There have been many unsung heroes over the past week, working tirelessly helping out neighbours, friends and those in need as we experienced a major weather event in the county and beyond.



FREEZING WEATHER CONDITIONS

/ ith the whole country experiencing a significant weather event in the past week, , Kerry was one of the counties which was hugely impacted by the freezing temperatures and snow this week.

Kerry County Council crews with the help of numerous volunteers worked to treat priority routes and there were numerous pleas from emergency services not to undertake journeys unless they were essential.

University Hospital Kerry cancelled all nonurgent Outpatient and clinical appointments up to and including yesterday, Thursday 9th

HSE staff were in contact patients with urgent appointments, such as dialysis and chemotherapy, to arrange care and all other OPD and clinical appointments cancelled, will be rescheduled as soon as possible with care for vulnerable and acute needs taking priority. Schools in the Killarney and surrounding areas remained closed during the cold spell with secondary school students taking part in online learning.

Many businesses remained closed, and those who did open, limited their opening hours.

Members of An Garda Siochana were on hand to do shopping and medical deliveries to those in need while Kerry Mountain Rescue's fleet of vehicles were busy over the last couple of days assisting members of the public in



difficulty on roads around the county along with transporting a number of health workers to hospitals and medical facilities.

In a statement on social media, the team said that there have been significant accumulations of snow on all slope aspects throughout the Reeks. Avalanche hazard is likely to be high in certain areas until thaw-freeze cycles consolidate the snow pack. The main hazard however is on the approaches to all trailheads, as lying snow and ice make driving conditions extremely dangerous over the coming days.

There were many unsung heroes over the past few days ensuring that those in need were cared for. Many were involved in pulling cars from ditches, especially on the County Bounds which were particularly bad on the Kerry side, bringing fresh food, fuel and medical supplies to those isolated by the snow and in some cases rescuing people from their homes in jeeps and tractors.

As we are now in the thaw with things hopefully getting back to normal in the next few days, the message is from the experts to heed weather warnings and ensure that you have all supplies including food, fuel and medicine at hand in case of emergency.

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FANTASTIC NEWS FOR KILLARNEY

There was a huge welcome for the news that Killarney jumped 10 places to rise to 4th position in the Irish Business Against Litter Survey.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, Co-President of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and tireless volunteer with Killarney Tidy Towns, Johnny McGuire welcomed the news.

"It's a fantastic result and we are thrilled with the news. This all comes down to the fantastic work of the Killarney Municipal District Staff and the volunteers with Killarney Tidy Towns", he said.

"This year we are going for 5 In A Row Gold Medals in the Supervalu Tidy Towns and this news will give us the momento to continue with the great work carried out in the town", he added.

"It is the ideal springboard to launch the Killarney Tidy Towns drive for 2025 and will give our unsung heroes a fantastic boost", he said.

The report, which was released earlier this week, said that a fall in plastic bottles and cans on our streets, brought about by the Deposit Return Scheme (DRS), was not enough to reduce overall litter levels in Ireland last year. That is the finding of business group Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL), whose latest survey of 40 towns and cities shows Killarney "cleaner than European norms", and rising to 4th position, but Tralee again "moderately littered" in 28th spot.

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

An excellent result for Killarney. With so many top ranking sites, there are a few which deserve a mention: Car Park at Killarney Outlet Centre, Open space, off Rock Road / St. Margaret's Road (a lovely expanse of greenery with recent planting / enhancement works) and Main Street – the latter wasn't just very good with regards to litter but is well presented and maintained. There were no heavily littered sites surveyed in Killarney.

Overall litter levels were on a par with 12



months ago. In all, 60% of the towns and cities surveyed were deemed 'clean'.

On a positive note, 2024 saw a further fall in the number of sites within cities and towns that were deemed 'litter blackspots', which suggests that local authorities were generally more effective in tackling urban dumping and in addressing sites that IBAL had previously highlighted.

The survey also revealed a near-50% fall in the prevalence of plastic bottles and cans in the 500+ sites monitored since the Deposit Return Scheme was introduced last year.

"We are definitely seeing cans and bottles disappear from our streets, which is very welcome – not only are they unsightly, but the bottles contribute to the very real problem of plastic pollution. However, it is clear from our survey that people continue to discard a wide range of litter types with flagrant disregard for their surroundings," says Conor Horgan. Killarney have not the most common litter types, ahead of plastic

bags and coffee cups, which were present in over 20% of sites.

"The DRS was one of a number of structural measures broached by the last government as part of its environmental agenda, with knock-on benefits in terms of litter. A ban on disposable vapes and a coffee cup levy were others.

"The need for such measures is evident in the stubbornly low penetration levels of refillable coffee cups and the proliferation of highly damaging vape litter, which cannot be recycled. If we are to see sustainable improvement nationwide, it is important that the incoming regime maintain the momentum on anti-litter legislation."

Killarney, which outlawed disposable coffee cups in 2023, was one of the most improved towns last year, rising from 14th in the rankings. "Given the evident success of this initiative in Killarney, it is perplexing why other towns have not yet followed suit," commented Conor Horgan.

New for 2025 is for the Youth Theatre Grant which is administered in

collaboration with Kerry Local Creative Youth Partnership. Not-for-profit companies and organisations with new and established youth theatres are invited to apply.

'Our Arts Grants and Bursaries support talented artists throughout Kerry. Funding the arts is an investment in our communities and culture, and we encourage arts organisations, artists, schools and youth theatres to avail of this funding opportunity', stated Arts Officer, Kate Kennelly.

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
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A calendar to celebrate the seasons of nature



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UP DEV!

I have never had much time for "Dev", as my mother would call him, before switching the radio down, whenever he came on.

No one of my generation, especially in Kerry can write about De Valera without first dealing with family history. Politics was personal and passionate and it prevailed over our lives.

Young women - and men too - shuddered increasingly at the picture of the ideal woman by the founder of the State.

