

"I tend not to ask the obvious questions when I interview and instead let the acts take the lead and this results in interesting interviews as I learnt a lot that I would not have known about these well known bands, and I believe the people that listen will find that too." The INEC has invested half a million euro in both it's sound and lighting facilities which really enhances the arena. The INEC has also upgraded it's capacity to 4,200 making it the 2nd largest arena in the country.

She is highly regarded by her colleagues, patients and their families, as well as the wider community of Kerry and West Cork, where she





FEXCO OPENS €21M RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT FACILITY

305 new jobs are to be created as Fexco open new facility in Killorglin this week.

Irish-international fintech The company, Fexco will house its Research Development own and Innovation Centre, and RDI Hub - a world-class centre for digital innovation focused on commercialisation of innovation and research backed by Fexco, IT Tralee and Kerry County Council. Fexco has invested over €21m in the project, which was opened today by Minister of State for Transport and Sport Brendan Griffin, and the CEO of Enterprise Ireland Julie Sinnamon.

Over 125 Fexco staff will work in 37,000 sq ft of the building that is to house the company's global R&D, Innovation and IT activities, and is aimed at driving Fexco's continuing development as a leading global fintech company. The west wing of the building has been donated by Fexco to become of the home of RDI Hub, and house 136 people on its programmes and in its co-location space. RDI Hub was established last year as a not for profit public-private partnership facilitating innovation and startups in the fintech and artificial intelligence (AI) sectors.

RDI Hub – which is a not-for-profit public private partnership- will create over 305 direct jobs by 2024, and in this initial period plans to support the establishment of over 35 high-tech funded startups. Its colocation with Fexco's Research Development and Innovation Centre will add value for both parties through increased availability of specialised labour and knowledge spill overs. RDI Hub will provide training to over 1,300 participants and support 140 apprentices on its programmes

in its first 5 years. The building is dedicated to John McCarthy as a tribute to the Stanford University computer scientist. McCarthy was one of the founders of the discipline of artificial intelligence, and his father was born in Cromane, near Killorglin. In the late 1950s McCarthy invented LISP, which became the programming language of choice for AI applications. The renowned scientist's two daughters Susan and Sarah, and his son Timothy were at the opening of the building to unveil a memorial plague to their father.

has been developed used to be the home of a manufacturing facility latterly owned by US firm Simpson Manufacturing, which closed in 2012 with the loss of 30 jobs. The Government has supported its transformation into a location that will support innovation, growth and entrepreneurship in the Southwest with €3.6m in funding for RDI Hub from Enterprise Ireland.

USING A PENSION TO PAY LESS TAX:

Pension contributions provide a way of paying less income tax. Up to Revenue Limits, contributions to a pension qualify for relief from income tax. This effectively means that, where the higher rate of income tax is 40% and you are a higher rate taxpayer, a ≤ 100 contribution to a pension will only have a net cost to you of ≤ 60 (had you not made the contribution, the other ≤ 40 would have gone to the revenue as income tax).

Pensions carry another tax benefit: they grow free of tax, unlike deposit accounts in Banks etc (which are generally subject to tax on interest in the form of DIRT Tax) or investment in property or shares (where rent or dividends are liable to income tax and gains in value are subject to Capital Gains Tax).

When your pension benefits are drawn down, a Retirement Lump Sum of normally at least 25% of the value of your pension can usually be taken completely free of tax. The rest of the benefit, is usually taken in the form of a retirement fund or a pension for life, this is taxable. However many people will find themselves paying much less tax in retirement than when they were working and making pension contributions, and so will often not pay a lot of tax on their pension income when they retire.



The 'Mocks' are a useful trial run but the real exam begins on 3rd June

The 'Mocks' or 'Practice Exams' are usually held in schools during Feb. They have nothing to do with the State Examinations Commission (SEC) and the exam papers are provided and corrected by independent educational groups. It's worth doing the 'Mocks' for the experience but don't let them distract you from the State Exams in June. Don't burn yourself out at this early stage by overestimating the 'Mocks'.

