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Killarney's great start to the new year

Strong showing from Killarney and Tralee in 2025 litter rankings

The latest litter survey by business group Irish Business Against Litter ((IBAL)) of shows Killarney has retained its Top Ten spot in the ranking of 40 towns and cities, in 7th position. Tralee, also clean, has improved to 16th. Sligo finished atop the IBAL table for the first time in a study which showed that city areas in particular cleaned up in 2025.

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

Another superb showing for Killarney with eight sites surveyed getting the top litter grade. These included Muckross Road and Cork Road Approaches, Beech Street, Main Street and Chapel Lane / Barry Lane – the latter is an excellent example of what can be achieved in a laneway environment, with the wall murals and

planter boxes. By far the most heavily littered site in Killarney was the JYSK Car Park – it would seem that the commercial bin area needs to be better managed at this site.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has said the achievement of the town retaining its place in the top 10 in the fiercely competitive Irish Business Against Litter League is a wonderful tonic at the start of the new year.

There has been a warm welcome for the fact that the town is once again deemed to be cleaner than European norms and it is in seventh place out of 40 towns and cities surveyed.

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated: "Another superb showing for Killarney with eight sites surveyed getting the top

litter grade." Chamber said it was particularly gratifying that the town centre streets – including Main Street – received the highest possible grade despite the huge footfall and the thousands of people passing through every day.

"Great credit is due to Killarney Municipal District Council and its dedicated outdoor crew who work with such dedication, passion and purpose to ensure the town is presented at its best at all times," said Chamber President Johnny McGuire.

"The council is certainly setting an example for us all to follow and, combined with the work of tidy towns volunteers, those spearheading the Killarney Looking Good project and others, it is only a matter of time before Killarney is back in the number one slot in the Business Against Litter League," he added.

The Chamber said fact that eight of the 10 local sites inspected received the top A grade and it is hoped that concerns raised regarding the JYSK car park and Rock Road will be addressed as a matter of priority.



THE REPORT:

Killarney ranked 7th out of 40 towns and cities surveyed and was assessed as being cleaner than European norms. This represented another superb performance for the town, with eight of the surveyed sites achieving the top litter grade. Among the top-performing locations were the Muckross Road and Cork Road approaches, Beech Street, Main Street, and Chapel Lane and Barry Lane. The latter was highlighted as an excellent example of what can be achieved in a laneway environment, enhanced by wall murals and well-maintained planter boxes. By contrast, the most heavily littered site surveyed in Killarney was the JYSK Car Park, where issues appeared to stem from poor management of the commercial bin area.

The Rock Road Approach received a Grade B+. The overall presentation of this route was very good, with wooden seating and colourful planting contributing positively to the general impression. However, the presence of food- and alcohol-related litter, along with cigarette butts – particularly around the bus stop and seating areas – prevented it from achieving the top grade. The Muckross Approach Road was awarded a Grade A, with no visible litter issues noted along

this key route into the town. All aspects of the area were found to be in good order.

The Deposit Return Scheme facility at Aldi also achieved a Grade A. This stand-alone facility was very well maintained and included a "Reject Items Only" receptacle, clear signage indicating video surveillance and no dumping, as well as a colourful notice advising the public to contact a staff member if assistance was required.

The JYSK Car Park was graded C and identified as the most heavily littered site surveyed. The issues extended beyond casual litter, with accumulations of food packaging and alcohol cans and bottles, particularly along the pathway parallel to the silver bollards and within areas of heavy leaf fall. An open commercial bin allowed litter, plastic and packaging to blow around the site. Plastic bags were also noted in nearby trees. The report suggested this should be an easy issue to address with improved management.

Killarney Bus Station received a Grade A. Pathways, seating and bicycle parking were all very well maintained, and there was a virtual absence of litter throughout the surveyed area. Main Street also achieved a Grade A. Positive features included high-quality paving, wooden

seating, attractive litter bins and bollards, planter boxes and planting around outdoor dining areas. Signage promoting Killarney as a single-use coffee cup free town was clearly displayed, outlining the reasons and how the initiative works. Apart from some cigarette butts, no other litter issues were noted.

Beech Street was awarded a Grade A. While this secondary shopping street does not feature the same level of streetscape enhancements as Main Street, it was found to be a clean and well-maintained environment.

Chapel Lane and Barry Lane also received a Grade A. These laneways were praised as an excellent example of effective laneway regeneration, with wall murals and large planter boxes placed centrally. Litter levels were described as excellent.

The Recycle Facility at the High Street Car Park achieved a Grade A. Although the recycling units were inaccessible at the time of the survey due to heavy flooding, the units themselves were freshly presented and the associated signage was clear and in very good condition.

The Cork Road Approach was awarded a Grade A. This busy route in and out of Killarney was found to be in good order, with no obvious litter issues observed.

CONTINUE TO CREATE A MORE INCLUSIVE AND WELCOMING ENVIRONMENT

Autism Friendly Killarney has launched a new six-part video series showcasing how the town's community, schools, event organisers and businesses are working together to create a more inclusive and welcoming environment for autistic people. Alongside the video series, Autism Friendly Killarney has also launched a new website, a central hub of information for Autistic people, their families and visitors to the town. The video series, available on Autism Friendly Killarney's Instagram and website, highlights simple yet powerful ways in which Killarney is adapting - from sensory-friendly environments and visual supports to sensory accommodations, welcoming assistance dogs, staff training and event modifications - demonstrating that small changes can make a big difference. It also features heartfelt insights from families who share how these initiatives have opened up new opportunities for family connection and community participation.

The newly launched website autismfriendlykillarney.com, brings together information on autism-friendly accommodation providers, restaurants, shops, healthcare services, events and activity providers across Killarney. It is designed to help autistic people and their families plan visits with confidence, knowing what supports and accommodations are available in advance.

Killarney's Autism Friendly Champions: local businesses and organisations that have completed autism awareness training with AsIAm, Ireland's leading autism charity, have made meaningful changes to better support people with autism and their families. In the video series, four of these champions - Portwest, Ponitails, Ross Castle Boat Tours and Hotel Killarney - showcase how they have adapted their businesses to be more autism-friendly such as offering sensory cubbies, neutral interior design and lighting, supplying sensory boxes, having dedicated autism friendly hours with reduced sensory experiences, offering step by step visual aids, etc.

Jessica O'Connor, Chair of Autism Friendly Killarney said, "We hope these videos along with our new website, will give confidence to people with autism and their families who live in or are visiting Killarney. We want them to know that they will be supported, understood, and welcomed here. These videos show that Killarney is really living the ethos of inclusivity and access for all. We are very grateful for the financial support provided by Kerry County Council through the Community Support Fund 2025 and to Killarney Chamber of Commerce for their continued support."

Tony Fleming from Ross Castle Boat Tours explains the changes they made to their boat trips to support people with autism. "We've made small changes that have had a big impact. Our boat is longer and wider for easier movement, and we have a neurodiverse box on board with earplugs and sunglasses. We also provide quiet and early-morning tours so guests can enjoy the lake at their own pace. Seeing the smiles at the end of the trip is what it's all about."

Two videos offer personal insights, both from the perspective of a young boy with autism and a parent of a child with autism. Luke, a student from St Oliver's National School, shares what makes him feel welcome and understood in his school and in the local town. While Deirdre Prendergast, a parent of a boy with autism, reflects on the positive impact that a town that embraces neurodiversity with kindness and empathy has on her family. She says, "It has made the world of difference to us as a family that so many events and businesses in Killarney are now autism-friendly. We are able to attend events that we would never have been able to before, such as the Christmas in Killarney parade. We were able to enjoy it together as there was a dedicated space with sensory items to keep him occupied and in case he had an overload. He loves cars and we were able to go to a special evening at the Rally of the Lakes this year where everyone understood what autism was and he was able to get into a car. Because of the autism-friendly initiatives at events, my other son can now enjoy events with all the family, not just him and one parent - we can now enjoy things together as a family and it makes our lives so much easier."

In February this year Killarney was awarded the Autism Friendly Town Award from AsIAm, just the third town in Ireland to receive this accolade. This is testament to the work of the voluntary autism-friendly group who have worked tirelessly to ensure that Killarney's festivals and public spaces are accessible and sensory-friendly and that local businesses are adapting the way they work to accommodate people with autism. This has included sensory friendly film screenings, group meet-ups for families with children with autism, sensory rooms in public buildings and awareness-raising days. Dedicated quiet and sensory areas have also been created at major community events including The St. Patrick's Day parade, the Christmas in Killarney parades, the Wander Wild Festival, the Rally of the Lakes, Killarney's Samhain Procession, BikeFest, Rewild, and the town's Sensory Friendly Walk and AbleFest Festival. These initiatives have made a profound

difference, helping families take part in the magic of Killarney's festivals, knowing there is space to rest, recharge, and feel safe. Kerry Airport Gears Up For A Big 2026 With 2025 On Course To Be Record-Breaking Year

KERRY Airport is gearing up for another year of growth in 2026 with passenger numbers in 2025 on course to exceed 430,000 for the first time.

The Spring/Summer schedule will be launched in January with increased frequency on routes to sun destinations in Spain and Portugal with Ryanair.com.

a challenge, with increased costs in wages, local authority rates, energy, and maintenance exerting pressure on our gross profit margin. We continue to monitor these areas rigorously to ensure optimal value for money. The new developments that will provide larger passenger facilities at Kerry Airport are welcomed and will be a strong driver in our conversations with airlines with our capacity to handle additional routes. We will be confident that the more comfortable surroundings will encourage increased passenger spend in our

Gift Shop, Catering facilities and Duty Free." Kerry Airport today contributes more than €18 million annually to the local economy and supports over 135 direct jobs – not to mention the countless others in tourism, transport, and service industries that depend upon our success.

Over the coming months to the end of March 2026, Kerry Airport will handle 59 flights per week from Dublin, London Stansted, London Luton, Manchester and Frankfurt Hahn.

SVP South West records over 3,000 calls for help in December, up sharply on last year

St Vincent de Paul (SVP) South-West has warned of a deepening winter crisis across Cork and Kerry after recording over 3,000 calls for help during December alone, a significant increase on the 2,100 calls received during the same period last year.

The charity says this represents one of the busiest Christmas periods on record, with families continuing to struggle under relentless cost-of-living pressures.

In November, SVP South-West Information Officers recorded 11,000 calls so far this year in Cork and 3,200 in Kerry, a level of need that had already exceeded previous years.