There was anyway a particularly dim view of Dev in our house. He had a bad start. In March 1922 the month of my mother's birth, he had delivered an inflammatory speech in Killarney about brother fighting brother. That set him in aspic.

In the schoolyard in Fossa School in the 1930s she would have to shout "Up Dev!" with everyone else. Or be surrounded and pay for it. At home in Lismongane - where Michael Collins was much lamented and the whole war of independence, Civil War and what came after it and the teaching of everything through Irish was much criticised - she would be interrogated about whether she had joined in shouting for De Valera. An only child, she couldn't win. She had enough of Dev. And we with her.

But of late and at a remove from all of it, I am wondering if in fact we should pay more attention to De Valera, this country's longest serving leader. Life taught him to measure his words. He became an advocate of peace, not war. His strict policy on neutrality now strikes me as not only adhering to a difficult principle, but long-sighted. Offering sympathy to the German ambassador on the



death of Hitler, an act for which he was much criticised at home and abroad - criticism he anticipated, paid dividends.

Just over a decade afterwards, we had the first international investment - German investment - in Killarney, and elsewhere.

I am struck by Dev's practical wisdom especially in the light of the intemperate language by our current political leaders mouthing off from the moral high ground as if they were all on a student march in the 1980s.

Now like the Skibbereen Eagle with barely a naval ship to our name, having stood up to the tsar of Russia, we find ourselves having to stand by and watch as massive Russian warships hover over our Atlantic cables. Trump's close friends, the Israelis, who are so strong in the IT and pharma industry, are no longer friendly.

We might do worse in 2025 than "turning" to the policies of the more reticent Dev.

A ROOM WITH A VIEW

The closure of Columbanus when the new nursing unit comes on stream will most likely lead to the closure too of the local registry office, a fairly dull building which has had no investment from the HSE.

Is it time to consider the Community Hospital as a new registry and community centre? We badly need meeting places for large groups like the women's shed within the town perimeter and the old District would be ideal for weddings with lovely views etc.

The prospect of two more empty HSE owned buildings is very real. The marriage registry office, with plenty parking could also be put into the main Columbanus, Cllr Marie Moloney pointed out to me.

Now on the health forum, Marie, has been mulling over the prospect of empty buildings and is to keep it on the agenda.

"We can't afford another St Finan's," Marie said. "We need to identify uses."

St Finan's looms over the town empty and "going to wreck and ruin" and this situation is even more unacceptable if joined by other HSE owned landmark buildings, she said.

The wards in Columbanus, the old county home, are huge and would easily be converted into venues for large gatherings such as the women's shed. Besides, the stone building would be an attractive venue for civil marriages, Marie thinks.

Meanwhile, the new 130-bed community nursing unit is almost complete.

Should the council initiate public consultation? They did it for Tralee with the Denny site.

THE KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK - BIG PLANS

Three separate planning applications are now lodged by the National Parks and Wildlife Service for Killarney.

A new education centre on a six-acre site centring on 19th century converted stables opposite Torc Waterfall is planned.

The raised cycle and walkway platform involving viewing points over the middle lake to run for close to one km between Dinis and Torc along the N71 is also before the local authority.

And there is a third proposal by the NPWS for the change of use of the Friars' Glen guesthouse on the Mangerton Road - which apparently has been bought by either the NPWS or the Trustees - to an administrative building.

The Torc education centre plans is for 'a fully immersive' education centre where students will be ferried by minibus to and from Killarney town, 7 kms away.

This follows the decision by the NPWS to close the park's only education center run in conjunction with the Kerry Education Service at Knockreer House in the Demesne.

The new centre will promote a "hands on" approach for primary, postprimary schools and third level institutions.

Kerry County Council planners have queried the need for the

relocation from Knockreer in pre-planning meetings.

Meanwhile, I would not be putting money on the success of the $915m \log x \ 3m$ wide raised platform walkway and cycleway from Dinis car park to Torc. The application, lodged a year ago, and still only being finalised, would provide a safe cycle and walk path parallel to the N71 road.

136,000 cyclists and walkers used the N71 section in 2023.

However, environmental consultant Peter Sweetman is strongly objecting.

The site is a special area of conservation (SAC) and the development will involve bringing tonnes of steel, concrete, precast concrete slabs and other materials into a sensitive area, Mr Sweetman said. If such a walkway is given the go ahead, "then anything can be built on an SAC", he told me. He is preparing to go to Bord Pleanala and to take a judicial review if necessary .

is asking older people across Ireland to seek any support they need during the cold snap

ALONE, who support thousands of older people across the whole country are monitoring the weather very closely and are checking with older people they support across all areas. Met Eireann have issued a yellow weather warning for the whole country as temperatures are set to plummet to -3 degrees or lower in many areas with the middle of the country being the most severely impacted and upgraded to an orange warning from Saturday.

The organisation, that enables people to age at home, is asking older people across the country to look for support they may need and for others be aware of older people in their communities who may be challenged, or more isolated because of the cold snap. Cold weather events cause excess winter deaths, so it is a public health issue to all of us to be aware of. Slips, trips and falls in over 75s can have serious even fatal consequences, with an average of 20% of older people dying within a year of a hip fracture. Cold snaps also result in increased amounts of lung infections weeks afterwards. We want older people to get the support they require.

ALONE is recommending older people to:

· Keep the heating on in their home, especially in the rooms that they



use the most

- · Eat and drink hot food and beverages to stay warm, perhaps even using the microwave if there is a concern around energy efficiency.
- · Wear more than one layer of clothing to stay warm.
- · Avoid making journeys that involve going outdoors particularly in counties affected by the snow-ice warning.
- · If using an electric blanket, check for signs of wear and tear if the blanket is old and damaged, do not use it under any circumstances.
- · Keep in touch with friends and family to let them know if you need any practical support such as picking up fuel, medicines and groceries.

t approximately 7am on Monday, 6th January, emergency services were called to the Tralee Sports Complex, following the collapse of the roof of the Sports Hall.

