KERRY MOUNTAIN RESCUE TEAM CALL ON PUBLIC TO COMPLY WITH RESTRICTIONS

N a week when Kerry Mountain Rescue Team were tasked to rescue 9 people on Carrauntoohil, the voluntary organisation has reiterated their previous lockdown stance in relation to the COVID-19 virus.

Colm Burke, PRO for the team said that it was was a necessary reminder in order to protect their members and their families as well as the casualties themselves.

"If you call 999 and ask for Mountain Rescue, we will of course do what we can, however...

- If you are uninjured, lost or benighted, you will be asked to consider waiting until morning, and/or better visibility to extricate yourself.
- If you are injured but able to walk comfortably you will be asked to consider extricating yourself from the mountain.
- If you are seriously injured, and/or not physically able to get yourself off the hill, we will attend with the absolute minimum of team members needed to complete the task. Because of this, the evacuation will be less straightforward and the overall time to transport you to medical attention will be

much longer", Colm said.

Helicopter support will only be requested if a time critical injury is sustained, but this is not a guarantee of availability as helicopter operations in the mountains are complex and limited by weather, light conditions etc. Kerry Mountain Rescue are asking all hillgoers to be considerate of the resources of the Emergency Services at this time by avoiding high mountain terrain such as the McGillycuddy's Reeks, sticking to lowland paths and walkways while strictly observing social distancing principles and the 5km travel restrictions recently re-imposed by the Government.

Given the current wintry conditions on the hills in Kerry, and recent observations by team members of extremely ill-equipped parties, we would also like to remind people who are considering venturing into the hills at this time to ensure they are properly equipped (including ice axe and crampons), have sufficient winter mountaineering experience and are complying with Government guidance on travel restrictionss", he added.

RESTRICTIONS IN PLACE ATCOUNCIL'S CIVIC AMENITY SITES

Waste and recycling centres are experiencing high volumes at present and Kerry County Council are asking members of the public to limit travelling to centres as much as possible. Kerry County Council's five Civic Amenity Sites (Kenmare, Killarney, Milltown, Dingle and Cahersiveen) remain open for the receipt of domestic waste from customers without an existing door-to-door, kerbside service and who need to dispose of household waste during the current period of COVID-19 restrictions.

The centres are currently experiencing high volumes of visits by members of the public which usually occurs in the post-Christmas period. Members of the public are asked to

visit the centres if waste needs to be disposed of urgently and to limit travelling to centres as much as possible. Members of the public are also reminded of the 5km travel restriction currently in place and the advice to remain at home except for essential reasons.

Having regard to Level 5 restrictions and in the interests of public health and minimising the numbers of people circulating at each of the centres, Kerry County Council has put the following measures in place:

Traffic management and a queueing system is in place at all sites and this may lead to short delays for those visiting the centres Just one occupant should leave vehicles on

site in the interest of reducing numbers of people circulating at the sites

Members of the public are asked not to bring items to sites which do not need to be disposed of urgently

Members of the public are asked to adhere strictly to social distancing and to wear a face covering while on site

Customers are asked to use credit/debit cards payments as far as possible.

Kerry County Council appreciates the patience and cooperation of all those using the five Civic Amenity Sites in the county.

Red letter day

JOHN RECEIVES THE

FIRST VACCINE IN KILLARNEY

"I'm very glad to be getting my vaccine today, it's not something that happens every week!"

95 year old John Cremin is the first community hospital resident to receive the Pfizer BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine in Kerry.

He got the vaccine today at St. Columbanus Home alongside other residents and healthcare workers from the residential unit.

John is originally from Knocknagree in Co Cork. The father of four has six grandchildren and has been a resident at St. Columbanus since 2013. He says he is looking forward to a time when he can have visitors again.

"We haven't been able to have visitors for a while now. I'm not a bit worried about getting the vaccine, it's good that it's here. I'm very glad to be getting my vaccine today, it's not something that happens every week."

Director of Nursing Maire Flynn was the first staff member to be vaccinated.

"I am delighted that we are receiving the vaccine, and so happy for our residents and our staff. We are so grateful to everyone who has made this happen, and so happy to be a part of this. Our residents are very excited, and are thrilled to be getting something that gives us all new hope for 2021. The important thing about these vaccinations is that they will help us to keep our residents safe."

Elaine Sheehan is assistant director of nursing at Killarney Community Hospital, and part of

the team of vaccinators delivering the first vaccines today. She said she's delighted to be part of the team rolling out the vaccine and keeping residents safe.

"We've a busy few days ahead but it'll all be worth it. It is just great to be at this point where we can begin to see some light at the end of the tunnel. People realised that we can't continue to live like this. For staff, this is not just about ourselves, this is about protecting our regidents"

Elaine added that staff and residents received literature about the vaccine over the last few days.

