

# Plaque unveiled at Flesk Bridge to mark 100 YEARS OF EAST KERRY GAA

This year, the East Kerry GAA Board is celebrating one hundred years since its foundation. In that inaugural year, the East Kerry Board organised their first League and Kilcummin and Killorglin reached the final of that competition. That final game between Kilcummin and Killorglin was played in the old "Cricket Field" behind Flesk Bridge on the Muckross Road, Killarney. Kilcummin were the eventual winners on a scoreline of 2-04 to 1-00 on Sunday November 20th 1925.

On Sunday, the East Kerry Board were proud to unveil a plaque at Flesk Bridge to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of that first East Kerry League Final. Mayor of Killarney, Martin O'Grady, was on hand to officially unveil the plague. The unveiling was watched by a large crowd that consisted of representatives of every club in East Kerry GAA, including a large contingent from Kilcummin GAA Club. The representatives from Kilcummin included descendants and relatives of every player on that victorious 1925 team. Four ladies held pride of place on the day, being daughters of three players from 1925. Mrs.Tessie Sheahan, whose father, Timmy McCarthy played left half back, Mrs. Noreen Cooper represented her father, Connie O'Leary, who played left full forward and Eileen O'Sullivan and Bridie O'Neill represented their father Jack Cronin, who played left half forward.

After the unveiling, the assembled crowd made their way to the Gleneagle Hotel, where there were speeches by Mayor Martin O'Grady, East Kerry Vice-Chairman Noel Kennedy and Kilcummin representative Billy Doolan. Billy introduced all the descendants and relatives of the 1925 Kilcummin team. President Ger Galvin was Master of Ceremonies for the day. Light refreshments were enjoyed by everyone afterwards.

That victorious 1925 Klcummin team were presented with a set of gold medals for winning the first East Kerry League and two of those medals were on display on Sunday. Noel and Dermot Fleming provided their grandfather's medal for the occasion and Donal O'Meara, who travelled from Dublin to be present, brought his uncle's, Pat O'Meara, medal with him. A third medal survives and is currently in the UK. The pathways of both finalists, Kilcummin and Killorglin, were set out on two boards, which were also on display.

ward winning Kerry Photographer Valerie O'Sullivan is set to release her stunning new book that captures beautiful and quirky Kerry

On the Edge of Europe KERRY is published by Currach Press and charters Kerry's people and cultural heritage that have shaped the landscape for millennia.

The book charts through words and images the richness of 'The Kingdom of Kerry' from ancient 'rock art' to winter and summer alignments, the golden age of monasticism, of high kings, saints, scholars, pilgrims who dared venture to all corners of the earth in the early centuries, and those from far off countries who visited the edge of Europe and brought their own blend of culture.

In his foreword of the book, Niall Ó Donnchú, Director General, National Parks and Wildlife Service - whose roots are well defined in Gneeveguilla, the heart of Sliabh Luachra, writes: 'Valerie O'Sullivan has long understood that to portray Kerry is not only to frame its grandeur, but to honour the relationship between people and place.

Her lens finds the drama of ocean cliffs and mountain passes, but also the intimacy of a face, the glow of a cottage window, the fleeting play of light across stone. Hers is a mastery of transposition: from view through lens to photograph.'

On the Edge of Europe Kerry explores the more quirky nature of Kerry - from the highest farm in Ireland, the highest Grotto, the farthest Island in Europe, to the ancient customs of the 'Kilbognet Biddies' and 'Lá an Dreoilín' - The Dingle Wren.

The UNESCO biosphere reserve that is Killarney National Park is given centre stage in the book. Over 30,000 acorns were gathered by National Park and Wildlife Service Outdoor Staff from the ancient Derrycunnihy native Oak woodlands in Killarney National Park. The Oak woodlands at Killarney National Park form the most extensive and oldest areas of native woodlands in Ireland and Northern Europe. Regeneration is well underway. The Park has the largest Yew woodland, which occurs along the Muckross Peninsula. Images of 'The Monarch of Mangerton' one of the largest upland Irish Red Stags in Ireland. The successful Whitetailed Eagle Project, an abundance of flora and fauna, kayaking in the caves of Muckross restoration of Victorian structures. Lake. Celebrating the oldest traditional regatta in the world. The first four lady Jarvey's in the history of Killarney tourism, the famous boatmen,

### Con and Anne Stack to be honoured in Killarney

Start small and think big was always the motto of Con and Anne Stack who saw their company grow from a small operation in a shed in their back garden to a multi-national enterprise that now employs over 600 people.

That remarkable success story is to be recognised in their hometown of Killarney in the coming weeks when they are inducted into the Order of Inisfallen, the most prestigious honour the town can bestow.

Con, originally from Moyvane, initially served an apprenticeship in a knife-making factory in Germany, followed by a managerial role in a US multinational in Shannon. He moved to Killarney in February 1969 to take up the role as manager of Ross Products, a company that specialised in the manufacture of cardboard boxes, on Lewis Road.

He soon identified a market for cuttingedge fibre glass and glass enforced products, with no capital required, and he operated from a shed at his home, with his Ballyduff native wife, Anne (née Leahy) by his side and playing her part.

Very soon an opportunity arose to create a product for the then thriving Pretty Polly factory in Killarney and Con spotted a requirement to manufacture fibre glass water tanks to replace galvanised steel models which were experiencing problems with rust.

He instantly built up a rapport with local companies like MD O'Shea & Sons and O'Callaghan Plumbing, as well as building boats for anglers, and to cater for a rapidly growing market, in 1973, Killarney Plastics was born

Son, Michael, remembers his mum dropping the five children to school before spending the day working alongside Con and, when school finished, they all made their way to their base in St Mary's Terrace before being brought home to do their homework and have dinner.


Con left his post in Ross Products in 1980 and his company moved operations to a IDA supported, purpose-built unit before the growth and the need became such that the current Tricel plant in the Ballyspillane Industrial Estate was developed.

The remarkable dedication shown and groundwork put in by Con and Anne Stack in the early days paid handsome dividends as Killarney Plastics became a key part of global engineering company Tricel

From humble beginnings, it evolved into a family-led global provider, delivering performance and innovation-driven solutions across the water, environmental, construction and distribution industries.

Tricel develops, manufactures and distributes an extensive range of innovative products mainly across Ireland, France, Denmark and the UK and it provides specialist services to customers in over 50 countries worldwide.

With 14 companies within the group it currently employs 620 people, 200 of



whom are based in Killarney.

Con and Anne remained full-time in the business until they passed it on to their children who are masterminding a very successful future for one of the great Killarney business success stories.

Now enjoying their retirement, secure in the knowledge that their lifetime of work is in good hands and that family remains the key to success. They have four sons, Michael, Con, Richard and Robert and a daughter Graine.

The Order of Inisfallen is a civic honour – a joint initiative between Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and Kerry County Council – that recognises those who have made exceptional contributions to the local economy and to the tourism industry.

Previous recipients have included former Taoiseach Enda Kenny, Charles, King of England, actor Michael Fassbender, entrepreneurs Donal Ring and Michael O'Donoghue and entertainer Daniel O'Donnell who has attracted thousands of people to his Killarney concerts,.

The award is named after Inisfallen Island, on Lough Leane, which was historically a centre of learning where the precious Annals of Inisfallen were scripted.

#### **Kerry County Council Opens 2026 Arts Funding Applications**

Bursary categories include Creative Work Development, Artist in Retreat, and Further Arts Education, while the Eamon Kelly Bursary is open to established artists from or living in the Killarney area.

Schools are encouraged to apply for the Artists in Schools Scheme, designed to connect local artists with students and teachers. The Youth Theatre Grant, run in partnership with the Kerry Local Creative Youth Partnership, is open to not-for-profit organisations operating new or existing youth theatres.