The charity has stressed that the true number of people seeking help is substantially higher, as many families and individuals directly contact local SVP volunteers seeking urgent support with food, energy costs and basic

living expenses.

SVP South-West said that many families paper over the cracks of debt in the run-up to Christmas, doing everything they can to ensure their children have gifts and a sense of normality.

However, the charity has warned that the real hardship is now emerging in January, as households face mounting bills, depleted savings and ongoing debt accumulated over the festive period.

With a cold snap forecast over the coming days, SVP South-West has warned that demand for fuel and heating assistance is expected to rise further, placing additional strain on already stretched services as families struggle to keep their homes warm.

SVP South-West has also stressed that all funds raised in Kerry go directly to individuals and families in Kerry.

DEER CULL: TIME TO TACKLE OUR SACRED COW

The number of deer taken out of the Killarney National Park in 2025 is underwhelming. 116 Reds and 276 Sika. This at a time when we have daily reports of accidents, some resulting in serious injuries and cars being written off.

There is no comeback because unlike farmers if their animals stray onto the roads, the NPWS refuses to take responsibility. It also refuses to fence the deer in.

This is despite the fact the national park is the repository of the deer.

The NPWS excuse is no one owns wild animals and deer are mobile and they can't be held responsible for where they roam.

40 years ago, deer were furtive. We rarely saw a deer other than during the rut when a few reds would come down from higher ground. Now the deer - sika and reds both - won't get out of the way and they are being treated by

the authorities like the scared cow is treated by the Hindus.


Councillor Brendan Cronin is calling again for the NPWS to take responsibility.

There is no census of deer, no one knows how many there are; they bred without restriction and the numbers were now out of control. He is again calling for "fencing, restriction and responsibility to be taken by the NPWS", Brendan said.

"Deer are a huge road traffic issue now in Kerry and are jumping out onto the bonnets of cars. They are in every direction, miles outside the National Park," Brendan said.

Yes, as the NPWS remind me, a deer management strategy, managed by Farm Relief Services, has been set up across the country. But it is very little, very late and won't be up and running properly for a while.

Meanwhile the impression increasingly is that Kerry is merely a playground for deer and day trippers with wild deer given priority over the local humans.

AN EMBASSY TO CHINA

An Taoiseach Micheal Martin is starting the New Year on a visit to China, as this small country on the edge of a beleaguered Europe tries to grapple with a new world order.

With China such a dominant player, it may be worth recalling how it was another Irishman who broke the first ground breaking official visit to China from the west, 230 years ago at a time when China was just as powerful. took place from June 1793 to January 1794.

There was an imbalance of trade at the time with Britain buying far more from China than the other way round. (Does anything really change and is most history mere repetition?)

Born in 1737 in Co. Antrim and educated in Kildare and Dublin, Macartney had risen in diplomatic circles from a colourful time at the Russian court and success in India. His official journey to China was huge and he was accompanied by painters, botanists, gardeners, architects, surgeons and mechanics.


It did not achieve its direct aims and there followed the opium war. But Macartney kept a journal and the visit was widely documented and the illustrations and ideas circulated. Indirectly, it led to a quiet revolution in architecture among other things.

Here in Killarney, the New Entrance cottage with its elaborate Chinese like roof and eaves at the New Entrance is straight out of the paintings from my

Folio book of the Macartney visit. Much like Micheal Martin's embassy this week, that of 1793 sought to lift trade restrictions and lessen tariffs.

But will it go anywhere near the visit in 2001 of Chinese Premier Zhu Rongji who flew into Farranfore to huge fanfare that September?

The Chinese leader was impressed with the dairy farms in north Kerry and the beauty of the Killarney National Park. A lavish 27,000 punt banquet was hosted for him by Brian Cowen at the Hotel Europe. Chinese tourism didn't exactly rocket but the dairy industry did. We have more cows now than ever before. And China has more milk. Who knows what exchanges Micheal's visit will bring back- a flock of Yaks perhaps?



SHUTTLE THE ICE?

This Christmas in Killarney was a wonderful experience. Credit is due to all the volunteers, council workers and business owners for the huge effort. But the traffic in Killarney is beyond the joke. Crucially, there is no progress on a shuttle service which was inserted into the local area plan by Councillor Marie Moloney with support from the other councilors.

The matter came up on Tuesday at the special meeting on the local area plan of the Killarney MD where councillors rightly zoned an area off the bypass for industrial use. We were told the landowner might be willing to accommodate a shuttle bus car park.

Shuttle is the only solution. The council needs to look at a shuttle for the popular ice rink. To my astonishment, I learned Killarney On Ice pays nothing for the car spaces it takes up on Beech Road for the vital shopping weeks running up to Christmas.. People had no place to park this year and worse, the town was clogged like never before.

I know of people who shopped in Killorglin, Castleisland, Tralee and Cork towns rather than face the Killarney traffic. "Kerry County Council facilitates the rink every year to enhance the Christmas in Killarney experience and encourage people to visit the town and shop locally. After every Christmas season, all arrangements for Christmas in Killarney are discussed and reviewed," a council spokesman said, confirming there was no charge.

There is little evidence the ice rink brought shoppers. But there is plenty of evidence it reduced car park spaces already in short supply.

We are plagued in this town and we deserve a medal to continue to support it. No shuttle and no car parking and no sensible traffic management.

In July we have to forgo the whole car park at Fair Hill for Bird's and in December we give up a large skelp of the Beech Road for the ice. The bazaar and the ice are wonderful enjoyable family friendly activities, don't get me wrong. But they don't need to be in the centre of town. The racecourse would be ideal for both.

Volunteers meet every Sunday and Tuesday, weather permitting, from 9.00am to 12.30pm, with a tea break at 11.00am. The meeting point is Dundag Car Park in Killarney National Park. Dromrower Wood can be accessed by taking the first left after entering the main Muckross House gate, driving to the end at Dundag Car Park, then staying left through the gate and walking towards the boathouse, keeping left where the volunteers can be seen and heard working.

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


A Calendar to Celebrate KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has released its annual Killarney National Park Calendar 2026, celebrating the park's biodiversity, restoration projects, woodlands, native flora and fauna, and the staff who maintain this UNESCO biosphere reserve. The calendar is available at Muckross Craft Shop for €5 and highlights the work carried out in 2025 by NPWS, Killarney National Park, Muckross House & Gardens, and local volunteers. Photography by Valerie O'Sullivan captures the park's stunning landscapes and wildlife.

Eamonn Meskell, Divisional Manager NPWS, said, "We are delighted to showcase the conservation and restoration work in Tomies Woodland. In 2025, significant progress was made clearing Rhododendron on Tomies Mountain using new mulching machinery-a real game-changer in the decades-long effort to restore native woodlands."

NPWS Conservation Ranger Padruig O'Sullivan added, "Our recent clearance in Cullinagh has revealed dry stone walls, potato drills, old farmsteads, and animal shelters, remnants of a self-sufficient community. The area is steeped in history, with links to the lost village of Cullinagh, the Royal Oak, and Innisfallen Island Monastery, founded in 631."

Other highlights in the calendar include the final year of the White-tailed Eagle reintroduction project, Ross Castle's new boating experience for visitors with limited mobility and neurodiverse needs, long-service awards, native woodlands, and some of the park's most-loved residents-'Winnie' the Pine Marten and 'Cyril' the squirrel-from the popular summer video series The Secret Life of Killarney National Park.



EXHIBITION SHOWCASES Nine Years of Artistic Exploration in Glenbeigh

An upcoming exhibition by artist Markus Ehrhard will open later this month at the exhibition space of the Department of Culture, Communications and Sport on New Road, Killarney.

Originally from Trier in Germany and now living in Glenbeigh, Ehrhard presents 9 Years in Glenbeigh, a body of work inspired by his long-term observations and findings on Rossbeigh Beach. The exhibition reflects nearly a decade of artistic engagement with the landscape, capturing the changing environment and its influence on the artist's practice.

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From Existing to Living: How One Decision Changed Everything

Anny McArthur Shares Her 6 Stone Weight Loss Story with Slimming World

There was a time when Anny's world had grown very small. Her health was failing, pain was constant, and her mobility was so limited that she relied on two crutches just to move around. She wasn't truly living-more merely existing-day by day, increasingly housebound, watching her morale slip away alongside her independence. Although she was losing some weight, it wasn't enough to halt the steady decline in her quality of life.

Walking into her first Slimming World group was one of the most frightening things Anny had ever done. She was terrified of being judged, of being mocked for what she felt she had "allowed" to happen to herself. Above all, she was afraid of failure-and of not being strong enough to face it.

It was her doctor who encouraged her to take that step. While pleased with the progress she had started to make on her own, her GP suggested Slimming World, telling her he had seen it change lives.

"I promised I would try. One phone call later-to Hayley-and my life quietly began to change," Anny recalls.

That first meeting is etched in her memory. She shuffled through the door, shaking, registered, and hid at the back of the room, head down, just listening. What she heard wasn't judgment-it was kindness. Encouragement. Practical advice. Support for those who were struggling. And most importantly, not a single hint of guilt or blame. She walked out of that room determined to give it everything she had.

The early weeks were challenging, but Anny was no longer alone-and that made all the difference. Group support became her anchor, especially during the weeks when her motivation wavered.

Slimming World taught Anny how to make food work for her, not against her: swapping

high-fat snacks for fruit, choosing lower-fat and wholegrain options, staying within her daily Syn allowance, and filling her plate with Free Foods-foods low in calories that don't need weighing or measuring. For the first time, she felt in control.

What surprised her most was the emotional impact. Living with weight issues often carries a heavy burden of guilt. In the group, that guilt was replaced with understanding-and channeled into positive energy. There was no competition, no pressure to be "the best." Just a shared belief that every single member could reach their target, together.

Anny lives with a chronic condition that causes severe, debilitating pain and affects her mobility. The pain hasn't disappeared, but the way she copes with it has transformed. Even on bad days, she now has the mental resilience not to let pain define her. Her emotions are steadier, her mindset more positive, and some days she even has energy to burn. Best of all, she can now walk unaided most of the time-something that once felt impossible.

The changes ripple through her life in ways both big and small. She can walk along the

beach, wander through woodland and parks, and is edging closer to a long-held dream of riding horses again. She can play with her granddaughters-push them on swings, paddle in the sea-moments that were once completely out of reach. These "off-scale victories" are too many to count. Anny is no longer just existing. She is living. And that feeling is priceless.

