n an effort to highlight the plight of 14 year old Ronan Foley, his family, friends and school community have launched a video on Ronan's story on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter this week.

The group are using the hashtag #RonansOpNow to raise awareness.

In a follow up to last week's article on Ronan in Killarney Outlook, Joesphine Doncell, one of Ronan's teachers is asking everyone to follow, like, share, retweet, comment, etc to help spread the message far and wide.

"We have been overwhelmed with all the support and we are heading for 200,000 views of the video now", Josephine told Killarney Outlook. "We are very grateful to have our local photographer, Ian Cronin help produce the video and get the excellent footage on the video with his drone camera and also lucky enough to have Irish actor Frank O'Sullivan narrate the story so effectively in the video and we appreciate him giving his time to do this for Ronan", Josephine added. "However, Ronan is still waiting and there is no end in sight for him. His parents, Tony and Caroline, are finding the lack of transparency and information on what is happening with his operation

particularly distressing. It is amazing in such a large organisation like the HSE or even Crumlin

Hospital itself

no one can tell them where he is on the waiting list and how he has gone from being scheduled for the operation on March 12th, to it being cancelled 6 days before he was to have it and now not having any idea when the operation will be", Josephine said.

Each day has Ronan still in pain and not able to do what he used to love doing. We need the help of everyone to support our social media campaign and to call on the powers that be whether they are politicians or the HSE to arrange for #RonansOpNow.

When contacted by the Killarney Outlook this week, Deputy Michael Healy Rae TD said he was doing his utmost to ensure that Ronan's case is a priority.

I had to be tough Marie, there is no education like the road".I wanted to touch on Seanie's elegant style of dance. So many of us have seen

him on the Instagram stories at JM Reidy's, a daily mascot, ballroom dancing with tourists and locals alike. So for all you potential strictly out there here's Seanie's advise. "Heel to toe is so important remaining graceful on the floor at all times. Laziness on the floor is elegance. The faster you go the worse you will look".

As I left Seanie, he complimented me familiarly "you're looking well and as a farmer I'm a fine judge of stock Marie". I laughed at the good of it, I always do and regularly follow by usual 'thank you Seanie' but this time Seanie had more to add. "You're a thoroughbred but you know what Marie thoroughbreds are hard to handle". I laughed and laughed. I wasn't prepared for that one. That's Seanie. It's rare to be in his company without laughter which in my opinion is the best medicine. Thank you for the bants & chats Seanie 'The Gentleman Farmer' O'Donoghue.

"Well, I felt like I got out of jail last Monday week Marie. I love my farm and the beautiful walks by the riverside but I did missed the familiar buzz of Killarney" Seanie told me. Well known locally as 'The Gentleman Farmer', Seanie O'Donoghue, a familiar face to many photographers at annual parades, race meetings and as a style icon judging at Fashion Shows and Strictly Come Dancing in the past. While I knew a little about Seanie, I was interested to know more about the life of popular Seanie, the Gentleman Farmer.

Seanie is the 2nd eldest of 6 siblings and resides at White Villa Farm on the Cork Road. "Would you believe our house was the first guesthouse on the Cork Road Marie, serving evening meals, hosting the former Minister for Agriculture Justin Keating and many other TV personalities back in the day. My mother Kate O'Donoghue was quite the host. She was glamorous and kept very high standards across the board". So that's where Seanie's consistent sense of style originated from.

Seanie began to tell me about his organic suckler farming. I confessed I knew little about farming even though I half came from one back home in Tipperary. I also had the misfortune of telling Seanie I am a vegetarian since the age of 7. Ooops. "Did you know Marie that if a cauliflower, apple or potato does not have holes in it, then vegetarians are effectively KILLING (he stressed killing) butterflies and insects. I believe the views of a vegetarian are against the killing of cows etc, well, if vegetarians eat such fruit and vegetables with no holes they are in turn doing similar to butterflies. ELIGIBILITY EXTENSION WELCOMED

Minister for Education Norma Foley TD has warmly welcomed the decision by Cabinet to widen the eligibility criteria for Summer Provision 2020 to include postprimary students with Down syndrome.

