

The Féile Lughnasadh was a tremendous success, the call is out for the 2025 Miss Kerry and the community in Kilcummin gather to remember Ger



Crokes return to The Cricket Field

Dr Crokes will be reeling back the years celebrating the Centenary of the Killarney Street League football when the 2024 first-round games get underway at 6.30 pm on Friday next August 9th in the Lewis Rd playing pitches.

The Street League was played for the 1st time in 1924 at the Cricket Field, Muckross Road, Killarney. with 4 teams: College Street, Main Street, New Street, and High Street.

Programme for 4 consecutive Fridays.

Round 1 August 9, Lewis Rd. Round 2 August 16, Lewis Rd. pitches, 6.30 pm

Round 3 August 23, The Cricket Field, 6.30 pm (Muckross Rd, on the banks of the Flesk River) and at the Fitzgerald Stadium 7.30 pm.

Round 4 (final) August 30 at Lewis Rd. The 100-year-old very valuable Silver Street Cup dating back to 1924 will be presented on the evening of the final by club president Jackie Looney followed by the big annual Summer Barbeque of food, music, song and dance for all club members, the club's social highlight of the summer.

Eoin Brosnan, the former All-Ireland winner and current chairman of Dr Crokes said, "Even though Dr Crokes was founded in 1886, and we had won the Kerry SFC 1901,1912,1913,1914, there was little or no football in Kerry during the War of Independence and the Civil War. Young people longed for games and the Kerryman newspaper of October 18th,1924 reported that,

Will sharpshooter Gooch holder of 5 All Ireland medals repeat the College Street win in the 1924 inaugural final v New Street on the score of 4-4 to 2-1, refereed by Small Jehr O'Leary, or will Amanda Brosnan, the former Crokes star with Kerry LGFA surprise everyone. New St were known locally as 'The Boys below the Bridge.

All-Ireland winner Johnny Buckley has mustered a fine High Street team but Kieran O'Leary his former Kerry and Croke colleague will be encouraging Main Street to spring a surprise

The Tralee v Killarney rivalry kicked in immediately after College Street won the inaugural Street League when Rock Street (later Austin Stacks) winners of the Tralee Town League challenged the Killarney winners.

Paul Russell was only 18 years old when he played at right corner back on the College Street team which won the 1924 Killarney Street League title. He impressed the Kerry selectors he went straight into the Kerry senior football team. Still, a student at St Brendan's College his first time wearing the green and gold was in the delayed 1923 All-Ireland final (played in September 1924), narrowly beaten by Dublin. He was the automatic choice for right half-back and went on to win 6 All-Ireland medals by the age of 26, still the only Killarney man to do so.

..and it all started in the first-ever Killarney Inter Street League of 1924.

In 1924 it was boys only who were catered for. The LGFA wasn't formed until 1974 and it's fitting that the 2024 Street League caters for boys and girls. The latter are very prominent at the Saturday Academies. Senior club player Kayleigh Cronin, All-Star and now All-Ireland LGFA winner as well as TG 4 Laoch na hImeartha in Kerry's spectacular win at Croke Park on Sunday last will be attending the games encouraging young girls to dream that one-day success can be theirs at Croke Park.

Very Pink Run Launched

as Lauren Shares her Story

As the launch of this year's Very Pink Run, which takes place on the grounds of MTU in Cork this week, we bring you Lauren's story....

At the end of April 2021, I found a lump on my left breast in the shower and booked into the doctors straight away. My mom had ovarian cancer 5 years previous and is a BRCA1 mutation carrier so I knew it should be checked ASAP. I sat my college exams, and then, after some delays, I was diagnosed on June 4th, 2021, with Stage 3 Triple Negative Invasive Ductal Carcinoma.

To be told I had such an aggressive form of breast cancer at only 21 years old was a huge shock. I was then told I too was a BRCA1 mutation carrier.

Due to my age, I underwent a round of IVF before starting 20 weeks of ACT regimen chemotherapy. I had surgeries in December and January, and then completed 15 sessions of deep inspiration breath hold radiation in March.

It was definitely tough having to take a year out from college, losing my hair and all the things that come with being unwell.

Undergoing cancer treatment during the covid pandemic was also quite difficult as I was by myself for all my treatments and surgeries and had to isolate myself a bit to prevent myself from getting covid. It is also quite uncommon

for someone to be diagnosed with breast cancer at only 21 years old which meant there weren't many people that I could relate to, which is why I think it is so important to share my story!

