TENANT PURCHASE SCHEME



At a 2015 Killarney Municipal Meeting, Area Councillor Michael Gleeson called on Government to provide clarity in relation to the long awaited introduction of a

new Tenant Purchase Scheme.

The following reply has been received from Mr Paudie Coffey, Minister of State for Housing: "Part 3 of the Housing Act 2014 provides for a new Scheme for the Tenant Purchase of existing Local Authority Houses along incremental purchase lines. The Government's Social Housing Policy 2020 includes a commitment to introduce a new Tenant Purchase Scheme in the second Quarter of 2015. Full details of the

New Scheme will be set out in the regulations that the Minister will make in advance of its introduction".

Councillor Gleeson stated that this scheme will give hope to individuals and families who have long wished to acquire their own home. He hopes that the terms of the scheme will encourage active involvement by many.

O'Carroll.

The Darkness into Light walk in aid of Pieta House takes place while dawn breaks and brings the community together to raise funds and awareness for the self-harm and suicide centre.

Looking for something different to celebrate their 50th birthday's, two Killarney women decided to take on the challenge of the Kerry Camino. Mairead Murphy and Kathleen took on the challenge of walking through Kerry for three days....

Here is Mairead's account of their adventure.

After hot showers and a change of clothes Kathleen and I walked again to find the resting place of Tom Crean. "Only a kilometre down the road" said a local man. Can I just say here in print that the Annascaul kilometre is actually about 2 miles!! We found the tomb.. we can confirm the man is dead.... we nearly were too! This Sunday a very special train will pull into the platform at Killarney Railway Station.

No. 461 is part of the Annual Irish Railway Heritage Weekend which takes in South Munster. The Railway Preservation Society of Ireland was formed in 1964 to preserve in working order steam locomotives and other rolling stock built for the Irish railway system, from 1850 to the present day. The RPSI maintains a museum at Whitehead, Northern Ireland and operates steam-hauled excursions over the present day larnrod Eireann & Northern Ireland Railway railway networks (for families and enthusiasts. The Society is a not-forprofit charity managed by volunteers. All funds from ticket sales shop sales membership fees or donations go directly to keeping Ireland's steam railway heritage operating for future generations. Now in its 46th year, the Annual Irish Railway Heritage weekend for 2015 takes in South Munster with visits to Cork and Kerry. The train will depart Mallow at 13.25 for the 40 miles to Killarney. Calling at Banteer (13.45 - 13.55), Millstreet (14.11 - 14.21), Rathmore (14.34 -14.46), 461 is due to arrive into Killarney at 15.10 hours. The railtour passengers will have 1 hour & 20 minutes to sample the delights of Ireland's No. 1 Tourist destination. At 16.30 hours, 461 is scheduled to steam out of Killarney back to Mallow and then into Cork where the tour will spend its second night. Well worth a visit.

DR. CROKES COMMEMORATE 100 YEAR OLD BOOK

Dr Crokes will celebrate the centenary of the publication of Dick Fitzgerald's book, 'How to play Gaelic football' at a special night in the clubhouse at Lewis Road, tonight, May 8th at 8.00 pm.

Canon Tom Looney author of the biography of Dick Fitzgerald, 'King in a Kingdom of Kings' will deliver a lecture on the first ever book on how Gaelic football should be played. Dick is a holder of 5 All Ireland medals. It is remarkable that this book was written while Dickeen was still playing as Kerry captain and remained the only book on coaching published until 1958, when fellow Croke, Dr Eamonn O'Sullivan published' The Art and Science of Gaelic Football.

Special guest on the night will be RTE'S Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh, who will be interviewing the 5 senior Crokes players and the 2 club minors who won All Ireland medals in 2014. Dickeen captained Kerry to All Ireland success in 1914 as he did in 1913 and the strong Kerry and Crokes tradition was continued in 2014 when Kieran O'Leary and Fionn Fitzgerald lifted the Sam Maguire.

An unbelievable 8 Crokes players won All Ireland medals in 1914, Dick Fitzgerald, Con Murphy, Denis Doyle, Pat Breen, Johnny O'Mahony, John Skinner and Paddy Healy who is grand-father of Seanie and Pat O'Shea.

