

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## How to spend the ultimate weekend in

# Killarney



Amy Lynch, Ireland Editor with Lonely Planet attended the Wander Wild Festival recently and here is what she had to say....

Sitting on the outskirts of the stunning Killarney National Park, Killarney is a lively, energetic tourist hub, popular with international and domestic travellers. The town is also a perfect base to explore the further reaches of Kerry, with plenty of accommodation options, excellent restaurants, cozy pubs with live music nearly every night of the week, and tour operators to bring you to any of the incredible regional sights that you might want to see.

Coming from the opposite coast, I had never been to Killarney before my recent visit, but my first hectic visit over a long weekend was enough to convince me that I will need to come back. Even with four action-packed days, I barely skimmed the surface of the activities, views and nights out on offer in this bustling town.

#### WHEN TO ARRIVE:

Friday, early, is a great time to start your few days exploring Killarney. If it's an option, a couple of days during the week won't be so hectic, and accommodations will be cheaper. There's also less chance of running into a raucous hen party out on the town. Summer is also incredibly busy, so consider spring or autumn for your visit. The wonderful Wander Wild Festival takes place in April, and is a great choice for families, wellness enthusiasts and outdoor adventurers.

#### **HOW TO GET FROM THE AIRPORT:**

Kerry airport is a 25-minute drive from Killarney via taxi or public bus. There's also a train that leaves a couple of times a day from Heuston station in Dublin that will take you to Killarney station right in the middle of the town. This will be far more relaxing and scenic than driving from the capital.

#### **GETTING AROUND TOWN:**



Walking is always your best option for Irish towns. They have not been designed for cars, and traffic can be mayhem. Killarney is no different. Bikes are great to get you to the outer edges of the park for any walks or outdoor activities you might have planned slightly outside the town. Most hostels and hotels will offer bike hire.

#### WHERE TO STAY:

Killarney Plaza Hotel is a beautiful spot for anyone looking to splurge, and to be placed smack-bang in the center of the town. For those on a tighter budget, the Black Sheep Hostel, run by travelers for travelers, is a great option. And for something a bit more middle-of-the-road price-wise, and out of the bustle of the town center, Crystal Springs is a bed and breakfast sitting on the River Flesk.

#### WHAT TO PACK:

Bring walking or hiking boots, and raingear that folds up easily. You'll be out and about a lot, so it's handy to have a raincoat just in case – this is, after all, the west coast of Ireland.

#### **FRIDAY**

#### **HOW TO SPEND THE DAY:**

Kayaking on the lake in the middle of Killarnev National Park is an absolute must. Head out onto the calm waters of Lough Leane surrounded by Macgillycuddy's Reeks mountain range. The views are unrivalled. Irish Adventures will take you out on the lake from Ross Castle (dating from the 15th century, this historic site is worth a look in its own right). Splitting their time between Dingle and Killarney, this friendly and professional outfit run by Noel and Conor is perfect for anyone from beginners upwards. They are mindful of varying abilities, and all gear is provided. You will kayak out to Inisfallen Island, site of a monastery from the 7th century, and currently home to ruins of a 12th-century Augustinian Priory. We got lucky with the weather and had an extremely peaceful afternoon paddling our way over smooth lakewater under the sun. For those who want to enjoy the views with less strenuous requirements, there are also waterbus tours available with Killarney Lake Tours.

#### **DINNER:**

After working up an appetite on the lake, Polly's on the ground floor of the Ross Hotel in Killarney town is the perfect place to stop

for dinner and a few refreshing cocktails. This modern spot is inspired by Mediterranean food with a focus on sustainability. The housemade mint lemonade is perfect on a warm day.

#### **AFTER DARK:**

No sojourn in Killarney is considered complete until you've spent a few hours of an evening ensconced in a cozy pub with a pint, listening to some live traditional music. O'Connor's is the gold standard of such a pub, boasting live music every night. This family-run spot is 100 years old and full of charm. It's not big, so get there early. JM Reidy's is another great choice, with pizza to boot.

#### **SATURDAY**

#### **MORNING:**

For early risers, a sunrise dip at Dundag Beach will really wake you up. The water wasn't exactly warm in early April – see if you can withstand more than I can (above the ankles). It's a gorgeous spot to enjoy the early morning. Samhradh's sauna, a mobile sauna in the region, was there for a warm-up afterwards, or you could do like some adventurers and hop continually between the lake and the sauna for 30 minutes to get your blood really circulating. Check the location of the sauna during your visit; it will be beside one of the bodies of water in the region.

#### **HOW TO SPEND THE DAY:**

For those traveling with little ones – or who just like ice cream – the Cow to Cone tour at Muckross Creamery cannot be missed. The

award-winning ice cream is a recent addition to the dairy farm of John and Catherine Fleming, the farm having been in John's family since the 1840s. A tour of the farm, just 5km (3 miles) from Killarney town, involves being brought to see the calves, the milking room, the cows, and the ice-cream room up close, along with a whistle-stop introduction to the process of making ice cream. And of course it includes a sample!

The friendly family operation also sells its own granola and skyr (yoghurt). The ice cream itself is delicious: creamy and fresh, with incredible flavors. My favorite was the strawberry, but the options can change, so it's best to try a few! It's a working farm and tours don't run all the time, but you can find the ice cream in local shops and at farmers markets.

#### DINNER:

Killarney is not short on excellent dinner options, no matter what budget or type of cuisine you're looking for, from upmarket Hilliard's on Main St and Argentinian street food at Tango's, to small plates with excellent cocktails at Pig's Lane. Killarney Brewing Distillery, just outside the town, is a great choice for those who want to sample some local beer (their red ale is excellent) alongside pub classics such as wings or fish and chips.

#### **SUNDAY**

Morning: Start off your morning with a lively brunch in Cafe du Parc, connected to the Killarney Plaza Hotel, right opposite Killarney House. It has all the usual brunch options, to a

high standard (try the eggs Benedict), and will set you right up for a hike.

