



t was an amazing weekend in Killarney with the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle taking place on Saturday last and the 4th of July celebrations taking place on Monday.

The town rolled out the red carpet as they welcomed thousands to the annual charity cycle which was back on the road after a hiatus of three years, much to the delight of the cyclists and indeed the charities which will benefit greatly from the funds raised.

In all types of weather, cyclists began their 170KM in the early hours of Saturday morning with the first cyclists arriving back in Killarney before noon.

The raising of the American Flag took place at the Town Hall on Monday afternoon, just before the streets of Killarney were lined with thousands of people for yet another fantastic parade.

Floats, brass bands, Disney characters and some amazing American motors took a route through the town with MC's Brendan Fuller and his dad Mike entertaining the masses.

The festivities moved to Killarney House and Gardens where attendees were treated to some fantastic music before settling down to watch The Greatest Showman Movie.

The night finished off with a fireworks display ensuring that Killarney is back doing what it does best.... welcoming and entertaining both locals and visitors alike.

In his message to the congregation Bishop Ray Browne thanked all who already serve in our parishes, priests, deacons and laity. "Thanks to our religious-education teachers in Primary and Secondary schools. Thanks to our chaplains in schools, hospitals and in MTU, Tralee. It is good news that Fr Amos and Fr Vitalis, our two priests on loan from Kitale diocese in Kenya, will be with us for a further three years. Their joy in their faith is an inspiration to us all. Continue to pray for vocations and for our two seminarians that they will in time be priests among us".

This Summer's appointments are few. Still, they effect four Pastoral Areas, and it will take time for each to adjust. Sincere thanks to Fr Tom Leane P.P. 

#### THE LONG GRASS



tchy eyes, runny nose, sneezing, sound familiar? The hay fever has never been worse in Killarney. This column wonders if it has anything to do with the out of control verges for bees.

Pollen is fine in a garden, and trees shed it also, and I have nothing against bees. However in urban spaces where the grass is uncut there's an avalanche of the dust and stuff, and everyone gets showered in the small particles. So everyone is sneezing more, is my theory.

The current policy of trimming around the edges and leaving the docks, the nettles and the grasses to grow to seed is called "wilding". Kerry County Council, like other local authorities have adopted it with great enthusiasm.

It cuts down on the mowing and the chemicals (read cost saving!) and everywhere these days we have "the tonsure look".

Roundabouts have fine displays of weeds and "the long acre" runs for miles along the N22 to Farranfore.

But in Killarney, literally inside the wall, there is a national park running to 25,000 acres of wilderness. Several areas like Mission Road are now unbecomingly wild and unkempt looking.

This is far from the neat managed parkland which established this town as a tourist centre. And what self-respecting bee, I ask myself, is going to eschew a fine vast park and garden on the other side of the wall on Mission Road for poor feed on the thin margins? And risk being smothered in petrol fumes?

I think Killarney bees and insects are wiser than that. Elsewhere in this column we saw how councillors made a brave effort this week against the all too common policy in this country of " one size fits all" in their bid to restrict more wind turbines. Killarney town, with its magnificent title as the town with the largest town park in the world, could do without this "wild effort" at keeping the bees on the margins!

#### GOOD HOME MADE VALUE: THE GROWING IMPORTANCE OF THE DAY TRIP IN TOURISM



Great value to be had at Lord Brandon's Cottage

We are coming down with talk about price gouging and over charging. But I had a pleasant few surprises last week in Kenmare and indeed Lord Brandon's Cottage in terms of value and quality.

I had some of the finest fish and chips I ever had in a pub called PF McCarthys on Main Street, Kenmare for Euro 14.50. Service was top class and plenty of lightly battered fish. On a separate work day, there was exquisite French onion soup to be had in the Brew House, complete with homemade health bread for just over Euro 5.00.

And then there was Brandon's Cottage in Gearhameen on after a long walk through the oakwoods: a fresh to order sandwich and homemade apple pie and delicious tea and all similarly reasonable.

It was reassuring to see how away from the madding airwaves not every place is ambushing the tourist and there is old style charm and quality still to be had. The trip to Brandon's, and charming Kenmare, will be repeated. By the way in both places it was mostly day trippers including a party from Sardinia in the Gap who are now living in Cork. The old style day trip from Cork will only get more popular to Kenmare and Killarney with the opening of the new road.

This is just as well as there is less accommodation than ever as several more hotels and guesthouses are likely to accommodate refugees in Kerry, closing altogether to tourists. Killarney town has rapidly become one of the most significant refugee centres in the whole country, according to recent statistics. This situation is unlikely to change anytime soon and with the global refugee crisis, not just war in the Ukraine, Killarney's new role can be built up and bring opportunity for good permanent employment, not just seasonal jobs.

But where tourism is concerned, new hotels and accommodation are highly unlikely so Killarney will become more and more dependent on the day tripper.

But I see no reference to the emerging importance of the day trip in the five year tourism plans or in the long debates in the course of preparing the 2022-2028 county plan.

### WIND AHOY!



Since the first stark white turbines were raised in the Stack's mountains in 1997, the landscape in north and east Kerry and the views from Killarney along the Cork border have undergone a dramatic change.

