





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Time to visit DEENAGH **FAIRY TRAIL**

Artistic Students at Killarney Community College were delighted to once again take part in an art project with Killarney Looking Good. In the past few years, Killarney Community College has worked with Killarney Looking Good on several projects to enhance the town and surrounding areas of Killarney.

Almost 4 years ago Killarney Community College, under the guidance of Art teacher Ms. Michelle Mahony, created the Deenagh Fairy Trail. These fairy houses served as a real delight to young and old who walked by them, and the fairies of Killarney were very happy with their new accommodation!Over time the fairy houses have become worn and in need of repair due to our lovely Irish weather. When Juliette Kelly, from Killarney Looking Good, approach Killarney Community College in October 2023 to see if the school would like to work on any project immediately the Art and Woodwork Department of the school said they would love to work on making new fairy houses in replace of the original ones made by the school.

Over the last number of months, 2nd Year woodwork students, under the guidance of Woodwork Mr. Shane Fleming, have designed and constructed new fairy houses out of timber. Once the houses were made the 2nd Year art students, under theguidance of Art Teacher

As part of the improvement to the Deenagh Fairy Trail the Woodwork Department in Killarney Community College also sanded and revarnished the original signs for the trail. Each fairy house is now placed on a tree truck kindly sourced by the Killarney National Park Rangers. Elevating the fairy houses will hopefully help to preserve them more from weathering and ground debris and can be explored more by those wanting to see a fairies!

The Deenagh Fairy Trail, inspired by the local landmarks, history and landscape of Killarney, consists of seven fairy houses: Bricin Dinis Fairy, Deenagh Fairy, Waterfall Fairy, Abbey Fairy, Castle Fairy, Fairy of the Forest and the Copper Mines Fairy. Located along the walkway near Killarney playground gives it the idea place for them to be enjoyed by both locals and visitors to the area. KERRY AIRPORT ANNOUNCES 2023 RESULTS

KERRY Airport has released the Annual Report & Accounts for the 12-month period ended 31st December 2023 reporting an Operating Profit after Taxation for the period of €1,198,347 as compared to an after Taxation Operating Profit of €1,061,416 in the previous year.

Passenger numbers for 2023 finished at 419,281 which represents a 17.7% year on year increase on 2022.

Commenting on the financials and the on-going operations of the Airport for the year, John Mulhern, CEO of Kerry Airport, said:

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Ferdia and Étaoin's Story To

RAISE FUNDS FOR CUMH FACILITIES

Killarney family who availed of the services of Bru Columbanus while their new born twins were in the Neo Natal Unit at Cork University Maternity Hospital are raising funds for the facility.

Jennifer Hartnett and David O'Connor from Killarney are the proud parents of four children, however during the pregnancy with the twins, complications arose and they were taken under the care of the exeptional team at CUMH.

On Monday last, Jennifer, who is the daughter of Carol and Denis Foley, from Lacabane took part in the VHI Woman's Mini Marathon in Dublin to raise funds for Bru Columbanus which became their home away from home after the twins were born and for the Neonatal Family Sanctum at CUMH which was a sanctuary for them during the 14 weeks spent at the hospital.

Jennifer and David, who is the son of John Anthony and Maura O'Connor from Barraduff have set up an idonate page to raise funds these great causes and are also hosting the twin's christening at the Dunloe Castle Hotel on June 16th to raise even more funds.

Ferdia and Étaoin's Story

"When my husband David and I discovered we were expecting twins, we could not stop smiling. We were elated although a little shocked", Jennifer said.

"However, our happiness was short lived when, at 16 weeks pregnant, our then OBYGN explained that one of our babies, Étaoin was not growing as she should, it was on this day we met Fergus McCarthy, the lead OBGYN for twins at CUMH. Almost weekly, Fergus had the difficult job of delivering to us the same heart wrenching news, that our little girl was unlikely to survive whilst her brother Ferdia was growing at a normal and healthy rate. Every week, we travelled to Cork all the while hoping and praying that they would both be on the scan alive and as you may know (or have guessed), our darling Étaoin continued to turn up every week

gestation, just as things began to deteriorate for her, Fergus with his team expertly delivered the twins on 27 June 2023. Étaoin weighed a mere 636 grams (just over 1 pound) and Ferdia weighed 1.49kg (just over 3 pounds). Both I and my babies received world class medical care and support at every stage of our journey and we are forever in their debt. From the midwives and Fergus, to our first antenatal neonatology meeting with Dr. Filan, our admission to NICU at 30 weeks under Dr. O'Connell and our eventual discharge after four months, we received expert care and advice, compassion, understanding and support throughout. Without the dedication of so many - the incredible teams of OBYGNs. Consultant Neonatologists, Registrars, Nurses, cleaning and security staff at CUMH, neither of my babies would be here

After many ups and downs in NICU and many months away from our families, Ferdia and Étaoin were discharged and we took our first trip home to the Kingdom as a family.

Jennifer and David share their reasons for picking the two Charities.

Bru Columbanus

While our babies remained in intensive care, Brú Columbanus became our home away from home. It was never just accommodation, it gave us the ability to be near our little babies when things were so difficult. It allowed us to keep our other children Daithí and Sadhbh close to us at a time of great uncertainty. Bru gave us time in NICU with Ferdia and Étaoin that we would

not have otherwise had, being from Kerry. Anne-Maria, Pat and Marian welcomed my family with open arms and went above and beyond to ensure our family was always cared for. During our stay, we witnessed this care and kindness countless times for all the other families that crossed the threshold of Bru. It is an amazing service, one that does not get enough publicity or promotion and is needed by families day in and day out, particualrly families at their most vulnerable and many families in their darkest hour.

Neonatal Family Sanctum at CUMH

We also got to know many of the other parents and we shared our tales of woe, our triumphs and our worries in the corridors of the NICU. The construction of the Neonatal Family Sanctum will comprise of two key areas; a Parent's Room and a Neonatal Sanctum.

The Parent's Room will give parents a private space to decompress out of the clinical setting of NICU - somewhere to sit, somewhere to have a cup of tea.

"We also met parents who had lost a baby or who had a seriously ill baby. The Sanctum will be a private enclosed environment which will allow parents of an ill or dying baby to experience nature and see the blue sky in a place of quiet, solace and privacy", Jennifer said.