Kerry ignited with fire, folklore, and festivity this autumn as Samhain Chiarraí – A Kerry Halloween is taking place from the 16th of October to the 9th of November 2025, celebrating the county's ancient traditions and cultural spirit.

Following Kerry's selection as one of the destinations for Fáilte Ireland's Home of Halloween Pilot Scheme, the initiative formed part of the national Home of Halloween Strategy, which aimed to establish Ireland as the authentic global home of Halloween. Samhain Chiarraí delivered a celebration deeply rooted in Ireland's authentic Samhain heritage, drawing inspiration from the Cailleach, the wise and wild Goddess of Winter, who, according to legend, emerged each year to mark the end of the harvest and the turning of the Celtic year.

The festival programme featured county-wide events, including three major new Samhain experiences in Tralee, Killarney, and Listowel. These family-friendly events told the story of the Cailleach Chiarraí through street processions, awakening spectacles, fireworks displays, céilís,

willow workshops, and treasure hunts.

Kerry County Council supported a wide range of associated community festivals and events across the county, including Féile Eile in Killorglin, Halloween Howl in Kenmare, and the Sneem Storytelling Festival. These were among the many local celebrations that took place between October 16th and November 9th, marking Halloween in Kerry.

Locals and visitors alike connected with Kerry's dúchas its heritage, sense of belonging, and spirit of place—through a variety of workshops, street spectacles, light projections, and community rituals.

### VENISON ON THE MENUS REQUIRED

Some while back I met tourists who wondered why we didn't have venison on menus in Killarney when we had so many well fed deer to get rid of. I have been asking the same thing myself.

The Irish Deer Commission too has been seeking to develop a wild venison market. Most hunters are limited in the numbers of deer they can sell here and end up eating most of what they kill.

Damien Hannigan of the IDC strongly believes being able to achieve proper deer management and having a venison industry "go hand in hand". Europe has demand for venison and Irish venison would go down well there, Damien feels.

You can't really have a sustainable deer management strategy without being able to sell the venison locally.

"While venison is a super food in terms of health benefits, sustainable, and organic, the demand for venison in Ireland is low," he said. This is because it is not promoted and the Irish

venison market is very little developed.

A survey by the commission showed 77% of respondents consume all the venison they cull. A significant number of deer culled in Ireland are exported in fur to the UK by Approved Game Handling Establishments.

Scotland has a well developed handling industry with handlers in practically every town in Scotland having a game buyer.

Meanwhile I did a quick Seared Haunch of Wild survey of restaurant menus Photo: Don MacMonagle in Killarney. One of the few to offer venison is Bricín in High Street.

Venison is on their menu in autumn and it goes down well, Bricín's Johnny McGuire said. However quality has to be closely monitored. Bord Bia says much the same as everyone else: the venison industry is underdeveloped and quality assurance is also an issue.

There seems to be some resistance by the beef and lamb industry from what I hear: they don't want any other four-legged creature on their patch. Although I can't see how wild venison would be any real threat.

If Bord Bia got the farmers on board, there would be plenty of venison on the menus and in the supermarkets, methinks.

#### ODOUR FROM THE SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT IN KILLARNEY CONFIRMED

There were two complaints about odours from the Killarney Waste Water Treatment Plant in the Ross Road/Demesne so far this year, the environmental agency, the EPA has confirmed.

There seem to have been separate complaints at the height of the hot weather this summer. "The nature of the complaints were odour issues from the Wastewater treatment plant. Uisce Éireann investigated the odour complaints, contacted the complainant, and took measures in relation to odour monitoring/assessment, sludge management and odour abatement. There have been no further complaints in relation to the wastewater treatment plant in 2025," the EPA said finally after overcoming hurdles on data protection.

According to the EPA, one of four bodies - along with the council and Uisce Eireann and Inland Fisheries Ireland - involved with water quality in Killarney, the plant is "compliant with the wastewater discharge licence (Reference D0037) emission limit values".

I keep pressing the EPA and Uisce Eireann about the capacity - they keep saying it's within the limits. But there is also the reluctant admission dragged out of them last year that yes the plant needs upgrading and yes there is an issue with the discharge into the lake that is causing the pollution in the Laune.

"Uisce Éireann reported to the EPA in early 2025 that options to upgrade Killarney WWTP to provide for growth and continued discharge at the current location, along with the options for relocating the discharge, are currently being assessed," is what the EPA now say.

### LEFT AND THEN ALL THAT IS LEFT - POLITICS IN IRELAND

The huge money being spent on refugee accommodation, the lack of proper train services to the south, only a patchwork of good roads, no water and sewage, no housing for our own educated and working young people who are all emigrating again and murders practically every day in the news.

Then our obsession with Gaza and our antisemitism - her friends on the continent are flabbergasted.

She might have added the dirt and dereliction in Dublin or the way the wet leaves pile up on the paths outside the Killarney train station. And how in the two days I was away no one had bothered to brush them up.

I am not alone in wondering who politically represents me anymore.

The latest madness is they would have all of us speaking Irish. When most of us long to hear English on our streets, hospitals and shops, so we feel we are still living in the Ireland we grew up in and the country our hard working parents with few entitlements not to mind luxuries helped build.

This fixation with non-speak and censoring debate started in our schools. Don't speak if you can't say something kind, was plastered on a notice board in the rural school where I voted. I looked up this acronym associated with THINK - you should only speak if you can say something inspiring and kind. It was apparently conjured up to counter bullying. But it's a Trojan Horse to stop conscientious thinking and smother spontaneous plain speech from a young age. It seems to have succeeded.

No wonder we are where we are - in our socialist utopia with our heads admiring the clouds and hardly able to walk with the leaves piling up around us.

Ah but it would be unkind of me to point that out!

# Tributes to homeless advacator Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy

The Religious Sisters of Charity have led tributes to the late Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy. RIP who passed away on Monday.

"We are deeply saddened to announce the passing of Sister Stanislaus Kennedy, known to many as Sr Stan. Sr Stan died after a short time at the St Francis Hospice, Blanchardstown.

"Sr Stan was a powerful voice for compassion, equality, and systemic change throughout her life. She will be greatly missed by her family, friends, co-workers and the Congregation. While there is a deep sadness, we are confident that her legacy of a life dedicated to the service of others in need, will continue to inspire us and generations of activists and social innovators in Ireland," says Sr Patricia Lenihan, Superior General.

"Sr Stan joined the Religious Sisters of Charity in 1958 and devoted her life to helping others. She was a leading advocate and activist for change, working tirelessly to support the homeless, immigrants, and those in disadvantaged communities throughout Ireland and beyond. Throughout her life, Sr Stan was a courageous force for social change. She challenged the status quo and consistently voiced her informed views to influence policy and promote justice."

Born Treasa Kennedy on 19 June 1939 near Lispole, on the Dingle Peninsula in County Kerry, Sr Stan was one of five children growing up in a farming family. At the age of 18, inspired by the work of our foundress Mary Aikenhead, she decided to become a Sister and was professed in January 1960. From 1995 until 2007, Sr Stan was a member of the Religious Sisters of Charity's General Leadership Team, a role that placed her at the heart of the Congregation's global mission and governance. To help achieve lasting social change, she founded several organisations to provide vital services where they were most needed. In 1985, she founded Focus Point, (now Focus Ireland), following her research into the needs of women experiencing homelessness in Dublin in the 1980s. Focus Ireland is now the country's largest voluntary



organisation helping people to find, create and maintain a home. In 1998, she established 'The Sanctuary', a centre for meditation and spiritual reflection, on Stanhope Street in Dublin. In 2001, she founded the Immigrant Council of Ireland (ICI), a national organisation promoting the rights of immigrants through information, advocacy, and legal aid. She also established the Young Social Innovators (YSI) in 2021, a national initiative to empower students to be more socially aware and engage on social issues to drive positive change.