At 360 plus and counting, we have the highest number of turbines in the whole country now. But Kerry has enough and councillors are standing up, bravely in my view, against what they called "the one size fits all" Dublin driven policy for wind.

Their unanimous stance to "omit rather than permit" areas for wind development is in "total breach of national and regional policy," management warn.

The new word is "cumulative", introduced in the plan and repeated by Fionnán Fitzgerald, councillor in neighbouring Castelisland.

Turbines which had been put "one after another across the county" had resulted in "a cumulative effect", he said.

"Future generations will not thank us for scarring our county. Once they are up, once we put a roadway through bog, we have upset that area," he said.

The prospect of rusting and disintegrating turbines was also raised.

Several councillors including Donal Grady questioned who was benefitting and why there was no reduction in electricity bills for Kerry people . Others remarked how "the tourism capital of the country" was now saturated.

There was "not a penny" off the electricity bills, despite the suffering people near the turbines had to endure, Cllr Marie Moloney said. Solar power was much more acceptable and a number of planning applications on solar were coming on stream, she revealed.

"We are elected to represent the people and fight their battles for them," she added.

The planning regulator was likely now to ask the minister to give a direction, Ms Murrell said. It will be interesting so see how this pans out – but the most salient point is how the councillors have stood together after long consideration.

## Call To Walk In Memory Of Damien

The people of Keel and the wider community are set to remember the late Damien Foley with a memorial walk on Sunday, July 10. Beginning at Keel GAA grounds at 10am, Damien's family, friends and neighbours will walk the Keel Loop Walk to mark what would have been the occasion of his 40th birthday. Damien passed away from cystic fibrosis in July 1999 just a few days before his 17th birthday. Damien was a much loved member of the community of Keel and was an avid sports fan, with the Kerry team and Aston Villa being his particular favourites.

Damien attended Castledrum National School and Presentation Secondary School, Milltown, and is fondly remembered by his former school mates as a popular, funny and caring friend. Damien was also a much valued member of Keel underage football teams, with whom he wore the white jersey with immense pride.

Damien's family and friends are asking people to come out and walk all, or even part of, the route with them on Sunday the 10th. ## 1,065 EXTRA CAO COLLEGE PLACES

#### AND FURTHER APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

By Billy Ryle

Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris, has announced that an extra 1,056 college places will be offered through the CAO for the 2022/2023 academic year in targeted skills areas. All of these additional places will be permanently added to the system. Some examples of courses receiving extra places this year include IT, architecture and construction, nursing, medicine, engineering, education and welfare. At Post Leaving Cert (PLC) level, the Minister has abolished the €200 course levy which was introduced a few years ago.

The development of an additional 16 apprenticeship will programmes also commence this year. The 16 new apprenticeships are Farm Management, Advanced Quantity Surveyor, Civil Engineering (Levels 6 & 7), Cybersecurity Practitioner, Farm Technician, Executive Chef, Horticulture, International Financial Services Advanced Specialist, Manufacturing Data Integration Engineer, Precision Machinist & Quality Control, Robotics & Automation, Roofing & Cladding, Stud Farming Assistant Management, Software Solutions Architect, Sports Turf Management Minister Harris' Department continues to introduce new apprenticeship programmes, such as those in bar managing and wind turbine maintenance which were launched last March. The financial incentives on offer to employers to take on apprentices, particularly female apprentices, has also been increased.

A key objective of the 'Action Plan for Apprenticeship 2021-2025' is to ensure that there will be an adequate number of apprenticeships to meet Ireland's skills and human capital requirements by delivering 10,000 apprenticeship places per annum by 2025. Apprenticeship is a demand-led, employer driven training system. As such, there are no limits on the number of places which can be provided, and no limit on the

apprenticeships which may be developed.

In 2021, a record 8,607 new apprentices were registered in the apprenticeship system. This was an increase of nearly 40% on the 2019 figure and was partly due to the 'Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme,' which was introduced in July 2020 to ensure that apprenticeship played a key part in supporting economic recovery following COVID-19. It has now been replaced by a new payment, the 'Employer Grant Scheme,' which means that, for the first time, all apprenticeship programmes receive ongoing financial support.

On 14th April, the new gender-based bursary for apprenticeship employers was announced. The bursary, which is worth €2,666, is available to employers who employ apprentices on any national apprenticeship programme with greater than 80% representation of a single gender. It is being implemented with effect from 1st January 2022, and covers all new apprentice registrations from that date on eligible national apprenticeship programmes. This year, for the first ever time. the CAO 2022 application system included information on apprenticeship options, with a link to www. apprenticeships.ie . There have been over 30,000 visits to the apprenticeship website directly from CAO/options page since the facility opened in November 2021.

#### **RESULTS**

Meanwhile, the post exam timeline is beginning to take shape with the announcement from the State Examinations Commission (SEC) that the Leaving Cert results will be available on Friday, 2nd September. Results will be issued to candidates through the Candidate Self Service Portal (CSSP) at www.examinations.ie and www.gov.ie/leavingcertificate. The date is in line with 2021, when candidates received their Leaving Cert results on Friday, 3rd September, three weeks later than usual.

