FIRST IRISH-BRED WHITE-TAILED EAGLE FOUND **DEAD IN TIPPERARY**

One of the first two White-tailed Eagles to fledge successfully from a nest in Co. Clare in 2013 has been found dead in Tipperary. The young male eagle was reared by a pair of Whitetailed Eagles at a nest on Lough Derg, near Mountshannon, Co. Clare and successfully flew from the nest in July 2013 along with its sibling. After a few months of care by its parents both young eagles began to disperse more widely and become independent of their parents. The last confirmed sighting was of one of the two juveniles near Dromineer, Co. Tipperary, on the east shore of Lough Derg in January.

After information supplied by a member of the public and a subsequent search on lands on the shore of Lough Derg by an officer from the National Parks & Wildlife Service (NPWS) and the Golden Eagle Trust Project Manager, Dr Allan Mee, the dead White-tailed Eagle was found near Ballinderry, North Tipperary, on the north-east shore of Lough Derg. Subsequent post-mortem by pathologists at the Regional Veterinary Laboratory at Knockalisheen, Limerick, and radiographs showed the young eagle had been shot, the body holding some 45-50 shotgun pellets. Subsequent postmortem by pathologists at the Regional Laboratory at Knockalisheen, Veterinary Limerick showed the young eagle had been shot, the body holding some 45-50 shotgun pellets. The impact of the shooting broke one of its legs and wings but the bird survived some weeks after the shooting before dying. The horrific nature of the bird's shooting and ultimate death has shocked all those involved in the reintroduction project.

Finding one of the first two young Whitetailed Eagles to fly from a nest in Ireland shot dead is heart-breaking", said Dr. Allan Mee, Reintroduction Project Manager. "It is absolutely incomprehensible that someone would shoot one of these magnificent birds but even more shocking is that one of the first two Irish-bred eagles has been shot only 7 months after leaving the nest".

Investigations are ongoing by both An Garda Siochána and the NPWS and into the shooting. White-tailed Eagles are protected under the Wildlife Act (1976) and it is an offense to shoot or otherwise harm the species.





POST OFFICE CLOSURES

In a bid to alleviate the fears of people living in rural Ireland regarding Post Office closures, Labour Party Local **Election Candidate Cllr Sean** Counihan has provided the following statement:

The Irish Postmasters Union (IPU) agreed to the closure of 197 post offices between 2006 and 2010. Since 2010 there have been 17 closures. The IPU, has engaged in a high profile protest campaign that has caused entirely unjustifiable and unnecessary distress in local communities especially for older citizens. Pensioners are being told that their "post office is closing".

The government has no plan to close post offices. Minister Rabbitte is hopeful that the Cabinet Committee dealing with the future of the Irish postal network will make further progress on a wholeof-government approach to sustaining and developing network consistent with European law. Since An Post has invested heavily in computerisation in all post offices, the network of post office contractors is well positioned to become the front office provider of choice for government and financial services sector.

An Post cannot rely solely on government business however, and given the financial challenges facing An Post (over the past 5 years mail volumes have fallen by almost 25%) a key focus for An Post is to secure new revenue sources based on service/ products offering higher value in both the mails and the post office business.

An Post has made much progress towards diversification with its enhanced arrangement with Aviva for the transfer of Aviva Ireland's branch



personal insurance business book to One Direct. The opportunity to pay Local Property Tax through the Post Office network was secured. A new 6 year contract to handle social welfare payments has just been awarded to the network and also they have the handling of Passports.

The truth is that this Government fully committed to maintain and enhancing the Post Office network as it is fully aware of the advantage of Post Offices to the community especially in rural areas which is why over the past number of years new business lines have been introduced.



EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE

Cllr. Tom Doherty is again highlighting the serious issue of the emergency ambulance service in the Killarney area. A child was left waiting 40 minutes



for ambulance in a GP's Surgery. The young person suffered an acute asthma attack and needed immediate medical attention. Luckily the child had the support from his local doctor and was given oxygen at the Surgery. If this happened in the child's own home at the time of the asthma attack there may not have been access to oxygen or a nebuliser to stabilise a critically unwell patient. If the concerned family members were to ring from their own home address it would have caused great stress and difficulties.

