"To say Seán Coyne did Killarney some service is a huge understatement. He was a larger than life personality with a great business acumen and his passing certainly marks the end of an era for Killarney," said Mr Kelleher.

He expressed his sympathy and that of the Killarney business community to Seán's wife, Frankie, daughters Lynda, Vicki, Tracy and Tanya, grandchildren, sons-in-law and many other relatives and friends and he praised the contribution the Coyne family has made and continues to make to the business life of Killarney.

The chamber president said Seán was a thorough gentleman who was always willing

to play a part and lead by example when it came to promoting Killarney and all of its attractions.

He was a well-known and hugely successful auctioneer for many years and he built up a thriving business from his offices on Main Street.

Seán was also a very successful hotelier and he owned and operated the very successful International Hotel, now managed by his daughter Tracy, for many years.

He was one of the founder members of Killarney of the Welcomes, an organisation established to promote Killarney as a top quality tourist destination and he worked tirelessly to promote the town at a national and international level.

That organisation later led to the formation of the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and it was Seán Coyne that spearheaded the successful bid to encourage the Government to hold a full cabinet meeting



at Muckross House as rural Ireland reopened following the foot-and-mouth crisis in 2001. Seán was also a founder member of the Kerry Parents and Friends Association and he contributed enormously to the success of that organisation, helping to provide essential

services for so many. Seán was a superb golfer and he was one of the flagbearers for Killarney Golf and Fishing Club on the national amateur circuit for many years, representing the club in senior Irish internationals. He was captain of Killarney Golf and Fishing Club in 2004 and president in 2013.

ENGLISH PAPER 1 GETS A THUMBS UP FROM STUDENTS

Students at the three secondary schools in Killarney gave the thumbs up on Wednesday following their first exam in the Junior and Leaving Certificate State examinations.

With the exams currenty underway the HSE are encouraging students to spot the signs of stress and to know how to manage anxiety related to their exams. Stress levels can be higher than usual around exam time. While a bit of stress can help you to stay motivated and focused, too much can be unhelpful.

Mark Smyth, Senior Clinical Psychologist, HSE says, "Exam time can be an anxious, stressful and potentially overwhelming experience. Remember, test taking anxiety is normal, and because anxiety is an emotion it will pass if you give it time. The more you fight it the longer it will last. As the phrase goes, "If you see a wave coming, grab a surfboard."

He has also provided some tips on how best to manage exam stress:

SLEEP: Getting a good night's sleep is the best thing you can do to help you perform well in exams and stay focused during study. **EAT:** Try to eat regularly and stay hydrated. Continuing the car analogy, a car won't run without petrol.

EXERCISE: Regular exercise can help to relieve some of the stress buildup and improve your mood.

DOWNTIME: Make time for some fun, it's not only allowed, it's recommended.

POST-MORTEMS: Dwelling on what has already happened will only mess with your head.

Remember exams don't define you as a person - we're all more interesting and important than a grade on an exam.

A 'First Date' WINS BEST DRESSED AT LISTOWEL RACES



The opportunity to learn everything there is to know about Killarney Water Rescue is available to all this week as the group will be hosting its first open day this weekend, Sunday 12th of June, at the Gleneagle Hotel car park from 10am to 2pm.

"On the day, we will have a range of equipment on display such as boats, diver and swift water equipment, new inflatable rescue craft, and demonstrations of how the equipment works and its versatility", Michael McSweeney from the group told Killarney Outlook.

"If you are interested in learning more about the club, training, or even

for a chat, then please join us on the day", Michael added. The club has at least one training session a month were we run through the topography of the waterways, coxswain skills, diver coxswain skills, radio skills, ropework, towing, search, and swift water techniques. Water Rescue is a voluntary-based service that operates 24/7, 365 days a year, and supports other clubs and services such as Kerry Mountain Rescue, Killarney Fire and Rescue Service, Irish Underwater Search and Recovery Council, National Parks and Wildlife Service, Garda Síochána, and the Irish Coast Guard.

SHORTAGE OF STAFF IN TOURISM IN KILLARNEY: A EUROPEAN PROBLEM


Jobs fairs for the tourist industry in Killarney are a new phenomenon. The era of rich pickings of professional labour from Poland and the former communist bloc countries with the expansion of Europe twenty years ago sems truly over.

Tourism operators are at their wits end anand there are reports of premises countywide, closing off rooms and having to turn away bookings. There may be a silver lining: During that period of EU expansion local teenagers and students found it next to impossible to pick up what was a traditional and much valued form of seasonal employment for them locally.

However the local student is again much prized. And Killarney is not alone - anyone who stays anywhere in the Dublin region will find most front of house staff these days are third and second level students.