The 10 months of treatment were quite a whirlwind but thankfully, I am now finished with treatment, I returned to college to complete my undergrad in Neuroscience, graduated with a first class honors degree and I am currently in my first year of my PhD in Parkinson's research at LICC

Breast Cancer Ireland does amazing work with research and support services. I have been an ambassador for the 100k in 30 days campaign and my personal fundraiser raised over €20,000 with the national one reaching over €1 million! I also ran the Very Pink Run last year for BCI in Cork and would love to get more involved.

Participants can take part in the run can do so by running, jogging or walking, in one of three live large-scale physical events, taking place in the grounds of MTU Cork on 8th September, and in Dublin at Leopardstown Race Course on the earlier date of 31st August, and The Watershed in Kilkenny, on Sunday 1st September. Alternatively, people can also take part in a 'virtual' sense in their own local communities any time between 31st August and 8th September inclusively.

Speaking at Killarney National Park, the Tánaiste said: "It is a remarkable experience to witness these majestic birds in their natural habitat here at Killarney National Park. I've been following this reintroduction programme with real interest since the first chicks were released here at the Park in 2007. The Whitetailed Eagle is an important part of our biodiversity, but also our heritage. Their reappearance in our skies is a source of wonder and interest for local and international visitors to Killarney National Park.

I would like to thank the NPWS staff, landowners and international partners from Norway for their work on the programme. We are all invested in the survival of these rare and beautiful birds, and have a part to play in keeping them safe."


Once native to Ireland, the White-tailed Eagle became extinct in the nineteenth century. The White-tailed Eagle is a bird of prey, and plays an important part in protecting our biodiversity. Since 2007 NPWS has been working with international partners, landowners and communities to reintroduce this iconic species to Irish skies. As part of phase two of this reintroduction project, a number of chicks are being brought over to Ireland from Norway. They are cared for in safe and secure locations until they are ready to be released. All of the chicks are fitted with satellite tags so that their movements can be tracked as they disperse and establish in new areas. The chicks are vulnerable to external factors such as adverse weather conditions, avian influenza and disease, and illegal poisonings. Eamonn Meskell, Divisional Manager NPWS, Killarney National Park said: "All of us at Killarney National Park welcome the White-tailed eagles returning to nest, breed and fledge their chicks. The Park provides the perfect nesting habitat, with its old, tall oak and pine trees, quiet surroundings and an ample supply of fish available in the lakes for their survival."



Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney



Is it time for volunteers to help with the traffic?

Passing through - or more accurately not passing through - Killarney is the tale of this summer in town. Log jams everywhere and the core hollowed out, especially during the day. Weary of writing about it at this stage, my lens has been widened by yet more traffic complaints.

There is a real problem with lack of respect for pedestrian crossings, with parking on footpaths and cycling on footpaths.

We have e-scooters coming out of nowhere. Big coaches are going through red lights with people on the crossings. On a day last week a car had taken up so much of the footpath on the Park Road, there was no room for pedestrians not to mind women with pushchairs or wheelchairs.

Half the cycling path on Ross Road was taken up by parked cars on Monday afternoon.

Then there is the mess that is Mission Road. Cars are turning in the traffic, they can't stomach the delays. That's understandable but coming around a bend you suddenly are bang into a car halfway across the road as it

attempts to escape the log jam.

Where are the guards? I never see a garda on the street, is the chorus. Maybe the guards are out policing late at night but I never see them during the day, is the complaint from entirely separate people to me who walk in and all around town a lot. Is this not anti-social behaviour on the footpaths? one asked. She is right.

Well, I have already put it to the gardai they need to be on regular point duty in Killarney to ease the traffic. They would need more gardai, and are short of personnel, they tell me and they also need to be approached formally by the council as a body- executive and councillors together.

One suggestion that might be taken up is volunteer traffic stewards. People in yellow jackets who would go around reminding there is no cycling on the footpaths and taking the numbers of cars and buses running the pedestrian crossings. Much like volunteer litter pickers. They could also help with the frustration of motorists, direct them while trying to turn around in the vain hope of escape, and especially be there for tourists who would really like to see there is someone around and in charge and aware of them. Like many Killarney people in this tourist town, I am deeply embarrassed and ashamed by the traffic situation .

Green shoots

Cleo Murphy has been selected for the Greens to run in the next general election here. The Greens, under pressure from populist politicians like the Healy-Raes and other independents are easily put down and derided. Yet they have achieved much and more than some in their short terms in Government. Not that they can expect to

be credited by the mainstream parties who use them as a kicking ball. The local link bus service is spectacularly successful and has opened up movement throughout Kerry. It is a bit of a cat's cradle, but it works.

So much so, a leading figure from Kenmare who is involved with another political party told me the bus link is the most transformative thing he has seen in decades and perhaps ever. And he gives full credit to the Greens in Government.

Similarly, the grant aided solar panels are being installed and are so successful some people now in Kerry are selling back to the grid as well as powering their cars.