She a was a driving force for societal change across a range of issues in Ireland for over 60 years. Her early mission focused on developing social services in Kilkenny, before she became the first Chair of the National Committee on Pilot Schemes to Combat Poverty in Ireland. In 1985, the European Commission appointed her as Transnational Coordinator for the European Rural Anti-Poverty Programme. She served on the Council of State from 1997 to 2004, appointed by President Mary McAleese.

During her life, Sr Stan was recognised for her outstanding contribution to Irish society including: UCD Alumni Award for Social Sciences (2014), Meteor Humanitarian of the Year Award (2004) as well as Honorary Doctorates from Trinity College Dublin, UCD, and the Open University. She was the successful author of numerous books in which she shared her vision and life purpose, including her autobiography

The Road Home.

We give thanks for Sr Stan's life, her vision, and her unwavering commitment to justice and compassion.

Norma Foley, TD also paid tribute to Sr. Stan saying she was "Saddened to learn of the passing of Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy. RIP A powerful advocate, friend and voice for those who needed it most. An inspirational Kerrywoman blessed with courage, integrity and a quiet dignity..Her legacy is rich. Leaba I measc na naomh go raibh aici."

Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy (Treasa), Religious Sisters of Charity, No 1 The Lodge, Stanhope Street, and formerly of Reenbuí, Lispole, Co. Kerry passed away on the 3rd November 2025 in the loving care of the staff of St. Francis Hospice, Blanchardstown. Predeceased by her parents Bridget and Tadgh Kennedy and her sisters Mary and Kathleen.

Sr. Stan will be deeply regretted by her Community and the Congregation of the Religious Sisters of Charity, her sister Eileen, brother Thomas, sister-in-law Bridie, brother-in-law Kevin, her nieces Deirdre, Caroline, Bríd, Gráinne, Ita, Áine, Sinéad, nephews Ciaran, Míchael, Tim, Tomás, grandnieces, grandnephews, great-grandnieces, great-grandnephews, her many friends and colleagues from Focus Ireland, Immigrant Council of Ireland, Young Social Innovators and The Sanctuary.



### NEW BIOGRAPHY CELEBRATES TRALEE'S LEGENDARY SPORTSMAN, MUSICIAN, AND PRIEST



A remarkable new biography, Unbeatable – Handball Supremo: Fr. Tom Jones 1868–1950, by Tom Looney, published by Londubh Books & Red Stripe Press (2025), shines a well-deserved light on one of Kerry's most extraordinary sons. Born on Rock Street, Tralee, in the year following the Fenian Rising, Fr. Tom Jones lived a life that spanned continents and causes, excelling as a world-class handball champion, musician, linguist, patriot, and dedicated priest. Known locally as An Laoch Ba Thréine "the most powerful warrior among handball folk that ever lived" he is buried in the grounds of St. James'Church, Glenbeigh, where he ministered for 24 years.

Tom Looney's 160-page volume tells the story of a man who was a 'Son of the Street of Champions', his family owning a public house at No. 13 Rock Street, Tralee. A multi-titled handball champion before his ordination at Maynooth in 1896, Jones also made his mark as the college's top athlete, the Senior Alley still known today as Jones's Court or the Kerry



Court.

His missionary years took him to Antrim, Leeds, and Australia, where he served the remote Rockmount Diocese before returning home in 1905 after a transatlantic journey that included a chance encounter with Captain Francis O'Neill and the Uilleann Pipes in Chicago an instrument he later mastered and played with legends such as Leo Rowsome and John Potts. Throughout his 45 years in ministry in Kerry, Fr. Jones served in Baile an Fheirtéaraigh, Dingle, Killorglin, Caherciveen, and Glenbeigh/Glencar. His life was punctuated by moments of heroism and tragedy including the 1909 Blasket Island drowning of Dónal Ó Criomhthain and Eibhlín Nic Niocaill, and his daring 1916 cliff rescue of eight Norwegian sailors, for which he was honoured with a Silver Goblet by the King of Norway.

A fluent linguist, Jones published Irish translations of both German and French classics, while local lore remembers him fondly for his humour and frugality. The book brings

together rare photographs, documents, and anecdotes, offering an intimate portrait of a truly unique Kerry figure.

# Killarney Woman Conferred with an Honorary Doctorate at SETU

South East Technological University (SETU) conferred honorary doctorates on Olympian John Treacy and Killarney woman Elizabeth Riordan-Coppin in recognition of their outstanding contributions to Irish life through sport, leadership, and advocacy for human rights and justice.

The conferring ceremony, held this afternoon at SETU Arena, West Campus, Carriganore, marked the third consecutive year the University has celebrated individuals who have made a lasting impact on Irish society.

Elizabeth Rioredan-Coppin has been recognised for her extraordinary contribution to Irish society, Elizabeth Riordan-Coppin was awarded an honorary doctorate for her courage, resilience and lifelong advocacy for human rights and social justice.

Born in St Columbanus County Home in Killarney, Co Kerry, Ms Riordan-Coppin spent her early years in Ireland's industrial school and Magdalene Laundry system, including time in Waterford. Sent to these institutions as a child, she has spoken about enduring harsh conditions, forced labour, and physical and psychological abuse, while being denied her freedom, education, and identity.

Despite this difficult start, Ms Riordan-Coppin later rebuilt a life in England as a nursery nurse, teacher, and mother. Choosing to share her personal story publicly, she transformed the pain of her experience into a lifelong mission to speak out, not only for herself, but for the countless women whose voices had been silenced

Elizabeth's dignified campaign for justice culminated in a landmark case before the UN Committee Against Torture in 2020 - the first ever brought by a Magdalene survivor - urging Ireland to confront a difficult legacy of institutional mistreatment.

Her advocacy for Magdalene Laundry and Industrial School survivors has since shaped

public discourse, informed national inquiries, and inspired future generations to seek justice with compassion and resolve.

Little did I ever imagine, I would return to Waterford on a voluntary basis, close to one of the Magdalene Laundries where I was once confined, to receive such a magnificent and prestigious award.

"I feel honoured, and truly astonished. I am profoundly grateful to all the wonderful people who have supported me throughout my campaign, especially JFM Justice for Magdalene - Dr Maeve O'Rourke, Dr Claire McGettrick, born Lorraine Hughes, and Professor Katherine O'Donnell. I would also like to thank Dr Jennifer

O'Mahoney and Dr Kate McCarthy from this University for recommending me for this honorary doctorate."

"Finally, this honour means recognition not only for me but for the thousands of women and girls trafficked by the State and their agents to Magdalene Laundries," she added.

Both recipients were selected through a nomination process involving SETU students, staff, and alumni, with the final decision made by the University's Governing Body.

Through this annual tradition, SETU continues to celebrate individuals whose exceptional achievements have shaped Irish society through the arts and sciences, culture, advocacy, social activity, sport, business, and beyond.

#### **ELECTRICITY SUPPLY AMENDMENT BILL RAISED IN DAIL EIREANN**

Deputy Danny Healy Rae spoke on the Electricity supply amendment bill in the Dáil this week. Here is what he had to say:

While I welcomed the investment by the Government in the ESB which is needed and thanked all the workers that put their lives in danger to restore the power –

" I welcome the investment by Government in the ESB. It surely needs to improve when we see communities left without electricity for days and weeks in places such as Cordal, Brosna, Gneeveguilla, Glencar and Knocknagoshel earlier in the year because of a storm. I want to thank all the workers that put their lives in danger trying to restore the lines, day and night, to get the power going. I have to commend them very highly." I do question why the consumer have to pay so much for electricity and many of the suppliers increased their rates again recently. I ask where is the regulator in this regard?

