



€3.4 MILLION WORTH OF PROPERTIES SOLD IN KILLARNEY IN JANUARY

As more and more people decide to move outside the larger cities and back to their home counties, the property market is showing

an average increase in prices of just short of 12 percent in 2021.

In January alone €3.4 million worth of properties were sold in the greater Killarney area. Kerry saw a 4.35pc increase in the three bedroom category in the latter six months of 2021 and a 3.57pc increase for both 4-bedroom houses and twobedroom apartments.

Pat Davitt, Chief Executive of IPAV said during 2021 in particular the differential between asking and achieved prices was crucial, given the intense demand against a scarcity of supply, leading to a trend whereby agreed prices often exceeded asking prices, sometimes to a considerable degree. "However," he said, "there is a myriad of factors impacting the market, with many buyers, particularly those with family connections to the

country, now seeing living in the country as a realistic, more affordable option given the new hybrid working arrangements."

pepicting Mind, Park, Lake and Mountain the Wander Wild Festival set to egnite the spirit of adventure on the Wild Atlantic Way this March.

After two years of being told to go inside, it's time, at last, to explore the great outdoors once again.

The Killarney Wander Wild Festival will see the past 24 months banished to distant memory as springtime is wildly embraced and celebrated through adventure-filled outdoor experiences.

A renewed sense of awe and freedom will greet visitors to Killarney on the weekend of March 25-27 when the town plays host to an event-filled Wander Wild Festival, the first post pandemic gathering of its kind along the Wild Atlantic Way.

Visitors will have an opportunity to emerge from lockdown with a vengeance in the country's adventure capital which is preparing to take a walk on the wild side in the 25,000-acre UNESCO national park.

An exciting programme of events has been lined up for outdoor enthusiasts and those anxious to make that great escape and a festival basecamp in the middle of town will be the focal point for the weekend. On the opening night of the festival, a spectacular opening equinox parade through the streets will dramatically celebrate the demise of winter and the rebirth of spring. In this post pandemic year, the flickering flame of a new dawn will illuminate the town like never before.

The adventures on offer include mountain hikes – taking in Ireland's highest peak Carrauntoohil – kayak and boat trips on the lakes, guided national park cycles, photography workshops, orienteering, lake walks, rock climbing and abseiling adventures, night nature walks and an engaging short film festival while plans for an exciting trail race are also at a very advanced stage.

Little wanderers can test their prowess on a 10.5m climbing wall, compete in urban orienteering, try out the "do touch" bugs and animals exhibition or pick up thespian tips in an acting class.

For a truly immersive experience, sunrise dips in the world-famous glacial Lakes of Killarney are guaranteed to revitalise and rejuvenate.

A food trail promises an authentic taste of Kerry food and drink and there

will be live music to be enjoyed throughout the weekend.

A number of high-profile guest speakers have been lined up to share their life experiences, including gifted writer and storyteller Michael Harding who will explore rituals, love, the ocean, the human spirit – and chest pain.

"The Wander Wild Festival is a really fantastic opportunity for people to mark the declining pandemic by escaping for a few days to enjoy our awe-inspiring park, mountains, lakes and our town, among friends old and new," said organising committee chairman Pat Chawke.

Throughout the weekend visitors will get an insider glimpse of the world-famous Killarney National Park, adjacent to the town, which is a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve.





TRICEL MARKS **MAJOR MILESTONE**

WITH A VISIT FROM AN TAOISEACH

he Tricel Group marked a major milestone this week in Killarney when An Taoiseach, Micheal Martin, visited the site to launch Tricel's sustainability and expansion programme. Mr Martin's presence was reflective of the government's ongoing commitment supporting growth within Irish companies in a sustainable way to protect future generations.

The CEO of Enterprise Ireland, Mr Leo Clancy, CEO of SEAI, Mr William Walsh, Marie Moloney, Mayor of Killarney, along with other local dignitaries and representatives were in attendance.

The company this week celebrated the completion

of Ireland's largest combined solar & heat pump installation at its 100,000 sq. ft. facility in Killarney. In 2021, amid the Covid 19 pandemic, the company began this ambitious project by installing nearly 2000 solar panels, six invertors and 3 Heat pumps. The project was another example of the company's firm commitment to protecting our local and global environment by reducing the company's overall energy, waste and emission levels. Working closely with Enerpower, a Waterford based company, Tricel were able to deliver this project and move closer to realising its sustainability goals.

The total reduction in emissions from this combined Solar PV and Heat Pump project equates to 357,800 kg of CO2 per year, equivalent to the emissions saved from powering 300 houses every year. The 750kw solar panel system on the roof of the Killarney manufacturing site provides 25% of our electricity through solar per year, while the heat pumps remove our oil dependence by 90%.

The Tricel Group's success over the past number of years is driven by a relentless focus on innovation. In 2017, the company began its robotics programme at its site in Killarney, which further strengthens its commitment to manufacturing excellence and quality. This programme was guickly followed in 2018 by installing a state-of-the-art SMC machine & plant room, which is now the main provider of raw materials to its manufacturing sites in Europe. Automation and robotics will continue to be a key focus for the Group into the future.

The continued growth and success of the company have also seen the creation of over 290 new jobs in 2021 in Ireland, the UK and France. Currently, skilled positions are available at the company's headquarters in Killarney; these are in areas such as Purchasing, Marketing, IT, Manufacturing, Engineering, Sales and Business, as well as Graduate and Undergraduate positions.

LOVE OF THE ARBUTUS TREE ALIVE IN KILLARNEY

One Killarney man who has not overlooked the arbutus tree is James Flynn of Ross Road, retired from the ESB. He has become an authority.

James was to have lectured on the subject at the annual Muckross House winter programme but this was postponed because of Covid-19.

