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LOCAL NURSE HAILED AS HERO After Saving Runner's Life on Fossa Way

routine afternoon walk turned into a life-saving mission for local nurse Teresa Clifford and her husband Jerry, when they came upon a collapsed man on the popular Fossa Way walking trail.

The couple, out enjoying the summer air, encountered a distressed passer-by who had already called emergency services after discovering the unconscious man. As it happened, Teresa, a highly experienced nurse and CPR instructor with the Irish Heart Foundation, immediately sprang into action.

The man, later identified as 55-year-old Terry O'Meara, a fit and regular runner, had been staying at the Europe Hotel with his wife Ciara for a family reunion. While out jogging, he collapsed without warning.

Teresa quickly took over CPR duties from the passer-by, who was being guided by ambulance personnel over the phone. Knowing every second counted, Teresa knew that there was a defibrillator located at the nearby Golden Nugget Bar and restaurant and luckily a colleague of Teresa's cycled by at that moment and, after hearing the situation, cycled to collect the Defibrillator.

Meanwhile, Teresa continued administering CPR for a staggering 15 minutes, with her husband Jerry stepping in periodically under her calm and expert instruction. Thanks to their relentless efforts, by the time first responders arrived, signs of life were returning to Mr. O'Meara. <image>

Kerry County Council Launches eBike Charging Stations IN KILLARNEY AND KENMARE

Kerry County Council has unveiled the first in a series of new public eBike charging stations as part of a pilot scheme to encourage more sustainable and active travel across the county. With funding support from Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII), the initiative aims to provide accessible infrastructure for the growing number of eBike users in Kerry. The first two stations have been installed and are now fully operational in Killarney and Kenmare. One is located on Mission Road in Killarney, while the other can be found outside the Library on Shelbourne Street in Kenmare.

Each station features five app-enabled charging docks developed by Bikeep. Cyclists can download the Bikeep app to unlock a dock, charge their bike, and securely store it while charging. Each dock is equipped with a robust locking arm and an anti-theft alarm, ensuring a safe and user-friendly experience. Importantly, charging is free of charge to the public, making it easier for residents and tourists alike to opt for environmentally friendly travel options. More stations are expected to follow in other towns across Kerry as the pilot progresses including Fenit, Listowel Glenbeigh, Cahersiveen, Waterville and Sneem.

Cathaoirleach of the Killarney MD, Cllr. Martin Grady speaking at the new charging station on Mission Road, Killarney said, "The new eBike charging station as part of the TII Sustainable and Active Travel scheme is a great addition to the town. By making it easier and safer for people to choose low-carbon travel options, we are building a greener and more connected Kerry for everyone."

This initiative is part of a broader strategy to enhance Kerry's sustainable tourism infrastructure, aligning with national goals to reduce emissions, promote active lifestyles, and support local communities. The new charging network complements existing outdoor offerings such as the Kingdom of Kerry Greenways, cycle routes, and Ring of Kerry attractions.

family who had long struggled to find suitable holiday accommodation for their disabled daughter has been gifted a free stay at a newly renovated hotel in Killarney, offering what may be Ireland's first accessible suite equipped with a ceiling hoist.

Speaking on Newstalk this week, listener Carmel, the mum of Caoimhe, shared the challenges her family faces when trying to plan holidays with her 28-yearold daughter, Caoimhe, who uses a custom wheelchair and requires full-body support.

"She can't sit in any other chair," Carmel explained. "So, going on an airline or using any other seat isn't possible. That's why we holiday at home."

Despite many hotels advertising themselves as accessible, Carmel said few, if any, provide the facilities they truly need, particularly a hoist system to safely transfer Caoimhe out of her chair.

"Accessibility usually just means you can get through the door," she said. "But it's the transferring part, from the wheelchair to the bed or bathroom, that no one offers."

Until recently, the family managed with help from Carmel's other daughter, Aoife, performing a "three-man lift" during holidays.

However, with Aoife now living abroad, lifting Caoimhe is no longer possible, effectively putting family trips on hold.

That changed when hotelier Tom Randles, owner of Randles Hotel in Killarney, heard Carmel's story live on air. He reached out with an offer that left the family stunned. "We've just completed renovations,

and to my knowledge, we've built Ireland's first accessible suite with a hoist," said Tom. "It's also a family room, so it's suitable for both individuals and families." Moved by Carmel's story and drawing from personal experience with a friend who also faces accessibility barriers, Tom said he would be "delighted" to host the family free of charge.

Carmel was overwhelmed by the offer, calling it the "best news ever" and saying she couldn't imagine a more beautiful location than Killarney.

Thanks to Randles Hotel, Caoimhe and her family may now enjoy a much-needed and long-overdue holiday of their own.

THE RSA'S FREE CHECK IT FITS SERVICE IS BACK ON THE ROAD AND COMING BACK TO KERRY!

Over half of child car seats (54%) checked by the Road Safety Authority's Check It Fits service were incorrectly fitted and needed some type of adjustment to make them a safe fit. If a child's car seat isn't fitted correctly, it could lead to a serious or fatal injury in the event of a collision.

to a serious or fatal injury in the event of a collision. The RSA are delighted to announce that their face-to-face child car seat checking service – Check it Fits –is back on the road visiting locations around the country and is coming to Kerry on 16th 17th and 18th of July.