A comprehensive programme of events have been planned by the National Parks & Wildlife Service and the Board of Trustees of Muckross House to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the opening of Muckross House to the public, beginning on Friday June 14th.

Now one of Ireland's premier tourist attractions, the house was opened as a Kerry Folk Museum on June 14th, 1964, and is run in partnership by the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) and the voluntary Board of Trustees.

Local dignitaries, some current and former staff as well as some current and former Trustees will attend a formal ceremony at Muckross House, on the 14th of

Also on that day, experts from the NPWS and Trustees will host several exhibitions, walks and guided tours in the vicinity of the house. These will feature the history of Muckross House, the history of Killarney National Park, nature stands / exhibits, nature walks, a spinning wheel, bookbinding, pottery, lakes ecology, Kerry cattle, deer, rhododendron, Killarney House, Reintroduction projects such as the White-Tailed Eagle and Osprey and other events.

There will also be free admission to Muckross House and Muckross Traditional Farms throughout the weekend (14-16 June) where the Guides and Traditional Farm staff will provide their usual high standard of interpretation for bus will run hourly from Mission Road, Killarney to Muckross on Friday the 14th.

At various times during the summer, there will be events such as traditional music in the Garden Restaurant featuring the Killarney School of Music, and a series of concerts in the Schoolhouse including John Spillane and Siamsa Tire amongst others. Muckross House and Muckross Traditional Farms will both host events for Culture Night. There will be a full series of events on Muckross Traditional Farms to celebrate Heritage Week including a vintage rally expected to be attended by thousands. In September Celtic Steps will perform on the front lawn of Muckross House.

Several major developments have been undertaken by NPWS in partnership with the Trustees of Muckross House since 1964, including restoration work, the development of Muckross Traditional Farms, building Muckross Schoolhouse, nurturing of traditional crafts, such as weaving, pottery and bookbinding; opening the Garden Restaurant and Craftshop and the development of an in-house research library. Muckross House, Muckross Traditional Farms, and Muckross Research Library have for the third time been awarded Maintenance of Full Accreditation under the Heritage Council's Museum Standards Programme for Ireland (MSPI) - the first in visitors. A complimentary shuttle : the country to have achieved this : NPWS Divisional Manager Eamonn



standard.

Thanks to the expert supervision and work of the NPWS horticultural unit the Gardens and Arboretum at Muckross House are now looking their best and continue to be a key attraction in the area.

An estimated one million people visit the Muckross area annually. Of these, 120,000 visit Muckross House, and 65,000 visit Muckross Traditional Farms. The Trustees of Muckross House currently employ more than 100 people.

According to the trustees' chairman, Marcus Treacy, "While Muckross is an undoubted magnet for tourists, it is also a huge attraction for the local community who visit and support the facilities all year round. Local people have a deep love of Muckross and we hope they will take part in and enjoy our celebrations to mark this historic year,".

Meskell said people would be given a first-hand opportunity to get insights into some of the projects being undertaken in Killarney National Park. "In recent years, the eagle restoration project, based in the park, has captured the public imagination in a big way, but there are also many other interesting aspects of our work here which we will be displaying to the public," he said. Meanwhile, two long-term signature projects related to music and dance are also planned by the Trustees of Muckross House as part of the celebrations. Composer J. J. O'Shea is composing a musical suite, telling the story of Muckross through music. Also, a traditional

Celebrating our links with the US

Killarney's 4th of July celebrating the US national day is undergoing a cultural cleansing after approaches by the Killarney for Palestine group.

Videos and talks have formed part of the persuasion, the result of which is Uncle Sam is to be cast out by the Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

There is to be no early morning raising of the Star Spangled banner. A number of other fun American-isms like the outdoor cinema and concerts won't make the cut either - and why Chamber pulled these is utterly perplexing. Especially as the removal of movies and fireworks and concert was Chamber's own decision, it seems.

Overall, why a decade old popular festival has been essentially ditched to row in with the concerns by a small unelected group about a part of the world we have no links with worries me - terrible though that conflict is

The Killarney festival is being rebranded and stripped of its stripes, largely. It is to be "'a celebration of America and Irish friendship". But even this adjustment is not going far enough for campaigners who now want America and its symbols erased altogether.

(Press images of the American flag are giving offence and words like "crass" and " tone deaf" are being bandied about on social media statements.

All this in the light of a current conflict and a country, let's face it, we have little or no connection with - blood, political, cultural or otherwise.

Apparently some of the KfP group have felt it inappropriate always to celebrate the American 4th of July, leading member Sally Macmonagle says in a statement on Facebook where she accuses the chamber of particularly bad taste this year for the sake of a dollar!

But surely we can and must continue to acknowledge Killarney's unique financial and other ties with the US - regardless of foreign policy which changes.

Our Star spangled festival for a couple of hours one day a year in Killarney is not all about the dollar.

We speak a common language and share a common Judeo-Christian culture. We have close relatives there. America accommodated us in our darkest hour and, yes, it continues to enrich us.

We are being asked now to cast all this aside and look only at the sins of America. But let me ask how it would feel if on St Patrick's Day in the US only the dark parts of our recent history were recalled in order to smother the shamrock?

There is a wider context too. As I write, the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings is being marked in Normandy. Tens of thousands of young Americans died to achieve the freedom we all - whether Killarney for Palestine or the Chamber of Tourism and Commerce - enjoy today across Europe.

Killarney through the ages

Costume is a thing that brings history to life. A little town in France with which I am familiar has introduced a reenactment of some of its well known characters every Wednesday. So, every week between May and October you can look up and see Cardinal Richelieu all in red crossing the square in the town he designed and built in the 1630s! His close friend and confidante, a lady decked out in the finest 17th century frills and lace will appear too. The thing is a delight.

Speaking with a local French costume maker - whole festivals celebrating the Three Musketeers are held - she told me it is difficult to get the original materials but people are very good and hand in old velvet and such - and she remakes them.

It strikes me from the colourful dramatisation of the lives of the McShain and Bourne Vincent families in Killarney House and Gardens as part of last year's festival, this is something we too could do on a continuing basis in Killarney.

We could bring different periods to life and it would give our actors and actresses plenty of opportunity during the summer months when drama is shelved.

