

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
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
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The annual rutting season is underway, the Irish Red Stags are bellowing while the Sika are whistling. Autumn is a glorious time in Killarney National Park - the changing colours, those primal bellows and early morning fog.

This years 'Samhain' Autumn Gathering Free events takes place from Friday 17th October until Sunday 19th October 2025. The Autumn programme of events is presented by the Conservation Rangers and Killarney National Park Education Centre, National Parks and Wildlife Service, (NPWS).

Killarney National Park encompasses more than 10,000 hectares of diverse woodland habitats including ancient oak and yew woodlands - the most extensive covering of native forest in the country and of international importance as well as the famous Lakes of Killarney and the monastic 6th century ruins on Innisfallen Island.

The renowned Native Irish Red Deer are a firm favourite with photographers who travel from all parts of Ireland to capture the activity of the rutting season, and witness the largest and only native deer species with a continuous presence in Ireland since neolithic times.

The distinctive bellowing and fierce rutting behaviour is something that has fascinated Killarney for time immemorial. The rich colours of Autumn, the morning light and shadows of evening light make the park so spectacular at this time of year.

The very popular Morning Deer Walks with Conservation Ranger Padruig O'Sullivan are planned for Saturday 17th and Sunday 18th October. The meeting point for these is Deenagh Cottage just inside the front gate of the Demesne at 7.00 am. Padruig's informative walks are always very engaging - no booking required.

With the view of Kenmare Bay and the Caha Mountains "our source and continual inspiration", seasonal, local and fresh is the mantra for Chef James O'Sullivan's menus. Provenance is king, with a map of suppliers' locations on the table for reference and the cooking style is pleasingly respectful of ingredients - prepared and presented with finesse, yet without overworking dishes and allowing the fresh natural flavours to be relished. Together with caring service, that makes for a deeply satisfying dining experience – and the delicious breakfasts served in Landline Restaurant are also outstanding.





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
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HUGH O'FLAHERTY CENTENARY

Remaining Events To Year End



Following a successful Group Tour to Rome in March and an O'Flaherty's Town Trail Walk in Killarney in August, the 1925-2025 Hugh O'Flaherty Centenary Commemorations will conclude over the next three months with three very different events. Also, wreaths will be laid at the Memorial on Mission Road to mark the Anniversary of his death (October 30th) and the Centenary of his Ordination (December 20th).

An Post/Irish History Podcast – Killarney Oct 15th:

Supporting the launch of the Hugh O'Flaherty Commemorative Stamp (later in the month), An Post has commissioned the Irish History Podcast to record a special podcast on the Monsignor's story. Fin Dwyer, the host of the Irish History Podcast has always been passionate about Ireland's past. In 2010, after working in archaeology for years he. launched the Irish History Podcast. Over the last 15 years the show was become one of Ireland's longest running shows with a global audience. When completed, the Podcast will include contributions from a well-known author on the Monsignor, a member of the Monsignor's family and from the Memorial Society.



The local recording event will take place in Killarney on Wednesday October 15th in Killarney House at 7.30.pm.

Admission is free but it is a ticket event with limited capacity. Anyone interested in attending should email oflahertysociety2008@gmail.com – on or before Sunday Oct 12th – giving their name and indicating the number of tickets required. Refreshments will be served.

An Post Commemorative Stamp:

To mark the Centenary of the Monsignor's Ordination (December 1925), An Post will issue a Commemorative Stamp on October 23rd. It will be a "W" Stamp for Worldwide mailing, in keeping with the global reach of the Monsignor's story. It will be available in selected Post Offices for at least 3 months from the date of issue. Some Offices may

opt to hold stocks beyond the 3 months.

Exhibition – Killarney Library Dec 15th 2025 to Jan 17th 2026:




Space Week

Tralee courthouse

Michael Cahill has raised the courthouses for Tralee and for Killorglin at the Oireachtas Committee. That is since our column last week raised the issue.

Angela Denning, the CEO of the Courts Service told him with regard to the proposed new Courthouse in Tralee, "the work involved in the pre-planning process will start shortly".

"The sooner this process is commenced, the sooner the building will be delivered to the people of Tralee and Kerry and I have requested that the necessary funding be provided in the Budget, he said.

He has also looked for an update on the Killorglin Courthouse - rightly recalling how the multi-million euro public/private partnership between Kerry County Council and FEXCO at library place was to have included a courthouse. He is going to pursue this, he says. Meanwhile, back at the ranch, the council tells me it is in talks with the Kerry ETB in relation to the third level college on the council site in the

former Pretty Polly stocking factory.

Kerry County Council are working with Kerry ETB on finalising transfer of the site," the council spokesman Alan Cantwell said.

Again everything is preliminary in Killarney and is taking far far too long. The terrible surface on the Muckross Road is a case in point. Years since we began highlighting it.

Our four Government TDs and our councilors in Killarney need to get seriously stuck into both projects.

THE KILLARNEY COFFEE CUP PROJECT - A FLAT WHITE?

Killarney's coffee shop project has floundered, we learned from the Irish Times last weekend. Most of the original members have thrown in the towel we were told - even though most of us could see the giant billboards posters still surround the town.

The coffee project got huge national publicity.
The national audience seemed to be the target from the off.

But lack of national support in the form of a government levy on single use takeaway cups scuttled the effort, organisers said.

Three years ago, Killian Treacy of Luna who was spokesman said the project was hoping for "a mindset change".

So that people would take their coffee cup with them when they left the house, along with their keys and wallet and there would be a national roll out.

It is very difficult these days to get Government backing for projects that start outside the capital, Dublin. Second city Cork has no real influence, and is a poor shadow of what it was 30 years ago, and that is with a Taoiseach.

Albeit that the slick launch in July at Killarney House, was handled by leading Dublin based PR firm Dury.

Even locally, I am not so sure how "ground up" the coffee project was. Had there been real "grounded" support, you would think the 20 cent national levy would be irrelevant.

For myself, an enthusiastic coffee drinker, I never really knew which coffee house was in and which one was out. So one St Patrick's Day I and three others paid what I felt was too much for dull heavy textured plastic cups which I haven't used since.

Johnny McGuire co-president of Chamber of Tourism and Commerce said Killarney is "joined at the hip to the National Park" and that is why the Chamber got behind it.

He is right. Killarney led the Irish Green movement in the 1980s - a different era when Dublin listened. Because of the park. I know I was part of it.

There is a broad acceptance now, finally, in 2025, of environmental matters.

So is it not high time for all the heavy weight coffee project backers - Chamber, Failte Ireland, the NPWS, and Kerry County Council to get behind more than throw away coffee cups?