In the last year 1,691 Kerry homes installed solar panels. I think back to the horse nappies in Killarney- this was thanks to John Gormley as minister for the Environment. Now we have Heritage Minister Malcolm Noonan who has done sterling work, is a regular visitor to Killarney and is my number one Green. He is a true friend to Killarney National Park and it is really thanks to him there is so much investment.

He told me he has fond memories of clearing rhododendron thirty odd years ago when we were all young and there was a great sense of energy and purpose.

Greens were not popular back then either and were regarded as a bit off beat. I think it was our own John O'Donoghue who called the Greens "the brown rice and sandals brigade". Little did he realise how quickly the world would turn putting the environment and climate change centre stage. Of late, the Greens may have got too urban. But one thing that is steadily true to their eternal credit - they seem not to care too much about populism and readily sacrifice their personal careers for a longer term vision for all.

Time for a new movement locally to put pressure on for conservation issues?

White-tailed eagles have been released in the Killarney National Park again this Tuesday and it is a wonderful sight and a strong mark for biodiversity. But the Park is a mixed bag, let's face it. Down on Ross Island, a wasp's nest, a truly rare feature this wet summer, is being fenced off from the public and also protected. This kind of awareness is praiseworthy.

But some areas of the park are altogether too busy. There is a wider issue here for Killarney: More museums and places to while away an afternoon in the rain are badly needed.

The spectacular yellow fringed water lily is rampant now all along Ross Bay feeding on the enriched water of the Folly Stream, with run off from the water treatment plant, no doubt about it. We will have an issue shortly with the plant tangling up in boat engines

Like a field of yellow rapeseed flower, the lily looks lovely, much like the purple rhodo when in flower. The rhododendron on Torc and Mangerton mountains and even around Muckross House is actually frightening, it is marching through so much of the forest this summer. Speaking of former minister John Gormley earlier and horse nappies, there seems little or no policing of this bylaw. I come across the dung so often, I asked a jarvey recently were there some jarveys no longer using the horse nappies.

Perhaps we need a strong new local conservation movement as in the 1980s.



A Creative Communities Project at Rossbeigh




Bring along an old piece of red fabric – these contributions will be recycled as part of a mantle for the project's final event of the summer on 7th September.

The Mantle is a community arts project at Rossbeigh, Co. Kerry, exploring the ecologies & mythologies of the strand and surrounding through various coastline storytelling practices. From 10th August to 7th September, free public events will take place by the beach every Saturday, each guided by a different mode of storytelling. From informal gatherings to biodiversity walks, performances & art making workshops, this programme invites members of the local community and all those with enduring or newformed connections to Rossbeigh to come together and pick up the storytelling mantle, so to speak. Born in Kyūshū and raised in Kerry, her work is inspired by the earth, love, justice, cultural fluidity and the nuances of language(s) spoken and unspoken. She writes across styles and genres including free form poetry and spoken word, as well as folk, pop and electronic music.





KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING **HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

Iith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



The quest of Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin to win the British Rally Championship and the Irish Tarmac Rally Championship in the same year is on the verge of entering a crucial phase, with a round of each series about to take place within a nine day period. 

CRONIN AND GALVIN ENTER CRUCIAL PHASE IN DUAL CAMPAIGN






comprehensive eye : examination is as essential for back-to-school success as supplies for learning.

Studies have consistently linked school performance to poor vision and visual disorders.

More than one in 10 children in every classroom is estimated to have an undiagnosed common vision problem that affects their learning and development.

Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

- an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards:





WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.







MUCKROSS DUO TO CONTEST EUROPEAN REGATTA FOR IRELAND

.

Following the record success for Irish rowing in Paris, excitement is building once more for two talented rowers from Muckross Rowing Club in Killarney who have been selected to don the green jersey. Ian Coffey and Daniel Fleming are among a select group of just five male and nine female rowers who will race for Ireland at the Coupe de la Jeunesse Regatta for European Under 19 rowers. The Coupe Regatta is an annual rowing competition that features crews from 16 European countries. This year's edition takes place in Racice, Czech Republic from 9th-11th August.

The high standard of competition at the event has again seen a rigorous selection process within the competing nations. Ian and Daniel's selection journey began in the autumn of 2023 when a long series of trial events commenced. In parallel with their ongoing club training over the winter season and through to the summer, both Ian and Daniel contested several national trial events on land and water, which saw the field of trialists progressively narrowed. The final Irish crew selection was announced at the end of June.

lan is the son of Emir and Maurice Coffey, from Coolies in Muckross and Daniel the son of Eileen and Joe Fleming from Faughcullia, Muckross. Both lan and Daniel have been rowing with their local club since the age of 12 and attend St. Brendan's College, Killarney, where they are preparing to enter their Leaving Certificate year. The progress of lan and Daniel to the national stage has been supported and guided by a dedicated coaching group in Muckross, including lan's father Maurice, Elaine Daly, Noel Kelleher, Kieran Murphy and Micheal O'Suilleabhain.

