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

No donation is too small and we look forward to seeing some of you on the 28th of October! Donations also welcomed on the day.




Killarney Ladies Turn On The Style for

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

HEALTHY IRELAND WALKING TRACKS INITIATIVE

A total of €50,000 in funding for pitch side walking track facilities has been announced for 2 Kerry sports clubs today. Killorglin AFC (soccer) and Killarney RFC (rugby) have been granted €25,000 each under the Irish Rugby Football Union and the Football Association of Ireland Healthy Ireland Walking Track initiative, which has been welcomed by Fianna Fáil

Councillor, Michael Cahill.

Cahill, a Kerry General Election candidate has said these facilities are very welcome, as they promote increased physical activity amongst all ages and improve accessibility for people with mobility issues, such as older people and wheelchair users.

"This €1m allocation is the second phase

of Healthy Ireland Walking Tracks initiative, following the awarding of €1.6m in funding to GAA clubs. Accessibility is key to encouraging everyone to take part in healthy outdoor exercise in a safe environment" added Councillor Cahill.



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Dig Killarney!

There's a real chance the coin found by Colm Doyle of Kelly's Villas on Inisfallen Island - the story was first aired here in the Outlook Killarney and it has since got huge traction - may be returned, on loan, to Ross Castle. This is in line with Colm's wishes for the piece of history he handed into the national museum authorities.

Fully identified now, as dating from between 1547 to 1550, there is at least half a theory it was thrown into the lake for luck. Much like the wishing well at Syracuse in Sicily, or Dinis Cottage, the casting of a metal coin to water for luck is ancient. Wouldn't you love to know if the person nearly 500 years ago enjoyed luck? The coin may be uncovered, but the story is unlikely to come to light. Alas.

It is only the second such groat ever found in Kerry and Colm's Inisfallen coin is of much better quality than the previous one found in Milltown.

In the meantime, Helen O'Carroll curator and manager of the Kerry County Museum tells us the National Museum has identified it as "almost certainly Irish", posthumous Henry VIII, with HENRIC 8 on the obverse and CIVITAS DUBLINIE (city of Dublin), on the reverse.

Helen says it is difficult to say how the Inisfallen coin got onto the monastic island. It may well have been "a casual loss".

"Another possibility is that it was thrown in the water for luck," Ms O'Carroll says.

Inisfallen ruins are in the hands of the OPW just as Ross Castle is as both are national monuments.

Helen has also said that she is not aware of any plans by the OPW to excavate Inisfallen. This is a great pity.

This past summer was the third year of "Dig Tralee" an archaeological excavation at Knockanacuig, the site of a prehistoric monument complex The dig is led by a team of professional archaeologists with support from community volunteers.

And all those over 18 with an interest in archaeology can apply for a place on the summer digs.

People outside Killarney are always digging at Killarney!

Is it about time we in Killarney had "a dig Killarney", perhaps on Inisfallen itself? And could we ask that our councillors advocate for such a project? Please!

Time for a deer fence

I have had a number of reports of deer collisions and near collisions in Muckross and near misses almost everywhere. The figures for the reds, and for the sika numbers culled within Killarney National Park are put at 250 last year with more than 250 to be taken out this year.

But we are already told that outside of the national park 4528 sika were shot in Kerry last year.

Last week we spoke about Martin's Wall and it has become a talking point. (Everyone I met think it's a great idea - lower the height of the Mission Road wall and put up a railing so that the views of the national park can be

appreciated from the town in line with what Martin has said).

This would be a job for the NPWS in consultation with the county council so both bodies would have to be lobbied.

Meanwhile deer are roaring and whistling because it is that time of year again. When the deer are rutting there is movement, sometimes blind chasing by red mad stags of whole groups of females across roads and railways.

We should be erecting fencing all along the boundary of the park on the Fossa and the Muckross side at least as far as Muckross House. Similar measures are taken in France and there does not seem to be a problem. Yet, approaches by various people here in the light of fatal accidents with suspected deer involvement including from the late coroner Terence Casey - are always rejected by the NPWS.

