

BUY A BUS CAMPAIGN SAYS


Thank You

There were records broken again at The Annual Kerry Way Ultra Marathon which is the most remote trail in Western Europe 200km non stop endurance race, traversing the MacGillycuddy's Reeks and Iveragh Peninsula, Co Kerry.

It is Ireland's longest distance trail Route. Athletes came to experience the gravity of the race. There were three races in total - the Kerry Way Ultra - 200km, the Kerry Way UltraLite - from Sneem to Killarney and Kerry Way UltraNite - from Waterville to Killarney.

Under the guidance of Race Director, Eileen Daly, and together with support and volunteers, circumnavigated the Iveragh Peninsulas coastal trails, mountain paths and ancient paths, over the weekend. All the competitors were provided with live tracking GPS Primal tracking along the Kerry Way route.

The winner of the Kerry Way Ultra 200 KM was John Keogh in a record breaking time of 22:25:44, the ladies was won by Lianne Van Dijk in a time of 28:39:05

The Kerry Athletes - Extreme Ultra Marathon Runner, Kevin Leahy ran the 200 km in just 24 hours, 4th Position, while Stephen Mangan, finished 7th overall in a time of 25:59:05

Eileen Said "We are always indebted to The kindness of the Kerry Way Landowners, South Kerry Development Partnership and National Parks and Wildlife Services. The marathons reached a phenomenal amount of virtual online viewers who engaged with our live tracking on the Facebook page. BUSY KERRY SCHEDULE FOR HOUSING MINISTER

inster for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Mr Darragh O'Brien TD had a busy schedule on Monday when he visited numerous projects and developments in Tralee, Farranfore, Barraduff, Rathmore and Killarney.

Chief among the events on the agenda was the official opening by Minister O'Brien and Minister for Education Norma Foley TD of the new €3.8m 20-unit social housing development in Rathmore, Láthair na Mánach and the official opening of An Carrigín, a 28-unit social housing development in Tralee which involved an investment of €5m.

Minister O'Brien also toured the Island of Geese site in Tralee as well as the Áras Phádraig site in Killarney which are currently being developed by Kerry County Council.

Speaking during his visit, Minister O'Brien said: "I was delighted to visit County Kerry and to see first-hand the number of housing projects which are currently in development. Having just launched 'Housing for All', the Government's new housing plan for Ireland, it's particularly exciting to see a wide range of projects which will provide much needed homes for people.

It was also important for me to visit Farranfore and to reaffirm Government's commitment to the investment in water services infrastructure in Kerry. There are numerous water and wastewater projects at various stages of development all across Kerry which I know people are dependent on.

The funding provided by my Department under the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF) is helping to further enhance the offering of both Killarney and Tralee, two fantastic towns with a huge tourism offering.

All in all it was a great trip to the 'Kingdom' and I am looking forward to coming back to see even more progress on the projects currently in train."

In addition to the opening of these estates, Minister O'Brien also paid a visit to a number

The Minister's schedule also consisted of presentations on Killarney and Tralee Urban Regeneration Development which were included in URDF funding announcements Minister O'Brien in March.





UNPRECEDENTED GRADES INFLATION INCREASES CAO POINTS REQUIREMENTS BUT KERRY'S APPLICANTS SWEEP UP A COPIOUS SUPPLY OF COLLEGE OFFERS IN ROUND ONE

The record-high Leaving Cert grades have caused a dramatic increase in points requirements for many third level courses for the second consecutive year. There was an overall average grades inflation of 2.6% this year on top of last year's 4.4%. More significantly, the percentage of high grades awarded has substantially risen on last year. For example, the H1 grades in Higher Mathematics, Higher Accounting and Higher History increased by 6.5%, 8% and 7.2%, respectively. That trend ran right across higher-level subjects.

4,650 extra college places were on offer this year to cater for the record number of CAO applications, in an attempt to keep points down, However, the extra places had minimal impact as this year's very generous grades have accelerated the upward spiral in points. A record 84,874 applications to CAO, up from 78,336 in 2020, meant increased demand across many courses.