IMPROVED HEARING ENHANCES QUALITY OF LIFE IN MODERATE DEMENTIA

AUDIOLOGY Medical Services, Kerry's only professionally audited hearing centre of excellence held an Alzheimer's Tea Day at the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee, yesterday, Thursday 7th May. Chief Audiologist at AMS in Bon Secours Hospital and Scotia House Tralee, Charles Lewis, said: "It has been reported that early findings in a new study suggest that the quality of life is improved in impaired listeners diagnosed with moderate dementia by treating hearing loss with hearing aids, as well as the quality of life of the caregiver. The study by the University of North Texas and Unitron, a global manufacturer of advanced hearing solutions, is being conducted by Amyn M. Amlani, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Speech and Hearing Sciences at the University of North Texas, in partnership with Brian Taylor, Au.D., Director of Practice Development and Clinical Affairs at Unitron." He said that the researchers have already been able to show some improvement in cognitive ability among participants using hearing aids. This is certainly suggestive that there may be new therapeutic potential for hearing aids in cases of dementia. If the early results are found to be conclusive, the findings could enhance the role of hearing healthcare professionals in the rehabilitation of patients diagnosed with cognitive decline in relation to his or her hearing. Dr Amyn Amlani, who carried out the study, said: "This study looks at whether improved hearing can improve cognitive functioning for people who have already been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of dementia, In particular, we want to understand whether better hearing

can play a role in helping people with dementia lead more active and engaged lives, particularly if hearing loss is identified and treated early."

Untreated Hearing Loss & Dementia

Previous studies have found that people with hearing loss are significantly more likely to develop dementia over time in comparison to those with normal hearing. There are currently many studies ongoing in relation to hearing loss and neuro degenerative disease, but no data yet exists showing that the effects of dementia can actually be lessened through the use of hearing aids.

The research concluded that given the expected sharp increase in dementia cases over the next few decades, the findings could have significant implications for aging individuals as they begin experiencing hearing loss.

The study includes adults 50-90 years' of age with moderate dementia who are inexperienced with amplification devices. It measures speech-recognition performance in noise, cognition and self-reported improvements in quality of life. The study is expected to be completed in late 2015. START TO FINISH VICTORY AT RALLY OF THE LAKES

Donegal driver Donagh Kelly and his Monaghan co-driver Conor Foley scored a start to finish victory on last weeekend's Cartell.ie Rally of the Lakes. The Ford Focus World Rally crew coped best in the trying conditions and extremely wet roads to score Kelly's third victory in the 2015Clonakilty Black Puddings Irish Tarmac Rally Championship. It also marked Foley's maiden international rally win. At the Killarney finish ramp on Sunday evening Kelly said: "It was a tough rally, very hard, but I am delighted."

Kelly now leads the series after four of the seven rounds. Robert Barrable finished runner-up after a fantastic debut drive in a McKinstry Motorsport Subaru WRC S14. He also won the Bertie Fisher Cup for setting the fastest stage time over Moll's Gap, stopping the clocks with an impressive 8mins 37.9sec on the third over the famous pass despite the road being covered in standing water.

Local ace Alan Ring and his West Cork codriver Adrian Deasy were third in another Subaru Impreza. Like Barrable they too overcame gearbox problems on Saturday evening and held off an early Sunday morning challenge from former doubleevent winners Darragh O'Riordan and Tony McDaid.

This is the second time Ring has finished on the podium of his home rally following his second place last year. "There is only one place left, he joked at the finish line.

O'Riordan dropped a load of time half way through Saturday's loop of stages on the Beara Peninsula, the front differential broke on his Ford Fiesta on the first run over Cod's Head and he dropped from second to sixth. He began a massive recovery drive over the latter Saturday and early Sunday stages and had closed to just five seconds of Ring's third place when he crashed out of the rally on the third and final run over Moll's Gap.

Joe McGonigle and Ciaran Geaney rounded off the top four in their Skoda Fabia S2000. HISTORIC RALLY



ROWING TO RIO The Monika Dukaraska Blog. The story of a Professional Athlete



Training two to three times daily, every

day for three to four weeks without a day off is demanding. It is demanding physically as well as mentally. Sometimes it is more of a mental battle to get through a training session while your body can actually do it. Also, not every training session is perfect. There is several things that a rower has to work on. The rowing stroke is complex but our goal is to make it as simple and easy as possible. We have to be able to repeat it over 240 times during a race especially when the fatigue kicks in. In a crew boat, it is even more difficult. We have to find a common way of thinking, moving and coping. Two has to become one.

