
Dónal passed away peacefully surrounded by his family after a short illness bravely borne, and in the wonderful care of the Palliative Care Unit, University Hospital Kerry.


Rena, who passed away last March, lived in Aghadoe, Killarney and formerly at Cleeny, Killarney and Ballymullen, Tralee.

The Toll into Killorglin proposal - a way of getting something back for the town from huge tourist buses

This was one of the livelier stories of the past few weeks and one I picked up covering the Kenmare MD meeting. New councillor Podge Foley proposed a toll over the bridge into Killorglin. It's actually the case that before the limestone bridge was built in the 19th century there was a wooden bridge with a toll. There was also "airgead an aonaigh", a toll going into fairs in Ireland. So a toll over a bridge is a historic practice.

It is also the case that tolls are levied on tourists in other countries. Visitors to La Rochelle in France, for instance, are asked to pay Euro 16 for driving over the bridge onto the lle de Ré.

Podge's motion asked for a 'tariff" of Euro 20 on all large tourist buses.

New councillors often have the best of ideas and I think the councillor term should be limited to two and if they want to come back after a break, so be it. But they should be sent out to grass after ten years to fatten up with ideas.

The same should hold for TDs.

Podge has been seeking various measures



to enhance Killorglin as a town where tourists stop, rather than pass through.

Kenmare Fine Gael Councillor Teddy O'Sullivan Casey seconded the proposal. Podge also lamented the lack of focus on the mid-Kerry region in the tourism strategy of Kerry County Council.

The council spend in tourism promotion next year will be over Euro 1.3 million - the figure includes salaries for its special tourism unit. The unit works with Failte Ireland, Tourism Ireland, the IDA and other promoters of tourism. We are falling over with promoters! Podge asked the council tourism office to focus its marketing efforts in attracting tourists to areas such as Mid and South Kerry. Council management told him the tariff proposal "would essentially be a toll on the route " which would have to be in introduced in accordance with the provisions of the Roads Act, 1993, as amended.

The Killorglin bridge, on the N70 national secondary routes, dates to 1885, having replaced a wooden bridge overcome by high spring tides.

Is Podge's motion the way forward for other parts of Kerry, overrun with tourists, but gaining nothing?

Lights go out in courthouse - Renovation must be a priority now for our TDs

The lights went out in Tralee courthouse last week and a trial underway in the Circuit Court Room with four days had to be delayed. The jury were sent for tea whilst an electrician was sought. In the family law court the judge sat in the dark.

The upstairs family mediation room was also unavailable due to flooding.

The courthouse was packed for family law. The trial was in camera but there was a senior counsel and a number of barristers and solicitors

as well as witnesses. And of course judges and clerks and journalists.

The early 19th century courthouse has been the subject of concern with two decades. Old courthouses have been done up everywhere, but not in Kerry. Tralee has deteriorated considerably since the pandemic.

Lighting and other networks in the building are old as are prisoner facilities.

The Courts Service has rejected local calls for improvements to the building after surveys by the OPW pointed to cost factors.

The council has washed its hands completely-the old "legacy" caretaker arrangement whereby the council provided caretakers has not been renewed and the building is now solely courts service responsibility. Proposals for a new court complex on a half acre site on the western end of Tralee never meant for a court are further out than ever.

The Law Society in Kerry has complained of "Dickensian conditions". No extra capital funding was provided to the Courts Service in Budget 2025, or in the funding of the National Development Plan as revised

for 2024 - 2026, for the construction of new regional courthouses.

A better courthouse has to be a priority for Norma Foley and Michael Cahill to secure funding either for a new courthouse or to do up the existing.

At this stage I think renovating the existing is the most urgent and the better option long term too.



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Huge business supports outlined at Chamber gathering

The Kerry Local Enterprise
Office and Kerry County
Council have paid out close on
€33 million to local businesses
under the terms of various
support schemes and help
programmes implemented after
the Covid-19 pandemic.

The information was provided to those in attendance at the final Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce lunch of the year which was held in The Laurels Restaurant on Wednesday.

Head of the Kerry Local Enterprise Office, Tomás Hayes, who was the guest speaker, said his organisation – a unit of Kerry County Council – succeeded the former County Enterprise Board in 2014, when there was a large scale re-evaluation of roles.