The points for almost 75% of courses at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degree) and about 67% at Level 7/Level 6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degree/ Higher Certificate) have increased. While the majority of the 48,068 applicants to the CAO from the 2021 Leaving Cert class will have the points to meet the course requirements, it will leave many candidates who are presenting previous years' Leaving Cert results struggling to secure a college place. Many of these innocent casualties of the dual grades process had little or no chance of competing with this year's grades' inflation, with a number of courses not able to facilitate applicants on the maximum 625 points. Indeed, it's very likely that a considerable number of students with 600 or more points have missed on first preference courses.

Kerry's 1,806 Leaving Cert candidates achieved outstanding results that paved the path to college. They swept up a copious supply of offers in Tuesday's CAO Round One offers. After a nerve-wracking weekend, there was

unconfined joy as a large majority of Kerry's CAO applicants received a college offer. On a pro rata population basis, Kerry's CAO applicants will be close to the top of the class in securing college places.

55,221 CAO applicants received at least one of the 82,175 courses on offer on Tuesday afternoon. The offers consisted of 49,358 at Level 8 and 32,817 at Level7/Level 6. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/

Level 6), so that 26,954 applicants received two offers, one from each list.

The collective good news is that 39,063 (79%) of the 49,358 applicants, who were offered a Level 8 course, received one of their top three preferences. A phenomenal 32,314 (98%) of the 32,817, who were offered a Level 7/Level 6 course also received one of their top three preferences. So, despite the huge increase in points, the 2021 Class has delivered the goods. The overriding conclusion from the points' trends is that CAO applicants were totally focussed on the jobs market. They applied in large numbers for courses with strong employment growth. UCC's flagship Biological and Chemical Sciences degree hit the heady heights of 555*points, up 45 points while UL's Physiotherapy degree jumped from 589* last year to 613* this year. UCC's Biological & Earth Science Degree increased from 467 to 500. A number of courses crashed the 600 points' barrier with NUIG's Occupational Therapy degree on 601.

As expected, the contribution of frontline workers during the Coronavirus pandemic inspired a massive swing to health science courses which invariably rocketed out of reach of most CAO applicants. Dentistry at UCC, for example, requires a staggering 625* points this year – a perfect Leaving Cert exam result! Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Medicine, Veterinary, Nursing and related health sciences were beyond the reach of many applicants.

School leavers continue to rush to college in unprecedented numbers. The steady flow also of mature and non-traditional applications is a very healthy development as everybody deserves a second chance. A quota of places was reserved by CAO for the 10,164 mature applicants and the 13,147 applicants from the PLC sector.







- start off small and build it up. I started off with walking and some gentle postnatal recovery exercises when pixie went for her naps. Each week I felt myself getting stronger and more confident. The important thing is to listen to your body, and stop when you feel you have had enough.
- ❖ I would advise returning to exercises you did pre baby first and build yourself up with these until you feel strong enough before taking on anything new that may be too intense for you. - ❖ avoid picking and just stick to your 3 main meals. This is probably the best advice I'd give anyone. All it takes is one biscuit or one bun and you could be at it for the week. So make a rule no picking and it's easier to stick to when you just say no. You will enjoy your meals much better also.
- ❖ Another rule of thumb that works for me & many clients…"if your not hungry don't eat it". Listen to your body and start getting in tune with your sensation of hunger and full. Often I see clients following predesigned diets to the letter of the law but they have stopped listening to their own bodies on what they themselves actually need. Often stress can mask the feeling of hunger so be aware of your body on how it's feeling and what it needs and you will be empowered.



THIS WEEK IS MIGRAINE AWARENESS WEEK

Retinal migraine (ocular migraine) is an eye condition that causes brief attacks of blindness or visual problems like flashing lights in one eye.

These episodes can be frightening, but in most cases they're harmless and short-lived, and eyesight goes back to normal afterwards.

Some people get retinal migraine every few months, although the frequency can vary. Retinal migraine is a separate condition and should not be confused with headachetype migraine or migraine with aura, which usually affects the vision of both eyes.

The symptoms of retinal migraine may include:

- partial or total loss of vision in one eye – this usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes before vision gradually returns
- headache this may happen before, during or after the vision attack

It's unusual for an episode of vision loss to last longer than an hour. The same eye is affected every time in almost all cases

Vision may slowly become blurred or dimmed, or there may be flashes of light. Some people see a mosaic-like pattern of blank spots (scotomas), which enlarge to cause total loss of vision.

Retinal migraine is caused by the blood vessels to the eye suddenly narrowing (constricting), reducing the blood flow to the eye.

