (less if surgically corrected at birth) and in those with a family history of testicular cancer.

WHAT ARE THE TESTICULAR CANCER SYMPTOMS?

In most cases, the first symptom noticed is a lump that develops on one testis. The lump is often painless but some people notice some pain or discomfort coming from the affected testis. Most swellings and lumps in the scrotum are not due to cancer. There are various other causes. However, you should always tell a doctor if you discover a swelling or lump in one of your testes. It needs checking out as soon as possible.

Occasionally cancer is diagnosed as a result of spread from the original site.

HOW IS TESTICULAR CANCER DIAGNOSED AND ASSESSED?

To confirm the diagnosis

Your doctor will examine your testes and may refer you for an ultrasound scan or specialist review. If cancer is diagnosed then the usual advice is to have an operation to remove the affected testis.

It is important to know that if you have one testis removed, it should not affect your sex life. You should still have normal erections, make sperm and hormones from the other testis and so can still father children. However, if you have chemotherapy or radiotherapy (see below) it may affect your fertility. But, many men find that their fertility returns to normal a year after they have received their chemotherapy or radiotherapy treatment.

MARGARET'S RAMBLINGS

REFUGEE CRISIS:

Nearly 60 million people have been forced to flee their homes by war, conflict and persecution—more lives uprooted than at any time since World War II.

In the month of October, the number of refugees and migrants arriving to Europe by sea had increased by more than seven times over last October—from 23,050 to 179,470. On one weekend alone, more than 27,000 men, women and children landed on Greece's shores.

To make matters worse, winter is fast approaching in Western Europe. Many refugee and migrant children and their families are now sleeping outside in the cold and rain because of a lack of temporary shelter. Serbia and Slovenia have already seen temperatures fall to almost 4 °C at night and by December; temperatures will drop to - 1 °C and below.

Most of these new arrivals, while thankful for reaching dry land safely, are exhausted, wet and frightened.

WHERE ARE ALL THE KERRY VOTES?

Of the six trees that have been selected in the Love my Tree competition, three are from Kerry and as I write they are in 3rd, 4th and 5th position, at present it looks like none of the three will be representing Ireland in the 2016 European Tree of the Year competition.

3 REASONS WHY DOGS EAT GRASS:

*Dogs who do not receive adequate exercise may eventually become bored and search for activities to occupy their time and entertain themselves.

Strangely enough, these activities can include nibbling on grass. Therefore, a good starting point is to evaluate how much exercise your dog is getting on a daily basis and consider introducing more walks or other fun activities, such as playing fetch or whatever else the dog enjoys

*Historically speaking, dogs are considered omnivores, which mean they consume both meat and plant-based food.

There is some indication that dogs with a low fibre diet may choose to scavenge in the grass to fulfill this nutritional deficiency. These dogs may also find that grass has an appealing flavour and consistency.

If you feel this may be the reason why your beloved canine is consuming grass, then consider discussing with your veterinarian ways to incorporate more fibre into your dog's diet.

*There is a belief that dogs with an upset

or gassy stomach will self-medicate by consuming grass, since vomiting often follows this grass eating activity, eliminating the contents of the stomach or changing the gas distension within the gastrointestinal tract.

However, the truth is there isn't much scientific evidence to back up this theory. If you suspect there is too much gastric acid in your dog's stomach or any other underlying medical issue that could be causing this behaviour, you should consult with your veterinarian right away.

THE GLOBAL TUNA INDUSTRY HAS A DIRTY SECRET:

Out at sea on the Rainbow Warrior Greenpeace activists met workers who were tricked or kidnapped and sold onto boats where they had no rights, little food and couldn't even use the toilet. They could be killed if they try to escape.

Meanwhile, their captors force them to work with destructive fishing methods that damage entire ecosystems, and attract, capture and kill other marine life – including turtles and sharks – while driving some tuna species towards extinction.

Hard-hitting media exposés have seriously implicated Thai Union in horrendous human rights and environmental abuses. And this is happening in the Pacific Ocean. Workers are paid \$300 a month and heavily punished for sleeping on duty and drinking fresh water.