"Anyone with any questions has been able to talk to myself and the other peer vaccinators.

We're constantly communicating with people, supporting and reassuring them."

Vaccinations will continue at Killarney Community Hospital today and tomorrow as vaccinators work to offer the vaccine to approximately 200 staff and more than 90 residents.

Afterwards, each person vaccinated was given a vaccine record card, showing the name and batch of the vaccine they have received. They will each receive a second dose, to be fully protected, in three weeks.

"This marks the beginning of Cork Kerry Community Healthcare's vaccination campaign in residential facilities in Cork and Kerry", Mary Smithwick, Communications Manager with the HSE told Killarney Outlook.

Throughout next week from January 11th onwards, we expect to have teams travelling to more than 30 public and private facilities in Cork and Kerry (22 in Cork and 11 in Kerry). We expect to vaccinate more than 3,500 staff and residents next week alone, and this programme will accelerate in the following weeks.

"We'd like to pay tribute to the staff involved in the vaccination programme who have worked tirelessly over the last few weeks in order to be prepared for this roll-out".

"This is a tremendous undertaking and we'd like to thank all staff involved in getting vaccine delivered quickly and safely", she added.

Unfortunately, Covid-19 is still with us and while welcome, the vaccination roll-out is only one part of our response. It's still extremely important that we all remain vigilant and keep up all protective actions.


KEEP THE SCHOOLS CLOSED -

Deputy Danny Healy Rae has called on the Minister for Education to rethink the decision to allow Leaving Cert Students return to school.

"I have contacted the Minister for Education Minister Norma Foley regarding this and think this is the wrong reaction now to have the Leaving Cert students going back into school next week. I have asked how the Government can say that the schools are safe when teachers have not been vaccinated and there have been outbreaks of Covid in many schools already", Deputy Healy-Rae told Killarney Outlook.

"With the massive numbers of Covid cases in recent days, I do not think the schools should be reopening", he added.



Killarney Tidy Towns welcome funding

The Minister announced funding of €1million to help Tidy Towns groups around Ireland to help to prepare for next year's competition.

YOUR GUIDE TO THE CHANGES

Schools

Closed until 1 Feb with some specific exceptions for final year Leaving Cert students, special education and specialised settings

Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE)

The resumption of the ECCE programme is delayed until 1 Feb

Childcare Closed with exceptions for vulnerable children and children of essential workers

Construction

Construction will close from 6pm on Friday 8 Jan, with limited exceptions

Retail

Essential retail only. Click and collect from nonessential retail outlets will no longer be permitted after existing orders are fulfilled. Click and deliver will continue

Travel into Ireland

No travellers from Great Britain or South Africa until 9 Jan. All travellers from those locations after that date must have a negative PCR COVID-19 test result (COVID-19 not detected) within 72 hours prior to arrival

At Level 5, the public health risk means that you will be asked to stay at home, except for travel for work, education or other essential purposes, or to take exercise within 5km of home. There will be no gatherings other than small numbers at funerals and weddings.

Schools and higher and adult education

Schools remain closed until 1 February, except for the provision of special education (special schools and special classes) and specialised settings (such as Oberstown and high support special care schools and youth encounter projects) which will continue fully open from 11 January.

All final year Leaving Certificate students, including Leaving Cert Applied, Leaving Cert Vocational Programme and the traditional Leaving Cert, can attend school for 3 days a week commencing from the week beginning 11 January.

Youthreach services will resume as scheduled.

The resumption of the Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) programme is delayed until 1 February.

Higher and adult education

Higher, further and adult education should remain primarily online.

Childcare

Childcare services, including regulated childminders, will remain closed with the exception of services for vulnerable children and children of essential workers. Other existing childcare arrangements can continue to operate for vulnerable children and children of essential workers only.

In addition, a household of an essential worker, without an existing childcare arrangement, can form a bubble with another household for the purpose of providing childcare.

Construction

Construction will close from 6pm on Friday 8 January, with limited exceptions including:

essential health and related projects including those relevant to preventing, limiting, minimising or slowing the spread of COVID-19

supply and delivery of essential or emergency maintenance and repair services to businesses and places of residence (including electrical, gas, plumbing, glazing and roofing services) on an emergency call-out basis

Retail

Face coverings must be worn.

All retail, other than essential retail, is closed.

All non-essential services remain closed.

Click and collect

Click and collect from non-essential retail outlets should no longer be permitted with immediate effect. Existing orders may be collected.

Click and deliver will continue to be permitted.