It may be triggered by:

- stress
- smoking
- high blood pressure
- oral contraceptive pill
- exercise
- bending over
- high altitude
- dehydration
- · low blood sugar
- excessive heat

Retinal migraine tends to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people with a personal or family history of migraine or other headaches

Treatment for retinal migraine usually just involves taking pain relief for any headaches and reducing exposure to anything that might be triggering the retinal migraine.

If you experience any sudden changes in you vision it is important to have a sight test to rule out more serious causes.



David Spillane kicked the final point for Spa but as the game was drawing to a close, Desmonds were grappling for each ball and clearly had only one target in mind. James Devane pulled off a great save on Tomas Lynch's shot before the ball flew across the goalmouth and Adam O'Donoghue was there to tap it to the back of the Spa net in the 59th minute. O'Donoghue added a second Desmonds goal a minute later with Luke Lyons following up with a late point. There was one more attack on the Spa goal, but the ball was turned over in a scramble in the goalmouth and the final whistle blew as Spa emerged with the ball.

JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY

takes a look at all things sport...

ALL IRELAND FINAL PREVIEW

I'll keep this short and simple. My heart says Mayo. Of course it does. That's not anti-Tyrone. They play a hard brand of football and we have failed too often to come up with the right answers, but I'm fine with that. Honestly. They had our gameplan in the bag right from the start. A defence that was about as relenting





as a toddler who wants a sweet. We didn't have that, and that's on us, not them.

But let's get real. Mayo. Always battling their way onto the big stage but never getting over the line. Not since 1951. It'd be one thing if they just fell away – Laois and Cavan were once giants of the game as well. But Mayo, a big county but absolutely cursed with emigration, somehow always kept making it back. They are a top four team always, most recently top two, really. But never top one.

So heart says Mayo. Head says Tyrone. They have come a much harder road, four tough games. Their massed defence are hard to break down – Kerry may have been unimaginative (the soft road in Munster definitely did us no favours there), but we got scores that Mayo never have. Scoring has always been Mayo's weakness. They've never really had a Sheehy, a Cooper, a Canavan, a Geraghty. Ciarán McDonald was the closest they had in my lifetime.

Tyrone emphasize defensive pressure more than scoring, but they are clinically efficient with their chances. No, tough tackling Mayo (James Horan has a knack for inserting steel in his teams) won't cough up goals as easily as we did and Tyrone won't slice through them anything like as easily, but I go back to Mayo in that first half. The old joke about always asking for a Mayo firing squad was never truer. Yes, they were a transformed side in the second half, but Dublin gifted them a way back into the game with their dilly-dallying. Tyrone won't do that.

I hope Mayo win, but I just don't think they have the firepower.

JACK O'CONNOR

The annual manager merry-go-round has hit full swing. Jack O'Connor flew a pretty big kite in a podcast interview with Irish Examiner podcast Paul Rouse last week, having only recently signed a new contract with Kildare, with whom he had managed a steady improvement. Asked about the Kerry job, Jack replied "Of course, there is an allure there. Who doesn't want to coach Man United? There is that allure because of the tradition."

From the outside, it appeared to send a strong message to the County Board. Come and get me. And (again, from the outside) it seems that the message was received and understood, with the announcement on Tuesday that he was stepping down from his managerial role with Kildare. Somehow, I don't think it's because he's planning to ride off into the sunset just yet.... Personally, I think it would be a fantastic

Personally, I think it would be a fantastic appointment for Kerry. Jack has history with us – and that history is that over two stints, he was the first Kerry manager since a certain other South Kerryman to lead us to three All Ireland titles, 2004, 2006, and 2009.

Remember that when he came in originally, there were grumbles. Many felt that Paidí Ó Sé had been treated poorly – I'm sorry, Paidí was an incredible manager, but in Kerry, managers don't survive the likes of that hammering by Meath. There were attempts by the media to claim that Kerrymen were shocked and horrified when he described us as 'animals' in an interview in January – nobody I know cared in the slightest about that. You stand or fall on results and results only.

There are always calls to bring in former players as managers. The theory seems to be that they were so good at the game, they must automatically be great at coaching it. Nope. Management is a completely different skill. Time management, man management, recognising the areas that need strengthening and delegating to the best people possible to do that, negotiating with clubs while keeping them on board, scouting players....the actually games are just the bare tip of that huge iceberg. Jack was the first manager in decades arguably ever, as Kerry were managed by groups of selectors before Mick O'Dwyer came in, and they were usually former players - not to have played for the Kerry seniors. Did that make him a weaker manager? I don't know. Two All Irelands, two Munsters, and Three National Leagues in as many years. That's not exactly a bad record....