#### **HOW TO SPEND THE DAY:**

Tomies Wood, a 20-minute drive from the town, is the perfect spot for a Sunday walk. If you're lucky as you wander through one of Ireland's few oak woodlands, you'll see deer, squirrels and maybe even a white-tailed eagle. There are a couple of trail options, depending on how intensive a hike you're looking for, the longest taking you on a 6km (3.7-mile) loop. Note that the walk is very popular with dog walkers. Keep an eye out for the steps down to O'Sullivan's Cascade, a peaceful waterfall to sit alongside moss-covered rocks and have a break, enjoying the sounds of the water. Keep some drinking water to hand for the steps back up.

#### **NEXT TIME:**

Despite my action-packed few days exploring Killarney, I left with an even longer "to do" list than when I had arrived. I still want to climb Carrauntoohil, Ireland's highest peak. I still want to do the historic Torc Mountain hike. I still want to explore the supposedly stunning Gap of Dunloe via boat and bike. I still want to see the Victorian Muckross Estate. Needless to say, Killarney has jumped up the list as one of my favorite destinations in Ireland.

#### THE FOSSA STRAIGHT - AND NARROWER



Exactly as we had predicted two weeks ago, "the big conundrum" of two buses trying to pass each other in Fossa has come to pass! A photo taken from a dashboard camera is doing the rounds on social media - and clearly the big buses only get by with great difficulty.

The total road width in Fossa is now just six metres. Why the difficulty with heavy machinery and lorries was not anticipated would leave anyone perplexed. All that was wanted in Fossa was a pedestrian crossing, Johnny Healy-Rae told Kerry Council last week.

National roads should be widened not narrowed and the reality is that the road will be blocked as far as Cork now if lorries etc get stuck in Fossa. "The only thing worse than no money being spent, is wasting money," Johnny said of the project which was forecast in some quarters as costing up to five million euro. (The council has not responded to a query on costs at time of going to press).

Director of Roads Frank Hartnett defended the works and said the same concerns were raised about the Muckross Road and these proved unfounded.

Several layers of approval were gone through,

and it was not a waste of money,the director : Fossa, the Aras and the Green Lawn. insisted.

But Cllr Brendan Cronin has now thrown a cat among pigeons - he measured the Muckross Road that road is wider by a yard.

Fossa is 6 metres - Muckross is 7 meters. A big difference when inches are at stake.

To be fair to everyone, a look back at the minutes of the July 2022 meeting which approved the traffic calming measures for the 1.574km from the Golden Nugget to the Gap Cross leaves no one in any doubt that the carriageway would be "reduced" to 6 metres. The plans were outlined by acting manager John Breen and engineer Padraig Teahan.

28 submissions from the public had been received. No one raised the reduced width apart from the turning at the Gap Cross for agricultural machinery.

Councilors themselves they unanimously for it - did not do so either. The big concern was the turning point.

There is another startling finding from those minutes: The new raised cycleways are not designed for the road's regular groups of fast moving sports cyclists - they will still be using the now narrower main road.

Perhaps it is time the public and the councillors who, are presented with video mockups of plans like traffic calming measures? So no one can be under any illusion. This way everyone can see exactly what is proposed.

Cllr Martin Grady who measured the Fossa Road and paths has come up with a solution there is still time to move in the 7 inch curb line on the left side.

That way cars won't mount should an emergency service vehicle need to pass, Martin says.

Councillors in Killarney will earn their money this year - they are right now faced with serious questions with regard to three huge projects -

#### **COUNCIL AND FAILTE IRELAND NEED TO SPEND A FEW PENNIES**

The dire need for toilets at all tourist hotspots was outlined at a council meeting recently by new councillor Tommy Cahill who has replaced his father Michael.

The popular Lisleibane - one of a number of routes to the highest mountain - was the start and finishing point of a tough hike. But it did not have a public toilet, Tommy said.

"Lisleibane is a big hike," Mr Cahill said.

Climbers came by car from Killarney or further afield and a climb could take five or six hours depending on the level of fitness and experience. There was a necessity for a toilet coming back to the car also.

The same was true of Dundag beach on the Muckross Lake - people had no toilet facilities. As for beaches, the toilets should be open all year round as these were popular walking

spots in winter and summer now. "Going to the toilet isn't seasonal," Tommy said. Speaking after the meeting, he said Mangerton - which sees hundreds traveling from Cork each weekend - should also be included in a review of facilities.

It is three years since the need for toilets on Carrauntoohil and on Mangerton and Dundag Beach was raised in this column. The fine early summer weather this year has brought crowds out on the mountains as well as the beaches.

The council said it does not have the budget for mountain toilets or to be open all year round. Tommy is disappointed at the reply he got from the council which outlined how it already runs 36 toilets. Failte Ireland which promotes the outdoors in Kerry should now contribute, he believes.

#### **GREAT ACTION IN KILLARNEY SOROPTIMISTS**

The Killarney Soroptimists International, part of the oldest ladies organisation in the western world have had a busy year. Covid came near annihilating the club - but huge effort by a few stalwarts has kept it going. Old and new members have come forward to lend a hand. This year energetic and highly focused President Anne Wrenn Killarney SI has led a tremendous drive.

The club's annual Shrove Tuesday pancake coffee morning at the East Avenue Hotel this year for the Kidney Association and the Kerry Hospice saw a huge turnout.

The national debating competition for senior cycle girls, which Killarney SI helped revive 15 or so years ago saw members travelling to Bandon in Co Cork and to Castlebar Co. Mayo to accompany successful contestants. Tree planting to mark international women's day was President Anne's choice of a cherry blossom to represent femininity and a plaque "Mna le chéile" was placed to recognize the strength of women together - and the often unsung women of Killarney past and present.

Brigid Delaney's work with the community Killarney Response Unit saw her selected as Killarney SI woman of the year for 2025. So worthy a recipient is Brigid Delaney and such great work do her and her colleagues do - they hadn't time to finish their lunch when their call bells went. And off they went in response.