The international selection for the Muckross duo is a testament to their dedication and commitment in training over recent years. This year, the rowers have challenged strongly in top national competition, including a gold medal win in the Lough Rynn Grand League Regatta in Leitrim in May. At the Irish Rowing



Championships in July, Daniel qualified to the A final of the Mens Junior Single. In the final of the Mens Junior Quad, Daniel and Ian raced to 4th with club mates Ronan Fahy and Cillian Leslie. On the third and final day of the Irish Championship Regatta, the duo were impressive winners in their qualifying time trial race of the Junior Double event, though illness was to deny Ian a chance to challenge in the final of the event.

Since the national championships, the Irish squad for the Coupe Regatta has come together for a training camp based at the National Rowing Centre in Farran, Cork, alongside crews who are preparing for the U23 and U19 World Championships taking place in Canada from 18th August. Joining Ian and Daniel for Racice are Adam Kenny (Athlone Boat Club) and Eoin Balfe (St. Michael's Rowing Club, Limerick), making up the Ireland Mens Quad crew. Richard Heaslip of Athlone Boat Club completes the Irish male line up and will contest the Mens Single. The Womens Quad and Coxless Four events feature strong Munster representation with six of the eight female rowers from Cork and Limerick. At the training camp, lan and Daniel are also in the company of fellow Kerry oarsman Sean Morris of Tralee Rowing Club, who has been selected to compete in the U19 World Championships.

Everyone in Muckross RC is incredibly proud of the achievements of Daniel and Ian, along with their coaches. Since 1996, 11 Muckross rowers have been selected for the Coupe event. Ian and Daniel bridge a gap of 28 years since the club last sent a male rower to the Coupe, when Sean Casey raced in the 1996 Coupe Regatta in Amsterdam. Sean later went on to represent Ireland at the Beijiing Olympics in 2008 along with fellow Muckross rowers Paul Griffin and Cathal Moynihan.

lan and Daniel's selection for Ireland in the Coupe adds to a very successful year for Muckoss rowing. In July, four university rowers hailing from the Muckross club represented Ireland at the Home International Regatta held in Scotland. The Homes Regatta saw Patrick Buckley (UL RC) and Finn O'Sullivan (UL RC) win gold medals as part of the Irish Mens Coxed Four crew over rival crews from England, Scotland and Wales. Joining Patrick and Finn for Ireland were fellow Muckross rowers Niamh Coffey (UL RC) who raced in the Womens Pair and Ethan O'Neill (UCC RC) who raced in the Mens Coxless Four. At the Olympic Regatta, there was also a vocal Muckross group among a large Irish contingent, cheering on all seven of the Irish crews. Some of the loudest cheers were for Kerry rower Zoe Hyde, a former member of Muckross RC at junior level. Zoe raced to a 4th place finish in the B Final of the Womens Double alongside Alison Bergin (Fermoy RC) to place 10th overall in an Olympic debut.

Inspired by the Olympic heroics, Muckross Rowing Club sends its very best wishes to all the Irish rowers competing in both the Coupe de la Jeunesse and World Championship events over the fortnight ahead. The Coupe Regatta will be live streamed by Czech Rowing (www. racice2024.cz) and the race schedule will be posetd on the social media pages of Muckross Rowing Club.





Reinstate 9% VAT rate to support struggling businesses

Seán Kelly, MEP for Ireland South and Leader of Fine Gael in the European Parliament, is calling on the Government to reinstate the 9% VAT rate for the hospitality sector. His appeal comes in response to the ongoing financial strain faced by restaurants, cafes, and retailers due to rising operational costs. "Reinstating the 9% VAT rate is crucial for many small businesses in our hospitality sector," said Kelly. "The increase has placed an additional strain on these businesses, many of which are already

The Government had reduced the VAT rate to 9% in 2020 to support the hospitality sector during the pandemic, but it reverted to 13.5% last August. "This

struggling to cope with higher wages, energy bills,

temporary relief provided a lifeline to countless businesses," Kelly noted. "However, although we are in a better now, with the current economic climate for the sector, a return to the 9% rate to prevent further closures and job losses."

Kelly argues that the benefits outweigh the costs of a return to the 9% VAT rate.

"Investing in the sustainability of our small businesses is essential. The long-term repercussions of continued closures would be far more damaging to our economy. By alleviating the pressure on businesses, we can avoid passing on costs to consumers, thereby protecting disposable income and maintaining competitiveness," said MEP Kelly.