He has kept the flame alive, and the lecture with slides looks set to be rescheduled.

The furniture made from the wood and combined with yew and sycamore and holly is now very prized.

Our family has a small remnant. My grandmother Mary Griffin who emigrated to Canada in 1908 was given a beautiful box keepsake with an engraving of Muckross Abbey in arbutus done by the late Done O'Brien, the renowned boat builder from O'Connells Terrace.

Muckross House of course has very ornate examples, admired by Prince Charles during his visit here. And in Kensington palace some years ago I viewed a beautiful piece presented to Queen Victoria.

Some of it is too elaborate and crowded for modern taste, as the plain wood itself is beautiful.

No doubt with some encouragement from James planting of arbutus has taken place in Ross Road. It is to be hoped more will follow. James thinks we should value the arbutus more, and its long history in the wood making industry.

He has already traced the history of a table he bought from Boston to what was once a wood cabinet making workshop at the rear of Reidy's, in the 1880s.

According to an online history of British and Irish Furniture Makers, there was a strong tradition but Killarney furniture making began to decline in the 1870s.

A revival was led by the Countess of Kenmare and inlaid arbutus cabinets were shown at the Dublin exhibitions of 1895, the opening year of The Killarney School of Arts and Crafts.

Under the tutelage of a German carver, there were evening classes and apprenticeships in the school, which was probably in New Street and which concentrated on lamps, boxes, tea trays and oak bedsteads.

Some of the old Killarney furniture ended up

in Australia and recently a chessboard and pieces went for €4,000 at auction in Dublin, James says.

POSITIVE SURGE IN TOURISM BOOKINGS

There is growing optimism in the tourism industry about the year ahead. While domestic visitors may be down, because of the natural yearning to get off the island, there is confidence Killarney will benefit from overseas visitor again after a two year hiatus. The latest February bulletin from Tourism Ireland tells how European wide, travel and tourism is seeing a surge of more than 250% in European bookings for Easter 2022 when compared to 2021, while summer bookings are currently more than 80% above last year's levels.

It is interesting to see Spain heads the list of destinations. Apparently, Lanzarote was full of Killarney and Tralee people last week, and this column has spotted a number of lucky Kerry people with glowing tans they hardly picked up on the lake shore.

Meanwhile, there is a worrying lack of employees for the industry. I have learned the employment gaps are now so serious in some of the very best establishments that whole floors are being closed off and bookings rejected.

The fact that Killarney has no third level college is coming home to roost, perhaps. The Department of Tourism website on employment stresses the importance and mutual opportunity for third-level students, on a part-time or seasonal basis.

The plans for the training centre and college former Pretty Polly are advancing, I am told. They can hardly come quickly enough

A large Swiss style hotel school is urgently needed, or the shift from Tralee of the Catering Department at MTU perhaps. Where else would give the mix of experience necessary for proper training than Killarney? Meanwhile, Kerry County Council's Tourism Strategy got an award from Public Sector Magazine, the magazine sparking controversy and question marks on Joe Duffy all week, the council confirmed.

Nominees from RTE to county councils were it appears asked for hefty contributions - for advertorial and marketing articles seemingly linked to the awards.

"The awards were accepted in good faith," the council spokesman said.

As well as the ground breaking tourism strategy, the Council's road safety programme, and website and social media platforms also got awards from the magazine. "Since the recent controversy about these matters emerged, the Council has contacted the magazine seeking clarity on the process and the criteria, "the spokesman said.



The school setup it's TikTok account when Mr. Pierce Dargan took over the reigns as Principal, on November 1st last. Mr. Dargan saw a need and a gap in the market for such a platform to promote the school. He said "It showcases the two aspects of what makes Presentation Castleisland so special, firstly, the school atmosphere on a daily basis, which short video clips capture more than any picture can ever do and secondly, it showcases the talented and inspiring staff at our school, who are also up for a bit of fun too.

"If students and staff are having fun, along with keeping academic, co-curricular and extracurricular standards high, as well as following the school policies and procedures, then you create a learning environment for both students and staff to flourish. It is essential to find the balance here and I think we have it just right in Presentation Castleisland."

The school has a very rigid mobile phone policy but students, under the supervision of a teacher, create the content and videos on a dedicated school phone that only has the school TikTok app on it and already logged in. The agreement is that the students can create the videos but Mr. Dargan must approve and publish each one, otherwise the app and account is deleted.

"Placing trust in my students is needed for this to be a success. It is a student council run initiative, mainly run by the 6th year members but any student or teacher can create videos. It builds leadership capacity in the students. We are simply showcasing what we do daily and bringing it to the public in their homes via TikTok"

"We have recently setup a 'TikTok Club' every Wednesday at lunchtime for the creation of these videos, open to all students. This is run under the guidance of Ms. Hurley. BROAD WELCOME FOR THE GREENWAY DECISION



There has been a broad welcome across the county with the Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council and the Cathaoirleach of the Kenmare Municipal District all welcoming the decision of the Supreme Court on the South Kerry Greenway.

Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Jimmy Moloney said the South Kerry Greenway will be transformative for the county and the southwest region.

"I am delighted that this matter has been settled by the Supreme Court and that Kerry County Council can now proceed with the construction of the greenway.

"Coming as it does so close to the scheduled opening of the Tralee-Fenit and Listowel-Abbeyfeale greenways this summer, this is an enormous boost for the local economy and the tourism industry in Kerry," said Cllr Moloney.

Cathaoirleach of the Kenmare Municipal District, Cllr Michael Cahill said that the greenway had enormous potential to transform south Kerry.

"This project will be of enormous benefit to south Kerry and the entire county from an economic and tourism perspective. It has the potential to attract thousands of visitors to the area every year.