He has had success at club level (he brought a relatively unfancied Rahillys to the brink of County and Munster crowns), minor level (guess who kick-started that phenomenal run of success after our long drought in 2014?), and there is no doubt in my mind but that he would have added a U20 title if the County Board had done the sensible thing and released the likes of David Clifford, Seán O'Shea (I will never forget the sight of Seán O'Shea sitting forlornly watching as Kenmare District narrowly won the U21 County title – Seán was held from playing in order to be an unused sub against Mayo the following weekend. Absolutely ridiculous) and Diarmuid O'Connor to play at their own age group.

All told, Jack O'Connor has been directly involved in no less than 21 All Ireland winning

teams as either manager or selector since first being asked to help out with the Kerry Vocational team by none other than the great George Dennis.

There is nothing confirmed at time of writing, but the timing of the end of his tenure with Kildare speaks volumes. Personally I would hugely welcome his appointment as Kerry manager – Jack was the manager who introduced the Northern style of clinically tough and efficient tackling to Kerry – it's something I see a real lack of in the camp at the moment. Time will tell.

Of course, it could be that he wants to replace Ronan McCarthy as Cork manager.....arrah yeah. Frankly, he'd be more likely to replace Stephen Kenny.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL FINAL: SPA V BEAUFORT

Look, I'm not going to be hiding the fact that I have a fairly big amount of bias here. I actually love Beaufort as a club – they battle well above their weight and the production of superb young players like Jack O'Connor and Seán O'Brien is a natural by-product of their work at underage. But I basically learned how to tie my shoelaces up in Spa (they tried to teach me how to play football as well; it was a heroically doomed effort).

It wouldn't be fair of me to be making any prediction, and I honestly wouldn't be able to anyway. Two attacking teams with very positive approaches. County players on both sides and some great young talent. I genuinely expect there to be only a sliver of daylight between them; extra-time would not surprise me in the least.

JAMES COSTELLO RETURNS AS MINOR MANAGER

I'm also delighted to see Jason Costello's return at the helm of the Kerry minors. I genuinely felt that he had Kerry primed as the best minor team in the country in 2019, but three of the best shooters at the grade just had one of those inexplicable off days. The 2020 team made it to the All Ireland Final, but came up against a Derry team who were rock solid and choked the supply to our most dangerous forwards. Be fair; it was very cleverly done. Even when Kerry took a shock lead late on with a goal (having gone for goal far too often, in my opinion, I'm afraid one or two lads felt the bugles of glory calling), they celebrated a little too early and let Derry down the field for an immediate riposte. That wasn't the managers' fault, I could see him immediately shouting animated instructions on the sideline below me (I'm embarrassed to admit that I was doing the same thing in the stand - I don't approve of spectators shouting instructions to players, that only muddies the waters for both players and management, but I got caught in the moment). It really was like a bad dream, you could see that one coming from a long way out at my vantage point. This year they fell by a single point late on to an excellent Cork side (I believe Cork football is well on the way back, despite the one-sided nature of this year's senior clash).

Congratulations to victors Laune Rangers and commiserations to Glenflesk on serving up a cracking Minor Division One Final in a resplendent Fitzgerald Stadium last Monday night. These have been the two foremost sides at their age group all the way up along – it's far from the first time they have contested a final with each other. They are both superb sides (they compete in this year's Minor County Championship - personally, I fancy the newly amalgamated North Kerry outfit to wrest East Kerry's crown, but there is a lot of water to flow under that particular bridge yet) and even in that brightest of firmaments, one player on each side stood out. Gearóid Hassett is a nephew of two great players and son of an All Ireland winning Laune Rangers captain, while Luke Crowley's father was one of the most feared forwards of all time in Croke Park. In neither case has the apple fallen far from the tree! Hassett, who enjoyed a better supply line but won a lot of ball himself, picked off 1-10, while Crowley kicked 0-5 and was the driving heart of Glenflesk all through. One particular pick-up in the second half with his legs while flat on his back was unorthodox genius, five seconds later the ball was neatly bisecting the posts.