Social and family gatherings

In your home or garden

No visitors are permitted in private homes or gardens except for essential family reasons such as providing care to children, elderly or vulnerable people, or as part of a support bubble.

Other settings outside your home or garden

No social or family gatherings should take place in other settings.

Weddings

Up to 6 guests are permitted.

Organised indoor gatherings

These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager.

For example: business, training events, conferences, events in theatres and cinemas or other arts events (excluding sport).

No organised indoor gatherings should take place.

Organised outdoor gatherings

These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager. For example: outdoor arts events, training events.

No organised outdoor gatherings should take place.

Exercise and sporting events

Training

People may meet with people from one other household in outdoor settings when taking exercise. No indoor or outdoor exercise group activities, including those involving children, should take place. Outdoor golf and tennis are not permitted.

Individual training only. No exercise or dance classes. No indoor or outdoor gatherings involving "individual training" except for professional and elite sports.

Matches and events

Professional, elite sports, horse racing, greyhound racing and approved equestrian events only are permitted to continue behind closed doors.

No other matches or events are to take place.

Gyms, leisure centres and swimming pools

Gyms, leisure centres and swimming pools must close from close of business on 31 December.

Religious services

Services will be held online.

Places of worship remain open for private prayer.

Funerals

Up to 10 mourners can attend.

Museums, galleries and other cultural attractions All venues closed.

Online services available.

Bars, cafes and restaurants (including hotel restaurants and bars)

Take away food and delivery only.

Wet pubs

Closed.

Nightclubs, discos, casinos

 $Night clubs, discos\ and\ casinos\ will\ remain\ closed.$

Hotels and accommodation

Open only for essential non-social and non-tourist purposes.

Work

Work from home unless essential for work, which is an essential health, social care or other essential service and cannot be done from home.

Travel restrictions

Domestic

People will be required to stay at home except for travel for work, education or other essential purposes, and will be permitted to take exercise within 5 km of home.

You can travel outside 5 kilometres of home for the following reasons:

travel to and from work, where work involves providing an essential service

to attend medical appointments and collect medicines and other health products

travel to attend disability day services

travel to attend a court

for vital family reasons, such as providing care to children, elderly or vulnerable people, and in particular for those who live alone, but excluding social family visits

for food shopping

for farming purposes (food production or care of animals)

to attend a wedding or funeral

to visit a grave

International

The current travel moratorium in place for travel from Great Britain and South Africa is extended until midnight Friday 8 January 2021.

From 9 January 2021, all passengers arriving at Irish airports and ports whose journey originates in Great Britain or South Africa will be requested to have evidence of a negative result from a PCR COVID-19 test (COVID-19 not detected) taken up to 72 hours prior to arrival in Ireland.

Outdoor playgrounds, play areas and parks

Open with protective measures in place.

Transport

Face coverings must be worn.

Walk or cycle where possible.

Avoid public transport - essential workers and essential purposes only.

Public transport capacity will be restricted to 25%.

Over 70 and medically vulnerable individuals

Those aged over 70 years and over and the medically vulnerable should exercise judgement regarding the extent to which they engage with others and in activities outside home. Specific guidance will be provided.

Visiting long-term residential care facilities (nursing and care homes)

Suspended, aside from critical and compassionate circumstances.

The raffle was held live on Facebook and hundreds of people watched it live in the run up to Christmas.


"The prizes and donations were fantastic, everyone was so very generous", Gina told Killarney Outlook.



Bilateral Agreement on Exchange of Driving Licences with UK

The Minister for Transport, Mr Eamonn Ryan TD, has signed an agreement with the United Kingdom that will allow for the exchange of UK driving licences for an Irish licence, for holders of UK licences resident here.

At the end of the transition period at 11pm on 31 December, the mechanism that has allowed for the recognition and exchange of UK licences for an Irish one will expire.

The agreement signed by Minister Ryan means that persons resident in Ireland with a UK licence will be able to continue to swap their licenses for Irish licenses.

This agreement will be of particular benefit to anyone planning to live in Ireland as it will allow them to exchange their UK licence for an Irish driving licence. It will also allow anyone who has not exchanged their UK licence in time, before the deadline of 11pm on the



31 December, to exchange it under this new agreement.

However, for anyone in this situation who didn't exchange their UK licence by the deadline, their UK licence will no longer be valid to drive here in Ireland, it is only valid for exchange purposes. It is imperative that it be exchanged immediately.

This change only applies to holders of a UK licence who are resident in Ireland. It does not affect persons living in Northern Ireland or Great Britain who are visiting or driving in Ireland

All holders of an Irish licence driving in the UK, whether they are UK residents or visiting there, do not need to take any action, as the UK has agreed that all licences held by a driver from any EU Member State continues to be valid for driving in the UK.