The Edwardian period and the Victorian are two favourites and the necessary materials for costumes are not hard to find.

I have long thought the black and white uniforms of waitresses and waiters down through the years would make a fine display - so we could celebrate our biggest industry the way it was too.

22 kms not enough on the N22

Roads, as we said last week, are one of the big issues in this election in Killarney. Speed and being unable to walk because of a lack of footpaths has come up.

So does the impossible to understand congestion whether from the Fossa, the Tralee or the Muckross side. Motorists are regularly stalled at the junction to Ross Road for no reason - with nothing moving in any direction.

The Killarney to Cork road is also still on the agenda. The 22 km Macroom bypass at a cost of around Euro 280 million is of course hugely welcome. But it does not go far enough. Literally. On a day last week the traffic queue began at Lissarda on the Cork side to get onto the new road which only begins after some narrow sections and bends along the water reservoir. Why the whole road as far as Cork could not be done is a question.

The promised time saving of 17 minutes is not being achieved largely because of the stop start nature not just in Macroom but also in Cork itself.

We always used the excuse that because the Romans never made it to Ireland we could not have good roads. But as we fund roads in the North now, we should surely keep our own southern roads on the agenda.

Speaking of politics, local election facts and figures were given at a press briefing on Tuesday morning in the council. There has been an increase of 7,000 on the register. The biggest increase is in the electoral areas of Kenmare and Killarney. In Kenmare the final count for the electorate is 23,922 - up from 21,813 in 2019. In Killarney there is a huge jump from 20,864 to 23,159 now. Hundreds of Ukrainian names with addresses across a myriad numbers of hotel and guesthouses are on the register.

NEW ONLINE FRAUD SCAM IN KERRY

Gardai in Kerry have issued a warning about a new online fraud which has been affecting businesses in the Kerry region.
Sergeant Michael Ouirke, Crime Prevention

Officer for the Kerry Division has said "We

are seeing a trend of a new Online Fraud scam in Kerry. A person is advertising on Social Media Platforms that they can provide anything for half the original price.

The items this person is advertising, range from vouchers for shops, hotels, salons to paying for items, e.g. Take-away food, purchases at Off-Licences, Oil Companies and Car Parts businesses. They also advertise that they can pay Utility Bills.

The way it works is that buyer contacts the Fraudster via social media and tells them what they want to purchase or what bill they want to pay. The buyer pays this person half the price and then the fraudster contacts the businesses (usually over the phone) and purchases the items/pays the bill for the full price. The fraudster is using Cloned, stolen Bank & Credit Cards to purchase the items. The Shop/ Company who sells the

products are unaware it's a fraud until a number of weeks later when the Bank informs them that there is a chargeback on the transaction.

We have discovered that in a number of previous Transactions, the Fraudster is using stolen credit card details which are issued from banks outside of Ireland. A way of checking the Country of origin of a credit card is outlined below;

Website Validate, Verify & Check Credit Card or Debit Card Number (bincodes.com)

If the above link does not work, the website and process is hereunder; www.bincodes.com – BIN Checker – Enter the first 6 digits.

A person using a Card from a different Country may be a red flag and would require extra

enquiries to be carried out by the businesses. It must be stressed that the Fraudster can use a cloned Irish card as well.

This information is shared to cause awareness for businesses of the scam. Businesses will have to take their own precautions when accepting payments over the phone.

In recent weeks, staff and visitors at Killarney National Park have been entertained by the iconic sound of unexpected visitors - the Great Spotted Woodpecker. A breeding pair was confirmed for the first time to have produced a small number of chicks in the Park. The chicks are becoming more and more vocal each day and preparing to fledge. Sightings of the Great Spotted Woodpeakesr, (Mórchnagaire breac) ontinue to be monitored. The Woodpeaker became extinct during the 17th century, however they have made a comeback in Ireland, colonising broadleaved woodland - their prime habitat. Using their powerful beak and shock absorbing skull to carve out their home in the trees.

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STONE AGE MOON RISE IN THE SHEEN VALLEY What of the Moon' constructed some 5000 years ago marks the most southern rising point of the Moon.

The Bonane Stone Circle in the Sheen Valley Heritage Area just outside Kenmare is famous for its alignments with the Sun. However, the ancient monument was also carefully designed to align with the most southern rising point of the Moon. The 'Altar of the Moon' as it is known locally was constructed on the horizon of a nearby mountain some five thousand years ago to mark this unique celestial event which happens once every 18.6 years.

2024 is a special year as this astronomical phenomenon called the 'Major Standstill of the Moon' occurs on the 21st June, the same date as the Summer Solstice.

The Stone Circle is one of only a few ancient sites in the world where the major standstill of the moon is marked. Other known sites include Stonehenge in England, Callanish Stone Circle in Scotland and Chimney Rock in Colorado, USA.

The community of the Sheen Valley has prepared a weekend festival of events to mark the occasion. On the evening of Friday 21st June visitors will gather at the stone circle to witness the moon rise over the 'Altar' together with a tasting experience cooked in the nearby Fulacht Fiadh (Ancient Cooking Pit). A presentation on the antiquities of the Sheen Valley will proceed the main event together with a wine and cheese reception. Other events throughout the weekend include guided walks of Bonane Heritage Park and other local antiquities and a traditional 'Straw Boy' ball night at Molly Gallivans.





KERRY COUNTY **COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

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
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

Too much sun can damage the eves. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems.

There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B. Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

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


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





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Muckross House opened to visitors on June 14th 1964...



Make the most of the opportunity to do well in the State Exams



After a long wait, there is tangible relief that the state exams are finally underway. Like many important milestones, the anticipation is often worse than the event itself. The first morning was the most nerve racking as it involved some formality. However, once the question papers were distributed and the candidates warmed to their task, the tension of the morning quickly evaporated.

COMPULSORY

The exam timetable mainly prioritises compulsory subjects during the early days of the exam. As the exams progress into the second and subsequent weeks, the optional subjects are nicely spaced out allowing for study days. But, as they continue until Tuesday, 25th June, it's important to treat the state exams more like a marathon than a sprint. After sitting a few subjects, candidates now realise that exams test not only your knowledge but also your concentration and ability to utilise every available minute. So, stay in exam mode until you leave the exam venue after the very last subject.