The building, which was closed at the time, was secured by the emergency services and the building and grounds have been closed to the public. It is intended to carry out an assessment of the building to determine the next steps.

Opened in 1977 Tralee Regional Sports & Leisure Centre (Tralee Regional Sports & Leisure Company Limited by Guarantee) is a unique cooperative venture owned by Kerry County Council and the Kerry Education & Training Board. The Centre is managed by Tralee Regional Sports & Leisure Centre Limited by Guarantee on a not-for-profit basis.

The Sports Centre attracts over 300,000 visits each year and is currently in the process of upgrading many of the dry sport facilities including a recent installation of a new sports hall floor. The facilities include: 25m swimming pool, 12.5m learner's pool, 830 sq metre sports hall, fully equipped gym, squash courts x 2, handball / racquetball courts x2, seven a side astroturf pitch, five a side astroturf pitch x2.



The eight award winners are:
Patsy McCarthy was honoured for saving the life of 76-year-old John Carroll, and his dog Oscar, when the river Feale in Killocrim burst its banks on November 23rd. Lorraine, John's daughter, nominated Patsy for a Fexco Kerry Heroes award.

The outdoor staff of Kerry County Council and the members of the Local Inter Agency Response Team, which also includes Gardai, Fire Service, ESB and Civil Defence, have been honoured for their response in weather emergencies including dealing with the aftermath of storms.

Garda Mark Cushen and Garda Ryan Hill have been nominated by Jocelyn, Mark's daughter, for helping save the life of a sevenweek-old old baby in August. Baby Precious's mother Donna O'Loughlin is convinced the Listowel-based gardaí made all the difference in Precious being alive today. One evening in August, Donna and her partner Joe had finished feeding Precious at their home in Athea when she became unresponsive. Donna rang Listowel Garda Station; Garda Cushen and Garda Hill managed to get Precious to University Hospital Kerry where she made a full recovery.

Ciara, Saoirse and Laoise Murphy were nominated by their teacher in Presentation Secondary School, Tralee, Helena Madigan, for their innovative medical emergency app - ACT. ACT is a medical emergency app designed to revolutionise ordinary people's response to medical emergencies, i.e. non-medical professionals and emergence response workers. The app s integrates crucial features to provide swift and effective aid during critical emergency situations. The girls have worked with the RDI Hub in developing the app.

Mike Moriarty nominated members of the local community in Fenit for saving his life when he had a cardiac arrest on November 16th. Mike was clinically dead for 20 minutes. Una Forde, Cara McMorrow Moriarty, Terry Sheehy, Denise Lynch and Josh Lynch were part of the community who

helped save Mike's life that day and have been honoured in Fexco Kerry Heroes Awards 2024.

Brendan O'Brien, who's chair of Tralee Tidy Towns, is honoured for leading a dedicated group of committed volunteers in achieving success both locally and national in the Tidy Towns competition. Sergeant Eileen O'Sullivan nominated Brendan for his role in Tidy Towns and for his involvement with other community organisations including Curraheen Community Council and the GAA.

Jean O'Sullivan from Tuosist was nominated by her daughter Rebecca for the dedicated love and care she gives to her son, Rebecca's younger brother, Michael. 12 -year-old Michael has additional needs and Jean has become deeply involved with his school, St Francis' Special School in Beaufort, and helps many families whose children have additional needs. Her event, Training with the Stars, has become renowned throughout the county and in GAA circles, for its successful fundraising for St Francis'.

The Kerry Senior Ladies and Management have been honoured for winning the All-Ireland for the county, after a 31-year wait. Their triumph, the fruit of hard work, commitment, diligence, plus sporting flair and prowess, has inspired the county and promoted the importance of women in sport.

Kerry's college hopefuls can be very optimistic about the 2025 CAO application season

PROMISING

As a new year dawns, college applicants must focus on the CAO form as the deadline looms large. Indeed, 2025 is looking very promising for CAO applicants. The outgoing Government already committed to easing the pressure on points' requirements by making more places available in some very competitive courses. Hopefully, most of these new courses as well as many more in other disciplines will be available to 2025 college applicants.

PROSPECTS

Last year, CAO received 83,537 applications – 2,362 from Kerry – for a third level college course. More than 52,000 college places will be available next August. The prospects of securing one of the precious places is very good as many initial applicants opt instead for PLC courses, Tertiary Degrees, Apprenticeships, Traineeships or study abroad. Applicants have until 5pm on 1st February to submit a completed application form. So, use the remaining weeks wisely. Carefully consider your course choices. Follow your heart but keep an eye on the jobs market.

STATISTICS

In total, 51,534 applicants accepted a CAO college place in 2024. 45,547 applicants accepted an offer at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) where demand is always strong. 5,987 applicants accepted an offer at Level7/6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates) where interest continues to decline. CAO always issues more offers than there are places available in anticipation of a level of refusal by applicants. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/6), so it's well worth filling in both lists. Indeed, with good research and due care with the application, it's not very difficult to secure a higher education course.

POINTS

Grades' inflation considerably increased course points requirements during the past five years but it's very likely that the post marking adjustment of Leaving Cert raw scores will be reduced in 2025, with a consequent reduction in points requirements. Consult the 2024 cut off points as a guide to likely points requirements in 2025, but keep in mind that points' requirements for courses can fluctuate from year to year, so predicting cut off points is an inaccurate science. Each Leaving Cert candidate should aim to achieve her/his best possible result in that exam. Points' requirements for courses will take care of themselves in due course.

CAO ROLE

The CAO processes applications for admission to undergraduate courses in third level colleges

in Ireland. Every public sector university, college and institute in the country, as well as a number of private colleges, participates in the CAO system. An applicant may choose from the entire range of courses in the CAO Handbook 2025. The courses are categorised as 'Level 8' or 'Level 7/6'. The 'Level 8' category contains the Honours Bachelor Degrees while the 'Level 7/6' category contains Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/ Higher Certificates.