Anyone resident here who is the holder of a UK licence, or anyone who intends to move to Ireland as their normal place of residence, can exchange their UK driving licence for an Irish licence by visiting ndls.ie

Review of EU Vaccine Purchase

and Rollout needed urgently says FF MEP - Billy Kelleher



 Tardy delivery of Pfizer BioNTech vaccine and tardy approval of Moderna and Oxford Astrazenca vaccines incredibly frustrating for citizens -

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has this morning called for an urgent review of the European Commission's Vaccine Purchase and Rollout programme saying, "it is clear that it's not working as efficiently as it should be and that citizens are getting frustrated seeing non-EU countries power ahead with their own vaccine rollout."

Kelleher, a member of the Parliament's Public Health Committee added, "The purpose of Member States agreeing to co-ordinate their vaccine purchase and rollout through the Commission was to secure both price and rollout efficiencies.

"What is now obvious is that only a price efficiency has been secured. In normal times, this may have sufficed. However, in the midst of a worsening pandemic, it's simply not acceptable.

"The cost of not vaccinating the population quickly enough, and thereby not opening up society and the economy quickly enough, is considerably greater than the savings made on bulk purchasing through the Commission. "Citizens across the Union are seeing nonmember states accessing the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine much quicker than they are. We are seeing delays in deliveries, yet no response from the Commission to rectify this. I am very concerned that the pharma companies have taken the Commission for granted.

"Furthermore, I am concerned by the bureaucratic delays in authorising of the use of the Moderna and Oxford-Astrazeneca vaccines. As WHO Emergencies Director, Mike Ryan said last spring, "Perfection is the enemy of good in emergencies."

"The European Medicines Agency should not be placing greater bureaucratic red tape on vaccine producers than other countries. Of course, they must be confident in the efficacy and safety of vaccines, but I do not believe we need to reinvent the wheel.

"The HSE and the Department of Health can only vaccinate the people of Ireland if they have enough vaccines. I am urging Minister Donnelly and the Taoiseach to raise these concerns at EU Council and Commission level. The people of Ireland, and indeed Europe, will not accept any unnecessary delays or failure when it comes to getting their vaccines, and neither should our government," concluded Kelleher.

CALL FOR MORE **TESTING CENTRES**

The Kenmare Local Electoral Area is a large geographical section of County Kerry, stretching from Kilgarvan to Killorglin and includes all of the Iveragh Peninsula and yet it is not being served by one Covid-19 Testing Centre within it's boundaries, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill.


"I have been making this point strongly for some time now, and I don't appear to be getting any hearing" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Accessibility to testing is vital if we are to trace and eliminate this deadly virus" stated Councillor Cahill. "And to emphasise the point, it has just been announced that Kenmare LEA has the highest incidence rate of Covid-19 in Munster. In one week, the incidence rate increased from 80 to 439 per 100,000 population" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"We need to be proactive in dealing with this pandemic and bring testing into the community. We need to provide Testing Centres in all our towns to allow access for people in more remote areas" stated Councillor Cahill.

"When we know where the infection is, we will be able to then provide the vaccine to these people and we can wipe out this deadly virus for once and for all" he added.

It's January, so it's time to finalise the 2021 CAO college application form

As a new year begins with persistent pandemic uncertainty, college applicants must focus on the CAO form as the deadline looms large. Indeed, it's shaping up to be a very promising year for the 80,000 plus applicants – about 2,500 from Kerry - seeking a third level college course.

More than 50,000 college places will be available next August. Applicants have until 5.15pm on 1st February to submit a completed application form. So, use the remaining weeks wisely. Carefully consider your course choices. Follow your heart but keep an eye on the jobs market.

Since the new Leaving Cert grading system and CAO common points scale were introduced in 2017, points' requirements for many courses have stabilised. As the 'calculated grades' considerably inflated course points requirements last year, it might be wiser to consult the 2019 cut off points as a guide to likely points requirements in 2021. But keep in mind that points' requirements for courses fluctuate from year to year, so predicting cut off points is an inaccurate science. Each Leaving Cert candidate should aim to achieve her/his best possible result in that exam. Points' requirements for courses will take care of themselves in due course.

The CAO processes applications for admission to undergraduate courses in third level colleges in Ireland. Every public sector university, college and institute in the country, as well as a number of private colleges, participates in the CAO system. An applicant may choose from the entire range of courses in the CAO Handbook 2021. The courses are categorised as 'Level 8' or 'Level 7/6'. The 'Level 8' category contains the Honours Bachelor Degrees (HD). The 'Level 7/6' category contains Ordinary Bachelor Degrees (DG)/Higher Certificates (HC).