FOCUSSED

Depending on the subjects being sat, the entire exam will conclude reasonably early for some candidates. Others will have to stay focussed until the very last subject on the final day. Irrespective of when you are due to finish the exam, keep in mind that you have prepared diligently for the exam. This is what you have been waiting for. Make the most of the opportunity to do well. Reap the rewards of years of study by performing to your optimum ability in each subject.

REVIEW

After three busy days of exams, the coming weekend will bring welcome relief and give candidates a chance to relax a little, to take stock and plan ahead. Spend as little time as possible on post-mortems. Review your tactical approach over the first week. If you are totally satisfied with your strategy before, during and after each subject then you need change very little. Focus on next week's subjects and forget about the subjects that have already been examined. Your entire concentration must be on the subjects still to be examined.

LEISURE

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries for the second week and to do some subject revision. Take some active leisure to burn off the residual tension of the first week. It will help you to sleep soundly and to maintain the levels of stamina, endurance and staying power needed for the challenges ahead. Avail of a few good nights' rest, which is essential for alertness. Resist the temptation to study late into the night. Confine your study to daylight hours, enjoy your period of exercise and go to bed early. Defer any latenight socialising until your exam is over. Keep your fluid intake high to avoid dehydration but be moderate in your use of artificial stimulants such as tea and coffee. Keep a clear head by abstaining from alcohol during the exam period.

QUALITY

Concentrate on subjects being examined next week. Prioritise your revision according to the timetable. Go over the tips and predictions that have been made for the subjects you are sitting during week two. Use your study days well and study wisely by not cramming. At this stage the quality of your revision is more important than the length of time you spend at it. On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts are fresh in your mind.

POSITIVE

You are off to a great start after the first week. Maintain your discipline during week two. Keep a good thought for yourself and stay positive. Have confidence in your ability to do well in your second week's papers. You are now well settled in and rising to the challenge. Deal with each subject as it comes and by this time next week it may all be behind you.

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MEP ON THE CAMPAIGN TRAIL IN KILLARNEY

MEP Grace O' Sullivan visited Killarney on Saturday evening as part of her campaign for European Elections 2024. Grace joined local candidate Diarmaid Griffin on the doors of Castle Falls and Scrahan Mews along Ross Road with a large canvass team.

'It was a great opportunity to highlight the upcoming local and European Elections with local residents, and to stress the importance of voting on June 7th' said Diarmaid Griffin.

After the canvass, Grace and Diarmaid called into Luna to speak with Killian Tracey about the Killarney Coffee Cup Project.

The importance of introducing the 'latte levy' was highlighted by Killian.

Grace O' Sullivan contacted Minister Ossian Smyth on this immediately and said 'Let's get on with the Latte Levy as soon as possible'.

I am delighted with the initiative Killarney took in being the first town to become disposable cup free. Now the project needs support and assurance from the government that it will support the introduction of a levy on single use cups.

Grace O' Sullivan is the shadow rapporteur with the Greens/EFA on Packaging and Packaging Waste Europe.

"In the face of intense lobbying from the plastic and chemicals industries, and others who benefit from our single-use, throwaway culture, the EU has set more ambitious targets for reducing packaging waste, and increased the scope of many rules. Agreement has been reached that will see PFAS - harmful forever chemicals used in food packaging, banned within 18 months, a ban on plastic wrapping on fruit and veg, mandatory roll-out of deposit and return schemes across EU member states, and measures to tackle over-packaging, including a ban on oversized boxes and parcels being used for small items, and a ban on polystyrene infills in packaging." Grace O'Sullivan said on the issue at European Parliament earlier this year.

DANGERS OF DEER

Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has again raised the dangers posed by Deer wandering on our roads throughout the county. He feels that since the major fire in Killarney National Park a few years ago, Deer have been dispersed away from their former home to practically every parish in Kerry.

"Everywhere you travel now, you come across Deer crossing roads in the county, causing accidents and causing drivers to swerve to avoid hitting them. These animals by nature are skittish, (unpredictable) as one constituent described them and you cannot judge in which direction they will run to, when you come on them" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Every day I am hearing about Deer jumping out onto the roads all around South Kerry. On a regular basis, you will come across Deer in Killorglin, Beaufort, Dromin, Cromane, Glenbeigh, Glencar, Kells, Cahersiveen and throughout the entire Iveragh Peninsula. I am hearing reports of accidents and near misses on almost a daily basis and there will be more major accidents and sadly, fatalities, if action is not taken now" said

the Fianna Fáil man.

"Another issue of course, is the matter of insurance. If your sheep or cattle jump out onto the road, then you are responsible for any damage caused to a vehicle. If a Deer jumps out and damages your car, you are left high and dry and this is not fair" stated Councillor Cahill.

"A Deer round up and cull must be organised to ensure the safety of people travelling our roads. I am calling again on the National Parks and Wildlife Service to recognise the fact that many of our Deer no longer live within the confines of Killarney National Park and to initiate a major drive to return these Deer to their original environment where they can be successfully managed" said Councillor Cahill.

"With no natural predator in Ireland for Deer, the herds are growing at a phenomenal rate, causing mortal danger to road users and spreading ticks that carry Lyme Disease. This is a major Health and Safety issue, which I believe, the Road Safety Authority must take into consideration. We must deal with Deer now" added Councillor Cahill.

€1 million in funding for projects in Kerry

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D. Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of over €1 million in funding for outdoor recreation projects in Kerry.

The investment, under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS), will be key to enhancing forest walks, cycleways, rivers, lakes and beaches across the county.

It will also provide a boost to the local economy by attracting more visitors to our rural communities.

The funding includes:

:: €445,140 Construction of a 1.5km extension to the Kilderry Wood Walk in Milltown in mid-Kerry, creating a looped countryside amenity walk of 3.1km. The project also includes the provision of 600m footpath to link Milltown and to Kilderry Wood Entrance.

- : €200,000 to further extend the Ballyseedy Wood Amenity Trail
- :: €200,000 to repair and upgrade the Jarvey Lane, the 1 km pedestrian/ cyclist surface which runs between Killarney town and the main entrance of Killarney National Park.
- :: €198,000 for recreational support facilities at 3 Blue Flag Beaches -Ballinskelligs, Banna and Rossbeigh. This includes cycle stands, seating and picnic areas, drinking fountains, shower areas and lifeguard facilities.