SINGLE APPLICATION

All you have to do is submit a single application to compete for one of the available third-level places. The interactive online application system, 'Apply' has made the process very straightforward. 'Apply' is easy to follow, particularly as the CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo Facility' to enable you make a trial application. The CAO Handbook 2025 also contains detailed easy-to-follow information on how to apply for the courses on offer. The interactive online application service will remain open on the CAO website, www.cao.ie, until 5pm on 1st February. The fee is €30, if you apply by 20th January and €45 thereafter until the 1st February.

STUDY THE 2025 HANDBOOK

Before you apply, study the online CAO Handbook 2025 - PDF Format or Personalised - which explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

STRENGTHS

Consult the CAO Handbook 2025 for information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements and content of courses. Similar information can also be found on colleges' websites. Consider the potential career value of each course for which you are applying. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few weeks. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling, enjoyable and successful college experience. Good luck with your 2025 CAO application.



CONSIDERING BE SHOULD YOU SWITCHING YOUR MORTGAGE

Yes, because some of the Irish mortgage lenders have much lower mortgage interest rates compared to others. There has been a lot of discussion recently in the media recently as regards mortgage switching this is because there can be a very substantial difference in interest rates and monthly repayments between lenders. For example on a mortgage of €250,000 over 30 years based on a property value of €320,000 and comparing current 3 year fixed interest rates. One lender is as low as slow as 2.20% (2.63% APR) which costs €950 per month whereas another lenders 3 year fixed rate is as high as 3.00% (APR 3.90%) monthly repayment €1,055 per month. The monthly repayment for the lender with the higher rate is a staggering €105 per month more expensive. 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












SIX QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF THIS YEAR

GETTING FIT

Getting fit can be a very rewarding journey. The following are some practical tips to help get you started.

Set Clear Goals – set specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound (SMART) goals. For example, "I want to run a 5K in three months" is more effective than simply saying, "I want to get fit."

Create a Routine – establish a schedule of days/times for you to work out each week, and stick to them, just like any other appointment. Remember if you're new to exercise, begin with shorter sessions and gradually increase intensity and duration to avoid injury and burnout.

Make it Enjoyable – make sure to choose activities you enjoy, it's easier to exercise when you are doing something that you like and look forward to. And even then, it is nice to mix things up to prevent boredom.

Nutrition Matters – eat a balanced diet including fruits, vegetables, lean proteins, whole grains, and healthy fats. Plan meals to ensure you're nourishing your body properly. And make sure to stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water throughout the day, especially before, during, and after your workouts.

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WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, : a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated. Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

Risk of falls

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75.

Risks for children

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Driving risks

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.



New Govt must use opportunity to radically alter planning process to achieve housing targets

- Gold Plating of EU Regulations must end to allow us to house all of our people -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said the next Government must use the opportunity of a change in administration to radically alter the planning and permitting processes in Ireland's housing system.

Kelleher, an MEP for Ireland South, was commenting after meeting with and engaging with homebuilders and developers over recent weeks who outlined that, on average, it takes longer for a new housing development to go through the planning process than it does for the physical homes to be actually built.

"Progress has been made and it is clear that we will hit 40,000 homes in 2025. However, I do not believe the current system will ever be capable of reaching the 60,000 plus homes that we need to stabilise our housing system and address the housing crisis.

"The reform of the Planning Act helped in recent years, but we need to go further. I worry that the planned investment in water infrastructure will not deliver tangible results due to delays in permitting and planning.

This is an essential component of delivering homes in regional and rural Ireland.

"I have repeatedly called for Ireland's lethargic planning and permitting system to be overhauled. It is holding us back as a society. Now is the time to do it; a new government with a new, stronger mandate must grasp this issue, and finally address it.

"There are many in Ireland who would lay the blame on the EU for the slow and lethargic systems we deal with in Ireland. This is far from reality. "The gold-plating of regulation in Ireland is a decision of Irish authorities. Over the last five years, I've seen how other Member States apply European regulations, and they are not as onerous as they are in Ireland. "We have a generational chance, with a new government, to change how we build in Ireland. We owe it to our people to use this opportunity to secure their housing future," concluded Kelleher.

MANOR MEDICAL CENTRE

Kerry Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill has raised the possibility of duplicating a Medical service around the county, that is already operating a successful model in Tralee. Deputy Cahill advises that he has been receiving reports of excellent health outcomes, low waiting times and very good accessibility at the Manor Medical Centre in Tralee from constituents.

"I have received reports of patients receiving excellent health care in a time efficient manner at the Manor Medical Centre over Christmas and New Year, a time when not all medical practises were open and visits to Accident & Emergency could take many hours, up to 36, 48 and much longer. If this medical model is working well and based on the reports that I have received during the Christmas period, there should be no reason why we could not arrange further such centres in Listowel, Kenmare, Cahersiveen, Dingle and Killarney" stated the Kerry Deputy.

"We are all aware that the rise in respiratory illnesses has put huge additional pressures on the Emergency Departments in University Hospital Kerry and I am aware of a number of cases whereby individuals living half an hour from Tralee went to Manor Medical Centre, were seen by a Doctor, received their prescription, went to a pharmacy where they ordered and got their prescription and were back home within an hour and a half from the time they left the family home" said Michael Cahill TD.

"Best practice models should be duplicated where possible in order to deliver the best possible outcomes for our sick and vulnerable" stated Michael Cahill, Kerry's newest member of Dáil Éireann.

"Your health is your wealth, as they say and I will be prioritising University Hospital Kerry, a Minor Injuries Clinic for Killarney, a Primary Care Centre for both Cahersiveen and Killarney and the list goes on" added Deputy Cahill.

GREAT NEWS FOR BEAUFORT

Kerry's newest County Councillor, Fianna Fáil's Tommy Cahill, was today delighted to announce that the long awaited repair and refurbishment of the road from Beaufort Bridge to just beyond the junction with the Beaufort Bar, will commence in the 2nd week in January 2025. This will be a top tarmacadam finish, will be lined along with signage and will be mainly funded by Uisce Éireann.