All you have to do is submit a single application to compete for one of the available third-level places. The interactive online application system, 'Apply' has made the process very straightforward. 'Apply' is easy to follow, particularly as the CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo' to enable you make a trial application. The CAO Handbook 2021 also contains detailed easy-to-follow information on how to apply for the courses on offer. Almost all applications are now made via 'Apply.' The interactive online application service will remain open on the

CAO website, www.cao.ie until 5.15pm on 1st February. The fee is €30, if you apply by 20th January and €45 thereafter until the 1st February.

Before you apply, study the CAO Handbook 2021, which explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

As the CAO Handbook 2021 doesn't contain information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements nor content of courses, consult the colleges' Prospecti and/or websites for that information. Consider the potential career value of each course for which you are applying. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few weeks. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling and successful college experience.

Q & A WITH B WELL FITNESS

Question: what to do for shoulder pain when in that seated position at a desk all day?

Answer: We are assuming that the shoulder pain experienced is due to muscle tension, and not a soft tissue or joint injury – these should obviously be assessed and you should follow the recommended rehab.

Any stretching should be done coupled with deep breathing exercises



KERRY GAA RETIREMENTS

This is the time of year when great players who know that their time has come exit the stage gracefully, and two of Killarney Legion's finest, Jonathan Lyne and Brian Kelly, have exercised that option, as has Tarbert's Shane Enright.

Brian and Jonathan were always stand-out players from a very young age, even among a hugely talented bunch of Legion youngsters that included James O'Donoghue and Podge O'Connor. James, Jonathan, and Brian were all stalwarts of the Sem side that won the Corn Uí Mhuirí in 2008, beating an equally star-studded Tralee CBS side by 2-11 to 1-11. The key moment was an absolutely stunning save by Brian to deny Fiachna Mangan a second goal. They succumbed to St. Pats of Dungannon in the Hogan Cup Final by 1-9 to 1-7, Kerry sides just couldn't get past the Northern teams for love or money in those times, but the youngest scion of the Cleeney clan and the tall and athletic young keeper were firmly on the radar.

They were stalwarts of that year's Kerry minor team, one of the most talented I have seen. As well as the three Legionnaires, you had Daithi Casey, Fionn Fitzgerald, Barry Shanahan, Jamie O'Sullivan, Peter Crowley, Wayne Guthrie, Jack Sherwood, Paul Geaney, Barry John Keane, Barry John Walsh (who was probably the stand-out player), Mike Tim O'Sullivan (now joint manager of Tralee CBS)....it wasn't enough. They took a very strong Mayo side to a semi-final replay but bowed out at that stage - a friendly giant of a youngster with strong Caragh connections was Mayo's man of the match - Aidan O'Shea was a pure gentleman and still is. They themselves came a cropper themselves to a Tyrone side who included Peter Harte and a much-heralded Kyle Coney.

Much the same Kerry team lined out against Cork in Pairc Ui Caoimh in 2011 in the U21 Championship. That was a strange one, to say the least. Cork led by 2-4 to 0-1 after 12 minutes and 2-13 to 0-4 at half-time; it was far too late for damage control. Just one of those games that spins out of control, it happens – Kerry Meath in 2001 is another example. If you told me that night that twelve of that Kerry panel would go on to play senior, with most of them winning an All Ireland in 2014, I'd have laughed – weakly.

The Legion duo had already proven their talent, though, and Jonathan made his senior debut that year against Cork in the National League at right back. He made his championship debut a year later against Clare in the qualifiers and was a stalwart on the Kerry panel for the next nine years.

After scoring two points against Kildare in the National League, Eamonn Fitzmaurice opted to switch him as a defensive wing forward rather than an attacking wing back. Jonathan,



a naturally intelligent and stylish footballer, could play anywhere but I have to say that I never agreed with that move with either club or county – I have always believed that Jonathan can dictate games from the half back line.

Every young footballer in Kerry dreams of an All Ireland, and it happened for Jonathan and his team-mates in 2014. Club colleague and close friend James O'Donoghue was Footballer of the Year, but Jonathan's contribution was also crucial. The best game of the year was Kerry's

replay win over Mayo in Limerick, a real classic. Kerry came back from seven points down to eke out a 3-16 to 3-13 victory, with Jonathan replacing Donnchadh Walsh and nervelessly scoring two crucial late points to win the game. By now he had a reputation as a talented wing back with a particular talent for timing his runs forward. In a way, his versatility came against him, with Jonathan regularly summoned from the bench to slot in anywhere on the pitch, and he performed a usually under-stqated but

always crucial role in many a Kerry victory. Jonathan is a teacher in Mean Scoil Castlegregory, where he and principal and Kerry star Aodhán Mac Gearailt helped guide the school to three Munster Finals.