"This is a historic day for the Iveragh Peninsula and the whole of County Kerry. It will be one of our most iconic attractions and leisure amenities and I look forward to its construction over the coming years," said Cllr Cahill.

Kerry County Council also noted the decision of the Supreme Court issued last evening in relation to the South Kerry Greenway project.

The Supreme Court rejected both applications for leave to appeal against the decision of the High Court.

"The Council warmly welcomes the decision of the court and looks forward to the commencement of construction of the South Kerry Greenway at the earliest opportunity and ensuring delivery of an enormously important amenity for the county" the council said in a statement.

Deputy Brendan Griffin said, "This is massively positive news for Kerry people, businesses and communities. The greenway will be absolutely transformational, not only for the South Kerry region but for the county as a whole.

"I've been an advocate of the South Kerry Greenway project for decades, and I have raised the need for funding to accompany planning permission in the Dáil on multiple occasions, including numerous debates with Minister Eamon Ryan in the recent past focused on the provision of financial support.

"I was proud to have secured funding of €6.5m for the Tralee, Fenit, Listowel and Limerick Greenway in 2019 as Minister for Tourism, and it is due to open this year. The development of the South Kerry Greenway will now act as the catalyst for the completion of a network of integrated cycleways and greenways across the county.

"We have seen the success of greenway projects across Ireland, and the economic, social and tourism benefits they bring to local businesses, towns and villages. This project will breathe new life into communities along the route, and this is due, in large part, to the hard

work, time and effort of many local people and groups.

"With planning permission in place, I hope to see development beginning on the greenway as soon as possible. Funding is now vitally needed to allow the project to develop at speed and I will continue to advocate for financial


support in order to see this project through to the very end.



There is a huge sense of happiness, hope and optimism throughout the community.",

DAPT Kerry, Women's Refuge and Support Services based in Tralee featured on RTE Investigates programme - DOMESTIC ABUSE - A YEAR IN CRISIS which was aired on Monday night.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, Catherine Casey, General Manager, ADAPT Kerry CLG said they are most

thankful to the RTE Investigation team for bringing the stark reality of surviving domestic abuse to households across the country.

"We are of course very conscious that the document will resonate differently for those living in safe homes to those living in, or concerned about someone, living in abusive relationships", Catherine said.

"We are extremely grateful to the survivors who bore witness to their own pain and suffering, and are in awe of both their resilience and

generosity in paying-forward their experience for the benefit of others", Catherine added,

"We commend the incredible work of all the frontline refuge and support services staff across Ireland and their voluntary Board of Directors, whose mission never faltered. They responded rapidly within hours of the Covid Lockdown announcement; immediately anticipated the increased threat to the safety of women and children; and developed and deployed a crisis contingency plan within days. We didn't want to be right, but what followed in our case was a fourfold increase in calls. In the ensuing months we kept going with a lot of nerve, and the generosity of the public at large", she said.

On the content of the documentary

It captured the essence of coercive control and physical assault; the strain on under-resourced frontline responders; and the abject impotency of the judicial system to hold perpetrators to account.

We imagine however that the public will be shocked to realise the pressure that services are operating under and the need for priority to be given by the State to ensure women and children are protected and services are resourced to respond.

"We thank RTE for its public service in the creation of this RTE Investigates production, and look forward to future collaborations in building awareness of violence against women and girls", she concluded.

LEAVING CERT CERTAINTY AND REDUCTION IN CAO APPLICATIONS IS

GOOD NEWS FOR EXAM CANDIDATES



There was welcome relieve last week for exam candidates with a reduction in CAO applications and clarity on the format of the 2022 Leaving Cert exam.

Minister Norma Foley announced on Tuesday, 1st February, that the hybrid Leaving Cert won't be available this year. Instead, a written exam will be provided for all candidates in June. In 2020, the traditional Leaving Cert exam was replaced by calculated grades. Last year, candidates were given a choice between written exams or accredited grades or a hybrid mixture of both assessment methods.

The State Examinations Commission (SEC) was adamant that it could not replicate last year's accredited grades system because 25% of the candidates don't have Junior Cycle exam results, which are included in the statistical instrument of accreditation (algorithm). In addition, the Department of Education was determined to avoid a repeat of the grades inflation of last year, which led to an unprecedented level of competition, depriving some of the highest achieving applicants of their first choice in the CAO college application system.

This year's Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle will be held as exams only. Leaving Cert candidates will be given extra choice on exam papers, they will have to answer fewer questions and they are guaranteed that their results will be no lower than 2021. Leaving cert results in 2022 will be adjusted to match last year's. The latter commitment means that this year's Leaving Cert candidates will notch up an average of at least 60 CAO points more than they would have achieved had they sat the exam in 2019. It also addresses a key concern of the 2022 Leaving Cert Class about competing for college courses with candidates who benefitted from grades inflation in 2020 and 2021.

The adjustments to Leaving Cert exam papers this year will be the same as those that were

made last year. The significant changes to Leaving Cert assessments, across papers and other assessment components are aimed at lessening the work load for candidates. The Junior Cycle exams will also take place for the first time since 2019. An alternative set of Leaving Cert exams will be held following the main set of exams, to provide for students who may experience a close family bereavement, Covid-19 illness and certain other categories of serious illness, during the first exam period. The timetable for the written Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle exams is expected to be published by the SEC shortly and arrangements for Leaving Certificate orals and practical music exams are already in place.

Leaving Cert candidates will now have a very wide choice in the Leaving Cert written exams. Changes have also been made to Junior Cycle requirements, among them a reduction in the number of classroom-based assessments from two to one. Students can use 2021 exam papers as a guide and full details of 2022 subject syllabi and the question paper format will be published by the SEC.