Anny encourages anyone reading her story who is wondering whether to take that first step into a Slimming World group: "Don't overthink it-just do it! It may be the greatest gift you ever give yourself. You will find people who understand your struggle, who support you without judgment, and who help you rediscover your confidence. You deserve to shine-sometimes you just need a little help to find your sparkle again."

ALONE URGES OLDER PEOPLE TO SEEK SUPPORT DURING COLD SNAP AND ENCOURAGES COMMUNITIES TO CHECK IN

ALONE, the national organisation supporting thousands of older people across Ireland, is urging older people to seek any help they need as temperatures are set to fall sharply in the coming days. The organisation is also asking the public to check in on older neighbours, friends and relatives during the cold spell.

Met Éireann has issued a number of Yellow Weather Warning for the entire country this weekend as temperatures are forecast to fall to as low as -4 degrees. ALONE is closely monitoring conditions and keeping in touch with the older people they support nationwide.


Cold weather significantly increases health risks for older people. Slips and falls can have serious, sometimes fatal, consequences, and cold snaps often lead to a rise in respiratory infections in the following weeks. ALONE is urging older people to reach out for any support they may need and asking

communities to stay alert to those who may be isolated. ALONE is recommending older people to:

- Keep the heating on in their home, especially in the rooms that they use the most.
- Eat and drink hot food and beverages to stay warm, perhaps even using the microwave if there is a concern around energy efficiency.
- Wear more than one layer of clothing to stay warm.
- Avoid making journeys that involve going outdoors particularly in counties affected by the snow-ice warning.
- If using an electric blanket, check for signs of wear and tear - if the blanket is old and damaged, do not use it under any circumstances.
- Keep in touch with friends and family to let them know if you need any practical support such as picking up fuel, medicines and groceries.


Honours for outstanding servants of East Kerry GAA



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

HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL HARE'S CORNER BIODIVERSITY PROJECT OPEN FOR APPLICATIONS AS IT BECOMES AVAILABLE IN KERRY FOR FIRST TIME

Applications are open for The Hare's Corner, an innovative biodiversity initiative developed by the nonprofit organisation Burrenbeo Trust, which is coming to Kerry for the first time this year.

Kerry landowners are invited to apply for support in the creation of wildlife ponds, mini-woodlands, hedgerows, mini-orchards, and plans for nature on their land through the initiative, which takes its name from the old farming expression for an awkward section of a field which wasn't intensively farmed and was therefore left to nature.

Kerry is one of ten counties involved in The Hare's Corner project this year, with the others being Limerick, Offaly, Carlow, Monaghan, Sligo, Donegal, Louth, Wexford, and Kilkenny. Applications close on Sunday, January 18th and anyone interested can apply via www.theharescorner.com.

The website also offers practical tips, infographics and short videos aimed at helping people to create their own Hare's Corners.

The Hare's Corner in 2026 is being funded through a combination of public and private sector funding, including the National Parks and Wildlife Service's Local Biodiversity Action Fund, and is an action of the National Biodiversity Action Plan 2023 – 2030. Private funders include SSE Generation Green Community Fund, NTR PLC, Greencoat Renewables PLC, ESB and Intact Insurance. The project is also

grateful for the partnership with Heritage Council's Biodiversity Officer Programme, which is enabling biodiversity officers in each of the 10 counties to provide ground support for the initiative.

Last year, The Hare's Corner marked its fifth anniversary by creating 1,600 habitats for biodiversity in six counties around Ireland. The 'menu' of supports available from The Hare's Corner includes – a mini-woodland (a mix of 50 native trees and advice), a wildlife hedge (a mix of 50 native trees and advice), a heritage orchard (5 heritage apple trees and advice), a wildlife pond (hydrologist advice and some expenses towards machinery costs), and a 'Plan for Nature' (a visit and advice from a Hare's Corner advisor on how to enhance nature on your site). For more info on the

supports and eligibility criteria please visit <https://theharescorner.ie/supports/>.

The initiative is coordinated by Burrenbeo Trust, a national non-profit organisation that supports people to take positive action for their local landscapes. Its flagship programmes – 'Farming for Nature', 'Heritage Keepers' and 'The Hare's Corner' – initiated in and inspired by the Burren are spreading across the country due to their proven efficacy and demand.

Ultimately, the project plans to go nationwide and welcomes interest from private and public funders to help achieve this. It is also interested in hearing from ecologists and hydrologists who have hands-on experience of working with people and nature and who would like to join The Hare's Corner team as freelance advisors in their own counties.

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Revised price ceilings to open the First Home Scheme to more buyers in Kerry

A €25,000 increase has been applied to the price ceiling for houses and apartments in Kerry.

The higher ceilings will bring more homes within the eligible price range for purchase with scheme support.

Changes to the First Home Scheme will enable a greater number of first-time buyers in Kerry to access support in purchasing a home.

From 1 January, following the latest scheduled twice-yearly review, price ceilings in 17 local authority areas, including Kerry County Council have increased by €25,000. This adjustment raises the eligible value of houses (including self-builds) and apartments in Kerry to €400,000 broadening access to the scheme and ensuring that more prospective homeowners can benefit from its supports.

The revised ceilings will allow many prospective buyers who were previously excluded because their preferred home exceeded the local price limit to now qualify for support under the scheme. The changes may also encourage the supply of additional new homes in areas with low stock of new homes.

The €740 million scheme provides financial support to borrowers and facilitates them in purchasing a new home (or building their




own home) that they could not otherwise do after combining their available mortgage and deposit.

By bridging the gap between the available mortgage, deposit and the price of the new home, the Scheme will make the prospect of home ownership possible for many for the first time.

Since the launch of the scheme up to Q3 2025, 8,399 buyers in all 26 counties have been approved by the scheme. The First Home Scheme has provided over €273m in support to people who have bought or self-built their homes.

FREEZING IRELAND: How To Prevent Burst Pipes

January is a time for getting your house in order, and the last thing anyone wants is an expensive pipe repair as a result of freezing temperatures. With Met Éireann issuing a warning about Storm Goretti, plumbing expert Sean Richardson of Complete Plumbing Solutions has compiled his top tips on how to prevent pipes from freezing and worse, bursting.

1. Keep Water Running

The tiniest trickle can sometimes be enough to stop a devastating freeze.

"Met Éireann are pretty good at forecasting when there'll be a particularly harsh storm or drop in temperatures, so turn your taps on and allow just a trickle to come through the pipes. We're not saying do this with all of the taps in the house, but just the ones that are supplied by exposed pipes. The constant movement of the water through the pipes will help prevent freezing and relieve any

potential pressure build up that could burst a pipe."

2. Insulate Your Pipes When Possible

Pipe insulation is cheap, widely available and can potentially save you hundreds.

"A metre length of pipe insulation can be as cheap as two euro so it really is a no brainer, you could have all of your pipes insulated for less than one hundred euro. We would always advise that you focus on the most vulnerable sections of your plumbing; the exterior pipes and the pipes located in the unheated areas of your home, like the attic. If there's cold weather on the way and you haven't had the time to insulate your pipes properly, you can DIY it too. Around fifty-sixty years ago, people used to wrap the pipes in old, bunched up newspapers and just secured it with some tape. It may sound funny, but it definitely does the job in a pinch."

3. Keep The Heat On

Energy prices are still quite high, so, understandably, this may not seem like the most appealing option. However, a small bump in your heating costs will still cost far less than the repair of a burst pipe. "When temperatures dip, we tend to blast the heat during the day and turn things down at night; this isn't helping your internal plumbing. Try and keep your heating at a more consistent temperature over the twenty-four-hour period as this will keep the pipes from freezing. Ideally, you should always be around twelve degrees Celsius at least."

4. Keep Your Cabinets and Doors Open

"Keeping cabinets and doors open is a simple but effective measure to keep warm air circulating around your pipes. In most homes, the kitchen or bathroom plumbing is tucked away behind a cabinet door of some sort. During a cold

snap, you should open these doors to allow the warm air from inside the house to get around the pipes, keeping them free from blockages."

5. Plug the Gaps

There are dozens of unhelpful cracks and openings throughout every home, and a cold snap is the perfect time to sort them out.

"Around this time of year, you should be checking around your doors and windows for any holes and large gaps that are letting all of the warm air in your home escape and letting cold air in. Windowsills are a common leakage point, so if you have any cabling running externally to internally, examine where it enters the home for gaps. By sealing these gaps, you're helping your overall home insulation which in turn benefits the plumbing."

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Killarney Celtic FC joins FAI National League

Kerry champions Killarney Celtic FC have signed up to play League of Ireland football.

The club, founded in 1976, will be part of the new National League being established by the Football Association of Ireland.

"We are pleased to announce that our application has been successful. As a founding member of the National League, we look forward to working collaboratively with the FAI and all other clubs in what is a significant step for football pathways and player development," said club chairman Philip O'Callaghan.

"The achievement reflects the continued growth of Killarney Celtic FC, the dedication of our volunteers, coaches, players and the ongoing support of our community," he added.

Celtic have been the dominant force in Kerry soccer, winning the last seven-in-a-row premier league titles and six cup wins on the trot.

The club said participation in the FAI National League represents an important milestone as it will provide enhanced opportunities for player progression, high-performance development and a clear pathway for young players to compete at the highest levels of the game in Ireland.

"Killarney Celtic is committed to upholding the values and standards of the FAI National League and to contribute positively to the future development of Irish football," Mr O'Callaghan said.

Further updates regarding squad preparations, fixtures and club initiatives will be revealed in due course.



The FAI is recruiting 15 teams – to compete in two divisions split into north and south – for the new league that will act as a direct connection between grassroots and professional football for the first time in Ireland. BUILDING AND OR BUYING BUILDINGS TO MEET DEMAND FOR CRECHE'S

The recent announcement by government to meet existing and expected growth of crèche facilities, by building or purchasing buildings to meet present and possibly future demands for such facilitates will be overly costly and will take decades to attain. There is a faster and less costly way, to the country and the users, in which to deliver a universal crèche system in Ireland.

There was, over the past thirty or forty years, countless buildings erected in every parish in the country, with multiple buildings in many parishes. These building, by in large, are not in use five days a week from early morning until 6.00 P.M and are vested in sporting clubs and communities throughout the country and are rent and rates free which is very significant in keeping the cost to the user to a minimum.

One would have thought it far more practical to begin a series of pilot schemes in chosen areas, to offer these clubs, full conversion grants to operate creche's in their clubs and or community buildings and cover the cost of providing fully qualified personnel to operate them.

The clubs and community groups would have the benefit of having members from the cradle to the grave and the cost to the users and the taxpayers would be greatly reduced and come to fruition in half the time.