Cllr. Maura Healy Rae on Housing

Housing continues to be one of the biggest issues facing our area despite the fact that there has been positive developments in Killarney and Barraduff.

There is substantial need for more social housing to address the waiting list which now has in excess of 1,500 applicants. Vacant and void properties need to be brought back into use. Furthermore affordable housing development needs to take place so that families and single

people can have a realistic opportunity of purchasing a home. I have time and time again campaigned for St.Finians landbank to be used for social and affordable housing development. I want to continue my work in this regard. "I am very active in assisting elderly people and people with disabilities to make applications for housing grants to make their homes more suitable for their needs", Cllr. Healy Rae told Killarney Outlook.



PROPOSAL TO DOUBLE PENALTY POINTS




'Earlier this year I spoke with residents in Ballyspillane regarding the CCTV scheme, as the estate was one of the three schemes to be funded under the CCTV Grant Scheme.' Kenneally said: 'while this decision is to be welcomed,

what is not acceptable is the time delay. The people of Ballyspillane and Killarney in general were told in 2017 that these schemes had been approved, but here we are, seven years later, and work on the installation is only being confirmed now,' she continued.

Kenneally concluded: 'I can confirm that officials in the Department have been in contact with Kerry County Council regarding the guery raised by Deputy Pa Daly TD. The Council has informed the Department of Justice that work on compliance issues associated with the application is ongoing and it is expected that the Council will fully draw down funds this year for the scheme, which is to be welcomed,' she concluded.

The LEA candidate said

that she will work with community leaders, particularly in Ballyspillane, to ensure that Kerry County Council initiate the tender process for the scheme in 2024.



Fianna Fáil Local Election candidate Niall Kelleher has welcomed €1.4m in additional funding for regional and local roads in Co Kerry damaged by persistent rainfall over the winter and spring months.

Minister of State Jack Chambers TD today announced €30 million in emergency funds to deal specifically with the impact of climate change, which has contributed to a deterioration in the surface quality of certain parts of the roads network.

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

FAREWELL TO TWO KERRY LEGENDS

SEÁN ÓG SHEEHY

Kerry GAA were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of the late Seán Óg Sheehy. If any family could claim to be Kerry royalty, the Sheehys of John Mitchels surely could. John Joe was an iconic figure in the twenties. A staunch republican leader, he emerged from the crowd for the 1924 Munster Final under a truce brokered with his friend, team-mate, and Civil War opponent Captain Con Brosnan. It remains one of the greatest GAA moments of all time in any county. The two went on to be key figures in Kerry's first four in a row team. John Joe's influence extended far beyond even his great playing career. Tralee Mitchels were the most dominant club side Kerry has ever seen (they were later split into Mitchels, Rock Street, and Strand Road) and John Mitchels continued that dominance in both codes. John Joe didn't quite select Kerry teams himself but, such was his influence, he could have done so without objection. Famously, he recused himself from the meeting to select the team to contest the 1953 All Ireland Final, with his son Paudie dropped and losing out on the captaincy to Jerome O'Shea.

In 1962 Kerry were smarting after losing two years in a row to newcomers Down. Kerry had brought in some new blood such as the Lucey brothers and Donie O'Sullivan and the youngest of the Sheehys to join hiss brothers Paudie and Niall. Seán Óg lined out at wing back and, although deceptive light in physique, his speed and uncanny ability to read the game soon made him a stalwart. Mitchels were on their way to claiming five Bishop Moynihan Cups in a row, a feat unmatched ever since, and Seán Óg was nominated as captain. Kerry saw off Cork to win Munster, beat Dublin in a brilliant semi-

final and then saw off Roscommon (in what is considered a disappointing encounter).

All of John Joe's sons played football, and it's sometimes forgotten that they were a great hurling and camogie family as well. John Joe himself played Railway Cup for Munster (later on, he would have been a regular at Kerry's usually sparsely enough attended hurling games) and Niall was an iconic full back.

Seán Óg actually retired from playing senior for Kerry in 1963, although he did play junior for a number of years afterwards. A quiet, modest man, he was unobstrusive at Mitchels' games in later years, but enormously popular in the community – including, significantly, many neighbours who never followed gaelic football.

TOM O' CONNOR

Tom O'Connor of Kenmare Shamrocks was another who never needed any introduction for Kerry GAA supporters. His greatest claim to fame was probably as a selector with Jack O'Connor, wise counsel in the background as Kerry went on to lift the Sam Maguire, and his masterful stewardship of a 1991 Kerry Junior team than won the All Ireland against all the odds. However, his greatest impact was surely around Kenmare. He was an absolute icon with Pobal Scoil Inbhearr Sceine. The school famously almost batted far above its population weight. No doubt you have heard of players like Adrian and Killian Spillane, Dara and Seán O'Shea, Paul O'Connor, Stephen O'Brien, Stephen O'Sullivan, Tadhg Morley, Donal Down O'Sullivan,.....it is not mere speculation that makes me think that without Tom O'Connor, you might very well not have heard of any of them. I have literally never attended an Inbhearr Sceine game, at any level (including First Year League games) where Tom wasn't present and if I happened to miss one, Tom was always just a quick phone call away. It says something about the man that he always remembered and credited the good players on the opposition team as well.

FACILE VICTORY FOR KERRY OVER MEATH

Meath were giants once. Meath were the ultimate in durable. They always refused to buckle down the years. They had some of the greatest players ever to grace the stage. Boiler McGuinness, Peter McDermott, Paddy 'Hands' O'Brien, Jack Quinn, Mick Lyons, Liam Hayes, Colm Coyle, Geraghty, Giles (one of the best passers of a ball that I ever saw).... Colm O'Rourke himself, of course. A lot of will remember that day in 2001 when they absolutely destroyed Kerry in an All Ireland semi-final....Declan Quill got our only second half point that day. I remember it; I still think it was just one of those days where everything goes awry. They weren't actually that good and we weren't actually that bad, but once we started floundering, we sank like stones. Go back before that, even before they appointed a soft-spoken herbalist and former hurler....to me, they absolutely shafted Boylan in the finish and that was the day that an inexorable decline

That was then;; this is now. Meath are not the power of yore, far from it. In GAA terms, they are more like a Dublin suburb than actual rivals. It's a shame, but it's the truth. Fair play to the due-hard supporters who made their way to Navan last weekend. I gave it a skip myself. Actually, wild horses couldn't have dragged me. I'll be giving the Louth match a miss as well. These games are absolute rubbish. This is ripoff central by the GAA. The idea of group stages after the provincial championships is gaelic football is pointless. There just aren't enough real contenders, and we all know it. We are creating tests of stamina, not skill, and charging people for the privilege.