INTERMEDIATE FINAL PREVIEW

Next year either Spa or Beaufort will be playing in the Senior Club Championship. Spa overcame Desmonds by 1-14 to 2-6, and it was more comfortable than that for the winners, with Desmonds only able to manage a single

Last year they were competing at Intermediate grade, while Dublin were lifting the Brendan Martin Cup for the fourth year in a row.

I'll be honest. I didn't really give Meath a chance. Shows what I know.

They were brilliant. Did Emma Duggan really mean that early goal? Watch it again. I am convinced that she did. It was instinctive brilliance. That gave them a 1-2 to 0-1 lead. In fairness to Dublin, they battled back and stubbornly fought to the bitter end. They bowed out like champions and Mick Bohan, like his team, exited the stage with paramount grace. I haven't lost any admiration for them. But Meath? My Team of the Year without question.

Given that Kerry put up a good battle against Meath in the Division Two Final of the National League despite missing some top players through injury, having beaten them soundly in the opening round, is it a sign that we are on the right track? I guess we'll find out next year.

SOCCER

Oh boy. I think we all knew it would be bad, but not this bad. It's time to face a stark reality. The FAI's corruption, and the fact that so many of the same faces are in situ, has left us without a real development system or a single domestic player on our national team. The chickens have come home to roost.

We're rubbish. And no amount of bleating about Stephen Kenny is going to alter the fact that he has almost nothing of international calibre to work with.

I actually think he has done a good job. He has encouraged his players to actually play the ball instead of hoofing it – granted, we're poor at it, but we'll never get better at it without trying. He is the first Irish manager since adopted Kerryman Eoin Hand to take that approach instead of hoofing it. He has organised a solid defence – again, our alleged three at the back is invariably actually five, with Coleman and McClean defending the corners of the pitch a lot more than they actually work the wings.

It's a long-term strategy to develop a playing style instead of the mock-bravado of hoofball (Ireland's preferred tactic almost since their inception; the myth that Jack Charlton invented it is no more than that. We'll be returning to it as well once pragmatism takes hold. Supporters and pundits talk about the team currently lacking 'heart' and 'passion', and that's all just nonsense. What we lack is a development system that inculcates technique. What in the name of all things holy sticking young players at U13, U15, and U17 on bus journeys for two hours or more is expected to achieve is utterly beyond me. It's ridiculous. That's on the FAI, not Stephen Kenny.

Let's clear up a few things. You'll have heard people talking about the lack of 'heart' and 'passion'. These people are pretending to be soccer analysts, but they are actually complete spoofers. Or possibly relationship counsellors. Our problem is a complete lack of penetration. Parrott, Connolly, Idah? I'll swap you the lot for a Robbie Keane. You can't get goals by wishing harder for them; you need to actually produce them in play. I'll swap your 'heart' and 'passion' for 'skill' and 'technical proficiency'.

It's a long-term fix, and unfortunately I don't think that the remnant of the public who actually care about the team are willing to give Stephen Kenny the time it takes. He'll take the brunt of the blame, but my deepest sympathies to whatever idiot actually accepts the post after him. Because the best of the talent available to them will still be Premiership journeymen at absolute best. Most of our players are barely hanging on to a starting jersey at their clubs.

Portugal: It was a penalty. There is absolutely no question about that. And Bazunu made a superb save, he is a real find....but you can't overlook the fact that it was his hospital pass

that gave it away in the first place. As for the idea that Cristiano Ronaldo should have been sent off for slapping a hand at Dara O'Shea? Not a chance. That wasn't a strike and it was nowhere near his face. O'Shea was looking for trouble and then play-acted to get a player sent off. Any real soccer supporter should be calling that worthless tripe out. Watching an Irish player do that was embarrassing.

Ireland's defence was magnificent, particularly a rejuvenated Shane Duffy and John Egan. It was a good goal as well. Mind you, I think it says a lot about us that our biggest scoring threat in recent years is headers by defenders. Idah works hard, but he isn't a threat. I remember Irish reporters hyping up Troy Parrott when he was with Spurs. You could almost hear the desperation in their voices even then.

It was our best performance so far. And Portugal had a whopping 72% of possession. 30 shots. 14 corners. And that's us playing well. Let's think about that for a minute.