Cllr. Tom Doherty reiterated his strongly held views that a fully functional emergency service is vital. It is imperative to have cover consisting of at least two fully equipped working ambulances for our area. I am also concerned about the centralized call centre as a strong geographical knowledge of local town lands is a must.

FLEMING WELCOMES CF NEWS

Kerry TD Tom Fleming has welcomed the progress made and the advancement to build Cystic Fibrosis wards at Cork University Hospital.

The Independent TD complimented the tremendous endeavours and fundraising of Castleisland based 'Build4Life', which made this possible.

Following prolonged negotiations between Joe Browne and the Minister of State at the Department of Health, Kathleen Lynch, a satisfactory agreement has been reached regarding the bed compliment.

Deputy Fleming said both the Minister and Mr Browne are to be complimented on a successful outcome to the negotiations.

SPORTS CAPITAL GRANTS **DEADLINE EXTENDED**

Labour senator, Marie Moloney, has welcomed the announcement that the deadline for applications for funding under the Sports Capital Grants programme has been extended. The new closing date for applications is 5pm on 10th March. "This is welcome news for clubs and organisations who have pre-registered with the process but who have not completed their applications.

"The 2014 round of sports capital funding will allocate €40 million to local sports clubs to improve and develop facilities such as changing rooms, pitches and floodlights, as well as providing funding for regional facilities. "The new application process for grants is now quicker and easier than ever and further details are available on the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport's website at: http:// www.dttas.ie/sport/english/sports-capitalprogramme," she said.

KERRY COUNTY **COUNCIL MOTION**

At the recent Kerry County **Council meeting Cllr Brendan** Cronin Proposed:

"I am calling on the Minister for Health on behalf of Kerry Spina Bifida patients and their families, to immediately appoint a Paediatric Urologist to Temple Street Hospital. Since spina bifida care was transferred there in 2009, there has been no Paediatric Urologist attached to Temple Street and as kidney failure has been identified as the most common cause of death for patients with spina bifida, the basic regular monitoring and tests which should be done for patients are not been done, clearly putting spina bifida patients lives at risk"

Cllr Cronin said, that all the medical professionals describe kidney failure, in spina bifida patients, as a

predictable disaster which can and must be prevented. It is not acceptable that 5 years after transferring spina bifida care to one of Ireland largest children's hospital that this important appointment has not been made. The Minister and HSE must act now and appoint a Paediatric Urologist immediately so spina bifida patients can have access to regular tests and monitoring which is a basic requirement.



KILLORGLIN **BUS SHELTER**

The National Transport Authority has confirmed that reason for the delay in providing the bus shelter is that it has transpired that the current location of the bus stop is not suitable for the installation of a shelter. As a result Kerry County Council undertook to identify a more suitable location for a bus stop. The Authority has received a proposal from the council for the re-location of this bus stop to a new location. Subject to confirmation from

Bus Eireann that they are satisfied with the new location, the Authority will then instruct the council and Bus Eireann to proceed with the proposal as soon as possible.

Michael Healy-Rae TD is glad to clarify this situation for the people who use the bus stop on a regular basis.

GARDENING



FOCUS ON TREES

Trees are beautiful in any garden and their long life makes them a wonderful garden feature. A tree should be the first think you plant in your garden after the hedging – they can be underplanted afterwards with bulbs and shrubs. Trees are interesting in all four seasons with attractive unfolding of leaves in Spring, full foliage in Summer, good Autumn colour followed decorative bark in the Winter. The first and most important think you need to know when buying a tree is what's the height and spread going to be when it is mature. There are many varieties of trees to choose from and there is a tree suitable for most areas.

Trees can be planted all year round but as with hedging, trees can be planted when they are dormant between November and

With these bare-rooted trees you will still have a few weeks left to plant them. If you plant before the end of March it will give the tree a better chance of rooting into the ground that bit quicker. When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough that you can spreads out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly place your tree ties on – one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.

Next week I will focus on Herbaceous Perennials.



