Have we passed up on our underpasses?

Is it time we had underpasses in Killarney to access Killarney National Park for walkers and cyclists. The green wave of cycling and walking which gave a spurt to walking infrastructure has passed. This new Government will not be so keen and are already committed to reversing - in the words of minister Michael Healy-Rae - the two to one public to road transport. This will be in favour of the car.

Alas. Let us hope there is still room for safety for walkers and cyclists.

The first or New Entrance to Killarney National Park, much loved by people coming from town because of the handy car park, is a case in point. The traffic on the N71 to and from Muckross on a Sunday or a bank holiday has to be experienced to be appreciated.

You have to queue to cross the dangerous road and depend entirely on the good will of motorists - both ways.

Last Sunday saw lines of people, some with buggies, some with bikes and small children. All waiting for ages to cross the road.

Another blind spot on the N71 is crossing from Muckross Park Hotel to the Abbey.

Then to the north of the town away from the leisure areas are the crossings at the Lidl and the Reeks which are little respected by ! Worse, at such an occasion security literally

motorists even when people have feet on the pedestrian crossings.

Is it time then we had underpasses in and around Killarney? Much safer than pedestrian crossings, these could be pursued in the interests of safety and of encouraging walking and cycling. Perhaps our four Government TDs and myriad Government councillors will see to it.

Old manners for new politics wanted

Old manners are needed for his new political era - at home and abroad, it strikes me.

Certainly there was an element of speaking truth to power in the way Episcopalian Bishop Mariann Budd lectured newly elected President Trump at the National Prayer Service in Washington. I might agree with much of what she said about sympathy for vulnerable minorities. But surely there is a time and a place; her emotional pleas for mercy were embarrassing and hard to stomach on the occasion. It felt uncomfortable. And to be fair to the Trump entourage they held their dignity apart from a raised eyebrow.

Our President Higgins caused great offence at the annual memorial to the Holocaust in the Mansion House bringing up Gaza. dragged people out. The international press had a field day about the Irish president.

I hear despite his cuddly image, Michael D is a stickler for protocol. Cross your Ts the wrong way with him and you'll hear about it! Of course, manners and etiquette and protocol are not the same thing at all. Manners is much older and stems from a deeper, more personal well. It has much to do with grace, and takes second place to vain self-assertion.

People might think of Jane Austen and Shakespeare when musing on manners, writers who captured the delicate sensitive nature of proper manners for the occasion. But I also think of the women of Lismongane, Lakeview and Killalee. Like the Greek chorus, they had a take comedy and tragedy and would have summed it up saying Michael D and the Bishop "went too far".

Locally, Michael Healy-Rae chose to drop a call live on air on Drive Time because he didn't like the question and this wasn't his finest hour . He is an experienced media performer - but always as an opponent. Being a member of Government will require a different, more delicate attitude. It was anyway ungracious of him to remind Sarah McInerney it was she and her producer who had invited him onto the programme. That need not have been said.

Meanwhile the art of keeping silent is holding sway over brother Danny who is not only sitting away from his brother in the Dáil but is saying nothing at all - on and off air. Most unusually, Danny had no comment for Radio Kerry this week on being muzzled when they asked him to discuss the matter of not having opposition speaking time.

We are indeed entering a new political era.

No smoke without fire

Last week we spoke of the need for several sources of power, not least chimneys. Chimneys are actually being taken off houses by the council it emerged since. Two houses in Kilgarvan, a village with three councillors and two TDs, are having roofs removed by the council to take out the chimneys, a council meeting was told on Friday.

The chimneys were being removed to make the house more airtight to achieve higher energy efficiency in line with national guidelines, the Kenmare MD meeting in Killorglin was told.

What Kerry County Council were doing was "the talk of the parish and beyond" Councillor Johnny Healy-Rae said.

Whoever would be allocated those two houses now would have "no gas ring, way to boil a kettle and no open fire and no way of heating themselves" in the event of future massive weather events and power outages.

He also guestioned the policy of total dependence on electricity especially when weather knocked out the power.

To make matters worse, the houses where the chimneys were being removed in Kilgarvan were directly opposite the local power station.

"These two houses are facing the (ESB) substation in Kilgarvan and they will be looking at the substation and they will have no heat and not be able to boil a kettle. It's nonsensical," he said.

Johnny was right too in questioning all this craze for insulation to a degree it is unhealthy.

Fresh air was good for people.

"I can't understand the obsession with sealing the house to the 'nth degree," he said.

Teddy O'Sullivan Casey said surely there were other What ways to make chimneys airtight than taking them off houses.

We will have to guard our chimneys in Killarney.

The Smart Pledge Project is a school-driven initiative supported by policy guidance from the Department of Education and is rooted in growing concerns about the negative impact that early smartphone use and social media exposure can have on young children. Schools in the Killarney area have come together to take a proactive approach in fostering healthier childhood development, reducing peer pressure on parents to provide

smartphones, and creating safer learning environments for children. **Key objectives of the Smart Pledge Project:**

Encourage parents to delay smartphone purchases for young children. Promote offline childhood experiences and social interactions.