The 'Mocks' provide an opportunity to work on your presentation, timing, answering techniques and current knowledge. They are usually marked externally so they provide you with an impartial assessment of your readiness for the State Exams. It's an opportunity to see if you can deliver the required information within the time allowed on a neatly presented script. Avail of the 'Mocks' to become familiar with the logistics and technicalities of each exam paper. The quality of your answering is the core of any exam so learn from the 'Mocks' how to approach each paper. Keep the content of your answer relevant to the question asked. Read each question carefully before deciding which ones to answer. Be concise, accurate and relevant. Be familiar with the format of each paper well before each exam session. Know how the paper is presented. What topics are examined? How many questions must be answered? What styles of question can you expect on the exam paper? Be familiar with the choices available on the paper. Is one or more questions compulsory? Be particularly careful about a paper, which is subdivided into subsections. Without prior knowledge of such a paper you could easily fail to address the relevant number of questions.

Use the 'Mocks' to test your allocation of time. The 'Mocks' are a great time trial. Go into the 'Mocks' determined to attempt the required number of questions. Work out in advance the approximate time you have for each question. The allocation of time to each question should be proportionate to the marks available for that question. Let me emphasise that if you attempt the required number of questions you will maximise your grade in that subject.

When your 'Mock' exam paper is handed to you read the instructions carefully. Spend a few minutes reading the entire paper. Keep to your pre-prepared answering plan and once you have made your choice of questions, start with a question you can answer well. When you have finished each question, reread it to ensure that you haven't omitted any part. Allow a few minutes at the end of the exam to read back over your answers and to check your numbering and presentation. Stay in the exam hall until the time is up even if you are finished early as some extra information may come to you. Every mark counts so don't leave any after you!

When your marked 'Mock' papers are returned, go over them to identify your strengths and weaknesses as outlined above. The old maxim of making your mistakes in the 'Mocks' and getting things right in the State Exams next June is as true as ever. As the saying goes, practice makes perfect and the 'Mocks' are the perfect practice!

MORE GARDA RESOURCES NEEDED in Kerry to tackle drugs – Moriarty

ianna Fáil General Election candidate for Kerry Cllr. Norma Moriarty has outlined a series of measures to increase the powers and resources of local Gardaí in the fight against drugs.

"Unfortunately, Kerry is not immune to the scourge of drugs and related crime. It has seeped into too many communities in the county in the past few years and far too many families and young people have been affected," she said. "The illegal drugs trade has been allowed to fester and grow at the same time as local Garda numbers were being depleted. Not enough is being done to support our local gardaí in preventing an escalation of this criminality, and we are failing to steer young people away from drug use. "Not only have local garda numbers been cut, numbers in specialised garda units were also slashed by Fine Gael who have just buried their heads in the sand about the impact of the drugs epidemic on all communities. The entire nation has been left horrified by the brutal murder of a teenager in Drogheda last week. This is a symptom of an escalating drugs and gang problem across this country that will continue to worsen unless we see

radical action from our politicians. "The fact of the matter is that all sectors of society and every user must bear responsibility for gangland deaths and the terror inflicted on communities by the drugs trade. Fianna Fáil has called for a national education and awareness campaign to bring home to "recreational" users the role they play in gangland criminality. "We need to see a significant increase garda numbers both here in Kerry and nationally. The force needs to stand at 16,000 gardaí across the country. Gardaí must be resourced to operate 24hour around the clock surveillance of the gang leaders that are controlling the sale and supply of drugs in our communities. They know who they are – they just need the resources to monitor them.

"We also need to strengthen the laws around jailing gang criminals, giving gardaí the same powers with gang criminals as they have with the Provisional IRA. This would allow the "belief" of a Chief Superintendent that someone was involved in gangland crime to be introduced into evidence. "The unavoidable fact is that there would be no drugs trade without the drug users. We need to target young people that are particularly at risk of being lured by drugs and the associated criminality", concluded Cllr. Moriarty.

PROGRESS On Pedestrian Crossing for Fossa N.S

Following numerous representations and the taking place of a deputation that Maura Healy-Rae requested in March, 2019, she am glad that Kerry County Council have agreed to submit an application to Transport Infrastructure Ireland that will include a proposed pedestrian crossing adjacent to Fossa National School. "The formal application will be forwarded to the TII in the next week. The TII will then consider the feasibility of this proposal. I will campaign and lobby to ensure that the TII approves this, which will drastically improve the current, precarious safety issues that children, parents and staff are facing", Cllr. Healy-Rae told the Killarney Outlook.

"I believe this is a major step in the right direction as KCC initially did not support our request for a pedestrian crossing in the area. Through continuous representations by the parents, Principal Clifford and myself, there is now positive progress", she added.