Thai Union needs to seriously clean up its act. But for that to happen, the company's management has to feel the pressure from people all over the world.

Why Thai Union? Because they're the biggest seafood company in the world. Greenpeace have taken on the tuna industry before - and thanks to petitions, brands and retailers in major markets like Great Britain and Australia have started to clean up their supply chains. But the global tuna industry is rotten to the core, so Greenpeace is tackling the biggest offender. If they change Thai Union, the rest will follow.

If you would like to help end slave labour in the world fishing industry there is an online petition – just enter - Add your voice to the call for seafood giant Thai Union to change for the better – to your search engine.

AT LEAST SIX AMERICANS OVER THE PAST FIVE YEARS HAVE BEEN SHOT BY THEIR DOGS:

The most recent to make the headlines was

an Indiana woman who was shot in the leg by her Labrador retriever, Trigger (yep, that's the dog's real name), who stepped on her shotgun which was laying around loaded with the safety off. Like most dog-on-human gun violence, the incident took place during a hunting trip.

In 2013, a Minnesota hunter was shot in the leg when his dog jumped into his boat and set off a shotgun, also in 2013 there was the dog who shot his owner in the leg with a .380 pistol while riding in his truck.

In 2011, a Utah hunter left his shotgun on a boat. His dog jumped on it, sending a blast of birdshot toward the man's buttocks. Two weeks later a Florida bulldog named Eli shot his owner with a rifle while in a car on the way to a hunting spot.

In 2010 there was the dog that jumped onto a bed and knocked another .380 pistol onto the ground shooting his "extremely intoxicated" owner in the hand.

But my hero is the three-month-old shepherd mix puppy who shot a man in the wrist with a revolver in 2004 while the man was trying to shoot the pup and its siblings, "because he couldn't find them a home."

These figures are a minimum, since they only include dog-induced gunshot wounds that manage to make the local news. Which means the number is probably considerably higher.

A LACK OF ANIMAL POOP IS CAUSING A NEW ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEM:

The world's animal population is down 50 percent from what it was just four decades ago. The declining animal population is not only depressing, but poses a lot of environmental dilemmas including the fact that animal dung plays a critical role in helping to fertilize the world and supply nutrients to everyone's diet. Small fish eat phosphorous-packed food on the bottom of the sea. Larger fish consume these fish. Coastal birds eat these fish and poop on land. This poop serves as fertilizer for plants that smaller animals eat. Larger mammals eat these creatures and poop inland, spreading nutritious fertilizer all over.

A big reason for the massive drop-off is the decrease in massive land mammals, and the biggest animals currently on earth are frequently endangered. It's not just that larger animals make larger turds – they also tend to cover more ground in their travels. It's their ability to bring nutrient-filled poops to new environments that make them especially powerful in this process.

Although farmers now keep a sizable percentage of the world's larger mammals, livestock is not going to fix this problem for a couple of reasons. First, the kinds of food animals are served aren't often the most nutrient-packed to begin and secondly, and more importantly, these animals aren't free roaming. It's the animals who wander and can take their faces to various places – further than fences will allow – that are promoting biodiversity.

The animal that the scientists singled out as one of the most important to this poop process is indeed large, but does not live on land: the whale. Whales consume a lot of phosphorus at the bottom of the ocean, which is easily transported along to land and other animals since they poop on the surface. With whale populations down so much due to human hunting, however, they now contribute just 23% of the phosphorus that they once did.

If we can get their numbers back up, that means more nutrient-packed fertilizer will make its way to land to the benefit of every land creature.

BLACK CATS ARE TOTALLY "PAWSOME":

Black cats are the longest stayers in animal shelters, just because of the colour of their fur! It's thought that the black cats' lower popularity is due to old superstitions about bad luck, when in actual fact black cats are seen as a sign of luck in Irish folklore and in other countries across the world.

Black cats are now unfortunately facing another challenge caused by the "selfie" phenomenon, which is that owners don't want black cats because they think they don't photograph as well as colourful cats.

If you are thinking of getting a cat please remember that black cats make wonderful pets and are just as special as any other cat and that they deserve loving homes too!