Reduce the pressure on parents to conform to early smartphone adoption.

Foster safer school environments with reduced distractions.

Support mental well-being and development in young children by limiting social media exposure.

The participating schools believe that collective action is key to reducing the societal pressure surrounding early smartphone ownership. Parents are invited to join the pledge and work together to build a healthier and more mindful digital culture for children.






CASTLEISLAND STUDENTS MARK THE HOLOCAUST

The students of Presentation Secondary School marked the 80th anniversary of the Holocaust last Monday, one of the darkest chapters in human history. Eighty years ago, the concentration camp of Auschwitz was liberated by the Soviet Troops but not before over one million Jewish people perished there.

The students planted crocuses in remembrance of six million Jews who were forced to wear the Star of David. These flowers symbolise hope and resilience, reminding us that even in the face of unimaginable darkness, new life begins again.

'We remember them not only to honour their memory but to remind ourselves of the devastating hatred, prejudice and discrimination that the Jewish people endured during World War Two', said Saoirse Collins. Planting the crocuses is a symbolic way of remembering those who had died, not just in Auschwitz. It made us realise the importance of equality and standing up against injustice in the world.

One of the students explained that an estimated 1.1 million people, mostly Jews were killed in Auschwitz-Birkenau. Just 220,000 are still alive

with more than 20pc over 90 years of age. It is up to us all to continue their story and learn from the lessons of the past', said Faith Bradley of Presentation Secondary School.





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Senior cycle subject choice is very important – Buyer Beware!



Students study one of three Leaving Cert programs at senior cycle. The majority prefer the traditional Leaving Cert (LC). The Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) is similar to the traditional Leaving Cert, except that students also take three Link Modules (Enterprise Education, Preparation for Work and Work Experience). The Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) is strongly vocational, meaning that its job and employment focused. The subject areas are more practical than academic.

SELECTION

Subject selection for Leaving Cert is very important because the subjects you choose will influence your further study and career. Give this process serious consideration and decide what senior cycle subjects suit you best. Leaving Cert students usually take seven subjects. Mathematics, Irish and English are compulsory. It's advisable to study a modern language, which many third level courses have as an entry requirement.

OPTIONAL

Your task is to select three optional subjects – four if not taking a third language. Make sure that your subjects fulfil the entry requirements for your courses of interest. Many colleges also impose additional subject requirements which are course specific. It's also worth knowing that a number of third level courses use criteria of selection, such as art portfolio, interview, audition and suitability test, in addition to Leaving Cert exam points.

The Fergal Quinn Award is presented annually to LCA students across the country who achieve exceptional results in their exams. This recognition celebrates their dedication, perseverance, and academic excellence. Pictured is Blanka Simhadri with her award.

POINTS TOTAL

Six subjects are used from any one sitting of the Leaving Cert exam to calculate total points' score. The potential maximum points' score in the Leaving Cert points' scale is 600 or 625 if Higher Level Maths is one of the six subjects counted, as 25 bonus points are awarded for Higher Level Maths for H6 or above.

LCVP

Students studying the LCVP may include the points awarded for the Link Modules as one of the six subjects used for calculating points - 66 points for a Distinction (80% to 100%), 46 points for a Merit (65% to < 80%) and 28 points for a Pass (50% to < 65%).

FLAIR

Keep the following criteria of subject selection in mind when making your choice. Firstly, if you have a flair for - a special ability in, an aptitude for - a particular subject, you will get tremendous personal satisfaction from studying that subject.

ACHIEVEMENT

Secondly, note the subjects in which you are achieving good grades. The Leaving Cert exam is a test of achievement. Grades and points determine entry to higher education. There is little benefit to you in taking a subject which you find difficult and are unlikely to do well in. Points' potential at higher (H) level is far greater than at ordinary (O) level. For example, H3 is worth 77 points while O3 is worth only 37 points. Study as many of your subjects at higher level as you can cope with.

INTEREST

Thirdly, select subjects you are interested in because you will work harder at those. Of all the variables that determine success at school, at college and in your career, interest is the most critical. It's likely that the subjects that interest you at school will influence your college course choices in two years' time.

REQUIRED

Fourthly, be aware of subjects that are required for any particular career interests you may have. Each college has a system of general and specific entry requirements which you must satisfy before you are considered for a place in a particular course. For example, the minimum general entry requirements for UCC are 2H5 and 4H7/O6. An O6/H7 in a laboratory science subject in the Leaving Cert exam is a specific entry requirement for a degree course in Nursing.

CRITERIA

The task facing you, therefore, is to select a subject grouping that will satisfy the four

criteria of Flair (aptitude), Achievement, Interest and Required. It may help you to remember that you need to make a FAIR choice of subjects. Study the information carefully, give careful consideration to your subject choice, think about your course options and the related careers. In the end choose wisely as subject choice is the first step on your road to college.