The updated brief was to work with small scale manufacturing and exports and innovative products and services with 10 or less people employed.

He said the remit has again changed gradually over the past two years with a much stronger emphasis on the retail and hospitality sectors and his office has been increasingly involved with increased cost of business programmes and schemes over the past couple of months.

He said post pandemic, they have been working on the administration of the two restart schemes, small business assistance and business continuity schemes, the increased cost of business programmes and the power-up grants.

"We're not just dealing with a few hundred applications here – we're dealing with thousands of applications. We reckon over the last period of time we've probably dished out in the region of €33 million to the local economy and that can only be done with the teams within Kerry County Council across revenue, finance and the Local Enterprise Office.

"That has been a huge challenge that, to a certain extent, has probably distracted us from our core activity," My Hayes stated.

He said he was delighted to now be in a position to advise Chamber members of new enterprise projects that are coming through, particularly a new green for business scheme and energy efficiency grants, which are aimed at focusing more on sustainability. Details of the new schemes were outlined at the lunch by Conor Slattery who is sustainability in business advisor.

He said the free green for business scheme is aimed at smaller businesses who can apply for inclusion to the Local Enterprise Office who will, in turn, appoint a consultant to assess and advise each business in terms of energy and fuel consumption, lighting and heating and renewable energy options.

It is open to all sectors with a cap on businesses with 50 employees or more and, in many cases, the grant is being used for equipment upgrades.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce Co-President, Johnny McGuire, availed of the opportunity at the lunch to acknowledge the recent passing of two people he described as "great Killarney champions."

He said Andy O'Sullivan, a great GAA stalwart and proprietor of the Killarney Carpet and Furniture Centre, and former councillor Donal O'Grady both left a lasting legacy in the town through their commitment to the betterment of the community.

"It is fitting that their children are continuing their legacy into the next generation," he said.

He also praised Fexco founder Brian McCarthy who was inducted into the Order of Inisfallen scheme which is an awards programme organised by the Chamber and Kerry County Council.

"His contribution to the economic life of our county and town is immeasurable," Mr McGuire stated, He also thanked all the candidates in the recent general election and, in particular, Linda Gordon Kelleher who facilitated a meeting between the Chamber Executive and the Minister for Finance, Jack Chambers, at which important issues relating to the future of Killarney town were highlighted and acknowledged.

The Chamber chief said Killarney was delighted to have secured a fourth consecutive gold medal in the recent SuperValu National Tidy



Towns Awards.

"I want to acknowledge the commitment and dedication of Kerry County Council management and outdoor staff, who are a shining example of public service, and to thank the many local volunteers for their commitment to keeping Killarney Looking Good," Mr McGuire said.

This week also marked the 50th Meitheal outing of the year in the national park and the regular volunteers were joined by 18 staff of Irish Water whose input was of great benefit.

"We have had great support this year from various businesses and voluntary groups

outside of our town and their input and the increased resources for the staff of the national park are greatly appreciated," he said.

Mr McGuire said he was thrilled to note that a planning application has been resubmitted for the planned Dinis-Torc cycleway and pedestrian route along the lake shore.

"Anyone wishing to make a submission on the plans please do so immediately as the planning decision will be announced on the 24th of January 2025.

"If you are a park user please have your say. The achievement of this path will be of enormous benefit to the safety and enjoyment of the Muckross and Dinis Loop and will be an iconic feature of the Killarney Outdoor Destination Experience," Mr McGuire added.

Killarney Chamber Events Manager, Katy Jacobi, outlined the attractions of this year's Christmas in Killarney Festival with return of the ice rink and the introduction of festive markets and she appealed to those shopping in town this year to remember to support the coffee cup project which encourages against single use cups.

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












COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE!



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BLEPHARITIS

WHAT IS BLEPHARITIS?

Blepharitis causes eyelids to become red, swollen and inflamed. It doesn't normally cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. It tends to be a long-term condition, which means you're likely to need ongoing treatment. Severe cases do have a risk of causing long-term damage, but fortunately these are quite rare.

TYPES OF BLEPHARITIS

There are two main types of blepharitis – anterior and posterior.

Anterior blepharitis

When the front (anterior) part of the eyelids becomes sore, this can be caused by an infection, allergy or a general sensitivity to bacteria present on the eyelids. It can also be associated with some scalp conditions, such as very dry or oily skin and dandruff.