Last week has been challenging, I felt tired. However, it was not only a physical tiredness but also more of a mental drain, which accumulated over hundreds of kilometres that I covered on and off the water. Long paddles often turned into a battle, a battle with myself. My goal was to maintain straight lines while moving up and down the boat. I knew I was fatigued but I had to force myself to change, to improve and to sustain that change for several kilometres. It is my responsibility to respond to what the coach is saying, to what the coach is trying make me to do. My changes affect my partner and vice versa, making the boat go faster or slower. I have to be on top of my game all the time especially as I am in a stroke seat – dictating the pace of our rowing.

Getting through a training session when you are not feeling 100 percent able for it often feels like an accomplishment. The moment you get things right and the boat goes faster or you feel that you are moving effortlessly with the boat feel very rewarding. Those rewards remind you why you do it in the first place. When my body and mind are aching, I remind myself about the upcoming competition and that I may feel similar way on the race day.

It is important to remember that days like these will always be there and are perhaps necessary. Without a tough day, I would not know how a great day feels like. A meandering road leads to success. Prepare yourself for ups and down, while the way you deal with them will determine your success.

KNOWLEDGE TRANSFER PAYMENT SHOULD GO DIRECT TO FARMER -ACCORDING TO ICMSA.

The payment made under the Knowledge Transfer Scheme to farmers should be paid directly to the farmer by the Department and the farmer should not be dependent on the advisor making the payment, according to Mr. John Comer, President of ICMSA. It is totally unacceptable that under the scheme, the €750 payment per farmer will be paid to the facilitator of the Group and the farmer will then have to wait for the facilitator to pay him/her. Such a system does not reflect the so called simplification agenda at EU level at this time and is a significant departure from the normal system of payment where a farmer is now relying on a third party to make a payment from a Department scheme.

While welcoming the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Marine regarding the opening of the Knowledge Transfer Scheme, a scheme that all farmers should consider given its benefits from a farming and personal perspective, Mr. Comer said, that it makes no sense that the farmer will not be paid directly by the Department. At a time when the EU is talking up simplification, it would appear that yet again, actions say otherwise and what we now have is complication rather than simplification when the simple fact should be that the farmer should be paid directly by the Department.

The simplification agenda is hugely important to farmers but yet again, ICMSA, Mr. Comer said, is very concerned that schemes are being made more complicated, more costly for no obvious reason or benefit and this needs to change. The payment should be made directly to the farmer and Mr. Comer concluded by calling on the Minister to make this simple change.

In the 1950's, when Allan Savory was a young ecologist he presided over the slaughter of forty thousand elephants in South Africa. At the time, he was involved in establishing national parks. То begin with, they removed the native tribes and their livestock, Savory blamed the degradation of land on livestock, as he had been educated to believe, so they were the first to go. However, the land quality continued to deteriorate, he assessed the situation and decided that they had too many elephants, a team of experts agreed, a savage slaughter ensued. The degradation of the land continued and Savory had to accept that some elements of his assessment did not add up. Carrying the burden of previous errors, he dedicated his life to solving the problem of soil degradation and desertification. His story is not a theoretical one, he has lived it and he has proven the myth of too many livestock in the world to be untrue. In a "Ted" talk of some years ago, available on the internet, he documented how by increasing cattle numbers dramatically on sites that had effectively turned to desert he restored them to grassland. The saying that a picture says a thousand words was never as true as it is in this presentation. Savory has worked his magic across the world and has shown the damage environmental experts have done to natural grasslands through poorly conceived ideas. From Atagonia to Orth America to Africa, Australia to Asia, mismanagement of natural grasslands has led to vast areas of desert where it should not in theory exist. The experts hired by the outside world to advice on solving the problem have only managed as Savory did in the 1950s to make it worse. Such experts rarely accept responsibility for their failure as Savory did. The decimation of a national park in the S by removing livestock was put down to "unknown" causes. In another case two hundred and fifty thousand sheep were removed from the Avajo reservation, to preserve native grassland, the policy deprived the Indians of a livelihood, and did nothing for the environment. The myth persists despite the tangible