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D, Norma Foley, has welcomed the eligibility for up to 38 Centres in County Kerry to apply for funding for older persons Day Centre and Meals on Wheels Community Care services. This scheme is being introduced by Fianna Fail Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly and Fianna Fail Minister for Older People Mary Butler and will be available to support around 400 Section 39 community organisations across the country by providing extra financial support of up to €25,000 per organisation. The funding is designed to support improvements to the physical premises for Day Centres and Meals on Wheels services. It can be used to upgrade kitchens and other facilities, and to purchase equipment. Since its establishment, the Meals on Wheels service has been vital to many communities across the country, providing approximately 2.7 million meals last year. Speaking on the availability of this funding, Minister Foley said: "I am delighted to receive confirmation from my party colleagues, Minister Donnelly and Minister Butler that so many community organisations are eligible to apply for this funding. This funding can go towards improving many Day Centres who may need upgrades to their facilities and will help these centres cater for the needs of people who avail of their services." "Older person Day Centres and Meals on Wheels services are such a vital service for so many, and many people rely on it. They offer a safe and welcoming environment where people can access these essential services as well as allowing people to engage in social activities." "People want to be able to live at home for longer, and that doesn't always mean care in their home. For people to have access to these Day Centres and essential services, it gives them a sense of purpose, social interaction, and a safe environment to meet friends." "Government have almost doubled funding for the national Meals on Wheels service from over €3 million in 2022 to over €6 million this year. I would encourage all eligible centres in Kerry to apply for this funding."

Fine Gael's deflection tactics cannot hide failings on sentencing - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Justice, Pa Daly TD, has today described government proposals on sentencing as an "election stunt".

Teachta Daly said: "Whilst we welcome judges being given a role in establishing how long a life sentences should be, Fine Gael's overall approach to sentencing since taking over the Justice portfolio 13 years ago has led to multiple failings. These ultimately let down victims of crime.

"The sentencing committee of the Judicial Council, which Fine Gael never wanted to establish in the first place, is still seeking to gather data to do its work.

"The issuing of sentencing guidelines has been slow, leading to weak and inconsistent sentences, especially in cases of violence against women.

"Six years ago we in Sinn Féin ensured that this Sentencing Guidelines Committee was established. It was based on the Sentencing Council model in England and Wales, established in 2010.

"However, various Fine Gael Ministers for Justice have failed to ensure that this was prioritised and progressed in a timely fashion by working in partnership with the Judicial Council and this committee.

"This failure has been highlighted again in the wake of the case in which serving soldier Cathal Crotty was given a fully suspended sentence for an assault on Natasha O'Brien.

"A Sinn Féin government would expedite the work of the committee and examine the need for a sentencing council, similar to what exists in England and Wales.

"We have raised the issue of sentencing with the Minister a number of times, and progress has been non-existent, making the timing of this announcement extremely telling.

"Fine Gael's credibility in the area of law and order has long since been lost. Victims of crime deserve better and an urgent change in government is needed to help service their needs."


A Hidden Identity

RSA Launches Time to Talk TV Ad

Having those conversations can be lifesaving and it is vital that we speak to loved ones if their driving behaviours are unsafe. This is an emotional and hard-hitting tv ad that highlights what can happen if we don't speak up. We hope it encourages more of us to talk about dangerous driving behaviours such as speeding, drink or drug driving, using a mobile phone behind the wheel, or not wearing a seat belt, and ultimately save lives." 

KERRY REACH THE PROMISED LAND

Ladies All Ireland Final: Kerry 3-14 Galway 0-11

At last. At long, long last, the Kerry ladies finally got past the finish line and got their hands on the Brendan Martin Cup. 31 years of hurt.

31 years of great players like Sarah O'Connor, Katie Gleeson, Kacey O'Driscoll, Mags O'Donogue, Bernie Breen, Sarah Houlihan, Aislinn Desmond, Amanda Brosnan, and many, many more being denied. That was a high mountain to climb, and a huge amount of people shared the weight along the way. Twice in the last two years Kerry were stopped at the final hurdle. So near, and still so very far away. When Declan Quill and Darragh Long agreed to come on board as a management team five years ago, Kerry were in Division Two and didn't look like getting out of it. Cork and Dublin were the queens of the sport and Kerry's glory days of the eighties and early nineties were just fading memories for most people.

Somewhere along the way Kerry had to make a choice. No, not somewhere. It was here, in Croke Park this time last year, after that

shattering defeat to Dublin. Kerry had the weight of history on them. Had emptied the tank, and to no avail. They could have walked away right then and there, and no-one, no-one at all, could have blamed them in the slightest. Or they could use it for fuel. Come back for one more go. One last tilt at the windmill. And Kerry made their choice.