The service will be based in Aldi on Park Road on Wednesday 16 July 2025/ 10.00 am-5.30pm

Car seats may seem simple to install, but the installation is often easy to get wrong. The RSA have found that almost a third of seats fitted incorrectly needed major adjustments*. We know parents are not intentionally putting children in danger and it is an education issue. To help address this problem, the RSA is Check it Fits service will be visiting

to help parents and ensure car seats and restraints are correctly fitted.

The service takes between 10-15 minutes and runs from 10.00am – 5.30pm, it is free of charge and offers parents and guardians reassurance that their child is safe while travelling in the car. It is a walk-in service, no appointment needed. It is important to use your child car seat correctly every single time during a car journey so parents should regularly check the fitting of your child car seat or get it rechecked at a Check it Fits service. For example, if you got your child car seat fitted in winter now coming into the summer months you may need to tighten the harness as your children are wearing lighter clothes. If your child's car seat or restraint is incorrectly fitted, the Check it Fits experts will advise on how to fix the problem, demonstrate how to fit the restraint correctly and answer any queries participants might have to avoid potential serious or fatal injury in the event of a collision.

SMELL OF COFFEE V SMELL OF SLURRY

The smell from roasting coffee beans was a key reason the planning appeals board - now known as An Coimisiún Pleanala - turned down an appeal by Killarney Coffee Roasters to turn a storage unit in Upper Lissivigeen into a roasting operation.

Local residents said the smell permeated the air and they had to keep windows and doors closed. It was "sickening at the very least," the residents told Kerry County Council planners.

The coffee roasters appealed the council refusal and offered to put in a mitigating machine drawing out smells and noxious fumes and the planning inspector thought this would work.

The roasters were to operate one day a week during winter and to two days in the summer, they said.

Their amenity, namely fresh air, was being affected, the residents said.

The commission went against its own inspector and refused permission.. The roasting would devalue the residents' amenities and their property and there was also an issue with a food / industrial operation in the residential area. Not to diminish the concerns of the residents of Upper Lissivigeen - basically the board found the smell of roasting coffee beans would be too much for them - what would the commission say to the smell from slurry?

The other day on the way between the Gap



Cross and Beaufort Bridge I had to close up all the car windows. Stopping briefly I had to run for cover.

Sometimes going into shops surrounding Killarney I am running from it. What's the story with cattle slurry, I would like to know? All over this county I know of people who have to hide indoors and wash clothes hanging on the line because of the stink.

Is anyone monitoring slurry contractors and how they are spreading the hot liquid taken from tanks this the hottest time of year? I have asked the Department of Agriculture. But I won't hold my breath for a speedy response from them - though I and others may well be holding our noses.

The basic thing with smell or the olfactory sense, one of the five main senses, is to warn us humans. Smell signals are sent to the brain. If something smells bad, it usually is bad. Not all sweet aromas are good but all bad aromas are bad. Trust me, I have "a nose" for things that smell bad.

PLEASE ARRIVE EARLY EVEN IF IT IS KERRY AIRPORT

One of the great takeaways from this year's agm of Kerry Airport in the Ballygarry Estate Hotel in Tralee last week is the appeal to passengers to come early. Flights tend to bunch at Farranfore and Saturday mornings are particularly busy. The fact the airport is in Kerry there's a relaxed feeling by passengers who arrive last minute,

the annual meeting heard.

This is no bad thing. Airports are stressful places and any ease is welcome. I went out through Cork recently and did not enjoy it. The crowds, the exorbitant price for a basic tuna sandwich at over eight euro in a crowded departures area is enough to put me off Cork, not to mind flying.

Kerry is friendlier. But too many passengers arriving with little time to spare is putting a strain on things. Many arrive just 45 minutes ahead, we were told. This small airport has battled from gloomy predictions and threats to its existence to what is likely a record number of passengers this year - more than the 420,000 of 2009.

There is great credit due to Kerry airport. Now five million euro from its own reserves have gone into a new arrivals and departures area to be opened at the end of July.

There is still cash in the bank to lure aircarriers other than Ryanair, the agm heard. Not so long ago, in the late 1980s I was involved in the twinning between Killarney and Castiglione di Sicilia - the first international twinning. And a nice trip to Sicily it was too in July 1987.

A year or so later while hosting a renowned sculptor from Castiglione on a return visit- his gift to Killarney which is probably priceless now sits unselfconsciously on a wall in the town hall - we joked about direct flights from Farranfore to Siciily.

Now a direct flight to Sicily from Kerry is entirely possible. Even probable.

Meanwhile, chief financial officer Basil Sheerin, chief financial officer said

"Perhaps because it is Kerry," people arrived last minute, often forty minutes before departure, after the issue was raised.

"We need to get the message out there: Please come early," Basil appealed to passengers on the Kerry to Germany, Spain, France, London and Dublin routes.

A SHUTTLE SERVICE -BUT WHERE WILL IT LAND?

Shuttle buses for Killarney are to be in place within weeks, we were told at the last council meeting.

The shuttle service, involving three buses operating seven days, was "imminent," Kerry County Council Director of Roads Services Frank Hartnett revealed, when asked for an update by Councillor John O'Donoghue

The buses will start at 6 am and continue to pick up and drop off passengers until 11 pm.

The service is part of the Smart demand responsive transport programme for Killarney and is being funded by the National Transport Authority, managed by the Local Link service.

"They are finalising routes and a travel plan. It is imminent," the engineer said.

But the question is where will the buses land and where will they take off from?

I have a number of times raised the lack of public information with the

Local Link service, countywide.

The stops, the timetables, the routes, should be more visible, published in local papers, on line and at bus stops especially.