Brian made his League debut in 2012 in a draw with Mayo. He had to wait until 2014 to make his championship debut – Brian was the first choice keeper throughout an enthralling and successful campaign that culminated in a win over Donegal and Sam Maguire's last official visit to the Kingdom. Brian also won the Sigerson Cup that year with UCC.

For much of his Kerry career, Brian shared the goalkeeping duties with Kilcummin's Brendan Kealy and latterly Shane Ryan of Rathmore.

The pair were part of a huge resurgence in Killarney Legion's fortunes. They helped the club to U21 titles in 2011 and 2012. They lost out in the County Club Finals of 2013 and 2014 to Dr. Crokes, winning promotion straight back to Division One of the County League in the latter year. In 2015, although they lost their third O'Donoghue Cup Final in a row, they reached their second ever County Senior Football Final and came agonisingly close to winning - Declan O'Sullivan inspired a great South Kerry comeback that saw his side pip Legion in extra-time of a replay. Killarney Legion did represent Kerry in the Munster Club Championship, but bowed out to Nemo Rangers of Cork. Possibly the best moment for Brian and Jonthan in a Legion jersey arrived in 2018, when they defeated Dr. Crokes to lift the Dr. Paddy O'Donoghue Cup for the first time since 1976.

The pair have been vital to Legion's success over the past decade and, no longer constrained by inter-county requirements, will no doubt be even more influential now.

Shane Enright was already established as a teak tough defender by then. He was a minor in 2005 and 2006, when a side that included David Moran, Tommy Walsh, Mike Moloney, Jamie Doolan, Gary Sayers, and Patrick Curtin (RIP) lost out to Roscommon in a replayed final. In 2008 the bulk of that panel won Kerry's last U21 title. Kieran O'Leary was man of the match that day, Mike Stam O'Donoghue got Kerry's two goals

while Paul O'Connor scored 0-5, but I was hugely impressed with David Moran in the middle and Killian Young and Shane in defence. By 2011 he was Kerry's starting cornerback – in fact, he was Kerry's designated man marker. In many ways Shane was an old-fashioned defender – sticky, tough, unobtrusive, and enormously focussed. He wasn't the type of player to make supporters gasp at an outrageous piece of skill, he simply made sure that his opponent was never doing it either. He was a key part of the 2014 win and won a deserved All Star a year later. Shane was also part of a Tarbert team that made the remarkable journey from Division Five straight to Division One in the County League.

All three have always been an absolute pleasure to meet and to watch, whether for club or county, and I wish them all the very best of luck in the future. Except, of course, when they are playing against my own club!

Further retirements are expected to be announced over the coming days.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD

Brian and Jonathan are not the only prominent retirements from the GAA recently. Cork stalwart Paul Kerrigan stepped away – he never had much luck against Kerry but he never gave us an inch either and I always respected him for it, his pace hurt us often enough. Dual player Aidan Walsh was a sensation from the time he was 17 years old (I first saw him that year as man of the match in the Duhallow U21 Tournament - the big lad was phenomenal). He gave everything he had to the service of Cork - I would have to agree with the general assessment that he spread himself too thin over both codes. I met him several times helping out at juvenile blitzes, that tells you something about his character as well. I never met Antony Nash, Cork's hurling keeper, but he was one of the best of his generation. I never liked how the rule change regarding penalties was named after him - the rule desperately needed to be changed (have you ever been his in the face by a sliotar? I have, my camogie-playing sister was absolutely delighted with herself) but Anthony Nash was simply playing fairly, it was the rule, not the player, that was wrong.

Incidentally and just in passing, of course I wouldn't be thrilled at having Mike Ashley of Sports Direct as a sponsor. But Cork GAA are getting E400,000 a year for five years now that they have replaced Chill Insurance as main sponsor with potential bonuses and a possibility of Ladies GAA and camogie being included after their current deal runs out. Would I take it? Get real. I would snap your hand off for a deal like that.

David Clarke, Donal Vaughan, Seamus O'Shea, and Tom Parsons retired from Mayo – Vaughan was one of those lung-bursting trademark Mayo defenders who could attack as well as he could defend in the half back line and one of their key players, but for me Clarke never really got the credit he deserved, second only to Cluxton as a keeper over the past two decades. For that matter, many people viewed Tom Parsons as a big, raw midfielder with more power than skill – a lot of people were completely wrong about

that. Parsons had superb skill in the engine room and was utterly selfless, any team, including us, would have been delighted to have him on board. Big Seamus O'Shea actually joined the panel after his awesomely talented younger brother (Conor would also join Mayo's senor squad). While he wasn't a polished diamond, he had size, strength, and most of all a phenomenal heart. All four players will be badly missed, even though Mayo unearthed a few gems in 2020.