I'm not saying too much about the game. I was expecting it to be basically a non-contest, and it didn't even live up to that much billing. Meath defended with everything they had and it took Kerry a while to really get going. Neither of the Cliffords nor Seán O'Shea really sprang into life. Cillian Burke tried hard but didn't really hit the afterburners. Paul Geaney found it hard to find space in which to operate. Kerry had some poor shot selections and some poor wides and could maybe have let the ball in faster when forwards were one on one.

I never paid the slightest attention to this notion of Kerry not scoring goals and that being a big issue. That didn't bother me in the slightest at any stage, and I wouldn't have cared if we didn't score any goals against Meath either. That 'monkey on our back' was never

more than media nonsense trying to foment is has been an issue for them and so has caution drama where there isn't any.

Kerry missed some shots. Meath missed all round them. Three points out of fourteen chances in the first half? Ouch. My heart goes out to them. I have always been a long-time admirer of Colm O'Rourke. Great player and a great guy. But he's drawing from a shallow well and all of Leinster is overshadowed in blue these days. That's not Kerry's problem, but it should be a huge one for the GAA. Dublin's preeminence doesn't worry me as much as it does many others, that's a genuinely great team and I actually like how they play the game. But the fact that Meath, Kildare, and Laois in particular have declined rather than risen in response is a real problem.

Eoghan Freyne kicked a couple of beauties. But Kerry's defenders had the freedom of the entire pitch. The likes of Tom O'Sullivan and Brian Ó Beaglaoich made hay all day.

0-10 to 0-3 at half-time, and commentators were saying that Kerry were struggling to open Meath up. Jays, talk about gilding the lily! Kerry did press on, more with a sense of purpose than urgency. David Clifford did get those two goals in the second half – my word, but he struck that first one with absolute venom!

What did we learn about Kerry that we hadn't known? Absolutely nothing. That game was utterly devoid of purpose. Everyone would have been better off if it had never been played. If I was in the Kerry dressing room afterwards, I'd genuinely be saying not to bother with any post-match analysis. There was no bench mark here to measure yourself against. It was a chore. Kerry got the win, gave some runs to aspiring players, picked up no injuries. Most importantly, they didn't have to reach too deep into the fuel tank. I genuinely believe that, including that coveted week off, is what will be the key factor later on. When the actual All Ireland Championship, not this awful drawnout pre-game show, actually takes place.

Roll on the quarter-finals. Like, as soon as possible, because right now it's immensely boring.

STATE OF PLAY

Group 1

Armagh with a statement win over Derry. Armagh have been the 'nearly' team for the past three years. Personally I think discipline

- having Rian O'Neill supporting midfield in tight games is a bit like playing Lionel Messi as a sweeper. Nobody's saying that he can't do it, but it's not where he has most value. Last weekend Armagh went for goals, having seen Derry's vulnerability. I still have questions about Armagh, but that Derry scalp could do a lot for them. Dark horses. As for Derry, I'm not trying any 'I told you so' (I was far from the only one saying it) but I go back to that National League game where they brought lads back from holiday a week after a Club All Ireland Final to beat Kerry by a single point. The schedule is longer than they realised, just like Mayo last year, and I believe that it is now catching up to them. Galway struggled to put Westmeath away but have their two wins from two. Like Kerry and Dublin, they have been quietly getting the job done without showing too much of their hand (Connaught Final excepted).I don't think Galway are as good as they were two years ago, but I suspect that they are coming good at the right time. Armagh would be a ferocious battle, but I think we would just about prevail. Galway? Bit of an unknown quantity, and I'll be watching out for them.

Group Two

Mayo don't need to beat Dublin. But I suspect that Mayo think that they need to beat Dublin, and I think they'll go handle after hatchet at this one. Dublin have been quietly and solidly going about their business. Apart from hammering Kerry in the National League (and that one felt like a real message being sent out) they haven't actually looked to hit the higher gears. They'll want to win this – that week's break is a massive incentive - but personally I think there will be more hype than substance about this particular clash. They are both through. They will both want to win, but neither will need to win, and that's a completely different mindset. I expect Roscommon to end Cavan's involvement, but I respectfully don't see them lasting too much longer themselves.

Group Three

Hon the Rebels! I don't care what anybody says. Cork have hurt us plenty of times over the years, but I've always had a lot of respect and a little bit of grá for them. They have been trying hard after a very rough patch – it's always been predominantly a hurling county with some great footballers in the mix. They

needed a lift, and I have suspected and stated that they have had a lot of potential if they can put a full performance together – I think people forget how much they had us rattled last year in the group stage. That was the real Cork; they just didn't believe until too late in that game and that penalty (it was a good call) made a difference. Once again, the team that went for goals got them. Interesting to see long kickouts and to see Donegal falling for the quick counter-attacks. Bit of a role reversal there, biter bit one might argue. Jimmy McGuinness brought an aura of clinical invincibility to Donegal; whether their self-belief can recover from this is the question. They could still have beaten Cork and came very close. They'll surely beat Clare and qualify comfortably; I expect they will still top the group.

Tyrone, as expected, saw off Clare fairly comfortably, but they have no room for error. I might be being a bit unfair, given that they compete in easily the toughest province by far, but there has been something brittle and unconvincing about Tyrone ever since their covid All Ireland. They have some of the best forwards in the modern game but their whole game plan revolves around blocking up their half back line and attacking at pace. Will they cut the likes of McCurry and the Canavans loose against Cork? No – and that gives Cork, who play a high line, a real chance. I still favour Tyrone, but every game is sapping a little bit more energy out of them.