visible evidence provided by holistic rotational grazing, in truth, grass needs grazers as much as grazers need the grass. In his paper "Where have all the grasslands gone", Craig Allen examines the history of ew exico grasslands. His study confirms precisely what Savory says. The photographic evidence again documents the changes that have occurred in the century since livestock have been removed. Grasses disappear and woody vegetation thrives. In years beginning in the most productive grasslands in the Emez mountains were reduced by, around the time this policy of stock reduction took hold. Here also fire was used to cleanse vegetation. Thousands of years of soil formation were altered by half a century of policy change. The reason for sharing this story now is that we will witness our own version in this county over the next few decades. Our mountains are under threat and it is not from overgrazing but the exact opposite. The last few weeks will have done little to secure their future. Insulting and deriding the custodians of those mountains will do two things, harden the resolve of those entrenched and inform those at an impressionable age that they are not wanted. Those who feel that they were threatened by fire lately should try to imagine what the mountains will look like covered in gorse and other highly flammable vegetation and nobody willing to control it. There are only two practical methods of control, manage livestock properly and manage fire, a combination of both has worked successfully in the past. Fail to maintain the former and the latter will be far more dangerous in the future.



IFA WELCOMES NEW €52M SUCKLER BEEF GENOMICS SCHEME

IFA President Eddie Downey this week welcomed the new Beef Data and Genomics Scheme, saying IFA lobbied hard to secure the annual funding of \in 52m. He said Minister Coveney must ensure that applications are sent out to all farmers immediately and there are no delays in processing so payments are made to suckler farmers by the end of this year, as promised.

Encouraging all suckler farmers to apply, Eddie Downey said this is a vital income support to maintain our valuable national suckler cow herd. He said the Minister must ensure the scheme is practical and that farmers do not incur unnecessary additional cost.

IFA National Livestock Chairman Henry Burns said this scheme is positive for suckler farmers with payments the equivalent of $\in 100/680$ per cow for the next six years. He said the key message to suckler farmers is to make sure to apply for the scheme. He said applications will be sent to all suckler farmers and producers can also apply on-line. The closing date for the scheme is May 29th 2015.

Henry Burns said IFA has clearly outlined farmers concerns with some aspects of the scheme to Minister Coveney and particularly the costs farmers will incur to comply with some of the criteria under the scheme. In addition he said there is a high level of concern among farmers about the direction of the scheme on aspects of the breeding requirements. He said suckler farmers cannot be left in a position where they are required to comply with something that is very costly or not practical at farm level. The IFA Livestock leader said it is essential that the genomics programme now being pursued under this new programme delivers for suckler farmers.

1. Write down all of the negative things you continue to say to yourself in a day. Note the ones that come up again and again. Then challenge each thought with this question: "Where does this thought come from?" Was it something you continually heard your mother or father say? Was it something you heard from a teacher or family member? Maybe it came from TV programmes? The key is to understand that the way we think is often learned when we were young.

2. Ask yourself if the thought is true? Do you believe it? Be firm with yourself. You may have been saying that you're not good enough but is that really true? Look at all of the things you do and who you are! We are all good enough – no matter what!

3. Replace the negative thought with the truth of who you are! Find evidence to support this thought and affirm it daily.

Know Your Rights: BETTER ENERGY HOMES SCHEME

MAY 2015

QUESTION

Our house is quite chilly, so we'd like to make it more comfortable and save on our heating bills. Are there any grants for this type of work?

ANSWER

You can apply for the Better Energy Homes Scheme, which provides grants to homeowners to improve energy efficiency in their homes. (It is also available to landlords and owners of more than one property.) The Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) administers the scheme.

You can use the Home Energy Self Survey to identify areas in your home that could be improved to increase energy efficiency. You can also get a Building Energy Rating (BER) done if you are uncertain about your energy-saving options or what work to get done first.

Grants are available for the following types of work: roof insulation; wall insulation; upgrade of heating controls; installing a highefficiency boiler; solar heating; and a BER after the energy-saving work is carried out.

To qualify for a grant, you must own a dwelling built before 2006; use a contractor from SEAI's registered list; use newly fitted materials and products; have work done that complies with the required standards; have a BER carried out after the works are done and use a BER assessor from SEAI's National Register. You must have grant approval before you buy materials or start work.

Grants for qualifying measures range from a maximum of \leq 300 for attic or cavity wall insulation to a maximum of \leq 4,500 for external wall insulation on a detached house. Grants are paid after the work is completed and you have paid your contractor.