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College aspirants can be very optimistic about the 2026 CAO application season

PROMISING

As a new year dawns, college applicants must focus on the CAO form as the deadline looms large. Indeed, 2026 is looking very promising for CAO applicants. With more places becoming available, particularly in competitive courses, and with a gradual return to standard Leaving Cert exam marking, the pressure on applicants is beginning to ease. The positive impact being made by the new Universities, including MTU Kerry, will ensure that a generous supply of places in all disciplines will be available to 2026 college applicants.

PROSPECTS

Last year, CAO received 89,308 applications for a third level college course, up from 83,169 in 2024. Applicants to CAO in 2026 will probably exceed a record 90,000. The prospect of securing one of the precious places is very good as many initial applicants opt instead for PLC courses, Tertiary Degrees, Apprenticeships, Traineeships or study abroad. Applicants have until 5pm on 1st February to submit a completed application form. So, use the remaining weeks wisely. Carefully consider your course choices. Follow your heart but keep an eye on the jobs market.

STATISTICS

In total, 54,032 applicants accepted a CAO college place in 2025. That figure will increase in 2026. 47,634 applicants accepted an offer at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) where demand is always strong. 6,398 applicants accepted an offer at Level 7/6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates) where interest continues to decline. CAO always issues more offers than there are places available in anticipation of a level of refusal by applicants. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/6), so it's well worth filling in both lists. Indeed, with good research and due care with the application, it's not very difficult to secure a higher education course.

POINTS

Grades' inflation considerably increased CAO points' requirements during the Covid years, but a reduction in the post marking adjustment of Leaving Cert exam raw scores last year helped to stabilize the points. A further decrease in the post marking adjustment in the 2026 Leaving Cert exam should reduce CAO points' requirements. Consult the 2025 cut off points as a guide to likely points requirements in 2026, but keep in mind that points' requirements for courses can fluctuate from year to year, so predicting cut off points is an inaccurate science. Each Leaving Cert candidate should aim to achieve her/his best possible result in that exam. Points' requirements for courses will take care of themselves in due course.

CAO ROLE

The CAO processes applications for admission

to undergraduate courses in third level colleges in Ireland. Every public sector university, college and institute in the country, as well as a number of private colleges, participates in the CAO system. An applicant may choose from the entire range of courses in the CAO Handbook 2026. The courses are categorised as 'Level 8' or 'Level 7/6'.

The 'Level 8' category contains the Honours Bachelor Degrees while the 'Level 7/6' category contains Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates.

SINGLE APPLICATION

All you have to do is submit a single application to compete for one of the available third-level places. The interactive online application system, 'Apply' has made the process very straightforward. 'Apply' is easy to follow, particularly as the CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo Facility' to enable you make a trial application. The CAO Handbook 2026 also contains detailed easy-to-follow information on how to apply for the courses on offer. The interactive online application service will remain open on the CAO website, www.cao.ie, until 5pm on 1st February. The fee is €35, if you apply by 20th January and €50 thereafter until the 1st February.

STUDY THE 2026 HANDBOOK

Before you apply, study the online CAO Handbook 2026 which explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

STRENGTHS

Consult the CAO Handbook 2026 for information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements and content of courses. Similar information can also be found on colleges' websites. Consider the potential career value of each course for which you are applying. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few weeks. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability,

achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling, enjoyable and successful college experience. Good luck with your 2026 CAO application.

- Foundation Level Maths: F1 and F2 are valued at 20 and 12 points, respectively

HSE South West advise public to be aware of Injury Units and Hospital alternatives owing to unprecedented demand

HSE South West have this week advised the public to be aware of the full range of services available to those seeking urgent healthcare away from acute hospitals.

Arising from seasonal illness and the adverse weather in recent days, Cork University Hospital (CUH) and other hospitals in the region have experienced significant and at times unprecedented levels of demand for health care services. The HSE South West are advising that many of the treatments required by patients presenting at Emergency Departments can be provided in alternative settings such as injury units located across the region.

Injury Units often have shorter waiting times and provide consultant-led assessment and

treatment, including X-rays, fracture treatment, burns treatment, and wound care.

Priscilla Lynch, HSE manager for Cork South and West said: "Many urgent injuries can be treated at our Injury Units, which often provide the fastest access to specialised care. Our Emergency Department at CUH remains very busy due to high demand and seasonal illnesses and weather related injury, so patients with less urgent problems may experience longer waits as we prioritise those most seriously ill. We're asking people to choose the most appropriate service for their needs using Injury Units and community services where suitable to support our hospital teams and keep emergency care available for those who need it most."

A wide range of services is available for those who need them, so consider which options are best for you:

- Self-care – Have a well-stocked medicine cabinet to help with colds and sore throats
- Pharmacy – Ask your pharmacist for advice on common minor illnesses
- GP Surgery – Make an appointment with your GP if you're feeling unwell
- Local Injury Unit at Mallow – For minor injuries, broken bones and burns. See www.hse.ie/injuryunits for more information
- Out-of-Hours GP – if your GP clinic is closed, call SouthDoc on 0818 355 999
- ED or 999/112 – For emergencies, please visit your nearest ED

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

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
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HARNESS THE POWER OF NEW BEGINNINGS


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WHAT SHOULD I DO TO PLAN MY FITNESS GOALS FOR THE NEW YEAR?

Planning your fitness goals for the New Year is a great way to start fresh and stay motivated, and it doesn't matter if you are starting from scratch or already on a journey and are thinking of what next.

Here are some steps you can take:

Reflect on Your Current Fitness Level: Assess where you are now. Consider your strengths, weaknesses, and any past experiences with fitness.

Define Clear and Specific Goals: Instead of vague goals like "get fit," set specific targets such as "run 5km in 30 minutes" or "lose 10 pounds." Use the SMART criteria - Goals should be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-bound.

Identify Your Motivation: Understand why you want to achieve these goals. Whether it's improving health, gaining strength, or boosting confidence, knowing your motivation keeps you committed.

Create a Realistic Plan: Outline the steps needed to reach your goals. Decide on workout routines, frequency, and types of activities. Make sure the plan fits your lifestyle.

Set Short-term Milestones: Break down your main goal into smaller, manageable milestones. Celebrate achieving these to stay motivated.

Track Your Progress: Keep a journal, use apps, or take photos to monitor your improvements over time.

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As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated. Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

Risk of falls

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75.

Risks for children

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Driving risks

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.

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Protect your heart and reduce your risk of a heart attack

Heat disease also called cardiovascular disease is a term for conditions that affect the heart and blood vessels. A heart attack happens when blood flow to part of the heart suddenly blocks.

Protect your heart and reduce your risk of a heart attack.

Heart disease doesn't just affect older men!
1 in 5 heart attacks in men occur before the age of 50, but the good news is Prevention is effective, and can reduce up to 80% of heart disease.

Why are men under 50 at risk of a heart attack?

- Symptoms are often missed or ignored - you feel 'too young' to be at risk
- Family history can increase your risk
- High blood pressure and cholesterol - often unknown
- There may be no warning signs

How do I help prevent a heart attack?

Know your numbers - attend your GP for an annual check up. New guidelines now recommend all individuals over 40 to have an annual blood pressure check.

Aim for a healthy weight and waist measurement- 60% of adults are living with overweight or obesity. Small changes to your lifestyle can prevent or reduce weight gain.

Be more physically active - 'Every Move Counts' being active regularly has significant benefits for your heart. Aim for 150 minutes per week of moderate activity – find something that you enjoy doing, brisk walk, cycle, and swim. Exercise classes and gyms are a great place to spend some time and also can be very social. Resistance training isn't just about muscles. It plays a large role in heart health by lowering your blood pressure, reduces body fat, and reduces your risk of type 2 diabetes. Gyms and exercise classes also great way to reduce stress and improve mental wellbeing.

Smoking Cessation – Stopping smoking is the most important step you can take to live longer and greatly reduce your risk of heart disease. Vaping is not an alternative to smoking



cessation. A recent study reports vape users have 19% higher risk of developing heart failure compared with people who never vape. www.quit.ie

Alcohol – Less is better for your heart. The low risk weekly guidelines are not to drink more than

17 standard drinks weekly for men

11 standard drinks weekly for women.

Avoid binge drinking and make sure you have alcohol free days.

Stress - Stress isn't just in your head. Longterm or unmanaged stress has a physical impact on your heart. Stress increases your blood pressure, and increases your heart rate. We all manage stress in different ways, some examples include

- Physical activity, talking to family and friends, or a professional
- Getting enough sleep and rest to recharge your batteries
- Plan ahead, learn to say no
- Learn to relax – cinema, reading music

Diet – has a major impact on heart attack risk. Limit or avoid processed meat and foods. Limit fried and fast foods, sugary drinks, energy drinks, cakes and high fat foods.

Eating more fruit and vegetables- 5-7 portions a day, limit red meat to 2-3 times weekly. Oily fish is so beneficial for your heart health. Swapping white to brown whole grains, pasta, breads The Mediterranean Diet tops the healthiest diet worldwide because of its health benefits and very easy to follow.

Knowing symptoms of a heart attack can save a life- you or someone else

Common symptoms of having a heart attack
Chest discomfort – pressure, tightness, squeezing or pain, often central or left sided. Pain can last for more than a few minutes, or come and go.

Pain can spread to other areas such as the left or right arm, neck, jaw and shoulder.

Other symptoms can be shortness of breath

- cold sweat
- nausea or vomiting
- lightheadedness
- dizziness, sudden fatigue.

Some experience crushing chest pain, can start mild and worsen over hours, or can be very sudden intense pain.

If you experience intense chest pain lasting longer than 10 minutes call an ambulance. Remember early treatment means less heart damage

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Minister Michael Healy-Rae confirms Ireland will vote against Mercosur, standing firm with Irish farmers

Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae has today reaffirmed that Ireland will vote against the EU-Mercosur trade deal, underlining that this position has always been Government policy and is clearly set out in the Programme for Government.

Minister Healy-Rae said that Ireland's opposition is not a late change of heart, but the culmination of sustained engagement and hard work by Government Ministers over a prolonged period.

"This was always Ireland's position under the Programme for Government. It is not new, and it is not reactionary. The Government has been clear and consistent in its opposition to Mercosur in its current form."

The Minister said he has seen first-hand, on a daily basis, the level of work and commitment shown by the Minister for Agriculture in defending Irish farming interests at EU level.

"I have seen the enormous work Martin Heydon has put in month after month over the past year, engaging with his EU counterparts and trying to maintain a blocking group. Ultimately, however, we can only be responsible for ourselves as a country and Ireland must, and

will always, stand by its farmers."

Minister Healy-Rae said the Mercosur agreement is a bad deal for Europe and a particularly bad deal for Ireland's agriculture-based economy, risking the undermining of high standards and placing Irish farmers at an unfair disadvantage.

"Irish farmers operate to the highest standards in the world. Any deal that undercuts those standards or exposes farmers to unfair competition is simply not acceptable."

Looking ahead, Minister Healy-Rae noted that MEPs will have an opportunity in the coming weeks to block the deal, and he urged Irish representatives in the European Parliament to stand firmly with farmers.

"MEPs will have a chance to block this deal in the next two to three weeks, and I hope that Irish MEPs, across all parties and none, will back Irish farmers and oppose Mercosur."

The Minister also highlighted that Mercosur was a major issue for Independents before entering Government, and said the outcome demonstrates the importance of Independent voices at the Cabinet table.

"I want to thank Seán Canney for his efforts with

the other coalition leaders, and for remaining steadfast in our opposition, along with all of my Independent colleagues in Government. This clearly shows the importance of having Independents in Government, people who are prepared to stand their ground on issues that matter."

Minister Healy-Rae rejected claims that Ireland's stance is "too little too late", saying such commentary ignores the reality of how Government works.

"A lot of work has been done on this over many months. Government work is all-encompassing. Those who say this is too little too late are being disingenuous. Many of the same people shied away from being in Government and had no input into the detailed work that has been ongoing on Mercosur."

"While others grandstand from the sidelines, we have been working diligently behind the scenes on the issues that really matter, like Mercosur. The goalposts have constantly shifted, but with a vote expected on Friday, the Government has stated its position clearly and it is a position that was never in doubt as far as I'm concerned"

Minister Foley welcomes over €1.4 million in funding for Kerry towns under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of over €1.4 million in funding under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme.

The projects receiving funding include Listowel Community Centre (€500,000), Corcra Dhuibhne museum & Community centre (€300,000), Fossa Community Centre (€300,000) and Muintir na Tire hall, Milltown (€269,939).

Funding under the scheme for project developments work on community centre upgrades has also been provided to Rathmore (€50,000) and Currow (€50,000).

Minister Foley said: "I welcome confirmation of this funding under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme from my cabinet colleague, Minister for Rural and Community Development Dara Calleary. The regeneration of town spaces and upgrading of community centres and other facilities has been a priority for this government."

The Town and Village Scheme is one of a series of national and local support measures designed to rejuvenate small rural towns and villages throughout Ireland, under the Rural Development Investment Programme.

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SHORT TERM LET'S



"We need Long and Short Term Let's, there's no doubt about that. We need all sorts of accommodation types to fill the needs of the people. Restricting any type, for instance Short Term Lets, is a detrimental move and we should encourage more of all types" according to Kerry Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill.

The Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Tourism has claimed that the richest vein of experience around accommodation and tourism in Ireland is within his own county, the premier Tourist county in Ireland and business owners there should have been consulted, before any changes in legislation are introduced for the sector.

"There are many types of accommodation available throughout Kerry, with Hotels, Guest Houses, Bed & Breakfasts, AirBnB's, etc, Long and Short-Term Lets. The wide choice of accommodation available, is one of the reasons that Kerry is so successful in attracting visitors to the area. Without this mix and flexibility, many people would stay away, despite our fabulous food and stunning scenery offerings" said Deputy Cahill.

"As I stated previously, we need to be very careful that we do not 'kill the Golden Goose' by legislating Tourism Accommodation Providers out of the market. Granted we have a big need for housing units long term, but I firmly believe that with the reclamation of Vacant & Derelict premises and a marked increase in new Planning Permissions, for both One Off Housing and Group Housing, which I have been constantly pushing for at the highest level of this Fianna Fáil led Government, with the expected investment in Constructed Wetlands in villages across the county, something that I have been consistently calling for since being elected a TD for Kerry 12 months ago, we will solve that shortage in the medium term" stated Deputy Cahill.

"The Kerry Tourism Trade feeds and supports many families in this county and has a positive ripple effect on our Farming and Fishing communities, our transport, food and beverage suppliers. In the present trying times, they are to be and should be supported, not challenged" said the Rossbeigh based TD.

The setting up of a Short Term Letting Register by Fáilte Ireland, does not have universal support throughout the country, especially in Killarney, the real capital of Tourism in Ireland, according to Deputy Cahill.

"The fact that this new Register is to focus on just one type of letting, i.e. Short Term, has brought it into disrepute with those offering such a service. Many of them believe that it is discriminatory towards Short Term Letting and that they are being held responsible for the shortage in

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Long Term lettings and the Housing Crisis" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Many of those in the AirBnB sector see this as a means to force them away from Short Term Letting, but they have confirmed to me that they have no interest in, or intention of getting involved in Long Term Letting. They have found their niche, they say, they pay their taxes and they feel they should not be forced out of business" said the newly elected TD for Kerry.

"Legitimate businesses should be allowed to carry on and other tactics need to be employed to encourage and attract people to offering Long Term Letting. We need not use a sledge hammer to crack a nut" stated Deputy Cahill.

"During the first quarter of 2025, I called for a waiver for all those involved in Short Term Lets for 3 years or longer. Prior to that as a member of Kerry County Council, I moved a Motion calling on the then Minister for Housing, Darragh O'Brien and the then Minister for Tourism, Catherine Martin to allow a waiver for the proprietors of AirBnB outlets on the need to apply for Planning Permission to continue their business and I stated at the time that this sector is a very important and popular part of our tourism offering and enforcement of Planning Permission requirements will see many leave the market, creating a major shortfall in accommodation offerings in the county" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"There is very real anger amongst all those involved in this sector, especially in Killarney, they feel that they are being dictated to, that they are now being told how and how not to invest their own money. I am again repeating my call for a waiver for all those involved in Short Term Lets for 3 years or longer and I will again raise this serious matter in the Dáil, with the Taoiseach and Senior Government Ministers. This issue is more important now than ever before as is evident over the past 2 weeks with the opening of the first completed section of the South Kerry Greenway and the very obvious shortage of accommodation" added Michael Cahill TD.

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

‘ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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

TOP 10 SAFETY TIPS' FOR DRIVING IN SNOW AND ICE

WHEN TEMPERATURES DIP BELOW FREEZING, DRIVING CONDITIONS CAN BECOME TREACHEROUS AS THE RISK OF ICE OR SNOW ON THE ROADS INCREASES. THE ROAD SAFETY AUTHORITY (RSA) HAS THE FOLLOWING "TOP 10 SAFETY TIPS" FOR MOTORISTS DRIVING IN SNOW AND ICE.

1. Get a grip. Remember your only contact with the road surface is your tyres, so it's vital that they are up to the task in icy and snowy conditions. Check tyres, including the spare wheel, and replace them if the tread depth falls below 3mm. Check that tyres are inflated to the correct tyre pressure. Lack of grip can occur even on treated roads, so drive slowly in the highest gear possible, manoeuvre gently and avoid harsh braking. Replace tyres if necessary.

2. Make sure you can see. Clear your windows and mirrors before you set out and carry a screen scraper and de-icer. Do not use hot water on the windscreen as it can crack the glass. Replace windshield wiper blades if necessary. De-mist the inside of your windows thoroughly. Make sure your windshield washer system works and is full of an anti-icing fluid. Remember that heavy snowfall will reduce visibility. Watch out for grit or salt spreaders and snow ploughs. The glare from the sun can be dazzling in winter when the sun is low in the sky, so wear sunglasses in these conditions.

3. Check and use your lights. Use your dipped headlights so that others will see you. Make sure your headlights and taillights are all in working order and replace broken bulbs. Ensure lights are clear of snow.

4. Gently does it. Manoeuvre gently, slow down and leave extra distance between you and the vehicle in front. Too much steering is dangerous, and harsh braking

and acceleration should be avoided. Use the highest gear possible to avoid wheel spin. Select a low gear when travelling downhill, especially through bends. Falling snow, fog, rain or hail will reduce visibility. Do not follow the tail lights of the vehicle in front as this can give a false sense of security. When slowing down, use your brakes so that brake lights warn drivers behind you.

5. Watch out for "black ice." If the road looks polished or glossy it could be black ice, one of winter's worst hazards. Black ice is difficult to see as it is nearly transparent and often looks like a harmless puddle or is overlooked entirely. Watch out for black ice especially in sheltered or shaded areas, under trees and adjacent to high walls.

6. Give yourself a brake. If you get into a skid, you need to know if your vehicle has ABS (Anti-Lock Braking Systems). After you step on the brake, the ABS begins cycling and you will feel pulses in the pedal or hear the system working. It is easy to properly use antilock brakes: remember Step, Stay and Steer. Step on the pedal, stay on the pedal and steer around the obstacle. A warning should be noted that a small amount of steering goes a very long way in an emergency. For vehicles without ABS, you must rely on the old-fashioned cadence braking system. Push the brake pedal until the wheels stop rolling, then immediately release the brake enough to allow the wheels to begin turning again. Repeat this sequence rapidly. Your goal is to have the tyres producing maximum grip regardless of whether the surface is snow or ice.

7. How does your vehicle help? Check your owner's manual to find out if your vehicle has any safety assist technology such as Electronic Stability Control (ESC) or Anti-Lock Braking System (ABS) and know how they assist

your driving in severe weather conditions. However, remember that technology offers no miracles and should not encourage overconfidence in available traction.

8. Be prepared. In prolonged icy or snowy driving conditions it is advisable to carry the following in the boot of the car: a high visibility vest, tow rope, spare bulbs, spare fuel, a shovel, appropriate footwear such as boots in case you have to leave your vehicle, a hazard warning triangle, a spare wheel with correct pressure and tread, de-icing equipment for glass and door locks, a first aid kit in good order, a fully operative fire extinguisher, a working torch, a car blanket, additional clothing, and some food and water. In preparation for driving you should also ensure the vehicle is properly maintained and serviced, engine oil viscosity is suitable for cold conditions, the strength of coolant or antifreeze is measured, there is an adequate supply of fuel for the journey, and you consider carrying some salt or sand. Give someone an estimated time of arrival at your destination and carry a mobile phone with a fully charged spare battery if you do not have a car charger.

9. Get informed. Listen to local weather and traffic reports. The RSA has prepared a helpful guide called "Severe Weather Advice for Road Users" which can be downloaded from the RSA website and provides additional useful advice on dealing with difficult road conditions.