RECIPES OF THE WEEK SPICY TURKEY & PEPPER BAKE

This warming bake is a real family winner, it's cheap, low-fat and superhealthy

- 1kg potatoes, chopped
- 25g butter
- 300g chopped peppers
- 1 onion, chopped
- 500g pack turkey mince
- 1 red chilli, deseeded and chopped
- 1 tbsp smoked paprika
- 200ml hot chicken stock

Method

- Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Cook the 1. potatoes in a large pan of salted water for 12-15 mins or until tender. Drain well, then return
 - to the pan and allow to steam for 3mins. Add some seasoning and the butter, then roughly mash with a fork and set aside until later.
- Meanwhile, cook the peppers and onion in a large pan for 5 mins the water in the 2. peppers should stop them sticking. Stir in the turkey mince, chilli and paprika and cook until browned. Pour in the stock, then bubble for 10 mins until thickened. Transfer the turkey mince into an ovenproof dish, top with the mash and cook for 30 mins or until golden and bubbling.

STRAWBERRY CHEESECAKES

This speedy, low-fat recipe means you can enjoy creamy cheesecake without the guilt

- 85g low-fat biscuits (we used WeightWatchers ginger biscuits)
- 200g tub extra-light soft cheese
- 200g tub 0% fat Greek yogurt
- 4 tbsp caster sugar
- Few drops vanilla extract
- 2 tbsp good-quality strawberry jam
- 100g strawberries, hulled and sliced

Method

- Put the biscuits in a plastic bag and bash with a rolling pin until you have chunky crumbs. Divide between 4 glasses or small bowls.
- 2. Beat the soft cheese, yogurt, sugar and vanilla together until smooth, then spoon over the crumbs and chill until you are ready to serve.
- Stir the jam in a bowl until loose, then gently stir in the strawberries. Divide the 3. strawberries between the cheesecakes and serve.

Know Your Rights:

PAY FOR PUBLIC HOLIDAYS

OUESTION

I work 2 ½ days a week from Wednesday afternoon to Friday. Am I entitled to a day off for St Patrick's Day?

ANSWER

St Patrick's Day is a public holiday, one of nine public holidays in Ireland each year. Part-time workers who have worked for their employers for at least 40 hours in the five weeks before a public holiday are entitled to pay or time off for the public holiday.

If the public holiday falls on a day you normally work you are entitled to a day's pay for the public holiday. If you are required to work that day you are entitled to an additional day's pay.

If you do not normally work on that particular day you should receive one-fifth of your weekly pay. Even if you are never rostered to work on a public holiday you are entitled to one-fifth of your weekly pay as compensation for the public holiday.

In 2014 St. Patrick's Day falls on a Monday. In your case, even though you never work on Mondays you are entitled to one-fifth of your normal weekly pay for the St. Patrick's Day public holiday. Your employer can also choose to give you paid time off instead of pay for the public holiday (again one-fifth of your normal working week which is a half-day).

SAFETY TIPS FOR **OLDER DRIVERS**

For most, continuing to drive as they get older is important as it helps them stay active in their communities and access essential services. However, as we age there are particular driving risks to be aware of. Issues commonly experienced by older drivers include:

- Changes in eyesight
- Health issues
- Medication side effects
- Uncertainty on busy roads and junctions
- Decline in physical strength




While older drivers face more physical challenges than younger drivers, generally speaking they're a lower motor insurance risk compared to other age-groups, especially young drivers. This is because older drivers usually:

- Wear seat belts
- Don't drink and drive
- Don't speed
- Obey the rules of the road when they drive and demonstrate courtesy to other road users
- Drive less kilometers compared to younger drivers and motorists driving to and/or for work Because of their physical frailty, older drivers are more likely than other motorists to suffer injury in the event of a car crash. With this in mind, it's important, if you're an older driver to keep up your driver fitness levels.

KEEPING FIT TO DRIVE

- Make sure you have regular eye and hearing check-ups
- Avoid driving when you're tired
- Avoid driving on unfamiliar roads, at night, in bad weather and during rush hour traffic
- Share the driving when travelling longer distances



Leave plenty of room between your car

- and the vehicle in front Indicate in plenty of time
- Drive cautiously
- Keep your car well maintained
- Never drive if instructed not to by a doctor
- Be aware of medication side effects and whether or not they'll impact your driving.
- If driving grandchildren around, approved child car restraints in your vehicle correctly
- Stay physically active as this'll help with actions such as turning the car's steering wheel and looking over your shoulder
- Know when it's time to consider hanging up your car keys. If you become confused while driving or you're concerned about your ability to drive safely it may be time to consider alternative forms of transport.