Meanwhile, early CAO figures indicate that the rush to college may be levelling off. By early application deadline of 20th January, CAO had received 65,535 applications, down 922 from the 66,457, who had applied by the same date last year. By normal closing date of 1st February, 78,162 applications had been lodged with the CAO, down 1,141 from the 79,303 who had applied by the same time last year. With the addition of late applications to CAO, the number of applicants in 2021 eventually increased to a record 84,526 applications. With the economy beginning to boom it's quite possible that more Leaving Cert candidates are looking seriously at the jobs market, apprenticeships, traineeships and further education as an alternative to the CAO route. All will be revealed when the final number of CAO applications is released later in the year. After an uncertain January, Spring has heralded in good news for anxious exam candidates. 

CALL FOR LYME **DISEASE TESTING FACILITY** IN KERRY

A Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor has said that due to the prevalence of Lyme disease in the county, it is imperative that the Department of Health set up a facility to test for the disease locally.

Councillor Michael Cahill has been calling for action for a number of years now including for a dedicated Lyme Disease Unit to be provided at University Hospital Kerry and for the appointment of a Consultant in Infectious Diseases.

"This is badly needed particularly if one takes into consideration that we have the National Park in Killarney with a large number of deer there, who it is believed are the main carrier

"At present, tests for Lyme disease take place in Germany, which is proving both time consuming and expensive for people with suspected cases" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Time is of the essence in the diagnosis and of the ticks that spread this disease" said the treatment of Lyme disease so that a dedicated

Unit locally would be a major advantage in the fight against this horribly debilitating illness. Lyme disease is relatively rare in Ireland, but because of our large population of deer in Kerry, cases here are more frequent and therefore it makes sense that UHK would be the perfect location for a dedicated Lyme Disease Unit" added Councillor Cahill.

UP TO €25,000 FOR TAXI DRIVERS TO BUY ELECTRIC VEHICLES

Transport Minister Eamon Ryan has announced the re-opening of the very successful electric vehicle taxi scheme, with €15 million allocated by the Department of Transport in 2022. The grants will enable owners of small public service vehicles (SPSV), such as taxis and hackneys, to buy electric vehicles (EVs).

SPSV drivers can apply for grants of up to €10,000 towards the purchase of a new, full-battery eSPSV, with a further €2,500 available to convert it to a wheelchairaccessible model.

Taxi drivers are eligible for double the normal grant when they scrap an older, more polluting or high mileage vehicle and make the switch to electric. By scrapping and switching €20,000 will be available for a new, fully electric SPSV and if the taxi is a wheelchairaccessible electric vehicle, the supports rise to €25,000.

Open Letter from the Rose of Tralee International Festival

Some misinformation has crept into the local public discourse, particularly online, in relation to our plans for Festival 2022. We want to politely intervene to reassure local people, and our Rose family further afield, that the Festival is blooming anew after a two-year hiatus, and we have very exciting plans for the 2022 event.

Our plans for the 2022 Rose of Tralee International Festival include all the events that traditionally take place in town, the lights, parades, fireworks, family entertainment, street performances and much more.

They also include, moving the dome, be it on a slightly smaller scale of 1000 square metres(!), to a site in the centre of town, for five nights of concerts and festivity. This is a very exciting development that will facilitate thousands of revellers by night, and children and families during the day. That guarantees an exciting weatherproof experience, and it will bring the Festival back to the heart of the community in Tralee. We made a decision in 2019/2020 to find an alternative to the Dome, which was costing us almost €250,000 annually. That financial burden was creating unsustainable pressure for the Festival, whilst swelling the coffers of suppliers from outside the county. That discussion was welcomed by our key partners, RTÉ, the Rose Hotel, and Kerry County Council along with the I.T.T. at the time, and we agreed that we would relocate to the brand new two thousand square metre Kerry Sports Academy facility just built by the I.T.T.. Those discussions were ongoing when Covid closed us all down.

That decision is now even more compelling, as during Covid the I.T.T. and their Cork counterparts have established the MTU, which is such a positive development for Kerry and for Tralee. We are now a university town! We have reengaged with the new entity, the MTU, and whereas our discussions are not concluded and are at a sensitive stage, we are confident that both parties can bring them to a successful conclusion.

In that event, we look forward to shouting from the rooftops during five hours of live TV in 2022, that the Rose of Tralee International Festival is coming from the newly formed Munster Technological University, allowing us to create a magical experience at this exciting venue for all the patrons who attend the Rose Ball and our Selection Nights!

We are also exploring some major opportunities to bring the crowds back to our Festival in Tralee during 2022, on a very big scale. Those plans are in the early stages, and we will not make any further comment on them for the time being.

We are so excited to have formed a new partnership with the local, four-star, family run, Meadowlands Hotel. Whereas the popular Johnny Franks bar will continue to cater for the food and beverage requirements of regular customers, albeit with a Rosey tint added to their normal experience, the exclusive use of all the other facilities in the hotel will allow the Roses, RTÉ, our judges and our Rose team some quiet retreat. We will have the opportunity to plan, rest, and recuperate in that enchanting oasis on the Oakpark road.

We have enjoyed thirteen years on the Fels Point site, with four Hotel Groups, including the Rose Hotel for the past four Festivals. Sadly, the commercial arrangements offered by the Rose Hotel were no longer viable for the Festival. We leave as friends, with great memories, and look forward to a wonderful experience in the four-star Meadowlands Hotel. Finally, we are launching our Festival in Dublin on Friday next, the 11th of February. It is a very exciting time for us and whereas we have many challenges ahead, we are quietly engaging with business and civic authorities around the town and county to make sure that our long-anticipated return will be a huge success for everyone who has anticipated the August festivities, and something truly worth waiting





Have regular sight tests

>UPDATE FROM THE DIOCESAN COVID COMMITTEE

While it is a matter for each Parish to decide on how it wishes to proceed, we would advise that Parishes proceed with care and caution being mindful that there will still be people who will be nervous about returning to Mass and public worship. We recommend the following:-

- Public Health Signage should continue to be displayed at entrances to churches.
- Hand sanitisers with an alcohol based rub should continue to be provided at church entry and exit points.
- we recommend that a face mask or covering continue to be worn by all those attending our churches. This
- recommendation will be reviewed at the end of February.
- Collection baskets may be used but again allow a lead in time for their reintroduction and let people know
- in advance when the baskets will be returning to use.