"The other problem I have is that we hear this massive sum being invested in the ESB, but what are we doing for our consumers that have to pay so

much? Do we have a regulator? Where is he? Did he ever open his mouth? Is he asleep all the time? What is happening the regulator or is he there at all? That is what I am asking. This is the only sector where companies seem to get what increases they want and the poor consumers have to suffer these massive charges."

I also raised the matter regarding the many farmers generating electricity, but they now find that the grid is only going one way, and the infrastructure is not in place to sell the electricity to the ESB and I asked the Minister to look into this further.

"Many farmers and others are generating electricity themselves. They were encouraged to produce enough that they could sell it and now we find the grid is only going the one way, bringing electricity to them. The infrastructure is not there to sell the electricity to the ESB. The ESB, in some cases, will only take one third of what they can produce. There is something wrong here and I ask the Minister of State to look at that. It is very serious."





# KERRY HAYES NAMED KERRY LIDL FAMILY CARER OF THE YEAR 2025

Kerry Hayes from Milltown has been named the Kerry Lidl Family Carer of the Year 2025. The awards recognise the remarkable commitment, compassion and strength of family carers who provide essential care to loved ones every day. The Lidl Family Carer of the Year Awards celebrate those whose dedication and compassion make a difference in the lives of the people they care for. They also serve as a reminder that behind every person receiving care is someone providing it, often quietly and without rest, recognition or access to vital supports and services which should be provided by the State.

Kerry has devoted herself completely to caring for her daughter Ruby (8), who has a rare genetic condition known as TBCK. Ruby's condition is life-limiting and requires round the clock care, as she is non-verbal, visually impaired, PEG fed and lives with epilepsy, brittle bones and sleep apnoea. Kerry has made huge sacrifices in her career and social life to be there for her daughter every moment of every day. Over the past two years, she and her fiancé have built a fully adapted home for Ruby, with Kerry using her respite hours to help on site, stacking roof tiles, carrying deliveries, painting, decorating and overseeing every detail.

Alongside this, she continues to manage Ruby's complex medical needs, including hospital stays and appointments, while also looking after their young son Leon (4), ensuring he has



time for football, jiu jitsu and play therapy. Her days are long and demanding, yet she meets them all with love, strength and grace. Her story is a powerful example of the dedication and selflessness shown by family carers in Kerry and across Ireland.

Since announcing their partnership with Family Carers Ireland at the end of 2024, Lidl has been supporting the caring community through the

development of their Lidl Charity Champion programme. One team member from every Lidl store and Regional Distribution Centre across Ireland has volunteered their time and energy to support Family Carers Ireland through a host of activities including planning and participating in store fundraising and fostering greater community engagement.

#### **EUROPE PREPARES FOR 2027:**

### What Comes After Temporary Protection for Ukrainians

European policymakers, civil society leaders, and officials gathered in Brussels for a major debate titled "After Temporary Protection: Staying in the EU, Returning to Ukraine." The event, organised by the European Policy Centre (EPC), Egmont Institute, PICUM, and the International Rescue Committee (IRC), focused on the future of more than 4.7 million Ukrainians currently under the EU's Temporary Protection Directive (TPD).

Among the participants was Natalia Eismont, Chairperson of Future of Ukrainian Nation (Kerry, Ireland), representing the Ukrainian community in Ireland and contributing to discussions on integration and cooperation between the EU and local networks.

In her keynote, Ylva Johansson, EU Special Envoy for Ukrainians, stressed the need for "long-term solutions that preserve dignity and stability." The Temporary Protection Directive, introduced in 2022, has allowed Ukrainians to work, study, and access healthcare and social support across the EU. However, it is due to expire in March 2027, prompting a Europe-wide discussion on what comes next. During a panel moderated by Michelle Levoy of PICUM, representatives from Germany, Czechia, and the European Commission

outlined national approaches to the transition from temporary to long-term residence. Nasira Bouhlouat from DG HOME noted that "most Ukrainians are integrating, working, paying taxes, and sending their children to school," and called for stable legal statuses that maintain their rights. Magda Faltová from Czechia described her country's new five-year residence permit for Ukrainians, while acknowledging barriers such as high income requirements. Hans-Ulrich Benga from the German Interior Ministry reported that Germany now hosts 1.3 million Ukrainians, with 36% employment, adding that "Ukrainians are contributing to our economy, and the priority is to ensure they can remain if they wish."

Ilona Havronska, Ukraine's Deputy Minister of Social Policy for European Integration, spoke on reintegration efforts for those considering return. Guided by principles of unity, dignity, and partnership, she said Ukraine is developing programmes to support returnees and strengthen ties with Europe. EU officials confirmed that the Temporary Protection Directive will remain in effect until 2027, after which most member states plan to transition beneficiaries to national or long-term residence schemes. While a legal extension



remains possible, Brussels currently prioritises sustainable, individual solutions.

Speakers also stressed the need to protect vulnerable groups such as children, people with disabilities, and those unable to return. Civil society organisations — including Future of Ukrainian Nation, continue to play a crucial role in linking EU policy, local communities, and Ukrainian individuals across Europe.

Closing the forum, Johansson remarked, "We are moving from the logic of refugee status to the logic of diaspora, from emergency response to long-term responsibility. Ukrainians are fighting not only for themselves, but for Europe."



Kerry Archaeological and Historical Society will host several events over the coming weeks, including the publication of their Kerry Journal and the Kerry Magazine for 2025.



#### MUCKROSS ROWER CILLIAN LESLIE COMPETES FOR IRELAND

There was great excitement last weekend for Muckross Rowing Club and one of its talented rowers, Cillian Leslie from Ballyhar, who travelled to Cadiz in Spain as part of an Irish squad of 16 rowers that competed in the Coupe de la Jeunesse Beach Sprints last week. The Coupe de la Jeunesse is a rowing federation of 16 European countries with annual Olympic rowing competitions for athletes in the Under 19 category. Since 1985, the Coupe has brought together some of Europe's best junior rowers with many Coupe athletes progressing to further international success at senior level. Ahead of the introduction of coastal beach sprint rowing at the Los Angeles Olympics in 2028, the fast-paced Beach Sprint event has recently been added to the annual programme of Coupe rowing competition. The 2025 Coupe Beach Sprints are just the third annual edition of the coastal rowing event.

Cillian contested for Ireland in the Mens Single event, together with one other Irish junior rower, Aidan Barry of Ring Rowing Club in Cork. Racing among the top 20 European junior rowers contesting the event, Cillian progressed from the first time trial round with a 10th place ranking, to then secure the fastest time in the second time trial round. Progressing through to the knockout stages, Cillian faced a strong challenge from his Austrian opponent Janis Glantschnig in the final round of 16. It was the Austrian who secured the win in their knockout

race to progress to the quarter final stage. Muckross RC is immensely proud of Cillian's achievement, to have reached the top 16 in the newest of European rowing competitions and to have represented club and country so well. Aidan Barry of Ring RC was also pipped at the knockout stage, second to his opposite number from the Czech Republic. The Mens Single was ultimately won by one of the home team, Ignacio Garcia of Spain.