If you get three qualifying measures done, a bonus of \in 300 is payable on top of the grants. (A BER doesn't count as a measure for this bonus.) A further \in 100 is payable on completion of a fourth measure. Full details of grants and bonuses are available on seai.ie.

If you are also claiming a tax credit under the Home Renovation Incentive, the amount of expenditure that qualifies for the credit will be reduced. You can contact SEAI at **1850 927 000** or **info@betterenergyhomes.ie.**

Last week we looked at some practical ways that you can reduce the pressure around exam time. So now it's time to plan how you are going to study over the next few weeks. It is important to study in a location where you can concentrate and won't be interrupted. Studying with others or as part of a study group can be helpful, but be careful to keep it from turning into an opportunity to catch up on the latest news and gossip.

Just as we are all different in many other ways, we also have different learning styles – so try out some of the following and use what works for you.

Effective Tips for Revising 1. MAKE SUMMARY NOTES

Condense your class notes and reading by pinpointing key terms and concepts and make sure that you understand them. Writing these notes can help you to retain more information. You can recite the summary notes out loud, and even record and listen to them.

2. USE FLASH CARDS

Flashcards are very helpful tools to remember information. You can condense your summary notes into bullet points, keywords, lists, formulas and diagrams and place them onto a card for each topic. They are also easy to carry around so you can look at them anytime.

3. QUIZ YOURSELF

Why not make up your own mock exam to test yourself. Write down a list of the keywords or questions and leave room underneath each one. Then pretend to take the exam and write down as much as you know about the topic under each keyword. If you do this with your study group it can even be fun!!

4. PRACTICE UNDER EXAM CONDITIONS

Practice going over past examination papers – in the same amount of time as in the exam. Although you are only practicing try writing the full answers to the questions so you can work through the entire thought process. Check your answers so you can assess your strengths and weaknesses and go back and study any area which you feel weak on.

5. CREATE MEMORY AIDS SUCH AS MNEMONICS AND DIAGRAMS

Mnemonics are tools that can help you to remember formulas, keys concepts, definitions etc. Jot down these mnemonics or diagrams before you start answering any question. In that way, you can refer back to your plan when writing your answer, without fear of forgetting what you were going to write next.

If you feel stressed or overwhelmed, it is important to speak with the adults in your life. They may not be aware of just how much pressure you are feeling to get everything done. Talk to a parent, teacher or counsellor, and ask for help in dealing with stress.

HEALTHY OUTLOOK

Health Matters.... With Dr. Michael O'Doherty

MALARIA

INTRODUCTION:

Malaria is widespread in many tropical and subtropical countries and is a serious and sometimes fatal disease. You cannot be vaccinated against malaria but you can protect yourself in three ways:

Avoidance of bites

•

Mosquitoes cause much inconvenience because of local reaction to the bites themselves and from the infections they transmit, Mosquitoes spread malaria, yellow fever, dengue and Japanese encephalitis.

Mosquitoes bite at any time of the day but most bites occur in the evening.

PRECAUTIONS TO TAKE:

- 1. Avoid mosquito bites, especially are sunset, if you are out at night wear long sleeved clothing and long trouser.
- 2. Mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing, so spray and insecticide or repellent on them. Insect repellents should also be used on exposed clothing.
- 3. Spraying insecticides in the room, burning pyrethroid coils and heating insecticide impregnated tablets all help control mosquitoes.
- 4. If sleeping in an unscreened room, or outdoors, a mosquito net (which should be impregnated with insecticide) is a sensible precaution. Portable, lightweight nets are available.
- 5. Garlic, vitamin b and ultrasound devices do not prevent bites.

WHERE THE DISEASE OCCURS:

For those travelling to many of the warmer regions of our world there may be risk of contracting malaria .Each year this parasitic disease causes many deaths both in the tropics and among travellers returning to their home countries .most of the transmission occurs in tropical Africa (approx 95%), Asia and Central & South America. Travellers need to remember that there is also a mild risk of the disease when visiting parts of North Africa and some parts of the Middle East.

HOW IS THE DISEASE TRANSMITTED?

- Fever
- Sweating
- Shivering
- Headaches
- Generalised flu symptoms

The degree of illness within any particular patient depends greatly on the number of parasites with the blood stream .During an initial attack the symptoms are usually very definite and a clinical diagnosis may be quite straight forward so long as a history of international travel is obtained.