Various establishments in the capital are factoring in training days for their students, I hear. Not only does this guarantee professional standards but it also builds a sense of loyalty. Perhaps short block courses is something our third level tourism college in Tralee might consider? Or even our second level schools?

We are so good at marketing the tourism product, and there is huge spend and focus by the council, and Failte and Tourism Ireland on marketing. But right now this is like selling a car on its looks alone. What about the wheels and the engine? Not to mention the steering wheel? Our educators and council and State training agencies really need to roll up their sleeves and look under the bonnet.



Is it time the EU rowed in and provided initiatives such as Erasmuslike work exchanges specifically for the tourist industry to help raise and expand standards and so help to make tourism an exciting and challenging place for young people once again?

Perhaps our able local man in Brussels - Sean Kelly - and his outspoken colleagues from Munster could float the idea?

But not only our local authorities and colleges.

Time to only check in once

Kerry airport is a gem according to recent publicity in the Independent by the new Kerry Rose Edaein O'Connell who in a lively piece likened the airport to a Buddhist temple and spoke of how a tractor was used to ferry luggage and half the people in the airport were drinking at 10am in the morning!

All praise is welcome. But Ms O'Connell and indeed another veteran journalist on Morning Ireland in recent weeks made the common mistake of suggesting to everyone they could check in to Kerry for connecting flights and

then avoid security in Dublin.

"You'll avoid security if you get a connecting flight," Ms O'Connell wrote in April.

This is not the case, unfortunately. And not only do you have to check in twice, flying from Kerry and catching another but the connecting corridor between Terminal One and Terminal Two is still closed!

So you actually have to leave the building altogether if you're landing from Kerry and catching a European flight.

Cllr Terry O'Brien a board member of Kerry Airport is pushing for this

ridiculous scenario to be addressed - as it once was for luggage from the US. The Tralee Labour councillor is lobbying so passengers from Kerry via Dublin to other destinations only have to check in once.

Still on the trail of the Annals

Jimmy Deenihan tells me he is still on the trail of the Annals of Inisfallen and their return to Killarney. The entries written on the lake - roughly the 11th, 12th and 13th centuries provide rich reading. The 13th century in particular was a time of great transition in Ireland and in Munster - not unlike what we are going through now.

Local warfare between chieftains is recorded with the "principal foreigners" the Norman Irish lining up with one side or other. On occasion as in 1280 the wars were against the foreigner! Famine follows many of these raids and wars and the women and children and underlings as they are called suffer most, having to leave home to beg for food.

However local chieftain Domnall Carthy, king of Deas Mumhan managed to put a stop to the pointless wars. In 1281 Domnall sent letters and messages to the various factions pointing out that "they were only wasting Ireland and their own patrimony," and they listened to him and stopped the mad wars.

You would wonder sometimes if we have learned anything since the 13th century.

Perhaps the Killarney annals written on the lower lake island should be required reading for our national and indeed international politicians; Perhaps if they read the medieval annals of Inisfallen, they might not be in such a hurry to send arms to the war and instead get stuck into working for a solution. As I have said previously I am still not hearing calls for peace amid the drama and the condemnation. And this is guite shocking on the anniversary of the Normandy landings meant to end all wars.

MAKE THE MOST OF THE OPPORTUNITY TO **DO WELL IN THE 2022 STATE EXAMS**



fter a long wait, there is tangible relief that the state exams are finally underway. Like many important milestones, the anticipation is often worse than the event itself. The first morning was the most nerve racking as it involved some formality. However, once the question papers were distributed and the candidates warmed to their task, the tension of the morning quickly evaporated.

exam timetable mainly prioritises The compulsory subjects during the early days of the exam. As the exams progress into the second and subsequent weeks, the optional subjects are nicely spaced out allowing for study days. But, as they continue until Tuesday, 28th June, it's important to treat the state exams more like a marathon than a sprint. After sitting a few subjects, candidates now realise that exams test not only your knowledge but also your concentration and ability to utilise every available minute. So, stay in exam mode until you leave the exam venue after the very last subject.

Depending on the subjects being sat, the entire exam will conclude reasonably early for some candidates. Others will have to stay focussed until the very last subject on the final day. Irrespective of when you are due to finish the exam, keep in mind that you have prepared diligently for the exam. This is what you have been waiting for. Make the most of the opportunity to do well. Reap the rewards of years of study by performing to your optimum ability in each subject.

After three busy days of exams, the coming weekend will bring welcome relief and give candidates a chance to relax a little, to take stock and plan ahead. Spend as little time as possible on post-mortems. Review your tactical approach over the first week. If you are totally satisfied with your strategy before, during and after each subject then you need change very little. Focus on next week's subjects and forget about the subjects that have already been examined. Your entire concentration must be on the subjects still to be examined.