Kerry v Louth



Kerry v Roscommon

Next Saturday sees Wayne Quillinan's minor side line out against Roscommon in an All Ireland quarter-final. It amounts to Kerry's first

knock-out game, which brings a dynamic all of its own, but Kerry will go in here as favourites after a fifteen point demolition of a very listless Cork in the Munster Final. Kerry had initially beaten Cork by two points in a game of no huge significance to either side before seeing off Tipperary by 2-19 to 2-5. That one wasn't as clear-cut as it might sound; Tipperary actually gave Kerry a stern test until a one-sided last quarter.

It would be easy, too easy, to read too much into that Munster Final. There's no denying that Kerry have a lot of work put in – they had more than Cork in terms of workrate, strength and conditioning, and tactical awareness. But – and I truly hate seeing this – that was as much to do with a certain malaise on the part of Cork (I saw a lot of those lads in colleges football, they are better than they showed that night – as any perceived excellence by Kerry. Credit where it's due, though. Gearóid White put on an absolute exhibition, while the likes of Ruadhan O'Donovan, Seán Ó Cúinn, midfielders Ben Murphy and Killian Dennehy, and playmaker Jack Joy would be outstanding talents on any team

Roscommon will be far from any pushover. They lost their opening game in Connaught to Mayo, who are considered up among the favourites this year but recovered to beat Galway (who contest the new Tier Two semi-finals along with Donegal, Kildare, and Tyrone) by three points. A comfortable win over Leitrim saw them face Sligo in the last round of the league section (that format works for Connaught, but I would expect too many one-sided games in Munster, which has been traditionally dominated by two counties with the occasional breakthrough by Tipperary) which they won by 2-8 to 0-8. That put them into the semi-final against Galway, and Roscommon's greater penchant for goal saw them triumph by 3-5 to 0-7.

The only Roscommon minor game I have managed to see is the Connaught Final against Mayo (with all the fuss about GAAGO, which I haven't gotten and won't be getting, I think TG4 deserve far more praise than they get for their excellent coverage of mens' and ladies GAA). Mayo won it, and won it fair and square, but Roscommon showed enough quality to concern me. Mind you, they had a lot of numbers back, and I don't think that style is going to stop a Kerry side whose support play

has been one of their strongest features. Kerry know how to thread through blanket defences. Roscommon have been putting up around ten scores a game consistently, including a goal or two. Kerry, and I accept that this is a higher level, can confidently aim for higher totals and know how to tuck away their own chances. Look, predictions of anything when it comes to 17 year olds is a fool's game. Roscommon's strongest area appears to be their midfield. Darragh Devaney and Cathal Enright are excellent, but I'd put my money on Ben Murphy (let's face it, that guy is an absolutely phenomenal talent) and Dennehy. Wing back Eoin Collins is a superb footballer as well, but as against that, I thought they left a few scoring chances behind them that Kerry would be taking. I'm tempting fate I know, but I fancy Kerry to win out in Cusack Park at 6.30pm next Saturday.

GOALS KEY AS KERRY SEE OFF DUBLIN CHALLENGE

Intermediate Camogie Round Two Kerry 2- 12 Dublin 0-13

Kerry had a morale-boosting first victory of the year last Saturday in the opening round of the All Ireland Intermediate Group Stage, but with all due respect, a home game against a very depleted Antrim is a whole other proposition to travelling to St.Peregrine's in the heart of Dublin city to take on the home side. Just to flavour the broth, Dublin were playing in a double-header, with their seniors (who beat Kerry by 2-14 to 0-9 in the National League) taking on Clare straight afterwards.

This was tough hurling, neither side willing to give an inch. Space was always going to be at a premium. Dublin made the brighter start, Jennifer Moore opening their account and the outstanding Roisín Ní Chathasaigh doubling the advantage. Laura Collins in particular was already asking questions inside for Kerry, though, and the peerless Jackie Horgan confidently despatched a '45 to get Kerry on the board. In the 10th minute she doubled her tally from a free. In a game like this, dead ball accuracy was always going to be crucial, and Kerry have one of the best in the business. Another free, this time from the stand side, was iust as comfortably converted, and Kerry were in front for the first time, 0-3 to 0-2.

Dublin kept coming, and while Kerry were able

to cut out any sniff at goal, the metropolitans did win frees and Gráinne Skelton proved just as adept as her counterpart at the art, slotting three in a row.

Roisín Ní Chathasaigh picked off her second point, with Jackie Horgan replying with a twenty metre free. 0-6 to 0-4, and Dublin probably deserved their slight lead at that stage. But then came arguably the game's turning point. Ann-Marie won possession out around the middle, spotted Amy O'Sullivan inside in a fraction of space, and drilled a superb pass straight in. Amy gathered just ahead of the defender and cut inside before unleashing rocket that gave the hapless keeper no chance. Jackie Horgan added another free, quickly cancelled out by Gráinne Skelton. Kerry were definitely on top now, and came very close to two more green flags, Chloe Ní Cheallaigh doing well to parry a rasping effort from Jackie Horgan. Before the break, Jackie swung over a long range beauty to give Kerry a 1-6 to 0-7 lead at half-time.

Once again it was Dublin who burst out of the blocks faster. Grainne Skelton snapped over another free and Roisín Ní Chathasaigh lofted over another fine score to level the tie. Jackie Horgan nudged Kerry back in front with a free and exchanged further minors with Skelton to make it 1-8 to 0-10.

With the game right in the mix now, it was Kerry again who came up with the little bit of magic to break it open. There didn't look to be too much on when Kate Lynch scooped up the ball 40 metres from goal until a sudden burst of acceleration suddenly found her with both space and momentum. She unhesitatingly burst inside and coolly unleashed a thunderbolt that rattled the net. 2-8 to 0-10, and for the first time in the game, there was real daylight between the teams.

Gráinne Skelton hit back with another free, but Kerry had the momentum now and Jackie swung over her first point from play and added a free. Skelton raised another white flag, Roisín Ní Chathasaigh picked off her third point, and sub Emma Moran got in on the scoring act for Dublin. They needed goals now as the time got tight, but a redoubtable Kerry defence didn't cough up a single opportunity, and the relentless Jackie Horgan closed out an invaluable win with the last two scores to take her personal tally to an even dozen.