Anna Galvin had a tremendous hour and she fed Danielle O'Leary for the first pop at the posts, but she couldn't quite direct it on target. Good pressure by the defence, in fairness. Galway meant business here today too. A scintillating run by Louise Ní Muircheartaigh (if ever there was a player born to play on days like this!) saw the captain Niamh Carmody notch Kerry's secod chance. At the other end Louise Ward got through and was fouled, there was a risk of a goal shot, but Galway had to settle for a Roisín Leonard score from a free.

A great Kerry move involving Niamh Carmody and Danielle O'Leary saw Emma Dineen make it 0-3 to 0-1. Olivia Divilly, probably Galway's best player on the day kicked their second point. Galway were really struggling aginst Kerry's defence, though. Kayleigh Cronin in particular was simply unbeatable. Even if a Galway player manaage to get their hands on the ball, they just couldn't find any way past her. She was the linchpin, but all of the defence were exceptional, while Anna Galvin, helped by Mary O'Connell, never gave Ailbhe Davoren the chance to exert her usual dominance. Kerry weren't playing with any burden of expectation or weight of history on their shoulders. Kerry seemed to be playing with wings.

A great ball over the top, and Louise Ni Muirchearataigh was on it like a flash to split the posts. Emma Dineen, who was providing the kind of inside option that Galway were being denied at the other end, had a kick blocked down by Nicola Ward - I acually thought the free was a bit soft, but Louise was hardly going to refuse it! A great ball in by Siofra O'Shea saw Aishling O'Connell win a more definite free and Louise obliged again. I was doubtful when Kerry started using Siofra as a playmaker rather than up close to goal earlier this year, but it was actually a masterstroke and she has been playing superbly on the forty after her long injury lay-off. Louise was on fire now and added a point from play and another free, this one won by O'Shea.

In fairness to Galway, they came right back at Kerry. Kayleigh Cronin denied a certain score with a superb block but Roisín Leoard did manage to pick off a point. But Kerry's response, just before the break, was devastating. Kerry threaded the ball neatly through Galway's defence and Aishling O'Connell slipped it off to Aoife Dillane. A beautiful curling effort with her left leg soared over the keeper's head and into the back of the net. Did she mean it or

was she going for a point? I actually think she did and that it was a sublime pece of skill, she certainly looked up to aim it. Conceding a goal just before half-time is always a killer blow for any team – but this game was a long way from over and Kerry knew it.

Half-time Kerry 1-8 Galway 0-3

Sure enough, Galway came out in determined fashion and Olivia Divilly snapped over a point. She could have gone for goal, but look, you only have milliseconds to make that kind of decision. Louise went for goal at the other end but hit the side netting – she hadn't realised that there was a free player across the square. Mary O'Connell kicked a fine score over the packed defence for Kerry. Emma Dineen kicked a point after good teamwork in the build-up. A foul on Anna Galvin saw Louise notch her sixth point, with Olivia Divilly replying in kind.

Hannah O'Donoghue had come onto the pitch by then, replacing Niamh Ní Chonchúir,and once she received the ball from Louise Ní Muircheartaigh, she had only one thing on her mind and she gave Dearbhla Gower in the Galway goal no chance. The Beaufort star quickly added a point. Andrea Trill and

Charlotte Cooney picked off points for Galway but their momentum was faltering now. Imagine looking at Kerry making subs and suddenly realising that they are bringing on Hannah O'Donoghue, Lorraine Scanlon, Cáit Lynch? Your life is not about to get easier....

Lorraine, as she has done for years in a Kerry jersey, rose high to gather and set up another Hannah O'Donoghue point and then popped one over herself. Roisín Leonard pointed another score for Galway but Kerry were in full control now and there was Emma Dineen on the overlap to pick off goal number three. Olivia Divilly (f) and a battling Shauna Hynes kicked late points for Galway, but it was all academic by then.

Niamh Carmody lifted the Cup to a massive cheer from the big Kerry support, but Niamh will know and understand that she wasn't the player we were all waiting to see. Sixteen years ago a flame-haired fifteen year old came from Corca Dhuibhne stood in a Kerry senior dressing room for the first time. Last Sunday, she walked off the field with three minutes of normal time left.

All eyes on the crowd were fixed on her, not the play, at that stage. And Louise's smile said it all.

COUNTY HURLING FINAL

Abbeydorney 1-17

Ballyduff 1-10

50 years ago Jackie Condon picked off a brilliant first half hat-trick against Austin Stacks and team captain Tony Behan brought the Neilus Flynn Cup back to Abbeydorney for the first time in 61 years. It was almost as long again before they would get their hands on it....but they have it now.

I'll admit that I was surprised. I felt that Ballyduff had come the hard road, coming out of a group of death and surviving that nail-biting semifinal against Kilmoyley. Abbeydorney hadn't had it as hard, their own semi-final win over Ballyheigue was a very one-sided affair. I felt that Ballyduff had been tested thoroughly and the likes of Jack Goulding and Pádraig Boyle would have too much for an Abbeydorney side that I felt were a bit too reliant on their big man up front. Michael O'Leary has been absolutely phenomenal all through this championship, but surely it was too much to ask any one man to maintain that standard.

He didn't maintain it. He got even better. He won and quickly dispatched a free for the opening score and gathered from Calum O'ullivan to add another from play. Paud Costelloe was always a great Kerry defender, but he had no answer to O'Leary's sheer power and exuberance.

Kevin Goulding slotted a monster point from long range to open Balyduff's account but Jack Sheehan replied and O'Leary won and pointed another free. 0-4 to 0-1, pretty much a perfect start for the underdogs.

Ballyduff had two wides in quick succession. In fairness, they were looking ratted. Abbeydorney looked that little bit faster, more clinical...hungrier. Ballyduff's plan was clearly to drop high ball down on their own target-man Pádraig Boyle – never a bad idea in itself - but Abbeydorney had clearly prepared for that and he got no change out of Stephen Egan, while the great James O'Cnnor rolled back the years with as good a performance as even he has



ever produced.

Michael O'Leary plucked another ball out of the air and sent it to his brother Daniel for another point. Jack Goulding flicked a dangerous ball across the Abbeydorney goalmouth, but Evan Boyle just couldn't stretch enough for the vital touch to nudge it into the net. You could argue that Goulding should have taken a simple point instead – I disagree. In hurling, you have to go for the chances. It's not a game where playing it safe ever works. Goulding turned provider for Jack O'Sullivan to get Ballyduff's second score, and they needed it. A foul on Daniel saw Michael O'Leary reply to keep that four point gap between them, 0-6 to 0-2.

Pádraig Boyle did manage to beat Stephen Egan to a high ball and slot it over the bar, but a great block by Nill O'Mahony to turn over possession saw Oisín Maunsell reply in kind at the other end.

Jack O'Sullivan got his second score for Ballyduff and Pádraig Boyle nailed a long distance free. 0-7 to 0-5. Ballyduff would have felt that was an acceptable margin at half-time, considering how thoroughly that had been outplayed, but there was still a bit of time to go before the break - and Abbevdrney made great use of it. Niall O'Mahony slotted a point himself. Oisín Maunsell drove in a goal and suddenly it was a six point game. Ballyduff were being run ragged at this stage and coughed up three more points in as many minutes to Calum O'Sullivan, James O'Connor, and Jack Sheehan. Ballyduff, a famous boxing heartland as well as hurling, were reeling on the ropes by the time Kevin Jordan sounded the whistle for the break. Half-time Abbeydorney 1-11 Ballyduff 0-5

There's fair steel in those Ballyduff lads. It says a lot for the respect I have for them that I never remotely felt that this game was over. They were well capable of pulling this one out of the fire. In fact, they made a great start to the second half, Padraig Boyle teeing up Jack

Goulding for a point and Adam Segal bursting from midfield with another. David Egan had a great goal chance at the other end, Keeper Darragh Quinlan did emerge smartly to narrow the angle but Egan should still really have finished it – instead, the ball skinned just wide. A let-off for Ballyduff, and they had another one when Niall O'Mahony found Oisín Maunsell, only for Quinlan to brilliantly deflect his rasper over the bar.

It was Ballyduff's turn to put on the pressure. Pádraig Boyle's goal effort was also narrowly wide. They hit two wides - Abbeydorney never gave them the breathing space for a comfortable shot. In the 42nd minute they won a penalty and up stepped Boyle....but an astute James O'Connor got behind it on the line to clear. Four goal chances in eleven minutes....but not a single score by either side. Abbeydorney, with their big lead, could afford to do that. Ballyduff, trailing by eight points, desperately needed to start working the scoreboard. Pádraig Boyle did pick off two frees, but Michael O'Leary pointed one himself and set up his brother Daniel for another. Jack Enright fed Evan Boyle for a score, but straightaway Michael O'Leary punished a foul on David Egan and then set up the third O'Leary brother, Brendan, for a point. No matter what Ballyduff tried to do, Abbeydorney always had an answer. The truth is that they made it look astonishingly easy, even against a team of Ballyduff's proven calibre.