Posterior blepharitis

Also known as meibomian gland dysfunction (MGD) is when the glands that make the oily part of your tears become blocked. Both types of blepharitis can cause dry eye or make it worse if you already have it. Many people will have a combination of blepharitis, meibomian gland dysfunction and dry eye.

RISK FACTORS

Blepharitis is more common in people over the age of 50, but anyone can develop it. This is often because the glands that make the normal tears, particularly the oily part of the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older.

SYMPTOMS

Blepharitis can cause crusting and white scales may stick to the roots of eyelashes. Your eyelid edges may become red and your eyes will feel gritty, burning, sore or itchy. If you experience these symptoms, make an appointment with your optometrist.

TREATMENT

There is a range of products designed especially for treating blepharitis, such as sterile pads, individual moist wipes and separate cleaning solutions.

As part of the treatment, you need to remove all the crusting and debris from the edge of your eyelids and from between your eyelashes. You should use a special lid cleaning product. Treatment of blepharitis is a long-term procedure. You may not see any improvement for several weeks.

Continue the treatment twice a day for at least one month, then less often as it starts to get better. You will probably need to continue to clean your lids at least twice a week to help prevent the blepharitis from returning.

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



MOMENTOUS CAMPAIGN

SEES ONE CHANGE IN KERRY

After a three-week campaign and seventeen candidates, there was only one change in Kerry. Albeit a momentous one.

Kerry returned two Fianna Fail TDs - sitting TD Norma Foley and veteran councillor Michael Cahill in a dogfight that went down to the wire, along with two sitting Independents, and one sitting Sinn Fein.

This is the third general election since we became a single constituency, combining the former three seaters of Kerry North and Kerry South.

But it will be the first time in almost 80 years Kerry will not be sending a Fine Gael TD to Dáil Eireann.

Michael Cahill, a sitting councillor with 34 years, based in Glenbeigh and Killorglin took the final seat - 757 votes ahead of sole Fine Gael candidate Billy O'Shea of Killorglin The seat had been held by Brendan Griffin of nearby Castlemaine in mid-Kerry.

They say all politics is local. And the battle for the last seat in one of the biggest constituencies in the country was indeed local. It was in mid-Kerry.

Brothers Michael and Danny who hail from the Fianna Fail gene pool were elected for the third time.

The Sinn Féin vote was back from his huge performance in 2020. But Pa Daly, a Tralee solicitor and Sinn Féin justice spokesman comfortably took the second Kerry seat on the eight count.

Strategy told for both the Healy Raes and Fianna Fail. Healy Rae supporters voted exactly as 2020, taking into account the increase in Michael's vote. Voters in Kerry dutifully obeyed the map distributed to all houses in Kerry, "respectfully" showing us all how to vote "1&2"

Danny, narrowed into the Killarney received 2633 transfers close to half Michael's surplus of 5,513, just as in 2020. A remarkable response by voters.

But this election showed that Fianna

Fail were just as clever at the end of the day. The party's first preference vote is up six percentage points to 26.23 per cent.

Norma Foley at the count centre was asked if she had sacrificed a larger personal vote in rigidly sticking to dividing the constituency.

She agreed she probably had - but this was "for the good of the party". Norma's first preference rose from 6,856 votes in 2020 to 10,302 votes in this election. "We have improved our vote spectacularly," Norma said. The three-candidate strategy had been controversial but it worked.

In contrast the Fine Gael party fragmentation - with three councillors refusing to canvass at all - meant the vote was almost halved. The fall out will continue until the next election. Or maybe a by-election.

Red Anger in Fine Gael

Having thrown away the seat, Fine Gael in Kerry is in disarray.

Former TD west Limerick and director of elections in Kerry Michael Finucane visited the press room to complain loudly about the lack of energy and input by sitting councillors in Kerry in the campaign. He included relative Jim Finucane who had retired from politics. This was on Saturday night.

There were other stories too. Michael Healy Rae sensing an opportunity had stood outside Keel church asking for "the loan" of the Fine Gael vote. Prominent blues including Fine Gael councillor Tommy Griffin made a point of shaking hands publicly with the TD, observers felt. In other words, the supporters of Fine Gael were free to vote for Michael Healy Rae, was how one of those canvassing with Michael read it. (Tommy Griffin says he couldn't avoid Healy Rae and so shook hands with him).