There's an awfully long way to go yet, but

IRELAND WOMEN STRUGGLING FOR GOALS

Euro Qualifiers Sweden 0 Ireland 3

Ireland gripped the heart of a nation with a brilliant World Cup and Nations League B campaigns. The likes of Katie McCabe deservedly became household names. But I suspect that expectations maybe got slightly ahead of reality. I think that the always pragmatic Vera Pauw paid the price for not being fooled by the hype and understanding our limitations at the higher levels. After her treatment, Eileen Gleeson was absolutely right to insist on guarantees regarding her long-term development role and insisting on the title of 'interim' manager - in the FAI, these things never last long and never end well.

We got just the one goal in the World Cup and to be honest, that was a corner that had a certain amount of hit-and-hope about it. We are actually a very solid team with one definite world class performer and a lot of solid ones. But we always struggle to get it on the board. We actually started well here. Lily Agg got on the end of a very good McCabe cross, but couldn't direct it downwards - Quinn almost got a head to the loose ball but credit Sweden's sharp defending. We had Sweden - and that's definitely a top team - under pressure. To be honest, Agg should most definitely have tucked away the opening goal after very good work by Amber Barrett. That's a bread-and-butter finish, but she nudged it wide. A few minutes later, Sweden showed exactly how its done, slicing us open very simply and opening the scoring. They almost got another, Kannaryd showing great feet to slip Louise Quinn (and that's not an easy feat at all; I rate Quinn) but Caitlin Hayes getting back to block the finish.

Great play by McCabe – I know I am harping on a theme here, but do you actually understand how many genuinely world class players, male or female, this country has produced? You can count them on your hands and have fingers left over - on to Agg, and a very good cross. It wasn't any 'gimme' like Agg's earlier effort, but I thought Barrett could have gotten over the header a bit more. It went just over. Fair enough; this was good soccer to watch. Before the end of the half, Barrett pounced on a defensive error (a bad one) but her touch at full stretch was just a fraction too heavy. No fault; she was in the right place at the right time. Some days those ones fall for you, this time it didn't. 1-0 at half-time.

We never got going in the second half. Courtney Brosnan had to be rescued by alert defending after missing a ball across her goalmouth, but she redeemed herself with a good save (I thought the Swedish player could have just slipped it across to the support player). Our defence was looking very rattled and Sweden were beginning to play those measured balls for forwards to run onto that defenders hate. The second goal arrived in the 61st minute and again, it looked simple, but it was the absolutely perfect weight on the pass that made it look that easy. Louise Quinn's deflection actually took it past her own defender, but there was a sense of inevitability about it anyway.

The third goal really hurt. Kanneryd simply just burst through empty space, her speed carving Ireland open, before putting it across. How do you have the entire defence sucked to one side with a lone striker waiting patiently in prime position? At least force Kanneryd into her own shot. As it happened, Brosnan actually saved the first attempt, but Kanneryd coolly slotted the rebound.

Much of the aftermath has been taken up with the two goal chances missed in the first quarter. We are definitely relegated, but I'm afraid that the narrative that those misses are the only problem we need to fix is wrong. We are now certainties for relegation - arrah, in fairness, with France, England, and Sweden in the one group, it would have been asking a bit much of any team. We do have a play-off pathway towards Euro qualification

FILLING WINDOW BOXES AND CONTAINERS

Again there is a large range of different types of window boxes and containers. The most popular ones are the plastic. If it's a plastic window box that you have the first thing you must do is sort out the drainage.

Turn the window box upside down and you will see holes marked out. You can either use a screw driver or a drill to punch out these holes. Turn the box back up and put some small stones or polysterine around the holes. Fill the box with compost and a slow release fertiliser to about half an inch from the top of the box and firm in compost. When choosing the plants for the window box make sure that the taller plants are at the back trailing plants towards the front and medium sized plants for

A good example for tall plants at the back of the box would be upright geraniums or upright fuchsias. Good trailing plants for the front of the box would be trailing geraniums or trailing petunias. Other examples of good trailing plants for fillers would be trailing lobelia, bacopa and bidens.

When you box is planted, water in plants well and don't put into position for a few days.

Remember that all window sills slope so when your trailing plants start to grow you will need



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






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






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
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"The human heart is the most deceitful of all things, and desperately wicked.

Who really knows how bad it is? But I, the Lord, search all hearts and examine secret motives of the mind. I give all people their due rewards according to what their actions and conduct deserve" (Jeremiah 17:9-10)

Equally one can be fooled by the smooth talk and flattery and gestures of goodwill by others, whilst oblivious to their - sometimes glaring - character flaws. Everything boils down to character. And good character must be cultivated — this requires work, but human nature can be lazy and it's easier to not put in the effort to develop good character which is a higher level follow-through of a person's basic good intentions.

Character transformation takes courage and humility, and is learned in the study of God's Word, through the leading of His Holy Spirit. Solomon puts it this way... "trust in the Lord with all your heart, lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths. Don't be impressed with your own wisdom. Instead fear the Lord and turn away from evil. Then you will have healing for your body and strength for your bones" (Proverbs 3:5-8). Humbling ourselves before God and looking unto Him for help, wisdom, and His Grace to overcome is a triumph, not weakness. People fear being vulnerable and weak. But God is attracted to weakness genuine and heartfelt cries for His strength by a repentant heart.

"Don't copy the behaviour, customs, or pattern of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good, and pleasing, and perfect" (Romans 12:2).

If you like, the study God's Word and leaning into a meaningful relationship with the Lord Jesus is akin to letting God re-programme you to resolve the glitches. When we make Jesus Lord of all - repenting of sin and asking Him into our hearts — it's actually an act of obedience, trust, and humility. Admitting by confessing aloud - 'God, I cannot do this by myself, but Lord Jesus Your Word says that I can do all things through Christ Who strengthens me, so I'm going to put my hand in yours. Melt my heart Lord, forgive me, change my way of thinking, heal my attitudes and motives, deliver me from evil Lord Jesus, and fill my heart with Your Joy, Your Love, Your Peace and baptise me with Your Holy Spirit of Life. Teach me Your ways that I may obey You always, Jesus, in Your Name I pray. Amen.' So as the song says... turn your eyes upon Jesus, look full in His wonderful face...and the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the Light of His Glory and Grace.