Such as badly needed waste water treatment upgrades in the Ross Road plant so the poisoning of our lake stops. An article I wrote for the Kerryman in 1983 after one of the autumn first talks in Muckross House exposed the gross inadequacy of the plant which was dumping sewage into the lake with only the barest filtering. The plant is again way behind and is overtaken with climate change stormwater.

Chamber needs to push for the catering and hospitality college so we can have a circular tourist industry here in training and retaining workers.

We can pick up the coffee cups. The other matters are more pressing in acting local and thinking globally.

THE PRESIDENTIAL DEBACLE

Killarney's Coffee cup project won't be the only posters taken down this week. The choice of a former football manager with no political experience by the Fianna Fail leadership was a perfect example of top down rather than ground up approach. Last week we correctly forecast it was already "all the president's women" - a two horse race.

One question raised with me by a legal person: did Gavin really need to resign? If the banks had taken over his finances, as they did in the case of most people caught in the economic crash, the former manager and defence force man would have had little say in what was coming into his accounts and what was going back to the bank.

A more politically astute candidate could have thrown the controversy back on the harsh way the banks dealt with people like himself. But he might only have done so had he paid the 3,000 debt back to his tenant . Irony of ironies though: Taoiseach Martin probably grabbed onto the successful Dublin man like a life raft in order not to have to run Bertie Ahern whose copy was stained in the same economic crash.

In contrast, the more political Catherine Connolly did not resign over her very serious lack of judgment in daily signing into Leinster House, a woman convicted - and jailed - in relation to firearms offences in the Special Criminal Court, of all places. Catherine's employee came from deep in a place opposed to the peace process. A much more serious issue in many people's views. But Connolly stuck to her guns.

People can be rehabilitated, she said.

I too believe in redemption. The question is do you have to be an extreme socialist republican Irish speaker convicted of an arms offence to be favoured for redemption by Connolly and her political party backers? I am amazed at the Social Democrats brushing this aside. Labour and the Greens are clearly uncomfortable.

There is also controversy touching on the international. She will also need to convince the middle ground she will be enthusiastic, not just tight and thin lipped when she greets President Trump. We don't sell much whiskey or viagra to the Russians!.

Ladylike Heather Humphreys the Fine Gael candidate has kept out of the firing line - so far. But she will need to take on the Mother Ireland / Peig mantle to put it up to the Galway woman. Maybe even exchange the pearls for the plain Galway shawl!

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Local Schools Launch "Agree to Agree" Pilot to Support Families with Children's Digital Lives

Seven local schools have joined forces to launch an innovative project called Agree to Agree, a community-wide effort to help families navigate the challenges of children and technology.

This Pilot was funded by the Department of Education and Skills under the then Minister of Education and Skills - Norma Foley TD. Schools were invited to participate through Tralee Education Support Centre Director, Terry O'Sullivan.

The initiative encourages parents of primary school pupils to make a voluntary pledge around healthy technology use at home. For younger pupils, this includes keeping children smartphone-free, following age-appropriate guidelines for games and apps, and staying off social media during primary school years. Schools arrived at these goals after collaboration between pupils, staff and parents.

For older pupils who may already own phones

/ devices, the project suggests practical steps such as reducing screen time, keeping phones out of bedrooms, avoiding age-inappropriate apps, and learning about digital citizenship and online safety.

The programme also offers parents support through talks, webinars, and resources on topics like parental controls and fostering positive online habits.

Dr. Maureen Griffin, speaking at the launch, explained:

"This isn't about one big internet talk, but about the million little conversations that help children build healthy habits online."

The schools aim to support families in making decisions that feel right for them, while creating a positive culture across our schools.

A powerful example of this came from teacher Dennis Griffin, who encouraged his pupils to leave group chats that excluded others—demonstrating how small, thoughtful actions can prevent bullying and build inclusion.

Ms Catherine Mangan (Oide) also informed all present of some of the supports available to schools and families through the Oide website. In the coming weeks, children will bring home information packs and families will have the chance to sign the voluntary agreement. Two parent webinars are already scheduled: Thursday, October 23rd, and Thursday, February 26th. The schools involved hope this initiative will become part of the community's fabric, helping families establish healthy digital practices together and reducing the pressure on both children and parents.

COMMERCIAL MOTOR DRIVER NUMBERS REQUIRED FROM OCTOBER 1ST

Many drivers will be aware of the legalisation brought forward last

March where all driver numbers must be provided to insurers before cover can be confirmed. The next piece of this data exercise commenced on October 1st and requires driver number to be provided for all commercial vehicles including agricultural vehicles, motor traders and fleet owners.

This data forms part of the Road Traffic Acts 2023 and will assist Gardaí at the roadside and

ultimately reduce uninsured driving in the state.

The data will be collected by insurers and brokers and will be validated and verified before cover can be confirmed. The data will be transferred to the Irish Motor Insurance Database (IMID)

This is an important development from a road safety perspective as the key aim of the IMID database is to remove uninsured drivers from Irish roads. An Garda Síochána have access to the Irish Motor Insurance Database through

their Mobility Devices, and can currently detect drivers operating without insurance on Irish roads.

It is important to note that fleet owners and motor traders will also need to upload driver numbers on the National Fleet Database (NFD) at www.nfd.mtpl.ie

Your driver number can be found under section 4D on the plastic driving licences and in field 5 of the older paper licences.



HSE South West's has launched a Winter 2025 vaccination campaign, with the rollout of both the flu and Covid-19 vaccines.

The campaign encourages all those eligible to take up their vaccines as soon as possible, protecting themselves from illness.

Vaccination is safe, effective and your best defence against seasonal illnesses. It protects not just you, but also your family, and the wider community.

HSE South West experts reminded the public that getting vaccinated now rather than waiting until later in the winter can help you avoid the need for isolating and missing out on social and seasonal get-togethers.

Those recommended to get both flu and Covid-19 vaccines in autumn/winter 2025 are: those aged 60 years and older

anyone aged 6 months and older with an underlying medical condition In addition, all healthcare workers, all children aged 2-17 years and all pregnant women are recommended to get the flu vaccine.

Dr Anne Sheahan, HSE South West Regional Director for Population and Public Health said: "Don't let yourself or your family be side-lined by Flu or COVID-19 this winter. If the vaccine

Last winter, almost 6,500 people were hospitalised with flu while more than 2,000 people were hospitalised with COVID-19.

Both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines are available from participating GPs and pharmacies and are safe to be given at the same time. In addition, HSE South West vaccination teams will provide vaccines for people living in residential care facilities and housebound patients. Healthcare worker vaccination clinics will take place in many HSE South West workplaces across Cork and Kerry.