Ballyduff did finally get the goal they craved, Jack O'Sulivan lashing a rebound to the net, but it was far too little and far too late by then, with man of the match Michael O'Leary closing out a five star performance with one last free to to ensure that Neilus Flynn would be travelling to Abbeydorney for the first time in half a century. They might well be celebrating this win for roughly the same length of time...







Kneecap was selected by IFTA's 2024 Selection Committee, including Oscar® nominated actor Stephen Rea (The Crying Game, The English); awardwinning directors Colm Bairéad (The Quiet Girl) and Lisa Mulcahy (Lies We Tell, Ridley Road); awardwinning actors Liam Cunningham (Game of Thrones, Hunger) and Bríd Ní Neachtain (Róise & Frank, The Banshees of Inisherin); and award-winning producer Rebecca O'Flanagan (Flora & Son, Viva).

FOCUS ON CLIMBERS

For colour all year round you can't go wrong with conifers and there are lots of different types to choose from.

When choosing a conifer they are usually classified under four sections. Dwarf which will grow from 1.5ft to 15ft. Medium 12ft t 50ft. Tall- anything over 50ft and finally ground cover or prostrate growing from about 2ft in height to a spread of anything from 2ft to 6ft.

When choosing a dwarf conifer it is very important to remember that it can mean two things. It may describe a slow growing variety which will grow to about 2 to 3 ft after 10 to 12 years or it may mean that it will grow to its maximum height in a quicker time frame.

An ideal dwarf conifer to choose is Juniperus Communis Compressa which will not grow more than 2 to 3 ft which makes it ideal for a mokery.

There is also a big choice when it comes to medium conifers. So remember before you choose find out the mature height and spreads. Medium conifers are ideal for shrub beds as they will give you a good focal point and colour all year round whether it is green, gold or blue- grey.

Tall conifers speak for themselves and are ideal for a large garden. Prostrate conifers are ideal for ground cover but make sure to remember that there are different varieties, dwarf, medium and large. Conifers are also ideal for centerpieces in pots and containers.

"She had heard about Jesus, so she came up behind Him through the crowd and touched His robe. For she thought to herself "if I can just touch His robe I will be healed. Immediately the bleeding stopped, and she could feel in her body that she had been healed of her terrible condition" (Mark 5:27-29).

Welcome back dear student last week we saw that as people heard about Jesus they came to Him for healing; how the demons causing sickness and torment had to leave for Jesus had authority over them as He was without sin. We learnt that He paid the price for our sins to be forgiven, for us to be cleansed by His Blood, and that healing results as we humble ourselves to receive Him as Lord and obey His Word. This is the Good News. God loves us so much that He took care of everything. We could never save ourselves from sin, death, and eternal doom. The Gospel is simple and brings freedom, hope, and security for those who will accept the Lordship of Messiah Jesus (Isaiah 61:1-3). The encounter in the Scripture above is a beautiful depiction of all mankind — our sin made us unclean, unworthy, and hopeless without Yeshua. In the context of the day this woman was 'unclean'. She shouldn't have been out - according to the law, until her bleeding was over. But this poor lady had been haemorrhaging for twelve years; her suffering was an ongoing, never-ending torment. She was utterly weak, sick, and broken. She had nothing left — all her strength and money was gone looking for help that never came.

But then, she heard about Jesus! Specifically, the accounts of those who had been miraculously healed by His touch. It struck a chord of hope in her heart, igniting her faith in God's goodness. She knew she faced being stoned to death for appearing out in public in an unclean state, but she had nothing more to lose, and her life to gain. So, she made a plan that she would only touch the bottom of the garment that Jesus was wearing. That would be enough for His Healing Power to deliver her. When she got there, many others were all trying to touch Him (she must have been battered and bruised crawling on the ground under their legs), but she reached out and touched His robe. Instantly, she knew she was healed. The bleeding stopped, and she felt the Power of Jesus. People have been wrongly taught to believe in a 'cure' - where they touch something that belonged to some godly person to get healed. It was her faith in Jesus alone that healed her, not His robe you must understand.

Something amazing happened - Jesus stopped, and said... "Who touched Me?" (Luke 8:45). His disciples couldn't understand what He meant — they reminded Him that multitudes were touching Him! But Jesus knew someone with faith had encountered Him, because He felt the Power going out from Himself, just as the woman had. Now, she faced a major decision. She could have just crept away and said nothing, but trembling, she came forward as He was still looking to see where she was. She admitted she was unclean, tormented, sick and helpless. And that her plan was to only get a touch from His clothing. Her humility, her confession and her worship resulted in Jesus telling her — "your faith has made you whole!" (Mark 5:34). This was more than healing — this was a new beginning, and restoration of all that was stolen from her — her health, her joy, her peace, and provision. Hallelujah! It's there for you too friend — call upon Jesus and come to Him now.