The voting share in ballot boxes around Keel and west Kerry told its own story - the Fine Gael vote in

the two Castledrum boxes slided into both the Healy-Rae and Cahill camps. Michael Healy-Rae got 180; Cahill got 171 - with just 61 for Billy O'Shea. In 2020, Castledrum delivered over 401 Number Ones for Fine Gael's Griffin with Michael Healty Rae getting just 90 votes.

The sole candidate strategy by Fine Gael headquarters and former minister Jimmy Deenihan was imposed - "parachuted without consultation" in the words of Tommy Griffin - after an apparent lack of eagerness by councillors to put their names forward. Only one councillor got stuck in on from the beginning, party loyalist Teddy O'Sullivan Casey accompanied by former councillor Patrick Scarteen.

(Tommy Griffin said he was asked to go after the local elections and said he would think about it after a holiday, but there was no further approach).

The Fine Gael vote was almost halved in Kerry - from close to 15,000 first preferences among two candidates in 2020 to just 7,932.

At the count centre on Sunday, Jimmy Deenihan laid the blame on councilors. Had the councillors nominated by members got involved at convention, this would have led "to a very different team and a very different outcome", a hugely disappointed Deenihan said. "There will be a lot of soul-searching by us and mistakes made by us must be acknowledged and rectified and we must make sure this constituency is never again without a Fine Gael TD," Sean Kelly, MEP told me.

Rainbow coalition?Winners and losers - the smaller parties

All candidates were winners. Respect is due to anyone who puts themselves before the public, and risks the embarrassment of getting no vote. Politicians like journalists stick their heads over the water and battle the incoming waves . This is often against the tide of populism. There was no tsunami.

There was a decent enough showing for all parties and others. The Green candidate Cleo Murphy under constant attack by the Healy Rae machine, near neighbours, need not be too disappointed.

Cleo was the last of the alternative parties to be eliminated and went out with a decent 3,439 votes.

Michael Healy Rae was the only one to go over quota and increase his vote by almost three percentage points to 18,596. That was expected. The Raes have a huge well-oiled electoral machine rolled out by a

key supporter in every village and a large extended family.

Linda Gordon Kelleher got 2,024 first preferences- but then she was unknown outside Killarney and was hemmed in by the strong men - Michael Cahill and by Danny Healy

Transfer patterns between weaker party and non-party candidates were consistent and they went out on a respectable vote. I thought to myself, if Brandon Begley, Irish Freedom Party (816) Catherina O'Sullivan of Aontú,(2897) Cian Prendeville of People before Profit, (1089) Cleo Murphy of the Greens, (3439) Michelle Keane Labour's Mike Kennedy (2,081),(2438) and Thomas McEllistrim clubbed together, and (1181)decided on a single or even a joint canvass, they would be a strong force.

Senate Seat for Billy?

The talk now is of a senate seat for Billy O'Shea. At the end of the day, for a first time candidate in any political field, O'Shea polled strongly. He was a mere 757 votes behind a politician of two generations.

Some FG councillors won't be happy but the moves are already underway to get him a senate seat. And Billy has left the door ajar in a statement post election: "Let's see what the future holds."

The senate is almost obligatory now the county is without a Fine Gael representative and has no FG senator with the death of Paul Coghlan. Jimmy Deenihan was made a senator in 1983 after failing in the general election in 1982. He won a Dail seat in 1987.

KERRY POLITICS FOSSILISED?

Mostly male and shades of green - is politics in Kerry going backwards?

On Monday after spending 30 hours in the count centre that sometimes felt like a 1970s dance hall, I was sent to cover a citizenship ceremony in Killarney. Ironically the ceremony was in the Gleneagle hotel, the location of the famous dancehall in the 70s.

Six thousand new Irish were being sworn in the INEC in a well managed two day event.

On Friday we voted for effectively four Fianna Fail TDs returning to Dublin along with their internationally shaded green cousin, Sinn Féin On this note it was notable SF had no tricolours. Usually they are wrapping the count centre in them. I was amazed too not to see the green and black Palestinian flag. But like Mary Lou there wasn't a poster of her in Tralee or Killarnev - the black and green flag of Palesitne was kept in the Sinn Fein drawer. As was the tricolour.

The weekend's result reflected nothing of the new Irish diversity in this country or even in Kerry, it struck me forcibly.

We are actually lucky to have a woman TD and very lucky to have Norma Foley, a dignified presence whether on the Dail or at a count centre. She is one of only a handful of women returned by Munster voters.

Otherwise, we have four white males, all old Irish families, returning to the Dail. This does not

reflect the new Ireland. Or even the old Ireland. Politically, I always liked the mix of green and blue or even red and green that stemmed from Kerry. The county was a great Labour stronghold. It had a blue TD in one or other part to save us from the more populist and greener Fianna Fail. But not this time. In fact, it feels to me as if Kerry is crawling backwards into the past. Like a crab. At times on Sunday I felt I was back in one of the more raucous traditional dance halls of the late 1970s. Or a house dance in Mickey Meara's in Lismongane. We had a solo of Roses around Cabin Doors, by Cahill's great backer Dan Tim who recently got to drive his sheep over London Bridge. This was followed by the Rose of Tralee and other ancient ditties belted out by the Rae chorus. All very enjoyable, but all reflecting a time that is gone with decades. And that will not come back.

This and the complete lack of engagement by our own new Irish - I didn't come across a single Polish or Ukrainian or Bangladeshi person at the count over two days - apart from three Mexican nuns here for the citizenship ceremony,

With transfers going everywhere and three of five seats on a knife edge, the sole Fine Gael candidate had not thrown in the towel. The Kerry five-seater constituency Killarney was still waiting for a first count late on Saturday night after almost fifteen hours of counting..

Billy O'Shea, the sole candidate, said it was "always going to be a dogfight" with Michael Cahill of Fianna Fail "as both live in the mid-Kerry Killorglin area".

O'Shea hasn't given up yet, saying "transfers are unpredictable."

"It's a battle and from my sporting background, I'm well used to battle from my sporting background. We'll wait and see what transpires." He got a good vote in North Kerry and he wanted to thank the people of north Kerry, Billy said. His main ambition was to get the Fine Gael vote out. Regardless of the outcome, it was a fantastic experience - and one that benefited his relationship with his wife Emir, with whom he had anyway a good relationship.

"Myself and my wife have bonded better and she was definitely my best supporter," he said in reference to the lively campaign wife Emir Irwin ran by his side.

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PRE NCT AND DOE TESTS

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

RATHMORE FIGHT BACK TO CLAIM EAST KERRY TITLE

O'DONOGHUE CUP FINAL:

Rathmore 1-12 Kilcummin 2-7

Kilcummin and Rathmore is a relatively unusual pairing for an East Kerry Championship Final – their only previous meeting at this stage was back in 2005, with the honours going Rathmore's way on that occasion. Rathmore had completed a four in a row back in 2017, but Kilcummin had prevailed over three-in-a-row Dr. Crokes in their semi-final and both teams entered the Fitzgerald Stadium pitch with real intent and ambition.

Kilcummin drew first blood, Paul O'Shea winning and dispatching a close-range free, having switched early on with Kevin O'Gorman from his midfield berth. At the other end John Moynihan almost nipped in for a goal chance, but an alert Kilcummin managed to clear their lines and Keelan O'Shea doubled their advantage off his left leg.

Ciarán Collins opened Rathmore's account in the sixth minute after good work by Cathal Ryan and a foul on John Moynihan saw Shane Ryan level matters with a free. The Kerry keeper, a deadly forward for his club side, was very narrowly wide with a long range effort.

Rathmore's defence were very impressive, Dan Murphy in particular, but they were struggling to get their attack moving. Rathmore sparked into life, Fionn Murphy kicking a great score. Dan Murphy rose high to claim the kick-out and set up Ciarán Collins to clip over. 0-5 to 0-4.



Matt Keane had other ideas, scooping up the loose ball and jinking into space before unleashing a thunderbolt with his left leg. The ball flew past the crowded square and nestled perfectly into the top corner for a stunning goal. Kilcummin were suddenly energised, winning the kick-out and Paul O'Shea slotting over another free to leave a sudden five point gap between the teams.