- We do not recommend at the present time the shaking of hands for the sign of peace. Use alternatives,
- such as a nod, an acknowledgement or a gesture.
- Priests and Ministers of the Eucharist should continue to follow existing protective measures, such as the
- wearing of face masks or coverings for the distribution of Holy Communion and sanitise their hands before
- and after. Holy Communion should continue to be received in the hand and not on the tongue for now.
- Choirs and folk groups may return.
- Altar servers may return to ministry. Rathmore Parish will review this situation at the end of
- February and only resume the ministry when restrictions at school ease.
- The return to the use of Holy Water fonts should be phased in gradually and our recommendation is to wait
- until the end of February when it is expected that there will be a further easing or perhaps removal of the
- remaining public health measures.
- People may offer their sympathies to be eaved families within the church, but we would recommend that
- at the present time that this be done by way of an acknowledgement, or gesture rather than a handshake.
- Subject to the above recommendations, churches should no longer have seats or pews, or sections cordoned off or

kneelers tied up. Churches and religious services can now return to how they operated pre the pandemic but as advised, please proceed with care and caution.

MARKER LAID DOWN, BUT QUESTIONS REMAIN

National Football League: Kerry Dublin It might sit uncomfortably with Kerry people, but the Dublin team of recent vintage are undeniably the greatest team to ever play the game. But the general consensus is that they are on the wane, and the evidence against Armagh two weeks ago and in Austin Stack Park last Saturday would seem to bear that out. Certainly, this was a bg win for Kerry, a big marker laid down for the summer.

Frankly, the Kerry players were in more danger of hypothermia than the Dublin attack for much of this game. Conditions were absolutely brutal, howling wind and lashing cold rain. Both sides, Kerry in particular, deserve credit for the positive football that they served up on the night. As do the loyal supporters on both sides; I like the Dublin banter.

There are caveats here. Dublin haven't shown their full hand at all yet, and I'd be very careful writing obituaries about a team that lost just one championship game (I refuse to count O'Byrne Cups) in years, and that after coughing up a ten point lead to lose by one. That animal may be wounded, but it's still very dangerous...

let us please remember the difference in Tyrone in League and Championship last year.

A foul on David Clifford saw Seán O'Shea coolly slot over – Seán was rejuvenated once back in his usual berth on the forty. Dean Rock replied in kind but Paudie Clifford, once again an awesome whirlwind of action out around the forty, put Kerry back in front after scything through the defence. Dublin were going sideways a lot of the time; Kerry were far more direct, and it paid dividends. Sean O'Shea pointed from play. Niall Scully – Dublin's most combative player along with Davy Byrne, and I admired him for it – hit the post before Evan Comerford kicked a good free.

The biggest thing for Kerry from last week was Kerry's midfield. Diarmuid O'Connor kicked a great point, he was unanimously man of the match, while I have to say that I thought Jack Barry and Adrian Spillane put in hugely selfless shifts and did an amount of unseen work. Brian Fenton couldn't get going in a midfield dominated by the green and gold – he didn't get lot of help either. He did set up Dean Rock to make it 0-4 to 0-3. We were much the better side in play, but it wasn't showing on the scoreboard just yet. David Clifford kicked a beauty but Seánie Bugler replied.

The Clifford brothers combined for Paudie to win a penalty, but David's shot skinned just

wide. However, an unruffled David followed up with one of those points that no-one else would really consider attempting.

Then we got a real let-off. Make no mistake we were very, very lucky. I still say that Dean Rock was trying to take his point, but his shot came down off the crossbar and bounced to the net off Shane Murphy's shoulder. One of those freak accidents, it certainly doesn't worry me. But referee Conor Lane had spotted a foul in the build-up and called it back to dish out a black card on Niall Scully for impeding Dan O'Donoghue (who had another fine outing and must be in pole position for a championship jersey). He actually had the wrong man, it should have been Seánie McMahon, but nonetheless the goal was chalked off.

Down a man, Dublin collapsed entirely. The second quarter saw Kerry effectively run riot, clocking up a whopping 1-8 without reply. Dublin were admittedly very poor (you would have to question their lack of leaders on the field) but that doesn't take away from the scintillating football of Kerry.Seán O'Shea notched two in a row (1f). Kerry had another let off when Lorcan O'Dell somehow overcooked a simple pass to Dean Rock with the goal at his mercy. Normal service quickly resumed, with Dara Moynihan, Paul Geaney (mark), and a David Clifford brace putting Kerry 0-12 to 0-4





ahead. Seán O'Shea kicked another free.

Then came the Kerry goal, and again we had a strong touch of luck. Kerry were awarded a lineball (I couldn't see it at the time (frankly, I was like a frozen duck) but it looked on television afterwards like Diarmuid O'Connor had actually touched it out. However, it was deemed a Kerry ball, Diarmuid swung it to David Clifford, who seamlessly turned and laid off to the inrushing Dara Moynihan. Beautiful football, and his blistering strike was worthy of it. A genuine Goal of the Year contender.

Paul Geaney closed out the first half scoring with Kerry ahead by 1-14 to 0-4. We lost Jack Barry to black card, but you couldn't imagine a Dublin comeback at that stage anyway.

I don't know what malaise infected Kerry in the second half - complacency is a possibility. It wasn't that Kerry rang early changes. I actually thought that we were slow to run our bench, I'd have been resting the Sigerson players and getting minutes into the likes of Crowley, Spillane, Burns, and Brosnan. Dublin brought on their subs much sooner - they had to in the circumstances. That said, I was really annoyed at this crack with making four changes to the nmed team and having players wearing the wrong numbers. Dublin's standards are higher than that - or used to be, anyway. I was very unimpressed when both Kerry and Dublin refused to name their subs before games, I felt that Croke Park should have called them out on it. This is even worse in my opinion.

Dublin owned the second half and did eat into that gap. Mind you, we let them do it,. Ciarán Kilkenny kicked his first point of the day but Paul Geaney replied. Astonishingly, it was to be Kerry's last score. Brian Howard, Fenton, Ryan Basquel, and three frees from Dean Rock meant that Dublin were able to restore semblance of respectability. I do feel sorry for Dessie Farrell, having lifted the poisoned chalice of taking over from Jim Gavin. It reminds me of Kerry after Mick O'Dwyer or Manchester United after Alex Ferguson. But that sort of shenanigans is disrespectful to the jersey. Not my business, I suppose.

Three things still hugely concern me. We all know that wasn't the real Dublin - throw the likes of James McCarthy and Con O'Callaghan into that mix and you're looking at a very different animal. I don't like how we took our foot off the throttle - think of the amount of games in recent years that we lost late on to Dublin. Such things become a habit. Thirdly and my biggest worry - is that on a day when we totally dominated, we still coughed up three good goal chances to Dublin (the disallowed goal, the bad pass from O'Dell, and the save by Shane Murphy). It was a good day for Kerry, no question about that, and it's important to appreciate these things. But let's not be cracking open any bottles of champagne. A lot done....there's plenty more to do.



easily have won it; that's the plain truth.

Then came the semi-final against Bandon. The schools played each other in the Frewen two years ago and the Sem won, but got a real battle. This time out, though, it looked home and hosed by half-time. Bandon were profligate under defensive pressure while the Sem, especially goalscorer Cian McMahon and Will Shine, were scintillating. They led by 1-9 to 0-3. In all honesty, you should be able to close a game out at this level with that kind of lead. The Sem, however, just couldn't seem to fire their engines in the second half and Bandon came all the way back at them, helped by three goals. Now, much of the focus has been on the Sem's malaise, but I feel that Bandon aren't getting anything like enough credit. They were superb when they finally got going.

The game actually went to extra-time – and the Sem could thank a majestic point by John Kelliher late on for getting it that far. They had the legs to win it in extra-time, but there's a hard lesson to be learned from that second half. Nothing less than sixty minutes plus of full concentration will do against their old rivals.

Focus on Tralee CBS

They are the reigning champions from 2020. Not only that, but I and others firmly believe that they would have been strong favourites for the Hogan had the competition been able to continue. They still have three starters from that day. Armin Heinrich and Conor Horan are still the starting midfield. Both are big men, and that sometimes glosses over the fact that these are superb footballers long with it. Jordan Kissane was injured at the start of the year but is still Tralee;'s top scorer. I remember him running the length of the field to score a cracking goal against the Sem in a Moran Cup Final at just fourteen years of age; this guy is the real deal.

Tralee, to be blunt about it, have walloped everyone they came up against. A young Corca Dhuibhne side were easily dismissed in the O'Sullivan Cup quarter-final. Sliah Luachra put up a decent battle but Tralee's greater firepower meant they had room to spare in the semi-final. They actually got a very good battle against that Coláiste an Sceilge side in the final (na Sceilge's first year back after a five year absence from the A grade). A feature of Tralee's games is that they tend to power into a game and usually finish stronger than they started. They beat Killorglin comfortably (your heart would go out to Killorglin, being drawn right at the start against the two competition favourites). Clonakilty Were able to stay with them at the start when Tralee got a bye straight into the quarter-final, but Tralee were able to burn them off with a lot to spare. Skibbereen gave them an even better battle for forty minutes but again, Tralee had a lot to spare in the finish.

Tralee also have a fairly legitimate grievance to fuel their tanks. Under the reciprocal agreement between the schools, the game should by rights have been fixed for Austin Stack Park. Instead, it is on in the Fitzgerald Stadium this Saturday because Tralee is booked. A small thing, but games are won and lost on a multiplicity of small things.

The Sem certainly can win this, especially if

that triangle of playmaker Cian Foley to sharpshooters McMahon and Shine works. However, Tralee are slightly bigger in key areas and proven goalscorers; it will take everything the Sem have, for every single second, to come out of this one.

A brilliant start to our campaign. Like Kerry versus Dublin, though, there are real caveats. Wales were missing an awful lot of players; Ireland more or less had the run of the pitch and honestly, they really should be winning games like this by a lot more. Right from the start, a lovely chip pass by Johnny Sexton saw debutant and man of the match Mack Hansen from Australia bomb down the wing and Ireland neatly carved Wales open for Bundee Aki to finish easily. Wales had no answer to the pace of Hansen or Conway, or the formidable power of the likes of Beirne, Furlong, and Conan. Johnny kicked a good conversion but missed two penalties; I'm not sure people are giving due consideration to the swirling breeze. He did put over the next, albeit from a simple angle. 10-0 at half-time.

Andrew Conway did really well to get over in the corner on the restart and Johnny curled the conversion over. Josh Adams got a yellow for shoulder charging Sexton – look, it was an intentional and cynical foul, but he wasn't going for the head. It wasn't the major crime that commentators subsequently made it out to be.

LEONA MAGUIRE

Leona Maguire has been an Irish phenomenon ever since herself and her twin Lisa began lighting up the fairways as young teenagers. Now she can legitimately be called a world phenomenon. She has been having the best year of her award-laden career, but she took it a step further by becoming the first woman to win on the LGPA Tour in Fort Myers, Florida. Leona, who starred on her Solheim Cup debut last year, earned €196,000 for the win (the money for the women isn't even comparable to the mens' game, sadly). She has also risen to 20th from 37th in the world rankings.

Seamus Power, meanwhile, had his third top finish of the season. He finished ninth in the Pebble Beach Pro-Am, which actually saw him leapfrog Shane Lowry to a world ranking of 46th, two places ahead of the Offaly man.

FISTS OF FURY

The boxing world nowadays is all about the big upcoming fight. Not Tyson Fury versus Dillian whyte – I have literally no interest. First of all, negotiations dragged on much, much too long. The hype is already vastly overblown. Is there anyone out there who really believes that Dillian Whyte has a chance against the man

who took down Anthony Joshua? I consider Fury, whether you love him or hate him (some of the stuff he has said in the past has been despicable, but I believe he was playing it up for hype and has learnt), I don't think there is anyone out there who can take Fury the distance when he is fully focussed. I consider Joshua to be the second best heavyweight boxer out there; he lost focus against Usyk.

Incidentally, I consider Canelo easily the best pound for pound fighter in the world. I saw that Joe Calzaghe recently said that he would have liked to fight him if they were both in their prime. You were a true great, Joe, but no you wouldn't. This guy is different gravy.

No. I'm talking about Katie Taylor versus Amanda Serrano. Womens' boxing has come an awful long way in a short space of time, and this pair are the biggest reasons why. Both are phenomenal. Taylor is quite rightly the nation's darling, a class act outside and inside the ring. She has great heart, all the technical skills, and her hand speed is phenomenal. But she's giving weight here and Serrano is a deadly puncher. Noine world titles across seven weight divisions. 44 fights, 1 draw, and one loss by decision. 30 knockouts. I won't be in Madison Square Garden, but I'd love to be. An unstoppable force is about to meet an immovable object. Fury versus Whyte? Meh.

ATHLETICS

There could be some very good days ahead for Irtish athletics. I know, we've all said that before, all too frequently. Athletics is the hardest, most contested of all sports. World class really does mean literally that, and we have very few who really shook up athletics beyond our own shores. But consider this. Rhadisat Abekele smashed both the 200m and 60m Irish Indoor records last weekend in Albuquerque. The 60m record had only been set a week before by Molly Scott, who then went on to win the 60m gold in the Czech Indoor Gala in Ostrava. Sarah Healy and Nadia Power both lined up the 1500m final, with Healy placing third in a new Irish U23 record of 4'11", Power finishing just two places behind here.

Andrew Coscoran won the Indoor Grand Prix in New York, one of the world's most prestigious mile races, in 3.53.64. Luke McCann was just a fifth of a second and two places behind him.

I think there is a creditable argument to be made that Irish people are inheriting the legacy of the likes of John Treacy and Sonia O'Sullivan and realising the lifestyle benfits in athletics and, more importantly, transmitting it to their children. It's early days, I may be adding two and two to get ten, but I foresee good days ahead.

Your guide to the National Retrofitting Scheme

GOVERNMENT LAUNCHES THE **NATIONAL** RETROFITTING **SCHEME**

The government has approved a package of supports to make it easier and more affordable for homeowners to undertake home energy upgrades, for warmer, healthier and more comfortable homes, with lower energy bills. The measures address barriers to undertaking energy upgrades (retrofits) reported by homeowners and those working in the industry. They also reflect the step-change needed in pace and scale of delivery - to achieve our target of 500,000 home energy upgrades, to B2 Building Energy Rating (BER) standard, by 2030. The changes represent an important step in delivery of the National Retrofit Plan, which identifies a range of measures aimed at driving demand for retrofit, expanding the size and capacity of the supply chain, as well as making retrofits more affordable.

The key measures include:

A new National Home Energy Upgrade Scheme providing increased grant levels of up to 50% of the cost of a typical deep retrofit to a B2 BER standard (up from 30%-35% grants currently) One Stop Shops to offer a hassle-free, start-tofinish project management service, including access to financing, for home energy upgrades A significant increase in the number of free energy upgrades for those at risk of energy poverty (400 per month - up from an average of 177 per month in 2021)

A special enhanced grant rate, equivalent to 80% of the typical cost, for attic and cavity wall insulation for all households, to urgently reduce energy use as part of the government's response to current exceptionally high energy prices

An Exchequer investment of €8 billion to 2030 will enable the supply chain to scale up, creating thousands of high quality jobs and delivering on this critical national objective

The Schemes will be administered by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI). The increased grant supports and the significant ramping up of free energy upgrades for those at risk of energy poverty is supported by ring-fenced funds from the carbon tax.

The main features of the announcement are as follows:


New Home Energy Upgrade Scheme

The new National Home Energy Upgrade Scheme offers increased grant levels of up to 50% of the cost of a typical B2 home energy upgrade with a heat pump (up from the current level of 30-35%). The scheme introduces a hassle free way to undertake home energy

with upgrades One-Stop-Shops providing an end-to-end service for homeowners. This includes surveying the home; designing the upgrades; managing the grant process; helping with access to finance; engaging contractors to deliver the work; and quality assuring work.

Homes owned homeowners, private non-corporate landlords and Approved Housing Bodies are eligible for the scheme. This provides unprecedented opportunity for people all over Ireland to upgrade to a warmer,

healthier and more comfortable home, with lower energy bills.