President Anne thanked Declan Murphy of Killarney Town Council and Killarney Councillor Marie Moloney for her help in facilitating and supporting the tree planting, restoring the Soroptimist Seat allowing the the plaque in the Maurice O'Donoghue park, Muckross Road. The annual mass for deceased members takes place shortly and a new president will be unveiled soon after.

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


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## Castleisland Community College claim

## TAKING CARE OF OUR OLDER PEOPLE

A complete overhaul is required of our system of taking care of our elderly when they no longer can take care of themselves according to Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People, Michael Cahill.

"Placements in locations far from their homes is unfair, undignified and often inaccessible to their loved ones" stated Deputy Cahill.

"I can quote a case in point where a patient was placed over 240km from his home and his loved ones. Availability of places must be increased

all over the country to ensure our older loved ones can remain close to their homes and amongst people they know and recognise" said the Kerry TD.

"There is also an urgent need to improve the Homecare Scheme. Our Senior Citizens are living longer and wish to remain at home for as long as possible and we must provide proper services to allow this to happen. We must also provide community housing in our towns

and villages for those who wish to reside close to the shop, the Doctor, the Church, the Post Office, etc," stated Deputy Cahill.

"The channelling or streaming of our national sports such as Gaelic Football and Hurling behind paywalls, making them largely unavailable to our older people, is a total disgrace. These people played and supported our Gaelic Games over many decades and what thanks do they get? Asked to pay an extra fee to see their own games, on a system

many of them cannot operate. The GAA have been generously funded by successive Irish Governments and should make our games available on our national television provider, RTE, as the honourable thing to do" said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People.

"Our older people helped to build this state and they deserve much better treatment than what they presently receive" added Michael Cahill TD.



### Maternal Mental Health Awareness Week:

## 4 in 5 Women Experience Baby Blues

As Maternal Mental Health Awareness Week takes place, mental health charity Turn2Me is calling on families across Ireland to be vigilant and compassionate when supporting new mothers. According to the HSE, four in five women experience some form of 'baby blues' after childbirth – but around one in seven women go on to develop postnatal depression, a more serious and long-lasting condition.

The first few weeks and months after giving birth can be an overwhelming emotional rollercoaster. Hormonal changes, sleep deprivation, and the huge responsibility of caring for a newborn can impact mental health in profound ways.

"Too often, postnatal depression is misunderstood or dismissed," said Fiona O'Malley, CEO of Turn2Me, "The 'baby blues' is more common than not in new mothers and postnatal depression can linger and worsen if not addressed. Knowing the signs and how to support a loved one is vital."



#### 7 Common Signs of Postnatal Depression:

- Persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness
- Apathy: lack of interest or joy in activities once enjoyed
- Excessive guilt or feeling like a 'bad mother'
- Difficulty bonding with the baby
- Changes in appetite or sleep (beyond typical exhaustion)
- Irritability, anger, or anxiety
- Thoughts of self-harm or harming the baby (which requires immediate help)

#### 3 Ways to Support a Loved One with the 'Baby Blues'

- Listen without judgement
- Allow her to express her feelings openly. Don't try to 'fix' things—just be present and supportive.
- Offer practical help

From cooking meals to watching the baby so she can sleep, small acts of kindness make a big impact.

**Encourage professional support** 

Gently suggest talking to a GP or using services like Turn2Me if her symptoms persist beyond a week.

Turn2Me is encouraging new mothers and their families to prioritise mental health. The charity offers up to six free professional counselling sessions to anyone over 18 living in Ireland. Sessions are available online through Turn2Me.ie and are fully confidential.

"Support, empathy and timely intervention can make all the difference. No one should suffer in silence." O'Malley added.

## **POWER UP GRANT**



In order to address this, this week the Government approved an appeals process that will give those businesses in the retail, hospitality and beauty sectors that were not eligible for ICOB and the Power Up grant because of the misclassification issue, an opportunity to register for those grants" stated Deputy Cahill. "I am delighted with this latest announcement by the Government and

support measure and I am now pleased that they can now apply for this grant through the appeals process" said the Rossbeigh TD.

"A reclassification exercise will be undertaken by Local Authorities and all businesses affected will be given guidance to complete the appeal application. I will keep you all posted on this as it develops" added Michael Cahill TD.
















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# Fossa Climate Action Group HOST WORKSHOP ON ENERGY

#### CALL FOR LONGER OPENING HOURS AT PLAYGROUND

At this months Killarney Municipal District Meeting which took place on Wednesday, Cllr. John O'Donoghue put forward the following Notice of Motion

• To ask that the playground opening times be reviewed, possibly in line with the clock change date as during the admittedly unique fine weather we had over Easter, many families were going to the playground at Knockreer in the evening to find it locked at 5.30pm. This despite it being bright for another couple of hours after 5.30pm.

I appreciate and accept that we are after an extraordinary period of good weather, but I was contacted by numerous families, particularly in the lead up to the Easter break, telling me that they were travelling to the playground in the evening time to avail of the good weather, only to find it locked. I am asking that the opening times be amended in line with the clocks changing each year, or if that is not possible that the Council staff mat be afforded a degree of discretion to leave the playground open for longer if we get a week of nice weather.

# Ireland should target the low hanging fruit in its own back garden when it comes to trade and commerce - MEP Kelleher

- Boosting exports to the Single Market and finding new global markets must be our twin priorities -

ianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that he believes that Ireland must redouble its efforts to export goods and services into the European Single Market as a response to the possibility of an extended tariff war with the United States.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs (ECON) Committee, was commenting as it was reported that the Government were today discussing a large trade mission led by An Taoiseach, later this year.

"Don't get me wrong. Trade missions are essential, and I believe a mission led by An Taoiseach is vitally important to our future prosperity.

"However, we cannot ignore our core markets, and quite frankly, with the exception of the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium, as well as France and Italy to a lesser extent, we export very little to the other Member States.

"In 2023, of the €81.2 billion of Irish exports to

the EU, €60.07 billion went to the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium, accounting for nearly 75% of all our exports to the EU.

"The US may be our biggest trading partner as a single country, but we need to make sure we harness the potential of the tariff free single market on our doorstep. As a bloc, the EU is by far our biggest trading partner.