Cillian is the son of David and Melissa Leslie from Ballyhar. His selection to the Irish squad for the Coupe Beach Sprints followed his participation in a national trial series organised by Rowing Ireland. The Muckross club is enjoying a particularly successful year in 2025, with Cillian becoming the seventh Muckross rower selected for international competition this year. In September, Muckross and UL U23 rower Caoimhe O'Sullivan placed fourth for Ireland as part of the Womens Eight crew at the European Rowing U23 Championships. At the Home International Regatta held in London in July, the club was also represented in the green jersey by Rachel Fuller, Daniel Daly and Ethan O'Neill with Rachel returning as a double gold medallist. In August, Muckross was represented by Cian Scannell and Ronan Fahy at the Coupe flatwater regatta held in Linz, Austria. A highlight from Austria was the bronze medal win for Cian and his Lee Valley crewmate Colin Creedon in the Mens Double.

The sport of rowing continues to go from strength to strength in Ireland, with the success of the famous O'Donovan brothers from Skibbereen and a growing group of Irish Olympic rowing starts inspiring a whole new generation in the sport. The participation of the Irish squad in the Coupe Beach Sprints and other international coastal competition will no doubt pave the way for future success in the coastal branch of the sport, with growing optimism for Irish fortunes at the LA Olympics in 2028 and beyond.



The Beaufort Bridge to Dunloe Bridge route is vital for residents, businesses, and tourism in the area, and I'm delighted to see it resurfaced to such a high standard. The resurfacing forms part of Kerry County Council's ongoing programme of local road improvement works across the Kenmare Municipal District.



Jim's career was defined by his unwavering commitment, conviction and humanity.

He was twice Mayor of Tralee and in 2023 was elected Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council. Throughout his life Jim was passionate about education.

Jim fundamentally believed that every person, regardless of age or background, should have every opportunity to reach their full potential. Jim's service went beyond politics and education. He was deeply involved in community life from reviving the Blennerville Windmill to supporting the Kerry Hospice Foundation, to the Tidy Towns and countless local sports and voluntary groups. His contribution was immeasurable.

In recent years, Jim became a driving force behind Kerry's response to the arrival of Ukrainian families.

His compassion and determination earned him national and international recognition. Earlier this year he was appointed Honorary Consul of Ukraine for the South-West of Ireland, the first such position in the country. It was a fitting honour for a man who led first and foremost with humanity.

Those of us who had the privilege to know Jim will remember a man of warmth, humour and enthusiasm.

He was a deeply proud Kerry man, proud of its culture and its people.

To Jim's wife, Sheila, his children and his grandchildren, I want extend my heartfelt condolences. Their loss is immense and they are in my thoughts and prayers.

## Milltown Credit Union Celebrates 55 Years

Milltown Credit Union was very proud to celebrate its 55th anniversary on October 29th.

In 1970, a group of young and energetic people had the foresight and vision to establish their own credit union in the parish for the benefit of the people living in the area and surrounding parishes.

It was during a conversation between the then curate, Fr. Denis O'Mahony (RIP), and local businessman James O'Doherty (RIP) that the idea of establishing a credit union was first broached. A study group was formed in May 1970, and five months later, on October 29th, the organisational meeting was held in the Muintir na Tíre Hall, where Milltown Credit Union was officially formed and its first board and supervisors were elected.

This first committee was made up of 15 volunteers from the local community. Muintir na Tíre Hall continued to be the home of the Credit Union until a new premises was purchased on the Castlemaine Road in 1974. "Credit Union House" was renovated and officially opened on September 21st, 1974, and it is an honour to say that we are still operating from this location today.

Over the years, the premises has been expanded and developed to meet the needs of the rapidly growing Credit Union and the local community. Last Saturday, we had the privilege of welcoming seven of the original board members to celebrate this monumental milestone. We also took time to remember the six members of the first board who have gone to their eternal reward - a candle was lit in their memory.

Their legacy continues to inspire the current board, management, and staff to work in the best interests of our members.

A sincere thank you to our members for supporting us down through the years, and to all the boards, volunteers, and staff past and present who have shaped our history and kept the doors open.

We look forward to serving both our current members and new generations for many more years to come.



#### WHY EXERCISE MATTERS IN **MENOPAUSE**

#### **DRIVING AND VISION**

It is important that you can : see clearly to be able to drive safely. Conditions that may affect your visual field and driving include strokes and brain tumours, as well as eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma (if you have them in both eyes). Make sure you have regular sight tests and if your optometrist tells you that you must not drive, you must stop all driving immediately. Driving when you are medically unfit to do so is a criminal offence, and you may be prosecuted if you are involved in an accident.

#### **Driving glasses**

If you have been advised to wear glasses for driving, make sure you wear them, even for short trips - and keep a spare pair in the car. Choose glasses with thinner sides for driving as they won't block your side vision as much as thicker ones. If you wear contact lenses, keep a pair of glasses in the car in case you need to take your lenses out. Even if you don't need to wear glasses all the time, you will probably find they are particularly helpful when the lighting is poor, and for driving at night. Headlights of oncoming traffic can be dazzling when you are driving at night or in poor weather conditions. Special drivina lenses designed with a speciallydeveloped glare filter and a contrast-enhancing filter can help reduce reflections and uncomfortable glare from oncoming traffic.

If glare is an ongoing problem for you, make sure your windscreen and headlights are thoroughly cleaned and free from grime and dirt. If you wear glasses, and don't forget to keep them clean too. If you find that problems with glare at night persist, make an appointment to have a sight test.

Sunshine can be dazzling too, particularly when the sun is low in the sky. If you wear glasses, you may find it helpful to have a pair of prescription sunglasses in the car, or to wear clipon sunglasses over your prescription glasses. Polarised sunglasses are great for driving in bright conditions. Polarised lenses are lenses with a special built in filter to reduce glare and improve vision in bright conditions

## Minister Michael Healy-Rae calls for deferral of toll increases hitting motorists and hauliers

Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae TD has today said that the planned toll increases due to take effect from 1 January 2026 should be deferred, describing them as "another blow to hard-pressed motorists and the already struggling haulage industry."

"While I understand that our road network needs continued investment and maintenance, it is simply not fair that the only people being asked to pay more are the ordinary men and women driving to work, and the haulage operators who keep this country moving," Minister Healy-Rae said.

"The M50 and Dublin Port Tunnel were built to keep cars and lorries out of our towns and cities, not to price them off the roads entirely. The Irish Road Haulage Association made it clear yesterday that these hikes will force many drivers to start avoiding toll roads altogether, which will only push more heavy vehicles back into built-up areas, creating extra

congestion and safety issues.

Minister Healy-Rae said he will be seeking Government approval to defer the increase and to look at a fairer approach that balances the need for road funding with the pressures facing road users.

"I have always stood up for working people, for small businesses, and for the haulage operators who are being squeezed from every angle by rising insurance, fuel, and compliance costs. This toll hike may look small on paper, but it's another cumulative cost that adds up week after week, month after month," he said.

"The fair thing to do now is to pause these increases, review the current toll system, and make sure it's delivering value for money without punishing people who have no choice but to drive. I'll be bringing that case directly to my colleagues in Government."

# Welcome funding announced for OUTDOOR RECREATION PROJECTS

Deputy Danny Healy Rae has welcomed the funding announced today by Minister Calleary for outdoor recreation projects. The funding for Kerry of €1,096,299. is very welcome. This is great news for the people of Kerry. Whether it's a walk through Ballyseedy Woods, a cycle to the National Park, or a hike up Strickeen, these improvements will be felt on the ground by local communities and visitors. The importance of maintaining and improving access to nature cannot be overstated.

One of the projects to benefit from this funding is The Jarvey lane walk/cycle trail repair and upgrade project and I am glad these works will be done on this busy area between Killarney and the National park which is popular with many locals and visitors to the Killarney area. There are four key projects across Kerry which

There are four key projects across Kerry which have secured funding totalling €1,096,299, aimed at enhancing walking, cycling, and trail amenities to benefit locals and tourists alike:

- €500,000 Ballyseedy Wood Amenity Trail: Extending the existing trail network and linking to Tralee.
- €200,000 Jarvey Lane Walk/Cycle Trail (Phase 2): Completion of the popular shared trail linking Killarney town with the National Park.
- €200,000 The Shannon Way (Slí na Sionainne) Phase 2: Continued upgrades to trail surfacing and infrastructure.
- €196,299 Strickeen Mountain Trail: Erosion repair and improvement works to maintain this treasured upland route.