Garda Youth Award for Castleisland Community College Students

The Lee Strand Garda Youth Awards ceremony took place on Friday, 27th September in the Rose Hotel, Tralee. Abigail Horan, Sharon Fitzmaurice, Rachel Horgan and Siobhán Mahony with guidance from their mentor Elaine Murphy received a merit award in the Safety Category. The Sun Smarties project involved the school becoming the first ever Sun Smart School in Ireland and they also ran an awareness campaign about the prevention of skin cancer. The school became a pilot school for the HSE, who wish to promote their Sun Safe Programme nationally.

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Ireland, with over 13,000 new cases diagnosed every year. This number is expected to double by 2040. Schools in the UK and Australia can register to become Sun Smart schools where the health authorities support schools in creating sun safe environments and promote sun protection behaviours. The four students worked with the HSE to introduce this into Irish schools. The team designed a four-step programme for schools to follow to become a

sun safe school. 'The students won the overall Gold Award in the Young Social Innovators 2024 for this project and they continued last year in progressing it further with the HSC. The



Men in Ireland Dying Too Young from Preventable Causes, New Report Warns

Men in Ireland are dying prematurely and experiencing poor health outcomes, according to a major new report from Movember. The Real Face of Men's Health study reveals that two in five male deaths occur before the age of 75 and that men are 40% more likely than women to die prematurely across all of the country's five leading causes of death.

The report highlights significant health inequalities, showing that men in the most deprived areas are 150% more likely to die before 75 compared to those in wealthier areas. It also estimates that preventable illnesses such as coronary heart disease, stroke, chronic lung disease, lung cancer and suicide cost Ireland more than €1 billion in 2023, with €716 million of that deemed avoidable.

Mental health emerges as a critical concern, with men accounting for nearly four out of five suicides. Almost all GPs surveyed reported treating men with suicidal behaviour in the past year, yet only a small minority felt very confident in addressing such cases. Stigma, social pressures, and fears about career impact were cited as barriers preventing men from seeking support.

The study also reveals the wider impact of poor men's health on families and carers. Six in ten carers reported declines in their own mental health, while many experienced frequent worry and anxiety as a result of caregiving responsibilities.

Public concern is strong, with three-quarters of Irish adults expressing worry about men's health, particularly around suicide, loneliness and mental wellbeing. Many believe younger men are struggling to find purpose in society, while fathers report feeling unsupported in their roles.

The report, produced with the Men's Health Forum in Ireland and South-East Technological University, urges Government to accelerate the roll-out of the National Men's Health Action Plan with an initial €10 million investment. Movember Country Manager Sarah Ouellette described the findings as a wake-up call, stressing that men's health is not only about men but about families and communities.

Health Minister Jennifer Carroll MacNeill said the findings would help build on progress made since Ireland became the first country to adopt a National Men's Health Policy in

2009. Musician Cian Ducrot and former boxing champion Barry McGuigan, both Movember ambassadors, endorsed the report, calling for urgent action to address the barriers stopping men from seeking care.

The report is being described as the most comprehensive examination of men's health ever published in Ireland and a crucial tool in shaping future policy.

when alcohol is removed from daily life.

Healthier coping strategies: Taking a break encourages people to replace alcohol with more positive outlets like exercise, reading, or time in nature.


Social connection: By choosing sober activities, people can strengthen relationships built on meaningful connection rather than drinking.



SCREEN TIME

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

WHAT IS BLUE LIGHT?

Sunlight contains red, orange, yellow, green and blue light rays. Combined, this spectrum of coloured light rays creates what we call 'white light' or sunlight.

Depending on where they fall on the spectrum, light rays have long wavelengths (with less energy) or short wavelengths (with more energy).

Blue light is a high-energy visible light and has shorter wavelengths. It is known as blue light because it is on the violet-blue band of the spectrum.

Blue light is naturally present in sunlight but is also something we can see from screens such as TVs, computers, smartphones and tablets.

Can blue light damage my child's eyes?

There is currently no scientific evidence that blue light causes damage to the eyes. However, there is evidence to suggest that carrying out near tasks, involving looking at something close-up, such as using mobile devices, screen time and reading a book, can increase eye strain for those who do this for long periods of time.

What is digital eye strain?

Digital eye strain happens when a lot of time is spent using near vision, for example, reading on screen or playing online games.

One of the main symptoms is temporary blurred vision but other signs such as sore and tired eyes, dry eye and headaches are also associated with digital eye strain.

Can blue light affect my child's sleep pattern?

Using screens close to bedtime may contribute to poorer sleep, which may mean your child's

concentration levels are lower during the day. This may be because blue light is linked to the suppression of the hormone melatonin which makes us feel sleepy. However, there is a range of other factors linked to disrupted sleep.

Can blue light filtered lenses help? Some people report that lens coatings that filter blue light make their eyes feel more comfortable or are helpful before bed.

ISTHERE A LINK BETWEEN SCREEN TIME AND SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS?

Short-sightedness, or myopia, is increasing throughout the world. Family history, ethnic background, environment (living indoors, in cities) and carrying out near tasks, such as screen use, have all been linked to the development of myopia. However, there is no clear evidence to suggest that screen time alone is the direct cause. But, there is good evidence to suggest that children who spend more time outdoors are at lower risk of developing short-sightedness.

TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD'S **EYES HEALTHY**

Get them outdoors - regular play and exercise can help prevent or reduce the development of myopia (short-sightedness). Studies show two hours of outdoor activity a day is ideal1

Use night settings - using night settings, if your device has them, may help children sleep by reducing the amount of blue light given off by the screen during night-time hours

Make sure digital devices are turned off at least an hour before bedtime

Book your child in for a sight test at least every two years, from the age of three.

COMFORT FOR CHEMO KERRY

A new standalone Oncology Unit for University Hospital Kerry (UHK) is vital for all cancer patients and their families in Kerry and Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill has raised it with the Taoíseach Michael Martin, the Minister for Health, Jennifer Carroll MacNeill, TD and the CEO of the Health Service Executive, Bernard Gloster.

"I impressed upon them the urgent requirement of a stand-alone Oncology/Haematology Unit on the grounds of University Hospital Kerry to include a Chemotherapy Day Unit, an outpatient. Department, and an aseptic compounding unit, all designed to provide Kerry patients with the dignity, privacy, and comfort they deserve during one of the most challenging periods of their lives. The Comfort for Chemo Kerry

committee have already raised over €1.5m in funds and a site has been designated for the purpose, within the UHK campus" stated Deputy Cahill.

"This project is extremely important for Kerry and I am anxious that it proceeds as soon as possible. Delays only mean an escalation in costs for an already costly undertaking. This vital project would lessen the need for some Kerry patients to travel to hospitals in Cork for Cancer treatments, some in multiple trips. I will continue to put pressure on for the early delivery of this Unit on behalf of all patients and their families in Kerry" added Michael Cahill TD who is also a member of the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Health.

Minister Foley welcomes extension of Free Travel companion pass which will benefit over 19,000 people in Kerry

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed the extension of the Free Travel companion pass which will benefit over 19,000 people in Kerry.

From 29th September, those over 70 with a valid free travel companion Public Services Card can have another person, aged 16 or older, travel with them for free on all public and certain private transport services operated under the Free Travel scheme. This includes bus, rail, Local Link and the Luas, along with some services operated by private bus and ferry transport operators.

This measure is expected to benefit up to 525,000 Free Travel recipients aged 70 and over at a cost of €4.1m this year nationwide.

This includes over 19,000 people aged 70 and over in Kerry who now will be able to bring a free travel companion with them.

Minister Foley said: "I am delighted to welcome this significant expansion of the Free Travel Scheme, announced by Minister Dara Calleary and Minister Darragh O'Brien.

"The announcement means that everybody with a valid Free Travel Companion Public Services Card in Kerry will be able to bring another person with them on their journey on all public and certain private transport services participating in the Free Travel Scheme.

"This is expected to benefit over 19,000 people in Kerry aged 70 and over - giving older people freedom of choice and greater

independence and security when travelling.

The Free Travel Scheme is currently available to everyone aged 66 or over, and to certain people who are under 66 in receipt of qualifying payments, or who meet the medical conditions for Blind Pension, and are legally living permanently in the State.

If you qualify for Free Travel and you are married, in a civil partnership or cohabiting, your partner may currently travel with you for free if you meet certain criteria.

If you are under 70 and cannot travel alone for medical reasons, you may apply for Free Travel for a companion. This allows a person aged 16 or over to travel with you for free.

This new measure allows those over 70 with a valid free travel companion Public Services Card to have another person, aged 16 or older, travel with them for free. The Free Travel Scheme allows for free travel on public transport provided by the State. This includes bus, rail, Local Link and the Luas. Free travel is also available on some services operated by private bus and ferry transport operators. There are currently over 1.1 million people eligible for a free travel pass. This figure increases to over 1.9 million when companion and spousal passes are included.

Michael Cahill TD Welcomes Major Investment in Kerry Mental Health Services

Kerry to Benefit from New €1.3m Crisis Resolution Service – 10 New Mental Health Staff to Be Appointed

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed the announcement by Minister of State for Mental Health and Older People, Mary Butler TD, of a new Crisis Resolution Service for Kerry, as part of the 2026 mental health budget.

The service, which will receive €1.3 million in recurring annual funding, will include the recruitment of 10 new whole-time-equivalent mental health professionals locally. This development marks a significant step forward in providing responsive, community-based mental health supports for people in crisis across the county.

"This is a transformative development for mental health services in Kerry," said Deputy Cahill. "I want to commend my colleague, Minister Mary Butler, for her strong commitment to ensuring that communities like ours are not left behind when it comes to accessing timely, compassionate mental health care."

The new Crisis Resolution Service will include two key components:

1. Crisis Resolution Teams

Multidisciplinary community-based teams providing rapid assessment and intensive short-term support (up to six weeks) for individuals in acute mental health crisis.

Services will be delivered in a flexible way, including at home, in community settings, or virtually. Teams will operate extended hours, seven days a week, ensuring help is available when it's most needed.

2. Solace Cafés

These non-clinical, out-of-hours spaces will offer a welcoming and supportive environment in the style of a café.

Open in the evenings and weekends, the cafés will offer peer support, psychosocial

interventions, and recovery planning.

Staff will also assist in signposting individuals to other mental health and well-being services locally.

Deputy Cahill added, "This is about meeting people where they are and offering them the right support, at the right time, in the right place. Whether it's through a Crisis Team responding at home or the warm, supportive atmosphere of a Solace Café, this investment puts Kerry at the heart of a modern, personcentred approach to mental health care."

The new service for Kerry follows the successful rollout of similar models in other regions, including a recently opened centre in Sligo.

"This funding is recurring, it's not a once-off. That means long-term, sustainable investment in mental health infrastructure for our county. It will make a real difference in people's lives," Deputy Cahill concluded.

Each event is run over an evening and opens with two short presentations, followed by a conversation between Minister Healy-Rae and a farmer discussing their forestry

journey. Attendees will also get an opportunity to talk to professional Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine Forestry Inspectors and Teagasc Forestry Advisors on a one-to-one basis about their interest in forestry. These events are FREE and open to all.

Minister Healy-Rae said: "I would urge all landowners who are interested in planting trees to attend these events, which will show how forestry can complement farming, diversify farm income, and provide long term financial support. These sessions will give farmers a clear picture of the



grants, premiums and supports available and demonstrate how planting trees can be a part of a balanced, resilient farm business."

These events will provide information on what grants and premiums are available to landowners to plant trees and how these payments interact with other agricultural payments. They will also help to address potential barriers to planting trees. Note all payments and earnings are income tax free.

Minister Healy-Rae continued: "I would also like to emphasise that there is a forest type to suit every type of land, and a scheme designed for every piece of ground. From agroforestry systems that combine grazing and trees, to native woodlands and productive timber crops, the programme offers real opportunities for landowners to match their land type with the most suitable scheme. Each option provides a secure annual premium and long-term financial return, ensuring that forestry can support farm families in managing their businesses with confidence".

The Employment Regulation Orders apply to approximately 35,000 staff in the Early Years and School-Age Childcare sector. While around one third of staff are already being paid above the current minimum rates of pay, it is estimated that 67% (23,000 approximately) of those working in the sector will see their wages increase as a result of the new minimum pay rates.

An additional €45 million in ringfenced Core Funding will be provided to support early learning and care services in meeting the increased cost of minimum pay rates in the sector.

This will bring total Core Funding for services to over €390 million in

the 2025/26 programme year.

Minister Foley said: 'I warmly welcome the adoption of these Employment Regulation Orders, which represents a much-needed improvement in pay and conditions for early years educators and school-age childcare practitioners in Kerry and right around the country.

The Department of Children has ringfenced €45 million in Core Funding for early learning and care services to make these Employment Regulation Orders a reality. I welcome the fact that this funding will be used solely for improved pay for early years educators and school-age childcare practitioners, who are a hugely significant resource in the delivery of excellence in the early learning and care sector."

"I would like to acknowledge the independent nature of the Labour Court and Joint Labour Committee process and the hard work of its members in negotiating the pay and conditions for the early learning and childcare sector. I look forward to seeing further positive negotiations from this process in the future."

Alan Dillon T. D., Minister of State for Employment, Small Business and Retail has confirmed he intends to sign the new Employment Order for Early Years Educators and School-Age Practitioners, as required under law.