"I'm delighted that my first welcome as Councillor is for the reinstatement of this important road from Beaufort Bridge to just beyond the Beaufort Bar junction. This is a project that my father, Michael Cahill as a Councillor pushed hard for the people of Beaufort as the road was left in a terrible state following pipe replacement there" stated Councillor Tommy Cahill.

"I am delighted as well that works have already commenced on the extension to Churchtown Burial Ground, also in Beaufort. Another project that my Dad was deeply involved in, facilitating mediation meetings, etc, which ensured that the people of Beaufort can continue to have the remains of their deceased loved ones buried in their home parish" said Councillor Cahill.

"These are 2 very important projects for Beaufort" added Councillor Tommy Cahill. Both announcements were also welcomed by Deputy Michael Cahill, Kerry's newest member of Dáil Eireann.

New EU Law leaves Irish pensioners out in the cold - Ní Mhurchú

A new EU law came into force last week which prevents local councils from helping pensioners to repair and replace their gas or oil based heating systems when they break down. Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has labelled moves by the EU Commission to stop local authorities giving grants for our pensioners to replace their oil and gas heating systems when they break as cruel and petty.


Ní Mhurchú has called on the European Commission to re-think these new EU laws which came into force in Ireland on January 1st this year.

Before January 1st, Local Authorities across the country could help our pensioners to replace a gas or oil heating system under the Housing Aid for Older People Grant. This is an essential fund that Local Councils use to repair and improve the condition of vulnerable older pensioners homes in the community.

Vulnerable pensioners could get their broken gas and oil burners fixed or replaced. Under the revised Directive on the Energy Performance of Buildings, grants cannot now be allocated for heating systems powered by natural gas, oil or coal.

As Ireland experiences sub-zero temperatures, Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has described this as an unintended consequence of what is otherwise a positive directive. "This EU law was agreed before my time. Most pensioners have gas or oil-based heating systems. This grant helped them to repair them or replace them when they became old and obsolete. A renewable replacement is not always an option in this case due to costs and construction works. Whilst I understand that we should not be investing in fossil fuels, surely in this case there must be a realisation that there is no alternative and that we cannot leave the vulnerable pensioners with substandard heating systems"

Ní Mhurchú will raise the issue with the EU Commission and will work with the new incoming government in order to raise this issue at the highest levels in the European Union

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

UTILITY TRUST ST PAULS VS KILLESTER

The biggest game in St Pauls history comes this Saturday when they face Killester in the semi final of the Paudie O Connor National Cup. The cup is of course named after one of Killarney's greatest sons, the pioneering Irish International who changed the face of Irish basketball in the late 1970s. It was Paudie who of course introduced the first American players to the country and started a revolution in the game whose benefits are still being felt today. Outside of that he has also been lauded as one of the best Irish basketball players ever. He grew up only a stone's throw away from where James Fleming was reared and that gives St Paul's cup run some special reticence. They find themselves in the last four alongside the top three in the league at this juncture and despite being ranked lower in the league they are there on merit.

They face Killester, a formidable unit who sit third in the Superleague table with a 70% win record. They accounted for UCC The Address Glanmire in a low scoring quarter final tussle, trailing heading into the final guarter but a Samantha Haiby inspired charge got them over the line. Haiby has been outstanding this season for the reigning league champions averaging 23 points per game and will be a big influence in this clash. Irish International Michelle Clarke is another serious operator, second only to Haiby in the scoring stats while Destiny Strother gives her US compatriot strong support. Hannah Thornton returned to the squad in mid November and her performance levels are steadily climbing. One area of concern for Killester has been the fitness of leva Bagdanaviciene who has sat out the last two weeks and they will be moving heaven and earth to give her a chance of playing.

For James Fleming the season has been a mixed bag. There have been huge cameos of quality that show they can compete with the country's best and the league clash with Killester is probably the best example of that. They put in a tremendous performance for thirty five of the forty minute clash and led by five. But they just fell short in the end, a trend that continued against the Liffey Celtics and Waterford Wildcats. In their quarter final win over Trinity Meteors they brewed up the perfect storm of defensive intensity and offensive efficiency to grab an epic win. The squad he has assembled gives him flexibility with Alex Wittinger, Megan Ormiston and Gracen Kerr handing him a selection headache. The influence of Lorraine Scanlon is still huge and alongside Denise Dunlea Siofra O Shea and Meabh Barry they are the heartbeat of the squad.

Mathilde Diop will give Killester a different conundrum as she didn't face them in that league clash. The lionhearted Lynn Jones stood up to the plate against Glanmire at the weekend and alongside Meabh Barry they are the ultimate team players. It is a tough task for St Pauls but they have shown the necessary quality at plenty stages of the league season. It'll be a case of getting all the moving parts right on the night. It's that time of year. Snow piling up outside the door, a fire crackling in the stove, and yours truly in reflective mood. I had planned to give my take on the Dr. Crokes versus Errigal Ciarán and Austin Stacks versus Ballinderry Shamrocks semi-finals. I wasn't travelling to either – are you kidding me? I'm not stepping outside the front door in this weather. I am not that soldier.

As it happens, I'm not really giving a rundown of either game. Dr.Crokes versus Errigal Ciarán was postponed for a week. Quite rightly, and for once, I will praise the GAA for making that call early enough for supporters to know. I've no great time for this idea of pitch inspections on the morning of the game - if it's in that much doubt already, call it off already. It's one of those things where the risk if you get it wrong vastly outweighs any rewards. Of course, the fact that the playing schedules are so congested that there is very little room for manoeuvre (or rest and recovery) is a different and I would say more urgent problem. The GPA came out with some sort of claim that no players were to train or play games for the month of November. Sure. No problem. Let me just go out and get a couple of flying pigs first.