## €450 energy credit urgently needed as electricity bills set to surpass record peaks - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Environment, Climate and Energy, Pa Daly TD, has criticised the government for allowing Ireland's energy affordability crisis to worsen following the withdrawal of energy credits and its failure to hold energy companies accountable.

Deputy Daly called for the immediate reintroduction of the €450 electricity credit this winter, warning that annual bills are now set to surpass €1,900, with over 300,000 households already in arrears.

He highlighted that the average electricity debt has surged to €471, up from €292 in 2021, with over 60% of arrears now long term, underscoring the growing hardship faced by households. Daly accused Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael, and the Regional Independents of "paying lip service" to the crisis, and condemned energy suppliers for raising prices despite falling wholesale costs, citing international data showing one of the largest gaps between wholesale and retail energy prices globally.

"The government must act now to reinstate the €450 credit and hold energy companies to account," Daly said. "People can't wait until 2026 for an Energy Affordability Plan while they struggle to heat and light their homes this winter."


### WELCOME FOR MEETING WITH HUNGER STRIKERS AT DAIL EIREANN

"I also said that their hunger strike had gone on long enough and somet thing needed to be done.

I am glad that the Taoiseach has met with them this week and hope this matter will be resolved without delay once they have their follow up meeting next week", he added.

## Hunger Strike have a strong case - Cahill

The former residents of Industrial and Reformatory Schools have made a very strong point to the Government supporting their case for compensation for the wrong that was forced upon them and now they must be listened to according to Kerry Fianna Fáil TD Michael Cahill. Deputy Cahill has been a huge supporter of the Hunger Strikers since day one and was the first TD to raise the matter on the floor of Dáil Eireann, seeking a resolution to this life threatening protest. The second TD to raise the issue on the floor of Dáil Eireann was the incumbent President, Catherine Connolly. "I am again pleading with the Taoiseach, the Tanaiste, the Minister for Education, the Minister for Health and the Minister for Justice to solve this problem now before anyone becomes seriously ill or worse. We can and must come to an acceptable solution for all parties here and these survivors of the Industrial and Reformatory Schools and the treatment they received there, cannot be allowed suffer any longer. It is critical, health wise, that this hunger strike is brought to an end now, before any further damage is done" stated Deputy Cahill.

"The Hunger Strikers have entered their 44th day on Huger Strike. They were scheduled to meet with the Taoiseach today and this has been pushed back until Wednesday. With a little understanding and empathy, I believe we can get around this impasse and return these fine people to the comfort of their own homes" said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism.

"The main issues here are the HAA Medical Card and a State Contributory Pension I have raised these important issues twice in the Dáil with the Taoiseach and the Minister for Justice, I have also raised it at a Joint Oireachtas Health Committee meeting with the Minister for Health, I have submitted several Parliamentary Questions on these matters and I am in regular contact with the Taoiseach and the Minister for Education in respect of these issues and I will pursue them until such time as we get a successful conclusion" added Michael Cahill TD.

#### AFFORDING RETIRED LIVING

A County Kerry Teachta Dála has reiterated his call for a significant increase in supports for our Older People who are finding it very difficult to survive in the present climate of rising prices. Deputy Michael Cahill, who is the Fianna Fáil Party Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism knows of many people out there who struggle daily to make ends meet, provide food and heat for themselves and many have family members dependent on them due to health issues, etc,.


"I meet many people daily, who find it extremely difficult to heat and feed themselves, due to the rapid rise in grocery prices recently and the ever increasing price of fuel. During the past few days, I have been contacted by a number of elderly constituents in Killarney, Dingle and Castleisland who are extremely concerned about an increase in the cost of Meals on Wheels. Senior citizens in Killorglin informed me that they are going up 2 euros per day, that is 10 euros a week and this wipes out the 10 euro weekly increase in the pension. I have queried our Government Ministers as to what new and additional supports that they can provide to alleviate the hardship now suffered by our Older People who have given a lifetime of service to their family and country" stated


Deputy Cahill.

"A priority of mine would be the removal of the anomaly that exists, where the Fuel Allowance is paid to a person, even though the heating of a house costs the same, whether it is occupied by a couple or a single person. Older single people living alone need to receive a sufficient monetary support to ensure they can heat their living quarters properly" said Rossbeigh TD.


"We must also be more innovative in our ways of providing support and look at the worldwide best practices in this field. Our people need food, water, air, heat, shelter and healthcare, as part of their daily living requirements. The regular company of family and friends is also of great benefit, helping both their mental and physical health and more social activity must be facilitated for them. It is only right that we have facilities to allow and encourage social interaction and avoid the exclusion of older people in society" he said.

"But the bottom line is that nourishment, heat and access to healthcare must be supported for an ageing population in Ireland to ensure their older years are their Golden Years in comfort and that is the main goal" added Michael Cahill TD



## Farm Hazardous Waste Collection Days 2025

Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine Martin Heydon TD, together with Minister of State at the Department of Climate, Energy and the Environment, Alan Dillon TD, have today announced the commencement of six Farm Hazardous Waste Collection days over the coming weeks.

## Kerry FC crowned MU20 EA Sports LOI Academy Shield Champions after fairytale final win against Shamrock Rovers

In the midst of an early winter wind, rain and hail storm, Kerry FC emerged on top in what was an epic final against Shamrock Rovers as the club's Men's Under 20 side wrote their names into the history books as the first Kerry FC side to win a League of Ireland trophy in the club's short existence.

After a hectic season, the Under 20 side narrowly missed qualification for the Tier 1 competition by just a couple of points on the league table. But with some impressive results in the third quarter of the campaign, the Kingdom secured a quarter-final berth in the Shield (Tier 2) competition. A comeback 2-3 away victory over Bray Wanderers in the last 8 was followed up by an impressive 2-0 semi-final win over Cobh Ramblers in Mounthawk Park to book the Kingdom's place in the final against Rovers. An incredible feat in itself for Kerry, who had reached the Tier 3 (Plate) final the previous two seasons, but lost out on both occasions in the decider.

A big crowd gathered in expectation in Mounthawk Park on Saturday evening. A cointoss allowed for home advantage for Kerry FC in the final, and a huge advantage it proved in the end. The final was played on tenterhooks throughout the opening 90 minutes, with neither side wanting to make the first mistake in a tactical battle.

Kerry came close several times throughout the opening 45, including chances for Brosna's Luke Palmer and Killarney man Luke Doolan. But Shamrock Rovers did threaten the goal on a number of occasions, but Killorglin's Darragh Foley refused to be beaten between the sticks. The second half started in the same manner as the first, with both sides threatening the opener as the game started to open up as we ticked nearer the end of the 90 and extra-time beckened.

But, it seemed Kerry hearts were to be broken yet again. Josh O'Dwyer found himself on the end of a lovely ball across from a Shamrock Rovers winger, and he tucked his effort home to the bottom right-hand corner to send the away dugout into jubilation as they thought the game was won.