Last week Local link acknowledged there is a problem with communicating its routes. It said the matter was in hand and will be addressed in the coming weeks.

It would want to be - people simply don't know when and where the publicly funded buses are available.

Locals and visitors alike in Killarney will need to know where to get on and off the new shuttles in urban Killarney.

Meanwhile a number of readers have contacted the column to say the field next to St Mary's Cathedral would be ideal as a park and ride stop. Perhaps the owners of the Cathedral field, St Brendan's Trust, might be approached? There is little use for much of this field anymore.

Locations for park and ride were being identified was the response from the town management who said the routes will be "flexible" and involve corner to corner drop offs and will focus on inter urban trips.

Any relief from having to drive a car in and around Killarney will be welcome.

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CALLS GROW FOR URGENT APPROVAL OF STAND-ALONE CHEMOTHERAPY UNIT at University Hospital Kerry



Comfort for Chemo Kerry has issued an urgent appeal to the Minister for Health, Jennifer Carroll MacNeill, to expedite approval for a longpromised, stand-alone Chemotherapy and Haematology Unit at University Hospital Kerry (UHK).

In a strong statement released this week, the charity warned that the current temporary unit, established in 2023 as an interim solutio, is no longer capable of meeting the rising demand for cancer treatment in the region.

"The ward space re-enabled as an Interim Oncology Unit is wholly inadequate capacity-wise," the statement reads. "While the current services are delivered with utmost efficiency and dedication, the physical space simply does not meet current or future needs."

According to the Irish Cancer Society, the number of cancer patients in Ireland is expected to double over the next decade. Comfort for Chemo Kerry says this projection makes investment in a permanent, purposebuilt oncology and haematology unit at UHK not just necessary, but urgent.

"The people of Kerry absolutely require a new stand-alone Oncology and Haematology Unit," the group stated, adding that they "stand firm with and support the people of Kerry in advocating and urging the Minister for Health to expedite HSE capital funding approval" for the proposed project.

IKA Joins 4,000 Cyclists for the 2025 Ring of Kerry Cycle -

a Celebration of Life, Resilience, and Giving Back

The Irish Kidney Association (IKA) proudly participated in the iconic 170 km distance Ring of Kerry Cycle on 5th July 2025, an event that saw nearly 4,000 cyclists take to the roads for a remarkable cause. Among them, over 140 riders represented the IKA, many of whom were fundraising to support vital services for kidney patients across Ireland while raising organ donor awareness.

This was the 43rd Ring of Kerry Cycle. Since the inaugural cycle in 1982, the event has raised over €20 million for more than 200 charities and voluntary organisations. Kerry County Council has confirmed to Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill that funding has been made available for 3 new CCTV schemes in Killarney, covering; The Town Centre, Killarney Outer and Ballyspillane and the project now awaits sign off from An Garda Siochána Data Protection Office before proceeding.



Deputy Cahill had raised the matter by way of Parliamentary Question to the Minister for Justice, Home Affairs and Migration, Jim O'Callaghan in the Dáil recently as it has been brought up regularly by people living in Killarney, the business community and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

"I raised the matter in Dáil Éireann as well as with senior members of An Garda Siochána at the Joint Justice Committee. In modern society, CCTV coverage is vital for the protection of people and property and it is important that this scheme is up and running quickly" stated Deputy Cahill.

Danny Healy Rae, TD **Raises Planning and** Development Amendment Bill in Dail Eireann

I am glad to get the opportunity to talk on this important matter to allow extension of time for planning developments that are held up for one reason or another.

Indeed, we had this facility a few years ago, where applicants could get a second five years if they looked for it. The then Minister, in his wisdom, decided to stop that because he felt that developers were hoarding land, benefiting from time and gaining money without building any house. I hope that does not happen with this. It should be for people who have started or who intend to start and are coming to building the houses.

This strict urban-generated pressure clause is ruling many young boys and girls out of building a house in Kerry in places around Castleisland, Killarney, Killorglin, Kenmare and Dingle if they are out four or five miles from the town. These people were never coming out from town. They want to remain alongside their parents. They want to buy a site from a farmer locally. They are being deprived and denied the right to do that. That is wrong. I have spoken to the Minister privately. I have spoken to him at length in in the Chamber. I ask him to do something about that and ensure that these people get the chance to build their house. They are not asking for money or anything else. They are only asking for planning permission that I believe they are entitled to but, because of this clause, they are being ruled out. They are being stopped and denied and it is wrong. Many of these people who have failed to get in in the past few years have gone abroad. They have gone as far away as Australia and New Zealand because they could not build a house for themselves at home.

The local authorities should be empowered to build smaller standardtype houses or modular homes. I hope that the Minister will allow granny-type flats at the back of houses that the Government has spoken about, and continue with them, but it seems to be delaying a bit. I ask young couples that are building their own homes to build them smaller, and I ask the Government to encourage them to do so. There was a grant for houses that were built under 1,350 sq. ft in the 1970s and 1980s and people lived in them. Now they are building double that size and they are not using all the house, but it is costing them fortunes more to build the house

I plead with them to build smaller houses. They will save money and it will give them hope of getting going. VAT on building materials should be removed or reduced. There is no VAT on building materials in the North of Ireland or in the UK. I ask the Government to seriously consider that due to the cost of building houses. When houses have gone over €400,000, they are costing too much and are putting a noose around a young family's neck they may never disentangle themselves from.