Call for unused properties to be let

At the most recent Killarney Municipal Area meeting, Councillor Michael Gleeson asked that Kerry County Council would invite property owners in Killarney Town, Rathmore Town and in the villages of Kilcummina and Barraduff to indicate if they have unused portions in their residences and if they are available for letting through the Council to individuals or families.

Kerry County Council replied that it will shortly undertake a public campaign on various letting/leasing Schemes in order to encourage property owners to consider making any vacant property available to the Council as part of the Social Housing Programme.

Councillor Gleeson welcomed the reply and expressed the hope that there will be a positive response. He said that if such a Scheme is successful it would provide much needed accommodation for people in need of a home and it would also re-invigorate locations that have experienced population decrease."

SUSPENDED DEXA SCAN Service at University Hospital Kerry is about to reopen



John Brassil has welcomed news that the suspended DEXA Scan service in University Hospital Kerry is about to reopen.

Fianna Fails junior spokesperson on Primary Care, Community Health services, held discussions with hospital management today and has been informed that the service will begin again and begin to clear the massive backlog of Kerry patients that have been on a waiting list for this particular scan service. Announcing the reopening of the service, Brassil described it as a win for the Kerry patients who are waiting on these scans.

"Having a machine that is worth so much money just sitting idle in University Hospital Kerry makes no sense. Today's announcement is to be welcomed.

John Brassil, who will be advocating for a health related ministerial position at the cabinet table should Fianna Fail lead the next government, credited Councillor Mikey Sheehy who works in Brassils office for continually raising this issue.

"Mikey sits on the Southern Health Forum and has been fighting this case with me for some time now. This news is well overdue and I would like to see UHK move to clear the existing waiting list as soon as possible. The scanner was bought by the Friends of Kerry General Hospital in 2014. It had been lying idle for two years, as there were no radiographers to operate it. An increasing shortage of radiographers resulted in the suspension of the service in late 2017. €110,000 was fund raised for the purchase of the machine for UHK.

VAT ON TOURISM

Recent announcements of an investment of \in 500,000 for the design of the new Killarney to Farranfore bypass and an additional \in 150,000 to progress preliminary work on the Lewis Road-bypass junction are encouraging but there is a need to advance these important projects in a timely manner.

The Chamber will be calling on the newly formed government to prioritise the outer bypass, from Lissivigeen to Farranfore and from Lissivigeen to Castlelough, which is a critically important project.

We have been hugely patient on this matter given that the plan was first unveiled in 2004 only to be shelved in 2011. Given the very concerning traffic congestion problems encountered, in and approaching Killarney,



the time to give the project the green light is now as proper access is a key requirement if the town is to reach its potential.

Chamber is aware that the planning, design and implementation of individual road projects is a matter for Transport Infrastructure Ireland, in conjunction with the local authorities, but we urge our public representatives to put this matter at the very top of their priority list and to no longer accept excuses from government departments why it is not being delivered.

SAVING OUR BUSINESSES

The uncertainty over Brexit and the high cost of doing business are taking their toll on businesses in Killarney and new national incentives to support small and medium sized operations and independent retailers are very urgently required.

The high cost of doing business remains a key concern with many local traders highlighting the significant negative impact that escalating insurance costs and local authority rates are having on competiveness.

The escalating costs pose a real threat to businesses and additional supports, in terms of tackling insurance costs, rates and rents, must be implemented to save jobs and to boost the local economy. A number of businesses in Killarney have been forced to close their doors and that scenario, which is devastating for the owners, their staff, their suppliers and their families, must be addressed.

LOOPED WALK PROPOSAL

While work has been progressing on a number of key sections in the development of a fully looped amenity trail around Lough Leane and Muckross Lake, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce wants to see the project brought to fruition as quickly as possible to create another world class attraction in the town.

The 29km trail, when complete, will be a real gem in the town in the park with a full circuit around the lakes, with accessible trails for walkers and cyclists, and it has real potential to deliver an iconic attraction that would be renowned internationally.

It is Chamber's wish that the funding required for the looped walk will be provided as a priority and that the various parties engaged in the project, including Kerry County Council, the NPWS, Fáilte Ireland and Transport Infrastructure Ireland, can make the necessary progress in the weeks and months ahead.

EASING THE GRIDLOCK

Killarney's tourism future is too important to take for granted and, in that respect, Chamber has ongoing major concerns over chronic traffic congestion and inadequate parking in and around the town.