GAA

Yes, the seniors most certainly did hit a blip against Cork. I made it clear at the start of the truncated 2020 Championship that getting games played was the sole priority. I have no doubt that if there was a back door, we would have regrouped and advanced to meet Dublin - let's be honest, we would not have advanced further. One surprise defeat does not suddenly make us a bad team and the showing of Tony Brosnan and Killian Spillane up front, and the impressive showing of our U20 players indicates to me that Kerry are by far the biggest threat to Dublin. I do have to note that the criticisms thrown Mayo's way after their comprehensive defeat by that awesome Dublin team were extremely unfair - Mayo earned the right to be there the hard way and I for one have huge admiration for that team.

We all know that Dublin are the team to beat. But I am honestly convinced that we have all the tools we need to beat them. A little more stability in midfield, a little more coaching in one-onone defending (our tackles need to be more convincing and we need to track free players in our danger area better) and a little more commitment to attack (we have better forwards than Dublin, but they need more support and less runners from defence) and Sam Maguire will be coming back to where it belongs. Everything to play for!

We haven't won at the U21/U20 grade since 2008. However, recent managements have seen a resurgence of our fortunes at Munster level. John Sugrue did a fantastic job and can justifiably feel unlucky that covid took four crucial players out of his hand for the All Ireland semi-final - to be fair, that was an awesome Galway side and they were brilliant to watch, credit where it is due. Kerry have made a very shrewd appointment in Declan O'Sullivan as his successor, and he in turn has picked wisely with John Galvin and Sean O'Sullivan - I honestly consider all three to be among the best judges of football in the county. Moreover, I would be hopeful after watching a great campaign by the 2018 Kerry minors that there is a wellspring of talent for the U20s to draw from. Time will tell...

The minors are our best success story of 2020. It takes some doing by management, players, and their families (an often forgotten but absolutely crucial part of the equation) to maintain focus and commitment during a lockdown, but Kerry managed it. That was a very, very good Cork team, we will see young Nash and Walsh at higher grades yet, but Kerry withstood the storm and came out burnished. The form of the likes of Nagle, Maunsell, Burke, and McMahon may be the headliners, but most impressive for me was Kerry's overall focus, hunger, and



enormous workrate. Talent alone does not win championships, and this year's Munster Minor Champions have more than talent going for them.

On the domestic front, Kerry supporters cannot complain about the dominance of Dublin GAA (I do firmly believe that the GAA need to put more money into coaching in Leinster counties and a bit less into Dublin - but that's the only change I would make. I enormously respect the Dubs - but I don't fear them. I can't wait until we play them again in championship, and I expect it to be this year) without looking at East Kerry. Of course I like East Kerry winning, but I think there are too many good players who won't be able to make East Kerry panels at the various grades because of the big numbers involved. Personally I am convinced that it is time to look at implementing Eoghan Ruadh as a district at senior grade, especially since Kenmare District going and Kilcummin dropping down from senior. Time for the County Board to grasp that

LOOKING FORWARD TO 2021

They say that it's always darkest before the dawn (a little bit ridiculous; it's darkest in the middle of the night, but let's not have mere logic interfere with folk wisdom). Certainly we have to face the fact that things look fairly bleak at the moment and sport is unlikely to feature too highly on anyone's agenda for the immediate future. Nonetheless, as vaccines begin to roll out and the world begins the process of healing, there is plenty to look forward to over the coming months, especially in sport. You have the Olympics (although Tokyo might not exactly be the most suitable host right now), the Paralympics, the Soccer World Cup (talking about unsuitable hosts!), the Rugby World Cup, the Cricket World Cup, the Ryder Cup, The European Championships.....

RUGBY

As things stand, the British and Irish Lions Tour to South Africa will be going ahead. The hosts won the 2009 series, but I expect the Lions to reverse that on this occasion. South African rugby is now firmly aligned with the Northern hemisphere

now anyway – I am sceptical of that move, to be blunt about it. I think rugby is expanding too fast for solid foundations. There are too many games expected of too few teams – Munster and Leinster fielding extremely weakened sides in defeats to Connaught and Ulster devalues competitions. French teams withdrawing from the Pro14, ostensibly over covid fears (I suspect that the cost of competing versus the reward when compared with their rich domestic league played a part) is another ominous sign. That said, Munster's late and great victory over Clermont Auvergne was a throwback to happier days and hopefully a harbinger of days to come.