HSE and GAA Launch Inclusive Cúl Camps Pilot in Munster

his summer, the HSE and the GAA are partnering on an exciting new pilot project aimed at expanding access to the popular GAA Cúl Camps for children with intellectual, physical, and sensory disabilities, as well as those with autism.

As part of this initiative, Inclusive Cúl Camps will be held in the Munster region, with two locations confirmed: CBS The Green in Tralee and Milltown GAA, both taking place in August. This collaboration between the HSE and the GAA marks a significant step towards making sport and recreation more inclusive for all children. The initiative will be rolled out nationwide in 2026, offering children with disabilities across the country the chance to participate fully in the fun and community spirit of GAA Cúl Camps.

The Health Service Executive (HSE) is committed to supporting people with disabilities to live full, independent lives in their communities. A key priority for the HSE is improving access for children and families to community-based services and supports. This work is carried out in partnership with the Department of Children, Disability (DCDE), and Equality families, disabled persons' organisations, service providers, and voluntary and community groups. Currently, approximately 10.8% of children in Ireland, more than 130,000 children, have a disability. Meeting their needs requires a collaborative approach that goes beyond health services alone.

GAA Cúl Camps offer boys and girls aged 6 to 13 a fun-filled, actionpacked week during the summer holidays. These camps focus on gamesbased learning, personal development, and wellbeing, all within a playercentred environment that celebrates inclusion and enjoyment.

In total, there will be 39 Inclusive Cúl Camps operating across the country this year, providing opportunities for over 1,100 children with additional needs to take part in a mainstream Cúl Camp experience.

WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

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Planning Permissions need to be granted to ease the housing crisis

Urgent action is required to address the lack of housing available across Ireland and Local Authorities are at the heart of the solution, according to Kerry TD, Michael Cahill. The Fianna Fáil man has written directly to the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD to request all Local Authorities to play their part in helping to address the Housing Crisis.

"Local Authorities urgently need to start granting Planning Permission for one off housing and I have called upon the Minister to request all Local Authorities to play their part in helping address the Housing Crisis. They can do this by amending their County Development Plans/Area Plans and granting Planning Permission to all applicants who clearly demonstrate a rural housing need. If an applicant is from the area, living in the area, working in the area, went to school in the area, they should qualify for Planning Permission to build a home in the area" stated Deputy Michael Cahill.



"We are forcing applicants onto our Housing lists by refusing one off houses. This has the affect of making the problem worse and we must reverse this now and get to a situation where houses are available to those who need them" said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism.

"I am anxious to get housing units available for all and I have urged that we introduce good quality Modular Housing to increase the supply available. Modular houses are available at a very high standard, are economical to heat and maintain and have a life span of up to 80 years. Many people have told me that they would be delighted with such a home. Young couples in Killorglin, Cahersiveen, Castleisland, Killarney, Dingle and Kenmare confirmed to me that they would be very happy with a Modular home" said the Rossbeigh TD.

"Free up land, relax planning requirements and introduce Modular Housing and I believe that a marked improvement will be seen in early course in our efforts to house our people, I believe. Naturally we do need a mix of affordable, social, private, including low cost sites" stated Michael Cahill TD.

"My son Councillor Tommy Cahill has also raised this matter in Kerry County Council and he will pursue this important issue for our people" added Deputy Cahill.

STORM WATER OVERFLOWS

At the recent Killarney Municipal District Kerry County Council Meeting, Cllr. John O'Donoghue requested that the council would write to Uisce Éireann to ask how many times were the Storm Water Overflow valves in Killarney checked during 2024 to ensure all were working correctly and that all necessary screens etc were still in place.

These screens are vital during times of heavy rainfall when our storm water network and sewerage network overflow into one another, a system which is far from ideal but regrettably is the norm in towns around our country due to our sewerage systems dating back to Victorian times.

Ideally, Uisce Éireann would spend millions rectifying this anomaly, but it will not happen any time soon as the figures required would actually run into billions they don't have. These screens prevent solid pieces of raw sewage from entering out waterways and it is of utmost importance that they are checked regularly to ensure they are working correctly. As I have mentioned previously in this chamber, one only has to look to Lough Neagh to see what can happen when proper procedure and checks are not in place. Our Lakes of Killarney are the jewel in our crown and must be protected.

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KERRY 3-12 KILDARE 0-11

A brace of first half goals from hat-trick hero Síofra O'Shea, while her side were playing against the elements, gave Kerry the foothold they needed to overcome Kildare in the TG4 All-Ireland SFC quarter-final at Austin Stack Park. Even though the Lilywhites got off to a very strong start, notching four points in the opening nine minutes to take the early ascendancy, the concession of the two green flags before the break was a hammer blow to the visitors.

With Alannah Prizeman (two frees), Aoife Rattigan and Gillian Wheeler all finding the target for the Leinster side, the Kingdom were slower out of the blocks before they struck for their first goal in the tenth minute.

A cross-field kick from Niamh Carmody, and a pass from Cáit Lynch slipped advancing centre-

back Emma Costello through the Kildare defence, and after her shot was parried by goalkeeper Mary Hulgraine, O'Shea was on hand to tap home the rebound.

Danielle O'Leary was now getting into her stride, and the Rathmore attacker fired over two points, with a Rachel Dwyer effort sandwiched in between. Ciara Wheeler and Prizeman responded at the other end, and the protagonists were level after 22 minutes (1-3 to 0-6).

The Kingdom edged in front before the half's most crucial moment in the 24th minute when Niamh Ní Chonchúir set up O'Shea inside the Kildare cover and, after being fouled while in the act of shooting by Lauren Murtagh, a penalty was awarded.