Tourism alone sustains over 3,000 jobs directly and more than 7,000 in the wider Killarney community but, as Chamber has warned previously, congestion in any form can go against our all-important brand promise.

It is anticipated that the number of visitors to Killarney will grow by 30 per cent to 1.4 million by 2025 and if that is achieved, the economic impact will increase from \notin 410 million to \notin 600 million within six years.

But while the provision of a new bus and car park on Rock Road last year was a hugely

positive development, courtesy of Kerry County Council, traffic congestion and a lack of parking remains a barrier to business growth and, aside of local concerns and frustrations, the visitors themselves have highlighted the need for better traffic management.

Beyond the tourism sector, traffic congestion and a lack of parking is a very real daily challenge for many of our members who are engaged in industrial, commercial and retail activity as well as the residents of the town. Funding is required to help the local authority to realise its goals in this regard and we would ask Kerry's TDs to bring their case to the corridors of power to provide the necessary supports to Kerry County Council.

SUPPORTING TOWN LIVING

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce saw great merit in a recent proposal brought to Kerry County Council asking the local authority to seek confirmation from property owners in Killarney town centre if the upper floors of their premises or dwellings were available for letting to individuals or families. If this proposal found acceptance with the owners and the council, it would provide much needed accommodation and help revitalise the locations in question, giving the urban area a whole new lease of life and, in the process, it would provide a sustainable impact on the business of the town as well as reducing the possibility of urban sprawl.

There is huge merit to the proposal to create attractive, well thought-out urban spaces that can be made enjoyable to live in and that would benefit the entire community.

KILLARNEY SITE VISITS

Killarney Chamber will continue to lobby for more site visits by the State agencies, including the IDA and Enterprise Ireland, to Killarney to determine potential and maximise job creation opportunities.

Killarney, South Kerry and, indeed, the entire county of Kerry needs far greater diversity in relation to job opportunities and there is a highly skilled and extremely well educated workforce to call on with the skills to make their mark.

Killarney may well be the county's tourism capital but it is imperative that communities



on the Ring of Kerry and on the Dingle Peninsula can benefit from sustainable jobs which can help create vibrant villages and towns that will ensure they become much more attractive to visitors.

Without diversification, we run the risk of increased urbanisation in areas like Killarney and Tralee which would come at the expense of rural areas and it will impact negatively on the sustainability of our traditional industries like agriculture, fishing and tourism.

LEWIS ROAD MASTERPLAN

Chamber will encourage the newly elected government to liaise closely with and support Kerry County Council and Killarney Municipal District Council in relation to the masterplan for the all-important Lewis Road site.

There will be just one opportunity to do the right thing and choose the correct option when developing that key site and the hope is that all decisions will be made following proper local dialogue with interested parties and with representative organisations such as the Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

PRIMARY CARE CENTRE

In a town where the population multiplies ten-fold during the busy summer season, the need for a Primary Care Centre in Killarney has never been greater.

There are several sites in very close proximity to the town that would be suitable to provide an accessible, professional and first class health care services with general practitioners, nursing staff, pharmacists, physical and occupational therapists and others with access to quality and relevant equipment that will ensure locals and visitors are afforded the care and dignity they deserve in terms of health care.

NEW KILLARNEY CYCLEWAY


Turning plans for the development of a new world class walkway and cycle route in Killarney into reality is one of the main priorities for Killarney.

Running from Ross Road to Flesk Bridge, the route will provide a continuous off-road route between the national park at Knockreer and the park at Muckross. The project has now reached a stage where everything is ready to go once the required funding is secured and Chamber will encourage Kerry's newly elected TDs to lobby extensively for the release of finance to help progress the project as a matter of priority.

The route will run through the townlands of Woodlawn, Bunrower, Scrahane, and Demesne and the proposed works will consist of the construction of a 2.5m wide cycleway and walkway with boundary walls and fences and all associated ancillary and accommodation works.

POSTER FREE COUNTRY

Killarney was one of the first towns in the country, over 20 years ago, to ask politicians of all parties and none – and their representatives – not to erect election posters within the urban boundaries. We are appreciative of the fact that, with a very rare and inadvertent exception, they have honoured that agreement and we thank them for doing so.



WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated. Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

Risk of falls

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75 in the UK

Risks for children

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Driving risks

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.

SIOBHAN O'LEARY LOSES A THRILLER



Katie Taylor may get (and fully deserve) most of the headlines, but she has spearheaded a surge in women's boxing that has enervated the whole country and Kilcummin's Siobhan O'Leary epitomises that quality. She lost out by a tiny points margin (58 - 55) to Greek-born Scottish opponent Eftychia Kathopouli for the Celtic Nations title after an absolute thriller. Both fighters were aggressive and controlled, with O'Leary taking the lead and landing cleaner shots (she dropped Kathopioulis at the end of the first), but Kathopouli kept absorbing everything and coming right back at her. Both boxers were a credit to the sport and to themselves, and it was also great to see O'Leary's composed grace and magnanimity in defeat - something all too rare in a professional sport that too often relies on bluster instead of this kind of real quality to sell tickets. I haven't seen O'Leary in action myself, but I most certainly want to, and it would be great

if she gets an Irish title shot against fellow superfeatherweight Elaine Greenan this year.

KERRY CAPTAINCY

Beaufort had a motion before last Monday's County Board Meeting to change the policy of the County Champions selecting the Kerry captain and instead giving responsibility for that decision to the Management and County Executive instead. It generated huge debate on the floor on the night, with Beaufort's Frank Coffey speaking brilliantly in proposing it, but a number of delegates speaking equally eloquently against it. In the end the motion got a simple majority of 50-48 but, since it required a 2\3rd majority, the system for selecting the captaincy. However, the Executive did reserve the right to select the captain if the nominated player is not selected or picks up an injury.

NFL: KERRY 1-15 GALWAY 2-11

There are no grand larcenies in football at this time of year, but this certainly gualifies as petty theft in an Austin Stack Park that was packed to the rafters. Galway were the better side here overall, with Shane Walsh the main tormentor. They have adopted a much more positive approach under former IT Tralee student Padraig Jovce and it looks good for them. That doesn't remotely worry me though; we are behind them in our training programme and that's ground we will make up easily. They used the mark well in the first half but left point and, more crucially, goal chances behind them. Our defence looked a bit jittery throughout. Shane Ryan made two good saves, and I for one thought he showed a great improvement in kick-outs, especially the speed at which he was taking them.

Liam Kearney made a hugely impressive debut

in the middle and Micheal Burns' direct approach worked well on the forty. Kerry were slow enough on the attack, working the ball slowly whereas Galway were hitting fast, long passes. Once the ball did get inside, Clifford was as deadly as always but it was James O'Donoghue who was the talking point; he had the verve and dash of old and looks razor-sharp. Tommy Walsh came on for him at half-time and I'm sorry, but the big lion-hearted Rahillys man just doesn't fit. He gave everything to the cause, but with very little production (one great point was very much an exception). Shane Walsh's goal came from simply cutting straight through the heart of Kerry's defence - I've been seeing too many of those goals too often. Yes, he's fast, but we didn't know that? Galway paid the price for a clumsy black card late on, that rule is working brilliantly (the other changes aren't, they make the game ponderous). Paul Geaney again spent a lot of time working out the field, but he's a predator and proved it with a late finish that was far harder than it looked; very few forwards can tuck those away. Killian Spillane also showed great composure for the winner. Overall, a great night and a real boost for Kerry. One small gripe – the match programme bore no relation to the starting team and why do we keep our subs secret? It's far from unique to Kerry, but a match programme nowadays is only so much kindling. People are paying good money to watch

games; the teams should not be so secretive. County Chairman Tim Murphy mentioned at the recent County Board Meeting that Croke Park may well address the matter at Congress.





FRIARY HOSTS BLESSING OF THE THROATS

The Franciscan Friary in Killarney held the Blessing of the Throats on Monday last, February 3rd.


The Blessing of the Throats is a sacramental of the Roman Catholic Church, ordinarily celebrated on February 3, the feast day of Saint Blaise of Sebaste. It also celebrated in some of the Eastern Catholic Churches, and in parishes of the Anglican Communion on the same day as a commemoration.

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a physician before becoming a bishop. His cult spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat.

Details regarding the miraculous healing of the boy vary. One account relates that the miracle occurred during the journey to take Blaise to prison when he placed his hand on the boy's head and prayed; another that the miracle happened while Blaise was in prison when he picked up two candles provided to him and formed a cross around the boy's throat. The use of candles for the blessing of throats stems from the candles that Blaise used while in prison. When an old woman's pig had been miraculously rescued from a wolf by Saint Blaise, she would visit him in prison, bringing him food and candles to bring him light in his dark cell.