With a minute of the 5 added on remaining, Kerry launched one last attack out on the right-hand side. Some lovely link-up play from substitute Rob Keane left Andy Kerins swing in a lovely cross which was met high in the Mounthawk sky by Ryan Perez. His header rattled off the crossbar, but a striker's instinct by Luke Doolan, who was waiting on the edge of the 6-yard box for the rebound. The Leaving Cert student in the Sem riffled the ball into the net, and the roar from the large crowd was deafening. Referee Oisin Walsh blew the fulltime whistle, and we were headed for extra time. What is it with Kerry FC and cup drama! Again, the added 30 minutes were played out in a tentative fashion. A deluge of rain, hail and high winds didn't allow for the best of football,

but both teams had to adapt to the atrocious weather conditions in the county capital. A Shamrock Rovers attack petered out to a Darragh Foley kick-out as the clock ticked into 120 minutes. With a minute added, it seemed we were headed for the dreaded penalty shootout once again, but then came a moment of sheer magic.

As conditions worsened, Darragh Foley launched one last attack from the back. A longranging kick out, aided by the wind, beat the Shamrock Rovers' back line. The pacey Luke Doolan got in behind and, with composure beyond his years, took the ball around the Shamrock Rovers goalkeeper (Todd Bazunu, brother of Ireland international Gavin) and he smashed the ball into the empty net with the last kick of the game. Cue the frantic celebrations with the Kerry bench running to the goalscorer, is sheer joyous scenes between the players and fans alike.

The torrential rain didn't spoil the celebrations as Kerry were crowned Shield champions. Kerry FC captain and Killarney man Oran Horgan collected the trophy and, after an inspiring speech, lifted the trophy with his teammates to the backing track of Tina Turner's 'Simply the Best'

Killarney's Luke Doolan was named man of the match and collected his trophy as recognition of the former Killarney Athletic's man's efforts throughout the 120 minutes, and with First Team Manager Colin Healy watching from the stands, we could be likely to see Luke feature more and more for the senior side in 2026.

It is a day that will live long in the memories of everyone associated with the club. Kerry have been playing League of Ireland football for 6 seasons, 3 seasons before the introduction of the senior side in 2023. We've come a long way in that time, and a trophy is the icing on the cake in what has been a record-breaking season for the club both on and off the pitch.





## **Ewan Lee Extends Mounthawk Stay**

### with New Kerry FC Contract

Kerry FC has confirmed that defender Ewan Lee has signed a new contract with the club, keeping him at Mounthawk Park for the 2026 League of Ireland season.

The 22-year-old Cork native, who joined from UCC during the summer transfer window, impressed after making the step up from the Munster Senior League. Lee featured 11 times in the second half of the 2025 campaign, scoring his first League of Ireland goal in a 1–1 draw against Treaty United.

Manager Colin Healy praised Lee's impact, saying he "proved his work-rate and professionalism very quickly" and would be "a vital player again in 2026."

Lee's renewal follows new deals for goalkeeper Matt Connor and defender Niall Brookwell, as Kerry FC continues to strengthen ahead of the new season.

Connor, a 28-year-old former Athlone Town player, made seven appearances before injury ended his season, while Brookwell, formerly of Cork City and Liverpool's academy, was ever-present in 2025 with 36 appearances and three goals.

All three signings highlight Kerry FC's intent to build on a record-breaking 2025 campaign as preparations begin for the 2026 League of Ireland First Division season in mid-February.









## JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

#### **NUDIE HUGHES** RIP

1985. Kerry were the most feared football team in the county. They were rightly popular as individuals, having not only dominated the game for the latter half of the seventies but coming back from that hammer blow of Seamus Darby's in 1982 and Cork in '83 to win again. Not many teams come back. They weren't especially beloved at the time nationally; nobody likes the top dogs in any sport - or should. It's human nature to back underdoas.

But in 1985, there was hardly a soul giving Monaghan a chance against the reigning champions. Their semi-final against Monaghan was expected to be a formality, even though Monagah were league champions

It wasn't, far from it. Davy Byrne and Hugo Clerkin were dominating midfield, even against Jack O'Shea. Eamonn McEneany was at his bullish best. And up front they had the best of them all. Before that game, pretty much everybody in Kerry could have only named one Monaghan footballer. But everybody could name Nudie Hughes. I was actually surprised to find out that his real christian name was Eugene. He was Nudie Hughes. He won the first ball that day and calmly stroked it over the bar. Páidí Ó Sé was a famously parsimonious defender, but Nudie was Nudie. And Nudie infused that Monaghan team, who only coughed up 1-1 in the first half to the most feared forward line in gaelic football.

They couldn't stay with them. Davy Byrne went off with a dead leg late in the first half and gradually a more experienced Kerry ground them down to win the replay by 2-9 to 0-10. We went on to beat Dublin to win our 29th All Ireland. 29 more than Monaghan.

Nudie Hughes. He was an icon of the era. Fair enough, all the Kerry players were household names, but they were winning things, repeatedly. Nudie was a Monaghan man through and through, and never had the same quality of player beside him. And still Monagan were a power at the time. After all, they had Nudie Hughes. Mickey Kearins of Sligo. Declan Browne of Tipperary. John Galvin of Limerick. In fairness, Conor McManus of Monaghan had a touch of that same aura. If you said that Conor McManus was Monaghan's greatest ever footballer, few enough would argue with you, and Nudie certainly wouldn't be one of them. He'd have been wrong, though, he really would, and I think McManus was one of the best forwards of his generation. Nudie would still get my vote; he could do everything Conor could and was also physically strong enough to shrug off tackles from big men. Low center of gravity and deadly accuracy, once he got the ball, it was game over for any defender, and he was a natural ballwinner.

It's traditional to list all the medals and the accolades that players have won at times like these. Three All Stars, one as a corner back and two as a corner forward. Three Ulster titles, '79, '85, and '88. A National League in '85. He won All Stars in each of those three years. Nine county titles and two Ulster crowns with his beloved Castleblayney Faughs. An equally talented dual player, he won three county hurling titles.

But all of those medals....they are no measure of the genial Monaghan man. His greatest battle was against cancer in recent years, he treated it with the same respect he gave to all his opponents on the field. You can say that the cancer finally won, but it could never take the smile off his face.

Nothing could. A devoted Faughs and Monagan man, an absolute phenomenon of a player who pretended not to know that he was not that good. A genuine legend, to use that overblown word correctly. He was Nudie, and my generation in Kerry grew up half fearing but mostly admiring him. Imagine the impact

he had on a Monaghan generation who had no winning tradition. May he rest in peace.

#### Ireland Lose Out In Soldier's Field New Zealand Ireland

Ireland's victory over the All Blacks of New Zealand in 2016 bookmarked arguably Ireland's brightest rugby era – I know that every generation will have their own opinions. I did feel at the time that, while it was certainly a historic victory, attempts to equate it with Munster's famous victory in Thomond Park in 1978 were exaggerated, to say the least – Ireland beat an All Black team who were at the end of a long and tough season. However, it was a moment that saw rugby – always popular but never wholly beloved by the Irish public – really take hearts and minds.

There were rumblings in advance of this game. Nobody was excessively worried about the particular result, but there was the outhalf question. Did we hold on to Johnny Sexton a bit too long before trying to bed in a successor? Ah, not really - we did try to blood replacements at the time, remember, and when one of the best players in the world wants to keep playing. when do you really take the jersey off him? Even now, have we a couple of players in there based on sentiment rather than cold calculation? Are Leinster over-represented and Munster underrepresented? Ah, yes, that hoary old chestnut. I'm not convinced – yes, Munster have made a fantastic start to the season and McMillan has the place absolutely humming. But frankly, I think some people are counting chickens based on eggs, Munster are not running with the big dogs just yet. But I will point out that none of these conversations were happening in hindsight; they were all clearly on the table before this game.

A low-key enough start. Mind you, it's very obvious that we are all over the place with our line-outs (personally, I think that's been the case against the top teams for several years now).