The Kerry full-forward picked herself up off the ground to beat the visiting custodian with a

low spot-kick to the 'keeper's right and, despite Prizeman's trojan work, a superb Anna Galvin point had the defending champions four up at the break (2-5 to 0-7).

Kildare needed a boost early on the resumption, but Prizeman had a goal-bound shot blocked on the line by Kerry captain Lynch, before Kerry, and O'Shea, pounced for green flag number three in the 39th minute to end the game as a contest.

Midfielder Galvin was the instigator, fetching a kick-out and sending a pinpoint delivery to O'Shea, who gave Hulgraine no mistake. From there to the finish, the hosts were always in control, eventually cruising home by a tenpoint margin to set up a last-four meeting with either Meath or Tipperary.

JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...



SEÁN DOHERTY RIP

From the late 1800s, gaelic football was as much a cultural movement as a sporting one. You could trace the fledgeling history of a newly minted republic that lauded a genuinely glorious past but wasn't afraid to fill in the gaps with imagination. A nation of small farmers and devout catholics. It was pithily summed up in De Valera's 'comely maidens dancing at the crossroads' speech - and even that was unfair on De Valera, who was economically conservative and insular (I would argue to our detriment) but socially more progressive in many ways than people rise. Love or loathe him, he cast a huge shadow for half a century young people who could afford it were actually wilder and more daring during the jazz age of the twenties in Ireland than is generally acknowledged, but that was easily brushed aside. And gaelic football, in many ways, echoed that conservatism. 'Catch and kick' was not so much a tactic as a mantra.

The sixties created a cultural explosion. Implosion, maybe. Education became standard. Industry began to rival agriculture and slowed the tide of emigration. Tourism grew exponentially. Cars and transport became affordable. Young people stayed, and social housing and jobs meant that they could. It is impossible from this remove to explain how Irish society advanced a century inside a single decade.

Young people had education, opinions, and a willingness to challenge the social order. And the GAA, always a strong undercurrent of Irish society, began to reflect that. Did the touring sides of Aussie Rules teams inspire the change? I think it's exaggerated as a factor; the change was inevitable as society changed.

Cork were first. The early seventies. Lightning teenagers, with minor medals in their pockets,

running no less a team than traditional giants and recent two-time champions Kerry ragged. It wasn't that young Jimmy Barry Murphy was a skinhead, the Rebel County's youth were up for the punk movement long before it had a name. It was that Cork's older generation loved this dashing and soft-spoken skinhead. In 1973 a Cork sidelike none that had ever preceded them beat Galway in the All Ireland Final.

Heffernan, that old wolf, was watching. Heffernan was old Dublin, once the darling of the masses himself. A Vincents man to the core. Love or hate the arrogance of Vincents (and plenty Dublin GAA folk inclined towards the latter), they were the foundation of Dublin GAA. Heffernan was looking at this new wave of gaelic football. People say that he was reluctant to take the tiller for Dublin in 1974. I've never believed that, still don't. Heffernan could read the wind. Down in South Kerry, an old opponent was paying attention as well.

Heffernan needed a core group of players who could ignore the past and play only for him. He was the first GAA manager – he would answer to no committee. And he picked men who would stay the hard road. The first one was obvious. Paddy Cullen was champions UCD's nomination for the captaincy; Heffernan gave it instantly to Seán Doherty. It was a good choice. The Doc had actually played U21 for Wicklow before donning a Dublin senior jersey in 1968. That might have created resentment, except that nobody else was unting that jersey. Dublin were barely going through the motions in those vears. It was a soccer town, the 'gah' was for unsophisticated culchies. But if Dublin football was rough and ready, so was the Doc. He wasn't winning much, but he was having horse's fun and he was good at it. No team had any fears of playing a fairly downtrodden Dublin, fairly unloved even by their own city brethren, but no players was in any hurry to test out the Doc either. In 1973, Doc and Jimmy Keaeney were stewards watching Billy Morgan lift the Sam

Maguire. Doc still had the flicker of a dream – Keaveney was long gone from Dublin. He had served his time.

1974. Dublin won the Corn na Casca – in hard currency, it might be the equivalent of a shirt button. Leinster was about Offaly, Meath, Kildare, in that order. Dulin had no hope.

Except that Dublin were training as never before. Mickey Whelan brought new methods, true, but it was dogs' work. And with Doc and a few old soldiers like him, there was no shirking. Keaveney was coaxed back in.

Wexford. Not contenders, but not easy meat for the likes of Dublin either. Few enough spectators, but those who did got value for money. Bobby Doyle and Tony Hanahoe with goals. Louth up next, a decent Louth outfit. Hickey and young Mullins with the goals, Keaveney with six points. Nobody was shouting it from the rooftops, but around the docks and the tenements and the discos, lads were talking. 'Gah' was only'gah', but these were their own, and maybe worth backing. Weren't they trying, at least, and isn't life hard enough? It didn't hurt that both soccer and rugby were at a low ebb.

Dublin, like a lot of Irish society, considered itself classless. Which was absolute rubbish. Dublin was as socially segregated as anywhere. Jane Austen could have written a book on Dublin in the seventies – although she would have had to increase her vocabulary a small bit.

That was the magic of the Doc. More than any of them, more than Heffernan. A qualified doctor, he could drink a pint with dockers or Lord Mayors and not care which was which, and they all loved him for it. He was a quintessential Dubliner. Maybe more than that – the Doc belted plenty players in his time, including Kerrymen. Think you can find a single one to say a bad word about the Doc? Good luck with that.

Offaly in the quarter-final. End of the road, surely. Offaly were a serious power back then, still a very underrated team. Nobody gave Dublin a hope.

That was the day that he gaelic football world spun on its axis. Offaly were greeted by a Blue Army of fans. Almost a thousand – unheard of! A riot of colour and noise. GAA spectators were supposed to be respectfully appreciative – Dubliners weren't particularly respectful of anything! Just before half-time, Leslie Deegan got a fist to the ball ahead of the advancing Martin Furlong, and Dublin were a point ahead. The supporters were starting to believe. The players were just hanging on. Level pegging in the dying seconds. Deegan again, a high, hopeful effort. It went over. Faith rewarded.

Dublin was buzzing. The players were celebrities, and not just in a local sense. Not that the likes of Doc or Paddy Cullen cared. Kildare were dismissed with a certainly that belied Dublin's dormant decade. Meath in the final. The old enemy. Dublin and Meath could always raise bristles on each other (no bad thing; personally I like to see Meath back this year as real contenders). An imperious Keaveney kicked 1-8 as Dublinwon with plenty to spare.

Cork. The champions. Old friends in many ways. Cork respected Dublin, but the Dubs had been working while Cork had been celebrating the All Ireland. It showed. Dublin filled a lot of Croke Park now. The supporters didn't let Dublin down, and the players responded. You can argue that hubris cost Cork, but I think you can say that hubris carried Dublin that day too, Galway were a very good football side but a fading force in the All Ireland Final. It was actually a poor game. But so what? The Dc lifted the Sam Maguire. And then, Dublin to the core, he left it after him and went for a few pints.

A year later it was an unfancied Kerry team of bachelors who caught favourites Dublin by surprise. Hubris. O'Dwyer and Heffernan were watching each other with narrowed eyes. They became friends in later years, but only much later. Kerry had a youthful confidence, none more so than the Ballyvourney schools star Mickey Ned O'Sullivan. He raced at the heart of Dublin....that was the Doc's domain, with Alan Larkin beside him. Mickey Ned woke up in hospital, young Pat Spillane having lifted the trophy instead of him. The Doc was never going to get out of his way – Tim Kennelly or Páidí would have understood the reasoning.

A year later it was Kerry versus Dulin again. Kerry were caught for two late goals. Seán Doherty was immense, bursting out to set up the winner.

1977. Heffernan had stepped down. There wasn't too much discussion on his replacement. The senior players, the likes of O'Driscoll, Keaveney, Doc, almost took it for granted that Hanahoe would step up. And he did. They all had extra incentive. Dublin had played Kerry in New York shortly after the league final, a charity match for Sr. Consilio. It was the Doc;'s busiest game for Dublin – in his professional capacity. Both teams were sour enough and Kerry wanted to lay down a marker. Very few people saw the game. Was it as bad as legend has it? Probably. But even if it wasn't, the likes of the Doc weren't afraid to embellish stories. It made no difference when it came to championship. Once again nobody could stay with Dublin. The Doc's third and last All Ireland.

1978. Kerry had paid their apprenticeship, Dublin were beginning to feel the hard miles in their legs. In fairness, they were the two greatest teams of their own or any era, but age caught up with one of them sooner than the other. Mikey Sheehy and Paddy Cullen immortalised by Con O'Houlihan and his image of burning cakes. Eoin the Bomber Liston announcing his arrival with a hat-trick. Dublin just couldn't stay with them. Even the Doc's tank was empty. It was his last game for Dublin.

Our friend, the enemy. The Doc epitomised Dublin. He never gave the slightest inch to any Kerry team, nor ever would. He never made a single enemy in Kerry either. May he rest in peace.

KERRY LOSE OUT IN PULSATING FINAL Minor All Ireland

They could have given no more. It was absolutely magnificent. Despite being on the losing side, it was a performance that made me enormously proud to be a Kerryman. Honestly, I've seen Kerry teams give less and win All Irelands. This one gave everything they had and it just wasn't enough. Fair play to Tyrone; that's a fantastic outfit. Tyrone look like they could do a full sweep, just like Kerry did back in 1975. Remember how Kerry got on in the following years? We'll be seeing a lot more of the Red Hand. No harm in that, and no neutral will be objecting after watching this game. Maybe it's the new rules, maybe it's just the sheer quality of the footballers on either side. But that game was so good I can even live with losing. They could not have done us any prouder.

Tyrone were the team that everyone was talking about before any ball was thrown in for the Ulster championship. Let's face it; Ulster football is setting a different standard nowadays, and Munster, unfortunately, is not particularly competitive. Uncomfortable truth? It's true nonetheless, and there isn't much we can do about it.

Tyrone took early possession, but were very cautious with it. A lot of back-passing and probing for gaps. A lot of teams are starting to do that - it feels like a backward step to me, an attempt to negate the positivity of the new rules. In the end Diarmuid Martin took the shot, but it curled wide. Tyrone won the kick-out (to say that Tyrone had a physical edge over Kerry is an understatement, that's as big a minor team as I've seen) but Tadhg Ó Slatara made a brilliant block on Pearse McDonnell.

Good break forward by Danny Murphy, that's been something of a trademark of his throughout this championship. Kerry recycled it, but with more purpose, and John Curtin boomed over a great score. Tyrone were back straight away, though, Darren McAnespie winning and converting a free. Once again Tyrone turned over Kerry's kick-out and Thomas Meenan set up Peter Colton for a point.

Talk about end to end stuff. Gearóid White steadied himself and split the posts. Kevin Griffin with a chance, but the angle was too tight. I didn't think going for it was the best decision but then again, Tyrone closed him down really fast. At the other end, big midfielder Jmaes Mulgrew went for the two pointer. It tailed off, but that wasn't far away. I like players having the confidence to back themselves; too many coaches try to stifle that instinct instead of nurturing it. Ben Kelliher won a good ball at the other end, but Elliot Kerr nipped it off him with ease. Great defending.

Both sides were exhibiting great skill, but Tyrone's greater strength was beginning to

show. Diarmuid Martin kicked a nice point. Ben Kelliher was beginning to work his way into space, though, and he set up Tadhg O'Connell for an equalising point.

James Mulgrew burst through and blazed a rocket over the bar. Was he going for goal? I don't think so, but there's no way of telling. Back came Kerry again, John Curtin setting up Tadhg O'Connell for a point. Cathal Farley kicked a nice point, but Ben Kelliher, definitely beginning to find space now, replied in kind.

Tyrone were just about shading the general play, but Kerry were staying with them. Mulgrew, always dangerous, had another go at a two pointer; this time it split the posts. Peearse McDonald won a free off Eoghan Joy. Nothing malicious, but Eoin Long slotted over. 0-8 to 0-5.

David Sargent was probably Kerry's best player overall. He showed a fantastic bit of skill in volleying a pass under pressure. Eventually it led to a foul on Ben Kelliher and Gearóid White converted. That was an important score, we couldn't let this Tyrone team get a run on us.

In fact, it was Kerry doing a lot of the running now. Danny Murphyraided up the field for a fine score. Tyrone won possession from the kick-out but John Curtin made a good interception and Kerry moved fast and direct. Danny Murphy again carried it into the danger-zone down the right hand side, drawing the defence before slipping it back to Ben Kelliher. That opened just enough space for the Crokes' sharpshooter – it doesn't take a lot – and Ben sliced inside before placing a clinical shot out of Ronan Donnelly's reach. That was a huge moment at the end of a pulsating half hour of football.

Half-time Kerry 1-7 Tyrone 0-8

A lively Aodhán Quinn kicked a fine point to open the second half scoring. A foul on PearseMcDonald saw Eoin Long convert a placed ball again and Tyrone were level. Tadhg O'Connell nudged Kerry back in front from a very tight angle but Diarmuid Martin replied with a beauty.

Kerry were under pressure around the middle now, but Alex Touhy was awesome in the contests and Mark O'Carroll wasn't far behind, while Kerry's defence was rock solid.

Gearóid White fired over a great two pointer. Eoin Long replied with a free but Kevin Griffin, who had also come out to bolster midfield, swung over a two pointer of his own. Kerry could also have had a goal after Kevin Griffin gobbled up a careless kick-out by Ronan Donnelly. He laid it off to Ben Keliher but, just as he was about to pull the trigger, in came Elliot Kerr with a really brilliant interception. Again, magnificent defending. Nonetheless, Kevin Griffin pointed the '45 and Kerry were ahead by 1-13 to 0-12.

Kerry were visibly flagging now, though, and it was taking some great defending on Kerry's side to repel Tyrone attacks. They were swarming us, more or less, and Kerry just couldn't quite clear their lines, eventually coughing up a point to sub Matthew F. Daly. Eoin Long had already hit the post – Tyrone were a bit profligate with all their possession now – but made amends after

a good pass from Cathal Farley. 1-13 to 0-14.

Disaster. Tyrone were completely dominant now and coming at Kerry in waves. Sub Matthew F. Daly burst through, was promptly wrapped up, and a body collision with his legs took him down. Look, I'm going to court Kerry controversy here, but I had a good look and examined replays from a couple of different angles. It's deliberate impediment, not a tackle, and yes, that's a penalty all day long. Patriots and true believers will disagree, but any neutral is awarding a penalty to Tyrone there and in my honest opinion, referee Thomas Murphy was absolutely correct to blow the whistle. Up stepped Peter Colton to send Ruairi Kennedy the wrong way and put Tyrone in front.

Still Kerry, running on fumes at this stage, refused to buckle. Danny Murphy made one more foray forward to kick an equaliser. James Mulgrew had an awful miss for Tyrone, Gearóid White had a good effort tail away for Kerry. With normal time just up, Ben Kelliher launched one last Kerry rocket that was tipped over his crossbar by Donnelly. Tyrone sent the ball out again, with Kerry catching it but being forced out over the line and a player kicking the ball away in a desperate bid to buy a few seconds. Desperate....but costly, as the referee brought the ball forward and Peter Colton clipped over the free. Level pegging again and just a minute of injury time to play. James Mulgrew raced in again - Kerry just had nobody to keep pace with the big man at this stage. It wasn't a great shot, coming back off the woodwork, but an alert Diarmuid Martin was on hand to gather the rebound and put it over for the winning score.

The biggest moment of drama was still to come. Once again that whirling dervish Ben Kelliher managed to get his hands on the ball and spin around his man to cut inside. Could he have fisted it over? Easy for me to be talking, and frankly I don't think we had the legs left to stay withTyrone through extra-time anyway. More importantly, was he fouled? Once again, I have to honestly say no. Of course a lot of Kerry fans will say that it was a definite penalty, just as most Tyrone supporters will say no chance. My honest call, again after careful consideration? No. Body collision, but a perfectly legitimate one - there's absolutely no obligation on a defender to get out of the attacker's way. So there is contact, but it is not illegal contact, and there's no penalty.

Deserved victory by Tyrone, but Kerry left nothing behind them. It takes two great teams to make a game to echo down the ages; this one will.

LADIES SEE OFF LILYWHITE CHALLENGE All Ireland Quarter-Final KERRY 3-12 KILDARE 0-11

Just two years ago Kildare were a Division Two team aiming for promotion, while Kerry were well on their way to a Division One title and aiming to end a long wait for the Brendan Martin Cup. It's not that simple though. Kerry weren't exactly long out of Division Two themselves and even then, I considered Kildare to be a county putting in a lot of work and underage and, quite simply, doing their business right. I'll admit that I did not expect them to be seeing off Armagh this year -Armagh have given us plenty of tough lessons in the last couple of years - but I honestly wouldn't think it all that huge a shock. I still had Kerry as strong favourites here, especially with the advantage of a home guarter-final. I wonder if the mens' format, poor and overstretched as it has been in recent years - 'pre-quarter-final games' in a sixteen team competition, oh boy! - would consider taking a leaf out of the better organised ladies' playbook? Arrah, maybe the changes in the mens' championship will work next year. Maybe.

I'd be wary of Kildare, and increasingly wary of them over the next number of years if they

continue on their present trajectory, but at the moment I felt confident that Kerry had greater versatility and more scoring power, especially in scoring goals.

Jaysus, but Kildare had me questioning my judgement very quickly. Kerry weren't doing anything wrong, getting their hands on ball quickly and moving it forward at pace. Quick to switch the line of attack, too The only problem is that Kildare were able to soak it up while maintaining their shape and force us into pressure passes congested areas. Really excellent defending.

They weren't afraid to break themselves either. Alanahh Prizeman opened the scoring with a free and Aoife Rattigan doubled Kildare's lead. Gillian Wheeler clipped over another and Prizeman's second free made it 0-4 to 0-0. Worryingly, it's not even as if Kerry were playing poorly or slow out of the starting blocks; Kildare were playing really good, confident football.

At last Kerry hit a rhythm. Niamh Carmody switched play across to the raiding Cáit Lynch, who drew the defender before neatly slipping it off to Emma Costello. I don't know how long Emma has been wearing a Kerry senior jersey – 2009 maybe? Certainly if there is one player who knows what to do in a situation like this.... Emma sent a rocket of a shot towards goal. In fairness to Mary Hulgraine, she did brilliantly to parry....but Siofra O'Shea is an old hand in these situations as well, and neatly nipped in to rattle the net.

It's not that the goal rattled Kildare, more that it inspired Kerry. I reckon Danielle O'Leary already has another All Star in the bag. She showed why by quickly firing over. 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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

The past year has seen three priests, David, Sospeter and Timothy arrive on loan to us from Eldoret diocese in Kenya. Also arrived is a priest from India, of the Order of St Camillus Fr Arlappa, who will be a chaplain in UHK (the Order has a special charism for hospital ministry). He will be joined by a colleague before the Autumn. We are deeply grateful for their support and that of their dioceses. Their presence challenges us all to truly live our faith, to ask God to send laborers into the harvest, - to call from among us vocations to the priesthood to serve our needs.

Facing the ongoing challenge posed by having fewer priests to minister in our parishes, the past year has been very important. We commissioned twentyfive parishioners as pastoral leaders following an intensive preparation course. Also, five candidates for the permanent diaconate are completing their formation program. They will serve in every parish alongside all who are already involved as volunteers, some who have given many hours of service over many, many years: Eucharistic Ministers, Readers, committee members, etc., not forgetting our secretaries and sacristans. The great challenge is for priests and parishioners together to be in a position to have the fullness of parish life in all our parishes. Let us face that challenge with confidence.

I am conscious that some of our churches only have Mass every second weekend and others no longer have a weekend Mass. Our challenge is to ensure there is a Mass in every parish every weekend. Faced with ministering in more than one parish and thus extra churches, our priests have not been found wanting. The evolving situation makes demands of all, parishioners and priests. We come together around the altar to worship and give thanks to God Our Lord and Creator.

Can I humbly ask all parishioners to be faithful to weekend Mass, Saturday evening or Sunday morning.

How healthy are numbers joining in the celebration of weekend Masses in your parish?

Taking the time to join in the celebration of the Mass is a call to look at the bigger picture, of the meaning, motivation and purpose of all our lives as one week ends and another begins. Am I happy with the week gone by? Am I ready for the challenge of the week ahead? Do I trust in the presence of God, his love and care for us all and his call to love and care for each other? Is it important that our children grow up with a sense of Sunday as the Lord's Day and a Day of Rest? Have I that sense of Sunday in my own life?

The past ten, twenty years have seen significant changes in how people choose to marry. Less than half of marriages now take place in Church. Marriage is an enormous gift: a couple entering a life-long loving union; the birth and rearing of children - family life; the continuity of humanity from generation to generation, - childhood, parenthood, grandparenthood and beyond. For most, despite all the challenges and the major things that can go wrong, marriage is a wonderful, life-long, fulfilling and loving union. Our faith is that it is not just our own doing, - it is God's will for us too, God is ever present and ever loving in the couple's marriage and home. On their wedding day a couple ask and receive God's assurance and blessing, God will be with them, their strength and guide. God blesses the journey they are setting out on, their union that will ever bear fruit.