MARGARET'S RAMBLINGS

MADELINE MCCANN WILL CAT-PROOFING **BE 12 YEARS OLD ON NEXT** TUESDAY

Madeline was abducted just over 8 years ago from her family's holiday apartment in Praia da Luz, in the Algarve area of Portugal on May 3rd 2007, when she was approaching her fourth birthday, Madeline and her younger brother and sister had been left asleep at 8.30pm in the ground-floor apartment, while their parents and friends dined in a restaurant 50 metres (160 ft) away. The parents checked on the children throughout the evening, until Madeleine's mother discovered she was missing at 10pm. Despite all enquiries by the Police and private investigators it's like Madeline has vanished off the face of the earth and about the only good news over the past 8 years is that the Portuguese police chief who led the initial investigation into Madeline's disappearance and later wrote a book about the case suggesting the couple had faked the abduction to cover up their daughter's death will now be paying for the continuation of the investigation by private investigators.

Kate and Gerry McCann sued ex-police chief Goncalo Amaral for libel and were awarded € 490,000, he was also ordered to pay an extra €104,000 in interest dating back to January 2010. The court also barred Amaral and his publisher from selling the book or issuing further editions. It also barred the producer of a documentary from selling the rights to broadcast or distribute it. The former police chief can appeal the verdict. Madeleine's parents are asking the public to continue search for their missing daughter saying "We would like to remind people that there is still an innocent little girl who is missing and that those responsible for her abduction remain at large." Kate McCann had earlier announced she will lead a 500-mile bike ride from Edinburgh to London in June to raise £10,000 for a missing persons charity 'Missing People' of which she is an ambassador. said: "As the eighth anniversary of our daughter Madeleine's abduction is upon us, I'm more driven than ever to continue the search for Madeleine and to help other families who face the pain of a child being missing. Madeline has blue-green eyes; the right eye has a distinctive spot on the iris and she also had a small brown mark on the calf of the left leg at the time of her abduction. Were you on holiday in the resort at that time? Did you notice anything suspicious? As you look back on old photos or videos do you think you might have something useful, no matter how trivial that might help the police to bring Madeline home?

Electrical wires. These can cause shocks when chewed. They can also topple lamps and appliances when pulled. Tape them together and out of reach. Do the same with long phone cords. Better yet, buy plastic conduit or flat strips of vinyl to cover them and hold them flat to the floor.

 Little things: rubber bands, thumbtacks, paper clips, deflated balloons. All of these can be enticing playthings but pose a choking hazard.

Big things, such as unsecured bookcases. Top-heavy or unstable furniture can topple over onto a cat should he hang from it.

Hanging cords for blinds. They may look fun to play with but can become wrapped around a kitten's neck. Tie the cords out of reach or cut them so they don't form a loop.

Open windows, balconies etc. These can result in falls.

Unsecured doors. You don't want your cat to accidentally wander outside or get caught in a door slamming shut from a breeze.

• Swinging doors. These can trap a kitten's head and neck.

An open fireplace. Protect your cat from getting burned by using a secure fire screen.

Precariously placed statues or vases. They can fall on a curious kitten.

• Hanging tablecloths. If pulled, they can bring dishes crashing down, possibly injuring the kitten.

Long strings. If swallowed, they can damage the intestines or cause a blockage, requiring surgery.

Craft or sewing kits. These may hold needles and threads that can be swallowed, causing severe injury and illness.

• Houseplants. They may be enticing to munch on, but some can be toxic. Know your plants or, even better, put them all out of reach.

Household cleaners containing pine or phenol. These chemicals are particularly toxic to cats. Never use these to clean the cat's bowls or sleeping quarters.

Laundry dangers, such as fabric softener sheets and laundry pods. These can be toxic, and open dryer doors (or front-loading washer doors) can be inviting for a cat to nap inside on the clothes — before the door is shut and the appliance is turned on.

GOOD NEWS

A police unit has been dedicated solely to investigating and apprehending perpetrators of animal cruelty in Norway. The initiative, which will be running a trial for three years, will take place in the western Sor-Trondelag county and will be the first of its kind in the country. The unit will consist of an investigator, a legal expert, and a coordinator who will focus solely on crimes of animal cruelty.