DRIVING CAREFULLY **AROUND AREAS WITH**

With almost 91,000kms of regional and local roads in Ireland, it is not uncommon

for motorists to come across loose livestock. Livestock have been mentioned in many an AA Roadwatch radio report over the years with "horses loose" or "geese waddling" a common occurrence. It may make for a light-hearted listen whether it is deer, swans, cattle, horses, sheep or goats but they all pose a danger for motorists. Animals don't usually cause that many single vehicle collisions but motorists must be aware how to behave if they do come across livestock. According to the RSA, there were twenty cases of injury and zero fatalities in 2010. This is a relatively low number compared with the number of single vehicle collisions with ditches. In 2010, there were 23 fatalities and 595 cases of injury.

If motorists come across loose livestock or farmers moving animals; it is imperative that motorists be patient and do not startle the animal.

- Always slow down and be prepared to stop when approaching or overtaking animals.
- You must obey any signal to slow down or stop given by the person moving animals.
- Motorists should avoid using their horn if an animal is in front as it might frighten them. A warning sign will be in place on roads where animals are common.

CAR SECURITY

Tips to aid in the prevention of car theft

With modern cars being fitted with complex immobilizers, a common tactic for thieves these days is to take keys off hall tables or from convenient key racks near the door, simply by 'fishing' for them with a pole through the letterbox.

The days of 'hot-wiring' cars are for the most part behind us. However tactics have changed. Thieves will now target car keys, and will

sometimes break into a house to look for them. It is a mistake to leave them in an obvious place like on a hall table.

Burglars are also adept at opening doors secured with conventional slam-shut barrel locks. Once in the house, they'll often find the keys left on a table or sideboard and can make a quiet getaway in the stolen vehicle.

Tips to tackle car thieves:

Don't be a temptation to the thief – lock your valuables in the boot.

- Park legally in a secure place.
- Lock the doors when driving.
- Park before 11.00pm for greater comfort.
- Use off street car parks.
- Lock the car! It is all too easy to forget the







BIRDWATCH IRELAND SEEKS VOLUNTEERS TO HELP FIND NESTING CURLEWS

The Curlew may be facing extinction as an Irish breeding bird. Volunteers are needed to help locate pairs during this year's nesting season, which runs from April to July. At present, there is no clear idea of how many pairs remain; there may be as few as 100. Curlews often nest in remote uplands or bogs and so can be hard to find, but Birdwatch Ireland plans to survey areas where there have been previous reports of sightings. AN APPLE A DAY KEEPS THE **DOCTOR AWAY**

Scientists at BHF Health Promotion Research

Group, Nuffield Department of Population Health, at the University of Oxford, England compared the effects of eating one daily apple to taking statin drugs (used to lower cholesterol levels) among British adults aged 50 and up. The study participants made no other dietary or lifestyle changes and their mortality rates from heart attacks and strokes were recorded. Scientists found that eating an apple a day or taking statin drugs daily resulted in an equivalent reduction of mortality. The scientists also estimate that if 70% of the 50+ population of the United Kingdom simply ate one apple daily, 8500 deaths every year due to heart attack or stroke would be averted. And, if 90% of the British population over fifty ate a daily apple, the number of lives saved would climb to 11,000 annually. Scientists also found that prescribing statin drugs to everyone over the age of fifty, would result in 1200 additional cases of myopathy, 200 additional cases of rhabdomyolysis, and 12,300 additional cases of diabetes annually. The great news is that if people ate a daily apple instead of taking statin drugs to prevent heart attacks and strokes, there would not be an increase in any of these serious conditions the scientists added. The researchers concluded that "An apple a day or a statin a day is equally likely to keep the doctor away." They added "We find that a 150 year old proverb is able to match modern medicine and is likely to have fewer side effects." 1923 - Five Republican prisoners were blown up with a Free State landmine at Countess Bridge near Killarney within 24 hours of the Ballyseedy Massacre, one victim escaped to tell the story. 1965 - US Troopers with night sticks, shotguns and tear-gas grenades violently confronted 600 civil rights marchers during an attempted 50-mile march from Selma to the Alabama state capitol Montgomery.

