

LOCAL COMPANY SWITCHES FROM **SIGNS TO SHIELDS**

Collowing a request from a local doctor, Rathmore company Sapphire Signs have begun production of Face Shields.

Brendan Dennehy was approached by a Millstreet GP to design a shield which could be used by front line health care workers during the Covid 19 pandemic. "We were delighted to be able to help" Brendan told the Killarney Outlook. "After a few trials, we came up with one that was suitable to the medical community. The masks are fully adjustable to fit anyone and the shield is disposable", he added.

"Initially, we were only making them for local distribution but we are expecting a delivery of acrylic this week for production of the masks on a bigger scale", Brendan said. Face shields are personal protective equipment devices that are used by all medical professionals that are dealing with Covid-19 patients. They protect the facial area, including eyes, nose and mouth from splashes and sprays of body fluids and are vital to front line workers who are treating Covid-19 patients.

Face shields are generally not used alone, but in conjunction with other protective equipment classified as personal protective equipmen (PPE). The advantages of the shields as opposed to the masks are that the are more comfortable to wear, portect a larger portion of the face and feel less claustrophic to the wearer. They also allow the wearer to speak clearer to the patient, thus reducing anxiety levels. Sapphire Signs are based on Main St., Rathmore, Co. A MESSAGE FROM **HSE SERVICES** ACROSS KERRY

SE management across Kerry this week issued a message of thanks to the people of the country for their support of staff during the current crisis. Management from Cork Kerry Community Healthcare, the South/South West Hospital Group, the Department of Public Health and the National Ambulance Service said the action of the people of Kerry in recent weeks will save lives, and have given services in the county vital time to prepare. An area Crisis Management Team with representatives of all HSE services has been meeting several times a week since early February to put in place extensive preparations for the impact of Covid-19 on services.

To date, these preparations have included:

• Increasing bed capacity across the entire healthcare system by refurbishing and reopening buildings in order to provide ICU beds, acute beds, transitional and step-down care.

• Putting in place arrangements to open selfisolation facilities should they be needed. We will update the public about these facilities shortly.

• Establishing four testing centres across the region.

• Supporting community response forums set up by local authorities.

• Planning to provide community assessment hubs, which will begin to open next week. These facilities will allow members of the public with Covid-19 whose GP has determined they need a medical examination. • Working with private hospitals to increase bed capacity in the acute hospital system and ensuring critical services continue to be provided.

Most importantly, we are still providing vital services and we are still here for the people of Kerry. CEO of the South/South West Hospital Group Gerry O'Dwyer said: "We thank and commend all our staff for their incredible efforts at this time. They have already gone above and beyond the call of duty as our health service faces extraordinary demands. I am immensely proud of all our staff as they rise to meet the unprecedented challenge posed by Covid-19. I want to thank all staff for the inspiring work being carried out in making advanced preparations. Every effort has been made prior to this virus arriving in Ireland to ensure that we would be as ready as we could be in the circumstances and in the best possible position to protect and safeguard public health."

Mr O'Dwyer added: "We are working extremely hard to create additional capacity for the health system in the area in the coming weeks and days, and we will update the public as and when plans are confirmed." Chief Officer of Cork Kerry Community Healthcare, Ger Reaney, who chairs the HSE's area crisis management team said:

"We have seen a huge redeployment of staff across our services, and our staff have risen to this challenge as they move to screening centres; from desk jobs back to ward duties; and increase their working hours where they can. Their efforts will help us to provide care for the people of Kerry."

Mr Reaney added:

"We thank the people of Kerry for their support at this time. That support takes many different forms, and it means so much to our hard-working staff. In particular, we want to thank everyone who has helped a healthcare work with childcare, as every extra hour that you can facilitate a staff member to work is a huge help."

With visiting restrictions in place at all hospitals and residential centres, staff are doing everything possible to support patients and residents and to help them keep in contact with relatives and friends. "We know that visiting restrictions are very difficult, and that some people have not been able to see their loved ones for many weeks now. Our staff are doing everything possible to make sure all patients and residents are kept safe and well," Mr Reaney said. Acting Director of Public Health Anne Sheahan thanked the people of Kerry for adhering to guidelines and staying at home as much as possible. "Staying at home will help us all to slow the spread of the virus, and that is giving us the opportunity to prepare all parts of the service. We would like to remind you that when you leave your home for essential reasons, that you continue to keep two metres apart from anyone not in your household. Also, please maintain regular hand washing, regular cleaning of surface and always remember to catch your coughs and colds. It's more important now than ever," she said.