#### **CAO OFFERS**

The Central Applications Office (CAO) has also announced that Round One offers for school leaving applicants will be issued on Thursday, 8th September. Round Two offers will follow on 19th September. The updated schedule, including Round A and Round O offers for other categories of applicants, is published on the CAO website. The 2022 offers season will commence on 7th July with the issue of Round A offers for mature applicants, mature nursing/ midwifery applicants, and deferred applicants. Offers are also issued to some applicants who have completed an access course, or those who may be required to make visa arrangements. Round 0 offers will issue on 5th August to graduate entry medicine applicants, additional mature applicants, deferred and Access applicants, and applicants presenting QQI FET/ FETAC qualifications for consideration for entry to courses with a quota for QQI FET applicants.

### THIS WEEK IS WORLD GLAUCOMA WEEK WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests. Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

#### **SYMPTOMS**

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your



central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open-angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

#### **TREATMENT**

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with openangle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.





### FIRIES LAUNCH BIG DROP FUNDRAISER

WITH PRIZES WORTH €25,000

Fires Football, Hurling & Ladies Football club has launched an innovative fundraising drive to develop their new playing facilities in Fires village while also raising funds for the Irish Community Air Ambulance Service and the vital work they provide throughout the country.

takes a look at all things sport...



**KERRY V DUBLIN** All Ireland Semi-Final, Croke Park, Sunday July 10th, 3.30pm

There is more iconic sporting fixture in Ireland than the green and gold of Kerry taking the sod of Croke Park against the sky-blue of Dublin. The history goes all the way back before Independence, all the way back to the roots of the game and the roots of the nation. Back to the O'Gorman twins and big Paddy Casey, one of many Dubliners with Kerry roots - he would have wished his Lispole nephews all the best in the green and gold, but he'd have had a special grá for his grandnephew Brian Mullins lifting an All Ireland medal for Dublin the same as he did himself

Dublin footballers were like a foreign team in a homely city for the first half of the past century, as countrymen brought the game into the city. Until the early '50s, native Dubliners wearing the geansaí were rare enough. It was Vincents, and their teak tough dual star forward Kevin Heffernan, who really lit a flame that has never dimmed since. The first really famous clash between Kerry and Dublin was in 1955 - with the likes of Mick O'Dwyer and Mick O'Connell looking on as young men, Kerry's traditional kicking style overcame the revolutionary flair of Dublin - whisper it, Heffernan was carrying a knock that curtailed his roving style and he had to give second best to Ned Roche, who had transferred back to his native Kerry from Tipperary - the Cronin brothers of Cork came back around the same time and made a big difference.

By the early seventies, Kerry and Offaly were the big two - fantastic teams who have been unfairly overshadowed by what came after. O'Connell was in his prime, but so was the great Willie Bryan. Meath were hot on their heels. Dublin? Dublin were almost an afterthought. They were flatlining.

Mick O'Dwyer took over as manager from Johnny Culloty - a young Cork team were beating us by comfortable margins, and National League medals are cheap currency in Kerry when that happens. Dublin had installed Heffernan as manager, with Redmond and Colfer behind him and John Gray as County Chairman giving him carte blanche (the first GAA 'manager' as opposed to mere 'trainer'). They exploded onto the scene, going from a narrow one point win in the first round to a sweeping All Ireland triumph, surprising red hot favourites Cork along the way. That great Dublin team never looked back - but they didn't see us coming either.

The roots laid down by Johnny were strong, and he had introduced talented youngsters like Pat Spillane and Paidí Ó Sé (plain Paudie O'Shea on those teamsheets, the teanga duchais was not respected in the years after the economic revolution of the sixties) to the team. Mick O'Dwyer brought a stiff sweeping brush with him and cleared the decks. Many felt that the likes of Eamonn and Paud O'Donoghue had plenty of good football left in them, but O'Dwyer could see the likes of Mickey Ned, Deenihan, big Tim Kennelly, and talented young soccer players Jack O'Shea and Mikey Sheehy on the horizon. Ironically, O'Dwyer's revolution was based on fresh blood, whereas Heffernan's greatest move was bringing back the likes of Hanahoe and especially Jimmy Keaveney, who kicked 1-36 along the way to their first All Ireland in a generation. By 1975 they were unbackable favourites for the Sam Maguire. O'Dwyer's team of bachelors came in under the radar (a Dublin-centric media were not paying proper attention, these young Kerry players were raw but well-proven).

Both Heffernan and O'Dwyer have always claimed not to have wanted the job of manager. Frankly, it's not remotely believable - O'Dwyer had actually been elected as a selector even before he had finished playing himself, had taken the U21s, and had actually taken over training Kerry for a while. Heffernan has a stronger case, but it was well-known that Vincents were aggrieved at the Dublin manager coming from a rival club (incidentally, the club clashes between Vincents and Eugene McGee's UCD were the stuff of legend - McGee had been part of a three man panel who had actually proposed his great rival for the Dublin job before he took on Offaly himself) and he had managed Dublin previously. No, both were obvious candidates, and both clearly had an idea of the budding talent available.

They were probably the two greatest teams in gaelic history to that point. Certainly, at a time when soccer was losing domestic popularity in droves (national mismanagement and especially the availability of English soccer on tv, where all of Ireland's top players played) and Ireland's rugby team were struggling against a Welsh team that would themselves become legendary, Dublin embraced this modern, daring, entertaining team. Flags and scarves became commonplace, Hill 16 became almost an urban myth of insularity (unfairly - the hill is the best place to watch a Dublin game, their supporters are fabulously witty but never hostile). Gaelic football, always the most popular sport on this island, hit new heights, thanks that Dublin team. was

And their rivals. O'Dwyer conductor а of maestros those players were always going to win an All Ireland, but it took magic by O'Dwyer to keep them challenging for a decade. The contests between the two teams acquired

element that captivated the

nation. Both teams drove each other to new heights. I will say that Cork were genuinely unlucky: that Cork team was one of the greatest itself, but simply came up against unstoppable forces and immoveable objects - I could argue the same about the Mayo team of recent years. Spare me any piseoga about curses; scoreboards don't care.

Dublin were always there or thereabouts afterwards, but 1983, when Dublin's 'twelve apostles' (or 'dirty dozen', some would say, after they had three men sent off) beat Galway was their last taste of glory until 1995. They had come close in 1991, after that famous four game saga against Meath that snatched all the headlines back of Jack Charlton's Irish team (poor oul' Martin O'Neill or Stephen Kenny could only dream of such talent, not least because English clubs have started recruiting globally rather than from the 'home' nations). Kerry had been quietly gathering titles after Dublin had faded, but were in the middle of a lull period themselves (no other county would consider 11 years between '86 and '97 a 'famine') and actually lost the All Ireland that year to Down. Northern teams were rising previously, the Ulster championship had been a gruelling marathon on itself.

Dublin and Kerry always had the mythos behind it, but in fact the two counties didn't meet much in championship in those years, and the League was not taken anything like as seriously as it is now. Kerry were one of the top teams still, but had plenty of struggles against Cork and a new and innovative Tyrone team who eschewed the traditional catch and kick. It worked, and let us face a truth that would have been unpalatable back then; we have happily adopted the methods since.

Gilroy laid the foundation, with that old master Mickey Whelan quietly helping to steer the ship. Jim Gavin was the master and a genuine



rival with O'Dwyer for greatest manager of all time - I would still just about give the nod to the Waterville man, having done it with many different teams, but that's not to take away from Gavin, an unassuming genius. I still remember travelling up by train for the 2009 quarter-final, and I honestly was going to say a proper farewell to a great Kerry team who were clearly on the wane, after barely beaten Sligo and struggled against Antrim in the back door. Shows what I know. That was the day that 'startled earwigs' entered the lexicon. It was a demolition as Kerry's footballers absolutely blitzed a hapless Dublin. We ended up as lords and masters of all we surveyed...

And then fate's pendulum swung once more. Dublin took their beating and took their lessons. I still feel that Kerry were slightly the better team in 2011, but left the door slightly ajar, and Stephen Cluxton coolly kicked a winner. We haven't beaten them when the chips are down ever since. I honestly think that when Mick O'Connell and Sean Purcell's names are mentioned as the all-time greatest, Cluxton's should be in that conversation (I'd include Larry Stanley of Kildare and Tommy Murphy of Laois as well, by the way).

Ye won't like me saying it, but Kerry supporters developed a habit I didn't like of hunting for excuses after defeats to Dublin. While the GAA did put a lot of money into promoting the game in Dublin (and too much in comparison to other Leinster counties), I don't believe that those Dubliners had anything that Kerry footballers didn't – we never denied our senior team much, and it's facetious to pretend that we did. As for the nonsense about referees...ah, lads. I was at all of those games, and Dublin outplayed us fair and square – in fact, I felt that it was a weakness of theirs that Kerry and Mayo were able to stay in touch with them for seventy minutes, given that Dublin were a good bit sharper in general play. There was never a referee that beat us yet; Dublin won those All Irelands fair and square. The Brogans, Flynn, McMahon....be fair about it. Those were great players, and that Dublin team brought an intensity and hunger that has to come from within. We were never far away, but we were definitely second best to them on

Mayo, probably their greatest rivals of the recent era, despite our All Ireland triumph in 2014 (Donegal caught Dublin on the hop a bit, I suspect), finally knocked Dublin off their pedestal last year after possibly the most dramatic turnaround in GAA history. Remember that Dublin had lads like Kilkenny and Fenton, who had multiple All Irelands without ever losing a championship game (I refuse to count the warm-up sessions called the 'O'Byrne Cup'). And so we move to the latest chapter in an unfolding saga that encapsulates something more than mere sport.

#### MATCH PREVIEW

I'll be honest about it; I have no real idea. There isn't a real form book as far as I am concerned for these two teams.

Kerry were flying after last year's National League, but ran into an immobile Tyrone team who basically absorbed Kerry's runners into a resolute half back line and got a couple of goals that had a smidgin of luck, but also a defensive openness about them. I've never really taken the National League as a true indicator of championship form. I know that you have a lot of times where the League and Championship winners doubled up, but that's usually when a team (usually Kerry or Dublin) are ahead of their peers and, crucially, have greater panel

Certainly, last year's League was deceptive, and a lot of Kerry supporters got a bit of a land when Tyrone proved to be a totally different kettle of fish to the team that had coughed up six goals to us in the League semi-final. I was at that game too, and Tyrone's full back line was non-existent. I don't care what anyone says; they were throwing no handle with the hatchet that day, and a lot of those goals were handed up far too easily (Gavin White's remains one of the best I have ever seen).

An important point about that day. Tyrone's full back line were very much marked absent. Now, remember all the talk about Dublin's demise after their relegation from Division One this year? Take a look at a lot of the scores they conceded, starting with that cracking goal by Rian O'Neill (a lock as an All Star and probably the consistently best player I have seen this year) against Armagh in the opening round. He simply gathered long ball over the heads of the Dublin defence and slotted it home. Dublin were doing that all through the National League, defending precariously one on one and paying the price. I always thought Bugler was a good footballer, but I had serious doubts about Lee Gannon. To be fair, once they slotted

proper cover into place, he has definitely looked the real deal, but the point I am making is that no team will defend like that in championship. Sure, Dublin were poor during the League and it piled pressure on Dessie Farrell. It was always going to be a tough task to take the mantle surrendered by Jim Gavin (remember how tough Ogie Moran got it after taking over from O'Dwyer, with a Kerry team that needed a rapid infusion of new blood?) and Dessie hasnt done himself any favours. Losing Cluxton's presence was a huge body blow - Comerford is actually a good keeper, just not on a par with the greatest of all time.

We came a cropper against Cork in 2020, but that was one of those anomalous days where everything that could go wrong did, and Kerry should still have beaten them. A wet, miserable, slick day will always suit the underdogs, I didn't feel that we had enough emphasis on attack (Paul Geaney was playing most of his football in the half forward line - that was never his game), and we ran out of steam late on. We were caught by a sucker goal - that's not begrudging Cork, who had a good game plan that again included absorbing our speedy ballcarriers into a wall of muscle.

The truth is that I, you, and everyone else knew full well who was going to win Munster this year, and we did so without ever having to hit top gear. Cork stayed with us for longer than expected (Powter at corner back has been a revelation, and they have unearthed some good shooters to supplement Brian Hurley, but they never looked like winning and faded late on. Cork had a nightmare League and relied on a huge slice of luck to beat Offaly in their final game and avoid the Taillteann Cup. They are improving fast, though, and we need a strong Cork to sharpen our edge.

As for the Munster Final? I attended it in Killarney; I'm not sure that I would have travelled to the Gaelic Grounds for such a predictable outcome. That game did nothing for either team. About the only real lesson from it was a strong reminder that Killian Spillane is still one of the deadliest predators around -Killian and Tony Brosnan would be starting on virtually any other inter-county team. No, the Munster Championship is a write-off, and that does us no favours. I remember Dublin around the millennium, picking up Leinster titles for fun but lacking battle hardness afterwards; I fear that we are in a similar position now. The back door certainly makes a difference, and

with weaker teams in the Taillteann Cup next year and more games in the Championship, that won't be a problem - you'll need strong benches though, with little time for rest or recovery. I'm strongly in favour of the split season (the stop/start nature for clubs was patently ridiculous), but you are looking at a very long playing season for the top players.

As for what's popularly referred as the Leinster 'Championship', rather than the annual coronation that it has become, that's no indicator of Dublin's form either. 17 out of the last 18 titles. Put it this way; Agatha Christie wasn't going to be writing that book!

Dublin are not remotely as bad as the National League made them seem. They aren't as good as the Leinster Championship would indicate, either. Much has been made of the return of James McCarthy and Con O'Callaghan to action - two great players, but I'm not so sure that the timing isn't more coincidence than anything else. The likes of Kilkenny and Fenton didn't set the world alight during the league, but I suspect that they were concentrating on a slow build training programme rather than opening full throttle or needing O'Callaghan as a linchpin.

No disrespect to Cork, but that was never going to be a real test for Dublin - I think they would have been better off meeting anyone but Cork or Clare. They are coming in cold into a Croke Park furnace.

We did at least get a decent contest from Mayo. I've heard a few grumbles since about Kerry's performance. Apparently it wasn't convincing. More nonsense. Come off it. Beating Mayo by eight points? I'd have snapped your hand off for that. No, we weren't perfect, but we were much the better team, and that's with David clearly carrying an injury from early on. The form of David Moran on his return was a huge plus. An awful lot of people have been very quick to write off David Moran. Do yourself a favour - google his age. David is not an old player by any means, and I actually think the break from playing after that injury in last year's County Final (it effectively killed that game as a contest, especially with the threat of Tommy Walsh having to come out to the middle) means that David is coming in fresh and primed.

There's loads of speculation about injuries on both sides. I have no inside information (frankly, I don't seek any - I'm a supporter, not any kind of expert) but I'd be fairly sure that both sides will be at full strength. I don't think Jack O'Connor or Dessie Farrell are men to waste time and energy on playing media games, they have enough to be doing.

#### **KERRY DEFENCE V DUBLIN ATTACK**

I think this is where we win or lose it. If we cough up goal opportunities to Dublin, we will be sunk fast. I expect both sides to score a goal, their forwards are simply too good not to, but only the winners will score two. Kerry had a weakness for conceding soft goals in recent years - Cork 2020 and Tyrone last year being obvious examples - but Tyrone native Paddy Tally does appear to have tightened that ship. Shane Ryan was always a great shot-stopper, but I thought he did have issues under the high ball early on. He has become a lot more commanding - I'm not bothered about one blip against Mayo. Dean Rock has played full forward of late for Dublin, but I expect him to revert back to the corner and O'Callaghan to take that berth. To be honest, I don't fear Rock too much from open play, despite his brilliance as a free-taker. O'Callaghan is a different proposition - hugely skillful, but also strong as a tank. Jason Foley will have his hands full O'Callaghan is also superb at a basketballtype screen to open the door for others. Jason is superbly comfortable under the high ball these days, but Dublin will play the ball in front of O'Callaghan - they are precision passers and ruthlessly strict on shot selection. They score a lot of 'easy' points – it's their movement that makes those opportunities look so 'easy'. I don't think Kerry can afford to drop a player in front of O'Callaghan without conceding too much space elsewhere. Tom O'Sullivan will most likely be on Cormac Costello – that one will be worth the price of admission on its own. Dublin will be expecting forays from Tom - I expect that Costello will stay and another player will be designated to pick up Tom's runs.

I expect Paddy Small to go out to the half forward line, with Niall Scully most likely to lose out. Small isn't a big scorer, but he's terrific in open play, a real hunter/gatherer. That'll suit Gavin White just fine with room to move, I expect the Kerryman to shade that duel (in as much as any game has individual duels these days - it's more about the synchronicity of the collective). Brian Howard has been outstanding for Dublin ever since he appeared on the scene, but I wonder will he play on the wing and Ciarán Kilkenny go on the forty. Kilkenny is the main playmaker for Dublin, in my opinion, and he is clever enough to draw Tadhq Morley out and create space. Tadhg has been understated brilliance for Kerry all year and the fulcrum of our defence. Kerry teams at all grades had a real problem with opposition players able to simply run through our centre for goals - we had bodies in place, but they were bypassed too easily. Tadhq, like Liam Flaherty back in the day, has become an obstacle that slows up attacks and let's his fellow defenders consolidate. Howard is a great player in his own right, but Kilkenny has incredible vision and can open play' If he gets time on the ball, goodnight. Whoever is on him, be it Tadhg or Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, will need help.

Dublin made hay in previous times by targeting our right wing. Paul Murphy and Gavin Crowley are outstanding footballers - Paul in particular was probably Kerry's best player the last time we won an All Ireland, but both have slipped down the pecking order. Both Dan O'Donoghue and Mike Breen looked like nailed on starters but injuries opened the door for Graham O'Sullivan and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch. Both had to be patient awaiting their chances, and both have seized them with both hands. I don't expect Dublin to target that wing as much this time around, but they are welcome to try. In fact, I think Seán Bugler might be tracking Brian ó Beaglaíoch as much as hunting his own score. Mind you, I like the cut of Bugler, rock solid and very selfless. He's one of those players, a bit like Graham himself, who isn't going to be the main headliner but will be consistently dependable.

#### **MIDFIELD**

Jack Barry and Diarmuid O'Connor have been a rock solid partnership all year. Even so, one of them is losing out on midfield, because there is no question about David Moran's berth. Kerry's longest established player should have won an All Star last year and if he repeats his showing against mayo, he could well be in line for one this year. The question is who partners him. Personally, I'd give the nod to Jack Barry, who has always done well against Dublin and Brian Fenton in particular. However, I'd be putting Diarmuid at number 10 and Adrian Spillane at 12. Frankly, I want physical strength against Dublin. Dara Moynihan and Stephen O'Brien are big sacrifices to make, especially Stephen O'Brien – he was our main tin-opener against Mayo early on, and that pass to David for the goal was just sumptuous. Dara Moynihan is an incredible worker and a ferocious tackler that puts teams on the back foot, but I think we need big bodies in the engine room of midfield for this game. Joe O'Connor was desperately unlucky to get injured during the National League, robbing him of a real chance to stake a starting place, and Greg Horan (a player I always rated county class) has only had brief cameos. We'll need one if not both late in the game – nowadays you definitely need to finish as strongly as you start.

Fenton needs no introduction, even if he didn't have Spa roots. He ticks every single box as a midfielder. High fielder, great kicker with both feet, powerful engine, physically durable and fearless. A regular scorer as well. For me it used to be a weakness in Jack Barry's game - he'd make a great fetch, break the gameline.... and then look around for options. He has developed hugely though, now he either shoots for the score or lays it off much faster, before the defence can re-adjust, and it does a lot more damage. Fenton's burst of pace are deadly though - that's where we need Tadhq in a relatively free role to say "this far, and no further". Tom Lahiff is an old style midfielder, a big man with glue on his hands and tireless energy. But I'd put David Moran against Him any day and fancy the Kerryman to win it.

#### **KERRY ATTACK VERSUS DUBLIN DEFENCE**

I've sacrificed a fair amount of attack to bolster our middle, but I'd still give Kerry the edge here. Diarmuid is almost always good for a few points, and Adrian Spillane has developed a knack of picking off a couple as well - his main focus is the trenches in midfield, of course. I repeat, Dublin are physically very strong and will be trying to impose themselves, Kerry don't actually have that many big men.

On paper it looks like Johnny Cooper to take up Seán O'Shea. No way can I see that happening - Cooper is a tenacious man-marker, but he tends to concede too many fouls. If that match-up happens, I'd be telling Seán to run at him every time. However, I expect that James

McCarthy will slot back into centre back, and to me that would be another crucial duel. I've gone on record as saying that I rate James McCarthy second only to Donegal's Michael Murphy as a footballer in the past decade. Seán is up there as well, though - there's a reason that he was last year's championship top scorer. He hasn't burst the scoring charts this year, but I actually take that as a good sign – Kerry have a deeper spread of scorers, as evidenced against Mayo. Cooper will be back in the full back line, minding the house.

Of course Dublin will have a plan for David Clifford. For any team playing Kerry, the proverbial elephant in the room is very obvious. But knowing what you have to do and being able to do it are two different things, and David has cheerfully gobbled up every challenge set in front of him so far. He really is a phenomenon. He's as skillful as Colm Cooper or Peter Canavan, and I do not say that lightly. He's also almost as big as both of them put together – if he gets his hands on a ball, you're not getting it off him. The general suspicion is that hurling full back Eoghan O'Donnell has been brought into the Dublin panel with David as the long term target – I'm a bit sceptical. He's a big man, but hurling is very, very different to football in terms of man-marking (it's physical position in football, fast first touch in hurling) and I see O'Donnell as a last resort rather than a starting option. Murchan is Dublin's equivalent of Tom O'Sullivan in terms of raids forward (as we know to our cost!) but he isn't anywhere near as sticky as the Dingle man - I expect him to follow Paudie Clifford out the field - Paudie operates best as a playmaker around the forty, with a two man full forward line of Geaney and David Clifford, while Seán O'Shea switches between the lines. I'd have Mick Fitzsimmons on David, with cover outside. Fitzsimmons is positionally aware enough to break the ball away and look to others to mop it up. I could see Cooper taking on Paul Geaney. If Kerry get the upper hand around the middle and get good ball in, Paul will do a lot of damage. Restored to his natural berth, he has been quietly picking off a lot of scores. I'd be hoping that we have the opportunity to bring the likes of Killain Spillane, Tony Brosnan, and Micheál Burns on reasonably early in the second half. If Dublin are chasing the game, that will create space and these are forwards who can slice you open if they get room - all three are very direct, refreshingly so in the modern game of percentages and calculations.

I'll be a nervous wreck on the day itself. I'm worried. It might be the bit of paranoia in me - I'll make no bones about fearing the ability of this Dublin team as I feared the Meath team of the late eighties, and they will feel that their collapse against Mayo last year is a debt owed an answer. I'll very reluctantly give them the nod by two points, and desperately hope that I am wrong. We certainly won't know until the final quarter; this one will be a gripping contest all through. I do feel that this Kerry team just need to win one All Ireland - if they can get one, more will follow. Like Dublin back in 2011, it's winning that first one that's the hardest. Ciarraí abú!

## KILCUMMIN SEWERAGE SCHEME ONE STEP CLOSER AS COFFEY **CONSTRUCTION ARE APPOINTED CONTRACTORS**



here was more positive news today for the community of Kilcummin as Irish Water, working in partnership with Kerry County Council, announced Coffey Construction as the contractor for the Sewerage Scheme works that will commence in the coming months. When complete, the scheme will provide a new sewer collection system for Kilcummin village,

that will ensure wastewater from the village is treated appropriately. Once operational, the new sewerage scheme will connect into the sewer network in Killarney town, where it will be collected and transferred to Killarney wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) for appropriate treatment. Speaking about the works, David Shalloo, Wastewater Regional Delivery Lead with Irish Water, said, "The appointment of Coffey Construction illustrates our commitment to delivering this project for the community. All new infrastructure has been sized to accommodate future population growth and the project will enhance the local environment and provide a platform for social and economic development well into the future". The scheme will ensure compliance with wastewater discharge regulations. It will also improve water quality in the River Deenagh and Lough Leane and protect recreational waters for swimming, fishing, boating and sightseeing, as well as protecting the integrity of the local environment. The new wastewater infrastructure will enhance local amenities and provide a platform for social and economic development.

The new sewerage infrastructure to be constructed as part of this scheme will include a sewer network for Kilcummin village, a pumping station, and approximately 6 kms of sewers. The scheme will reduce the reliance on on-site systems such as septic tanks and package treatment plants. Works on the project are expected to commence late in 2022, with the entirety of the project due for completion in 2024.

## DECISION ON ADARE BYPASS DELAYED AGAIN

Adecision on the proposed bypass of Adare, that was initially expected by the end of May, has been delayed for a second time, has been strongly criticised by a Kerry County Councillor. The decision is now expected to be announced on August 15th. Councillor Michael Cahill had previously criticised the original delay at the beginning of January.