"There is a huge market in the east of Europe that Ireland should be looking to gain traction in Poland, the Scandinavian and Baltic countries, and central European countries like Czechia and Slovakia are all considerably more prosperous than 10-15 years ago.

"It's a well-established economic fact that bilateral trade between two countries is inversely proportional to the geographic distance between them.

"For Ireland that means boosting our exports to the countries closest to us. As well as trade within the EU being tariff-free, the EU is now actively working to lower internal administrative and compliance burdens, which should make it more attractive for small businesses to sell into the Single Market

"As an economy, we need to reduce our overdependence on certain markets. That means new trade deals with countries across the globe, but it also means fostering even closer ties with our closest neighbours," concluded Kelleher.







# Good time management will pay dividends at the State Exams

#### **ADJUSTMENT**

The uncertainty about the marking of the 2025 Leaving Cert exams was ended when it was announced that the post-marking adjustment will be reduced to an average of 5.5%. The 7.5% upwards adjustment last year resulted in 68% cent of grades increasing. As a result, last year's Leaving Cert candidates gained, on average, about 60 CAO points more than they would have done before the pandemic. By decreasing the post-marking adjustment to an average of 5.5%, the average gain by 2025 Leaving Certs should be about 43 CAO points. The State Examinations Commission (SEC) will publish the Leaving Cert results on Friday, 22nd August.

#### MANAGE

The state exams begin on Wednesday, 4th June so it's vital to make good use of the remaining weeks. Manage your revision efficiently and sharpen your exam techniques. Concentrate on a final revision of your course material and practice answering past exam papers. Be organised in your revision plan. Set down priorities in the subject areas, which you intend to revise. Be patient and methodical in your routine. Don't be over ambitious in your revision planning. Take a self-contained manageable unit of work in a revision session. Cramming – extended revision sessions with too much content – is the least effective way to prepare for exams.

#### **SIMULATE**

When answering past exam papers simulate exam conditions as far as possible. Using A4 paper, try to answer within the time allowed for each question. Accurately number each question and part of question. Ensure that your handwriting is legible, that your diagrams are detailed and that your presentation is neat.

#### **FORMAT**

Attend school each day up to the end of term as your best work is done under the expertise of your teachers, who will guide you through revision and exam techniques. Be familiar with the format of each exam paper. Be aware of the style of questions and the topics examined

in each paper. Know how the marks for each paper are allocated and how much time should be spent on each question.

#### **REVISION**

As the final weeks are for revision and for answering past exam papers, avoid studying new unfamiliar material, if possible. If you have missed out on some part of the course, give that topic immediate priority. Study the topic, revise the topic and consolidate it by answering past exam questions based on it. The alternative is to omit that topic completely. In summary, an intensive revision period is the best prescription for effective exam preparation.

#### **ROUTINE**

Efficient management of your home study is vital. A regular routine is essential. Study for about four hours on each of the five weekday nights. Two sessions of about two hours each with a half-hour or meal break in between will result in good quality work. Aim to do seven or eight hours of revision spread over Saturday and Sunday. Prepare a daily, weekly and full-term study schedule. Review your progress at the end of each week. Be disciplined and organised in your approach to study. Stick to your routine and to your study schedule. Use short breaks between subjects. Avoid unscheduled breaks and beware of 'time thieves' such as excessive TV watching and prolonged social media use.

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

Good working conditions are vital aids to effective study. A comfortable study environment at home is essential. If possible, study on your own where you'll have peace and quiet. A comfortable room temperature, neither too hot nor too cold, is an aid to concentration. You need a table or desk on which to write and a hard-backed chair on which to sit. Good lighting keeps you from getting tired. A desk lamp, if available, is a useful aid to mental application. Your total focus must be on your work, so don't allow yourself to be distracted.

#### **REWARD**

Use a reward system to reinforce your progress

and to maintain your momentum. The aim of doing well in your exam is your greatest motivator but also build in a few treats. After an evening of study, your reward might be a favourite television programme or listening to some music. At the weekend, treat yourself to a film, a swim in the local leisure complex or an active leisure activity, which you enjoy. As a result, you will face the challenges ahead of you with confidence and renewed energy.

#### **CHECKLIST**

- Final term work mainly consists of revision and doing past exam papers
- Be patient and methodical in your revision programme
- Cramming is the least effective way to study
- Simulate exam conditions when answering past exam papers
- At school you will benefit from the expertise of your teachers
- Understand the lay out and marks distribution of each paper
- Avoid new unfamiliar material if at all possible
- Routine and organisation are vital in your home study
- A private working environment at home is conducive to effective study
- Beware of 'time-thieves' such as long telephone calls and unscheduled breaks

- Reward yourself for work well done

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# WHAT TO DO WHEN SOMEONE PUSHES 'YOUR BUTTONS."

We have all had those moments when someone has pushed us to the point that we feel we can't take it anymore. And, we also have probably pushed somebody else's buttons, with or without knowing it.

- Remind yourself that all is okay in this moment and that nothing bad is happening to you. Inwardly, tell yourself that this is an old emotion and that you are safe and well in this moment.

## ARE YOU APPLYING SPF EVERYDAY?

If someone told you to wear a cream on your breasts to prevent cancer, would you use it? Yes, so why are we slow to wear SPF all year round.

Factors 15 - 50 offer similar protection against UVA rays and DNA destruction but factor 50 blocks out 98% of UVB rays while spf30 blocks out 97% and spf15 blocks 93%.

You've probably heard that staying hydrated is essential—but what does that really mean, and how can you make it easier? Proper hydration affects everything from your energy levels and skin health to digestion and brain function. Yet, many people don't drink enough water throughout the day.

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#### **EYES IN THE SUN**

Too much sun can damage the eves. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems.

#### There are two types of UV ravs: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

#### UV-A

can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye.

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

#### What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

#### **Macular Degeneration**

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people.

#### Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

#### Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea. Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

#### Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

#### **Corneal Sunburn**

Corneal sunburn, called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

#### Protecting your eyes from the sun

If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

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### Cutting cost of third level education must be Government priority

- Fine Gael Senators

Fine Gael Senators have tabled a motion to be debated in the Seanad this week urging the Government to continue to reduce the student contribution fee during its lifetime.

The motion acknowledges the significant improvements made for students and their families across the country in cutting the cost of going to college and university in recent years. This includes a reduction in third level fees for the last two years and changes to eligibility criteria student grants to ensure more families can avail of support.

In addition to calling for a reduction in fees, the Seanad motion calls for a range of commitments in the Programme for Government on further and higher education to be fulfilled.

These include additional capital funding for the third level sector under the review of the National Development Plan, reforming the CAO, increasing funding for research, and identifying alternative routes into further education for the more practically minded student, particularly in high demand roles.

Senator Seán Kyne, the leader of the Seanad, said: "Third level education is a huge cost for families across the country. The student

contribution fees, accommodation costs, and travel all add up and can be a significant cost for students and their parents.

"In the last few years, we have made good inroads in helping families by reducing costs particularly at a time when household bills have been impacted by inflation. It is important we meet the Programme for Government commitment to reduce the fees over a period of time and to build more student accommodation."

Mike Kennelly, Fine Gael Senator and Spokesperson on Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, said: "The establishment of the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science has been transformative for third level education in this country.

"Apprenticeships are now more popular than ever, higher education degrees are now available outside the CAO system for the first time and we have started a new building programme for student accommodation.

"Our party leader, Tánaiste Simon Harris, began a lot of this work when he held the portfolio and

it is really vital we continue to make progress in all these areas in the time ahead.

"That is why we want to see more funding for the third level sector under the review of the National Development Plan to develop our college campuses and build more accommodation.

"It is also vital we back research and innovation in this country by continuing to fund Taighde Éireann, a new agency, that will drive competitive research and innovation funding. This is even more important in this period of global economic uncertainty.

"The administration of President Donald Trump has taken the decision to reduce funding for universities and research centres in the United States. Ireland could potentially offer those impacted a place to live and study and certainly believe this is something the Minister should be actively looking at But in the first instance if we can show research is a priority, talent will come to Ireland bringing significant economic benefit."

# KILCOOLAGHT RESIDENTS FORCED TO ENDURE HUGE VOLUMES OF TRAFFIC

At this months Killarney Municipal District Meeting which took place on Wednesday, Cllr. John O'Donoghue put forward the following Notice of Motion

• As much traffic is now being funnelled down the lane way opposite O Kelly's Villas in Kilcoolaght, to ask again that the bollard which was there previously would be reinstated. Similar lanes in the area have bollards to prevent them being used as a rat run and residents feel quite aggrieved that they are being forced to endure huge levels of traffic passing through what was a quiet residential area.

I should say at the outset that I am not suggesting traffic is being deliberately funnelled through this area, but rather that it is a by product of the traffic congestion our town faces. Residents of this once, quiet neighbourhood are being forced to endure colossal volumes of traffic passing by their houses. They are growing increasingly frustrated by this huge increase in traffic, and of late buses and other large vehicles have begun to use it as a rat run which is making the situation even more untenable. On the laneway in question, residents are again appealing for the bollard which was there previously to be reinstated. This would at least prevent traffic snaking around the back of houses through narrow laneways which were traditionally used mainly by pedestrians and sometimes by delivery trucks. They have no issue with residents own private motor vehicles but rather with the volume of through traffic. If the bollard was reinstated, it would at least ensure that through traffic had to stay on the main thoroughfare through the area. The new residential development at the old dairy site has also greatly increased the amount of cars in the area, but many of these residents rather than driving around on the main road through O Kelly's Villas out towards Daltons Avenue are turning right to use the narrow laneways. Other similar lanes in the area have a bollard to prevent through traffic and I feel it is unfair that the residents of this laneway cannot get the same. I again call for the situation to be examined to see if a solution can be reached.

### Danny Healy Rae raises Revised National Planning Framework in Dail Eireann

People in Kerry are looking forward to the new planning framework and hoping it will deliver from them in a way previous plans have not done. I am talking about people who own land, not farmers' sons or daughters because they are being looked after. There are others who own an acre beside their parents' house, four or five miles outside Killorglin or seven or eight miles east of Killarney, but are still not allowed to build. We talk so much about housing here every day. It is scandalous that people who want to build and are asking for nothing but planning permission no money or funding because they would build the houses themselves - are not being allowed to do so. It is all because of this significant urbangenerated pressure that has been thrown at them.

For people who want to buy their own house, there have been no affordable houses in Kerry. The Government's plan did not provide for one affordable house in Kerry. As regards sewerage schemes and water schemes, we are totally ruined. Treatment plants in 38 settlements need upgrading. People in places like Scartaglen, Curragh, Castleisland and Moyvane cannot build another house. We then have group water schemes in places like Knight's Mountain, Gneeveguilla, Bawnard, Knocknaseed, Castleisland and the higher areas that are without water for a lot of the year. We need to do something.

People are blaming Irish Water and that is wrong because the company is not being funded. It cannot do this work without being funded. I ask the Government to show that if it is real about building houses, it has to build treatment plants and provide water sources. To do that, we need to fund Irish Water to provide those services.




### CALL FOR IMPROVEMENTS AT ENTRANCE TO CAHERNANE

I believe the huge increase in recent years of scooters whizzing along has only exacerbated matters, There is no easy solution to this problem but I ask that our engineers would again review the junction and speak to residents to see what can be done to improve the situation.





the Riverdale club in Nenagh. The Junior Mens grade has four Kerry participants meanwhile both Tralee and both Deerpark players in the same half of the draw.



# ALL TOO EASYFOR COMFORTABLE KERRY MUNSTER FINAL

#### KERRY 4-20 (4-3-14) CLARE 0-21 (0-2-17)

I see absolutely no point in dressing it up. The Munster Championship is basically a dead duck. Fair play to Cork for playing a huge part in an absolutely cracking semi-final. Clare in the final? Not so much.