The Six Nations is my favourite tournament, although I generally think of it as 'Five Nations and a Close Friend', sorry Italy, but that's the harsh reality. England are the powerhouse right now – and I really do mean power, rugby is worryingly attritional and I firmly believe that concussion protocols are nowhere near strict enough, a pending legal case by former players could and hopefully will have repercussions for the game. A resurgent France came very close to shocking England in their last game and did it with a team infused by youth.

Ireland, to be honest, look well behind both. More worryingly, we still look to the likes of Sexton (though Burns looks a real contender for me), O'Mahony, and Aki, some of the best players....of yesteryear, to be blunt about it. We got absolutely spanked by England in particular. Worse, we looked completely lacking in any flair or imagination. That said, we are well ahead of Italy, Scotland, and Wales. I've watched some of the games by that great Welsh side of the early seventies on you tube during lockdown. Lads can talk about Gareth Edwards all they want, and he really was great, but none of them come close to JPR Williams for me. The Doctor was probably my favourite rugby player ever to watch, shimmying skill allied to a fearless core. Admittedly, he was also the worst commentator ever in his later career. Good old Bill McLaren commentated on some of those Welsh games - he was like a befuddled but enthusiastic favourite teacher he didn't always make complete sense but you had to love him.



SOCCER

Like I said, darkest before the dawn. Hopefully the legal net is closing on a certain individual who shall not be named because he's a muppet. Borrowing E6m from Mike Ashley and pretending it was sponsorship? Ah, lads! Stephen Kenny has come on board at a time when things are at a low ebb and I strongly suggest that he literally gets a free pass for 2021. We haven't qualified for the European Championships, and no harm, a bit of breathing space is good for us right now. I have no more interest in qualifying for Qatar than I do in attending a Sepp Blatter house party right now. Is he still in jail after that corrupt debacle? I certainly hope so. I've no time for his designated heir apparent and former assistant Infantino either.

Brexit means that Irish players can no longer transfer to British clubs before the age of 18. I actually believe that gives us a golden opportunity. For far too long, the League of Ireland has been shamefully neglected by the FAI, our development system has been all about sending young players to England. But having our best 17 and 18 year olds developing their game at home with LOI clubs would help provide the missing element in Irish soccer for generations - a pathway forward for non-elite players. Cork City FC's future remains in debate while Limerick FC, sorry 'Treaty United' (they had to change the name to avoid paving debts) don't seem to have one. I know that the FAI don't have money and are dependent on the taxpayer, but having a team in two of Ireland's most important cities must be a priority. Meanwhile Shamrock Rovers are putting a B team into the First Division – great move for them, absolutely terrible move for Irish soccer. What will happen if that trend continues is a small handful of clubs will completely dominate, hoover up all the available talent....and stagnate. We need more LOI clubs, not less. Get young Irish players playing in Ireland. Move the focus from elite underage squads (that narrows development pathways, not opens them) to District Leagues feeding into Irish teams, not English ones. Forget summer soccer, it simply hasn't worked - Mayo If the FAI can keep their heads, and I realise the size of that particular 'if' given their record, this could be the year that Irish soccer for the first time ever in its history builds a solid foundation for the game in this country.


The new Government Level 5 Guidelines allow for INDIVIDUALtraining only.





DEALING WITH **DEPRESSION** PART 2

Thoughts are constantly streaming through our minds which in turn can impact on how we feel and how we behave. These thoughts can be friendly positive thoughts or hostile, critical and negative ones. It makes sense therefore that we would try to reduce the negative ones as much as possible. Just as we wouldn't allow any stranger to just enter our house and take over, we need to be just as vigilant with our thoughts. We need to take more control over what we allow into our minds and what we prohibit from entering. We have much more choice than we realise - and therefore rather than just reacting to every thought we begin to take more control over our mind. Slowly we begin to realise that just because we think something it doesn't mean it's true! By examining our thoughts as they flow through our mind, we begin to increase our awareness of how our minds are focused. Then we begin to allow these thoughts - whether they are positive or negative, exciting or boring - to just flow through our mind stream without reacting or responding. This is the basis of mindfulness.

For many people experiencing depression they can create an endless cycle of 'If onlys' and 'what ifs' in their mind. There is an underlying non-acceptance of the past as they constantly think how their lives would be different 'If only I hadn't taken his advice', 'If only I hadn't behaved in that way'. This all leads to feelings of anger, hopelessness and mistrust of others. Accepting how things are right now- not as we wish they were, but as they actually are - is quite a radical step. It can however mark the starting point from which we can come to terms with past events and begin to move forward. Just as there are many paths leading to feeling depressed, there are also many routes out of it. We don't get depressed as a result of an adverse event or experience - but in how we respond to it. When our emotional needs go unmet this can lead to considerable mental distress and depression. 