Incidentally, the late goals? Ferguson's United used to get those injury time goals so often it became known as 'Fergie time'. But it wasn't luck. It was the constant, grinding pressure of playing high intensity attacking football.

Azerbaijan: Time for our misfiring strikers to fill their boots. This was the reverse of the Portugal game. Here Ireland were the hot favourites and peppered their goal. We were well on top. Only they went in front just before half-time, a great strike by Mahmudov. Not out of character for him, either, by the way. And, guess what? We were absolutely chronic up front. 21 chances. One goal, And guess what? A header from a defender. To eke out a draw. Against a team who would be doing well to win the League of Ireland if they competed in it.

Serbia: The hype merchants are out in force after this one. "We've turned the corner". Eh? We did play the ball, and it's good to see an Irish team trying that. Stephen Kenny is the first Irish manager in an awful long time to act as if he trusts the players. Mind you, we're not actually great at it, but at least we are playing soccer. The truth is, though, that Serbia weren't clinical up front – we gave them plenty of chances (a lot of our inter-play was sloppy). Gavin Bazunu is rapidly building a reputation as a superb shotstopper, and it's thoroughly deserved - by jayusus, he's getting plenty of practice! 3-1 down at half-time would have been a fair reflection of the game. Serbia weren't clinical up front, whereas at the other end we....were non-existent, apart from a very good attempt by Jeff Hendricks that went narrowly wide (the keeper had it covered anyway, but full credit on the oasis of a goal attempt by an Irish player). We were 1-0 down by then – I genuinely feared that the floodgates were about to open, so credit to Ireland for holding their nerve well, if not the ball. A good header from a corner -Bazunu got a hand to it, but it had the power. No fault to the defenders.

We came more into it early in the second half, but it was more cudgel than razor in terms of threatening a goal. Bazunu was forced into several more great saves - Serbian

keeper Predag Rajkocic could have brought a newspaper to read. Our equaliser came courtesy of an absolutely flukey own goal. That's not "turning a corner", and Ireland were, despite the nonsense, thoroughly outplayed here. Serbia will privately be enormously disappointed at not putting Ireland away, we will privately be thanking the stars for Bazunu and a massive slice of good fortune that saw us double our points tally.....to two points from a possible fifteen.

The problem is not with team management, or lack of effort, or any other bland cliches. The problem with Irish soccer is higher up and deeper entrenched than that.

We're certainly not going to Qatar. But until we develop Irish players in a structured and properly supported League of Ireland and develop players who could stand on their own in the English Championship on a regular basis (I repeat, quite a lot of our starting team are not holding down places in those teams), we are going nowhere.

GOLF **SOLHEIM CUP**

Caitriona Matthew's European team headed to the Solheim Cup in Ohio last week with Leona Maguire on board as Ireland's first player in the competition. Leona was far from a certainty for this team at the start of the year, but her great form in the LPGA saw her selected and to say that it was the correct decision is a huge understatement. Leona was the only player to play in all five sessions and she won four of them and halved another for a whopping 4.5 points contribution to Europe's overall tally.

PITCH AND PUTT JOHN MCGRATH WINS SCRATCH CUP

Last Saturday saw a very successful staging of their Scratch Cup events by Listowel as a new name was added to the list of Scratch Cup winners in the county. After being competitive

at senior level for well over 20 years, Deerpark's John McGrath finally won his first such competition with a 19 under par score that gave him a one-stroke victory.

SOWING HARDY ANNUALS



It may seem a long time away, but sowing some hardy annuals now will give you a very impressive display in early spring. Most hardy annuals can be sown in autumn and will over- winter quite well.

Hardy annuals are plants that will grow and flower for one year only. When sowing your seeds, dig the soil over well, to about a spades depth, then rake it over and firm it down, and make sure it is weed free. A good idea before sowing your seed is to mark it out by sprinkling some sand on the on the area you're going to sow the seed on. Also don't sow the seed into soil that is too rich, as this will only encourage too much leafy growth and not enough flowers. If the soil is rich there is no need to use fertilizers.

You can also scatter the seed over the whole bed, and try and leave about a 1.4 of an inch between them and cover them lightly with some compost and water well, but make sure there is a fine rose on your watering can. There is a range of hardy annuals to choose from so make sure you know the heights and spread and, of course, the colour.


Park your car at Ross Castle, meet us at the RED BOATS at Reen Pier and start your journey at 11am. Highlights include:
