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

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Baby Grace's Family APPEAL FOR HELP

The family of a new baby girl, who was born with the help of surrogancy in Cyrpus have issued a heartfelt plea for help in their hour of need. Baby Grace Maria O'Sullivan was born prematurely at 33 weeks on Monday, March 24, 2025. Baby Grace arrived into the world facing complex medical issues, including duodenal atresia and heart defects.

Her devoted parents, Padraig O'Sullivan and Julett Culloty with the dream of becoming parents, began their journey with the help of surrogacy in Cyprus. They have remained by her side in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit since her birth. At just four days old, Grace underwent emergency surgery for duodenal atresia and she is currently on a ventilator recoverying from this procedure. Baby Grace will require further surgery to address her critical heart condition.

Despite these overwhelming circumstances, the couple has been deeply touched by the outpouring of love, support, and prayers from around the world. The messages, mass cards, and warm wishes have offered immense comfort in the most difficult of times.

To help Grace receive the lifesaving care she needs and to support her parents with the significant costs of her treatment and their temporary relocation to Cyprus, The Baby Grace Fund has been established. This fund will directly contribute to her emergency medical interventions and the substantial expenses her family now faces.

The fund was set up by the couple's extended family and friends, who humbly ask for any contributions that can be made—no matter how small. Every donation brings hope, healing, and support to Grace and her loving parents during this incredibly challenging journey.

"We are deeply grateful for all your help, prayers, and kind wishes - thank you from the bottom of our hearts", Kieran Culloty, Julett's brother told Killarney Outlook.

"Paidi and Julett are completely overwhelmed with the support that they have received and want to say thank you to everyone", Kieran added.


"My heart goes out to all those affected by the tragedy, including the driver of the tractor", Cllr. Grady said on the passing of such a young man with everything to live for.


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Wander Wild Festival




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Walf to Remember Vivien and Sheila

RECLAIM THE GREEN AREAS FOR CHILDREN

Whole streets in some parts of Dublin and it seems Waterford are being cordoned off to allow children to play together on the street and in their green areas near their homes, as neighbours get together to keep cars away, even for limited periods.

Here the Woodlawn Park Association is being revitalised with a new generation. One of the top concerns is to allow children to play safely on their wonderful green and come and go from their surrounding homes. Traffic during after school play time particularly from learner drivers and driving schools is a real concern in Woodlawn.

Car ownership along with the population in Ireland has spiralled and every second person now has a car.

In 1985, there were just over 700,000 cars for 3,500,000 million people or roughly one private car for every five people in the country. Now, there are close to 2.5 million cars for five million people.

We all had to learn the three-point turns, the reversing and parallel parking but surely there has to be consideration for others.

One of the proposals being looked at in Woodlawn is an appeal to learner drivers and their teachers to practice while children are at school. And to keep out of the estates during play time.

It is very difficult to block streets or even small estate roads; all sorts of permits are required even for brief closures. Both Fingal and Waterford councils are looking at ways



to simplify the process. In north Dublin where the streets play initiative has been introduced, parents have put up traffic cones and used chalk to block off their streets - on their own initiative. But there is no obligation on motorists to obey.

No one envisaged so many cars would be on our roads and the cars are getting so big too it is difficult even for adults to see around them. Asking learner drivers and their instructors to confine their practice to the times children are at school - say up until 2 pm - seems reasonable. It might make a motion for a council meeting? Woodlawn is leading the way, but Dromhall, Cahernane and Kings Court, along with the Park Road, and other estates are also practice areas. A bylaw might be considered.

WE ARE ALL FOR THE BIRDS

A bronze eagle has landed - a monument on Tomies walkway has just been erected - to mark the successful reintroduction of the white-tailed eagle, the biggest bird of prey in the country.

It's all about birds these days. The cuckoo will

already been recorded in Knocknagoshel and the British Tracking system will doubtless follow the national park and Muckross Cuckoos.

Ed Carty the ornithologist who has been counting the Hoopoes in people's lawns - the fantastic looking orange bird with an Indian style headdress which drifted here from Africa - said the fine weather is bringing migratory birds early.

Hoopoes are not usually here in such numbers but the wind from the Sahara has brought them further than their usual Iberian and French landing spots.

Tralee based Ed does not think the hoopoes with their distinctive call will breed here, but they may well visit again. They like short grass such as cut lawns, meadows and golf courses.

Meanwhile the bronze eagle being erected on Tomies is an old object, is my understanding. It is being erected to mark "the very positive impact the eagle programme has had on wildlife issues" a source said. And it all began on Tomies in 2007 when the eagles safely landed at Farranfore and were brought to their hideout near the lake.

WHAT WILL STOP THE WILDFIRES?

We raise this a lot because it is a serious issue. A few years ago then Garda Supt Flor McCarthy, county manger Moira Murrell, leaders in the farmers and the NPWS and Fire Service got behind an inter-agency programme to bring the out of season burning under control. It seemed to have worked for a year or two.

But once again, a fortune is being spent by the NPWS now on fire spotting and by both this and the council on fire fighting. Helicopter patrols are daily. Even so, further fires have erupted in and around the park in the last week. Barbecues are believed to be the cause of the Five Mile Bridge fire, but the usual setting alight for no apparent purpose is also obvious. We need to revitalise the fire forum as we shall call it. Fire is frightening. My children were terrified when they were young of the annual burns which sometimes confined us to our house and ruined many a good day of fine April and May weather.

Some of the fires in recent weeks have threatened houses.

If we can't consider the landscape, or wildlife, then how about thinking of the terrified children?

But also we need prosecutions. People should be nabbed and prosecuted

An international wildfire conference last year in Tralee heard how we had "a flammable landscape". Regional Inspector with the Forest Service Ciaran Nugent said this week after call outs to numerous fires in Killarney, south and north Kerry, there was a build up now of vegetation. Ireland had practically no wildfires last year and low levels the previous year which meant there was a stack of vegetation.

It was also the case that the major fires in Kerry this year were on bogs and turf cutting areas in Kilcummin near Killarney as well as in north

Other fires in Mourne, the boardwalk in Mayo and in areas of Donegal were alongside roads and such and the suspicion was these were set alight deliberately and maliciously.

There was no alternative now but to manage the land bearing in mind that drought and dry periods would occur - so vegetation could not build up perhaps with strictly controlled burning under the NPWS and the Fire Service.


Monumental importance to acknowledge successful White-tailed Eagle Project

t is time to celebrate the success of the White-tailed Eagle project, and acknowledge the incredible work by National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS). This week NPWS Staff with Stone Mason Simon Mangan, are installing and rendering the final touches to a new monument, dedicated to the successful Re-Introduction programme of the White-tailed Eagle. The installation monument is situated in Tomies Mountain, (on the high path) in Killarney National Park.

In 2007 the first 20 White-tailed Eagles were brought to Killarney from Norway. Over the past 27 years - its second and most successful phase, Divisional Manager, NPWS, Eamonn Meskell is project lead, the White-tailed Eagles are once again soaring over Ireland. Killarney National Park will have at least 2 chicks fledging later this year.

The eagles are successfully breeding, with ideal locations and environments chosen across Ireland. Once native, the White-tailed Eagle became extinct in the nineteenth century, they play an important part in protecting our biodiversity. National Parks and Wildlife Service staff have been working closely with its International partners in Norway, landowners and communities. Since 2007 Tomies Mountain has proved to be a very safe and sheltered location. When the birds arrive in Ireland, they are cared for in secure locations by Conservation Rangers and NPWS Staff members until they are ready to be released.

SHOWCASES UNIQUE HISTORY AND HERITAGE OF MILLTOWN

6,000 years of local history told through the lens of the local landscape

A new film which showcases the spectacular and unique history and heritage of the Milltown area is to be launched at the end of April. 'Milltown: The Story of a Kerry Landscape' is an initiative of the Milltown History and Heritage Society, a recently established voluntary group which aims to protect and promote the many distinctive features of the local landscape.

The film, directed by Niall Foley, was prompted by a desire to highlight how archaeology, heritage and key events and personalities in the past have shaped the development of the town and its hinterland over thousands of years.

The 'world premiere' of the new documentary will take place on Friday, 25 April at 8pm in the Old Community Hall in Milltown and will be followed by a roundtable discussion with the team behind the film.

Tickets, at just €10, are now available from milltownhistoryheritage.ie with all proceeds going to the Milltown History and Heritage Society which has plans for several local oral history, conservation, and educational projects. The script for 'Milltown: The Story of a Kerry Landscape' was researched and written by Milltown natives and historians Dr John Knightly and Dr Owen O'Shea and the project coordinator was Stewart Stephens of the Milltown Community and Chamber Alliance. Stewart said the film is a spectacular portrayal of the local landscape and the key milestones in the history of Milltown:


"The aerial cinematography from videographer Niall Foley is quite breath-taking and portrays Milltown in an innovative way with an emphasis on the unique local landscape and its heritage and archaeology. The film begins with the story of the 6,000-year-old portal tomb at Killaclohane and takes the story of the development of Milltown right up to the present day," said Stewart.

Key locations and sites like the 13th century Augustinian abbey at Killagha, the Mass Rock where Fr Thaddeus Moriarty was arrested in 1653, and Kilcoleman Abbey which was the home of the Godfrey family for hundreds of years, feature prominently in the film as well as the many social, cultural, economic, and political developments which made Milltown what it is today.

"One of our key objectives of the film is to inform existing residents as well as the many newcomers to our community in recent years about the history of the place and why preserving and protecting our history and heritage is so important. The hope is that there will be a renewed interest in the past and how it influences the present and the future," said

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CHESS IN SCHOOLS ON THE RISE WITH FICHEALL

136 pupils from 12 schools across Kerry were invited to take part in one of Ficheall.ie's annual Comórtas Chess Tournaments last Tuesday in Fossa Community Centre. 2025 will see Ficheall arrange 33,000 games with 14,000 children from 655 schools nationwide!

Primary schools across the country are unlocking social and cognitive skills with Ficheall. Ficheall is the voluntary network of primary school teachers in Ireland fostering essential life skills through chess. Ficheall is of course the Irish word for chess. The Ficheall initiative emphasises values such as respect, accepting defeat, planning ahead, etiquette, teamwork, decision-making, patience, distinguishing safe and unsafe moves, resilience, and the importance of practice & commitment.

Jason Culloty, who is the Kerry Area Coordinator, teaches in Fossa NS and was Co-Host on the day reported, "It's a highly coordinated & measured event and is a pleasure to be part of. The atmosphere at both the Féile Ficheall events which were held in February & March and at the Comórtas are unique in the sense that participation and learning are seen as being the real winner on the day, regardless of the result of each individual game." Grace Fitzgerald, teacher in Holy Family NS Rathmore & Co-Host on Tuesday added, "It's a jam-packed, fun-filled day of chess play and is great to be involved in. We also see it as an organic way for children from different schools to engage & mix with one another in a highly structured & social manner."

Ficheall sought to provide an annual fun chess tournament as a focal point for chess during the school year. Since then the Ficheall initiative has grown from strength to strength with 1 in 6 schools now registered as Ficheall Schools across the country.

In 2024, 369 teachers enhanced their teaching methodologies at Department of Education approved Ficheall CPD summer courses. In total, over 1,000 teachers have completed the 20-hour course since 2016. The summer course teaches teachers how to play chess, as well as how the game can be harnessed to enhance a school's SPHE curriculum. A series of ten lessons and accompanying short videos, available in English and Irish, are available free to access for all primary school teachers on the Ficheall.ie website.

This year, in partnership with Education Centre Tralee, five Féile Fichille tournaments took place in Kerry alone with 29 schools registered across the county. These events then culminated in the Comórtas with teams who achieved a high standard or embodied the spirit of the game at their respective Féiles, being invited to the final Ficheall event in Kerry this school year.





If the current senior ladies' team can capture the coveted superleague title this weekend, however, it will be the club's greatest achievement in 40 years and, indeed, in the history of ladies' basketball in Killarney.

While St Paul's has been in existence since 1985, there is a tremendous history and tradition of basketball in Killarney, dating back to the very first men's game in the old town hall in November 1951.

Ladies' basketball didn't start in the town until the mid-1960s following the opening of St Mary's Parish Hall with local priest, Fr Leahy, facilitating the growth of the game among young boys and girls with the use of the hall.

The very first game of competitive ladies' basketball in Killarney took place in the mid-1960s when a St Brigid's Presentation Convent team defeated a Holy Cross Mercy team. Coaching the Presentation team on that historic occasion was Tadghie Fleming – father of current St Paul's head coach James Fleming – while the Mercy was coached by the late Michael Courtney, a man synonymous with the introduction of the John Player ladies' tournament in Killarney in the late 1960s.

This later became the Pretty Polly ladies' tournament, attracting several teams from all over Ireland to Killarney every Easter during the 1970s and 80s. One of the main highlights on the Irish basketball calendar, the event continued until the late 1980s.

As the current St Paul's team bids for ultimate glory this weekend, it is worth remembering those early and subsequent years of ladies' basketball in Killarney and those who paved the way for future generations. Maura Moynihan was an exceptional talent alongside the likes of

Peggy O'Sullivan and Brenda (Bronny) Kelliher (RIP) and they led a St Brigid's Presentation Killarney team, coached by Tadghie Fleming, to a Munster schools title in 1970.

Sheila O'Sullivan from Mangerton View was an outstanding player during the 1970s and 80s and also played for Ireland at international level.

The St Paul's club built a strong ladies' team in the late 1980s and early 90s and, coached by the late Donal O'Doherty, they enjoyed a number of successes in Kerry leagues and championships.

St Paul's have reached the penultimate stages of the superleague and national cup in the past. With the growth of juvenile basketball in Killarney, the club enjoyed underage success

winning the Under 19 boys' national cup in 1995 and 1997 and the Under 19 girls' national cup in 2003. While the club has won national league division one men's and ladies' titles, a coveted title at superleague level has eluded them in both codes on a number of occasions. National Cup semi-final defeats to St Vincents in 1997 and 2005 and to Demons in 2007 and a superleague semi-final loss to Killester in 2004 have been the closest calls in men's competitions. St Paul's first entry to the ladies superleague started in 2002, under then head coach James Weldon, while James Fleming was his assistant coach.

It turned out to be a very impressive rookie year in the superleague and they finished in a very respectable third place while they were runners-up in the national championship final. Despite impressive superleague campaigns during the mid-noughties, there were agonising national cup semi-final defeats three years in succession. In 2004 they finished second on the league table but were pipped by Waterford Wildcats in the cup and league semi-finals. In 2005 they lost a cup semi-final to Killester and, again the following year, at the same stage to University of Limerick in 2006.

The teams that battled in those years put in huge efforts, gave great joy to supporters and put Killarney basketball in contention for major honours but missed out on the ultimate glory. The current St Paul's team has already gone one step further and is within touching distance of bringing a first ever Superleague ladies' title to Killarney. Killester stand in their way and the Dubliners already pipped St. Paul's by one point in a thrilling national cup semi-final in January. St Paul's coach James Fleming is well aware of the history of Killarney basketball and will be hoping his side can emulate the achievements of the St Vincent's Gleneagle Killarney men's team, led by the late great Paudie O'Connor, who won the top flight National League and National Top Four Championship on two occasions in 1980 and again in 1982.

As the current St Paul's team bids for glory on the highest stage in Irish basketball, it is hard to believe that it is well over 30 years since the last time a Killarney player has enjoyed success at this level. Plunkett Street native Éilis Ní Laoire, now domiciled in Australia, started her career in Tralee, where she won a league and cup in 1987 before going on to lead Naomh Mhuire (Dublin) to a national cup success.

St Paul's head coach James Fleming is chasing his 10th national title as a coach having already won five titles with St Paul's and four with Fr Mathews of Cork. As a player, his MVP performance led St Paul's to a national cup win in 1995 while he also played on the St Paul's senior men's team that won the national league division one title that season.

He played a few seasons at superleague level but, it is fair to say, he would have played a lot longer but Gaelic football commitments with Dr Crokes and basketball coaching dominated his time for many years.

He won several district board, county and Munster championships with Dr Crokes and captained the side to an All-Ireland senior club final in 2007.

His basketball coaching career almost happened by accident. Back in 1994, James Fleming was a promising teenage basketball prospect enjoying his rookie season as a player in the national league with St Pauls Killarney. He had never been involved in coaching before then but was asked to help out with the club's Under 13 girls' team by their coach Breeda O'Donoghue. He was hooked from day one and over the past 30 years he has been actively

involved in coaching ladies and underage basketball in Killarney. A few players stood out from that Under 13 team in 1994. Coach Fleming was particularly struck with three very promising 10-year-olds and knew from an early stage that they were going to make it on the big stage. Mairead Finnegan, Diane Griffin and Lynn Jones were earmarked by coach Fleming from the start and all three went on to represent Ireland at international level and enjoy very successful basketball careers.

With Coach Fleming offering guidance, St Pauls dominated underage girls basketball in Kerry for a number of years. From Under 13 level right up to Under 19 level they never lost a game at underage level in Kerry over the course of six years. The highlight of their underage careers was clinching the Under 19 National Cup with St Pauls in 2003. 30 years on from his first coaching season, it is a remarkable story that James Fleming is still directing a team

that includes the same Lynn Jones, who came under his wing back in 1994. Her longevity and commitment has been incredible. Having represented Ireland at Under 15, Under 18 and Under 20, she remains an integral part of the current squad bidding for glory this weekend. With 14 coach of the month awards and two coach of the year awards already collected in recent years, James Fleming knows that winning a superleague title this weekend would represent the pinnacle of success. He has invested an incredible amount of time and energy to the cause and secured sponsorship to ensure that a Killarney team is competing at the highest level possible in Irish basketball.

Growing up as a child in the Lewis Road/ O'Sullivan's Place part of town, in the shadow of St Mary's Parish Hall, the spiritual home of Killarney basketball, sport dominated his life from a young age.

His own sporting background was influenced by some of the greatest names inKillarney sporting history. Close neighbours and friends to the Fleming household included legends such as Johnny Culloty, Weeshie Fogarty and Paudie O'Connor, all sadly departed, and former Irish international basketballer Aidan O'Shea who is an uncle of current StPaul's player Leah McMahon.

James' father, Tadhgie, won a Kerry senior hurling championship with Killarney in1969 and seven East Kerry O'Donoghue Cup football medals with Dr Crokes along with several county and Munster championship basketball titles with the BusbyBabes and Kerry.

It is 60 years since he first made a name for himself as a top winning coach with a Killarney ladies' basketball team and there would be great celebrations in Killarney if history can repeat itself in this season's superleague decider.

If we value all our students equally, bonus points for Higher Level Maths must be abolished

STFN

20,300 candidates sat Maths at higher level in the 2024 Leaving Cert exam compared to 8,250 in 2011, the year before bonus points were introduced. The promotion of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects and the attraction of 25 bonus points account for the 150% increase in the number of students taking Higher Level Maths during that time period.

REPORT

However, a report on students' exam performance confirms that many students are boxing above their weight in Higher Level Maths in pursuit of the bonus points. Far too many students are devoting hours of study to Higher Level Maths which they find very difficult and don't need for their course choices.

BONUS

Many students eventually drop down to Ordinary Level Maths, achieve a low grade or fail Higher Level Maths in the Leaving Cert. It should also be noted that the 25 bonus points kick in only if the student achieves at least 40% (Grade H6) in the Higher Level Maths exam. Even though 30% (Grade H7) is regarded as a pass in a higher level subject, it's not considered worthy of the 25 bonus points, Also, the bonus points apply only if Higher Level Maths is one of the six subjects counted for points' calculation.

DISPOSITION

Even if they manage to chieve 40% or more to qualify for the 25 bonus points, there is anecdotal evidence that many candidates lose far more points in their stronger subjects, than they gain from the bonus points. Struggling with Higher Level Maths can also have a negative effect on the disposition of students. A

student who isn't comfortable in a Higher Level Maths class because of the advanced logic and understanding involved in mastering the subject can suffer psychologically. Spending hours of valuable study time on Higher Level Maths homework can be emotionally draining for a student who hasn't the flair for Higher Level Maths.

ELEVATED

As an inveterate numbers' geek, who loved Maths at school, who studied Maths at third level and who has taught Maths at all levels at secondary school, I can't fathom the elevated status of Higher Level Maths. People have multiple intelligences so every subject deserves equality of esteem. A higher grade in Art, Economics, Chemistry, French or any other subject should merit the same points as the equivalent grade in Higher Level Maths.

OPPOSED

I have always opposed bonus points in the State Exams. As an experienced Career Guidance Counsellor, I feel uncomfortable with this anomaly in the points system, which discriminates against candidates not taking Higher Level Maths. All children are gifted and talented. What, for example, would we do without our "Hassers" – HASS (Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences) - writers, actors, musicians, artists, dancers, historians, philosophers if all our children become "Stemmers?"

SCALE

The new common points scale which came on stream in 2017 was based on equality of esteem for each and every exam subject. The highest grade, H1 is valued at 100 points. Six subjects are counted for points scoring so the maximum potential score was 600 points. However, with

the provision of 25 bonus points in higher level Maths, that score increased to 625. In fact, 6H1 grades is worth 600 (100x6) points for some students and 6H1grades is worth 625 (100x5 + 125) for other students. There is a distinct element of unfairness in that scenario. It's time to acknowledge the uniqueness of each individual and level the playing field by abolishing the bonus points for Higher Level Maths.

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





FITNESS TIPS FOR BEGINNERS

Nobody in the gym is judging how much weight you can lift, everyone is too focused on themselves. If you don't understand something, never be too shy to ask for help.

Results don't happen overnight, take things very slow. Track your progress, what weights, reps, sets your doing for example. What you see in the mirror is not what everyone else sees. We are our own worst critics. You can still make progress without the scales moving. Don't get too hung up about weight. Focus on correct form. Trying to use heavier weights with poor form will catch up with you in the long term. What works for one person might not necessarily work for you, Focus on your own path.





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CONTACT LENSES

Most people who need very safe, as long as you to wear glasses can wear contact lenses.

There are two main types of contact lenses:

- soft lenses which mould to the shape of your eye
- rigid gas permeable lenses (RGP lenses) which are fitted closely to the shape of your eye and are less flexible.

Most contact lenses fitted in Ireland are soft lenses. They are available as single-use daily, fortnightly and monthly disposable lenses, and more specialist lenses that are designed to last for longer.

Which type of contact lens is

The type of lens that is best for you will depend upon several factors. These include how often you want to wear your lenses – for example do you want to wear them just for certain activities such as sport, or do you want to wear them most of the time, instead of glasses?

As soft lenses are initially more comfortable than RGP lenses, they are ideal for people who only want to wear lenses occasionally. RGP lenses are a little more uncomfortable than soft lenses at first, so they take a bit more getting used to

Are contact lenses safe? Modern contact lenses are follow advice about how to wear and look after them, and have regular check-ups. It is possible that anything that touches your eye could introduce an infection.

I need to wear different glasses for distance and reading – can I have bifocal or varifocal contact lenses? When you reach your forties it is common to find that you need a different prescription for reading than you need for distance.

There are three main options to correct presbyopia with contact lenses:

- You may choose to have contact lenses to correct your distance vision, and wear reading glasses over the top when you need them.
- You may have multifocal contact lenses.
- You may wear lenses to have one eye corrected to see in the distance and one eye corrected for near vision. This is called monovision.

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STORM ÉOWYN EMERGENCY FUND DETAILS

An emergency fund to replace farm building roofs, is to be set up shortly, according to correspondence from the Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, in reply to Kerry TD , Michael Cahill. The Targeted Agricultural Modernisation Scheme (TAMS) had already funded generators, animal fencing and mulchers, following Storm Éowyn and the next tranche to be rolled out is for damaged farm roofs.

"The Minister has urged farmers to have their farm buildings structurally assessed now, to be fully ready for the next TAMS rollout. This is an excellent opportunity to be ahead of the game and ready to apply for funding to replace damaged roofing" stated Fianna Fáil's Deputy Cahill.

"I am delighted that I queried the Minister on funding for the damage done by Storm Éowyn and I hope all of our farmers affected can get qualifying applications in order in advance of funding being formally announced" said Deputy Cahill.

"I am also delighted that I got the opportunity to recently raise this important matter in the Dáil on behalf of Kerry farmers" added Michael Cahill TD.



Beaufort Village Traffic Management Plan

Kerry County Council has confirmed that it will explore the feasibility of implementing much-needed improvements to traffic management in Beaufort Village, following a motion submitted by Fianna Fáil Councillor, Tommy Cahill. The proposed upgrades would include public lighting, footpaths, and pedestrian crossings from the Beaufort Bar extending beyond the Community Centre.

Councillor Cahill highlighted the critical need for these changes for the safety and well-being of Beaufort's residents. "Beaufort Village is a busy, residential area where locals regularly walk and exercise close to their homes. It is hard to believe that such basic amenities, like public lighting, footpaths, and pedestrian crossings, are lacking. The current situation is unsafe, and residents are calling for these essential upgrades," said Councillor Cahill. "It's time for Beaufort Village to be prioritised for these vital improvements. I will continue to work closely with Kerry County Council to ensure that these traffic management upgrades are put in place as quickly as possible," added Councillor Cahill, Cathaoirleach of the Kenmare

In response to Councillor Cahill's motion, Kerry County Council confirmed they will examine the feasibility of submitting improvements under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme and that the process would involve initial engagement with landowners.

Councillor Cahill, finished by stating "I welcome Kerry County Council's reply and I will continue to press for progress on these critical safety upgrades to ensure the health and well-being of everyone in our communities across the Municipal District."

MINISTER HEALY-RAE welcomes European experts' engagement at Windblow Taskforce

Minister of State with responsibility for Forestry, Farm Safety and Horticulture, Michael Healy-Rae TD, has welcomed European experts' engagement at Ireland's Forest Windblow Taskforce.

Minister Healy-Rae said: "I welcome today's engagement with our colleagues from the Forest Europe-endorsed Forest Risk Facility. This facility provides European countries and experts with a collaborative platform to strengthen international cooperation, and to share expertise and good practice, on how to manage the impacts on forests from natural events such as wind, fire and disease. There are many countries that have experienced similar natural disasters resulting in catastrophic wind damage such as Storm Éowyn. Today's engagement is important, and we heard some useful insights on how countries have managed large storm events across Europe."

Silvia Abruscato, the senior expert at the European Forest Institute, leading the Secretariat of the Forest Risk Facility, said: "We welcome the opportunity to come to Ireland and to share experiences, and to highlight the importance

of this new facility. Our forests across Europe are facing numerous threats and challenges, and we need to cooperate and to learn from others in order to enhance the resilience of our forests. Today, Dr Christoph Hartebrodt, who has extensive experience in wind and risk management, has shared useful insights on how to manage the consequences of windblow."

Dr Hartebrodt emphasised the importance of assessing the challenges and bottlenecks along the supply chain, from harvesting to delivery of timber products to markets. He emphasised not rushing to harvest trees until haulage and markets are in place, and that windblown trees still attached to the root plate will remain in good condition for a period of time.

The Windblow Taskforce will now develop a detailed action plan building on the work completed to date, and will also use expertise from the pan-European Forest Risk Facility and other stakeholders to inform the next steps. A workshop is planned for early May to inform the action plan currently being developed.

DEPUTY DANNY HEALY RAE RAISES LOCAL ISSUES IN THE DAIL

This week, Deputy Danny Healy Rae raised the following issues in Dail Eireann. *Water Services* -

I highlighted the many areas in Kerry that are without an adequate water supply and asked the Minister of State to look at this because this is a serious issue. Similarly, our infrastructure for wastewater treatment plants is totally obsolete or not there at all in many places. There are 38 settlements in Kerry without proper wastewater treatment plants. The Government will have to buck up to ensure that people have a proper water supply. It is a basic human right.

Topical Question Pension Abatment of HSE staff:

I again raised the matter of the pension abatement for retired nurses who returned to work for the HSE during Covid. Many retired nurses and other workers who returned to work in vaccination centres, back into wards, community settings, these were highly experienced staff and they answered the call and were told ther pensions would not be impacted. Some went into mental health into the CAMHS clinic liaison support team, they were told they could work up to 19.5 hours and it would not affect their pension and every thing was going grand until the department of Finance intervened some time late in 2022 and told the HSE that the pensions would be abated, but the HSE never relayed this to their workers and the workers did not know and they continued working. Now the Department of Finance and Revenue, the pensions side of it are looking for tax back from these workers. This is totally wrong. I asked the Minister to intervene and deal with this and resolve the matter.

Minister O'Donovan announces launch of new "All Right All Night" online safety training

The Minister for Arts, Media, Communications, Culture and Sport, Patrick O'Donovan TD, has today announced the launch of a new online safety training resource for young people. The All Right All Night training programme is a safety initiative which is funded by the Department's Night-Time Economy Unit and developed by the Bystander Intervention Team in University College Cork.

The All Right All Night programme, aimed at teens and young adults, helps young people recognise problematic behaviour, whilst developing the skills and capacity to make safe and effective interventions to keep each other safe on a night out. The All Right All Night programme has been successfully piloted in schools, youth clubs and sports clubs across the country and is now rolling out nationwide. Through the workshops, participants gain a clear understanding of the diversity of lived experiences, and in so doing promote respect and inclusivity.

This latest element of the programme, provides bystander intervention training condensed into a one-hour online training course. 5,000 places will be made available free of charge to people aged 18-24.

Speaking today, Minister O'Donovan said:

"I am pleased today to be announcing this important Night-Time Economy safety initiative. The All Right All Night training programme



promotes a safer night-time environment for young people, which is a key priority of the Night-Time Economy Taskforce. Initiatives like All Right All Night are so important in providing young people with the tools how to safely intervene or get help should anything arise when socialising at night.

"I want to encourage young people to take part in this important training which has the potential to make a positive difference in our society and bring about a real change in attitudes and behaviours, particularly in a night-time context."

Professor Louise Crowley from UCC said:

"The Bystander team at University College Cork

is excited to bring the impactful All Right All Night training to the online platform, making it immediately available to 18–24-year-olds across Ireland and allowing us to upscale our reach and maximise the programme impact. "The ability to better recognise problematic behaviour and the associated capacity to make safe and effective interventions will encourage and enable participants to contribute to an improved culture of respect and safety for all young people on nights out."

Minister Foley welcomes Capital Plan for Facilities for University Hospital Kerry in 2025 HSE Capital Plan

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed the confirmation of new infrastructure for University Hospital Kerry in the 2025 HSE capital plan. The plan commits to the delivery of an additional theatre for childbirths at University Hospital Kerry plus the upgrade of existing theatres and plant. This project is currently at tender

Detailed design work has been carried out on the provision of an Oncology Day ward for cancer patients in the hospital, which is due to go to tender stage this year.

This also includes an aseptic compounding unit which will be developed in the hospital for the first time, allowing for the manufacturing of individually tailored chemotherapy and biologic preparations for patients.

The HSE capital plan includes the proposed new ward block at University Hospital Kerry comprising single rooms and ancillary accommodation.

The women's health team will be relocated from University Hospital Kerry to a new building on the John Joe Sheehy Road.

Minister Foley said: "I welcome the significant commitment to University Hospital Kerry in the plan which will deliver theatre expansions, a new day ward for cancer patients and additional bed capacity through new single rooms. This will improve and enhance the already excellent facilities available."

WOMEN & MEN'S SHEDS

The value of a place to meet with likeminded people, to chat or to work on a hobby, etc, is immeasurable and the Women's and Men's Sheds have proved their worth in this regard, simply by their popularity. Deputy Michael Cahill and Councillor Tommy Cahill believe that the social and mental value alone of these facilities, is worth its weight in gold.


"There are Women's and Men's Shed groups all around Kerry that are thriving at the moment, bringing like minded women and men together to practice hobbies, play cards, tennis and bowls, etc, do charity work, generally socialise, and so on, for a couple of hours a day. These can be retired or unemployed people, who have some time on their hands, and the Shed helps them to take their minds off the mundane, even spending some of this time helping others" stated Councillor Tommy Cahill.

"There are groups around the county at present looking for a home to locate their Shed. In Cahersiveen, the Men's Shed group are looking for a site or a suitable building. In Killarney, the same applies to the Women's Shed group who are looking for a home to locate their Shed. Both Tommy and I

are calling on Kerry County Council to make a big effort to find a suitable location for them, be it through means of providing a site or a vacant property. I am also calling on our Government to row in with funding for any new builds, refurbishments or alterations that may be needed" stated Deputy Michael Cahill.

The Cahill's believe that there are many Local Authority sites and vacant buildings around the county that would be more than suitable to hosting a Women's or Men's Shed, be it in Killarney or Cahersiveen or in any other town or village in Kerry and if they can be made available and suitable, support should be forthcoming for such an amazing and valuable concept, which would be fabulous in any community.

"Sneems Men's Shed group currently have a Planning application pending and they along with all other Men's and Women's groups across the county must be supported and in this context, I have submitted a Parliamentary Question to the Minister calling for additional resources to be made available for these groups in Kerry" added Michael Cahill TD.



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.

rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

KILLESTER VS UTILITY TRUST ST PAULS

Fairytales are short stories, full of magic, part of folklore and always have a happy ending. But are they true? You could point to Leicester City's Premier League triumph of 2016, Offalys annexing of the Kerry Five in a Row and more recently Armagh's capture of the Sam Maguire. All achieved against the odds, some even mystical. Utility Trust St Pauls find themselves in a Women's Superleague Final only two and a half years after they entered the National League and now stand on the brink of history, The 2022/2023 season saw them come up just short in their bid for promotion with a narrow defeat inflicted on them by the Portlaoise Panthers. Yuleska Tejeda and Sofia Paska were the imports that helped bring the squad to the doorstep of the Superleague. The second season would see Paska return early in the year alongside Glanmire Superleague winner Khiarica Rasheed and on Saturday March 9th 2024 they accounted for Swords Thunder in the National Basketball Arena to reach the promised land and take their place amongst the top clubs in the country. But the hard work was only starting then.

Coach James Fleming has been around the leagues long enough to know what it takes and he recruited Megan Ormiston, Gracen Kerr and Anja Marinkovic to line out alongside his local brigade. The common denominator in all the seasons has been of course the likes of Rheanne O Shea, Lorraine Scanlon, Denise Dunlea and remarkably Lynn Jones. All tried and trusted local players who had plied their trade with other clubs while Killarney were dormant. Coming into the equation was underage Irish International Leah Mahon as well as Siofra O Shea, the Kerry footballer targeting an injury free run.

The opening games in their new domain of the Superleague were all an education, getting used to the pace and power of the league. Day one was definitely an eye opener as Flomax Liffey Celtics gave a full exhibition of their skills . Glanmire came to Killarney for a novel Monday night fixture and everything fell into place as they bounced back from the Celtics defeat with a 94-79 win over the Leesiders. Thereafter they would find wins hard to come by, the Galway Mystics being their sole win in the next nine fixtures. The games themselves were competitive with single digit losses to Brunell, Killester, Portlaoise Panthers and SETU Waterford Wildcats. Having settled into the

league would the experience gained from : those defeats stand to them in the long run? By now Anja Marinkovic had been replaced by Mathilde Diop and Megan Ormiston had moved to the Cleveland Rockets. The key signing of the season was about to land in Alex Wittinger. Even though they tasted defeat to Killester in the National Cup semi final this was a performance to build on. She would bring a new dimension to the team and everything clicked into place. Beating Brunell by a single point in Killarney, 71-70, kick started the renaissance, Killester, Galway Mystics and Portlaoise Panthers were all dispatched. Wittinger had now fallen victim to a hand injury but Coach Fleming astutely picked up the released Callie Cavanaugh from Glanmire. Her contribution to the Panthers victory would be telling.

They hit a dip in the road losing to Trinity Meteors and the Wildcats, which set up a must win game against Fr Matthews. The team rediscovered their mojo in front of a passionate home support to qualify for the last eight and a feature of that run was the key contribution at vital times of Denise Dunlea, Rheanne O Shea, Leah McMahon, Lorraine Scanlon, Lynn Jones and Siofra O Shea. But finishing as the eight seed handed the team the toughest task of them all, an away day to the top seed, SETU Waterford Wildcats.

The game was going to form in the opening quarter in the Mercy College Gym but a scintillating second quarter, inspired by Gracen Kerr, yielded 28 points to put them in the box seat. But they had to withstand a late Waterford rally to pull off an unlikely win. The bus then turned for Dublin for what would be their fourth meeting with Trinity Meteors this season. The semi final took place in the Colaiste Eanna Gym and again laid witness to a humdinger of a game where the lead exchanged hands sixteen times. With Alex Wittinger gone to Australia on a pre-signed contract Callie Cavanaugh stepped forward to lead the scoring but a feature of the second half was the input of the Irish players, who accounted for 21 of the 31 points scored. But that doesn't tell the full story of what was a superb defensive performance and a display full of grit and determination.

So the season will end this Sunday in Tallaght where Killester will be looking to bring home some silverware following their National Cup Final defeat to Liffey Celtics . In Samantha Haiby they possess a player at the peak of her powers , the March Player of the Month and are a team laced with talented players like Michelle Clarke, Hannah Thornton and leva Bagdanaviciene. They will be a huge challenge for St Pauls but given the run they've been on since the turn of the year you cannot write off James Fleming's side . It would be a remarkable achievement after only three winters plying their trade. Do you believe in fairytales?

MUNSTER U20 CHAMPIONSHIP

Kerry 1-22 Cork 1-12

It wasn't so much the scoreline as the style of Kerry's play in seeing off Cork in a relatively meaningless Munster U20 contest in Austin Stack Park. Would it have been a tragedy if Kerry had lost? Let's be honest about it, not really. That's not to suggest that we would have seen off Tipperary comfortably to qualify for the Munster Final. Tipperary pretty walloped us in midfield last week and just left too many good scoring chances behind them. That one wasn't any convincing Kerry victory.

This one most assuredly was. Look, I know Kerry were on home ground and I know there was an element of ducks and drakes about it. Put Ed Myers, Darragh Sheedy, and Brian Hayes back onto that Cork team and you are looking at a different animal. But we had lads rested who would have been playing if this was a knockout game as well, and frankly I felt that we won pulling up. I know it won't be as easy again, but I'd have us as very strong favourites if we meet again - and while Tipperary have shown a lot of quality, Munster is likely to be yet another Kerry v Cork contest. I rate Ray O'Mahony very highly as a manager, one of the good guys, but he isn't drawing from the same hand of cards as Tomás Ó Sé has. Have a look at recent minor results between the two counties or Corn uí Mhuirí winners in recent years. Kerry aren't hunting any Munster title this year; that's just their baseline.

I thought Kerry were tentative enough against Tipperary, despite the great turnover rate of Donagh Shine O'Sullivan and Darragh O'Connor. In this outing they were far more assured and very direct. Daniel Kirby teed up Tomás Kennedy for the opening score. Paddy Lane jinked sideways neatly to evade a tackle before coolly splitting the posts. Ciarán Collins nailed a beauty. Daniel Kirby fisted over. One way traffic.

Danny Miskella opened Cork's account with a great left leg kick. Paddy Lane found Tomás Kennedy with a brilliant pass to open up a goal chance, but the shot lacked conviction and Billy Curtin saved easily. Eddie Healy – I thought himself and Gearóid Evans were absolutely superb for Kerry – burst up the field for a point. Dylan O'Neill – Cork's best player on the night for me – replied to make it 0-5 to 0-2. The gap felt wider than that.

And then it was. Ronan Carroll was on the end of a sweeping Kerry move and this time Curtin had no chance. Paddy Lane snapped over a point from the kick-out and Kerry were ahead by 1-6 to 0-2.

Cork were being outclassed in most sectors – I'm

still not thrilled about our own kick-outs – but they have real character. Colm Clifford came up from corner back with a roving commission to loft over. I had expected Darragh Gough to be a real danger-man but he had been marshalled well enough by a tight Kerry backline until now, but he cut loose with two two pointers. I love how previously insurmountable gaps are now manageable because of the big scores on offer, much fewer games will peter out in the last quarter now. 1-6 to 0-7, game on.

Eddie Healy – jaysus he's like a tank when he bursts forward – kicked his second point and Darragh O'Connor set up Paddy Lane for the final score of the first half. 1-9 to 0-7 in Kerry's favour. Cork were still well in this, but it always felt like Kerry had higher gears whenever they needed. But hey, I've thought that plenty of times before and been wrong.

Not on this occasion. Maybe it might have been different if Darragh Clifford had been able to finish off an early goal chance for Cork in the second half.....is the kind of nonsense that people often say. That can be true in tight games, but this one wasn't tight at all. Dylan O'Neill did kick a great score for Cork, but Kirby, Carroll, and Eddie Healy had already pointed for Kerry and the Kingdom reeled off five more straight after. Kirby, Paddy Lane with two, Ronan Carroll skinned a goal chance over the bar, Killian Dennehy pointed a free, and Liam Evans made it 1-20 to 0-5 after good work by Maidhcí Lynch. Done and dusted.

In fairness to the Rebels, they never gave up the ghost. They hit a purple patch of their own. Luke Shorten, Gearóid Daly (he worked very hard all through), Darragh Gough with a great goal chance after more good play from Dylan O'Neill, who had a ferocious bullet tipped over the bar himself by Michael Tansley. They did finally get in for a goal, Danny Miskella with a nice finish after a great run by Gearóid Daly. 1-20 to 1-12, but it was in the dying minutes and Odhran Ferris closed things out with a two pointer.

A good outing for Kerry, a tough one for Cork. I know they didn't show their full hand, but their heads must be down after this one. Will Kerry win Munster? I'll be astonished if they don't. Will they win the All Ireland? I don't know. Contenders definitely, but as with the Hogan and the last couple of minor and U20 titles, I'm afraid you'd have to be looking at Ulster right now. Long way to go, though, and it's a steep learning curve.

ALL IRELAND CHAMPIONSHIP BEGINS

Look, I don't know if the start of the provincial championships counts as an All Ireland starter. I think it's more of an a la carte menu, really. Frankly, when it comes to both Munster and Leinster, the top guns would be more interested in the cocktail menu at that stage. But in Connaught and Ulster, teams are generally hunting scalps from early on.

Donegal 1-25 Derry 1-15

I'm a big and unapologetic advocate for the new rules. I'm eagerly looking forward to football games now; that hadn't been true in the last couple of years. There was a pervasive negativity taking over everywhere. I think it's true enough in most sports. In fact, in most human endeavours. It's easier to level the playing field by dumbing things down rather than raising things to the highest standards. The easy familiarity of fast food franchises will always outsell authentic cuisine. Let's have another green screen superhero movie from Hollywood, preferably one where another manufactured teen pop star can begin their transformation into a readymade movie star. Or remakes of movies and tv shows from twenty years ago - we don't want to be paying pesky writers for original material, do we?

The Ulster Championship was always the most compelling of them all (you could make an argument for Leinster in the sixties and early seventies or the end of the eighties). But the actual football was cautious and contrived. Loads of toughness, absolutely, but brilliance? That might not sound fair to the likes of Michael Murphy, Oisín McConville, Owen Mulligan, or Peter the Great (and I do not call Canavan that with any sense of irony; his sons are the reason I have Tyrone right up there with his year's All

Ireland favourites and neither of them is quite as good as Peter in his heyday yet). Ulster in championship would really provide a test of these new rules. Because, frankly, if there was a way to negate the positivity and consequent random factor, especially in terms of kick-outs and overlapping strategies, Ulster managers would find it.

Except take another look at that scoreline. For the last two decades, unless it was a completely one-sided earlier round, very few Ulster teams were clocking up 1-15. For Derry, last year's Division One winners, to do that and still lose by 10? Football is back, baby!

Derry actually started well enough, but Doegal were much more clinical in their finishing. Derry had a penalty comfortably saved early on and just left too much Daire Ó Baoill with two two pointers upped the ante late in the first half. Derry coughed up a 50m advantage with a poor reaction after a free was given - people say the punishment is harsh, but it forces players to be smarter and it speeds up the play. Well worth it. By half-time Donegal were suddenly 1-17 to 1-12 in front, with the sides swapping goals. Derry had the wind and the opening three points of the second half. Donegal responded with seven on the trot. Their shooting was very good, their work-rate was frighteningly good, their bench is very deep. Their fitness levels....I don't know. McGuinness is an expert, arguably the best in the game in terms of conditioning but can you maintain that at a constant rate?

Galway 3-28 New York 0-20

Matthew Tierney got a fifth minute goal but New York, having taken their first ever championship win two years ago with a penalty shootout against Leitrim, were able to give as good as they got in a first half that finished 1-12 to 0-12. The Brosnan brothers and Rob Wharton were among their best performers. Once Tierney got in for a second goal, though, Galway gradually began to pull away but they were made to work hard to the wire. Padraic Joyce was almost subdued in his post-match interview – I thought he could have been a bit more diplomatic about their hosts but I think he will be quietly pleased. Galway were as good as they needed to be and a little bit better. People are saying that New York gave the All Ireland finalists of 2024 a real scare - Galway won by 17 points and are obviously only building towards their peak.

Mayo 2-20 Sligo 2-17

Mayo got a real ding-dong battle off Sligo, but that's because Sligo were very good – McEntee is doing a great job there and I expect them to give the Taillteann a real rattle – than any deficiencies in Mayo. That said, Kevin McStay described his team's performance as 'patchy' and it's hard to argue. They led early on but for a team that can and often have blown teams away, they didn't seem to have that ruthless edge. Even so, they were seven points clear with six to go. Two two pointers for Sligo (actually just one; Niall Murphy's was clearly well inside the arc) meant that there was just a goal in it.

Two pointers aren't having as dramatic an effect as I thought they would. What's happening is that teams are forced to defend a higher line and attackers are exploiting the consequent space rather than kicking two pointers. The dissent and solo and go changes are speeding the game up hugely, two pointers less so. But when they work, as in a case like this, it makes for a great finish. Mayo had to win the ast kickout and Aidan O'Shea, the best player on the pitch, came out and rose high to gather. Sin sin. Again, plenty of dry powder left over, and again at this stage that's how it should be, Mayo got caught hitting turbo early in other years.

Roscommon 2-26 London 0-13

London just didn't have the firepower. London trailed by nine early on but managed to cut it to three at half-time, but that was with the aid of a very strong wind and Roscommon were able to wrap it up comfortably enough in the second half. The most notable feature of the game was the fact that London's Liam Gallagher kicked he first ever two pointer in championship football

Meath 1-30 Carlow 0-19

Ah, Leinster. Which team will lose to Dublin in this year's Delaney Cup Final? I'm worried about Dublin, by the way. They blooded some very good players in the league and have some big guns to come back for championship. Yes, they have lost players, but outside of Fenton I don't think those great players really had much more to give. Can Meath, whose fortunes have really fallen since they unceremoniously dumped Seán Boylan behind his back (let's call a spade a spade here) start getting back to the top table? Based on this showing, maybe, but I kind of doubt it. I'm tempting fate, I know, but while they have good players, I'm not seeing the scoring power to trouble any of the top teams. The game itself wasn't much of a talking point; Meath won comfortably enough. All the post-match questions were about two Meath selectors walking away a week before championship, and Shane 'Cake' Curran abruptly stepping down as Carlow manager. In both cases, why? I don't know and, frankly, I don't care. Not my business.

Wicklow 2-23 Longford 1-20 (aet)

I didn't see any of it, there's only so much time. Wicklow would have been slightly fancied and the final scoreline bears that out. I will say that I like the scoring, even with extra-time. That's big numbers to be putting up and there weren't that many two pointers, two for Wicklow and three for Longford. It's definitely a faster and more attacking game these days, and all the better for it.

Laois 2-21 Wexford 2-11

Two decent teams. I could see Laois being in the hunt for a Leinster Final. They were good here and really had control from a fairly early stage. Two late goals for Wicklow put a gloss on the final scoreline – Justin McNulty won't be happy with that – but we'll be seeing more of Laois later on. Again, though, I can't see them being in the six or seven real contenders for Sam.

SOCCER LADIES NATIONS LEAGUE

IRELAND 4 GREECE 0

I was nervous about this one. We absolutely needed to win to avoid the drop into Division Three - a long way to fall for any team that reached the last World Cup Finals. Katie McCabe being on the bench wasn't a hopeful sign either. She was 'resting' a knock picked up in the Champion' League match between Arsenal and Real Madrid - let's face it; how many players, male or female, do Ireland have contesting at that kind of level? I will also say that my suspicious mind was in overdrive, she had a mild calf strain, that was all. Katie, by far our main talisman, had played against Slovenia and looked both lost and cranky that night. An early yellow hadn't done her or Ireland any favours. Not that it could be used as an excuse by the rest of them - Ireland fell apart against a Slovenia side who aren't top tier but were much more composed on the night. It raised a question for me - where actually do you deploy Katie in this Irish team? Arsenal can play her at left back but leave her free to attack the wing - she actually spends more time in midfield but Ireland haven't got that freedom. There's no way she is a ten; she needs the space to attack in front of her. She drives forward, she isn't a player to receive it with her back to goal. She isn't a defensive midfielder. You could play her in central midfield, but you'd be using Picasso as a hod-carrier. Attacking from the wing is her speciality, but she is an all-or-nothing defender. Wing back felt like a compromise, Ireland aren't dominant enough to give anyone a free role. It reminded me of England shifting Paul Scholes to the left wing to accommodate Stephen Gerrard and Frank Lampard. That never worked Look, I don't want to be singling out Katie McCabe. It's not fair on her or the rest of a hardworking and proud Irish team. But she is worldclass. Literally. She is the barometer. I would like to see Toland a bit further up the pitch; I think she could be a lot more dangerous. But in fairness, I can only base my opinion on short impressions; I don't follow the games enough. The first half was very average. It really looked like one of those games where everybody was adequate but no-one had the craft to create a goal, it would have to come from a defensive mistake. It wasn't bad, by any means. It takes both work and skill to look average at this kind of level. But there wouldn't be any queue for tickets for your next game, either. Katie came on at half-time. She definitely

brought more energy and more intensity. She also exuded a sense of control and purpose that had been completely opposite of the Slovenia game, where it had looked like she

and the team were fire-fighting all night. This time Ireland looked able to move up a gear. It helped, of course, that the first goal wasn't long in coming. The second half wasn't even four minutes old when Marissa Sheva, who had also come on at the break, had a shot. It wasn't a great effort, she didn't really get power on it. However, the ball was diverted off a defender. Not much – to be honest, I'd be expecting an international goalkeeper to get a hand on that (I think the right sun didn't help her) – but it poked it's way into the right corner and Ireland were 1-0 up.