Beauden Barrett collides with Tadhg Beirne. I didn't think it was too bad at first but when I saw the replay....look, there's been umpteen debates. Full credit to Beauden Barrett for saying afterwards that there was no malice and that he would speak in defence of Tadhq at the hearing but he did not say that it wasn't a red card – because he knows and Tadhg knows that under the new laws it was most certainly a card. There's a whole other debate about whether these much stricter new laws that don't require any semblance of intent are actually necessary. I'm not expert enough to have that debate but I do have an opinion, and straight up too many rugby players were coming out of the game with too many injuries and after-effects,

especially of concussion. I honestly think it would have unquestionably morally negligent (and, looking at the NFL in particular, not just morally) not to have taken action.

Anyway, what's most pertinent to this isn't your opinion or mine; it's the referee's and the TMO, and Tadhg's yellow card was upgraded to red. Ireland didn't appear too rattled. In fact, good work by Stuart McCloskey saw Jack Crowley put Ireland in front with a good penalty kick from long distance. It got even better in the 17th minute as great Irish pressure opened the door for Tadhg Furlong and he powered over the line for a try. 10-0.

You can only go on so long against a top team while a man down, though, and once New Zealand kicked into gear, they were always going to do damage. Ardie Savea picked off a good try and Beauden Barrett converted. There were actually some good passages of play after that, but neither side could add to their tally and it remained 10-7 all the way to half-time. Ireland put on early pressure in the second half and Jack Crowley was unlucky with a penalty kick that just curled a fraction too far. Three minutes later he had an easier one and made no mistake. 13-7. To be honest, it's not a great game, but if we can hang on, it'll be some result. Into the last quarter now, Ireland were making substitutions, with the likes of McCloskey (he was excellent), Sheehan, and Furlong making way. New Zealandwith a tap and go and suddenly show their pace and power, with Tamaiti Williams going over. Barrett nails the conversion and New Zealand have gone ahead, 14 to 13. Ireland are beginning to ook a little bit ragged.

Yep, there we go. 13 minutes left and Wallace Sititi crosses the line for a try. Another conversion by Barrett and it's 21-13 in their favour. Ireland are really labouring now. The tanks are fairly empty. In all honesty, I wouldn't exactly say that it's the All Blacks at their best, for that matter. Cam Roigard added a try late on and they even had another one disallowed for a forward pass.

Like I say, not a disaster. Not any advertisement for the game, either, though, and questions will linger.

#### SOCCER

Shamrock Rovers finally sealed their title win. Look, their early dominance effectively killed off any suspense in the last run of games. The fact that they limped to the finish line, struggling to get that final point to seal it, unfortunately dulled any excitement rather than heightened it. To be fair, they were rarely able to field their best team in those games and still got the job done

Derry City's Candystripes will be quietly pleased with taking second place with a run of a draw and four wins in their last five games, including a final day 1-0 win that piles more pressure on a Cork City side who are a far cry from their heady days battling with Stephen Kenny.

Shelbourne also had a good run, even if they never looked the same quality or were half as interesting without the mercurial Daien Duff at the helm. They never looked the same side this season – acceptable, but no more than that. They will be looking to improve.

Bohs won't really say it out loud, but they will be thrilled with a final day rout of Drogheda that sees them leapfrog into fourth place. That's much bigger than it sounds; if Shamrock Rovers do the double by beating Cork City in the FAI Cup Final, that will free up a European spot for Bohs. Lads, Bohemians will ask their supporters to cheer for Shamrock Rovers in that one. And be soundly refused – they might have done it for Shelbourne, but Rovers? There's a history there over more than a century.

Wunderkind Mason Melia was sensational all year for St. Pats and he moves on to bigger things at Tottenham, but even he couldn't find a winner against Shelbourne that would have guaranteed them fourth place. Missing out on Europe is a huge sting for Stephen Kenny.

Down at the bottom of the table, Cork City never really looked Premier grade all through the year and there's a real chance they could be yoyoing between Premier and First Divisions – there is an enormous gulf between the two in terms of both finance and quality. Moreover, with Cork fans really turning on Dermot Ussher (partially justified in terms of price increases, but if I was on an aeroplane with the engines failing, I wouldn't be starting any fight with the guy who owns the parachutes) it could get a lot worse before it gets any better.

The battle for who was going into the play-off was a lot more interesting. Galway, Waterford, and Sligo were all struggling. I have a certain fondness for Sligo - Eamonn Sweeney's "There's Only One Red Army" has been among my favourite Irish sports books for a long time now (although credit Neal Horgan's Cork City trilogy) and, well....you expect soccer in Ireland to be mostly city based, given our history, not Sligo. There's a little bit of me that expects Sligo to be full of hard-eyed cattle jobbers and sheep farmers who view American tourists more as a food source than actual people, and it's far from it. They are actually brilliant and very funny supporters. Add in Kerry FC's defeat of them in the FAI Cup quarter-final....you'd have to be a cold Kerry soul to wish Sligo Rovers

to be relegated this year. And they won't be, having defeated Shamrock Rovers in their final game to secure promotion. Another teenage sensation, Owen Eldings, scored a crucial penalty for a victory over the champion elect – Sligo's first win over them in a decade (Rovers were far from full strength, though). Actually, Rovers had a teenage sensation of their own in Michael Noonan, who actually made his name with St. Pats.

With all its many travails, Irish soccer does still seem to be able to throw up these talented young players. It's interesting that most of them are coming through the clubs rather than the FAI's underage academies. Although, given that the FAI are trying to shed 60 staff, perhaps not surprising. They are also under pressure from UEFA and are still trying to force through a switch to a calendar year. I still say that would be a disaster for underage soccer in Ireland and I'd be telling UEFA to get back to me after they have sorted out those 115 charges against Man City - La Liga have reported Man City to the European Commission. As for this long promised third tier to the LOI...unless you let teams use the local town park and jumpers for goalposts, that ain't happening

With the Bit O' Red (I actually can't tell if Sligo have a brilliant or a terrible nickname – it's like something out of a Maurice Walsh novel) safe, the relegation play-off spot came down to Galway or Waterford. In the end it was a draw, and Galway's superior goal difference sees them safe, while the Blues will face Bray Wanderers in a promotion/relegation play-off. Waterford will be strong favourites.

In the first division, Dundalk may be a mess off the field with various disputes in regard to ownership etc. but they still have good support and a solid team. They were fully deserving (and unsurprising) winners of the First Division and deserve to go back up.

Bray Wanderers have a chance in that promotion play-off, after beating Treaty United with a last minute winner, but are just that bit too inconsistent for me. That doesn't get hugely exposed in the First Division, but at a level higher....respectfully, I don't see them going up and even if they do, I don't expect them to stay there. Cobh Ramblers were a bit unlucky, having finished second in the regular season, and they would be my favourites for promotion next year; I think they have a good recent record of recruitment.

## KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE **BUILDING IN KERRY**

ith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

## **ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS** WITHOUT **CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY** COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry

County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008 This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45.000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Recause there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

### PRUNING APPLE TREES

Pruning apple trees each winter is essential for producing a healthy crop of fruit the following season. Without regular pruning, trees can become overcrowded with old branches, which reduces both fruit quality and yield.

Pruning isn't a difficult task once you understand the basics. The goal is to create an open, balanced shape with about six main branches forming the framework of the tree. The best time to prune is during the dormant season, between November and early March.

Before you begin, make sure you're using sharp tools such as secateurs, loppers, or a pruning saw. Start by removing any dead, diseased, or damaged wood. Next, cut out branches that cross or rub against each other.

Finally, remember to keep the centre of the tree open, even if that means removing a few larger branches. This allows sunlight and air to reach all parts of the tree, encouraging strong growth and an abundant harvest.