10. Stay at home. The best thing to do in extremely bad weather is to stay off the road. Take heed of warnings not to travel as this allows emergency services to deal with real emergencies instead of assisting stranded motorists.

JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

Well, a bright and shiny new year (too shiny – the world is basically frozen as I write this) but the frantic world of sport hasn't even paused for breath.

My new year's resolution (I know some people would start those words with capital letters – ah now, let's not be tempting fate) is to be less cranky. I intend to greet every new day with a big smile.

So when I say that the amount of games that are taking place at the moment is ridiculous, I say it in a cheerful manner. Don't worry about it being the first week of January and very cold. Players love that. I'd say managers were nearly demented on Christmas Day with all the players texting them to say "look, alright so, no full training session for the day that's in it, but can't we at least open up the gym?"

I didn't go to any game over Christmas. Haven't been to any yet this year. No rush, either.

BALLYMAC

I didn't even see the Ballymac game on television. Sounds like they needed that early two goal cushion to hold out for a win over a very good Grangenolvin team. I like Ballymac, always have. For me, Aidan Breen was one of the best club footballers in Kerry for the bones of a decade and Ballymac have produced some really sparkling young guns recently – one grecian vase in rude earth may be a fantastic poetry line, but several means that somebody has put hard work into planting.

AN GHAELTACHT

I did watch An Ghaeltacht against Sallins. Cracking football, to be fair. I genuinely thought a few Kerry pundits were overconfident about that one. Club football (and hurling and camogie, by the way) are a lot stronger in Kildare than their intercounty results would indicate. I'll freely admit that I was caught on the hop by their hurlers last year, but as a general rule, I believe their clubs tend to be underestimated. Kildare's senior footballers should be genuine contenders for at least Leinster every year. Should Sallins have had that equaliser by James Dalton to take it to extra-time? I genuinely don't think so. I have issues with an obvious breach being simply ignored. I know it didn't matter in the end, but what if it did? You know as well as me that there would be no justice forthcoming. Of course, you have the controversial finish to extra-time. Was it a free? Yes. Did Sallins attempt to delay the free kick? Yes. After the free is brought forward, is Éanna Ó Chonchúir allowed to bring it back outside the arc for a two pointer? Yes. Now, there is certainly an argument that the punishment is excessive to the crime. That was my initial take on frees being brought 50 metres forward but you know what? Don't do the crime and you won't need to care. I'm alright with harsh sanctions. Some of you may have forgotten some of the

appalling borefests that I endured on GAA sidelines in recent years; I certainly haven't. My generation saw some stuff...look, you that TV programme 'Stranger Things'? You know why stuff like that only happens in America? It didn't, stuff like that happened to us all the time – we just didn't go making a song and dance about it. All Ireland semi-final, Dublin v Donegal, 2011. It's on you tube. Go on, google it. I dare you.

Yes, this game was cruel on Sallins (I thought Darragh Mangan was superb) but it was a great game of football.

Can An Ghaeltacht go all the way? I'd love it. I remember their game against Caltra. That was a tough one – my abiding memory is that they were tactically outsmarted and, worse, just didn't produce their best on the day. One of those games where you couldn't help but come away thinking "if only". I remember them against Moy as well – I think it was Portlaoise. Four of us travelled together by car. That was another tough one. Especially the finish, with Moy playing keep ball and determinedly killing off any attempt at playing football. Right tactics, I'd have done the same myself, but it was truly hideous to watch. It was 0-6 to 0-3 after 52 minutes of football. I'm not joking; it was literally that bad.

Can they finally go all the way and claim an All Ireland at the third time of asking? I don't know, I haven't seen Glenullin of Derry. But they have reached an All Ireland Final; it's not like that's ever easy. And An Ghaeltacht are carrying injuries. You need the likes of Brian, Ruaidhrí, and Cathal Ó Beaglaoich and Tomás Ó Sé in full form for occasions like this. Why are so many players carrying knocks?

Well, here's an idea. It's January and they are still playing last year's football without a decent break. I'm just throwing it out there; I don't think we need to look at any Biddy Early type of curse here.

DINGLE

Then you have the Dingle game. Yours truly can be some clown at times. I was telling people in the days before the game that I thought Ballyboden were just slightly overrated. Tight sticky defenders, very fit team, good footballers. Not necessarily great shooters. Yes, Dingle would be up against it, but I thought Geaney two pointers would see them through. Twenty minutes later I was cringing. Jaysus, they were destroyed. Ballyboden were just hoovering up ball and smothering any effort by Dingle. Frankly, it looked like men against boys. If anything, I thought Ballyboden should have been further ahead. 0-14 to 0-5 at half-time. I genuinely did check what was on the other channels. RTE One had 'Oliver Twist'. When it comes to Charles Dickens, one of the greatest humanitarians of his era despite the flaws in his persona, I incline towards Oscar Wilde's famous remark "One must have a heart of stone to read the death of Little Nell without laughing". Harsh, I know, but Dickens does lay it on thick. I have no interest in watching greedy little Oliver demanding more food, the little pork barrel. RTE Two had Kate Garraway and Alison Hammond examining their DNA or ancestry or something. Even if I knew who they were, I'd be a solid No.

I did consider going for a walk, but then I remembered that I'm not actually a masochist (early January, et cetera). So I left the game on TG4, huddled by the fire, and concentrated on a good book ('The Gaffer' by Paul Howard, about Ireland's World Cup campaign. Twasn't great, in fairness).

Dingle definitely stepped up their game. Did Ballyboden hold back a bit? I hadn't paid close enough attention. But somehow, the tide wasn't just receding, it was changing direction. Freed from the shackles of Pa Warren, Tom O'Sullivan was suddenly everywhere. So was Tadhg de Brún. Paul Geaney came on and....

well, this time two years ago people were talking about him retiring from the game. Arrah, there's a biblical story where people were telling Jesus that Lazarus had retired. How did that one work out?

Extra-time. Ballyboden racked up three points and I thought that might be enough. But Dingle seem to relish this kind of last ditch territory and closed it out. I mentioned earlier on about an infamous Donegal v Dublin semi-final. Did ye actually google and watch it? Oh, ye poor crathurs. You should never pay me that much attention. The final score in that game was 0-8 to 0-6. Dublin won it with a grand total of two points from play. Dingle v Ballyboden St. Enda's finished 1-26 to 1-24. I would only describe one of those as a game of football.

I'm not rehashing reports of a game that I watched on television. If you attended the game in a bitterly cold Pairc uí Caoimh, you already have a better perspective on it than I. And if you didn't even watch it on television, I think it's safe to assume that you don't particularly care – in which case, good for you.

PLAYING SCHEDULE

I don't want to harp on about a topic, but it's January, and it's cold. These games are simply being crammed into an unwieldy schedule. I have a certain sympathy for the Sigerson Cup, that's a hard one to slot in given that education is the colleges' priority and intercounty managers want their players for the league and championship.

Not, and I can't stress this enough, the McGrath Cup. Look, of course it's good that Jack O'Connor gets to run the rule over talented players like Eddie Healy, Ciarán Collins, the Darragh O'Connors.....

I don't see it as being my business, or even of interest to me. I don't think winter football in what are basically glorified challenge games (yes, I said it, and I believe it) sets any benchmark. It puts lads in the training environment. I do think these lads deserve a look, having seen their club form in the club and county championships, and I'll certainly hope to see them in the National League.

The McGrath Cup, on a Tuesday night in early

January? Don't even be talking to me. It wasn't a bad game. I watched it on clubber, because I have a subscription. Would I have been willing to pay a one-off match fee to watch it? I don't know, maybe. On a Tuesday. Not a hope if it was on the weekend.

It was a good game. I thought Tomás Kennedy (I know he won an All Ireland medal last year, but I would not call him fully established as yet; it's kind of a grey area. But he looked genuinely a cut above the other players, and even with the caveats of bad ground and early days and the McGrath Cup, that counts for something. Joe Broily famously commented about Ulster's equivalent McKenna Cup that it was so meaningless that "even the McKenna's don't attend". Little bit harsh, but funny, and it does have a kernel of truth – when you read the stats on the Kerry greats like Seamus Moynihan, Colm Cooper, Declan O'Sullivan, et cetera, the McGrath medals don't feature too highly. It's not nothing, though. I thought Charlie Keating, Cillian Trant, and Thomas O'Donnell did well too.

Look, no team can afford to rest on their laurels and of course every team will come gunning for the All Ireland champions. Absolutely right and proper. But there aren't quite as many places up for grabs as you might think. Who do you see retiring from the Kerry panel? I can name twenty players in the queue for places without even stopping to think about it. That's without even considering the Dingle, An Ghaeltacht, or Ballymac players. Then remember the lads involved with the Sigerson – I've always believed that intercounty managers should not just allow, but insist of having lads prioritise the Sigerson. You'll have plenty long enough to run the rule over them, and the Sigerson is a great test for any aspiring county player.

KERRY'S PROSPECTS

My take on last year is that we picked up a soft enough National League (I am adamant that a lot of the contenders didn't want an extra game so close to championship), and started off well on a road that has been artificially elongated in the championship. Good Munster campaign – Cork rattled us hard twice, and that's no

harm. But bodies were taking on knocks – I have been opposed to the 'Super 8's or 'group stage' or whatever people want to call them. They are rubbish. I think tiredness and injuries caught us against Meath more than anything. I thought the main reason that we won the All Ireland was actually our load management. Key players got enforced rests and came back fresh just as other teams (Dublin, Meath, Cork, Galway) began to run out of steam. After that, our quality told.

Which is a long-winded way of me saying that players running themselves hard on bad ground in winter is not at all helpful in terms of winning an All Ireland. Frankly, I'm not that bothered by the National League. Yes, I do know Jack's record of winning leagues and championships together. I still believe that it's a case of 'post hoc, ergo propter hoc', i.e. just because one thing follows another doesn't mean that it caused it. I only know the phrase because it was the title of an episode of 'The West Wing', an old TV series where the US actually had a President. God be with the days, hah?

Can we pull it off again? I don't see why not, but that said, Cork are getting closer to us all the time (while somehow failing to really produce at underage) and I do believe that we caught a few teams on the hop who will have taken lessons on board. In many ways, you are dealing with a whole new game, or at least a complete change in game dynamics. The game is much more attack-minded now (for which I will gladly sing 'alleluia!') and the long schedule of games.....look, I still think that crowded schedule is a ticking time bomb.