The second goal was beautiful. That's quality. Genuine brilliance by McCabe, lovely touch control and then a perfectly measured cross. Leanne Kieran on the end of it - no coincidence, McCabe had clearly been looking for her timed run. That wasn't instinct; that came from the training ground, and that makes it better. Good right foot connection by Kiernan. This time the keeper did really well to push it away, but Kyla Caruso was ready for the follow-up and poked it home. The fact that Caruso was ready and waiting for the follow-up was the best thing about it for me. They used to say about lan Rush that "he's a metre out from goal, and he doesn't miss many from there". It sounds funny, until you remember that Rush used to score hundreds of those goals just by always being there. When that kind of goal becomes bread and butter.....the simple-looking things aren't simple.

Look, a rattled Greece, with respect, are the kind of team that we should be beating. We could and should be competitive – not necessarily winning – but competitive against the likes of Wales and Slovenia. This felt like a step back to that level.

73rd minute. Lovely inswinging corner by McCabe and a good header by Jessie Stapleton. Well-executed and well-finished. Those are harder than people think. It's a bit of a lottery, though, you can't rely on goals like that at the top level.

Amber Barrett added a fourth in the dying seconds. Very well taken by her, and a really precise finish from a tight enough angle. I thought the defence dropped off her too much, too expectant of a cross, and Barrett was happy to attack that space and pick her spot. 4-0, second place in the group, and back in the hunt. Early days, but it feels like a bit of

confidence returning to the camp. A note of caution, though. I honestly thought it was almost laughable who the Irish mens' team beating a very lacklustre Bulgaria was hailed as a revival. Give me a break. That would be like Kerry going wild after beating Tralee It in the McGrath Cup. This Greece team asked more questions of our womens' team, but that's a brief swallow; let's not start calling it a summer just yet.

KERRY FC

Last week was more like an episode out of the X-Files than anything else. It appears to be agreed on all sides that three LOI teams fielded players whose full transfer from outside leagues had not fully complied with proper procedure (my understanding is that previous clubs were not listed correctly) through no fault of those clubs. Kerry FC can feel particularly hard done by – they brought on a player with two minutes to go while leading 2-0 against Finn Harps.

After that, stories differ regarding the disciplinary process, and those stories are directly contradictory. Either Kerry FC are telling the truth or the FAI – or their Independent Disciplinary Process, to be more precise, are. That's subjective and the matter is subject to an appeal, so I am nailing no colours to any mast. I wasn't there for any of this, and I just don't know

But I do believe that there is a bigger issue, and it has cropped up in other Irish sporting codes as well. The bottom line is that the FAI claim that it is always the club who is responsible for the transfer process. Even though they themselves are responsible for making a player 'active' on the LOI registry, that in itself does not make a player eligible. Two years ago FAI Connect (that player registry) was established by the FAI in order to deal with ongoing problems in regard to outside transfers.

Sorry, what? If you can't even manage a transfer process or player registry, what good are you as a governing body? What's the point of your existence? Player eligibility has been a regular issue in the League of Ireland, and the idea that the FAI have no responsibility for that process.... it honestly feels to me as if I hired a builder to build me a house and they subsequently said it was nothing to do with them when the walls fell down. There's a lot of "who did what and

when" about this whole situation now, but the core issue is fundamental. Very simply, if the FAI list a player as 'active' on FAI Connect, and the LOI club have followed the registry procedure honestly, then they should not be punished if they did nothing wrong. The problem is with the system, not the club, and the FAI are responsible for the system. That's basic.

Kerry FC are responsible for their own results on the pitch. They have improved a lot; they aren't giving away the kind of soft goals that they used to cough up. But that bit of a bounce that' the sign of a cohesive and controlled team just won't fall away. I thought 3-0 was a fair enough scoreline against Treaty United. Now, it should actually have been 1-1 before the first goal almost on the stroke of half-time. Kerry FC were simply unlucky to give away an early penalty. Ball to hand rather than hand to ball, but the whistle is always blowing in those situations and frankly, Kerry had chances to take control of that attack well before it. Not a bad penalty, but a great save.

Kerry had a great attack coming up towards half-time but just couldn't get the finishing touch. You need those. It's a cruel game, inches away is the exact same as miles away in terms of the scoreboard.

Back down to the other end. Good ball control by the attacker, but he flops down as soon as he gets into the box. LOITV isn't great camerawork (it is great value, to be fair) and there's no close-ups, but I'd be very sceptical of that one. If there was enough contact, fair enough. Didn't look like it to me, but I can't definitely say no. David Tarmey tucked away the penalty.

56th minute and 2-0 down. Lovely goal, to be fair. Nicely timed dispossession in midfield and straight forward to Koslowski to bear down and pick his spot. I wouldn't say we were caught napping. It was well executed. Chris McQueen just about cleared off the line to prevent another Treaty goal, but it wasn't a long respite. Defence caught a fraction too high (still better than being caught too deep and inviting them onto you), nice run, and a lovely cross for Trpimir Vrljicak (it took me long enough to learn how to spell his name when he played for us; I'm not wasting the opportunity) to tuck it away. Brilliant pass, most players would have blasted their own shot in those circumstances. Sign of a team playing with confidence. Understandably enough, that's not us right now.









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HANGING BASKETS

Using containers, pots and baskets full of summer bedding plants can give you brilliant colour from now right through the summer to early autumn.

There are a wide range of different types of hanging baskets but the main thing to go for is the size because the larger the basket, the more compost you can fit into it, giving the flowers more compost to grow in thus prolonging their lives. When filling a hanging basket the first thing to do is to place a liner at the base of the basket. Then place your basket on top of a pot as this will give you a steady base when planting. Half fill the basket with compost and a slow release fertilizer. Then plant some bedding plants at the base and sides of the basket such as trailing lobelia, pansies and nasturium. All you have to do is to push the root of the plant through the square in the basket, push it through the liner and into the compost. Then fill the basket almost to the top with compost, place your remaining plants around your chosen centerpiece plant such as a geranium or fuchsia. Pick three good trailing

plants, like trailing petunia, geranium or fuchsia. Fill in between with other bedding plants such as begonias, busy lizzys or pansies. Some of the plants at the bottom of the basket may look a bit shook after planting but when watered in well they will look perfect in a few hours. Don't hang your basket out in its position for a couple of days after planting and water regularly.

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

It covers over one third of the island of Ireland, with areas of the Midlands, the West and Southwest and in particular the stunning coastline of the Wild Atlantic Way over the long distance from South Kerry to the edge of Co Sligo.

In that first Passover the people ate the meat of the lamb, and they exited slavery the next day with... 'not one feeble among them' (Psalm 105:37). As they ate the lamb, their bodies were supernaturally healed. This foreshadowed Jesus healing us by the stripes He took on His body (Isaiah 53:3-7; 1 Peter 2:24).

God rescued His people from bondage - at the Red Sea they saw His awesome power part the waters for them to cross on dry ground, then witnessed their enemies' destruction as the sea closed back over them. Their slave masters who had robbed them finally got their come-uppance (Exodus 14:13-31). After they witnessed God supernaturally provide all their needs - food, water, shelter, and warmth in a desert wilderness! Emmaneul Himself was with them, carrying them through (Psalm 105:39-45). It's the same for you and me today friend, and all believers who call upon Jesus for Salvation, and obey His Word (John 15:9-10).