In the 2025/2026 programme year, a new pay element of the grant calculation, the Staff Funding Additional Contribution, be introduced to centre-based Partner Services to facilitate the distribution of the €45 million in ringfenced funding. This new element of Core Funding will support Partner Services to meet the costs of increasing rates of pay as a result of the new Employment Regulation Orders. The rate at which the Staff Funding Additional Contribution is to be paid was agreed upon during the Joint Labour Committee's negotiation



SPORTS DIRECT MEN'S FAI CUP SEMI FINAL

Kerry FC defeat to Shamrock Rovers in Tallaght Stadium

Shamrock Rovers 6-1 Kerry FC

History beckoned for Kerry FC as they headed for a defining night in Tallaght, taking on Shamrock Rovers for a place in the FAI Cup final. Excitement swept through the county, as the anticipation was electric, as supporters dreamt of another famous chapter in this extraordinary story.

This Cup adventure has been pure drama from start to finish. A stunning late free-kick against Athlone saved their campaign, followed by a convincing victory over Cobh to claim Munster bragging rights. Then came the unforgettable comeback against Sligo, a night of disbelief and celebration that cemented Kerry's reputation as the team that simply refuses to surrender.

Now, the newcomers meet Ireland's most dominant side with everything to gain. Shamrock Rovers stood as towering favourites, chasing another double, but Kerry's determination and unity have carried them beyond expectation. The stage was set for a battle of belief, courage, and maybe, just maybe, another miracle.

FIRST HALF

Under the lights of Tallaght Stadium, the story of Irish football's newest dreamers continued. Only three years into their existence, Kerry FC arrived in Dublin not as tourists, but as equals, proud semifinalists in the FAI Cup, facing a Shamrock Rovers side steeped in history and silverware. From the moment they stepped onto the pitch, the travelling Kerry faithful made themselves heard. Decked in green and white, their drums, chants, and flags created an atmosphere that felt more like Tralee than Tallaght. It was passionate, loud, and full of belief, the sound of a county united behind its team. As the game kicked off, Kerry immediately showed composure beyond their years. Rovers saw most of the ball in the opening minutes, but the visitors were brave and purposeful in possession. Captain Ronan Teahan marshalled the midfield with confidence, while Joe Adams and Daniel Okwute linked up smartly on the counter. In the fourteenth minute, Kerry carved out their first real chance when Okwute's low-driven cross almost found Robbie Cleary at the near post, only for goalkeeper Edward McGinty to smother the danger.

It was a reminder that Kerry was not content to sit deep and absorb pressure. They were here to play football, their football, built on energy, movement, and confidence. The away crowd responded with a roar, their songs echoing through the stands as the team pressed high and battled for every ball.

But against a side of Shamrock Rovers' pedigree, opportunities are punished swiftly. In the seventeenth minute, Graham Burke, a man with years of top-flight experience, found space inside the box and struck low beyond Darragh Foley. Five minutes later, Burke struck again to make it 2-0, finishing off a well-worked move that showed the difference in clinical edge between the two sides.

Despite the setback, Kerry refused to retreat. Colin Healy's men continued to play out from the back, with Oran Crowe and Christopher McQueen distributing calmly under pressure. In midfield, Aladesanusi, who replaced Carl Mujaguzi in the twenty-ninth minute, added bite and energy, breaking up play and helping Kerry gain territory.





The half grew more physical as tempers flared, with Joe Adams and Burke both shown yellow cards after Burke went in for unnecessary afters due to a fantastic tackle from Kerry's number ten. Burke was very lucky to stay on the pitch as he shoved Adams' head into the ground. But this was a sign not of frustration, but of fight, Kerry were determined to stand their ground. The travelling supporters, although frustrated, loved it, raising their voices again to back their heroes in yellow.

Rovers pushed for a third before the break, with Dylan Watts firing over before Michael Noonan finally made it 3-0 in stoppage time. It was a cruel blow just before the interval, but as the whistle went, the Kerry players walked off to an emphatic ovation from their supporters. The away end had not stopped singing for a single minute.

At half-time, despite the scoreline, the sense of pride among the Kerry contingent was unmistakable. They were living a dream that, not long ago, would have seemed impossible, an FAI Cup semi-final under the lights of Tallaght Stadium.

SECOND HALF

The second half began with Rovers again on the front foot, and they added a fourth through a Watts penalty five minutes in. Yet, in typical Kerry fashion, the Kingdom responded instantly. Just two minutes later, Daniel Okwute, tireless all evening, was fouled in the box, and referee Paul McLaughlin pointed to the spot. The noise from the away section rose in anticipation as Joe Adams stepped forward. With nerves of steel, he sent McGinty the wrong way to make it 4-1. The Kerry supporters erupted, scarves

waving, drums pounding, voices carrying across Tallaght. It was a moment of pure joy, a reminder of how far this young club had come in such a short time.

That goal seemed to energise both players and fans. Suddenly Kerry were pressing higher, moving the ball with swagger, and chasing every second ball. The belief from the stands seeped onto the pitch, a symbiotic energy between players and supporters that lifted the entire side.

Healy introduced fresh legs on the hour mark, bringing on Cian Brosnan and Arran Healy for Cleary and Adams. Both immediately injected enthusiasm and urgency, chasing every lost cause and showing the kind of fearless attitude that has defined Kerry's

Rovers, to their credit, showed their quality once more through Noonan's second of the night in the sixty-seventh minute, but the spirit of the visitors never faded. Foley made key saves, McQueen threw himself into blocks, and Okwute continued to torment Rovers' backline with his pace and directness. The Kerry supporters, undeterred by the scoreline, turned the away end into a carnival of pride, their chants and a version of the Poznan lifting spirits that could be felt back home in the Kingdom.

As the match entered its final quarter, Kerry kept pushing. Sean McGrath replaced Okwute in the seventy-seventh minute and immediately pressed high, while Arran Healy picked up a yellow card for a strong challenge that drew applause from the travelling fans, the kind of wholehearted commitment they had come to expect from their team.





Even as Rovers threatened again, with Watts heading narrowly wide, Kerry continued to show their development. Their structure held firm, their communication was sharp, and their transitions were executed with intent. Every tackle was cheered, every clearance applauded, and every forward pass greeted with chants of encouragement.

In the final moments, Rovers substitute Cian Barrett, formerly on loan to Kerry FC on two separate occasions, added a sixth goal, but by then, the story had already been written. Listowel Celtic B delivered a clinical showing in a 5-0 win over LB Rovers A. Ethan Stack bagged a brace, while Tommy O'Connor, Evan Rodgers, and Ruairi O'Brien all added goals to complete the scoring.

In another high-scoring affair, Tralee Dynamos A came out on top against Fenit B with a 6-3 victory. Marcos Benito Martinez stole the show with four goals, supported by strikes from Flyn Boyle and Rory O'Connor. Eoin Reilly netted a brace for the home side, while Eamon Og McElligot also scored for the home side.

SENIOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Well, the County Championship is in full swing and starting to get interesting. To be honest, I think I and a lot of people were just 'footballed' out of it by the time it started. You are going from a long Inter-County Championship campaign (thank God - a short one would count as a disaster for Kerry) straight into a long (albeit gripping) club championship campaign - and from there into a County Championship that takes a while before knock-out games. And look, I know people won't like my opinion, but I'd value a club title over the county one in Kerry. I know that it's a bit different for the top clubs. The likes of Kenmare, Dingle, Austin Stacks, or Rathmore have a genuine chance to leapfrog Dr. Crokes and represent Kerry in the Munster Senior Club Championship. So of course they will be going all out to win the Bishop Moyihan, and I'm not suggesting that's anything to be sniffed at anyway. I'm just saying that for most people, players and supporters, their club championship supersedes their County Championship. That's especially true when there is no relegation; that takes all the spice out of it. Just to add to that - and I've made this point repeatedly, so I won't belabour it this week - but the likes of Paul Geaney, Darmuid O'Connor, Seán O'Shea and plenty more playing games while carrying knocks is absolutely reckless. Week after week after week....it's a savage schedule, and too savage on bodies.

All that said, it may be changing, but for me and all the generations before me, you'd have a fair chance of remembering who won the Bishop Moynihan, not the Senior Club Championship, in any given year. I would say that the County Championship was the domestic equivalent of Sam Maguire, the club championship was comparable to the National League.

There were a couple of riveting games last weekend – one in particular has electrified the rest of the competition – but let's be honest, severa of them were pedestrian enough and there were a few disappointing showings.

East Kerry 3-23 Templenoe 1-10

The top teams hate games like these. Templenoe haven't a fraction of the population of East Kerry, and almost all of those East Kerry players have worn county jerseys. They win in a canter, or it counts as a disappointing showing. Templenoe literally had free shot; there were no expectations.

It played out exactly as expected. East Kerry led by 0-12 to 0-4 at half-time, with Ruairi Murphy already notching 0-5 in a man of the match performance. Himself and Paul O'Shea (yes, I know, 'Paul and he'. There's grammatical English – but there's also colloquial English)

goaled in the 38th minute and Paudie O'Leary added a third just before the final whistle. Ruairí Murphy finished with 1-6, Paul O'Shea had 1-4, and David Clifford had 0-5. I thought Ronan Buckley had an absolute stormer until coming off injured early in the second half. He and Paudie Cifford would be huge absentees. East Kerry have now been installed as overall favourites. I honestly wouldn't read too much into this one, though. Templenoe had plenty of guts. Gavin Crowley and Seán Sheehan, who scored their consolation goal, battled hard all through. Mark Casey didn't impact the scoreboard but he gave it everything. Adrian Spillane might have finished his inter-county career, but no Kerry player wants to tangle with him, while his younger brother kicked 0-9 while feeding off scraps. But Kerry FC were as likely to beat Shamrock Rovers as Templenoe were to beat East Kerry, and that's the plain truth of it.

Dingle 2-19 Na Gaeil 1-13

Dingle had Tom O'Sullivan and Dylan Geaney back in harness, while Na Gaeil were without Diarmuid O'Connor, Oisín Maunsell, and Conor Bohane. I said last week that I think Dingle were focusing more on the County Championship than the Club this year and I still think that. Tom O'Sullivan's goal early in the second quarter meant that they led by 1-10 to 0-2. Na Gaeil got a goal of their own through Ruairí Ó hAiniféin but Ned Ó Riain replied in kind and na Gaeil were battling a strong tide from then on. It was 2-15 to 1-6 at half-time and realistically, the second half was a formality.

Austin Stacks 4-29 Milltown/Castlemaine 0-17

It's like this. Myself and a colleague were back in hospitable Beaufort, trying to write an interesting 800 words about a game with a 16 point disparity between the sides and feeling a little sorry for ourselves (nobody else ever feels sorry for us). And then we heard the half-time score between Stacks and Milltown/ Castlemaine. 3-23 to 0-2. We felt a lot less sorry for ourselves and a lot sorrier for John O'Dowd, who was reporting on that game.

I was at a junior match one time with a colleague from Kerry Radio who was doing live updates. It was a slow sports Saturday and the radio kept coming back to him more often than usual. In a game where the first score was kicked in the 23rd minute. At one point in the second half he was so desperate for something to say that he gave an impromptu lecture on how progressive the host club were in rewilding around the edges to create bee habitats. I had to walk away in case everybody on the radio heard me laughing. But that's commentary. Some days you've got what you've got and can only work with that.

Look, Stacks were very impressive. Milltown/

Castlemaine were much better in the second half and had locked the stable door, but the stallion hadn't just bolted by then, that stallion had sired grandchildren who were winning Grand Nationals.

I'm not doing any match summary. It's like this. I do have it on my clubber subscription, but I'm not going to be watching it. I couldn't be doing it to myself. My sympathies to Milltown/ Castlemaine; every club has days like this. Let's just consign it to history.

Mid Kerry 3-8 Dr. Crokes 0-15


I did tip Crokes to win it, but in fairness I did say last week that Mid Kerry are a coming side and this would be very close. To be honest, Mid Kerry were actually better than I had expected – I hadn't factored in Liam Smith. He has been absolutely outstanding for Glenbeigh/Glencar in the last two years and was actually in training with Kerry last year before he got injured. He was awesome here, particularly in the third quarter when the game was on the line. You know and I know that when Crokes are able to gain possession at times like that, they can be lethal. Smith (and Seán O'Brien, and Mike Breen for that matter) won vital ball.

Even so, Crokes can count themselves unlucky. They played against the strong wind in the first half but controlled the play very well, conserving possession and slowing things down. Mid Kerry were struggling to build any momentum. It was actually a masterclass in how to play against a wind like that. Mid Kerry caught a break when a Shane Murphy kickout held up in that wind and dropped shorter than intended, with Daire Cleary doing well to snaffle it and find Liam Carey, who gave it to Jack O'Connor for a clinical finish. Jack O'Connor was a superb Kerry minor in 2018 and 2019 and I'd love to see him getting an injuryfree run of games. Younger brother Darragh is class as well and soon added a two pointer. Cian McMahon pulled one back and Micheál Burns was denied a goal thanks to a brilliant block by Seán O'Brien. Dr. Crokes trailed by 1-6 to 0-4 at the break, but frankly that didn't remotely look like enough on the board.