SOCCER

To be honest, I'm very sceptical about this third tier in League of Ireland. Best of luck to those involved, but frankly, you already have a colossal gap between the Premier and First Division. This is going to be expensive for any team outside of Dublin – they have far fewer overnights or travel expenses than other teams, simply because so many LOI teams are based in or near the capital. I think it's a bit of a disaster for Kerry – I can't see a strong enough foundation to support two teams. They will

be competing for sponsorship and players and, great cup run aside, Kerry FC's league results just aren't getting them into anything like contention. They need to start hitting mid table. I don't know enough about their new signings but I really think that they will regret losing Ronan Teahan to Dundalk. Mind you, he might end up with regrets himself – Dundalk claim to have stabilised after two years of absolute turmoil – but Dundalk have made a lot of spurious claims in that same two years.

AFCON

The African Cup of Nations is coming in for criticism as well. Why can't it be played at a time more convenient for everybody...except Africa Wow. Do yourselves a favour – read a history book. Maybe they should have to pay reparations for taking the players away to another continent....oh, wait. I changed my mind. Please don't ever read a history book. I took one quick glance at the format of the European Cup (call it what you will) and decided that I wasn't going to care until it got down to at least the last sixteen. Except that by the time it reached that point, I was already well past caring. It's just far too long and far too many teams who just aren't elite quality.

WORLD CUP

Which brings me neatly to the World Cup. Will we get there? I reckon it's a 50/50 chance. Which is brilliant going, because up to recently I'd have said absolute zero. This Irish team aren't world-beaters in any sense of the word, but they have proven character. Will Troy Parrott ever have a week like that again? Will Ireland supporters?

I was actually at the last World Cup in the USA. In fairness, it's not as daft a venue as Qatar. Mind you, the dark side of the moon would be a better venue than Qatar. That was a truly awful World Cup. Yes, it was a brilliant final, and winners Argentina losing early on in the group stage did give a temporary sense of intrigue, but overall the hype merchants had to earn their corn.

Will the USA be much better? I'd be very worried. First of all, soccer has grown in the USA, but if you actually watch MSL, the standard is not great. The Club World Cup was an embarrassing shambles. Really bad. And some factors, such as the weather, simply can't be avoided. Public transport in the US is notoriously poor. I'm actually told that it's much better in Mexico, which is where Ireland would be based early on (I've never been to Mexico, but Maradonna in '86 and the Mexican wave are my first conscious memories of soccer on TV).

USA, Canada, and Mexico. Co-hosting. To listen to US republicans, you'd assume it would be a Fentanyl Convention, but no, apparently not. How big an issue will getting entry visas be? I don't actually think that will be a huge stumbling block. American tourism is already



hurting fairly badly. Have you noticed the advertisements for J1 visas? For almost my entire lifetime, they had absolutely no need to advertise them; young people were queueing up for J1s. I suspect that America will actually be trying to entice people to visit. I know Trump has blustered about changing venues per his whims, and we know exactly how willing Gianni Infantino is to stand up to FIFA's first Peace Prize winner, but the US is smart enough to know that their international standing has declined very sharply and this can be a shop window for them. No, I think ICE, those defenders of life, liberty, and the pursuit of...well, just general pursuit, will be told to cool their jets. Well, depending on how soon Trump declares a State of Emergency and suspends democratic elections....I suspect that he will hold off on that until next year and take the inevitable hit on the Midterms.

The biggest issue, I think, is money. FIFA, never altruistic (are you kidding me?) have gotten ever more greedy. Ironically, it was American probity that eventually exposed Sepp Blatter's rank corruption, but that was a very different America. Ticket prices for this World Cup are already preposterous, even with all of the extra games, and it's going to get a lot worse. Soccer always billed itself as the game of the common people, the modern equivalent of Roman bread and circuses. I don't know how many common people will be able to afford this. Mind you, sports events are becoming exclusivised anyway.

Once upon a time sports was very much confined to the gentry. Jousting, polo, foxhunting, horse-racing, golf ("gentlemen only, ladies forbidden" is just an urban myth, however true the sentiment behind it, a 'gouf' was a small Scottish club)....basically, you owned land and equipment. It was a status symbol.

Athletics, of course, has an ancestry that surely goes back to when homo sapiens were asking neanderthals for dates, but a strict amateur ethos managed to exclude all those awkward peasants who might want actual prizes or be seen eating crude peasant fare like lobster or artisan sourdough. Yes, those were considered peasant dishes unworthy of nobility, who would instead wonderful fare like jellied eels. Have you ever seen jellied eels? Because I promise you, the name is literal.

Anyway, my point is that the peasant, awkward divils that they could be, kind of invented a game of their own about contesting for animal bladders. It wasn't played on horseback. It was played on foot. Hence, it became known as 'football'.

The Industrial (and less appreciated Agricultural – quick shout out to Jethro Tull) Revolution effectively created a regulated working week, urbanisation, more leisure time, and the ability to travel. Organised sport absolutely flourished. 'Football' may have come to mean different games in Britain, Ireland, the US, and so on, but the basic principle still applied. They could be played 'on foot'. You didn't have to be wealthy to participate or attend.

I'm beginning to suspect that is something that has almost turned full circle.

Oh, yeah. Remember my New Year's resolution to be less cranky? That went out the window fairly fast.

ACROSS THE WATER

Is soccer reaching a point of saturation? Not domestically – LOI attendances rose 11% last year from an already record 2024. But across the water the standard appears to be declining rapidly. Yes, Erling Haaland may well be the best striker in the world, but when you look at Liverpool, Chelsea, Arsenal, and purely for old times' sake let's pretend that Man United are still up among that bunch, even though they patently aren't, they all seem to lurch from crisis to crisis. Part of that is media-driven – no offence to tiktokkers and youtubers and other such idiots, but could we have some criteria for credentials? As for the jokey 'hail fellow well met' and 'here's a gas story I remember from a decade ago when I was actually god at the game' – jaysus, Roy Keane has become a parody of himself and will someone tell Micah Richards that it's only okay to bray with laughter at your own jokes if any of them are actually funny? Which doesn't ever seem to have happened. As for Simon Jordan? Ah lad, you'll never be the most annoying little pomposity of television, Piers Morgan has that title well sewn up.

BOXING

Speaking of tiktokkers and youtubers....ah, no, let's leave boxing out of it. Best wishes to Tyson Fury on his brave decision to come out of retirement...I think this is the sixth time? Maybe we could do a tag team event. Tyson and Conor McGregor against Logan and Jake Paul. When you read the soccer in the sports section of most newspapers nowadays, you have maybe half a page on the League of Ireland and about three pages on the English Premier League, plus a syndicated piece about Lionel Messi or (increasingly rarely, understandably) Cristiano Ronaldo. And most of it will be gossip about managers. Who has been fired and who is just about to be. Amorim has finally departed Man United – that was a long and dismal saga. At some point the club have to look at their own structure and stop looking for stop gap solutions. They did give Amorim time, to be fair, but what's the point in firing him at the start of January? Exactly what miracle are you hoping for over the next couple of months? To be fair, the legendary class of '92 constantly carping in the media doesn't help, but that's not the problem and shouldn't be used as an excuse. How many hundreds of millions will the next attempt at a quick fix cost?

I personally think that Martin O'Neill has made a mistake taking back the helm at Glasgow Celtic. He did an incredible job as interim manager earlier this year. If he can work that magic again, he will be a god in that city. But the thing is, he already was a god in their mythology. What happens if he fails, which is likely enough given the starting point at his time? I think he is at risk of tarnishing his own legend.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

CLAIMING THE RENT TAX CREDIT

What is the Rent Tax Credit?

If you pay rent, you may qualify for the Rent Tax Credit. The tax credit reduces the income tax you owe by the amount of the credit. You can file for rent payments you made in previous years by making an income tax return. You can also claim the tax credit for payments made in 2025 if you are a PAYE taxpayer. It was announced in Budget 2026 that the tax credit will be extended for a further 3 years, to the end of 2028.

How much is the Rent Tax Credit?

For 2024 and 2025, the amount of the credit is 20% of your rent payments in the year, up to a maximum credit of:

- €1,000 for an individual
- €2,000 for a couple who are jointly assessed for tax

If a smaller amount would reduce your income tax to zero, that amount is the maximum credit you can get. For 2022 and 2023, the credit was €500 for an individual and €1,000 for a couple.

Can I claim the Rent Tax Credit if I live in shared accommodation?

If a number of tenants pay the rent for a property, each individual or couple can claim the Rent Tax Credit for the rent they pay.

You cannot claim for payments for:

- A security deposit
- Repairs or maintenance
- Board, laundry, utilities or other services

Who is eligible to claim the Rent Tax Credit?

You can claim the credit for rent payments you have made for:

- Your home
- A second home in Ireland that you use to take part in your work or an approved course
- A property that is used by your child to take part in an approved course, if they are under 23 at the start of the year in which they begin the course

The rent payments must be for a home that is in Ireland.

You cannot claim for rent payments on a property that you get housing support for, including:

- The Housing Assistance Payment
- Rent Supplement
- The Rental Accommodation Scheme
- Cost rental housing

This is the case even if you make a top-up payment in addition to the housing support you get.

Your tenancy must be registered with the Residential Tenancies Board (RTB), unless it is a type of tenancy where this is not required, called a licence arrangement.

This means that if you are sharing with the owner in a rent-a-room or digs arrangement, the tenancy does not have to be registered to claim the tax credit.

The Rent Tax Credit is not available for rent-a-room or digs accommodation if you and the landlord are related.

When your tenancy is registered by the landlord, the RTB sends you the Registered Tenancy (RT) number. You will be asked for the RT number when you apply for the tax credit. If you cannot provide the RT number when you apply, Revenue may ask you for it later.

When you apply, you will be asked to provide information about your landlord including:

- Their name and address
- Their PPS number or Tax Reference number
- The property's Local Property Tax number

If your landlord prefers, they can give this information to Revenue directly through myEnquiries. They should also give the Registered Tenancy number.

How to claim the Rent Tax Credit

If you are a PAYE taxpayer, you can claim the tax credit for rent paid in previous years in myAccount. You can also claim for rent paid this year if you are a PAYE taxpayer.

If you are registered for income tax self-assessment, you can claim the credit for previous years by completing your annual Income Tax Return (Form 11) in Revenue Online Service (ROS).