It is surely time to involve our roads authorities too and get them to fund proper fencing and get political commitment from the major parties for the money. Its a shame that at a time when nine million euro can be set aside for phone purses which no one sought that vital fencing which is being sought year after year is not even entertained. Nine million would put up a lot of fencing around the Killarney national park.



Noise monitoring in Killarney is needed.

Buskers are not half the problem these days since the street performer bylaws on street acts were introduced.

What it means is that no busker is on one spot for too long so the town is not deafened from bad music and the same tune over and over again.

Kerry County Council enforcement officers are equipped with sound monitors to test sound levels of street singers under the laws.

They are also deciding on the quality of the music .

All street performances are now to be limited to two hours in the one location. Performers then have to move "more than 50m" in order to continue.

All busking stops at 9 pm. But this column would encourage the council to keep its baton out and widen its remit.

There is an urgent need to tackle all musical noise in this town.

Surely someone needs to monitor the noise from pubs and premises on our streets in the evenings. Last week I myself experienced music blaring from premises onto the streets at 7pm and at 9 pm. At a time when we are supposedly encouraging town centre living, is this fair on residents and those already living over our streets?

The council tells me the busking bylaws only apply to on-street

performers. However there are noise pollution regulations and laws which apply to premises that are streetside.

"Instances of alleged noise nuisance reported to the Environment Section are investigated on a case-by-case basis. The appropriate action is taken based on the investigation findings up to an including enforcement action where appropriate," a council spokesman said.

Staying healthy together this winter

The winter vaccination campaign for HSE South West gets underway today, with the roll-out of the free flu and COVID-19 vaccines to recommended groups. Everyone aged 60 years and older, anyone with a long-term health condition, and pregnant women are all encouraged to make an appointment

Both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines are available from participating GPs and pharmacies and can be given at the same time.

The children's flu vaccine (a nasal spray) is also available from participating GPs and pharmacists and is available in schools for all children aged 2 to 17

HSE vaccination teams will also provide both vaccines for people living in residential care facilities, including nursing homes, and housebound patients. Dr Anne Sheahan, Area Director for Public Health Medicine, HSE South West,

"Each winter season, our immunity to viruses drop, so it's important to top up your flu vaccine now and get your COVID-19 booster when it is due. People can safely receive both vaccines at the same time for free through participating GP practices and pharmacies. The children's flu vaccine or nasal Dr Andy Phillips, Regional Executive Officer (REO) for Health Service Executive (HSE) spray is also available to those eligible and aged between 2 to 17 years."

Kathleen O'Mahony, Acting Head of Service for Health, Wellbeing and Strategy, Cork Kerry Community Healthcare said:

It's important for all families to be vaccinated over the coming months. Vaccinations are crucial in safeguarding against preventable diseases, and this winter is no exception. If you have recently has COVID-19, we recommend waiting at least three months between having the virus and getting your for Public Health Medicine, HSE South West; Dr Andy Phillips, Regional Executive COVID-19 vaccine. If you are unsure if you are due a vaccine, please check hse. Officer (REO) for Health Service Executive (HSE) South West; Tess O'Donovan, Chief ie, call HSELive on 1800 700 700 or talk to a participating GP or pharmacist.

THE SECOND WOMEN'S SHED TO OPEN IN KERRY WAS LAUNCHED ON THURSDAY 3RD OF OCTOBER BY SHEILA MARTIN, THE SECRETARY OF THE PHOENIX WOMEN'S SHED IN TRALEE AND CHAIRPERSON OF THE KILLARNEY WOMEN'S SHED AND THE MESSAGE TO THE GATHERING IS THAT KILLARNEY WOMEN'S SHED NEED A PERMANENT HOME.

The first Women's Shed was set up two years ago, the Phoenix Women's Shed in Tralee and has gone from strength to strength, recently receiving TWO community awards, one SILVER award and also the BEST Community Start up. "A few Killarney based women attending the Women's Shed in Tralee, approached me, knowing I was also Killarney based, and asked about setting up a Shed in Killarney. So, after some deliberation, a group of us set about working towards the objective, of setting up a Women's Shed in Killarney", Sheila told the launch.

"We organised a public meeting and 145 women turned up to the Methodist Church; we expected about 50 women to show up...and were completely overwhelmed. Women were outside the door and in the hall and of course ---- not enough chairs.

That morning, we got the message loud and clear that the women of Killarney wanted a Women's Shed!", Sheila said.

The group held events in July in the Methodist Church, they closed for August and reopened in September in the Killarney Avenue Hotel because the church was too small for them. Regularly now, we have between 70 and 125 women attending our weekly Shed events.

The SHED is about providing an inclusive space for women, a community of kindness and support. It is about engagement, social connection and peer support.

Women need connection in their community especially in today's society and especially after they have reared their families and their careers are behind them.

Sheds provide a sense of community and offer opportunities to learn new skills, develop new interests, be creative and to keep up to date with legal and financial changes.

Women can participate in many forms of healthy activities such as yoga, meditation, tai chi, dancing and other exercise classes. There are also informative talks by experts; there are day trips and of course – parties!!!

As women, of course, we can simply sit, drink

tea, eat the cake and have a heart to heart chat. Overall, Sheds are a place where women can feel relaxed, safe and welcome.

"Our ultimate goal in Killarney is to have our own premises. We would settle for a log cabin, a modular building, that we could call our own, and access at any time. Currently in Tralee and in Killarney we are dependent on renting a space for one morning a week.

"In Killarney town, we are really in dire straits. There is not one single 'County Council' owned community hall. This has been a major problem for women's groups over the decades. I raised it personally in 2008, when I completed a piece of research for the SKDP, on the needs of women in the greater Killarney area.

The conclusions from the research reached both national and local press and the local radio. Women wanted a space in the town that they could access any time, as a one stop shop for information, a meeting place, a supportive space to just pop in for a coffee. I naively thought that having presented the evidence, that the Council would be forthcoming and provide something.

Here we are in 2024, 16 years later and nothing has changed. And yet much has changed. Women's Sheds are becoming a powerful movement in Ireland, speaking up for the wellbeing of women and providing direct services to them.

"The women of Killarney have identified a need and I call upon the KCC counsellors to do something for the Women's Sheds of Kerry as a way of addressing the 'quality of life' and The 'Age Friendly Society' referred to in the Development Plan especially for those women over 60 years", Sheila told the gathering.

In Killarney, ideally, a plot of land is needed on which we could erect a modular building in a relatively short space of time and with minimum cost. This is not much to ask. We literally have no where to go, as a group of women, for our events/meetings.

Having said that we are committed to making the Killarney Women's Shed A GREAT SUCCESS. We have a strong and cohesive team of amazing women. Our track record speaks for itself.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers. PROPERTY PARTNERS GALLIVAN

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

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KERRY'S JUNIOR CYCLE CANDIDATES deliver superb results



2024 Junior Cycle exam results were issued by the State Examinations (SEC) last Wednesday. 72,828 candidates nationwide, including 2,186 from Kerry sat the exam last June compared to 70,727, including 2,148 from Kerry, last year. Last year was the first time ever that a junior cycle exam exceeded 70,000, clearly indicative of substantial population growth in that age profile and higher retention rates in postprimary education. Junior Cycle exam results in Kerry were superb and on par with the very high standard of last year. The results again confirm that candidates have adapted well to the new grade descriptors.

DESCRIPTORS

Six grade descriptors - Distinction, Higher Merit, Merit, Achieved, Partially Achieved, Not Graded - are now used in the reformed Junior Cycle programme, replacing the old A, B, C, D, E, F and NG grades. The Junior Cycle exams were cancelled in 2020 and 2021 and replaced with a system of school assessments. Since 2022, when the Junior Cycle exam was once again held post covid, all subjects are examined under the new Junior Cycle grade descriptors. English, Irish and Mathematics are examined at both higher and ordinary levels while all other subjects are examined at common level. As and from last year's Junior Cycle exams, Irish is examined at two strands with T1 aimed at native speakers and T2 aimed at non-native speakers.

COMMENDED

The Junior Cycle exam results were issued late last year, on 18th October, so Minister Norma Foley and the SEC must be commended for getting the results out nine days earlier this year. The increased availability of markers and a major move to online marking in almost all subjects helped to facilitate the early results. It's wonderful also that students, are once again getting state exam experience at the end of the three-year junior cycle.

The old Junior Certificate exam and its

predecessor, the Intermediate Cert fulfilled their purpose back in the day, but the reformed Junior Cycle programme is far more suitable for the current student body. When you combine the relevance of the Junior Cycle with the reforms that are currently in train at Leaving Cert level, there is little doubt that post-primary education in Ireland is as good as you'd get in any country in the world. The icing on the cake for candidates is the publication of the 2024 state exam results close to the pre covid timeline for the convenience of Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle students.

CERTIFICATION

The reporting process at Junior Cycle culminates in the awarding of the Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA) to students. The JCPA replaces the Junior Cert and consequently the SEC no longer issues these certificates. The JCPA confirms the level of achievement in learning, under five descriptors - exceptional, above expectations, in line with expectations, yet to meet expectations and not reported, across all areas of learning including Classroom-Based Assessments (CBA), Short Courses, Priority Learning Units and other areas of learning, as well as the SEC exam results.

SAFEGUARD

The Junior Cycle exam is often overshadowed by the more public Leaving Cert exam but it's a very important exam in its own right. It's a prestigious exam of the SEC and it's the first opportunity for second level students to engage with a public exam of this nature. With very few students now leaving school after this exam, the Junior Cycle is proving to be a significant safeguard against early drop out of at-risk students and a major force in the reduction of inequality in Irish education. Its primarily a passport to Senior Cycle education, which is a further two years – three years if the optional Transition Year is included. During the final two years of Senior Cycle, students take the traditional Leaving Certificate (LC), the Leaving Certificate Vocational Program (LCVP) or the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA).

Most schools will now give those moving on to 5th year a few days to finalize their subject grouping for Senior Cycle. Consider your Leaving Cert subject choice very carefully. Start thinking about your college course options and the related careers because, this time next year, it will be your turn to apply for college. Congratulations to all candidates, who received Junior Cycle exam results. Be proud of your achievement and good luck in Senior Cycle.








OVERTRAINING - WHAT IS IT?

While it is great that we want to train and indeed train hard, one thing that can get $neglected \ is \ or \ not \ included \ at \ all \ is \ time \ to \ recover \ properly \ between \ training \ sessions.$ What can then happen to us is a thing called overtraining.

We need to try and find a balance between the training we are able to do, and the training that we want to do. Recovery time should be part of your training programme and not just something to do when you are too tired, or injured.

In fact one of the issues with overtraining is that it can make us more susceptible to picking up minor injuries.

What are some of the signs of overtraining?

Exhaustion

Aches and pains that are more than the DOMS (Delayed Onset Muscle Soreness) you normally feel

Minor muscle strains

Lack of motivation

It is important to recognize these but of course you might think well I am tired because of how hard I am training. Then it comes down to identifying whether it is that you are just tired or are you overtraining. With overtraining you can get to a stage where you are no longer looking forward to your sessions, you question why you are training leading to lack of focus on your goals, or there is a lack of motivation generally.

What can we avoid overtraining?

Make sure you have a proper recovery included in your training programme Reduce the load or intensity

Introducing something like pilates or yoga

There is no one answer as we are all different, and as a result will have differing needs. However if you are showing any of the symptoms of overtraining and are unsure what to do then discuss with you trainer and they can help you.

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SCREEN TIME FACTS FOR PARENTS

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

WHAT IS BLUE LIGHT?

Sunlight contains red, orange, yellow, green and blue light rays. Combined, this spectrum of coloured light rays creates what we call 'white light' or sunlight.

Depending on where they fall on the spectrum, light rays have long wavelengths (with less energy) or short wavelengths (with more energy).

Blue light is a high-energy visible light and has shorter wavelengths. It is known as blue light because it is on the violet-blue band of the spectrum.

Blue light is naturally present in sunlight but is also something we can see from screens such as TVs, computers, smartphones and tablets.

Can blue light damage my child's eyes?

There is currently no scientific evidence that blue light causes damage to the eyes. However, there is evidence to suggest that carrying out near tasks, involving looking at something close-up, such as using mobile devices, screen time and reading a book, can increase eye strain for those who do this for long periods of time.

What is digital eye strain?

Digital eye strain happens when a lot of time is spent using near vision, for example, reading on screen or playing online games.

One of the main symptoms is temporary blurred vision but other signs such as sore and tired eyes, dry eye and headaches are also associated with digital eye strain.

Can blue light affect my child's sleep pattern?

Using screens close to bedtime may contribute to poorer sleep,

which may mean your child's concentration levels are lower during the day. This may be because blue light is linked to the suppression of the hormone melatonin which makes us feel sleepy. However, there is a range of other factors linked to disrupted sleep.

Can blue light filtered lenses help? Some people report that lens coatings that filter blue light make their eyes feel more comfortable or are helpful before bed.

IS THERE A LINK BETWEEN SCREEN TIME AND SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS?

Short-sightedness, or myopia, is increasing throughout the world. Family history, ethnic background, environment (living indoors, in cities) and carrying out near tasks, such as screen use, have all been linked to the development of myopia. However, there is no clear evidence to suggest that screen time alone is the direct cause. But, there is good evidence to suggest that children who spend more time outdoors are at lower risk of developing short-sightedness.

TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD'S EYES HEALTHY

Get them outdoors – regular play and exercise can help prevent or reduce the development of myopia (short-sightedness). Studies show two hours of outdoor activity a day is ideal1

Use night settings - using night settings, if your device has them, may help children sleep by reducing the amount of blue light given off by the screen during night-time hours

Make sure digital devices are turned off at least an hour before

Book your child in for a sight test at least every two years, from the age of three.







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



HOSPITALITY SECTOR SURVIVAL

GORDON KELLEHER calls for improvement of breast checks services

Fianna Fáil General Election candidate Linda Gordon Kelleher has said that their needs to be a change in approach to the scheduling of ultrasounds for women being referred or those who self-refer for breast check examinations.

She said a number of women who attend for mammograms have pointed out that if something of concern is observed, there can be an additional wait for a follow-up ultra sound appointment and that can be a time of great worry.

She said while she is aware that the mobile BreastCheck units have limited space and equipment, the EU standard is for both the mammogram and ultra sound services to be available on the same day and in the same place.

"The process of scheduling of ultrasounds here during breast checks is one that doesn't meet the European norm.

"I believe it is unacceptable that someone should have to wait to complete the process, particularly if they have concerns after their mammograms," Ms Gordon Kelleher said.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and each year over 3,400 women and 30 men are diagnosed with breast cancer in Ireland.

The Kerry Fianna Fáil candidate said it is crucial to raise awareness this month and it is just as important to determine how services can be improved.

"With it being Breast Cancer Awareness month, I feel it is the perfect time to

flaws in the system that people are experiencing.

"This month is all about awareness and checking for lumps, and rightly so, but I can't help



but feel we need to continue to raise awareness of how we can improve our services to make them as effective as possible.

"We must do everything we can to get the earliest detection possible for patients".


Ms Gordon Kelleher called on the HSE to review the current process that is in place and to examine if can be improved to meet the European standards.

"I will work hard on this issue and will also be engaging with my party colleague and Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly, on this matter," she said.



"It helps find cancer at an early stage. If it's found early, it's easier to treat and there's a better chance of recovery," she said.













Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh opens up on 'hurt' and 'frustration' over poor treatment in early career

Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh has opened up on the poor treatment she and her teammates faced in the early part of her career, saying she hopes things are "easier" for the next generation of female Gaelic footballers.

Speaking on a special episode of The Kerry Football Podcast in partnership with Killarney-based insurance broker GMIB. ie, the four-time All-Star underlined the importance of the proposed merger of the GAA, LGFA and Camogie Association so that equality with their male counterparts can be achieved within "a few short years".