Rathmore needed a strong start to the second half and got exactly that. Cathal Ryan set up Shane for a point. GAA SPECIAL CONGRESS

There was a really important election last week, one that has ramifications for Irish culture that will reverberate for years if not decades to come. There was a General Election as well but, while I respect all those who put in the time and effort, it didn't feel like it had the same resonance. Maybe that's just me.

The game of gaelic football has undergone big changes over the past couple of decades. More efficiency and less flair. High energy work-rate, much less reliance on skill. Statistics as an end goal in themselves rather than a tool for refinement. Gyms taking precedence over ballwork. Primacy of possession and defensive swarms over attacking ambition. Am I exaggerating? No, I'm not. I love the game, I have followed it all my life. And the modern game is a very, very hard watch. What's more, and may even be more significant as far as Central Council are concerned, less and less people are watching. The Leinster Championship is a non-event. Munster ain't exactly any rollercoaster. And please, let's not play the "Kerry are all catch and kick footballers and blanket defence is only puke football" card. Kerry are as defensive, sometimes more so, than plenty of other counties.

I'm not detailing any numbers to back up these points, simply because we have all known this for a long time. Does any crathur really want to stand up and say that the games are brilliant? Because that's as outdated as any pretence that climate change isn't happening; those conversations became embarrassing over a decade ago.

Last weekend, following the recommendations of a very, very strong sub-committee appointed by Central Council, a number of proposals were voted on by Special Congress. Their purpose? To fundamentally alter the game of gaelic football (hurling is absolutely thriving), reward attacking play, and reduce the mind-numbingly boring possession-at-all costs mantra.

Will these succeed in transforming the game? I have no idea. It's risky. But frankly, doing nothing would have easily been the worst option on the menu, and I think the voting of the delegates (it was a landslide vote in favour of change) generally reflected that.

I'm not going through all 49 motions individually, since most of them were interlinked and reference the rulebook. These are the main points.

Motion One

This is an enabling motion so that rule changes made at Special Congress will be adopted on a temporary basis for one year, commencing on January 1, 2025. Central Council shall be entitled to rescind or amend any rule changes made by this Special Congress.

This was a very big one. Essentially, the argument was that these rules should be brought in at inter-county only for the first year. Sligo and Longford preferred that to the committee's recommendation to bring it in across the board. For me, it was important that it be brought in fully. You'll have plenty of naysayers anyway, you always do to any proposed change (status quo bias is a wellestablished principle) so you may as well run the table. The higher education competitions will not be run under the new rules in 2025. I know there were a lot of calls to restore the likes of the McGrath Cup to give inter-county teams a chance to experiment with these new rules. I wasn't in favour; there are far too many games crammed into far too tight a schedule already.

Motion Two

Throw-ins to be contested by one player from each team, with the other midfielders on opposite sidelines.

Throw-ins have become a little farcical. They are little more than shoving contests at this stage. These feels a tiny touch extreme, but it certainly won't hurt and may well help matters.

Motion Three

Kick-outs have to land outside a new 40 metre arc.

Retention of kick-outs has become a mantra.

I want contests for possession. That's the essence of hurling, you can't exactly hoard a sliotar, and people love it. So yes, love this.

Motion Four

Teams must have three outfield players in each half at all times.

Yes. Swarm defence is grand for rugby league if that's your game. My worry is that already you have a few managers and pundits talking about how fitness and runners will be paramount because players will need to get from one half to the other at pace. In other words, they are trying to find a way to counter the entire purpose behind this proposal, which is to open play. Jayus, it's like they'd try anything rather than play football!

Motion Five

Attacking marks can only be claimed inside the 20m line, with the forward allowed to play on if they wish and go for goal.

I've never been a fan of the mark. Certainly this idea of a dinky little 20 metre pass and a forward gets a free shot at a score never made much sense to me. It reduces skill, not encourages it. Open play is better.

Motion Six

A score from outside the 40 metre arc from play or frees (not '45s) will be awarded two points, with the umpire signalling such a score by raising an orange flag. Scores from inside the 40 metre arc and over the bar will be awarded one point, while a goal will remain at three points.

I like it. I want kickers rewarded. The game has evolved into sure-thing shooters, recycle rather than risk. That'[s the biggest problem with the modern game. This rewards risk.

Motion Seven

A player who is fouled has the option of taking a quick solo and playing on rather than lose attacking momentum.

There are people out there who firmly believe that there is no such thing as tactical fouling. And such people are very precious for their innocence and must be treasured and protected. For the rest of us, this rule makes perfect sense.

Motion Eight

The ball will be advanced 50 metres (or up to the 13 metre line) for any foul which purposefully and deliberately delays play. Again, yup. Play football. Lose the cynicism; it now comes with a price tag.

Motion Nine

Obvious examples of cynical fouling will now carry the sanction of a black card.

The black card did help to improve the game on its introduction and it's role has gradually expanded ever since. I have no problem with it

Motion Ten

A player who is fouled inside the 40 metre

arc has the option of bringing the free back outside the arc to take a kick worth two points rather than one.

I appreciate the reasoning but I think it's just a fraction too much with the other sanctions that are coming in.

Motion Eleven

A third or subsequent player joining a melee will incur the sanction of a black card.

Was it not a straight red anyway? Shows what I know. I do feel that more times than not, the person entering a melee si trying to break it up and pull someone away from it but they get embroiled in the whole thing instead. So from now on, it's up to every player to simply be smarter than that.

Motion Twelve

A referee has the discretion to allow a longer period of advantage than five seconds if they deem the circumstances appropriate.

You are opening up a bit of a grey area – a question of how much is actually enough. I presume it's a case of let that phase of the attack play out before opting to bring play back. You are asking a fair bit of every referee's judgement.

Motion Thirteen

Dissent towards the referee will result in the free being brought up 50 metres or to the 13 metre line.

Of course I like the principle. Nobody approves of dissent in theory. In practice, this one will generate a fair bit of debate. No problem in Croke Park in the AllIreland Championship with 27 cameras and everybody miked up. Have fun with that in a rough junior game on a rainy Tuesday night without linesmen.

Motion Fourteen

Team captains are the only players who can seek clarification from the referee in regards to a decision, and only during a break in play. I don't agree with this one. What happens if there is an incident involving your full forward, but your goalkeeper is captain? This rule works in rugby because there are clear lines of demarcation in play and frequent stops. In gaelic football I think it's unworkable.

Motion Fifteen

New lines will be needed on all pitches to facilitate the implementation of these rules, including two 40 metre arcs on each side and a dashed line to indicate midfield.

A fairly obvious statement in the circumstances.

Motion Sixteen

A public hooter will be used for timekeeping and signal the end of each half.

Timekeeping is always more of a talking point than it really should be. I don't particularly think this is necessary or that it will add anything to the game. On the other hand, it does take a little bit of responsibility

away from overworked referees (and these new rules are enormously burdensome on referees) and it won't do any harm.

Motion Seventeen

Allows officials running the line to immediately bring any instances of foul play to the referee.

My limited understanding of it was that umpires could bring technical infringements to the referee's attention, i.e. squareball, but not instances of foul play. A gap in the rulebook that always seemed like an anomaly to me and the more help that match officials can give referees, the better.

Motion Eighteen

Where a rule requires a player to be inside or outside a particular line of play (e.g. to be a third outfield player in a particular half), both of the players' feet must be on the right side of the line.

It shouldn't even need saying, but you know that some lad or, more likely, manager, was going to chance his arm with it.

MUNSTER U20 FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP 2025

In the Munster U20 Football championship 2025, Clare, Waterford, Limerick & Tipperary play a round robin competition from March 8th with the bottom two teams meeting in the B final on April 1st while Cork meet the top team & Kerry meet the second team of Phase 1 on the same evening.

Cork and Kerry meet on April 8th at a Kerry venue in round 2 of phase 2, with both sides meeting Phase 1 runner up and winner respectively a week later with the Munster final listed for April 29th.

IRELAND VERSUS WALES

Ouch. Very much ouch. The plain fact is that Ireland were taken to school by Wales. They should have won the first game. They scored a very good goal after Ireland fluffed a chance to clear it. Ruesha Littlejohn hit an absolutely precise shot for the equaliser, great hit and real skill, but back off the crossbar and in off the back of the keeper's head? Dress it up all you want, that's a fluke goal. Wales were very much the better side for me on the night, much more composed, and I thought we were fortunate enough to get a 1-1 draw. Littlejohn was absolutely phenomenal over the ninety minutes, but she was lucky enough to stay on the pitch after a rush of blood to the head led to a stupid push on an opposing player. If some-one's going to live in your head like that at this level, you need to at least be charging them rent. Much the same can be said for Katie McCabe. Best Irish womens' player ever, no question about that, arguably one of the best Irish players of all time. But quite frankly, she was ratty and a stronger referee would and should have called her on it.

I expected us to be better at the Aviva. Frankly, I expected us to win. But comments from McCabe and Eileen Gleeson in the buildup were worrying. What was it that Jimmy Deenihan said about Dublin footballers back in the seventies? "Don't talk about the alligator until after you have crossed the river?" Ireland don't particularly like Wales and vice versa. Big deal. But don't go around saying it out loud and fuelling their fires before the game. That's basic. Great team, you admire them, tough task facing us, etc. Yes, it's guff, but that's the role a professional has to play. We were disrespectful of the Welsh players and that's always playing right into their hands. Amateur hour.

Game on. And Katie McCabe, our best player and talisman, is getting a really stupid yellow within five minutes. Yes, there was a bit of a tug on her. But the response was a hack tackle that could have been worse than a yellow. There's no excuses for that.

We did start well. Credit where due. We took the game to them. Couldn't actually get it on the scoreboard — Denise O'Sullivan had a great effort denied by the woodwork, and McCabe wasn't far away with another. Scoring goals is not exactly a forte of any Irish team at the moment.

And Wales absorbed all that we had to throw and gradually but oh, so very surely, took control. Courtney Brosnan made some very, very good saves, and needed to.

Penalty. I thought at first look that it was harsh but when you look at the replay, no, Patten does throw the arm out deliberately. A rush of blood to the head. There was no real need for it but yes, penalty all day long, and Wales duly tucked it away.

Wales were better. Ireland tried very hard, no fault on effort, but it was never convincing. No sense of conviction or controlled purpose. The second goal was just one where we were pushing too hard and a bit too frantically, left space wide open at the back, and Wales just tucked it away. Two goals down? I knew full well that we weren't coming back; I think everybody did at that stage.

Ireland did pull one back, a bit of a bundled effort. One more goal would take it to penalties, and in fairness, Ireland put in a great effort. But the truth is that it would have been a robbery. Wales ended up winning 2-1, andwere full value for every bit of it. They are in the Euros on merit.

Ireland have a serious bit of soul searching to do. Don't bother trying to blame Eileen Gleeson, that won't stand up any more scrutiny than the nonsense about Vera Pauw did. This is an okay Irish team, some good young players coming through and hopefully a few more coming, but as of right now, the reality isn't matching the hype. A bad night foor Ireland, but maybe it needed to happen.







FOCUS ON CHRISTMAS HOUSEPLANTS

This is the time of year when people will give and receive gifts of houseplants such as Cyclamen, Azalea, Gardenia, Poinsettia etc. Christmas houseplants obviously give their best display this time of the year but they have to be kept in the right conditions like the right temperature and humidity level to prolong their lives into the new year and longer.

The conditions of a house environment can be a challenging place for houseplants because of central heating which is very drying to houseplants especially for ones that come from humid tropical parts of the world.

There are several ways to improve conditions for your plants in the house. You can avoid placing them in draughts, especially in places where temperatures will fluctuate from very hot to very cold or in very hot areas like above or beside a radiator. Water your plants by placing them in a container of water for about twenty minutes.

For plants that need more humidity place them on a tray of gravel with some water but make sure that the plant is sitting on the gravel not the water.

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"The words of the righteous are a life-giving fountain; the words of the wicked conceal violent intentions" (Proverbs 10:11).

Welcome back dear student, here we are post-election and facing the close out of the year. Already lots of people are burnt out and the Christmas partying hasn't even begun. There used to be an advert for tea awhile back, with the parting shot that certain people are "all talk". It was funny because it's true. We have been listening to much talk, analysis, promises and fluster. We sure love to talk - often, just for the sake of saying something. Then there are the few who say little - when they talk it's worth listening to. "The wise say very little and those with understanding stay calm. Even fools seem to be wise if they keep quiet, if they don't speak they appear to understand" (Proverbs 17:27-28). Last week we spoke on the danger of unforgiveness and offence, and a major factor in all strife is — talk!