Minister Foley said: "I was pleased to bring this proposal to Cabinet yesterday, and secure this important support for postprimary students with Down syndrome. I am deeply conscious of the additional challenges these students have faced in continuing with learning since the Covid-19 closure of school buildings since



March. Providing this additional support is an important step in recognising this difficulty and in preparing these young people for

school re-opening and I would like to thank my Cabinet colleagues for their support in this. "The

expanded programme for Summer Provision 2020 for children with complex needs is being provided to approximately 15,000 children, which is about 5,000 more than the traditional July Provision. The programme is made up of a school-based strand and a home-based strand. 4,000 children will be participating in the programme across more than 240 primary schools. It is estimated that an additional 670 children will be covered by today's decision to expand the eligibility to post-primary students with Down syndrome."

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ALL IRELAND GLORY FOR MICHÉAL

Castleisland Community College student Micheál O Shea was a national winner at the Young Social Innovator's Open Call competition. The competition, which had over 300 entries, looked for young people's ideas about how to overcome the problems that we are facing during the Covid 19 pandemic. Micheál designed an educational board game about Climate Change. The aim of the game, called Climate Conquest, is to educate people on the small changes they can do to help combat climate change. They learn how to adapt their daily routine to reduce their carbon footprint and thus benefit the environment.

Micheál was interviewed online in the final by a panel of judges. The judges feedback included: 'Micheál has taken an idea and turned it into a reality, reaching out for help and advice along the way. This idea is nearly ready for market. Gamification is proven to increase engagement from people, having done your research is great. I was blown away by how much work and thought you put into your idea. Huge congrats and keep working towards the end goal, the future is very bright for you'.

The board game will be used as a teaching device in CSPE and Geography classes. Students will learn about solutions to climate change in a fun and engaging way. Comhghairdeachas do Mhicheál!

As part of this, Kerry County Council is asking visitors to help to ensure that they can play their part in keeping Kerry safe and open for visitors. This includes following the public health guidelines of:

Practising Social Distancing Carrying out regular handwashing Covering your mouth and nose when sneezing Avoiding congregating in large groups Avoiding handshaking or hugging Wearing of facemasks where necessary

"In Kerry, we have had extremely low levels of COVID-19 cases, and as restrictions begin to ease and we welcome visitors to the county, we are able to highlight the significant work that has been carried out by accommodation providers, shops and businesses, communities and Kerry County Council to continue to keep it that way," Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Patrick Connor Scarteen explained.

"As Ireland's prime tourism destination, we want everyone to know that we are open for business, but we are asking all visitors for their help to ensure that Kerry continues to be a safe, welcoming location for visitors."

Chief Executive of Kerry County Council Moira Murrell pointed to the work carried out by all sectors making Kerry safe. "Our Safe Destination Kerry Programme has seen significant work carried out by Kerry County Council to provide additional space on our footpaths and around our towns and villages for people to feel comfortable in. In addition, the Safe Destination Badge identifies tourism and retail premises in Kerry where over 3,000 staff have undergone specialised training on cleanliness, hygiene and customer interaction.

"We are mindful that people want to feel comfortable and safe on their holidays. In Kerry we can offer this, with safe streets, safe shops and safe hotels and guesthouses, and we are asking our guests to be mindful of the health guidelines and help us keep Kerry safe."

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PLENTY OF **AVAILABILITY** For staycations in Kerry

There is still plenty of holiday accommodation available in Kerry, so say the results of a new survey carried out by the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation (KTIF).

In a bid to understand the impact Covid-19 is having on the hospitality industry in Kerry, KTIF members were asked to divulge their occupancy levels from July to October of this year. A total of 51 members in the tourism accommodation sector contributed to the survey over the past week.

While 6% of those surveyed have decided to remain closed for this season, the majority of Kerry's accommodation providers including hotels, guesthouses, B&Bs, self-catering, caravan, camping and glamping sites are already open and welcoming guests.

However, despite government recommendations to holiday in Ireland this year, three quarters of members surveyed report that their occupancy levels are under 30% for the month of July. August figures show a slight improvement with two thirds of members reporting occupancy levels at below 30%.

"This survey indicates that the staycation market is not yet materialising in Kerry. The



majority of our members are less than a third full across July and August. There are of course exceptions, predominately among selfcatering providers who are reporting relatively strong levels of business for July and August. Overall, however, unless there is a sharp rise in bookings this survey indicates that most of our members are facing into a tough few months," says Kerry Tourism Industry Federation Chairman Pat O'Leary. "While it's bad news for the sector, it's good news for the consumer" says Mr O'Leary. "Low occupancy levels means there is still the opportunity to book your staycation in Kerry and avail of the tried and trusted tourism offering here. It also means that consumers can avail of competitive pricing and special offers by booking directly with the accommodation providers."