1999 - A human chain was formed around the Central Bank in Dublin to highlight the campaign to cancel unpayable Third World debt for the millennium. Over 400 people took part in the ceremony organised by Trocaire, Jubilee 2000 and the One World Network of Students in Ireland. Similar events were held in as many as 50 other countries across the world. 2005 - Calling the story of the Irish in America "an important part of the history of our country," President George W. Bush proclaimed March as Irish-American Heritage Month.

ELEPHANT ESCAPES DEATH

Authorities in Zimbabwe say that a suspected poacher was killed by an elephant after he attempted to shoot the animal. Rangers found the body of Solomon Manjoro inside a national park, and believe he was attempting to poach in the protected Charara safari area. It is believed Manjoro and an accomplice entered the park with plans to hunt elephants for their ivory. It seems that when Manjoro and his friend, Noluck Tafuruka, finally tracked down an animal and attempted to shoot it, the elephant charged. Manjoro was killed in the incident and Tafuruka is now in custody, along with a third man suspected of involvement. The surviving pair appeared in court where they faced charges of illegal weapon possession and contravention of local wildlife laws. Sadly, pachyderm poaching has been on the rise lately, as the black market demand for ivory continues to increase. This elephant, perhaps knowing the danger he was in, protected himself

NEOLITHIC FARMERS PREFERRED MILK OVER FISH

The appearance of farming, from its inception in the Near East around 12 000 years ago to the northwestern extremes of Europe by the fourth millennium BCE or shortly thereafter has led to various models being created to explain the Neolithisation of northern Europe. New research by archaeologists and chemists from the University of Bristol and Cardiff University attempts to answer the question of dietary change utilising multiple evidence strands, from the Late Mesolithic into the Neolithic and up to 1400 CEThe team, led by Professor Richard Evershed of the University of Bristol's School of Chemistry, developed new techniques in an effort to identify fish oils in cooking pots. Their findings, together with archaeozoological and human skeletal analysis explored by the Cardiff group led by Dr Jacqui Mulville, confirmed that a drop in marine resource usage by early farmers coincided with the adoption of intensive dairy farming, with more than 99 per cent of the earliest farmer's cooking pots lacking any marine derived residues. Human bone collagen contains a unique chemical signature for those eating seafood; while the early fisher folk possessed this signature it was lacking in the later farmers, which backed up the lack of marine residues in the pottery. The Bristol team used a compound-specific carbon isotope

technique they have developed to identify the actual fats preserved in the cooking pots, showing that dairy products dominated the menu right across Britain and Ireland as soon as cattle and sheep arrived. The ability to milk animals was a revolution in food production as, for the first time humans did not have to kill animals to obtain food. As every farmer knows, milking stock requires a high level of skill and knowledge. In view of this, team member, Alison Sheridan from National Museums Scotland concludes that: "The use of cattle for dairy products from the earliest Neolithic confirms the view that farming was introduced by experienced immigrants." Viewed together the findings show that Early British hunters ate a diet rich in venison and wild boar as well as eating quantities of sea food, including seals and shellfish. With the introduction of domestic animals some 6,000 years ago they quickly gave up wild foods and fishing was largely abandoned with people adopting a new diet based around dairying. It was another 4,000 years before sea food remains appeared in pots again, during the Iron Age, and it was only with the arrival of the Vikings that fish became a significant part of our diet. This pattern of Neolithisation contrasts markedly to that occurring in the Baltic at exactly the same time, suggesting that geographically distinct ecological and cultural influences dictated the evolution of subsistence practices at this critical transitional phase of European prehistory.

ELECTRIC CAR THAT ALLOWS A WHEELCHAIR TO ROLL **RIGHT IN**

Weighing in at around 1,000 lbs., the Kenguru— Hungarian for "kangaroo"—is an electric vehicle designed specifically for wheelchair users. Drivers roll their wheelchair in through a pop-up backdoor and use motorcyclelike handlebars to steer. The car, which goes into production in the next year, provides unprecedented access to transportation for wheelchair users. The concept for Kenguru originated in Hungary six years ago, with automaker Istvan Kissaroslaki, but the project never got off the ground because of financial troubles. That's when Texas lawyer Stacy Zoern stepped in. For Ms. Zoern, accessible and affordable transportation for wheelchair users is personal—she has spinal muscular atrophy and uses a wheelchair. So when she heard about Kenguru, she called Mr. Kissaroslaki and convinced him to move the company to the U.S. The two worked together to set up Community Cars, which now manufactures the Kenguru, and have raised the \$4 million needed to produce the E.V. The seven-foot car has a maximum speed of just 25 miles per hour and an estimated range of about 60 miles on an eight-hour charge, it's designed more for commuting and errands around town and has a \$25,000 price tag. The Kenguru 2.0 will feature a joystick-controlled "steering wheel" for those users who do not have the upperbody strength to operate the current model.

THE STORY BEHIND NUTELLA

In the 1940s, Italian pastry maker Pietro Ferrero created "pasta gianduja" — "pasta" meaning paste and "gianduka" named after a carnival character used in the original ads. Chocolate was in short supply due to rationing during World War II, so Pietro used hazlenuts in the spread, which were plentiful in the region.

Pasta gianduja was first made in loaves, wrapped in foil and sliced, then served on bread. Children often would throw out the bread, so Pietro altered the product to be spreadable and sold in a jar, renaming it "supercrema gianduja." In 1964, the product was renamed "Nutella."

URBAN BIRDS USF **CIGARETTE BUTTS TO KEEP PARASITES AWAY**

Birds often bring parasite-deterring plants into their nests, but some city birds faced with different nesting materials in the city, have taken to using the cellulose fibres from smoked cigarette butts instead. As every smoker knows Nicotine is forced through the fibres when someone smokes a cigarette, and the study authors speculate that this chemical might act

as a mite repellent. The team set up parasite traps in house sparrow and house finch nests in Mexico City. The heated traps attracted parasites, which then became stuck to pieces of tape. The researchers included cellulose fibres from the filters of smoked cigarette butts in some traps, and fibres from the filters of unsmoked cigarettes—which would not contain nicotine—in others. The researchers also analysed the birds' nest materials and found that 89% of house sparrow and 86% of house finch nests contained cigarette-butt fibres. The more fibres the birds used, the fewer mites the team found in the nest.

DID YOU KNOW

Researchers surveyed a total of 2,000 women in a detailed study about women's make-up habits and beauty routines. Nearly one in five women said they would refuse to open the front door if they hadn't their make-up on. The "average" woman will spend more of her life wearing make-up than not. In a typical day, women will have a face full of cosmetics for nearly 13 hours a day and will have just 11 hours free from it. The "typical" woman puts on her 'face' at precisely 8am and spends 11 minutes applying it. A quarter of women said they don't remove their face until gone 10.30pm. 58% of those polled said they make a point of leaving their make-up on all evening if they know guests might be popping in. 38% admitted to frequently going to bed with all their make-up intact. 10% said the more makeup they have on the better they feel. Well over half surveyed said they feel much less confident when completely bare faced and 50% said they dreaded anyone seeing them without makeup. 38% said their make-up bag was full of the same products that they had been using for years. 16% per cent confessed to loving to buy the latest cosmetics. The "average" women will spend £147 on cosmetics in a typical year and has around 13 items in her makeup bag. Foundation, concealer, mascara and eye shadow were said to be the most popular cosmetic items.

SABRIANA'S STORY

Sabriana was introduced to a man called Yani by a neighbour in her village as someone who would help her to a better life in Western Europe. She would earn good money, have a new life and be able to send money home to her elderly mother and father. She agreed to pretend to be married to the man and went with him using false documents he procured. But what began as a journey of hope soon became a living hell.