I would like a no contact month. December 20th to January 20th. Nothing. No challenge games, no training sessions, nothing. As with so much of the GAA, it would be completely unenforceable, but it would at least send a proper message. Newsflash, Irish weather is not great in January.

I'm also not doing a big rundown on Austin Stacks versus Ballinderry Shamrocks. I watched it on TG\$ You Tube and I listened to Radio Kerry's very good coverage of the game. So why am I unwilling to do a full (albeit inadequate and mostly guesswork) analysis of it? Because it was absolute gack. Truly hideous. At one point deep in the first half, there were 26 players in Ballinderry's half of the field. Totally negative. I actually like Austin Stacks; I genuinely have great respect for them as a club. As has ben their wont in recent years, they defended very well. I thought Dylan Casey outstanding. Joey Nagle pushed forward impressively. Jack O'Shea has calmed down about his ball-carrying sprints - I was never sure about his actual defensive abilities - but he marshalled a shield around the half back line very well. Joe O'Connor was a massive loss, no question about that. But up front.... Paddy Lane just seems to be getting better and better. Cian Purcell - he has been a real stand-out player for me all year - showed really well. But a half-time score of 0-4 to 0-2 tells you a lot. Stacks led by 0-6 to 0-5 and then just completely ran out of steam. Kerry lost a lot of games to Dublin in the closing minutes of big games. Last year we did the

same against Armagh. Now Stacks ran out of legs against a Northern team. Is it a trend or merely coincidental? I'm certainly not dismissing it out of hand.

I watched the game. All of it. In a way, it feels like an achievement. The Stacks supporters who actually went and watched it....soldiers are given medals for a lot less.

GAELIC FOOTBALL

Overall, I'd be happy enough with Kerry this year. I do honestly think that we left a real chance of an All Ireland behind us. We coasted through Munster, maybe a little too easily - Cork put up a battle, but they were never going to win it. The group stage is just a dreary blur in my mind. The sooner the GAA abandon that dreadful nonsense, the better. It saps energy, recovery time, supporters'wallets and patience, and clogs up the fixtures schedule to absolutely no purpose. It adds absolutely nothing and takes away a lot. We were very controlled against Derry. Yes, it was awful to watch. Even Central Council were forced to take off their rose-tinted spectacles and admit that yes, the modern incarnation of gaelic football is pretty much rubbish. Then we came against Armagh. We left goal chances behind us and gave them one. I did think we were the better team for 45 minutes, but we didn't kill them off and they were making all the running in the end.

I don't want to sound churlish or begrudging,

but overall it really was an appalling football championship. Just dreary.

For me, Tom O'Sullivan, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, and Tony Brosnan were Kerry's best players, and I'd just about give the nod to Ó Beaglaíoch.

The club championships took a while to get going. The best game in the senior was that rip-roaring opener between Crokes and Dingle. A game not without some controversy, but absolutely brilliant football. The best club game I saw was the Intermediate semi-final between Laune Rangers and Glenflesk. The home side were down a few too many bodies but came very close to pulling it off. To be honest, I didn't feel that the final or the replay lived up to the billing.

The best championship for me was the Premier Junior. That was an absolute roller coaster and I loved it.

Kerry Club Player of the Year? I'd just about give it to Gavin White of Dr. Crokes ahead of Paul Geaney of Dingle. Yes, two players on the strongest teams, but they are absolutely key elements in that team strength.

Will the new rules work? Well, they absolutely have to be better than what we have now. We have the usual suspects coming out and saying that there is nothing wrong with the game, but that nonsense isn't gaining traction with anybody. My worry is that already you have managers openly talking about how to manipulate those rules to prioritise strength and speed over skill.

moment about Donegal experimenting with Michael Murphy as a goalkeeper. Ah, lads. They say that paper never refuses ink, but there are times where paper absolutely should do so. It's January. Welcome to the silly season, you'll get worse stories.

Very happy with the U20s and minor team as well. The U20s reached an All Ireland Final and the minors reached a semi-final. Both beaten fair and square on the day by better teams, but that's no big think. It's all about an upward curve and we have good players coming through. The issue - and a huge talking point – is the AFL recruiting Irish players. I have no major issue with it. Of course it's a problem, these talented young players getting opportunities to play professional sport at a high level. But the idea that their amateur sports clubs should be compensated? That makes absolutely no sense to me. You don't pay them, so why on earth should you get paid?

Three contenders for Young Player of the Year, in my opinion. Evan Looney of Dr. Crokes, Paddy Lane of Austin Stacks, and Cormac Dillon of Duagh. Liam Evans of Keel and Killian Dennehy from Currow were excellent this year, but just not quite in that company. Very tight call, but my nod would go to the Duagh man.

HURLING

The hurling was as brilliant as the football was terrible. I would genuinely say that it was the best All Ireland Championship that I can remember, and that's after a decade of brilliance. There's definitely an element of shadow-boxing about the National League and, while the games are superb, the Munster Champiponship just takes too long. The game of the year — and I don't just mean best hurling match, I mean best game I saw in any code — was the semi-final between Cork and Limerick. The final was a cracker as well.

Kerry.....ah, look, no point in dressing it up. Our turnover of players is simply too big. We need a bit of stability. And the omens are not looking good for the coming season either. Fionán Mackessy was Kerry's best player this year, and he will be a massive loss. Best of luck to him with Kilkenny – he hardly needs me to tell him that he is swimming in much deeper waters now.

The County Championship.....well, the County Championship started off with a bizarre group stage that was utterly meaning less. Those games were damp squibs, truth be told. But once it got going, it was brilliant. I followed a lot of it on clubber - I do a bit for them myself, so take my high recommendation of that service with as much salt as you think is appropriate - but I did actually make the semi-final between Ballyduff and Kilmoyley. I'd imagine it's no great secret that the prospect of extra-time normally causes groans to erupt in the press box - we all have deadlines (and are remarkably childish, myself included) - but not on that occasion. Player of the Championship, and I imagine

this would be unanimous, would have to be Mike O'Leary of Abbeydorney. I have no idea why there are no Abbeydorney players committing to Kerry for the past while, but we desperately need the big man up front, especially in the absence of Pádraig Boyle. Interesting at underage to see how many dual players there are in Kerry. Part of that is the hard work put in by Mercy Mounthawk and especially Tralee CBS — they got an absolutely awful draw in the Harty, but it's brilliant to see a Kerry team playing in it. I honestly never expected to see it in my

SOCCER

BEST 25 IN THE LAST 25 YEARS

This is what we in the trade (and everybody else) calls a filler piece. It's January. There isn't a lot happening - and I think we'd all be better off if it was even less. So journalists make predictions for the coming year, detail their biggest talking points of the previous year, make lists. Endless lists. Greatest leftfooted soccer players of all time. Ireland's best eleven soccer players. Greatest Lions players ever. Blah, blah, blah. I'm not knocking it. I've done it myself - I love doing them. It's a massive ego boost. I can pretend to be knowledgeable about a subject, in fact I can claim to be practically undisputable in my expertise. And of course, you can complain, I actively encourage it. Just send your complaint in writing to my secretary, Mr. Simon Harris, c/o Leinster House.

As is common in the Western World, the US tends to lead the way. Thankfully, we don't copy their newspaper layouts (they are truly dreadful, stories might start on page 2, continue in mid sentence on page 10, and conclude on page 22), but their commentary and opinion pieces.....contrary to what many people think, the American education system is actually quite good, albeit ridiculously expensive at third level. They are actually highly intelligent. But you would never guess it from reading their newspapers or watching television. Let me give you a quick rundown of the big topics. Is LeBron James better than MJ? (More of a team player, but not even close as a clutch shooter. Neither could stay with Kareem at his peak, though, and Wilt would barely notice Kareem on the court. Is Caitlin Clark victimised because of her skin colour (when I say their education system is actually very good, I make an exception for social history) and is Angel Reese the worst villain out there since....well, I was going to go with Hitler, but apparently Taylor Swift is even worse. You can't watch a single four hour NFL game involving her boyfriend without her appearing on screen for at least thirty seconds.

These are the things that consume media space in a country where a worrying amount of people think The Handmaid's Tale's Gilead is too liberal.

One unfortunate thing these days, for me at least, is how only players of recent vintage are considered. I have seen several 'greatest English league teams ever' by actual or pseudo-celebrity former players in recent days. Guess who many of them mention Tom Finney or Stanley Matthews? That's right, absolutely none. It would be like picking a gaelic football best fifteen and not even mentioning Mick O'Connell (happy birthday to the great man, by the way) or Seán Purcell. Nor is it only people across the water who are guilty of recency bias. I saw a Kilkenny article mention their greatest ever hurlers.... and not mention Eddie Keher. Oops.

The Irish Examiner's Kieran Shannon printed his best fifteen footballers from the last 25 years. I rate Kieran Shannon – easily the best basketball writer in the country before he switched to sports psychology and the GAA. I'd agree with a lot of his selections. But – partly because paper never refuses ink and, let's be honest here, I have a lot of space to fill in a fairly quiet week

STEPHEN CLUXTON – yup. Absolutely nailed on, and you can go back a lot further than $25\ \text{years}.$

KARL LACEY – Again, no argument. Umm, well....I don't want to be that guy, but Marc Ó Sé was a key player in five All Ireland wins and won Footballer of the Year....ah, look, maybe I'm wearing my Kerry hat a bit too strongly. Lacey was a great player, no question about that. We will leave it stand.

SEAMUS MOYNIHAN - he was full back in

his annus mirabilis of 2000, but for me his best position was wing back. He could direct again and drive it forward from there while minding the house. My full back would be Fermanagh's Barry Owens just ahead of Meath's Darren Fay.

LEE KEEGAN – Had to get the nod surely. Could you make a case for Tom O'Sullivan from Rathmore? I would say so, but Keegan is a fair shout.

TOMÁS Ó SÉ – Respectfully, I'd have Seamus Moynihan wearing that jersey. And if not, I think you'd have to look at Dublin's Jack McCaffrey. People remember the incredible speed, but he was also one of the most intelligent players I have seen.

KIERAN MCGEENEY – No question, McGeeney was a superstar. An icon of the game. Aidan O'Mahony would be in with a shout, but I think McGeeney has to get the nod

JAMES MCCARTHY – Like I say, he had to make the team somewhere. One of the most influential footballers of the past decade. Philly Jordan and Peter Harte both deserve mentions.

DARRAGH Ó SÉ – I don't think anyone will argue that he wasn't the dominant midfielder of his era. One of the first names nailed on.

BRIAN FENTON – Again, it's a fairly obvious one. I will say – and this is another drum most of you have heard me beating before – Limerick's John Galvin brought awesome power to the field. He was a force of nature.

CIARÁN KILKENNY - They were talking about this guy as a dual player when he was fourteen years old. Mostly as a hurler, mind you. Imagine the Dublin hurling team if all their dual players committed to the small ball? Shannon mentions Paul Galvin and Brian Dooher as contenders; I agree with both, but I think people are forgetting how good Dublin's Paul Flynn was in the role. My own choice, though, would be Seán Cavanagh. You know how you can have a false nine in soccer? Well, Cavanagh was gaelic football's first false midfielder. He was always named there - and had the skills to fulfil that role - but in fact he always had a roving commission.

COLM COOPER – Right player, wrong number. You already know before you read any further that the number 13 jersey is going to David Clifford, and that's why Colm is being switched out to centre forward. I'd actually have another Kerryman in that jersey, and I don't think it's selection bias. There are people outside of Kerry who will agree with me that Declan O'Sullivan was an astonishing talent.

SEÁN CAVANAGH –Kieran Shannon names Diarmuid Connolly as a contender. Connolly

was among the most talented players I've ever seen, no question about that, but without being mean to a great player, his temperament was always questionably. He walked off too many of the big games before the final whistle. Yes, he would be goaded. Opposition players are going to do that to you all day long if you keep falling for it. Instead of Cavanagh, I'm going for the person I believe to be the best individual player of the last 25 years. Unlike Cavanagh, he was most often named full forward but operated around midfield. Step forward Michael Murphy of Donegal.

DAVID CLIFFORD – No. I'm not putting David at corner forward. Stop, calm down now, put away them pitchforks. Tisn't Frankenstein's monster ye are dealing with here. David has the advantage of physique, but Colm Cooper had the quickest mind and deftest touch of anyone.

PETER CANAVAN – Again, absolutely had to be on the team. Frankly, I think he'd make the best fifteen of all time, not just the last quarter of a century. But again, I'm moving him one place to the right and I'm putting David on the square. For me, David's biggest asset is his long distance kicking –nobody out there, is regularly scoring points from his range. But he is also absolutely brilliant at claiming important marks under pressure, really big game-changing fetches, and I think he is more a natural full forward who drifts into space than the other way around.

BERNARD BROGAN – I promise ye that I am not being controversial for the sake of it. And all of the Brogans (including their Da) were great footballers. But in my honest opinion, while Bernard was the better shooter, Alan was the better playmaker. But as for the idea of either of them starting ahead of Peter

Canavan? Not a hope.

Right. That's me actually being honest about it. And even I can pick obvious holes in that team. Both my wing forwards are arguably square pegs in round holes, in that neither was actually named there as far as I can remember. But given that both had roving commission based around drifting between midfield and full forward, I think that half forward line is fair enough.

Four Kerry players is a good bit, but I think we won or contested enough All Irelands in the past 25 years to justify it. Declan O'Sullivan wasn't even named by Shannon in his article, but Declan is literally one of the first names I would put down.

Just three Dublin players. In fairness, that would generate more controversy than Roy

Keane punching Prince William (how many people would even bat an eyelid?). Cluxton, McCarthy, and Fenton are inarguable. Kilkenny has a very strong case, likewise Flynn and Alan Brogan. But that Dublin team was arguably so strong as a unit that it was hard to single out individuals. There were players on that team that earned multiple All Ireland medals that weren't necessarily elite players in their position. I'm not going to name anyone (okay, Rock and Cooper) but their teamwork and cohesion....it really was like clockwork. I wanted to dislike them, but I just couldn't.

No Tomás Ó Sé. No Paul Galvin. No Kieran Donaghy. Yeah, look, I know what you are saying, and you know who would love to hear it? Joe Duffy. Ring him right now. Don't delay.

Applications for Back for Business programme now open!

Business, the free government programme that helps returned emigrants start and develop businesses in Ireland, is now open to applications.

Now in its eighth cycle, the programme is seeking offers of interest from people who have recently returned to Kerry or are still living abroad but thinking of returning in the near

Those eligible to apply include returned Irish emigrants who have lived abroad for at least a year and have returned to Ireland in the last three years, and emigrants currently living abroad who are planning to return to Ireland in the near future.

The 8th cycle of the programme will run from February to June 2025 and there is no charge for those selected to participate. Up to 50 places will be available nationally. Eligible candidates have until Thursday, January 16, to submit their applications. Those interested can apply through www.backforbusiness. com.

Funded by the Irish Abroad Unit, Department of Foreign Affairs, the programme was created to foster and support entrepreneurial activity among emigrants recently returned to Ireland.

Since launching in 2017, Back for Business has helped entrepreneurs who are returned to significantly grow sales and employment. It also addresses challenges that all early-stage entrepreneurs encounter, but also focuses on additional barriers faced by emigrants who have been living away from Ireland.

Participants on the last cycle, Back for Business 7, quadrupled their collective turnover from €300,000 at the start of the programme to €1.2million at its conclusion. Their collective employee numbers also increased from 14 to 47 during the cycle.

Back for Business 8 participants will take part in round table sessions focused on goals and milestones, which are facilitated by voluntary Lead Entrepreneurs who have experience of successfully starting and growing a

The 8th cycle's Lead Entrepreneurs are: serial entrepreneur Hannah Wrixon; Morgan Browne, CEO of Milner Browne and Enterpryze; Paul Duggan of The Gardiner Group; Seamus Reilly, co-founder and formerly of Critical Healthcare; Sinead Doherty, founder and CEO of Fenero; and Thomas Ennis, founder of the Thomas Ennis Group.

A Back for Business Community is also being formed for previous participants, who will be offered workshops, review round tables and an annual Community Forum.

Former participants from Kerry include Maurice O'Driscoll of Wild Atlantic Timbercraft which specialises in handcrafting exquisite garden and household furniture and lighting using three distinct materials: Bog Oak, Recycled timber, and Driftwood. Maurice says: "When starting a business, a network is essential. The great thing about Back for Business is not just that you get a ready-made network, but one that's growing all the time. I returned to Ireland after 23 years living overseas and the Back for Business round table discussions very quickly helped you fill in the knowledge gaps in Irish Business which had changed dramatically since I last worked here. 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Now is a good time if you are planning a new garden or trying to add some colour to an established garden to plant some early flowering spring shrubs. One of the best known shrubs is the Camellia and these popular shrubs are starting to flower in most places at the moment. The Cam s a very valuable shrub in the garden as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green leaves and showy blooms from early spring. A lot of people think that Camellias are a difficult shrub to grow, but in fact they are no more difficult than Rhododendrons or azaleas, and most varieties on sale now are hardy. When choosing the spot to plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix plenty of moss peat with the earth, rather than on its own around the plant, as it will tend to root out quicker. Camellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Camellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Camellias only to prune out old dead wood, dean up the old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of the plants every spring with some moss peat. There are a lot of other good spring flowering shrubs, here is a list of just a few: Forsythia, Cythisus, Corylus, Berberis, Darwunnii, Ribes and Skimmia.

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


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