In 2014, under 40 cases of animal cruelty were reported to police in Norway. Not only will the unit address these crimes, but will help catch and rehabilitate those who could move on to commit more serious crimes against humans in the future. According to the Norwegian government, studies have found a correlation between those who abuse animals as youth and those who commit violent crimes as adults. This law will only add to Norway's excellent record of protection for animals. Using live animals as bait is illegal in the country, as is abandoning them. The government foots the bill for the medical care of any sick or injured animal found by a citizen and brought into a shelter or veterinary center, and requires citizens to act if they see a group of stray or wild animals exposed to sickness or abnormal suffering. This new unit will ensure that police have the time and resources to investigate all allegations of animal cruelty, and could help prevent violent crimes in the future. If successful, this trial could change

the landscape of animal protection all over Europe.

LET'S HOPE THE GOVERNMENT DOESN'T READ THIS

• During the 1st century AD, Roman emperor Vaspasian placed a tax on urine. The buyer(s) of the urine paid the tax. The urine from public urinals was sold as an essential ingredient for several chemical processes e.g. it was used in tanning leather etc and also by launderers as a source of ammonia to clean and whiten woollen togas etc. Therefore, those who obtained valuable urine from collectors were charged a tax.

• During the Middle Ages, European governments placed a tax on soap. Great Britain didn't repeal its soap tax until 1835.

• Playing cards were taxed as early as the 16th century, but in 1710, the English government dramatically raised taxes on playing cards and dice. This led to widespread forgeries of playing cards to avoid paying taxes. The tax was not removed until 1960.

THE LAVENDER CAPITAL OF NORTH AMERICA



When you imagine lush fields of lavender, the first place that comes to mind is often southern France, which has led the world in commercial production of these fragrant flowering bushes for many years. Despite this long-held dominance, lavender can be grown throughout the world as long as the climate is sunny and low in humidity. One such location is Sequim, Washington, which has earned the nickname the "Lavender Capital of North America." Located along the Dungeness River at the base of the Olympic Mountains, Sequim has spent the last 20 years transforming arid farmland into a fragrant prairie of purple blooms. Despite the relentlessly rainy reputation of the Pacific Northwest (and especially the Olympic peninsula), Sequim stays quite sunny and arid throughout the year due to its position at the downwind base of the Olympic Mountains, a placement that results in a meteorological phenomenon known as a "rain shadow." Rain shadows form when humid prevailing winds roll in from the ocean and are intercepted by mountains. As the moist air rises along the

mountain's windward side, it begins to cool down, condense and precipitate. This process essentially dehumidifies the air by the time it makes it over the mountain peaks, casting a "shadow of dryness" down along the leeward side of the mountain. The effect of this phenomenon is striking when you compare Sequim with a town situated on the other end of the mountains, such as Forks which receives a whopping 119 inches of annual rainfall, Seguim only clocks in at around 10-15 inches a year. With so little rainfall, Sequim nearly qualifies as a desert, but early Western settlers who came to the "Sequim Prairie" in the 1850s to farm were able to circumvent this challenge by digging irrigation canals. Farming remained the primary industry of Sequim for over a century, but as more housing and commercial developments began to take root in response to an influx of people in the late 20th century, evidence of this important agricultural history began to dwindle and farmers began turning their attention away from conventional crops and livestock in the mid-1990s to focus on more niche crops, like lavender. Almost 20 years later, the pivotal shift towards this fragrant purple flower has transformed Sequim into a major cultural tourist destination on the Olympic peninsula and today, there are dozens of lavender farms spread across the Seguim-Dungeness Valley. Several farms in Seguim grows, harvests, distills and sells their own lavender and some are also a tourist destination where visitors can wander the fields at their leisure and even pick their own lavender bouquets. One farm for example sells all kinds of lavender-based goods, like sachets, soaps, tinctures, lotions, candles and even salad dressing and coffee!

Candles and even salad dressing and coffee! Their biggest crowd-pleaser is the homemade lavender-infused ice cream, which they sell by the scoop in a small hut outside the main gift shop; the ice cream stand features several lavender-infused flavours, including lemon custard, peppermint, lemon sherbet and white chocolate. For those who don't like ice cream, there are also lavender lemonades, teas and sodas.