Except....if anything, Mid Kerry grew into the challenge against the wind. I've mentioned Liam Smith; Eoin Clifford is another player who has been doing it in the big games for the last couple of years and he was outstanding as well. But Crokes had a not-so-secret weapon in Tony Brosnan. Two superb two pointers from him had Crokes back level by the start of the third quarter and he would add two more. A lot of people, including a number of neutrals, felt that he had kicked another one. I genuinely couldn't tell, but the umpires were watching it closely and the referee did consult before waving it wide.

Ciarán Kennedy, another to impress, notched

a pint and then came a big, big moment. Eoin Clifford went on a huge run and got in, but I felt that Crokes had the situation in hand and he would be wiser to take his point. Instead, he went for goal. David Shaw reacted fast to get a half-block on it....Shane Murphy was perfectly positioned to gather the initial shot, but that deflection was a killer and the ball rolled into the net. Not exactly a fluke, but definitely a big slice of luck involved.

Having battled so hard to get back level, Crokes had a four point deficit to climb again. No bother; they have been here before, and an effervescent Tony coolly kicked another two pointer. Jack O'Connor and Tony Brosnan raised orange flags again. 0-17 to 0-14. Crokes looked poised for a late surge but Smith, in particular, really stepped up to the challenge. Then came the vital break as Ciaran Kennedy was on the end of a great move to fire home a goal. I think Mid Kerry needed that to win it, but we'll never know and the point is moot anyway. They got it, and were able to hang onto that narrow lead until the finish.

Tough on Crokes. I'd still be shocked if they aren't representing Kerry in the Munster Senior Club, but coming in cold into that won't help their cause. However, it does mean that the favourites are out of the County Championship and opens up the competition from here.

Kenmare Shamrocks 4-15 North Kerry 1-12

I fancied North Kerry for this one. I know it took late goals from Grimes and Jason Foley to pull them out of the fire in their last game, but looking at the players at their disposal, I felt that with the couple of games under their belt, they had the potential to be real contenders. Were Kenmare the force of old?

Yup. Most definitely. North Kerry did open with two pointers from Cormac Dillon and Rob Stack and Sean O'Shea had to be sharp to deny Cillian Trant a goal. But as the game went on, it became clear that Kenmare were quite willing to drop back in numbers and absorb North Kerry pressure before breaking at pace. Not guite a blanket defence of old, but not far away from it either. The new rules have created a bit more space even in that style, but North Kerry didn't have the forwards to take advantage. Instead, what it meant was that Kenmare defenders could afford to burst forward. In the 20th minute. James McCarthy did exactly that and hit the net to make it 1-4 to 0-5. Jack Tagney added another at the end of the first half and they led by 2-5 to 0-6 at the break.

Tagney added another at the start of the second half and at the start of the fourth quarter they led by 3-9 to 0-8. North Kerry were denied goals from Ruairí O'Connell and Cormac Dillon by great saves by Kieran Fitzgibbon. Before Joe Joe Grimes did finally hit the net. It was too late, though, and Kenmare full back James McCarthy iced the cake with his second goal.

North Kerry will be a little disappointed to have departed their first championship at this stage, but they have the potential to develop into a strong force. For Kenmare? Well, they have as much of a shout as anyone now.

Spa 3-18 South Kerry 3-13

Mid Kerry v Dr. Crokes was obviously the game of the weekend, but this one runs it very close, with both sides looking likely winners at different times until very late on. With Alex Coffey outstanding in the middle and Emmet Daly wearing his shooting boots, South Kerry opened up a 0-4 to 0-1 lead. Spa got the next two points and Oran O'Neill and David Spillane were very unlucky not to goal. A minute later the ball was in the net....but it was in the Spa net. Alex Coffey had cleared Spillane's rebound volley off his own goal-line, now he was up the field and setting up Ciarán O'Sullivan for the finish. Michael Horgan did reply in kind in the 20th minute, but then came a moment of controversy. The referee blew his whistle for a free as Coffey was breaking forward. He should have played advantage, but clearly blew the whistle. He and the Spa defenders stopped, seeing as the free was given and Coffey had continued past the four metres from the infringement where 'solo and go' is permitted and also because he was inside the 20 metre line. Coffey hesitated...and continued play, exchanging a 1-2 before finishing to the net, and the goal stood. It looked very much like a mistake by the referee. If it was, it was his only

The only reason I am mentioning it is because there have been issues over the last month or two about one point v two pointers and so on. With all the new rules, which have unquestionably improved the game hugely, have we made things a little too complicated for referees? I know I've had to check the rulebook during games recently and I doubt if I am the only one.

Sean Teahan landed a third goal, this one undisputed, and South Kerry led by 3-7 to 1-8 at the break.

Spa needed a strong start to the second half and got it with a goal. That one was also controversial, though. He was trying to handpass over the bar but it ended up in the net. Did it get a slight deflection on the way in? If so, it's a goal. If not, definitely not. You can fist a goal from a ball in flight; you cannot hand pass it to the net. At the start of the 'Golden Years' team in the seventies, you could, so they did....so much so that the rule was changed. I saw Michael Foley's goal in real time and I've rewatched it on clubber; I still can't give you any definitive answer.

Arrah, the bottom line is that if Alex Coffey's goal was ruled out on one side and Michael Foley's on the either, there would be very few arguments. Same if they both stood. Two wrongs (if they were wrong) can never make a right, but arguably they balance out on this occasion.

The sides exchanged point for point until Cian Tobin's third free on the trot made it 2-12 to 3-10. Michael Foley cleverly hand passed to David Spillane and the sides were level.

Chris Farley with a great two pointer and Ian O'Sullivan added a point. Three in it again; it felt like it could be enough to burn off Spa's challenge.

It wasn't, though. In the 54th minute, David Spillane jinked his way through and struck an

equalising goal, easily the best green flag of the game. An imperious Cian Tobin calmly hit a great two pointer free and added another. David Spillane gave Spa a five point win that had looked well out of reach just minutes before.

QUARTER-FINAL PREVIEWS East Kerry V Rathmore

Rathmore will give them plenty of it. Nobody needs to be told about the likes of Paul Murphy, Shane Ryan (will he be needed in goal or will he play in the forward line?), and John Moyihan are obvious dangers. But anyone who has seen the likes of the Moynihans and especially Ciarán Collins will know that Rathmore will bring a lot more to the party. Moreover, Rathmore are an outfit with a really impressive ability to get the best out of themselves. There's no weak links there.

East Kerry should still have too much power overall. I'm not going to start listing names; we'd be here for a while, even with the players they are missing.