If you were looking for drama, thrills and spills, the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre was the place to be as two sides served up a high quality encounter with a finish that would be hard to match. This was two top quality Superleague sides going at it hammer and tongs with every ball and call contested. St Pauls were superb in the first half especially in the second quarter which helped them build up an eleven point lead. But the Wildcats, in a testament to the side that they are, came roaring back in the second half and actually led by ten, 84-74 and looked likely winners with just over two minutes to go. It seemed to dangle for an age over the rim, contemplating whether to go in or not before eventually sinking to the roars of the partisan crowd. There was still 2.1 seconds to play and the Wildcats would have possession. But with too short a time span the shot was forced and the game entered over time. But truth be told there would only be one winner in added time as all the momentum was

with the home side.

Lorraine Scanlon and Tiarra Brown exchanged early baskets before Burnham nailed a couple of free throws. That set the scene for the winning moments as Leah McMahon and Lovisa Hevinder hit two massive outside shots, and Brown on the bench fouled out also. Ahead by eight, 95-87, you would have thought the game was safe but Alyssa Frescas hit two threes of her own to squeeze up the game. But as it had been throughout overtime the home side defence stood strong with Burnham leading the resistance. With other results going their way, St Pauls now sit in second again, just a game behind Killester, who suffered defeat to the Liffey Celtics. It's all to play for heading into 2026.

Despite Tara Cousins opening the game with a three it was the visitors who settled in quicker with Sarah Hickey, Brown and Frescas all on target. Lorraine Scanlon was getting into gear inside though and alongside Burnham and McMahon they tied up the game at 15-15. The level of the outside shooting went up a notch in the remaining minutes with Hickey and Burnham on song and that left the Wildcats 24-23 ahead at the end of the first.

St Pauls played their best basketball in the second quarter with Hevinder showing her form and Burnham excellent inside and out. Leah McMahon having her best outing of the season was superb in defence but also netting in offence. Midway through it was tied at 35 a piece before St Pauls started to unleash. Burnham and Hevinder may have been the architects of the scoring run but Scanlon and McMahon were rampant also and it meant St Pauls were 48-37 clear at half time.

But the Wildcats and their coach Jillian Hayes know the ropes better than anyone else and slowly but surely they started to claw their way back into it. Hevinder was excellent in this period, actually helping her 58-43 clear but Sanja Brikmane and Brown were all busy chiseling away at the lead which had shrunk to 64-61 by the end of the quarter. St Pauls

tried to knock that momentum on the head with Scanlon and McMahon netting early but Sarah Hickey was leading the Wildcats charge and with assistance from Frescas the lead was wiped out at 70-70. For the next few minutes the lead changed hands before Brown hit a big three to push her side four clear, 78-74. Hickey made it a six point game, soon to be eight and then Brikmane made it a double digit lead. Lovisa Hevinder hit a long range three to cut the gap to seven but you would still have got big odds on a St Pauls comeback. But that failed to take into account their fighting spirit and no little skill. A memorable afternoon for all those present.

Maisie Burnham had 26, Lorraine Scanlon and Lovisa Hevinder 22 each, Tara Cousins 14, Leah McMahon 11.

For the Wildcats Sarah Hickey was best with 28, Tiarra Brown 23, Alyssa Frescas 13 and Sanja Brikmane 11.

Utility Trust St Pauls Lakers made it five wins in a row and a second win over Galway opposition when they accounted for Moycullen in the Kingfisher Gym on Saturday night. The home side made a strong start to the first quarter but Jack O Sullivan continued his recent good form by giving his side a leg up and that helped them into a 22-19 lead. They went to win or at least gain parity in the remaining three quarters and for the most part they were relatively comfortable.

Point Guard Stephen Kelly again led the St Pauls effort, his 26 points / 11 rebounds / 8 assists may have been agonisingly short of a treble double but it's that kind of form that helps a team win games. And while not every shot fell for Sam Grant he still recorded a double double and his threes were well timed. His rebounding was central to quelling any Moycullen second chances and in this regard Eoin Carroll was also outstanding. When you factor in 16 points it was another good night in the office for the Lakers captain. Minus Rui Sariava, Marko Bencic and Pablo Murcia the full strength of the squad was needed and the 2 Adams, Whitty and O Neill, again saw court time. As is their usual Mark Sheehan and Oisin Spring put their shoulders to the wheel, the former with six points and rebounds and the latter with his

usual gusto. The win sees the Lakers in playoff territory heading into 2026 and Coach Luke O'Hea must take serious credit for the way he has shape shifted his side in recent weeks.

As stated Moycullen were first out of the traps with Jack Hackett and Antonio Molino accurate and when Grant Ollson hit a three there were 8-2 to the good. Jack O'Sullivan had the Lakers sole reply but the next few minutes saw the Lakers accurate from outside with Grant, O'Sullivan and Kelly tightening up the game to 14-12. When Mark Sheehan hit another three the Lakers were in front, and indeed it was a lead that they were never to relinquish. Eoin Carroll was weaving his way in the paint and despite points from Ivan Basic and Liam Moloney the Lakers were 22-17 to the good.

Grant hit a three early in the second period to give his side more daylight and even though the impressive Ollson was on song for Moycullen, Carroll continued his good work and with the help of Kelly they were now 34-21 clear. Dylan Cunningham did initiate a mini spree for the hosts with Ollson and Hackett following suit and the game poised at 37-30 with a minute to go in the half. But a lot can happen in a minute and good work from Grant and Kelly meant the Lakers would now be 41-30 in front heading to the break.

Cunningham gave his side a fast start to the third period but Sheehan again landed from three point land to settle the Lakers in. Kellys drives to the basket were paying dividends all night and try as they might, Moycullen couldn't

reduce the deficit. Ollson thought he was making headway but Jack O Sullivan popped in another three which was soon followed by a similar Kelly effort. James Loughnane had a three and with the home crowd sensing a bit of momentum they got involved. Ivan Basic had trimmed the lead down to 8, 57-49, but Kelly produced a vital three point play which served to temporarily deflate the home crowd.

But Ollson and Loughnane soon had the crowd involved again, their early threes cutting the gap to five early doors. But that spurred the Lakers to go on an 8-0 scoring run, with Kelly, Carroll and O Sullivan supplying the bullets. O Sullivans basket particularly was the product of intelligent game management, using the 24 second shot clock to full effect. With a 68-55

lead and four minutes to go, it would take a Devon Loch moment for the Lakers to lose the points now. But there was no fear of that as Grant hit an overdue three and followed it up with a smooth bucket. Despite the best efforts of Grant Ollson, Moycullen never threatened again, with the Lakers running out stress free 76-64 winners.

Steve Kelly had 26 points, Eoin Carroll shot 16, Jack O Sullivan and Sam Grant 14 and Mark Sheehan 6.

Grant Ollson was best for Moycullen with 27, Antonio Molina 9, Dylan Cunningham 7, James Loughnane, Ivan Basic and John Hackett 6 each. No action for the Lakers again until Saturday January 10th when they face the Titans.

Warriors pass UCD test to secure Cup final ticket

Garvey's Tralee Warriors 86 UCD Marian 74

For the second time in their short history Garvey's Tralee Warriors are through to a Super League National Cup final after seeing off the challenge of UCD Marian by 86-74 in the semi-final played at Neptune Stadium last night. Marian were without the services of two of their pros in Tanner Graham and Mihael Linde but the Warriors went about their task in business-like fashion to secure a place in the Cup final for the first time since 2022. The win sets up a mouth-watering decider against keen rivals Ballincollig in the season's showpiece event at the National Basketball Arena in Tallaght on Saturday 17th January.

Both sides started the contest well with the Warriors shading the early exchanges with Daniel Jokubaitis firing in the first two scores and when Jordan Perkins and Cian Sullivan opened their respective accounts the Tralee side led 9-4 with UCD Marian's response coming from Zach Hinton and new signing Bruce Saintilus. Saintilus was in range again from inside and outside either side of a Sean Fitzpatrick basket to edge the Dublin college side ahead but Iggy Hunte drove up the lane to give Warriors a one point lead midway through the quarter. James Connaire and Hinton struck from distance for Marian but at the other end Perkins and Jokubaitis replied in kind before an 'and one' from Cian Sullivan put four between the teams with 2'00" on the clock. Perkins knocked down his second major of the night before team captain Eoin Quigley added to give Warriors a 28-23 lead at quarter time.

Olaf Michalczuk heralded his arrival on the court early in the second with a quickfire double but Saintilus was again on the mark for Marian a minute later to leave six between the midway through. Saintilus from beyond the arc and a double from Hinton kept Marian in touch but at the other end the Warriors were finding the UCD basket with some ease and Perkins, Michalczuk and Steven Bowler with an and one

combined to give Warriors a ten point lead at 44-34 up with a minute on the clock. However a Zach Hinton effort with the last score of the half pared the lead back to 44-36 as the halftime buzzer sounded.

The third quarter saw Warriors continue to pick off scores with Jokubaitis adding early from either side of the three point line and with Perkins, Dan Bowler and Quigley all on the mark their lead remained intact. However, Marian's offence moved up a gear with Hinton and Jack Kehoe finding the time and space to knock down two three pointers each and with Saintilus again finishing under the board the sides were suddenly all square with 1'30" left on the clock. Team captain Eoin Quigley stepped up to the mark to land the final score from play with a cracking major effort to help Warriors to a 60-55 lead turning down the stretch.

The outcome of the contest remained very much in the balance early in the final quarter as Steven Bowler and Quigley added before a sensational finish from Perkins kept Warriors in front. However Saintilus and Hinton continued

to dominate the UCD scoring and combined for eight points from play and the free throw line to maintain the Marian challenge. But in what were the decisive moments of the game Daniel Jokubaitis lit the arena up with a devastating volley of scores that added 10 to the Warriors tally. Sean Fitzpatrick struck back with a major score for Marian before Iggy Hunte slammed in a dunk to push the Warriors lead out to 79-66. The Warriors rearguard stood tall late on and crucially denied the Dublin outfit a score for a full two minutes before Hinton and Sean O'Flynn chipped in consolation scores as the clock ticked down. Jordan Perkins calmly swished two free throws in the final seconds to seal the deal and book the Warriors ticket to Tallaght in two weeks time.

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


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Gardening with Killarney Outlook

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Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance. Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity. Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil. to choose the right hedge for your garden here are a few pointers to think about

1. The type of soil you have.
2. How exposed the garden is, i.e. what direction is it facing.
3. The eventual height and width the hedge will be.
4. Does it need to be evergreen.

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want it is time to prepare the soil. start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around, but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time. What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. Now is the perfect time to plant hedging, however if you wish to wait until the end of March you can plant container grown hedging all year around. Next week I will focus on trees.