The minute I got on the horse I knew that this was something that would always be part of my life. When I got home to Killarney, I joined Pony Tails Stables where I learned how to jump, ride and care for horses. The pony I rode there every week was a beautiful grey Irish draught horse who was an amazing jumper. Her name was Missy. Missy was boarded at the stables and owned by three

sisters. She was used for lessons and was probably the most popular pony in the stables. She had a sweet, gentle nature but was a fast mover who loved to jump, everyone loved her. I so looked forward to Saturdays all week so I could spend time with her. I became friendly with the girls who owned her and we would be snap chatting about Missy regularly.

One week I arrived for my lesson and Missy was gone. The girls who owned her had built their own stables at their home and Missy was gone to live there. I was devastated. The months passed, I moved on to another stable called Abbeyglens where I rode some lovely horses but I kept in contact with the girls and they updated me on how Missy was getting on.

My Mom and Dad had promised that I could get a pony of my own this Summer that we would keep on my Grandad's farm. Then the Covid 19 hit and Abbeyglens had to stop doing lessons due to the virus. Life is just not the same without horses in it. My Mom decided to look for a pony for me as I was now off school until September. My Mom must have rang a dozen people enquiring about ponies but none of them turned out to be right for me. I was giving up hope it would ever happen.

BROADBAND ROLLOUT

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill has again called for further resources to be provided, in order that top quality High Speed Broadband can be put in place in every home and business in the county as quickly as is possible.

"High Speed Broadband is needed now by practically every individual and business in the county of Kerry" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor. "And I mean NOW".

"I cannot understand how we were left so far behind in this regard" said Councillor Cahill. "It doesn't take a genius to realise that the success of any business in the modern age depends on High Speed Broadband and yet we are only at the stage of surveying a sample of sites for suitability"

"We need to have this ratcheted up big time if we are not all to be left behind here in Kerry" he said.

"We are attempting to reopen businesses after nearly four months of lockdown and yet the logistics are not in place" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

"The future success of the entire economy of this county is now dependent on the provision and the availability of High Speed Broadband" he said.

"The delivery of Future Proofed High Speed Broadband needs to be completed an awful lot sooner than planned by National Broadband Ireland" added Councillor Cahill. "The Urban/Rural divide in the provision of this service is a form of discrimination that must be ended" stated the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

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TOP SPORTS PHOTOGRAPHER snaps local challenge game



t's not often that one of Ireland's top sports photographers attends a challenge game between two rural clubs in Kerry, but this was the case on Sunday last at Fr. Allman Park in Listry when the local club took on Dromid Pearses in the first game played by both teams since the pandemic.

Sportsfile's Brendan Moran was on hand on Sunday last to see one of the first GAA games take place ahead of the official GAA restart of competitive matches from Friday 17 July in an effort to contain the spread of the coronavirus Covid-19 pandemic. Brendan Moran is credited as one or Ireland's best sports photographers, and has been snapping for Sportsfile for the last 26 years.

He has numerous awards under his belt and as a young photographer he supplied photographs to The Kerryman, Kerryseye and The Kingdom before joining the agency.

He is responsible for some of the most iconic photographs every taken in Ireland and in Europe and has captured the likes of Real Madrid's Cristiano Ronaldo celebrates after scoring his side's fourth goal during the 2014 UEFA Champions League final against Atletico Madrid, Darren Clarke holding the Ryder Cup after Europe's 2006 victory in the K Club in 2006 and Ireland's Sonia O'Sullivan celebrating her victory in the women's 10,000m

final at the European Athletics Championships, Nepstadion, Budapest, Hungary in 1998. Some of his famous photographs include Seamus Callanan, Tipperary, being challenged by Limerick goalkeeper Barry Hennessy, a clash which saw Callanan lose three teeth and leave the pitch for a blood injury before returning late in the game, the Munster Senior Hurling Championship semifinal, Gaelic Grounds, Limerick. The image captured the three teeth in mid flight as they left his mouth. Another was the 1997 photograph Stephen McDonagh of Limerick in action against Aidan Flanagan of Tipperary during a National Hurling League Division 1 match at the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick. Brendan caught the image of the hurl breaking on the arm of Stephen McDonagh during a mid air clash. Listry are currently in Division Two and are being trained by Marc O'Sé.