COCOONING

For people most at risk of serious illness if they catch coronavirus, we are giving special advice called cocooning. Cocooning is for people who are extremely medically vulnerable. It is for your personal protection. Cocooning means you should stay at home at all times and avoid face-toface contact. Even within your home, you should minimise all non-essential contact with other members of your household. Ask your family, carers or neighbours for help to ensure you have the support you need. You can also get help while cocooning through your local County Council and other organisations. If someone you care for needs to cocoon, share this information with them. Make sure they understand how important it is they follow this advice. This advice is in place until we

hear otherwise from the Government. *People who need to cocoon*

Cocooning is for people who:

• Are over 70 years of age - even if you're fit and well

Are solid organ transplant recipients

•Have cancer and are undergoing active chemotherapy or radical radiotherapy for lung cancer, have cancers of the blood or bone marrow such as leukaemia, lymphoma or myeloma who are at any stage of treatment are having immunotherapy or other continuing antibody treatments for cancer, are having other targeted cancer treatments which can affect the immune system, such as protein kinase inhibitors or PARP inhibitors, have had bone marrow or stem cell

HOW TO COCOON

DO Stay at home at all times and avoid any face-to-face contact for 2 weeks from 27 March. If you have a garden or balcony, spend time outside for fresh air. Keep in touch with family and friends over the phone or online if you have access. Keep yourself mobile by getting up and moving as much as possible. Ask neighbours, family or friends to get any shopping or medicine you need - do not go out shopping. Arrange for food or medicine deliveries to be left outside your door. Use the phone if you need to contact your GP or other services - do not leave your house.

DON'T Do not go outside your home and garden. Do not have visitors to your home, except for essential carers. Do not attend any gatherings, including gatherings with family and friends anywhere.Phone your doctor if you have any symptoms of coronavirus.Changes have been to make it easier for you to get your medicines and prescriptions. Read about medicines and coronavirus.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE HSE

transplants in the last 6 months, or who are still taking immunosuppression drugs, have severe respiratory conditions including cystic fibrosis, severe asthma and severe COPD.

• Have rare diseases and inborn errors of metabolism that significantly increase the risk of infections (such as SCID, homozygous sickle cell) are on immunosuppression therapies sufficient to significantly increase risk of infection are pregnant and have significant heart disease, congenital or acquired. If you are unsure whether or not you need to cocoon or not, talk to your doctor. If you are an essential worker, get advice from Occupational Health.

GREAT RESPONSE TO NEW HELPLINE

The new dedicated Covid-19 helpline receives over 700 calls in its first week. The free confidential phone line was established by groups in the county and is manned by trained volunteers.

The phoneline supports and advises people during the current Covid-19 pandemic. The majority of the calls are from people seeking food, medication and fuel deliveries. The service is open seven days a week from 8am - 8pm and can be contacted on 1800 807 009. KILLARNEY CREDIT UNION AND CARA CREDIT UNION LEND A HELPING HANDTO THEIR CURRENT ACCOUNT MEMBERS

ast October, Killarney Credit Union and Cara Credit Union launched a much sought after Current Account with a globally accepted Mastercard Debit Card with Contactless Payments. Both credit unions have reported great interest in this current account which is no surprise given that credit unions offer something different to other financial institutions in terms of personal service having been voted number 1 for customer service, 5 years in a row.

The Current Account comes with simple and transparent fees and charges. However, in light of the global COVID-19 emergency, both

Killarney Credit Union and Cara Credit Union are not charging their members the quarter one fees from January to March this year. The fees are due to be deducted from members accounts on 28th April to cover the period from January 1st 2020 to March 31st 2020, but both credit unions have agreed to refund their members immediately.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook, Mark Murphy CEO of Killarney Credit Union " This is not a decision that both ourselves and Cara Credit Union have taken lightly. However, we are acutely aware of the challenges faced by our members in these very uncertain times. Helping and supporting members is at the very core of everything we do within the credit union movement and this is why we made the decision to refund our members the quarter one fees on 28th April.

While this is a very welcome gesture by the two credit unions, it is not the only one. Both Killarney Credit Union and Cara Credit Union have put a number of measures in place to help their members at this time, including helplines if members are experiencing financial difficulty. Pa Laide, CEO of Cara Credit Union said "Not only are we refunding the current account fees for the first quarter but we would also like to let all members know if you are experiencing financial difficulty we urge you to contact your local credit union preferably by phone or online, to discuss possible flexible arrangements regarding your loans over the coming months. We can assure members that they will be treated fairly and with empathy. We hope that by offering as much support as we can to our members we trust they will continue to support their local credit union when our lives and economy returns to normal".





COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT HUB TO OPEN IN CASTLEISLAND

►astleisland Primary Care Centre which is based at Keelgorm House on Limerick Road is to open as a Community Assessment Hub as part of the significant response to Covid-19 which is underway across the entire health system.

The assessment hub is for patients who have or may have a confirmed diagnosis of Covid-19 when their GP decides they need a face-to-face clinical assessment. Patients can only access these hubs when referred by their GP. Our aim in setting up the hubs is that anyone who needs a face-to-face clinical assessment can get one in the community, as quickly as possible. This will help patients who need assessment but who do not need immediate hospital care to avoid referrals to acute hospitals where possible.