Grant supports (under the Better Energy Homes Scheme) for homeowners that want to take a step-by-step approach to upgrading their homes have also been significantly increased. For instance, the grant for heat pumps has increased from €3,500 to €6,500 and the rate for external wall insulation has increased from €6,000 to €8,000 for a detached house. These figures specifically relate to grant amounts for this step-by-step approach.

The full list of measures and grants.

Free home energy upgrade: Protecting people at most risk of energy poverty

The Warmer Homes Scheme offers free energy upgrades for eligible homeowners who are most at risk of energy poverty. Since 2000, over 143,000 free upgrades have been supported by the scheme.

A budget allocation of €109 million has been provided for this scheme this year. This will support an increase in the number of free home upgrades, from an average of 177 per month in 2021 to 400 per month this year, helping to reduce waiting times. The scheme will also target the worst performing properties, by prioritising homes that were built and occupied before 1993 and have a pre-works BER of E, F or G. Existing applications will not be affected by this change. For the first time, applications will be accepted from qualifying homeowners who previously received supports under the scheme, but who could still benefit from even deeper measures. The scheme eligibility criteria will also be extended to include those in receipt of the Disability Allowance for over 6 months and have a child under 7 years.

Grants, equivalent to 80% of the typical



cost, for attic and cavity wall insulation

Grants for cavity wall and attic insulation will more than triple, as part of the government's response to the current exceptionally high energy prices. For instance, in the case of a semi-detached home, the attic insulation grant will increase from €400 to €1,300 and the cavity wall insulation grant will increase from €400 to €1,200. These are highly cost-effective upgrade measures that can be deployed rapidly and at scale this year. It is expected that these works will pay back in 1-2 years in most houses.

The new grant rates will cover approximately 80% of the typical cost of these measures and will be available to all homeowners.

Community schemes: Improving buildings across the country

Under the Community Energy Grant Scheme, grants are available for public, commercial and community buildings. These include buildings within housing associations and local authorities; rental properties; and buildings belonging to public sector organisations. The total budget for this scheme will be €43 million in 2022 (of which approximately €15 million will relate to home retrofits). Grants of up to 80% are available under this scheme - for private, energy-poor homeowners.

In addition, €85 million funding has been provided by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage for the Local Authority Energy Efficiency Retrofit Programme. This investment is targeted to deliver 2,400 B2 (or equivalent cost optimal) upgrades this year.

Of the total government retrofit budget of €352 million, €203 million (58%) will be spent on dedicated energy poverty schemes and local authority retrofits.
















FOCUS ON TREES

Trees are beautiful in any garden and their long life makes them a wonderful garden feature. A tree should be the first think you plant in your garden after the hedging — they can be underplanted afterwards with bulbs and shrubs.



Trees are interesting in all four seasons with attractive unfolding of leaves in spring, full foliage in summer, good Autumn colour followed decorative bark in the Winter. The first and most important think you need to know when buying a tree is what's the height and spread going to be when it is mature. There are many varieties of trees to choose from and there is a tree suitable for most areas.

Trees can be planted all year round but as with hedging, trees can be planted when they are dormant between November and March.

With these bare-rooted trees you will still have a few weeks left to plant them. If you plant before the end of March it will give the tree a better chance of rooting into the ground that bit quicker. When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough that you can spreads out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly place your tree ties on — one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.






Welcome back dear student, when going through times of difficulty the hardest thing can be to have hope for the future. Sometimes things can be so dark it can feel like it's easier to give up. Matthew quoted the prophet Isaiah when relating the beginning of Jesus' ministry "the people who sat in darkness have seen a great Light. And for those who lived in the land where death casts its shadow, a Light has shined" (Matthew 4:16). Jesus had Himself come out of a difficult wilderness season where He endured trials as the devil tried to rock His identity and purpose when He was tired and weak. But God strengthened Him as Jesus proclaimed the Word against the onslaught of the enemy's lies (Matthew 4:1-11). And God is no respecter of persons (Acts 10:34). He also has NO favourites, and His favour cannot be bought, but rather is given as a gift to those who love Him by putting their trust in Him (Deuteronomy 10:17; Romans 2:11; Psalm 30:5; Psalm 5:12). God makes it clear that He watches over His Word to perform it, so that it does not return void without accomplishing that for which He sent it (Jeremiah 1:12; Isaiah 55:10-11).


Therefore friend, if Jesus had to stand in faith against the devil's attacks what makes us think that we can sail through life without encountering darkness? This is where our faith kicks in - so that even in times of turmoil when all seems hopeless, we will see God's hand of deliverance (Psalm 27:13-14; Psalm 34:7-9). Whatever we have faith in will bear fruit; so - if we have faith in, and trust God, we will see His hand upon us as He brings us out the other side of adversity. But, if all one ponders upon are the negatives in people or in any situation, negativity is the result that that one will get.

God's Kingdom is founded upon the principle of seedtime and harvest. He warns "do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap" (Galatians 6:7 ESV). The New Living Translation puts it this way "you will always harvest what you plant". When we sow faith in obedience to God's Word, we will reap a harvest of blessing. You may say how do I sow faith? Well, how does any gardener sow seeds? He or she plants them in good soil, waters and feeds them, gives sunlight and heat, and the seedling brings forth a plant that grows and bears fruit. Our faith is exactly the same. Jesus said if you have faith the size of a mustard seed (which is a really tiny seed) then you can command whatever mountain of impossibility is in your life to move, and that faith you release will cause that mountain to go, and nothing will be impossible for you (Matthew 17:20). Faith attracts God's Presence. You may worry that you don't have enough faith in Him, but we all have been given a measure of faith (Romans 12:3). Even a very simple prayer invites God into your situation no matter how dark. Pray: Dear Lord Jesus please forgive me of my sins. Come into my life as Lord and bring Your Light and Love to heal me, amen.