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DRAWS MADE FOR REVISED 2020 TG4 ALL-IRELAND LADIES FOOTBALLCHAMPIONSHIPS

HAMPIONS Dublin have been pitted with Waterford and Donegal in the round-robin phase of the revised 2020 TG4 All-Ireland Ladies Senior Football Championship.

OUTLOOK GAA

The draws were conducted in Portlaoise this evening (Tuesday), with the four-in-a-row chasing Sky Blues handed a spot in Group 3 of the pool stages.

Galway, the 2019 runners-up, have been drawn with last year's Intermediate winners Tipperary and Monaghan in Group 2, while 11-time Senior champions Cork will battle it out with Munster rivals Kerry, and Ulster representatives Cavan, in Group 1.

Ulster sides Armagh and Tyrone have both been drawn together in Group 4, alongside 2019 semi-finalists Mayo.

The four teams topping their respective groups will progress straight through to the All-Ireland semi-finals, with the 1st team in Group 1 facing off against the Group 2 table-toppers, while the Group 3 winners will play the top team in Group 4.

Dublin, Galway, Cork and Mayo – the 2019 semifinalists – were seeded for the Senior draw.

In the Intermediate Championship, Westmeath will hope for a swift return to the senior ranks following relegation last year.

The Lake County find themselves in an all-Leinster Group 2 alongside Longford and Louth, who were Junior Champions last year. Meath, beaten Intermediate finalists in 2018 and 2019, will battle it out with Leitrim and Down in Group 3, while Group 1 is made up of Roscommon, beaten semi-finalists in 2019, and Leinster counties Offaly and Wexford.

With 13 teams involved in the Intermediate Championship, Group 4 is a group made up of four counties, namely Sligo, Clare, Kildare and Laois.

The top team in Group 1 following the roundrobin phase will play the Group 2 winners in the All-Ireland semi-finals, while the leading teams



in Groups 3 and Group 4 will contest the other semi-final.

Westmeath, Meath, Sligo and Roscommon were seeded for the Intermediate draw.

An open draw determined the make-up of the two groups of three teams for the Junior Championship round-robin phase.

Group 1 contains 2019 runners-up Fermanagh, alongside Carlow and Wicklow, while Derry, Limerick and Antrim have been pitted together in Group 2.

The top two teams in each group will contest the All-Ireland semi-finals, with the Group 1 winners facing the Group 2 runners-up, while the Group 2 table-toppers will face the secondplaced team in Group 1.

Ladies Gaelic Football Association President Marie Hickey and Ard Stiúrthóir TG4, Alan Esslemont, were on hand to conduct the draws, and the 2020 finals will mark the 20th of the long-standing partnership between the LGFA and TG4. It was also confirmed that promotion is on offer for the winners of the 2020 Junior and Intermediate Championships, but relegation will not apply in the Intermediate and Senior grades.

The dates for the 2020 TG4 All-Ireland Ladies Football Championships will be confirmed in due course.

2) Players, parents/guardians, mentors must complete the health questionnaire once only https://returntoplay.gaa.ie and prior to each session click reconfirm if no change to health.

3) All members must have paid their membership in order to participate in training and matches. It will be the responsibility of the player and or parent/guardian to inform the team's Covid supervisor of any change in circumstances before any subsequent sessions. JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

t long last, we are seeing green shoots pushing up through the sleepy social daze of our society in the past four months. As far as business, sport, and tourism as concerned, 2020 is about to begin, and everybody is looking forward to it. We need it, and not just for economic purposes.

There are kids back training and playing challenge games, and oh lads, but they absolutely love it. A lot of ye won't believe me (No, great fault there, you should always include a dollop of salt in anything I say), but I'll swear in any court that there were kids togging off from training at seven o'clock in the morning for training that evening. Mad for road. Mad to meet up with their friends. Mad for the craic - when you are young, that should be the absolute priority in any training session. Meeting up with their friends. Yes, mammy and daddy have been helping them to videophone granny and cousins and friends on whatsapp and zoom and stuff like that. But that's a formal occasion. That's like going to mass. You can't really have a lot of craic at mass (you can, but keep the giggles quiet; you don't want to get caught).

Meeting up with your friends is the best craic of all. And if any mammy or daddy think that children's conversations are cute and innocent when they get together to try and rationalise the stuff that's going on in the slightly mysterious and fascinating adult world....well, the child isn't the only cute and innocent one there.