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries for the second week and to do some subject revision. Take some active leisure to burn off the residual tension of the first week. It will help you to sleep soundly and to maintain the levels of stamina, endurance and staying power needed for the challenges ahead. Avail of a few good nights' rest, which is essential for alertness. Resist the temptation to study late into the night. Confine your study to daylight hours, enjoy your period of exercise and go to bed early. Defer any latenight socialising until your exam is over. Keep your fluid intake high to avoid dehydration but be moderate in your use of artificial stimulants such as tea and coffee. Keep a clear head by abstaining from alcohol during the exam period.

Concentrate on subjects being examined next week. Prioritise your revision according to the timetable. Go over the tips and predictions that have been made for the subjects you are sitting during week two. Use your study days well and study wisely by not cramming. At this stage the quality of your revision is more important than the length of time you spend at it. On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts are fresh in your mind.

You are off to a great start after the first week. Maintain your discipline during week two. Keep a good thought for yourself and stay positive. Have confidence in your ability to do well in your second week's papers. You are now well settled in and rising to the challenge. Deal with each subject as it comes and by this time next week it may all be behind you.


DEXTER PROMPTS MARY TO HOST CHARITY CONCERT





€ 30 million over three years to support a sustainable, nationwide Post Office network

New Government funding will support the Post Office network in Kerry, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said, "My colleague, the Minister of State with responsibility for Postal Matters, Hildegarde Naughton TD, has updated me on a new Government funding package of €30 million over a three-year fixed period, to support a sustainable, nationwide Post Office network.

"Fine Gael is working to build stronger, safer communities and our local post offices play a vital role in community life. We recognise the importance of a high-value and high-quality Post Office network to citizens right across the country, as well as the central and trusted role of postmasters in our communities.

"This funding announcement marks the first Kerry." time in the history of Government where Minister Hildegarde Naughton, who has Special

we are providing direct financial support to post masters. It will give them certainty and stability, allowing them to plan and develop their services. Government is encouraging the Post Office network to deliver an increased range of community banking and e-commerce services to the public and businesses. A report from the Inter-Departmental Group, which was established to examine the feasibility of additional Government services being provided through An Post and the Post Office network, will be published shortly.

"The funding will also help safeguard the future of more vulnerable post offices in our communities.

"It is so important that people have access to the quality services offered by the Post Office network, whether they are living in urban or rural Ireland. This funding will help to ensure that access for everyone, wherever they live in Kerry."

Responsibility for Postal Matters, added, "Post offices are a vital part of our community; a fact clearly evident in the monthly footfall of over one million visitors to post offices. Post offices play a central role to both society as a whole and to Government through the provision of high-quality public services in towns, villages and cities right across the country. I am confident that this €30 million multi annual scheme, amounting to €10m every year for three years, will protect our Post Office network and will ensure that families and businesses nationwide can continue to access services from within their own community.

"It would be remiss of me not to take this opportunity to commend the work of post masters and post office workers throughout what were incredibly challenging times during the height of Covid-19; indeed, they have brought a whole new meaning to the term public service."

EV CHARGING



The Fianna Fáil Deputy Mayor of Kerry, Councillor Michael Cahill has called on Kerry County Council to "install as a matter of urgency, Electric Vehicle Charging Points at regular intervals along the Ring of Kerry route, at all towns and villages, to accommodate residents and visitors who drive Electric vehicles and to encourage both visitors and residents to move away from the Petrol and Diesel options."

In its reply, Kerry County Council stated that it "is committed to supporting and facilitating the installation of EV charge points throughout the county. However, to date, the Council has not installed and does not operate any public EV charge points but has worked with the private sector to facilitate the installation of EV charge points in a number of public car parks." "Sales of new Electric and Hybrid cars in the first couple of months account for 20% of Irish car sales according to a recent newspaper report, which indicates a sharp rise over the past three years or so. When encouraging visitors and residents alike to use EVs, we

have a responsibility to provide the facilities to charge them" stated Councillor Cahill.

"None of us could envisage travelling the Ring of Kerry, if diesel/petrol was available only in Killarney. We all expect that we can refuel in Killorglin, Glenbeigh, Cahersiveen, Sneem or anywhere else along the route that we might decide to stop at. How can we expect locals or tourists, who drive an EV, to be any different?" questioned the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The world of transport is evolving, apparently towards EVs and here in Kerry we must evolve with it. We must be proactive not reactive, and make every effort to be ready with EV Charging Points in place to serve our motoring public" added Councillor Cahill.

CAMHS REDRESS SCHEME

The Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group are grateful for Minister of State, Mary Butler's continued support and the 'extraordinary work' she has done on behalf of the children in South Kerry affected by CAMHS, but they do have a large number of queries around the Redress Scheme that has been announced, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill.

"Earlier this year in Leinster House, members of the Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group and I met with Minister Butler, who has responsibility for Mental Health at the Department of Health and who has done trojan work for the KCFSG and it is appreciated, I can assure her. But the makeup of the CAMHS Redress Scheme requires some clarity and possible tweaking" stated Councillor Cahill, who has been working closely with the families. "Is the Mediator mentioned actually an Arbitrator, how many of them are there, why are they appointed by the HSE, can families have an input? Will present support costs be taken from the Redress figure announced? Why should General damages be reduced by Special damages? And is any compensation awarded to be held in trust for the patient or is it available immediately to the families" asked Councillor Cahill.

"These are a sample of the queries that families require now and I am hopeful that the Department of Health will be in a position to provide satisfactory answers and/ or solutions to them" stated the Deputy Mayor of Kerry.

"We now have an opportunity to assist all these families who have greatly sffered and have been put through so much over the years and no stone can be left unturned " added Councillor Cahill.




ring finger.

EYES IN THE SUN

Too much sun can damage the eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems.

There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems. UV-A

Can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye. UV-B

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

WHAT EYE PROBLEMS CAN UV **RAYS CAUSE?**

Macular Degeneration

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people. Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eve's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea. Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind. Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure. **Corneal Sunburn**

Corneal sunhurn called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

PROTECTING YOUR EYES FROM THE SUN

If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

HURLING

Late Heartbreak for Kerry Hurlers

It was said of brave men in the gory medieval past that "they died with their boots on" or that they "had their wounds in front", i.e. they died facing the enemy. Over-used clichés nowadays, they can fairly be applied to the magnificent Kerry hurlers who were massive underdogs against Antrim and looked well out of their depth at times throughout the game, but rallied incredibly and in the end bowed out by just a single controversial point. Hurling aficionados can be over-proud of the game at times; it isn't always a spectacle and, contrary to some of the nonsense I have heard spouted, of course you can have negative and defensive hurling. But at its finest, their really is no greater sporting spectacle - I will unabashedly say that gaelic football at its finest cannot match it, and this game between Kerry and Antrim was hurling at its finest.

I never thought Kerry would reach this final, their third in a row, after their appalling start against Down. I was even suspicious of our late and hard-fought victory over Antrim earlier on – that wasn't Antrim at full power, and it showed. This was the Saffron Army at full strength, and it really looked early on as if Kerry would be swamped.

Conall Cunning and Padraig Boyle traded early frees before Neil McManus nudged Antrim ahead. Ciaran Clarke got their first goal after just four minutes and a great run by Joe Maskey - too easy, to be honeast. Padraig Boyle pointed from long range but Kieran Molloy countered and then James McNaughton swooped in for their second goal. Fionán Mackessy (another certainty for Team of the Year) pointed from distance but four on the trot for Conall Cunning and a second point from Molloy meant that we were trailing by 2-8 to 0-3. Pádraig and Gavin Dooley swapped scores with Cunning and Ciarán Clarke before Paudie O'Connor found Fionán Mackessy, who powered through to win a penalty converted by Pádraig. The Ballyduff sharpshooter had moved into full forward and was posing problems as Kerry trimmed the gap back to a manageable 2-13 to 1-10. However, Seán Elliott pounced for a tap-in goal after Louis Dee had saved well from Kieran Molloy and Conall Cunning pointed to close out the first half scoring.

Half-time Antrim 3-14 Kerry 1-10

Daniel Collins opened the second half scoring but Clarke and Cunning replied. Padraig Boyle (f) and Jordan Conway cut the gap back to six points – Conway was, yet again, scintillating brilliance on his introduction. Kerry suffered another hammer blow, though, with Conall Cunning sweeping in for yet another goal (Antrim had averaged four goals a game in the group stage). 4-16 to 1-14, and Kerry's slender hopes were sinking fast again despite points from Boyle and Shane Conway. Kerry were inching towards parity, but Antrim always seemed able to just nudge that little bit further ahead and the truth is that they always looked capable of pulling a goal out of nowhere - we didn't. After fifty minutes of play it was 4-17 to 1-18. Kerry had been denied a goal when Shane Conway's rocket had been diverted by keeper Ryan reianited Conway

Kerry's hopes with a great strike. Michael Bradley pointed for Antrim but again Jordan swept in like an avenging angel to hit the net and suddenly it was 4-18 to 3-18. A Pádraig free cut the gap back to just two points. Game on! And just inches from the mountain top, Kerry slipped back like Sisyphus as Antrim sliced once more through our defence to win a penalty coolly converted by Ciarán Clarke. 5-18 to 3-19. And still we weren't done. A trend throughout all of our games, Kerry just simply refused to accept defeat . Maurice O'Connor picked off a good point. Michael Leane added another. The unstoppable Pádraig Boyle made it a two point game again, 5-18 to 3-22.

Conor Cunning slotted a free. This one was highly controversial - the plain fact is that Daniel McKernan slipped, nothing else. Kerry supporters have been unhappy about that one. Look, be fair to referees - Seán Stack and his officials gave everything to this game as well and a referee has to make at least a thousand calls in any game – he got by far and away the vast majority of them right. Yes, he did make one mistake, but any notion that it cost us the game is just nonsense. What cost us the game was the fact that Antrim got in too easily to score goals earlier on in the contest, and that's what we must focus on correcting in the future. Build back better - complaining about the referee has a touch of sour grapes about it as far as I am concerned.

And still we weren't done. At the end Pádraig Boyle wrote a fitting coda to one of the greatest individual championship campaigns of all time by bursting through for one last stunning goal, one last cry of defiance to the hurling gods. It was already a moot point – the large hand on the clock dial had already moved too far for Kerry to claw back that last sliver of a lead by Antrim – but it said everything about the character of this Kerry team. I have no hesitation in congratulating Antrim – a quality side who have shown Kerry what can be done in their progression – but I also have to congratulate this great Kerry team despite their defeat. Losing on the scoreboard isn't the measure of anyone or anything, and this is as great a Kerry team as any that ever took the field.

They'll have another chance to show it again next weekend when they take on Wexford in Austin Stack Park in the All Ireland Quarter-Final. The fact that Wexford lost to Westmeath is a good sign for Kerry in this one. Personally I'd move Colum Harty back out to midfield and give Pádraig a free role and I would be starting Jordan Conway (he has been phenomenal off the bench in every game). We have to stop goals – Wexford will run at us all day – and we need to fire up our engine much sooner, we are slow starters. It's almost certainly a bridge too far against the Division One side, but after this display, Wexford will be just as worried about us.

In fact they are coming in towards the quarterfinals with a series of hard battles under their belts - only a real contender would have emerged from this one with a win. Monaghan gave them nothing easy - Donie Buckley brought his magic to their obdurate defence. I'd be genuinely fearful of Mayo – they are the one team who seem to be getting stronger throughout this competition (I genuinely fear that we are coming in very cold to the hot battles).

Armagh 1-16 Tyrone 1-10

The Sam Maguire will be finding a new residence (hopefully Kerry) after the reigning champions bowed out to Kieran McGeeney's Armagh. This was a hugely physical contest, hard-fought but reasonably honest, but on Armagh's side it was also sprinkled with some spectacular scores, with the likes of O'Neill and Campbell outstanding. In truth Tyrone haven't looked the same side at all last year. The fact that Mickey Harte's Louth has lasted longer in the championship will have a certain schadenfreude within the county, but they can't (and creditably, didn't) make any excuses. Armagh were simply better. Especially impressive was their willingness to continue to attack (albeit not in full numbers, of course!) during the second half.

Oh boy. Oh anam an diabhal. Oh, lads. This is the kind of report that becomes almost standard when you have followed Ireland for years. Plucky underdogs not given a hope by anyone (including yours truly). Backs to the wall defending. Ordinary players growing into giants as the game wears on, buoyed by the huge support of a faithful army of supporters. Somehow defying all the odds to snatch a....well, in our case, it's usually a draw that involves a headed goal in injury time.

Except that we weren't the plucky underdogs

here. Armenia came into this game ranked 92nd in the world (we were 47th), coming off the back of a 9-0 hammering by Norway. In their last ten games, they had managed a 1-0 win over the traditional superpower that is Montenegro. Henrik Mikhtaryan would have been easily their most famous player – except that he had retired.

Look, there's no question that Ireland were the superior team in play over the 90 odd minutes. We had the vast majority of the attacking play, albeit little enough that contained real venom or purpose. Robinson hit the side netting with a decent shot – good movement and a good ball through. Jeff Hendrick played Robinson in with a well-weighted pass and he flicked on to Ogbene – the shot was a bit awkward but the defender did well to clear. Ogbene hit wide with another chance and should have done better with a headed chance.

Armenia had produced only one chance by then, in fact the first real chance of the match. I have to say that the Irish defence were a bit lax at times – Nathan Collins was trying to be a lot too clever dribbling out of his own defence and deserved to be robbed. The subsequent shot had a real whiff of sulphur about it, parried well by Kelliher – significantly, Ireland's multiplicity of attacks weren't producing anything with that scent of danger. Once again, no cutting edge.

Armenia very nearly got in on the napping defence at the start of the second half, and then they did get the ball in the net, only for it to be ruled offside in the build-up. Again an Irish player had surrendered possession much too easily (uncharacteristic of Stevens, to be fair) but again their reaction was much faster than ours. Less than ten minutes later, Armenia had another shot just over the crossbar, dipping wickedly as it went. Ireland, for all their possession, were getting plenty of warnings....and didn't heed them. In the 74th minute Eduard Spertsyan got too much room to shoot, albeit from distance, and hit an absolutely brilliant shot in off the post. Pinpoint accuracy, pace, and power on the ball....the exact opposite of our own scoring attempts.

And we huffed, and we puffed, but we could not blow that house down.....

Ogbene really impressed me for Ireland. Didn't score, but always got into dangerous positions and wasn't afraid to go for it. Troy Parrott just never got going – I know that Armenia crowded their backline, but these are the games that you need to earn your corn. Mind you, asking out-and-out striker Parrott be a playmaker is like calling a carpenter to fix your plumbing. Robinson looked fairly pedestrian, but in fairness he gave it absolutely everything, a real trojan. There's talk of Nathan Collins being wanted by Premiership clubs – seriously?

I don't blame Stephen Kenny for this – the simple truth is that Ireland don't have great players, as their club standings show, and that's down to our development system. But we still haven't won a Nations League game (we have scored the whopping total of two goals in eleven games) and once again we are already talking about avoiding relegation to the third tier rather than promotion. The truth is that the clock has to be ticking loudly in Kenny's case,

Irish supporters expectations are tempered, not extinguished, and their patience is finite. Of course, the FAI can hardly afford to pay off another managerial contract after the hames that they made of Mick McCarthy's and Robbie Keane's, especially without Denis O'Brien's largesse. Kenny did himself no favours, though, by bristling prior to the game when Ireland's poor record was brought up, and his interview after the game where he claimed that Armenia really had just the once chance...the job takes a real toll; Kenny was always a straight talker before.

Look, by the time you read this, Ireland will have played Ukraine on Wednesday and hopefully we will have a win under our belts as we prepare for Scotland tomorrow. The view might be very different to the immediate aftermath of this defeat. But at best, questions will linger about this Irish team.

KERRY FC

The best soccer news of all. Α statement was released last week announcing that a new entity, Kerry FC, had applied for a license to compete in the League of Ireland. This has been a



long bugbear of mine, that Kerry has no team competing in the League. All the guff about our development programmes has been so much hot air and meaningless noise without that most obvious of all steps – I have always made clear my contempt for the histrionic PR nonsense of those underage leagues that involve long travel and expense but don't remotely compare to meaningful club competitions in terms of development.

It's the travel and expense that has stymied Kerry soccer from this crucial step forward; it was never about a lack of player quality. I'm especially glad to see Billy Dennehy and Steven Conway involved - players with top experience in the League. Billy Dennehy is probably the best player that Kerry has ever produced from within its own ranks (Killarney Athletic's Brendan Moloney would certainly be in that conversation), and knows Kerry soccer inside out after coaching the U17s and U19s, while Conway was a sublime and combative midfielder for the county. Dubliner Brian Ainscough played a bit in the League of Ireland, but would be best known as a very successful colleges coach in the US (Conway and Ainscough are both US-based) and CEO of the Boston Bolts, an MLS Academy Club. There are issues that have yet to be revealed - the funding basis, whether the new team will be amateur or semi-pro, and where the playing pool of players will come from. Getting the Kerry clubs on board with this project will be vital hopefully they will take the long view rather than cosseting their short-term but ultimately costly prospects. Mounthawk Park will be Kerry FC's home venue, and hopefully by February next year there will be supporters heading to Kerry soccer's spiritual home to cheer them on.

I know there's an element of counting chickens while looking at eggs about all of this, but at the same time as long as the funding checks out and there's a clear core of executive management (

managing the team), McDonagh Cup Final. I can't see any reason

why this application would be refused. It wouldn't just be good for Kerry. The League of Ireland has received some bad press recently for off-field reasons, but it's the highest level of soccer on this island and the amalgamation of Dublin teamsBray Wanderers and Cabinteely last year leaves an obvious opening and the fact that the FAI have been directly involved in discussions regarding this application is a very positive sign.

Let us talk of more cheerful subjects. Jim Crawford's U21 side moved into very real contention for a play-off place for the European Championships. Granted, Bosnia Herzegovina would not be considered the top calibre of opposition, but teams like that can be very hard to break down (as we know full well after the senior game!). In the circumstances, this was a great performance. Ireland weren't just aggressive in winning the ball, they also used it brilliantly. Not all the feints and inter-flicks worked, but ambition was rewarded more often than not and they moved with a confidence that we haven't seen at senior level for a long time. Will Smallbone was the main headline with two goals, and was outstanding in general play, but Odubeko was a brilliant foil for him and my man of the match. It was Odubeko who laid off neatly for Smallbone to use his pace and get in for the first goal - the keeper could and really should have done better for that one. The second goal was up there with the best Irish goals I have ever seen, it really was. That was no hoof out of defence; that was a pass under pressure to Odubeko's feet. His one touch was a sublime flick onto Matthew Tierney, who returned it in equal style - those passes look simple but it's getting the balance of it measured perfectly so that the player can take it easily at full stride that requires mastery. From there, Odubeko's piledriver past the hapless keeper was actually the simplest part of that goal - even that was good technique with a bobbling ball. The third one was comparatively simple, a low ball drilled across the goal that wasn't dealt with properly defensively, leaving Smallbone with a simple tap-in at the back post

ATHLETICS Silver For Sarah Leahy

Ireland's ladies have been making huge strides both literally and metaphorically on the world's athletics tracks recently. The headliner, of course, has to be Rhadisat Adeleke. The 19 year old came third in the final of the Big Twelve in US college athletics in the 400m, representing Texas University, in a time of 50.70, beating Joanne Ciuddihy's 15 year Irish record for the distance. It also gualified her for the World Championships in Oregon next month. Adeleke now holds the Irish records at...deep breath here...60m, 200m, 300m, and 400m. Moreover, given that the only two runners faster than her were her Texas training team-mates, it implies to me that she is being trained by the best alongside the best.

Sarah Healy has been tearing up the record books with equal aplomb, setting a new U23 (fourth overall in Iris athletics) 1500m time of 4.02:86, beating the 31 year record held by another Cork native, a certain Sonia O'Sullivan. Healy also set a new Irish mile record three weeks ago of 4.29:03 in recent weeks.

Killarney has a sprinter right up there with the very best of them, and Sarah Leahy proved it yet again (not that she of all people needed to after her double gold at the Irish University Championships) who wore the Irish senior vest for the first time and adorned it with a silver medal after running 11.80 in the 100m in Athens.

Congratulations also to Lios Tuathal AC, whose U23 Ladies 4 x 100m Relay Team set a new record of 49.84 at the Munster U23 Championships.

Oisin Lynch of Killarney Valley ran a personal best of 1.56.83 to take silver in the 800m, with teammate Jack O'Leary coming in third. Tadhg Galvin, also of Killarney Valley, took gold in the 400m junior hurdles.





RENEWING YOUR PASSPORT

My passport is almost out of date, how do I get a new one?

You can apply:

- Online, through Passport Online
- By post, through Passport Express

• In person, through the Passport Office's counter service in Dublin and Cork

How long will it take?

Applying online is the fastest way, with simple adult renewals taking 10 working days. More complex renewals can take about 15 days. You can also track the status of your application online.

The turnaround time when applying by post is currently averaging 8 weeks. Updates on services and the latest turnaround times are available on the Passport Service's website.

If you are unable to wait, there is an Urgent Appointment Service for passport renewal. You must book an Urgent Passport Appointment to go to the office in Dublin, Cork or London.

How much will it cost?

The fees for a standard 10-year passport are:

- Online: €75 (plus €15 postage if you live outside Ireland)
- By post: €80 (plus €9.50 admin and postage fees)
- In person: €95 (Additional charges may apply)

What if I lose my passport?

If you lose your passport in Ireland, contact the Gardaí and the passport office.

If you lose your passport while you are abroad, call the local police and contact your nearest Irish embassy.

For anyone needing information, advice or have an advocacy issue, you can call a member of the local **Citizens Information team in Kerry** on **0818 07 7860**, they will be happy to assist and make an appointment if necessary.

LONELINESS

As social beings, we are hard wired to connect and most of us feel the need for rewarding social contact and relationships. Loneliness is the feeling we get when our need for this type of contact is not met. This is especially significant at this time when we have been asked to stay at home. Loneliness of course is not the same as being alone. We may choose to be alone and live very happy lives without much contact with others. Or indeed we may have much online social contact, and yet feel very lonely. Loneliness can have a significant impact on our mental health and can contribute to mental health problems, such as anxiety and depression. Loneliness can have many different causes and affects people in different ways. Some people feel lonely due to their personal circumstances (e.g. moving to a new area, loss or bereavement). For others however, loneliness can be a deeper more constant feeling that comes from within.

Connecting with the world around us can be a great way to combat loneliness. This may be having a small conversation with the cashier when we pay for our groceries or saying hello to someone we meet in the street. Phoning or sending an email to family and friends can be a good reminder that we do have people in our lives.

Our brain can try to make sense of the feeling of loneliness by telling us things such as 'It is because nobody loves me' or 'There is something wrong with me' These thoughts are not facts - and can make us feel worse. Thus it is important to accept how we are feeling without overreacting. When we feel lonely, the tendency might be to withdraw into ourselves and this can be counterproductive. The healthiest thing to do if we are feeling lonely is to reach out and cultivate friendships. Reaching out can be difficult and at times we will resist it. However, think of it in the way you might approach exercising - whilst we may feel tired or lazy it is a beneficial thing to do. We need to tackle loneliness one step at a time. It may involve finding a new hobby or joining a club or exercise class. Another skillful way to combat feelings of loneliness is to volunteer as it's a great way to meet new people and also to learn new skills.

Loneliness is a profoundly human emotion and a signal that our need for connection is going unmet.

PLANTING A COLOURFU

When planting a colourful flower bowl, choose your bowl from either terracotta or plastic but make sure to get a saucer underneath when purchasing. Then put some gravel around the base surrounding the hole and add compost mixed with slow release fertilizer.

Fill your bowl to about one inch from the top as this will make it easier when watering afterwards. When choosing the plants start with the centre piece. An ideal plant for this would be an evergreen grass. This is an ideal plant as when you are finished with the bowl, the evergreen grass can be planted outdoors.

There are a huge range of plants with colour to fill around the centre piece. Some of the most popular to choose from are trailing variegated ivys, heathers in flower, primroses, polyanthus, forget-me-nots and you will also still be able to get some potted daffodils and tulips.

When finished planting, make sure to water the plants well, and if you decide to keep the flower bowl indoors make sure that the saucer is underneath. Keep the finished bowl in as much light as possible and this will flower well into the time for Summer bedding. As certain flowers go off before others, dont be afraid to remove them as this will keep your bowl looking good for longer.





Welcome back dear student continuing our study of hardened hearts (the previous articles are on our Facebook page - Word of Victory Christian Fellowship Killarney). This weekly Bible study is training and equipping us as disciples and we will reap a harvest from implanting the seed of God's Word in our hearts (Isaiah 55:10-11). This is how Jesus operated during His earthly ministry - He poured the Word of God into His followers to disciple and equip them for the ministry of spreading the Good News - the Gospel (Luke 10). Then God confirmed the Word with signs and wonders. "Later He appeared to the eleven as they sat at the table; and He rebuked their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they did not believe those who had seen Him after He had risen. "And He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptised will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned. And these signs will follow those who believe: In My Name they will cast out demons; they will speak with new tongues; they will take up serpents; and if they drink anything deadly, it will by no means hurt them; they will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover.' So then, after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into Heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God. And they went out and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the Word through the accompanying signs." (Mark 16:14-20 NKJV)

Signs and wonders - miracles and supernatural healing, follow the preaching of God's Word! Why has this part of the Gospel disappeared from much of the church? Doubt and unbelief peddled by the devil's lies, sin and empty traditions has infested people's thinking, and hardened hearts (Mark 7:1-9). It is easier to doubt than to believe. Interestingly, when Jesus comes back for His church (and friend look around you at the world - Jesus is coming soon) He won't be looking for anything else except faith (Luke 18:1-8; Luke 17:22-30). So, whose report will we believe? (Isaiah 53:1-11). There are plenty of voices speaking, but we need the Holy Spirit to instruct us and lead us into the Truth as we lean in to hear God's voice (Proverbs 4:20-26). In order to do that we need to remain humble and tender hearted, trusting and, teachable! Jesus rebuked His disciple Thomas for doubting that God had raised Him from the dead. Thomas must have felt quite foolish when Jesus appeared in the room with the disciples (even though the doors were locked) and told Him to touch Him where the nails and the sword had pierced Him. "Then He said to Thomas, "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing" (John 20:27 NKJV). Let's pray..... "Dear God, I want to know You. I ask You to forgive all my sins and cleanse me with the blood of Your Son Jesus. I renounce all doubt and every evil work of Satan. Lord Jesus, please come into my heart and take over and be my Lord. Fill me with Your Holy Spirit, teach me Your Word and heal me. I give You my life because I believe in You Jesus, in Your Name I pray, Amen.