Once seen at the hub, patients may either be asked to return home, to enter isolation or to attend an acute hospital. The hubs will be staffed mostly by GPs with the support teams of healthcare professionals including nurses and physiotherapists, with administrative support. We would like to pay tribute to the

teams involved in getting these hubs set up and operational for their dedication to patient care. People are working extremely hard to get these hubs ready in a very short time. The focus at the moment is to train and enable the staff who will be working in the hubs, and to ensure GPs are aware on how they will make referrals. There will be 120 staff trained by the end of this week across Cork and Kerry. The hub will open seven days a week, and we expect the opening hours to be from 8.30am to 7.30pm although this will depend on the level of referrals. Patients will only be seen by appointment. It is not possible to make appointments at the hub; this can only be done by your GP or by SouthDoc on Saturday and Sunday.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income, usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

Known throughout Killarney and South Kerry, the local branch of the **Irish Cancer Society** are pivotal fundraisers for this very worthy cause... in this week's Killarney Outlook we look at the amazing work undertaken by the society using funds raised locally.

With 1178 cases of cancer reported in Kerry last year, the Killarney South Kerry committee of the Irish Cancer Society, comprising of Eugene O'Sullivan, Kathrina Breen, Kathleen O Shea, Eleanor O'Doherty and Timmy Moriarty work harder than ever with their army of volunteers to ensure services are readily available to support cancer patients.

The original Killarney South Kerry committee was founded in 1988 by Ann and Neilie Moynahan, assisted by Sr Anne Maria Horgan. They were joined by Lourda Kelly, Jackie O Sullivan, Mary Casey, Lily Terry and Mary McCarthy. This hard working committee understood the need to support cancer patients and their family in a time when there was neither morphine pumps or night nursing services available in the area. Hence the start of Daffodil Day in South Kerry. Over the years the committee have developed new fundraising ideas to assist The Irish Cancer Society provide vital services

Incidence of cancer in Ireland is growing, but more people are surviving cancer than ever before. Here's some information on the work of The Irish Cancer Society and how your donations impacted people affected by cancer in Kerry in 2019.

71 cancer patients in Kerry received 379 nights of care through the Society's Night Nursing service. Night Nurses provide up to 10 nights of care for cancer patients who are at the end of their cancer journey, in their own home, during the last days of their life.

48 patients from Kerry were brought to 491 chemotherapy related appointments by the Volunteer Driver Service. The service currently operates in 23 hospitals around the country and relies on volunteers to drive patients to and from their chemotherapy treatment. There are 31 drivers volunteering in Kerry at present. The Society's Cancer Nurses are available to talk to anyone concerned about cancer on the Freephone Cancer Nurseline, 1800 200 700, or in one of the 13 Daffodil Centres nationwide. Last year, 325 people from Kerry were directly supported through these services.

730 counselling sessions were provided in Kerry through the Society's affiliated cancer support centre, helping 103 people cope with a cancer diagnosis in their life.

To ensure delivery of these vital services The Killarney South Kerry Committee start their annual fundraising with a Coffee Morning Launch, followed by Daffodil Day and fundraisers continue throughout the year, walks, dances, including Strictly Come Dancing, cycles, coffee mornings, Churchgate

However, the committee would still like to acknowledge the loyal support they receive from volunteers and public throughout the county.

Support for people with cancer is more important now than ever the CEO of the Irish Cancer Society has said as the charity marks its first Daffodil Day without street collections or events. CEO Averil Power said, "When we made the decision earlier this month to cancel all Daffodil Day events and street collections we were blown away by the response.

"As we work to adapt to the current public health crisis and ensure we are providing cancer patients, survivors and their families with the appropriate care and support that they need. Each year more than 40,000 people are diagnosed with cancer – unfortunately this will remain the case even with the coronavirus outbreak. What's more is there are approximately 200,000 people in Ireland living with and beyond cancer, many of whom are at a higher risk of developing a serious illness if they catch coronavirus.

"This is why it is more important than ever that we support people with cancer.

The Irish Cancer Society is continuing to provide crucial services including the NightNurse service, providing end-of-life care for people in their homes, the volunteer driving service to transfer patients to chemotherapy and other support services and are also funding remote counselling to ensure that those affected by cancer can continue to access the help they need when they can't access face-to-face services. It's time to decide whether the State Exams are going ahead, being postponed or cancelled?



To be or not to be? That is the question being asked by over 125,000 anxious and stressed Leaving Cert (LC), Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and Junior Cert (JC) state exam candidates. Are the remaining practical exams going

ahead on 27th April? Are the written exams going ahead on 3rd June? Are the exams being postponed to a later date? Are the exams being cancelled? The oral and practical tests which were due to take place from Monday, 23rd March to Friday, 3rd April were already cancelled and full marks were awarded to all candidates, who were due to take these tests.

The State Examinations Commission (SEC) and the Department of Education and Skills (DES) are closely monitoring the evolving situation regarding upcoming exams. Candidates were advised to continue preparing for the practical exams scheduled for the end of April and early May and the final exams scheduled for May and June.

From Monday 27th April to Friday 8th May, the timetable includes practical exams in Leaving Certificate Art Life Sketching, Engineering, Construction Studies, and Junior Cycle Metalwork. There are also final exams during May in LCVP Link Modules (Wednesday, 6th May), Leaving Certificate Applied ICT (Wednesday, 13th May) and Leaving Certificate Computer Science (Wednesday, 27th May).

Normally, young people would be enjoying the Easter Holiday break before returning to school for the final term. But the times in which we live are abnormal and uncertain as the country battles the Coronavirus pandemic.

In the interests of public health and safety, schools have remained closed for five weeks and students have tried to study at home. At this stage, it's possible that the academic year may end before schools can resume normal service.

That's not a major issue for non-exam classes as they can make up lost ground when they eventually return to school. As long as they follow the directives given via their schools' online platforms, video conferencing, social media, text and phone communications, etc., they will stay in touch and catch up in time.

The situation is far more urgent for those due to take state exams in June. Exam candidates have missed vital weeks in school and if schools don't reopen on Monday, 20th April, the final term is very likely to be lost. In those



circumstances, exam candidates can hardly be expected to be emotionally at ease or knowledge ready to sit these crucial exams in June. Contact with class teachers during the final term is vital and all the virtual learning in the world will not compensate for in-school teaching.

After weeks of home study, exam candidates are feeling the pressure. They are finding it very difficult to maintain their focus and motivation. They are suffering from cabin fever and an overload of virtual learning. Structured home study has become far more challenging with the country in lockdown and more family members house bound. Outdoor physical exercise is confined to 2km from home and social interaction is limited.

The country is now in the second week of restrictive actions in the response to Covid-19. That period may be extended further depending on the advice of the health care specialists. If that happens, it's highly likely that schools will not reopen on Monday, 20th April. Over 125,000 exam candidates can no longer be left in limbo. It's time for a decision, yea or nay, on the state exams.

MY TOP FIVE SPORTING MEMORIES

1. St. Brendans winning the Hogan in 1992

The Sem had a grand total of sixteen Corn Ui Mhuiri titles at the start of 1992 but just one solitary Hogan, the 1969 team. If you had to guess at the Hogan champions in any given year, all you had to say was St. Jarlaths and you'd likely be right. The Sem had only recently stopped being a boarding school, which meant restricting the intake (the school had many great Cork players in the past) which made it even more difficult. Seamus Moynihan was simply incredible in that campaign, especially in the final against Jarlaths. Brian McCarthy completely shut out Conor Mortimor that day. Seamus started his first Senior Munster Final for Kerry that year (the famous game against Clare, an equally vivid but less joyous memory!).

2. The 2014 Minor All Ireland

Not so much the win itself, which was joyous enough anyway, but the homecoming. My own club hosted it (Dan O'Donoghue and Liam Kearney were joint captains) and it was a perfect blend of low-key, casual, and deeply proud. Jack O'Connor made a speech about the connections between his own club and ours and made mention of the great Spa players of former years. Little children quite happily wandered up to Kerry minors and chatted away to them....it was just one of those days that stays in your head, you know? Sport is far more than scorelines and medals, and I realised it that day.

3. I Scored the Winning Goal

A bunch of us entered a team into a seven-aside run by Killorglin, and I got the winner in the quarter-final. It was 1-1 at the time, Paul O'Neill having scored for us (Jack C's Bar). My cousin, our keeper, hoofed a long ball out to me under pressure. I was on my own (having been too lazy to run back to defend, really) so it was me and the keeper. He came out as the ball was dropping, I went to control it with my chest, realised I had misjudged it completely, and jumped high in desperation. The ball came off the back of my head and looped over him into the net. Every-one congratulated me on the stunning judgement and technique. This is the first time I have admitted that it was the flukiest goal in world soccer history. I'm still claiming it though, and it's still a great memory.

4. TV with Family

It's more of a family thing than sport, I suppose. But there was one particular Christmas where all of us were at home (a rare enough occurrence nowadays, unfortunately). All the grandchildren and adults were there. We had a big meal, the fire was lit, and we watched recordings of various Kerry games of recent years. The kids loved the stories, there were a huge amount of laughter, there were memories of games that had happened and maybe should have

happened. There was talk of one sending off that my mother thought had been very harsh – the culprit himself and all his brothers and sisters thought this was hilarious. It was a lovely day of doing nothing productive but doing it really well.

5. The Greatest Soccer Match Ever Played

Out in the back garden. My little god-daughter and her Mammy against her Nana and I. We lost 5-1, with the little one scoring all five. I got our one, and by jaysus but I got a look that would curdle milk. In my defence, at least two of her goals were miles off-side and one of them bore a suspicious resemblance to a rugby try, while Nana did not seem as committed to victory as I was. But little one spent the rest of the day telling everyone she met (and I literally mean everyone) how great a soccer player she was. And I couldn't argue the point. And that is my most favourite memory of them all.

SPORTING MEMORIES

Victor Mulcahy looks at his favourite Sporting Moments

After spending quite some time thinking about it I have come up with my list and all of them have made either National or International Headlines.

I was fortunate enough to have attended 4 of them and I was only 5 miles away from the 5th and the most memorable of thern all. I have been an avid sports fan from a very early age and my earliest memory is of the 1959 All Ireland Football Final [as we all sat "hushed" and listened to the Great Miceal O'Hehir do his inimitable commentary as Mick O'Connell led out such Kerry luminaries as Johnny Culloty, Mick O'Dwyer, Tom Long, Jerome O'Shea, Niall Sheehy Etc, all under the watchful gaze of their mentor Dr Eamonn O'Sullivan, as they defeated Galway by a score of 3-7 to 1-4.

I did not attend the 1969 Final as tickets in Killarney were like Gold Dust as my 2nd next door Neighbour and Lifelong friend Johnny Culloty was to become the 2L't Kerry winning Captain of the All Ireland Championship. I did have the pleasure in helping to arrange the "welcome home" bonfire in the middle of the hill on the St. Anne's Road/ Lewis Road Junction that evening.

1. G.A.A. Football Championship

I will start with G.A.A. Football Championship, and I attended every all Ireland Football Final that Kerry played in between 1970 and 1986 all 12 of them, and various ones are memorable, 1975 the first time that Mick O'Dwyer's youngsters defeated Heffo's Army, to the hapless Charlie Nelligan's dismissal and "5 Goals in the Rain" sung to the air of "Brown Girl in the Ring" IN 1978. The greatest mernory that I have is of the majestic display by the Great Caherciveen Man Jack O'Shea in the 1981 Final against Offaly in what was a very tight and relatively low scoring garne with Kerry leading by 11 Points to 8 Points with just a few minutes to go, Jack burst through and scored a memorable goal from 1 would say 2A/25 Yards out to seal the deal, we scored another point after that, but Jack's Goal was the deciding moment and Jimmy Deenihan accepted the Sam Maguire Trophy to record Kerry's 27th Championship Victory.

2. Masters Golf Championship

In 2003 I was fortunate enough to attend the Masters Golf Championship at Augusta and to attend there for 4 of the days to witness the unforgettable spectacle that The Master's at Augusta is. Day 1 was the first "official" practice day, I followed Padraig Harrington, Seve Ballesteros, and of Course Tiger Woods among many others. Day 2 practice in the morning and the "Par S" Tournament in the aflernoon" The number of "Patrons" were such that if you got a good vantage spot for the Par 3 that you stayed right there, I did, and got numerous photo's of my All-Time Golfing Hero Arnold Palmer playing with Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player. The Par 3 was won jointly by Padraig Harrington & David Toms, and sure enough it was the "kiss of death" for Padraig who failed to make the halfway cut of 5 over par. The Thursday's play never even got started and such was the continuous downpour that play for the day was abandoned at 11.00 A.M. oh well

S1,000 ticket bought off a "scalper" went down the drain so to speak. I attended on Friday thanks to the generosity of a Friend from Charleston South Carolina who gave me his season ticket. It was eventually won by the Canadian Mike Weir a left hander, the first to do so, he was quickly followed by fellow left handers Phil Mickelson and Bubba Watson.

3. Aintree Grand National

I have been a great fan of the Aintree Grand National since 1"965, that year St Vincent's Basketball Club ran a fundraising raffle the first prize was a weeks holiday in Butlin's for 1 person and the winner was going to be the person who had drawn the winning horse, the late Michael Courtney gave me 2 books of tickets to sell and I believe that tickets cost 5 Shillings each, the ticket that I sold to my sister Marguerita drew a horse called "Jay Trump" trained by Fred Winter and ridden by American Amateur Jockey Tommie Smith, it beat the favourite "Freddie" in a close race. My favourite Grand National story is about the 1970 race, on that day I was attending the wedding of Anne & Patie O'Shea at the Lake Hotel when Dan Buckley & Seanie O'Leary friends of mine from St. Mary's Parish Hall asked me if I could get a bet on a horse for them, as a 17 year old I was not really interested in betting but I phoned Power's Booking Office in New St. and to my amazement they were agreeable to taking my bet. Then 5 of us had £2.00 each way at 16 to 1 on "Gay Trip" trained by Fred Rimell and ridden by Pat Taaffe, the horse won and we got a taxi into town to collect our winnings, a great day was enjoyed by all. Dan Buckley was a great man for the horses and in L973 Dan gave me a horse by the name of "Red Rum" which famously won 3 Grand Nationals and came 2nd in the 2 others over a 5 year period.

4. Shane Lowry's win

My favourite sporting moment of all time has just got to be Shane Lowry's win in the "Open" Golf Championship played at Royal Portrush in July of las year. I have been a fanatical Golf fan all of my life and it began with rny friendship with 3 time South of Ireland winner and local Killarney man Michael Guerin since the early 1,960s <u>Michaelturned Professionalfor</u> a brief few years

and during those years there was a Pro/Am held here in Killarney in 1966 named the Jeyes Pro/Am, in the abandoned final round Michaelwith my Brother Brian as his caddie shot a course record of 66 which remains the record for our original Golf Course. Last July while working with Kerry Coaches I had to be near to Royal Portrush on the Sunday of the Championship as I was bringing two Ladies from nearby to play Golf in Co Down the next morning. I watched Shane play the last 4 holes of the Championship in a Hotel in the little Coastal village of Fortballintrae and when Shane sank his final Putt, I knew there and then that this was the pinnacle moment of my lifetime of following Golf seeing an Irishman holing the winning putt to claim the famed Claret Jug on a Golf Course in Ireiand, it does not get much better than that.

5. Six Nations Rugby Championship

When England came to play Ireland in the 2007 Six Nations Rugby Championship the game was to be played in Croke Park as Lansdowne Road was undergoing substantial refurbishments at the time. This was the 2"d Rugby International being played on the Hallowed GAA turf of Croke Park, Ireland had earlier played France and lost that game by 20 Points to 17 Points, in what was a bitter defeat for Ireland, who had great hopes of a Championship clean sweep after defeating Wales at home earlier in the Tournament. Croke Park welcomed the teams on to the pitch and after introducing tl're Teams to the then President of Ireland Mary McAleese the time came for the respective National Anthems. The whole attendance held their collective breaths as I did from the upper deck of the Hogan Stand when "God save the Queen" began, and thankfuily there was not even one single jeer from the 70,000 plus attendance. Ireland then played like a team inspired by the sense of the occasion and Ireland went on to trounce England by 43 Points to 13 Points. This was the worst ever defeat suffered by England in the Tournament both in number of

MILLTOWN/CASTLEMAINE NEWS John Burke – A Tribute


It was with great that sadness members of Milltown/ the Castlemaine GAA club learned of the sudden death of club stalwart and current President John Burke. Coming from

COUNCIL CLOSES PUBLIC CAR PARKS AT BEACHES FOR EASTER WEEKEND

Following consultation with An Garda Síochána, and in the interests of limiting the spread of the coronavirus, Kerry County Council will close all public car parks at beaches around the county for the Easter weekend.

The decision follows the issuing of clear national public health advice that members of the public should not visit or congregate in public places such as beaches, apart from individuals or households which are resident within two kilometres of a beach.

Council personnel will be present at the car parks to

monitor the closures over the weekend and will liaise with An Garda Síochána to ensure compliance.

Chief Executive of Kerry County Council, Moira Murrell said: 'The clear advice from the National Public Health Emergency Team is that members of the public should not travel to or congregate anywhere which poses a risk to public health. This decision is to ensure that people do not breach the current guidelines and to ensure that the sustained effort to flatten the curve continues.'

Being the FAI, they tried to have both options, with 'Captain Fantastic' player but 'Manager Average' Mick McCarthy taking the helm for the European gualifier campaign and Stephen Kenny taking over afterwards. A crazy notion. If they failed to qualify, then Stephen Kenny is already hamstrung. Worse, if they qualified, he would be replacing a successful manager - given the voracious and unreasonable expectations of Irish fans at the best of times,

Mick McCarthy actually did well in his first stint when he replaced Jack Charlton and, despite perennial unpopularity, was actually great as Ipswich manager. With Ireland, he was stymied by the fact that our best player by far, truly great, was a fragile ego underneath that hard surface and blamed McCarthy for Saipan failings that were the fault of a disfunctional FAI. With the country polarised after Roy Keane's outburst, the FAI's Brendan Menton resigned, to be replaced by the even worse John Delaney. With Ipswich, of course, Mick was always hamstrung by the continual lack of promised investment and worked a lot of miracles on shoestring budgets.

Ireland did well at the 2002 World Cup before McCarthy's first tenure (29 wins and 20 draws in 69 games - I am genuinely not sure if Roy Keane's brilliant midfield presence but divisive character (Keane was easily a whole level above his Irish team-mates, but disruptively unshy about letting them know it) would have taken them further. More crucial was the presence of one Robbie Keane, Ireland's best striker ever. The hard and cold fact is that Robbie Keane scored 68 goals in 146 international appearances, and more of them against quality opposition than is usually acknowledged. Robbie harked back to the days of Givens and Stapleton as ruthless goal-poachers - John Aldridge was world class at that art, but it was like using Vincent Van Gogh as a house-painter, given Charlton's pragmatic but stultifying 'put 'em under pressure' style. In our Euro 2020 qualifying campaign , we scored 7 goals in 8 games. We had an easy group, and qualifying has been made much, much easier by a UEFA desperate for increased participation and increased revenue, and we still laboured to third in our group. We struggled badly to beat Gibraltar 1-0. Gibraltar has less people than Killarney and Tralee combined.

As it stands, Mick McCarthy will be walking away from the Ireland set-up with a pay-off of E1.13m (+ E1m if Ireland qualify). Robbie Keane, who was given a four year contract as assistant (bizarrely, without any consultation with Stephen Kenny) will be walking away with E1m. That's from an organisation who hid a hole of E50m in their blatantly falsified accounts. At least Stephen Kenny knows what he is dealing with – Delaney's house of cards collapsed when Kenny's Dundalk asked for their money for winning the LOI and Delaney tried to bluff it.

Ireland's problem in recent years has not been a lack of managerial; quality (thanks to sponsor Dermot Desmond, who has also recently invested in Shamrock Rovers. Ireland's problem is that it doesn't have a real development system, despite constant FAI bluster about it. Stephen Kenny, like every Ireland manager before him since the days when an FAI Committee selected the team, will have to hope that English clubs (who now have a much wider base to draw players from) will develop enough quality players from Ireland.

Stephen Kenny is a great manager, with a brilliant track record at Longford, Bohs, Derry City, and especially Dundalk (his time in Scotland started well but finished badly, maybe an ominous sign or maybe valuable lessons learnt along the way we'll see) More pertinently, he is used to coming from a League team with relatively small resources and competing at European level. Like McCarthy (I've always considered Gerry Francis at QPR to be the ultimate example of a manager who was brilliant with limited resources but struggled with more affluence available), Kenny just doesn't have the players. It's not a lack of imagination. It's not because Kenny is short of creativity - far from it, he is an adventurous manager who trusts his players on the field.

But personally, I'd much sooner be in Mick McCarthy's shoes, walking away, than Stephen Kenny's I also think that having Alan Kelly, Keith Andrews, and Damien Duff alongside him is a mistake. Great players and great servants of Ireland, certainly, but a huge dearth of managerial experience among them. Duff has done some work with Glasgow Celtic and Andrews worked well with Kenny with the Ireland U20 team, but management is a skill that needs developing just like playing the game did, and in the same way.

The FAI should have let Mick McCarthy finish the qualifying campaign instead of sticking Kenny straight in at the deep end with a team that he didn't prepare. Kenny should have been left to finish off what has been a great U21 qualifying campaign and then come in as Ireland manager. Neither he nor McCarthy were agitating over the current situation. But all of this, sadly, was bound to have a complicated and unsatisfactory ending since a desperate-to-appear-competent FAI made the strange decision to appoint two national managers for one team at the exact same time.

I wish Stephen Kenny all the best, I really do. It would be good if Ireland could regain some small bit of credibility in soccer. But right now, I can only offer him condolences rather than congratulations as he lifts the poisoned chalice. Mick McCarthy has now managed Ireland twice. What's the betting that, as Ireland becomes less and less desirable as a managerial job (Desmond's millions are the only reason that high profilers like Trappatoni and O'Neill took the job, and it worked out poorly for them), what's the betting that the FAI turn to Mick again in the future? As the French say, au revoir – 'until we meet again'.

30% PREMIERSHIP PAY CUT

UK Health Secretary Matt Hancock has led the charge against the fat cats of the Premiership and stating that they should take a 30% pay cut. Good old Matt, a man of the common people.

Matt, just by the by, hasn't taken a 30% pay cut. The Premiership is big business. We are talking multiple billions here – it stretches into trillions if everything is added up. Granted, some of the money isn't exactly based on reality – Premiership Clubs have become playboy playthings in recent years rather than viable businesses. The transfer market has spiralled out of all control and the gap between the 'rich' (grossly wealthy enough to buy trophies (quick hello to Man City and Chelsea there) and 'poor' (a very relative term, no Premiership team is poor by any objective standard) is colossal.

Clubs are at a real risk of folding. Hence the Likes of Barcelona, Juventus,

Soo I can understand Matt Hancock, hero of the masses (the English Government's response to current circumstances is....all I will say is that I wish Boris Johnson a guick recovery and an early retirement, both as soon as possible) saying that these players with their enormous salaries should take a pay cut. Nigel Farage has called on Hancock to resign. When Nigel Farage is giving the impression that he has a better moral sense than you, the world has really turned on its head. The response is equally brilliant, with the PFA more or less saying that they would love to take a 30% pay cut, but the subsequent loss of tax revenue would hurt the health service. It's very similar to the FAI claiming that they needed a government bailout for the sake of their unfortunate employees because they are innocent victims. Yes, they are - of your misfeasance.

I have a compromise, a real wisdom of Solomon moment. Absolutely, let's ask the players to take a 30% pay cut – but put that money directly into the health service instead of into shareholders profits. I think a lot of them would go for that. And we'll give the Health Service 30% of your salary as well, Matt.

"Football is always an easy target but where are the big businessmen, where are the CEOs of these enormous companies, what are they doing at the moment?" Gary Lineker makes a fair point. I repeat; that's Gary Lineker making more sense than you, Matt Hancock. Gary Lineker. You should

hang your head in shame.

Bournemouth Manager Eddie Howe took a big voluntary pay cut. Brighton's Graham Potter and staff quick to follow suit. Promotion chasers Leeds, who have more to lose than most clubs if the season is voided, are sharing out their salaries so that all staff can maintain wages. Manchester United are actually a shining example of how to do it right (yes, another sentence I never thought I would say) by donating 30% of their salaries directly to health services in Manchester. David de Gea, Marcus Rashford, Paul Pogba, Harry Maguire, Jordan Henderson of Liverpool (the squad joined in when they heard of his donation to the North Liverpool Foodbank), and Ilkay Gundogan of Man City have been guietly brilliant in charitable initiatives. Likewise Pep Guardiola, Jose Mourinho, Ruud Gullit, Wilfried Zaha, Andy Robertson, Gareth Bale, Christian Pulisic, Ruben Loftus-Cheek, Gary Neville, Ryan Giggs, Cristiano Ronaldo, Lionel Messi, Neymar, Toby Alderweireld, Kaspar Schmeichel.....yeah, soccer players are the bad guys here.

FURLOUGHING

An awful lot of individuals involved in soccer have been far better than the people who rush out from rocks who rush to condemn them at every opportunity. Matt Hancock is not alone in his "Do what I say, not what I do" mantra. But some soccer clubs have absolutely disgraced themselves. England have a temporary scheme to similar to our own for people for people who have been laid off work temporarily to be able to claim 80% of their wages. Like a lot of things, the legislation had to be put in place faster than is usual. And if there wasn't a legal loophole left behind, there was certainly a huge moral one. Several Premiership clubs - it is probably unfair to single out Liverpool, Newcastle, Tottenham Hotspur, Norwich, and Bournemouth as being the most disgraceful, so I certainly won't be naming those clubs - are paying their players up to £200,000 per week while letting their regular staff, who are on a tiny fraction of that kind of money, go, and expecting the government to deal with it. Hypocrisy much? A lot of these are the clubs asking players to take a voluntary pay cut – with the money saved going directly into club coffers. It reminds me of Charlie Haughey, paunch bulging through another Charvet shirt, telling us to 'tighten our belts'.

VIRTUAL HORSE-RACING

The conduct of the horse-racing industry these days has not won them many admirers. They were among the last to acknowledge the dangers that became more and more obvious as the days went on. Allowing Cheltenham to go ahead was a bad move – and that's not hindsight; it was obvious to most people at the time.

This year's Aintree Grand National was a different kettle of fish,. Very different in fact. Last year a precursor of the main event had been run by computer simulation, with three quarters of a million viewers tuning into watch it (ten million watched the real thing).

This year, with the event itself obviously cancelled,. It was decided to run a virtual race,

with every horse and jockey and owner's statistics run through a computer algorithm and this programmed visually on a computer screen (I think of it as 'computer man do magic'). It generated a TV audience of 4.8 million people . 'TV audience' is one of those statistics that one should be very wary of, too many variables and the estimates are always way higher than they should be, but that's still impressive figures.

18-1 shot Potter's Field, ridden by young Jack Tudor and trained by Christian Williams, was the surprise winner after a fantastic race, which Mr. Tudor may or may not have actually watched. I presume that he will be paid for his simulated role? He just about beat Walk in the Mill in the runin, with Any Second Now just behind them and two-time champion Tigers Roll in a disappointing fourth place.

Bookies have been full of praise for the event and all profits are being donated to British and Irish health charities.

It's all a bit mad to me, but sure, no harm. However, I hope that it doesn't become a future model for the sport or any other. I may be cynical, but when bookies are doing something for charity, I tend to think that they are making a future investment. Get the public to buy in for a good cause and they'll get used to it. Sport is about human interaction, both for the spectators and the participants. I can wait as long as it takes, but I want to get back to that. Not simulations of it. We'll see.

CYCLING NEWS RÁS TAILTEANN 2020

Following the recent developments and recommendations from Cycling Ireland, the UCI, the HSE, Sport Ireland and the Government of Ireland. Cáirde Rás Tailteann has decided to postpone the 2020 Rás Tailteann which was due to return to the roads of Ireland in June 2020 after a hiatus in 2019. This is directly as a result of accelerating developments relating to the Covid-19 virus pandemic. "Considering the nature of the public health emergency Ireland and the world is currently dealing with and the progressive evolving nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, Cáirde Rás Tailteann has decided that it is in the best interests of everyone associated with the event and the wider public to temporarily postpone the 2020 event from its planned start date on June 10th next" said Eugene Moriarty, the 2020 Race Director.

He added "The decision to postpone has not been taken lightly, but when we consider the ongoing restrictions that are in place, the current workload of An Garda Síochána, County Councils and the Health Service, all of whom play integral roles in an event of this stature, we feel it is only appropriate that planning for the 2020 Rás does not add to the immediate burden faced by our critical frontline public servants" Cáirde Rás Tailteann will continue to monitor the situation and provide any updates that may be relevant as more information becomes available. The group has made many preparations for the 2020 event and currently is now actively working toward staging Rás Tailteann in the latter half of the 2020 racing season, after July.

They will continue to work with Cycling Ireland to promote the event on any suitable date that may become available before the end of the 2020 season. They will reassess the situation in the first week of June and release a formal update thereafter.

According to Ger Campbell the 2020 Route Designer "we do not foresee any changes to the route that has been published, so it will be a matter of managing any changes that may be necessary in relation to a change of dates. This is of course contingent on any opportunity that may become available to put the Rás safely back on the roads of Ireland later in 2020, if the prevailing circumstances would allow and most importantly that it is safe to do so"

Summer Bedding

Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground, and although Garden Centres are closed, many of the supermarkets are carrying stock. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the ground the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn. As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petonias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and rlysum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an averall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in



Faithfully we distance ourselves from one another. Faithfully let us unite as one with Jesus in prayer as we remember and honour his Death and Resurrection.

Every Easter Sunday is special. This Easter Sunday light a candle at the family dinner table to symbolise your love and trust in Jesus Christ in all things. He is our strength through these difficult weeks of the Pandemic. Let us pray for each other. Our Lady help of the sick, pray for us.