The proposed Adare Bypass is a particularly significant project for the county of Kerry, as it is one of the main entry/exit points for the Kingdom according to Fianna Councillor Michael Cahill.

"The transit of people and goods in and out of Kerry, is much restricted and delayed by poor traffic conditions at Adare and the proposed bypass would be a godsend. However, An Bórd Pleanála have once again postponed announcing their decision within the planning process" stated the Fianna Fáil man.

"The question must be asked if An Bórd Pleanála is equipped for this task? Is it properly resourced, is it sufficiently staffed? From the number of postponements experienced during the decision on The South Kerry Greenway, and subsequent legal challenges to it, is the correct



type of professional expertise available to An Bórd Pleanála" demanded Councillor Cahill.

"The likes of the Adare Bypass and the South Kerry Greenway are major public projects being progressed on behalf of our people. Taking ten and twenty years to complete them because of red tape and slow moving bureaucracy is absolutely unforgivable" stated Councillor Cahill. "It appears to me that An Bórd Pleanála is overdue a total shakeup in personnel and procedures and that legislation in this area requires to be brought up to date and streamlined. Personnel rights and Environmental concerns need to built in to a robust system which allows depositions from interested parties affected in the locality" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"All objections must be taken on board and dealt with in a timely manner and the decision made should then be final. We have been strung along for far too long and the time for progress is now" stated Councillor Cahill.

"These delays in respect of the Adare Bypass are having a catastrophic effect on business and tourism in County Kerry" added Councillor Cahill.

## LAUNE BRIDGE TO FEXCO

□ianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill recently received an update from Kerry County Council, following submission by him of a Notice of Motion, outlining the progress to date on the proposed road upgrade from Killorglin's Laune Bridge to the FEXCO Hub on the Killarney road. Councillor Cahill said "this busy section of the Ring of Kerry road is in an extremely poor and dangerous condition."

A Kerry County Council Senior Roads Engineer advised that 'It is expected that the application for statutory consent would be submitted to An Bord Pleanála (ABP) in early 2023. The statutory process with ABP can take a minimum of 6 months. Once the Board has made it's decision, preparation of tender documents and the tender process can commence.'

"Specialist Consultants have been appointed earlier this year for the design, structural and ecological work. Ecological surveys have already begun to provide four season data which will be required for planning" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Transport Infrastructure Ireland are due to release updated guidelines on the Active Travel Project, scheme which will apply here

and an additional non-intrusive topographical survey, which may require access to lands, will be carried out over the month of August and details of accommodation will be discussed with landowners in the Autumn" said Councillor Cahill. "This is a project that is a long time in the pipeline so to speak, and I am delighted to see the progress that has been made to date and am confident that Kerry County Council and TII will deliver a 2.6km road/walk/cycleway that everyone in Killorglin and Mid-Kerry will be proud of for many years to come" added the Rossbeigh based Councillor.






Welcome back dear student "for God speaks again and again though people do not recognise it" (Job 33:14 NLT). It takes time to recognise when God is speaking to us, and we must attune our ears to hear His voice (Romans 10:17). For instance when we hear a native Irish speaker from Donegal talking one must listen carefully to hear what they are saying because their way of speaking Irish differs from our accents in Munster. Hearing God is no different. We are living in a world that has captured people's hearts with sin and nonsense so much that obeying the Word of God seems like an alien notion to many. When the prophet Samuel was a young boy God visited with him and called his name. Samuel got up from his bed and went to Eli his guardian because he thought it was he who was calling. He came three times before Eli realised that it was God who was calling out to Samuel, so he coached Samuel to answer God the next time it happened. Sure enough the Lord called his name once more. This time Samuel was ready and he answered "...speak (Lord) for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10). Samuel went on to be used by God leading Israel for many years as judge and prophet with God even choosing him to anoint David as King. How? Because Samuel heard God's voice and yielded his life to Him.


Do you desire to hear what God is speaking to you? Well let me tell you that He already is! Only, if we don't know Him we miss it. Many people expect that if God were to speak to them it would be in a loud aristocratic voice. Elijah the prophet was at his lowest having just had a great victory over the idolatrous worship of the false god Baal in Israel which was set up by Queen Jezebel (1 Kings 19:12). The battle itself and the intimidation afterwards left him depressed, exhausted and suicidal. But God showed up and asked Elijah 'what are you doing here?' Elijah began to tell his story of woe but the Lord told him to go outside from where he was hiding and stand before God. So Elijah came out to hear God. A powerful wind stirred up suddenly and tore the mountain rocks in pieces – but God was not in that wind. Then after the wind, an earthquake but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake, there was a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire, there was the sound of a gentle whispering breeze. And there was God's voice in the gentle breeze whispering His instructions for Elijah to move forward.

We are no different friend. In order to advance and press ahead we must hear God's voice of instruction (Philippians 3:13-14). Jesus said ... "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand" (John 10:27-28). There is a place of complete peace and security in the secret place where we are forgiven and restored with renewed fresh vision for life and the fire of God fuelling us (Psalm 91:1-4; Psalm 61).