West Kerry v Dingle

Dingle may have dominated the West Kerry Championship for several years now and reached County Finals, but this is not the foregone conclusion you might think. I mentioned Mid Kerry's Liam Smith and Eoin Clifford as stand-out players in recent games; Cathal Ó Beaglaíoch has been in the same mould. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch is an obvious danger, but his younger brother Ruaidhrí gives a real cutting edge up front. Seán Ó Cuinn, Colm Ó Muircheartaigh, Franz Sauerland, Tom O'Donnell, Éanna Ó Conchúir, Killian Falvey, Cian O'Grady....yeah, that's not any side that's going to lie down, and especially not to their neighbours! You'd still fancy Dingle, especially

Austin Stacks v Kenmare Shamrocks

Tie of the round for me. I must admit that Kenmare Shamrock's comprehensive win over a quality-strewn North Kerry opened my eyes a bit. Austin Stacks have some phenomenal talent starting to really make an impact at senior level (plenty more in the pipeline, by the way). I know they are down a few bodies but they can fill those gaps. Funny enough, given the attacking talent on display, I'm not expecting big scorelines and I think goals will be crucial

Mid Kerry v Spa

Spa were excellent against South Kerry but Mid Kerry are a different level. After beating the reigning champions, I have them as second favourites just behind East Kerry. It will be a good battle – Spa have the scoring power to ask tough questions, but I expect Mid Kerry to come up with the right answers.

The Sem will be facing off against one of the Tralee schools in the O'Sullivan Cup Final next week. Things are progressing well for the school

so far, wth the U17s defeating Coachford in a Munster U17 Frewen Cup preliminary round last week.

Shamrock Rovers 6 Kerry FC 1

I don't think anybody, anywhere, realistically gave Kerry a chance of winning this one. Kerry FC against Shamrock Rovers....one of those clubs is three years old and has always finished in the lower end of the first division. The other is, by far, the most decorated Irish club of them all and our European representatives. And look, that's exactly how it played out.

Kerry brought over 1000 supporters and plenty of noise and colour. They stamped a mark and have received praise from all and sundry. This is how to do things right.

Kerry actually started well and we could dream for quarter of an hour. It couldn't and didn't last – in the 17th minute, Graham Burke hit a clinical finish past our young goalkeeper. Five minutes later Rovers combined for Burke to strike again – in fairness, that was a well-worked goal that showed how the top sides do it.

Joe Adams and Graham Burke hada tussle on the sideline. Unfortunately, that's the moment that most commentators and pundits chose to focus on after the game. Negativity and scandal sells; that's all that's going on there. Yes, Burke should have received a red card. But in fairness it was an absolute reckless challenge by Joe as well. Burke pushed his head down in retaliatory frustration. I'm not excusing it, but I am saying that it was an awful lot more molehill than mountain. Not a big deal; move on.

Just before the break, wunderkind Michael Noonan, 17 years old, made it 3-0.

Kerry conceded a penalty early in the second half to make it 4-0 but not long after, Daniel Okwute's persistence paid off as the referee pointed to the spot. Up stepped Joe Adams to fire home and Kerry were off the mark.

Noonan added his second midway through the half and late on, former Kerry player Cian Barrett closed out the scoring to make it 6-1. Shamrock Rovers will face relegation certainties Cork City (as an aside, Cork supporters seem to be blaming Dermot Ussher for their woes – lads, he put two million euro into your club and your problems long predate is involvement; stop biting the hand that has been feeding you) and look poised to claim a league and cup double. It says a lot that it was the Kerry fans who were cheering and singing at the finish. Games can never be fully measured just by the scorelines.

GAA CONGRESS

It was all relatively straightforward and a bit dull, truth be told. The FRC had already done most of the hot topics this year and, with general consensus that it has done its job brilliantly and reinvigorated the game of gaelic football, there wasn't too much thunder in any of the speeches. One or two of the motions, all 61 of which passed comfortably are worth a glance.

If a player moves from the sideline or 45m line before the referee has thrown in the ball to start or restart the game by awarding a free-kick to the opposition from the middle of the half-way line. If opposition players foul simultaneously, the referee will start/restart the game again as normal.

Nothing controversial. The midfielder on the sideline has been trying to steal a yard or two in a good few games I've seen; no harm to put a stop to that.

Kick-outs must now travel 20 metre line as well as the 40 metre arc before being played by another player of the defending team. *Basically, play it forward.*

The two-point score has been slightly amended. Previously a shot kicked from outside the 40 metre arc only registered as a two-point score rather than a single point score if it went over the bar without being touched by another player. So, you often had a situation where a goalkeeper getting his hand to a shot from outside the arc on its way over the bar meant it was a single-point score rather than a two-pointer. Now all converted shots from outside the arc count as two-point scores provided no other player from the same team as the shooter touches it after it's kicked.

Again, pretty straightforward. If it's kicked from outside the arc and goes between the posts, it's a two pointer. No need to complicate things.

Deliberately denying a goal-scoring opportunity by pulling an opponent's jersey has now joined the list of cynical behaviour infractions which are penalised with a black card and a penalty.



I agree. I'd happily concede a free late in a game rather than an almost certain goal. This way, the punishment fits the crime.

The black-card/penalty for cynical behaviour infractions now also applies at club level as well as inter-county senior, U20, minor, and junior level.

Frankly, I want the same rules for club and intercounty games across the board.

'Disruptive conduct' by team officials will penalised by giving the opposition a free on the 13-metre line. Where the infraction occurs immediately before the start of the game or during the half-time interval, the game shall start or restart with such a 13-metre free.

In my opinion, there is far, far too much sideline abuse in GAA. Managements actively try to pressurize referees throughout games and, unfortunately, it often works. I want this to be enforced absolutely ruthlessly – as always, though, the issue is will County Boards support referees in doing so?

Sideline officials have the power to bring to the attention of the referee any foul play or infraction of Rule by a team official.

Sideline officials were once extremely limited – they simply couldn't inform the referee of most matters as it was beyond their scope. Sideline officials are an important resource for referees; use them. With the caveat, of course, that referees at lower grades often have to ask each team to do a sideline. In those circumstances, referees obviously have to take things with at least a inch of salt.

If a player advances the ball deliberately from the place where a free or side line kick should be taken, or takes a sideline from a position not outside the boundary line, then a free is awarded to the opposition. Previously a throwin was awarded in these situations.

Look, the word 'deliberately' is doing a lot of heavy lifting there. I said it with the black card, 'intent' is a subjective, not objective thing.

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
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
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
















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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE **BUILDING IN KERRY**

ith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dua up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers



This is a photo of an item on a snaa list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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Every two to three years should be enough to divide most perennials to maintain good vigor and healthy plants but if you want to divide them for the purpose of propagation, it can be done more regularly.

The best time to divide herbaceous Perennials is when the plants are dormant, so anytime from November to mid March.

A lot of spring flowering plants such as Irises, are best divided in summer after flowering when they produce new shoots.

When you have divided your plant and you have either planted some in the border or in pots, remember to keep well watered until established.