THANKS TO DNA, THE FACES OF LITTER BUGS ARE BEING PUT ON BILLBOARDS

A new science-based anti-littering campaign is taking away the anonymity Hong Kong residents who fling Litter on footpaths and streets currently enjoy. The aptly named project, The Face of Litter, is using DNA found on discarded items-the saliva on a cigarette butt for instance ----to reconstruct the face of the user. The effort relies on Snapshot DNA phenotyping, which crosses a person's genetic code with the demographic data of a particular neighborhood in order to generate a 3-D facial model. In this Hong Kong campaign the faces of folks who litter aren't being sent to the police. Instead, they're currently being displayed on advertising billboards in busy transportation hubs where everyone around

can see them. The campaign, which is a collaboration between Hong Kong Cleanup, Ecozine, and The Nature Conservancy, takes advantage of Chinese cultural ideas around shame. Given the cultural pressure not to "lose face," the last thing anybody wants is to be embarrassed by seeing their image on one of these billboards. According to Hong Kong Cleanup, people living there throw more than 16,000 tons of rubbish - including an estimated 1,368,000 disposable plastic bottles and 1,000 tons of plastic bags - on the ground every day. That litter ends up being swept into sewage systems where it pollutes the Pearl River Delta and the South China Sea.

THE DEAD TREES AND FALLEN LEAVES NEAR CHERNOBYL AREN'T DECAYING

It's been nearly 30 years since the catastrophe at Chernobyl, and as the cleanup grinds on, the far-reaching effects continue to be documented. Birds with smaller brains, increasing spiders, decreasing butterflies, all these and more have been reported from the areas surrounding Chernobyl. One group you don't hear very much about are the decomposers - those bugs, microbes, fungi, and slime molds who nourish themselves by consuming the remains of dead organisms. Without these recyclers, carbon, nitrogen, and other elements essential to life would be locked in plant corpses. The effects of radioactive contamination on the decay of plant material remains unknown... until now. Scientists examining the forests around Chernobyl have found that radioactive contamination has reduced the rate of litter mass loss. The dead leaves on the forest floor. along with the dead pine trees in the infamous Red Forest, don't seem to be decaying -- even a couple decades after the incident.

EDUCATION OUTLOOK Channel anxiety into positive

energy (By Billy Ryle)



As the exams draw near, candidates become anxious about their performance. A level of anxiety is normal and focusses the mind on the task ahead. Almost all exam candidates, irrespective of how laid back they

appear, feel nervous. It's the body's way of dealing with a stressful experience. How you deal with this nervous energy is the critical issue. If you channel it in a positive direction it will give you the vitality to cope with the demands of the exam.

A positive mental attitude is a considerable aid around exam time. Have confidence in your ability to do well. Don't be discouraged by other students appearing to know more than you do. Aim to do perform to your own capability not to compete with others. Make positive statements about yourself. Banish all negative thoughts from your mind. Think well of yourself and of your readiness to achieve success. Your best effort is more important than your ultimate performance in the exam. Determine to do your best, no more, no less.

Success is a product of positive thinking. By motivating yourself towards your goals, you will redouble your effort and improve your performance. Have items in your study environment to spur you on. Place a statement of your objectives, such as your target grades, in a conspicuous place. An occasional glance in their direction will encourage you.

Exam stress becomes newsworthy every year because of the assessment system used in the state exams. For the most part these exams are terminally assessed. In effect, two years of work is examined by means of written papers in June. Little credit is given to the candidate for consistent work over the two years. Continuous assessment is not utilised nor, with certain exceptions, is project work part of the exam structure. The major problem with the exam system is the increased level of stress it causes in some students around exam time. Despite all that is written about exam stress, students continue to show that they are excellent exam performers and use stress as a stimulant rather than an affliction.

The stress experienced by the majority of exam candidates is positive stress. It concentrates the mind wonderfully. You realise that the forthcoming exam is making increased demands of you. However, your application to study and revision provides you with the resources to meet these demands. Positive stress provides you with the motivation to prepare for the exam. It will sustain and stimulate this motivation until the exam is over. Properly controlled stress will activate hidden resources of energy and application in you. It's important to control the stress and channel it into positive energy.

It's only when you haven't the resources to meet the demands of the exam that distress or negative stress becomes an issue. Exam distress is a rare occurrence in young people and can easily be confused with normal exam anxiety. The present cohort of young people is highly skilled and well able to cope with the demands of the exam. Distress, when it does occur, is disruptive and may interfere with your performance if it isn't counteracted.