As soon as she reached London she was beaten and abused, she was locked up, told she would be put in jail if the police caught her. Yani forced her to sell sex. Foolishly she hoped for the best because she did not want to believe that it could get worse. It did when Yani sold her to another man and she had to work in brothels and clubs. Without documents escape was almost impossible, she was controlled through a combination of promises, lies, threats and violence. She was eventold that her parents would be killed if she tried to escape. Months later she was sold on again and was moved to Dublin from where she was regularly sent to

'visit' provincial towns. After a severe beating Sabriana decided she had to get out. She escaped and arrived in a Garda Station afraid, bruised, with broken ribs and teeth.

Sabriana's saga is not yet over. She is now in the asylum process. She lives in fear that the 'owner' who beat her will find her again. She fears being deported and also that her parents will suffer because of her escape.

It is estimated that over 400,000 women and girls are trafficked into and within Europe every year. Sabriana is one of the many who's suffering and misery is unimaginable....... Ruhama.

COPING WITH LOSS

Loss is considered to be a natural part of life - yet coping with loss is one of the most difficult challenges we will face in our lives. Grief is a natural response to loss and the more significant the loss, the deeper our grieving will be. When a loved one dies, we may experience all kinds of difficult emotions - and it can feel like this pain will never ease. This is a normal reaction. Grieving is a vital process and typically, over time, these intense feelings will diminish in intensity. Everyone reacts differently and there is no right or wrong way to grieve. Equally there is no 'normal' period for someone to grieve – and it may take months or years to come to terms with a loss. For most people, grief doesn't go away - but it fades into the background. Thoughts and memories of our loved one are woven into our minds – and whilst missing our loved one may be part of our life – it doesn't interfere with us living our life. Sometimes however, we can experience what is termed 'Complicated Grief'. This refers to an intense and long-lasting grief that takes hold and doesn't seem to lessen as time goes on. Many people come through the loss on their own – supported by friends and family – others benefit greatly from bereavement counselling.

Whilst there are no right ways to grieve - there are however, healthy ways to deal with the pain. People often report that grieving the loss of a loved one gave them a renewed sense of meaning, purpose and direction in their life.

HELPFUL STEPS INCLUDE

- 1. Accept what you are feeling: If we deny or ignore our feelings it will only make it worse in the long run. For healing to occur, we need to acknowledge and face our feelings.
- 2. Talk about the death of your loved one: Talking to family and friends can help us to understand what has happened and remember our loved one.
- 3. Remember and celebrate the life of your loved one: Honor the individual - perhaps through making a collage of photos, planting a tree in their memory, donating to a favourite charity etc.
- 4. Be patient and allow the grieving process to naturally unfold.

Whilst we may often think of grief resulting from the death of a loved one, any loss can cause grief. Over the coming weeks we will explore grief and loss and ways we can deal with this.

Health Matters.... With Dr. Michael Moloney

TENNIS ELBOW (LATERAL EPICONDYLITIS)

Tennis elbow is a common condition which causes pain and inflammation of lateral (outside) of the forearm just below the elbow joint.

It is an overuse injury in which partial tears of the extensor tendons occur at the point at which they insert into the bone. The extensor muscles are the muscles that extend the wrist. We commonly use these muscles while clicking the mouse on a PC or twisting a screwdriver. It is typically the injury associated with poor backhand technique in tennis players, although I more commonly see it in avid Wii users!

Xrays and other imaging are rarely required in order to make the diagnosis.

Treatment

If you feel you may have tennis elbow it is reasonable to rest from activity for a few days and use ibuprofen and heat packs. If the symptoms are severe or persist you should seek an appointment.

There are many different treatment options available for tennis elbow. The main aim of treatment is to reduce the symptoms until natural healing occurs (which can take 6-12 weeks).

Treatments range from physiotherapy and ultrasound to steroid injections. There is some evidence to suggest that autologous blood (one's own blood) injected onto the tendon may improve healing.

Steroidal injections are very popular as they help reduce pain in the short term but recent evidence suggests that they may prolong the healing time overall and can occasionally cause rupture of the tendon. Acupuncture has been shown to be safe and effective in relieving the symptoms of tennis elbow.

If the symptoms are persisting or if the injury is sport related advice should be sought for rehabilitation exercises. Ones sporting technique may have to be examined and modified to prevent recurrent injuries. Counterforce bracing (special brace on forearm) may also be of benefit.