I'm not disrespecting Clare – they gave us many a hard battle in their day – but this wasn't one of them. Worse, we all kind of knew it. I made the point last week that very few of these players were even born on that famous day back in 1992; the shine of that famous Banner victory is well tarnished by now. Kerry have won the last five Munster Football Finals, and eleven of the last twelve – we got caught by a very late Cork goal in 2020 on a day where we left far too much after us.

The day didn't exactly start off in a promising fashion. Twenty euro to watch the Division One champions play a team that were a bit unlucky not to get out of Division Three? Beautiful weather, which helps, but chaotic traffic – fair play to the gardaí, who had the roundabouts in particular manned from early in the day, they were needed. No parking – look, keeping space in the Dalton's Avenue car park, just beside the Weeshie Fogarty roundabout, for people with disabilities should always be standard.

Don't even think about blaming the rally. It's a hugely popular sport in its own right, both nationally and locally, and it's a big economic boost for the town, well-organised and well-

In the end, the football attracted 13, 181, around 90% of the Kerry supporters. Football games are far more exciting than they have been in the past year or two, thanks to the new rules, but there is still far too crowded a schedule and too many of those games are relatively meaningless. Supposing that we had lost? Big deal. Back in 1992 it was knockout. Now I wouldn't even call it a bump in the road. I suppose I have to talk some little bit about the game. Don't ask me much about the second half; frankly I was paying very little attention by then. What did we learn? That Kerry are better at football than Clare? Good for you, Einstein. The Irish Examiner threw up a scary statistic. More people attended the Kerry v Cork replay in 2015 than attended the entire Munster Football Championship last year. It's not just a Munster problem. The biggest result so far this year in

terms of impact wasn't Kerry beating Mayo in the League Final – frankly, I still believe that the Ulster counties in particular were playing a bit of ducks and drakes (I'd have done the exact same with the Ulster Championship looming). It was Meath eating Dublin in Leinster. Now check how many people actually attended that game. See what I'm saying? And maybe I'm wrong, especially given the nature of the groups, but I still think Dublin will last longer than Meath in the hunt for Sam Maguire. Ah look, that's a philosophical conversation for another day. Kerry could only beat what was in front of them.

Seán O'Shea got the ball rolling with a two pointer straight from the throw-in. Clare had a couple of wides – difficult enough chances. Kerry were exerting great pressure on Clare possession and kicking it long and accurately – very pretty, but I suspect that it will be an awful lot harder to do against the likes of Galway or Armagh. One such ball found David Clifford, a clever dummy solo to fox Cillian Brennan, an extra step to glide past a flailing goalkeeper, and he rolled it gently to the net. Colm Cooper's famous adage about passing it to the net came to mind. 1-2 to 0-0, and Kerry had the start that Clare so desperately needed.

Daniel Walsh fisted over to put the Banner on the scoreboard. Back came Kerry, a lovely fluid move ended with a very impressive Micheál Burns denied by a great save by Eamon Tubridy, only for David Clfford to volley it home at the back post for his second goal. It's one of those goals that looked simple and actually takes brilliant instincts and coordination, a super finish. Seán O'Shea deftly robbed the keeper to fire over – in fairness, a Clare defender did well to get back on the line to prevent an open goal. A good turnover by Kerry sawTony Brosnan find Paul Geaney with another super kick-pass. 2-4 to 0-1.

The match programme was very well put together publication. I know, because I was reading it by then. This game was already over and we all knew it.

Good work by Ikem Agwero saw Aaron Griffin split the posts but Barry Dan O'Sullivan curled over from a very tight angle in reply. Shane Murphy was shouldered over the endline as he gathered a high ball, with Mark McInerney converting the '45, and Keelan Sexton added another, but Seán O'Shea responded with a two pointer free.

Clare lost Emmet McMahon to a black card. I watched the Sunday Game on RTE player when I got home (yup, glutton for punishment) and I don't know why people were trying to make a fuss. He clearly caught the Kerryman's leg, black card all day.

Brian McNamara pointed for Clare, but Micheál Burns coolly dispatched a third Kerry goal. Lovely handpass by Dylan Geaney to set him up. The fact is that we had been swarming Clare when it was fifteen on fifteen, let alone with an extra man.

David Clifford exchanged passes with O'Shea before unleashing a thunderbolt that crashed back off the underside of the crossbar.

Goal number four wasn't far away. Paul Geaney could have gone for it himself but generously played it across for Barry Dan O'Sulivan to dive and fist home. 4-7 to 0-5.

A lifeline for Clare. Penalty for a foul on Keelan Sexton. Again, there was no real argument. Sexton stepped up to it himself and fired it fast and hard....over the crossbar. It felt like an accurate summation of Clare's day.

Paul Geaney fired over his second point of the day and Seán O'Shea won and converted a free. Mark McInerney pointed for Clare but Seán O'Shea kicked the last score of the first half. Kerry 4-10 Clare 0-7.

There was absolutely no half-time buzz. No real spark of life at all. There were a few Clare supporters standing near me. Lovely people, but sure, what could I or anyone else really say? Dylan Geaney pointed straight from the howin. Brian McNamara pointed for Clare and two two pointer frees by Emmet McMahon (Kerry got caught with just two players forward for the first one – that's a cheap score to concede and could be enormously costly later on) gave Clare some little bit of hope.

David Clifford and Seán O'Shea kicked frees and David added a point from play after great work by Micheál Burns. David ended up getting the man of the match award, but Micheál must have been in that conversation. Emmet McMahon made it 4-13 to 0-13.

Kerry didn't have the same intensity as in the first half. Arrah, that's no criticism; nobody else did either, and I include myself.

McMahon pointed again, but David Clifford replied with a two pointer. Micheál Burns found Dylan Geaney for another score, with Manus Doherty replying. Mark McInerney (2, 1f – the free coming off a Kerry kick-out that was just inches too short) and Paul Geaney (free won by Killian Spillane) exchanged scores. David Clifford and Paul Geaney pointed to take their individual tallied to 2-5 and 0-4.

Mark Mcinerney kicked another brace (1f). Tadhg Morley had a great goal effort cleared off the line. At the other end, Ikem Agwero made a superb burst but blazed an ambitious goal effort left and wide.

Emmet Mcmahon kicked a fine two pointer

and added one last free for Clare before the referee Noel Mooney sounded the final whistle. What did Kerry learn? Basically, nothing. Sure, we looked very good in that first half, but we were on top in all sectors, destroying Clare on turnovers (especially on their kick-outs). We could have racked up a landslide score if we had wanted, but it wasn't needed. We got playing minutes into a few legs - the likes of Barry Dan O'Sullivan, Micheál Burns, and Tony Brosnan emerged with serious credit in the bank. But.... meh. A good training session would have been better all round in terms of preparation for the hard games to come. One of the few talking points afterwards was the question of whether Kerry would be going into the knock-out stages undercooked. A tough group stage will sap an awful lot of energy, but a weak one dulls the edge too much. Most people seem to agree that Kerry weren't primed against Armagh last

I disagree. We lost to the eventual champions, after leaving good goal chances behind us and coughing up an unlucky one. Absolutely we ran out of legs late on, but that's not the same as being undercooked. The Kerry/Clare game didn't do anything to progress either side, but I doubt if it did any harm either. I genuinely believe that Armagh aren't being given the respect that they deserve by most pundits.

I'm old enough to remember Clare's Noel Walsh arguing to break up the seeding system which saw Kerry invariably meet Cork in the Munster Football Final back in 1991. Both Kerry and Cork resisted it, but eventually the motion was passed. I was actually strongly in favour of it – theoretically bad for Kerry and Cork's prospects, but unquestionably good for the game in general. A year later Noel was a selector with John Maughan as Clare beat Kerry, and beat us well on the day to win only their second ever Munster Football Championship.

As I say, I was against the seeding system, just as I have always argued that GAA grants should not be funnelled proportionately to the more successful counties. But after watching that thrilling semi-final against Cork compared to last Sunday's woeful mismatch – I'm not trying to be mean to Clare, but that game was basically over after ten minutes – I'd be a lot more inclined to go with a seeding system. I'm not convinced anymore of the merits of

provincial systems. Munster hurling is great but it is preposterously drawn out, and Munster football is practically dead. Less games and more consequential ones please.

#### HOW TO SKORT AN ISSUE

I'm not going on any big rant here, though I'm certainly tempted. It's not often that you get Irish people in unison on any one topic – minding mice at a crossroads is the usual expression – but the idea that camogie players must wear skorts in this day and age is preposterous. It's archaic.

The GPA surveyed 650 inter-county players, 70% of whom felt that skorts weren't comfortable, and 83% of whom felt that they should have a choice between skorts and shorts. I haven't done any formal survey, but I can tell you heart in hand from talking to club players that they feel the same way.

Last year Britain's delegates brought a motion to allow the choice to National Congress. Meath had a similar motion but deferred it to Britain. I'm very glad to say that Kerry were firmly in support of this motion. That's representing your membership.

The top table were opposed, although they never actually came out and explained the issue. One gets the sense – and I may be wronging decent volunteers who commit a lot of time to the game, it's important to remember

that and no-one be throwing any stones from the ditch – but I get the impression that that appalling word 'unladylike' would feature at some point. Remember that Victorian adage about "ladies don't perspire, they glow"? Yeah, the fool that came out with that never watched a game of camogie in his life.

Kilkenny and Dublin lined out in shorts last weekend, but the referee refused to allow the game to go ahead. I don't blame the referee; it would be chaos if a referee in any code just started choosing which rules to implement (which, by the way, is why I privately write off any pundit who ever says that a free is 'soft' or that the referee should apply 'common sense'. It's either a free or it isn't). But well done to both teams, because it highlights an issue that deserves highlighting.

Back around the early fifties basketball began to grow popular in urban settings in Ireland, including Killarney. The boys had ferocious battles in the Parish Hall. The girls wanted to take part and set up a team – the likes of Weeshie Fogarty, to his credit, was hugely supportive and trained that team. It led to a debate about what they would wear. Skirts would be too revealing. Shorts....dear God, sure men might see a girls' legs and that wouldn't be good for the heart at all. So they had to wear trousers.

That was the early fifties. As in, over seventy years ago. Ladies basketball has moved on. It's about time camogie did as well.

The Camogie Association have stated that they are obliged to implement the democratic decision of Congress and that the matter can't be raised again until 2027. Good luck with that. Because with the public response amid the efforts to draw the various strands of hurling, football ladies and mens', and camogie together (look, I've always supported the idea, but clubs are privately worried about sharing limited facilities), you are fighting a war that's already lost.

# KERRY COMFORTABLE AGAINST WASTEFUL CORK MUNSTER MINOR CHAMPIONSHIP

#### **KERRY 2-18 CORK 2-8**

You never really know what you are going to get in the first outing for the minors. I actually think that the round robin system to give weaker teams (don't give me any of your 'so-called' rubbish, the numbers are stark) a decent run of games and having Kerry meet Cork with a very clear back door works. Remember when the Munster Championship is effectively all over if they met in a semi-final? That was it, year over. I still remember that great game between the two in 2015, we just scraped over the line by a single point. It was by far the toughest game we had all year.

That was all or nothing, and this obviously wasn't. I, and I would say most supporters on both sides, expected Kerry to win comfortably but when I looked through that Cork team, I knew a few of those names. And that's a warning sign. I'd always have known the U18s from the schools and the development squads. Personally, just to note one more time, I still loathe the age changes to U20 and U17. Adds nothing to nothing and takes it out of synch with other competitions.

This was actually a great game. Both sides will have learnt an awful lot and both sides – yes, us as well, needed those lessons.

Cork, frankly, were much the better team in the first half. They were sharper in midfield, while Kerry's eagerness to get that dangerous full forward line into play saw them drop numerous efforts into Cork's sweeping system. Persevered with that far too long, in my opinion. Meanwhile, Cork left far too many good chances behind them. Borh Wayne Quillinan and Keith Ricken have work to do, but that will suit both fine.

Cork won early possession and probed for an opening. It took a while but a sudden bust by Seán O'Sullivan carried him clear and it took a really superb save by Ruairí Kennedy to deny him. You Rory Twohig came out of goal to take the '45, but it curled away. Cork's main free-taker, unfortunately (I make no bones about saying that we need a hard road, not an easy one) had an off day, although he was rock-solid in his primary duties.

Cork were well on top and Kerry weren't holding them long, with Doah Flynn slicing through and scoring an absolute peach of a goal. Ben Kelliher replied with a free but good work by Eoghan Aherne saw Ben Corkery Delaney reply in kind. Paddy Murphy clipped over another to make it 1-2 to 0-1, a fair reflection of play.

In the twentieth minute Gearóid White fired over a fantastic two pointer. I don't like singling out any U17 as one to watch for the future, but with this guy, I have to say it is too tempting. Pure silk.

He struck again. Fellow Tralee CBS player Nick Lacey curled over a beauty and John Curtin, industrious all day, finished off a well-worked move.Remarkably, Kerry ahead by 0-6 to 1-2. After scoring one free in twenty minutes. They had reeled off five in just four.

Back came Cork, Ben Corkery Delaney with a badly needed two pointer. Kerry were playing it that bit cuter now, with White running the show, but Cork mustered a great response. Paddy Murphy picked off a nice point and Joe Miskella, not long off the bench, added another. Cork back in front, 1-6 to 0-6. Kerry finished the half stronger though, with White slotting a two pointer free and Kevin Griffin closing out the first half scoring.

Half-time Kerry 0-9 Cork 1-6. Overall, we didn't really deserve to be on level terms at that stage. Unfortunately – and I genuinely mean unfortunately, Cork basically failed to emerge for the third quarter. They were on the field in body, but maybe not in spirit. Maybe it's just that Kerry were so much more assured and soaring in confidence, but it looked like a malaise or at least a lack of belief was sapping the strength from Cork.

Kerry were on the attack straight away. Rory Twohig – as I say, his free-taking was a little off but his goalkeeper skills are questionable twice had to knock away dangerous balls and twice Kevin Griffin punished it with well-taken '45s (a weapon Cork need to get into their armoury). Twohig had another unfortunate miss. At the other end Ben Kelliher had three chances and was clinical with every single one. In the 43rd minute Ben latched onto a long effort from Tadhg O'Connell and the Crokes' man did what he was doing for the Sem all year. Gearóid White almost had another one, his rocket just tipped over the crossbar by Twohig. 1-15 to 1-6. Realistically, Kerry were unlikely to lose it from here.

Cork's subs were beginning to make an impact, though, especially a very impressive Tom Whooley, who opened his account with a point soon after coming on. He struck for a goal after Ruairí Kennedy stopped Donagh Flynn's initial effort. Whooley nearly had another. Suddenly there was a bit of renewed life in the game.

It didn't last long. Ben Kelliher scored another free. Tadhg O'Connell was on the end of another mesmerising Gearóid White run to fist to the net and White added a free. 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

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

# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

# ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an exita tiniteen nouses in an existing nousing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect".

Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.




This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.




This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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# **ANY NEWS?**

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"You have taken account of my wanderings (all my sorrows and periods of trial and distress). You have collected and stored all my tears in Your bottle. You have recorded each one in Your book" (Psalm 56:8)

Welcome back dear student, continuing on how God meets our needs. Grief, tragedy, and loss are hard to bear. When we hear of someone else's loss we pray for comfort, and console those we know and love - 'we weep with those who weep' (Romans 12:15). Some blame God for their pain or feel like He has abandoned them in their time of need. This is a huge lie from the enemy - a great warfare tactic; convincing people that God who loves them, is actually against them — all the while the real enemy secretly operates behind the scenes. No friend, it is Satan who steals, kills, and destroys - not God (John 10:10). His access point is sin — it's a landing strip for destruction (Romans 6:23). We must repent of sin and live for Righteousness — it's the free gift of right-standing with God that Jesus gives to His followers (1 Peter 2:24; Romans 5:1-11). The tricks of the enemy deceive many who believe his lies and fall into his snares. "Stay alert! Watch out for your great enemy the devil. He prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Stand firm against him and be strong in your faith" (2 Peter 5:8 NLT). Jesus paid the price for our sins to redeem us back from the kingdom of darkness. When we get to know God through His Word we arm ourselves with faith and knowledge and begin walking in His authority and power to overcome our adversary (Luke 10:19). We understand that we will be reunited with our loved ones again one day but until then, we release them into God's care (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18).

Our lead Scripture shows that nothing escapes God's notice — your tears are carefully documented by Him for He loves you deeply. Hope for healing and restoration comes through staying strong in your faith - trusting in His goodness. It's a difficult path, but the Lord Jesus understands the distress, for He endured so much to deliver you and comfort you: "....a Man of sorrows and pain, acquainted with deep grief" (Isaiah 53:3). Despair is an isolated place, but Jesus has been through it already, and if you call upon Him He will wrap His arms around you and carry you and bring you out in victory. Others may not understand the depth of your anguish, but Jesus does (Hebrews 4:15-16). You have Someone to talk to Who sees all your tears dear one (Genesis 16:13). God promises to comfort you — it's why He sent His Holy Spirit to live inside of everyone who believes in Jesus. "And I will ask the Father, and He will give you the Comforter (the Counsellor, the Advocate) Who will never leave you" (John 14:16; Psalm 147:3).

Finally, it's not always someone passing away that's the source of heartbreak. Traumatic life events can trigger past buried anguish — 'the straw the broke the camels' back'. People grieve for many reasons — perhaps a lost childhood; lost loves or friendships; or heartache for a family member's lost future hopes and dreams as a result of a limiting diagnosis. "...Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). Remember, your bottles of tears are lined up on God's shelf friend! Seeking Him more will bring you comfort, and joy will come again — it may be different to how you imagined, but don't give in to the trap of lifelong grieving - you must break all association with that demon of grief and instead trust God's healing Love and Freedom.