While cardio exercises such as running, cycling, and swimming are great for burning calories, they don't provide the same long-term benefits as strength training. Strength training not only helps build muscle mass, but it also increases metabolism, which can lead to sustained weight loss over time. Additionally, strength training can help improve bone density, which is especially important for women as they age. (Continued next week)

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GLAUCOMA

WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular siaht tests.

Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

Symptoms

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset)

is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision

because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as openangle

glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

TREATMENT

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You

will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with openangle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.

MEP Kelly: Storm Éowyn Highlights Need for Reform of Forestry Licensing for Windblown Trees

Seán Kelly, MEP for Ireland South and Leader of the Fine Gael Delegation in the European Parliament, has called for urgent reforms to Ireland's forestry licensing system to ensure a more reactive approach to dealing with windblown trees.

"Ireland's forestry sector is already facing significant challenges, and the slow licensing process for clearing windblown trees is not helping matters," Kelly stated.

"Storms like Éowyn have caused widespread damage to forests across the country, but current regulations are preventing forest owners from acting swiftly to salvage valuable timber and protect their woodlands."

Under the current system, a felling licence is required to clear windblown trees, a process that can take years to secure. Additionally, if a forest road is needed to extract the fallen trees, another licence is required, further delaying recovery efforts. "This is unworkable" Kelly stressed. "By the time a licence is granted, much of the fallen timber has already rotted, leading to unnecessary economic losses for forest owners."

Kelly warned that delays in removing windblown trees could have serious consequences beyond financial loss. "When trees are uprooted and left in place, they create a domino effect, pulling down surrounding trees and causing further destruction. On top

of that, precariously positioned trees pose a real danger to people walking in or working around these forests," he said.

To address these issues, Kelly is calling for an expedited licensing process that allows for the rapid felling and removal of windblown trees. "We need a fast-track system that enables forest owners to act quickly after a storm," he said. "Other European countries take immediate action to clear fallen trees – Ireland needs to do the same."

Kelly also emphasised the importance of a streamlined process for replanting. "Forests play a crucial role in our fight against climate change, and when trees are lost due to storms, they must be replaced as soon as possible. A more efficient planting licensing system is essential."

As extreme weather events become more frequent due to climate change, Kelly insists that action is needed now. "If we're serious about supporting forestry in Ireland, we must reform the licensing system to allow forest owners to react when disaster strikes. We have a new government in place, who have committed to reviewing the forestry appeals process. As part of this, the procedures for licensing of windblown trees should also be updated. We should not let the opportunity go to waste."

Killarney Primary Care Centre

The Minister for Health has responded to Kerry Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill's query on what progress has been made on the delivery of a Primary Care Health Centre in Killarney, stating that the Health Service Executive (HSE) and Kerry County Council (KCC) have a joint venture planning application for the development of the Áras Padraig site in the town. The Minister also states that construction should be completed within 3 years, if planning is obtained.

"This will be a major step forward for the people of Killarney and the surrounding hinterland of East and Mid Kerry. The Minister also expects to have an interim facility in place in 10 to 12 months, in the grounds of the old St Finan's Hospital" said Deputy Cahill.

"I am delighted to see this progress and I believe that its delivery will have the knock-on affect of easing pressure of overcrowding and queues in University Hospital Kerry and will bring a more efficient Health service to the people of Kerry" added Michael Cahill TD.



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

There is no way of sugar coating this result. It was a tough day in the office for Scotts Lakers. What was always going to be a tricky assignment against a team who had served their time in the Superleague was made all the harder by a "quartam horribilis" where anything that could go wrong did in the second period.

With 4.20 to go Dunlea cut that to one, that being the cue for Wittinger to give St Pauls the lead. But some good defensive play from Strother and Haiby led to breakaway scores which put Killester back in the driving seat with 2.18 on the clock. Not to be derailed, St Pauls stuck to the task, Dunlea and Diop cutting the gap to one. Killesters' offence had all but dried up now and Wittinger put her side ahead again from the free throw line. 

LATE GOALS SEE KERRY WIN A THRILLER

National League Round 2:

Kerry 5-15 Derry 1-24

I didn't make it up to it. I did consider it, I had a friend driving up on the Saturday. I could have gotten the train from Dublin and met him up there, but overnighting in Dublin and then an early start to make Celtic Park by 12.30? Ah no. I actually like an early game; I like to be on the road home early enough. But frankly, I was at the last Kerry Derry match, last year's quarter-final, and I don't care what anybody says. It was hideous to watch. Kerry actually won fairly well and controlled the game, but it was slow, negative football. I could not be watching that again. You could hear the players talking to each other in Croke Park, that's how dead the atmosphere was. A week later Cork played Limerick in the hurling - a friend brought his son and they were sitting beside each other in the Hogan, and they couldn't even hear each other, such was the atmosphere. Spot te difference. The fact that the hurling was so good in comparison was the death knell for what was beng passed off as football.

I'm done with debates on the new rules. In my opinion we all owe Jim Gavin, Eamonn Fitzmaurice et al a huge debt. Sure, there's tinkering to be done, but the comparison between Kerry and Derry in this year's league to last year's championship? A brave new world and I loved it. I'm not going back to the old games, the blanket defence, the fear of kicking it, handpass after handpass.....it was chronic. I didn't go to the Kerry Armagh game last year and if I had, I would have brought a book to read.

This one? This was excitement from start to finish. Real attacking football.

Let's not paper over any cracks at the same time. It definitely wasn't a perfect showing by Kerry. In fact, I thought Derry looked more dangerous for most of it and deserved to win overall. Kerry have plenty to work on. One on one defending would be a priority – some of our top guns had tough outings, but they are just back into action so I'd give a lot of leeway.

But first week of February? Frankly, I don't want Kerry to be throwing any hatchet and

handle at a game like this. Our first outing in the National League, and I have always believed that the National League has no great bearing on the Championship. There was a correlation previously, but that was because there was a less prolonged (unnecessarily) schedule and based more on the fact of elite teams than causation. I also do know that both Dublin and Armagh won the Championship after emerging from Division Two, which only reinforces my belief that you are only burning energy too soon to tear into the National League.

Jason Foley was one of those who found it hard going, but there aren't many out there who have ever contained Shane McGuigan, and the wily frontman soon had his team on the board. Brendan Rogers — I thought himself and Ethan Rafferty were both up there as man of the match contenders — boomed over a two pointer.

Back came Kerry. My first look at real speed in attack, and that's what I love most about the new rules. Fantastic move, Paudie Clifford laying off to Conor Geaney for a confident finish. I was very impressed with Paudie as the driver in our engine room, while Diarmuid O'Connor did a lot of the heavy lifting. I would still say that Glass and Anton Tohill edged midfield, but they got a much harder battle of it than I had expected.

Seán O'Shea with a free that was brought forward (the sanction may seem harsh, but too many teams have developed a tactic of deliberately slowing down frees), Ethan Doherty with a good reply. This is nice fast football

Very good defending by Kerry. Damien Bourke is already catching the eye, more so than bigger names. McGuigan narrowly wide. A let off.

Barry Dan O'Sullivan with a fine point. Niall Toner in reply from a free.

Great turnover by Paudie Clifford, that was very good pressure by Kerry. A year ago that would have been a massed defence. A fast counter-attack sees Conor Geaney nudge Kerry in front 1-3 to 0-5. Barry Dan stretches the lead to two.

Derry with a surge. Paul Cassidy with a point. Shane McGuigan angles over beautifully with his left leg.

Seán O'Shea isn't having the best of days but that's another bread and butter free – by his standards anyway. Derry drop a ball short before Niall Toner squares things up again. The crowd are loving this; so am I. 1-5 to 0-8. Kerry coming at pace again. Direct and straight for the jugular, and again Derry aren't sharp enough to deal with it as Dylan Geaney lays off to his cousin for another green flag. Ben McCarron with a great two pointer. Derry are more willing to go for those than Kerry, which surprised me a little bit. Niall Toner with a point and we are level again, 1-8 to 0-11.

Mighty fetch by Anton Tohill. Namely son of a namely father and his Da would have been proud of that one, which leads to a point for Diarmuid Baker. Donncha Gilmore takes a mark and nudges Derry further in front.

I'm happy enough with Kerry's first half display. Truth be told, I wasn't really expecting Kerry to win away against Derry with an experimental team. Glad to see new players getting a run – despite the three late changes to the starting team. It happens, sometimes a player can tweak something in the warm-up, but three? I dunno. Like I keep saying, I want the likes of Jason, Tom, Paudie, and Seanie taking it handy enough at the moment and storing up for the hard and more important yards later on. This is the time for new faces to get their chance, I would feel that several of them seized their opportunities. It'll be tougher to get jerseys with the likes of the Crokes and Stacks lads in harness.

Half-time Derry 0-13 Kerry 2-5

Conor Glass is his usual trojan self for Derry, covering some amount of ground, and he puts his side three points in front at the start of the second half. Paul Cassidy astutely notches another. Derry look a little bit too fast and direct for Kerry to contain at the moment. They also have a slight edge in midfield and are running a good press. We might be in a little bit of trouble here, not because Kerry are playing bad, but Derry look good. That's eight points on the trot.

Conor Geaney looks very assured here and opens Kerry's second half account. We need it, but Donncha Gilmore calmly cancels it out straightaway. 0-17 to 2-6.

Five points. It almost feels to me like 'next score wins', as we used to play as kids while Mammy while calling us in for dinner. Jack O'Connor will admit after the match that he would have been quite happy to take a draw in the closing minutes. I'd be more of a pessimist (remember, I hadn't been expecting too much out of this game anyway). If Derry





pushed it out to six, I couldn't see us getting any draw.

Dylan ľve watched three Geaney. generations of Geaneys play football now and I've no doubt it goes a lot further back in their DNA. Dylan steadies himself and fires over a confident and glorious score. That's the kind of thing that will make spectators gasp. A two pointer, and a gorgeous bit of skill. Even if he had missed, I like that he had the self-belief to take it on. I want more of that in Kerry football long term. Enough of playing wth what I will generously call 'caution'.

Ethan Doherty with a point. Great burst of pace and well-timed by both the passer and receiver, but he'll actually be disappointed that he didn't keep it down and test Shane Ryan. Incidentally, Shane played somewhat conservatively, mostly concentrating on his primary duties, and I liked it. Derry gambled on Neil McNicholl as a bit of arover. Mind you, suggestions afterwards that it had cost them goals is nonsense. Those were close-range, well-worked finishes where the keeper was helpless. He wasn't caught out of position for them; his rearguard was and that was because of the pace. They do say that everything is confirmatory of a prejudice. Kerry hanging on a bit again. Seán O'Shea with a free from outside the two point arc. Small bit of luck about that one; I would say that Kerry got small and unintentional breaks a few times from the referee. Yes, sometimes that actually happens. That should actually have been a free to Derry, their player was just pointing out our mistake in keeping three in the half. But I only saw that in a replay afterwards, criticising the ref would only be hurling from the ditch. Like I say, it happens to every team, it's how you react that matters. Brendan Rogers and Diarmuid O'Connor are key players for their respective teams (Diarmuid has been having a really immense second half) and both work the scoreboard. Niall Toner with a tap-over free, Seán O'Shea with a reply from play. Derry aren't pulling away, but we are huffing and puffing a bit to stay with them. Kerry's subs are beginning to have an impact, though. Did Jack keep a bit in reserve? I don't really think so (not that I'd be in any hurry to second guess Jack!), I think it's just an energy-sapping game now. And I'm fine with that, by the way, albeit the idea of five or six weeks in a row at this intensity? I'll be curious about that long-term toll at a time of year where most teams are building muscle and stamina for later on. Too much, in my opinion, but I'm no expert.

Two points in it. Donal Down O'Sullivn is on by now and he straightaway has added a physical strength and even more hungry directness to Kerry's attack. He isn't afraid to take it on and that's a very good score. His second is even better, and not too far from the arc. Level pegging. We could actually take something from this yet, and a draw from a long away game would be a big result for us.

Kaboom. It's Derry's turn to string together a great move and their ruthlessness in finishing, which they won't have been thrilled about for the most part, is fully evident. Ethan Doherty slips it off to Shane McGuigan, and McGuigan is never going to spurn a chance like that. Great goal - although those are not the first words that came to my mind! I'll never make a radio commentator; let's just leave it at that

The game is gone now. No question. Lachlan Murray and McGuigan tack on points to make the gap five. They have been better than us, if only fractionally, in the past while and the clock is squeezing now.

Maybe the fact that I think in terms like that is why I never made a top class competitor (no, wait, it might be because I'm utterly useless at every other aspect of the game as well). Intercounty footballers have a different mindset. Last year there was some grumbling that Kerry weren't scoring enough goals. It was a recurring theme throughout the year, and an unnecessary one. Play good football at pace and the goal chances will come. 'At pace' are the key words, not 'goal chances'. It was an easy stick to thrash out soft headlines. Mind you, once Kerry strung together another superb move for Paul Geaney to knock it to the net – one of those finishes that the great

predators make look simple, but that took timing by every Kerry player.

Paul and Donal Down are making Kerry look at least as dangerous as they have been all game, arguably more so. But McGuigan, in fairness, is a pure terror to deal with and he splits the posts again. Back to a three point game. Two minutes left – and remember, the injury time is no longer subjective with the new timing system.

One small slip by a Derry defender. Could and should have gathered that one. The crathur, I'm not naming him. But Kerry are in hunting mode now. This is a Kerry I haven't seen in a long time - maybe having nothing left to lose with so little time left is giving them a bit of freedom. Once again they pounce instantly, almost telepathically, and Donal Down fists it home

Level pegging. I'm thinking we need to close them down; I'm sure every Derry supporter is thinking the exact same thing. Final minute, a draw is a grand result, don't let them kik a winer. Except that, in adjusting to all the new rules, soeting I hadn't factored in is that you can't actually shut the game down. You can't take the short kick-out; you can't funnell everybody back and play keep-ball. It's like a colossal extra bonus, to be honest. I want games going down to the wire.

That's not a great kick-out by McNicholl, and once again Kerry hawks are swooping.

Paul Geaney....arrah, don't ever worry about taking that horse to water. He'll drink his fill every chance he gets and the net is bulging once more.

Kerry, somehow, have snatched a win. Cruel on Derry, but I'm not sure that 'snatched' is actually the right word. Derry did a lot right, but Kerry were absolutely clinical in the key moments.

You'd have to be happy with this one as a Kerry supporter. Remember that we have a lot of footballers to come back in, but lads really put their hands up for me. Barry Dan showed really well, Damien Bourke was superb, the two Geaneys and Donal Down.....there are definitely hands up for jerseys. Again, a small caveat, looking good in early February is no

guarantee about May. And five goals, all well taken, is a definite positive but not a reliable statistic just yet. Score ten in our next two games, and I'll pay attention. Actually, score two against DonegalAs teams get used to the new rules, goal chances like that, no matter how well executed, will dry up. C'est la vie. Five swallows in the first week of February is as much a guarantee of a good summer as that weird rodent in Punxutawney (great film starring Bill Murray, strange superstition). But maybe I'm over-cautious. Kerry's forwards certainly weren't. Midfield were a lot more competitive against that fantastic Derry diamond in the middle. And early points in the bag is like manna from heaven. It takes the pressure off and gives Kerry a little bit of precious wriggle room. If we can't celebrate a high-octane roller-coaster win like his, why are we watching sport at all?

Just on a personal note, an uncle of mine, Seán Moynihan, was one of the people who gave me a grá for watching sport. It wasn't just with his own people that he inclucated that grá, far from it. He taught for many years in St. Columbs in Derry, and was a key part of management as Fr. Ignatius McQuillan guided them to a Hogan Cup in 1965. Charlie Gallagher and Raymond Gallagher were on that sideline as well, no bad company to keep! Seán was a selector with the Derry minors as well as they won the Tom Markham Cup. They were his most successful teams, but he laid a gentle fingerprint upon many a Derry club and team. At last Saturday's game, a tribute to him was generously paid by Derry GAA before the game. That may sound like a small thing, but it doesn't feel like that to his own people and it is hugely appreciated by his family. GAA communities, any sporting community, is not defined by scorelines. Those are mere trivia laid over bedrock.

Good result – great result in the circumstances, especially after the late defeat to Armagh in the opening round – but certainly not a great performance. In my opinion, Waterford played most of the good football in this game. That's okay, as with the men, it's very early in the year, and Kerry weren't at full strength. I'll not be worrying for a long time yet. That said, there is clearly a learning curve to be navigated.

It was tough weather. I'm told there was a savage breeze, worse than it looked on television. The pitch held up really well – no surprise there. Kerry were dropping deep, maybe a little too deep to suit me, and Waterford were quite rightly pushing up and pressing our kick-out.

Niamh Ní Conchúir has scored some truly fabulous goals for Kerry. Her sixth minute green flag her was....not that. The plain truth is that it was a pure fluke, a point effort that dropped sort and 16 year old Waterford debutante Gemma Corcoran was caught off her line. A lucky break, especially considering that Corcoran gave an absolutely flawless display otherwise.

We were labouring, to say the least. Struggling on our own kick-out and getting caught under pressure in our own defence, with no obvious outlet.

Lauren McGregor with a free. Great massed defending by Kerry but eventually a free conceded and Kellyann Hogan obliged to put her team deservedly in front.

Anna Galvin relieved the pressure with a fine score. All of the Murray sisters were playing well (no surprise there) and Emma was basically running the show, well assisted by McMaugh and Hogan. England are growing in confidence and I....am not.

James Lowe is our one spark of light for me. Great break and we have a chance. England cough up a penalty and then another one. Ronan Kelleher gets over but I'm not sure he touches down. I'm absolutely sure - and so is everybody else – that Tadhq Beirne fouled in the build-up. Kind of obviously, to be truthful. That isn't "the dog ate my homework" kind of bluff. Decent at club level? Definitely. O'Gara or Sexton? I don't have him on a par with Jack Crowley. The Irish media used to have conniptions about Ward or Campbell. That felt childish to me even then, and I was literally a child. I get the impression that they

Good defending by Ireland. England have heart, but it's they who are looking that little bit ragged.

Lowe again (Gibson Park got the man of the match and he was excellent, but it was Lowe all the way for me) and this time it is Dan Sheehan who goes over. All of Ireland's

This is a game that is about contrast in many ways. The Sem have the strongest tradition of Corn uí Mhuirí success and have amassed four Hogan Cups along the way. Their first Corn uí Mhuirí title goes all the way back to 1929 and they won their first Hogan in 1969. Mercy Mounthawk, on the other hand, only won their first ever Corn uí Mhuirí title just last year. In fact, it was their first time reaching the final.

You could argue that they 'burst onto the

scene' – except that you would be very much wrong. The school isn't yet a quarter of a century old, but they have already established a briliant sporting reputation in several sporting codes and have won All Irelands in both boys and girls competitions consistently oer the past decade. Ask the likes of the great Buddy O'Grady, that great Mitchels stalwart, who was there from the very start, about the work put in by teachers and students along the way to get to last year's success. The school, including the players on this team, took absolutely no shortcuts along the way.

It started with their first ever Frewen success in 2022. Last year most of the players from that Frewen team helped Mounthawk to see off the Sem and win their first ever O'Sullivan Cup. That, a huge achievement in its own right, was just a stepping stone, and a few months later they affirmed their place in story by seeing off Tralee rivals Tralee CBS in a thriller to win their first ever Corn uí Mhuirí Final. In fact, they actually went all the way to the Hogan Cup final and only lost out in a great battle against a superb Omagh CBS.



A lot of that team, of course, have moved on, but a lot of the bones are still there and, in a positive way, the ethos remains. So do some very serious talents, while other players have held their hands up for selection.

There is no dressing up the simple fact that no team has really laid a glove on Mounthawk so far this year. They have been favourites from a long way out, and with good reason. They retained the O'Sullivan Cup with relative ease, dismissing the Sem's semi-final challenge easier than the 0-23 to 3-8 scoreline made it seem. The group stage of the Corn uí Mhuirí held absolutely no bumps along the road. In fact, Mounhawk could have freewheeled all the way. No game could remotely be described as a real contest. The toughest gme that they had was against a brave but outclassed St. Pats Castleisland who could only muster 0-5. Mounthawk won by a 'mere' 12 points. That was their tightest game.

The quarter-final did throw up a bit of a blip, with Mounthawk losing focus a little bit and coughing up four late goals. Given that the Sem also scored three goals against them in the O'Sullivan Cup Final, that might be a little chink in the armour. Except that Mounthawk had effectively been well out of sight before those goals went in, and they kept it tight all the way to the wire in a very one-sided semi-final against Hamilton HS of Bandon.

Mercy Mounthawk may be beatable, deep down every team is, but they certainly will not be beaten easily.

St. Brendans have a younger side than Mounthawk, including a number of the successful Frewen team, and wouldn't quite have the same experience in their ranks, but they certainly aren't coming in cold either. In fact, that may be one of the advantages they possess. They are a more battle-hardened outfit. They have had to win a few metaphorical scraps along the way and frankly, that's no bad thing for any young team. They had very little training done when they met Mounthawk in the O'Sullivan Cup semi-final and I suspect that, while the final result was of course disappointing, the Sem showed real steel in their resistance. It was Jamie Moynihan who led that fightback, and he is the midfield mainstay of this team.

In fact, the Sem might not have put up the same scorelines as Mounthawk along the way, but they faced a slightly steeper incline and have answered every question along the way. I would feel myself that they are the most improved side from their first outings and are now a very formidable team in their own right.

It's not disrespecting Mounthawk's outstanding attack to say that they haven't run into a defence like this one. Kacper Robak was the Electric Ireland Minor Keeper



of the Year in 2024. Literally the best in the country. Outside him Dara Stack has been snuffing out top guns all year and making it look easy. I'm not saying even he can shackle Paddy Lane, but I guarantee he will relish the chance to try. Cian Fleming and Darragh Brosnan on either side of him are tasty footballers as well. Adam Byrne is flanked by pacy Jack Rudden on one side and Cian Mulcahy on the other. The half back line is one of the Sem's main strengths. They were better in their second game against Rochestown, notching 2-12, and appeared to be finding their rhythm.

As I said, Jamie Moynihan for me is the only rival to Kirby and Murphy in terms of midfielders this year — that's no disrespect to the likes Oisín Gillain or the O'Sullivans of Inbhearr Sceine or Killian Dennehy, but Moynihan has been a powerhouse all year for club and county. Oran O'Neill beside him captained the Sem to a Dunloe Cup and won't be taking any backward steps either.

The Sem attack has improved in leaps and bounds. The individual talent was always obvious but the cohesion took a bit of time. Their defending was top class against Ballincollig in their opening game – the harsh truth is that Ballincollig coughed up two soft enough goal opportunities and the Sem could only muster four points.

They were better against Rochestown, clocking up 2-12. Their third game against St. Flannans can, unfortunately, be effectively discounted. The Sem had already qualified and the Clare side were already eliminated, and that showed in an easy victory.

That set them up for the big one. The Sem against Tralee was one of the most anticipated games of the whole competition. There's no dressing it up; that was a huge challenge and I wasn't the only one slightly tipping the Green. Instead, though, the Sem showed everybody how could they can be. That was almost textbook perfection. There were highlights, young Ben Kelliher's five points, Joey McCarthy's goal, but that

was about a team display more than any individuals.

Inbhearr Scéine were dark horses coming into the semi-final, but they had proven themselves as thoroughbreds long before. It was another convincing Sem display. A tough battle, but they did have the edge, even though they had just three points in hand after an exciting finish.

Joey McCarthy on the forty pulls the main strings. Mark Carroll on his left can take his scores but he is likely to supplement midfield - if the Sem can break even there, that's a huge swing in their favour. Ted O'Gorman on the right wing is a quality footballer. Inside, the Sem have three obvious predators in Ben Kelliher, Josh Bowler, and Oisín Fleming, All three are natural scorers, and Liam O'Brien was hugely impressive off the bench as well. Mounthawk are obvious favourites going into this game. And any suggestion about ambushes or complacency runs straight into the managerial experience of Aidan O'Shea and Luke Mulligan - you won't snare operator's like that into making that kind of miscalculation.

But this is far from any foregone conclusion. This isn't Kieran Herlihy's first time on the sideline at any Munster Final, far from it, and the Sem bring a lot themselves to the table. Home ground and home support won't hurt either.

I do expect a massive crowd and parking will be very tight. I wouldn't be surprised if a fair few of the Donegal supporters heading into the Fitzgerald Stadium for the National League game call in to Lewis Rd. first (McLarnon Cup holders Abbey CBS from Donegal Town will play St. Pats Maghera in the Ulster McRory Cup Final). Certainly two Kerry schools in a Corn uí Mhuirí Final will attract a fair crowd in its own right.

Mercy Mounthawk will be fancied by most and with good reason. But there will be a lot of good football played before either Paddy lane or Jamie Moynihan lift that coveted trophy.

KERRY LADIES RECORD THEIR FIRST WIN IN THE LEAGUE

Goals in either half from Niamh Ní Chonchúir and Siofra O'Shea gave TG4 All Ireland champions Kerry their first win in Division 1 of the Lidl National Football League at a windswept SETU Arena on Bank Holiday Monday.

These Munster rivals were level on four occasions before O'Shea's punched effort ten minutes into the second half put the Kingdom clear. Captain Anna Galvin came up with two massive points. Kerry midfielder Anna Galvin levelled matters on the quarter hour.

Emma Murray and O'Shea (free) traded points before Hogan's second dead ball sent the Déise 0-6 to 1-2 ahead at the half time hooter. Two brilliant blocks from Kerry sub Mary O'Connell denied Waterford a goal just before the break. The Kingdom made a triple substitution during the interval. One of those new arrivals Danielle

O'Leary kicked them into the lead four minutes

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING **HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

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


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
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"Teach me to number my days, so that I may get a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12)

Welcome back dear student, the song 'Time In A Bottle' is a beautiful song whose words ring true '... there never seems to be enough time to do the things you want to do ...'. Time gets swallowed up so easily, especially nowadays. It's an interesting exercise to do a 'time inventory'. People examine their finances regularly to see where all the money is going, but how many of us have ever sat down with pen and paper and inspected how we use time? Our time is valuable - it's what we exchange in our workplaces for wages. But much of it is spent aimless and wasted: not always through laziness but squandered on fruitless pursuits. God warns that our lives are like a vapour that vanishes quickly (James 4:14; Isaiah 40:6-7). Think of when you boil the kettle: the steam rises for a while, then it's gone, vanished into thin air! We need God's help to live productive, measured, and intentional lives that bear fruit for His Glory (John 15:5). In the lead Scripture, Moses asks for God's help.... 'teach me to realise the brevity of life, so that I may grow in wisdom' (Psalm 90:12 NLT). There is a knock-on effect from yielding to God — we get His Wisdom to navigate through life more smoothly.

Time is a precious commodity that God has entrusted us with here on earth. The devil knows how to make a life unproductive - setting up distractions, dramas, and desires - all aiming to sneakily steal time. God promises His people that He will restore the years the locusts have stolen (Joel 2:25). Locusts are dangerous pests. In swarms they blot out the landscape, devouring acres of hard work in literally no time at all. The comparison here is that whatever the enemy has used to steal from you, God can, and will, turn back. "The eyes of the Lord search the whole earth in order to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to Him" (2 Chronicles 16:9). The life of Joseph is a story of stolen time as well as stolen dreams, yet he turned around to his brothers who had sold him into years of misery as a slave, telling them that what they had done for evil, God had turned around for good (Genesis 50:20). The Lord has the same plan for you and me dear friend. As if being sold into slavery wasn't bad enough, Joseph was later lied about and unjustly imprisoned, but he used his time there to make the prison a better place, trusting God with his case (Genesis 39:23). Understanding and using time well grows wisdom, "the principle thing" (Proverbs 4:7). Multitudes catalogue their health and fitness, their wealth, and achievements, but how many identify the snares Satan uses to rob time? God's plan for mankind is to 'be fruitful and multiply' (Genesis 1:28) Difficult circumstances or drama created by others can block God's plans, leading to unprofitability and failure. "My times are in Your hands, rescue me from my enemies" (Psalm 31:15). Lord Jesus, help me take stock of my time, and grow in Your Wisdom, amen.