It takes me back to my own innocent days and the year that changed Kerry football irrevocably. I was only a garsún myself; heroes were real, and I was able to watch them. It was 1975. And look, I may as well be honest; I didn't really have a clue what was going on. But people were excited and happy, and sure, I was joining in with that. If something or other had happened (and I rarely knew what) I was going to cheer as loudly as anyone. I remember 1975 as a blur of colour and noise, standing among crowds and staring at the view around me (mostly a heaving mass of legs with a rare glimpse through them of a field with people running on it. I knew they were playing football, and I had a part share of a football. I wasn't an only child, we had more fights about football than actual games, but that's part of childhood with siblings. And any fool that ever tried to tell me nonsense about girls not being able to play football on account of being too soft I had sisters, and I love them to bits, but they were born and bred stone killers. Even by our house rules (don't even get me started on squareball) biting was frowned upon. Even Mammy, a truly tough and impartial judge, would accept tooth marks as proof that some-one had been 'bold'. But when the girls were playing the boys....well, let's say that the high court was never kept as

busy.

We had a television, but Wanderley Wagon was the extent of our interest in it. Godmother was supposed to be a sort of motherly icon, but to be honest, I always thought she was a bit bossy. O'Brien was gormless, there was never a doubt about that. Even among children for whom arguments were the greatest entertainment of all, nobody was defending the gormlessness of O'Brien.

We did have newspapers. But reading as entertainment? Enid Blyton, or maybe The Hardy Boys or Nancy Drew for the more hard core, but that was about it. Look, we had enough of that to do in school.

"Here's Peter and Jane. This is Spot the Dog. Run, Spot, Run."

Spot must have been the most moronic dog of all time. Spot was useless. And Peter and Jane never struck me as intellectuals either. I'd rather hang out with The Famous Five. They would solve mysteries (on reflection, never very challenging ones) and go home for ginger beer and buns. I was desperately curious about ginger beer. I assumed it was like TK red lemonade with a drop of lager put in.

Children take their cues from adults. Kerry weren't great in the spring of 1975. That, unfortunately, was a given. You had to go back all the way to 1970 for Kerry to win an All Ireland. In child years, that was about a generation and a half ago. That was a hoary old myth, lost away back in history. The loss to Meath in March in the League quarter-final was real, and disastrous. Kerry had won some decent games before that, including a good win in Cork. Cork supporters, obviously, were satanic by nature and I wasn't straying too far from mammy's hand, but they were remarkably human up close. We had ham sandwiches and cheese and onion taytos on the way home, packed into the Datsun and playing "I spy". That was great craic of a day....and there had been some sort of a football match to go with it.

I wasn't at the Meath game, and probably a good job. I'd have been very sulky on the way back.

The consensus was that Kerry were only a team of garsoons themselves. Mick O'Dwyer was a great footballer, but not the man to affect change in our obviously declining fortunes. Donie O'Sullivan left on the bench. Our Donie! Donie was from our club, and the second best footballer of all time (Mick O'Connell's status was more sacrosant than anything in the bible). Donie had tied my brother's laces for him one time! Donie O'Sullivan on the bench. Whatever tiny sliver of hope we had was completely extinguished.

Spa actually did have a great team at the time. O'Donoghue Cup champions, and we would retain it. We had gone as far as a County quarter-final, the only East Kerry side to reach so far, before losing out to an unbelievably good Austin Stacks.

Halcyon days at club, but less so at county. We brought home great stories from school about the land of saints and scholars (it turned out there was a fair dollop of salt required in Irish schooling back then as well). Saints and scholars were grand in their own way, but would there be any chance of a few footballers coming along as well?

I wasn't at the Tipperary game either, but I wasn't bothered about that one. Once I heard on the radio (or rather, the gang of interpreters around the radio in the kitchen) that Kerry

scored an early goal, I knew we would be fine. Ray Prendeville, a grandson of the famous Mundy Prendeville who had won an All Ireland and become an archbishop after (actually, Ray was no relation at all, but all Kerry footballers were basically related to each other in our heads) had scored that one. John Egan added two more in the second half. He was from Sneem, and he was handy. But look, that was just Tipperary. We'd cheer for them against Cork in the hurling (are you kidding me? We'd have cheered for Mordor against Cork in the hurling!) but we weren't reduced to taking them seriously in football yet! Yes, of course we were arrogant. If you think kids are meek and humble, then you have never met any. I was surprised, and worried, when I was informed by reliable sources (my cousin, who was an expert on football and dinosaurs) that Kerry had actually struggled badly in that game. But he might have been winding me up; most people did at some point. I was a serious and gullible child, a dangerous combination.

Munster Final. Kerry and Cork in Killarney. Man and Dad brought the kids along and we squashed in our usual spot on the terrace. We knew the Fitzgerald Stadium; we had even been in there a few times when people were doing jobs in there. I knew all about scoring goals in there, provided there was no opposition and no goalie. Cork. They had been All champions just two years ago. They had been beating Kerry in championship pretty much forever (two years is a long time for a child). The truth is that I was a child who could shake off such appalling tragedies within minutes, especially if I was given a few sweets. I wasn't hopeful today, though. And it looked like my scepticism was well-founded. Cork started really well, narrowly missed a goal, but Kerry scored a brilliant goal, one of the best I have ever seen. Actually, the craft and skill existed only in my imagination; Martin Doherty had very unluckily deflected a Pat Spillane effort into the net. A pure fluke by any standards, but I didn't know that. Paudie O'Mahony saved a penalty. Paudie O'Mahony was from my own place and my own people. We didn't know him personally, but that didn't matter. As far as we were concerned, that save was the intellectual property of our club and there was no debate about man of the match. He made another great save in the second half, and that clinched it. That was, effectively, the end of the Cork bogeyman. Johnny Culloty was a great keeper, we'd tell the Legion lads, but did he ever make a save like that? Actually, Johnny did, and the great gentleman would have gotten a great kick out of us. As far as we were concerned, if a visitor was to argue the point in our kitchen....well, he'd never be refused the cup of tea, but he'd only get rich tea biscuits. More agreeable visitors had a chance of chocolate digestives. The priest would get the almost mythical kimberley or mikado. Jaffa cakes were the strict preserve of Mick O'Connell or the Pope (and his holiness would most likely have been served first, but I wouldn't guarantee it).

I wasn't at the All Ireland semi-final against Sligo. The old adage about Kerry people not travelling to semi-finals had a real grain of truth

in it; money was always going to be a factor in a house with children. Nobody was worried about Sligo anyway. None of us had ever been there or knew anyone from there. One of my sisters' friends supposedly had cousins up there, but had no inside info on their football team. And my sister could have been making that much up, she definitely wasn't trustworthy. Sad to say, we paid no attention to older people who warned us about the legendary Mickey Kearins. One of the greatest footballers of all time deserved far better weaving in the stories we told ourselves, but the young are merciless. We took Kerry's subsequent hammering of Sligo as proof that we were right. It was long over as a contest; I actually think a few of us had left the radio and gone outside kicking ball by the time Egan and Spillane finished it off with goals.

Dublin. The train up. Astronauts had less exciting journeys. It seemed like all the adults on the packed train (and I really do mean packed) knew each other. We played cards (I was genuinely good at 31) for most of the way up. The placenames of the stations were exotic; Mallow was the last one I recognised until Heuston.

Consensus was that Dublin would beat us. The newspapers agreed. Dublin were the greatest thing since the invention of sliced bread (which always puzzled me, I was a lot more impressed by madeira cake than sliced bread). Dublin were defying traditions. Dublin had style and sophisticated Dubliners (i.e. they wore denim or leather and listened to rock music) adored them. Dublin were the ultimate townies; Kerry's country people represented all that was good about Ireland. We must have been insufferable, now that I think about it.

Again, I'm afraid the game was only a backdrop

to us. It was the bright, noisy, packed-in unison of the Kerry people that we small ones soaked up. I remember the cheer for the early goal, but not the circumstances of it – Egan, poacher extraordinaire, had snapped up another loose chance and turned it into gold. I do remember a player (I now know that it was Mickey Ned O'Sullivan) who was brutally stopped in his tracks. Kerry supporters were enraged (neither of my parents approved of the language roared) and we kids joined in. Mam and dad never once did and I would never do it now. Having seen it again, though, I still say it was a bad foul and should have been more severely dealt with. That's just honest opinion.

Kerry were in front all through. Ger O'Driscoll finished it off late on. There was no doubt who was the better team, the best team in the whole country. The best team ever. Hadn't I been saying so all along?

We planned to go crazy on the train home, but actually the buzz of conversation soon lulled us into a deep sleep and I'd say I was only half aware as I was brought home and put to bed. I totally missed the celebratory bonfire and all that craic, but you may rest assured that I lied my head off about it in school the following day.

I was there. I may have been slightly thicker than a very slow sheep and only dimly aware of proceedings, but I was there.

The kids who are now eagerly getting back to training, pretending to be Colm Cooper or David Clifford or James O'Donoghue like I pretended to be Pat Spillane or Jack O'Shea or the elusive and deadly John Egan? They'll have a day like that too. Days like that are far more precious than medals.

The IRA faced many challenges at the beginning of the War of Independence. Due to their shortage of supplies, securing weapons through ambushes and attacks was the only means they had to obtain weapons from their British counterparts. The 5th Battalion decided to seize the RIC Barracks in Rathmore as it was occupied by the British Army. The Barracks in Rathmore was situated beside the train station and it was easily accessible by car and train. The British Army could come and go as they pleased, and the IRA believed it was a stopping point for many Cork soldiers who travelled back and forth to Killarney.

Con O'Leary directed the Rathmore Battalion and managed the attack. O'Leary and his men took a canon from Ross Castle and had it cleaned by Din Murphy, a local blacksmith located near Gneevguila. He washed it out thoroughly and assembled a platform which was used to mount the gun. O'Leary hid the cannon in the Pap mountains which was a base of operations for the IRA. It was decided to test out the cannon's reliability on an old abandoned house however when the cannon did not perform to expectation the dependability of the weapon was in doubt.

The attack was scheduled for 11 July 1920. The Rathmore company were joined by men from the Scartaglin and Ballymacelligiot companies for this attack. The Rathmore Barracks were shuttered with steel and the protective sheets of metal did not extend to the full height. The IRA blocked off the village and cut trenches to prevent the opposition from escaping and avoid reinforcements coming in. The group met at the Co-Op located beside the Barracks where the orders were given to their men and plan was to move in 30 yards west of the Barracks. Rifles and a homemade bomb were the chosen weapons.

Sixty men were ready to attack the Barracks however, there was miscommunication between the entire party. Different plans had been put in place by different people. The first homemade bomb was dropped inside a gap over the steel shuttered windows in the Barracks and thus the attack began. Twelve British officers were inside the building and the garrison quickly began to fight back. The canon was placed on the train line opposite the Barracks however it was heavier than anticipated and as a result it was stuck between the train tracks.

O'Leary's canon did not work, and it was useless to the operation. The attack continued for two hours however with the loss of the canon the IRA withdrew and the attack ceased. The attack on the Barracks proved unsuccessful for the IRA. The Irish Examiner described the attack as 'Daring but unsuccessful'. A constable was killed, and a sergeant was injured. The Rathmore Barracks remained in the possession of the RIC until the Truce was called in July of the following year.

Citizens Information

Know Your Rights:

Question

I have recently inherited some money following the death of a close relative. Will I have to pay tax on it?

Answer

If you get an inheritance following a death, you may have to pay inheritance tax on it. Inheritance tax is a type of Capital Acquisitions Tax (CAT) which includes gift tax. You do not have to pay tax on gifts or inheritances from your spouse or civil partner. If you get an inheritance from other relatives, you may get all or part of the inheritance tax-free – depending on the amount. The tax-free amount or threshold depends on the relationship between you and the person who left you the money.

• Group A applies where you are the child, stepchild or adopted child of the person giving the gift or inheritance. In certain circumstances it can apply to a foster child or parent getting an inheritance.

• Group B applies where you are the parent, grandparent, grandchild, great-grandchild, brother, sister, nephew or niece of the giver.

• Group C applies to any relationship not included in Group A or B.

Since 10 October 2018, the CAT threshold for each group is as follows:

• Group A – €320,000

• Group B - €32,500

• Group C – €16,250

You have to pay inheritance tax if the value of your inheritance (together with any other gifts and inheritances you have already received within the same group since 5 December 1991) is more than the tax-free amount or CAT threshold.

If you do have to pay inheritance tax, it is charged at 33%. The tax only applies to the amount over the group threshold.

As CAT is a self-assessment tax, you have to file a tax return. You can file Form IT38 (Inheritance Tax/Gift Tax Return) online through ROS, Revenue's online service. You can also submit a paper form to Revenue.

MUCKROSS ROWING CLUB RETURN TO ROWING

Our Phase 3 return to rowing continued this week, with members getting back to more action in larger boats. As previously reported, Rowing Ireland has commenced preparations for the staging of a limited Irish Championships Regatta on Sat-Sun, September 12-13 and a Festival of Rowing for non-Championship events on Saturday, September 5. The rescheduled AGM of Rowing Ireland for 2020 will be held via web conference this Sunday, with each registered rowing club in Ireland eligible to vote on a final decision regarding the running of a Championship event for 2020. While a regatta is feasible and permitted within the government roadmap, a broad spectrum of opinion across Irish rowing has emerged regarding the suitability of the proposed event in September. Rowing clubs based in Northern Ireland and in all Irish universities and schools will be severely constrained in their ability to compete. Such clubs are unlikely to support the rescheduled Championship event. Concerns around public health and maintaining the high standard of Championship events are also expected to be aired. This Sunday's national rowing meeting will also hear further discussion on the potential staging of smaller regional regattas during August and September.

- Feedback in respect of remote or home working is generally positive, however proper care must be taken in relation to the above matters from a legal perspective.
- Employers should also reserve the right to amend a home working policy and oblige home workers to attend at the office on request!
- Employers should also be aware that if an employee works from home for an extended period that the right
 to work from home could become an implied term of their contract through custom and practice.

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NEW GUIDELINES FOR RELIGIOUS SERVICES

While some parishioners have enjoyed a return to Mass over the past week, a new set of detailed Covid-19 Guidance has been developed for religious services. The Cabinet Committee reviewed the guidance, which state that an assessment should be carried out for each premises to determine how many can attend within the requirements of social distancing. The Cabinet Committee decided that where the size of the premises allows for a capacity of greater than 50 this may be permitted only where:

* Social distancing guidelines are adhered to

* The premises can be subdivided into distinct sections (cordoned or marked appropriately) of not more than 50 persons in each section * There is a minimum of 4m between sections

* Each section having its own entrance/exit route

* There are separate arrangements for elements of the service involving close contact, e.g. the distribution of Holy Communion

* Strictly no movement of people between sections before, during or after the service

* The premises is well-ventilated. Account must also be taken regarding the risk of congregation by people outside before and after any services, having regard to outdoor overall limits on mass gatherings and arrangements for staggered exiting after ceremonies The use of face coverings is strongly recommended for such indoor set



THE IMPORTANCE OF COMMUNICATION

When people come along to counselling, and begin talking about their problems, it sometimes becomes apparent that some of their difficulties may be down to the challenge of communicating with the other people in their lives.

This can apply to any of us. Whether discussing issues in our relationship with a partner or other family member, or with friends or colleagues, we are quite likely to say 'He knows how I feel about this', or 'She knows how difficult I find that', or 'I'm not going to ask them for help because I shouldn't need to ask, they should just know what to do', and so on. Sound familiar?

All this ignores a fundamental reality – we cannot assume other people know what we think, or how we feel, or what we need, unless we tell them. We are all equipped with a degree of intuition, and some people can be very 'tuned in' to the thoughts and feelings of others. But we cannot always rely on intuition alone. For example, someone may long for their partner to open up about a shared difficulty in their lives, while the partner may want exactly the same thing, but feel they 'shouldn't go there' because they think this would be unwelcome. Two people, who long to connect with each other, may grow further apart because of a gap in communication.

Of course we all need, and are entitled to, our privacy. We don't have to wear our heart on our sleeve all the time. What we are thinking about here is building bridges and sustaining connections with the

significant people around us, rather than seeing those connections weaken through a lack of communication, with all the misunderstandings, frustrations, conflict, hurt and loneliness that can ensue.

As children, we may have been fortunate enough to have an adult around who tuned in to our feelings and tended to our needs, before we were old enough to put those feelings and needs into words.

Even if we don't realise it, perhaps a bit of us still quite naturally longs for that sort of automatic understanding from others. But, as adults,

we probably need to play our part in making ourselves known and understood. The counselling process can offer a safe space where we can start putting things into words, gradually find our own voice, and become more confident about making ourselves known to another person.

FOCUS ON

Even though its only July, you can start thinking about planting bulbs. Most bulbs are suitable for growing in containers especially the likes of tulips, daffodils, lilies and aliumns. When planting up a container of window box with bulbs, plant them at about three times their depth and about one bulb width apart and don't forget to water them especially when the foliage is out and they are growing.

When planting bulbs in the garden dig over the area well where you are planting and add some compost. Always plant your bulbs in groups of about six depending on the type of bulbs. If you would like to add some colour to some areas of the garden for Spring and into Summer, it would be advisable to grow your bulbs now in small pots and grow them on until early spring. You can then plant them in their pots in the areas you want and after flowering you can dig them up and keep them until next Spring. A good dwarf daffodil for this is Tete a tere.