"I'd be hoping that they would try and bring everything under the one umbrella in 2027 like they had promised us," Ní Mhuircheartaigh said.

"I'm hopeful for the next generation that it will be equal and things will be much easier for them than what we had to deal with when we were growing up."

When asked if it hurt to be treated differently to male players, the 33-year-old forward said, "it did, of course".

"We see ourselves as the same as the men. We put in the same amount of training and effort and put our lives on hold probably even more. If women want to have kids and do that part of their lives, they have to stall it if they're playing football. It was frustrating to see the men get this, that and the other, and we'd be fighting to get small things like meals.

"Compared to now it wasn't great. I remember we were training outside the

Fitzgerald Stadium on the grass patch. We would never get into the main pitch, anyway.

"Thankfully things have improved since. Both county boards are working well together. It's looking really good for the future.

"I'd be hoping that [my younger teammates] will be equal with the men. That's something that we have been fighting for with years, and that's part of our job as older players to look after the next generation. The majority of our senior team are very, very young and they have long careers ahead of them, so I would be really hoping that they will be equal to the men in a few very short years." The veteran also expressed her gratitude to joint managers Darragh Long and Declan Quill who have confirmed that they will not be staying on for a sixth year at the helm.

"They had a massive hill to climb with us, especially the older players. We had hit rock bottom by the time they came in. We're very, very grateful for what they've done for us as a group. We owe them everything."


In a wide-ranging interview filmed at the majestic Fitzgerald Stadium, Ní Mhuircheartaigh told sports journalist Adam Moynihan about her childhood in West Kerry, her 'grá' for the Irish language, struggling with defeat, and finally winning an All-Ireland in her 17th season.

Game abandoned with 19 seconds left in the fourth quarter

There was plenty of drama in this season opener played in the SETU College Hall in Waterford. With the South Coast of Ireland under an orange weather warning for rainfall you would imagine indoor sport would escape the wrath of the weather, But it proved to be a vital factor in this opening round clash in the Men's Basketball League. With 2 minutes,58 seconds to go in the final quarter, moisture was gathering on the floor from a leaking vent in the ceiling, with the result that Lakers player Shane Daly took a heavy tumble on the slippery surface. The game was halted as the affected area was dried with the game resuming after a prolonged break. However with 19 seconds remaining, and Waterford Vikings holding a slender advantage, 69-68, more moisture had accumulated on the playing surface with the result that the game was abandoned. At the time of writing it is believed, that the sanction for failing to find a suitable alternative venue to finish the game, is forfeiture of the game and therefore the points would be awarded to Scotts Lakers.

As with all decisions the Vikings hold the right of appeal so this may rumble on but for now Scotts Lakers are in possession of the points, by my understanding. The game itself was a real ding dong affair which exploded into life after a slow start. Eoin Carroll had the privilege of opening the Lakers account for the season and that was soon followed by a Patrick Lanipekun three pointer. Mikah Blackwell, who finished with 42 points, also found his range to open up a 9-0 lead. Laker old boy Aaron Jackson lined out for the Vikings and alongside James Aboaba he reeled in the lead and forged the host 13-11 clear.



The second quarter was equally tight, Lanipekun streaking clear early to stuff home a dunk. But well be working on our ball movement and effort and getting our defensive intensity upto a consistent basis. I'm looking forward to coming home and playing in the Aura in front of our Killarney family and supporters."

Mikah Blackwell was on fire with 42 points, Patrick Lanipekun had 12, Shane Daly 7, Eoin Carroll 4 and Rui Saravia 3.

For the Vikings Aaron Jackson was 6/6 from three point land to score 33, James Aboaba had 15 and Osilama 7. Dale Kavanagh, Marius Huber and Daniel Sheehan each had four. The first home game of the season is this Saturday night when league newcomers Tipperary Talons visit the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre. Having risen through the Development leagues they got a tough opening round fixture when they were landed with the Limerick Celtics. But they acquitted themselves very well for three quarters of that game before eventually succumbing to the more seasoned side. In Shemarri Miles they seem to possess a potent point guard, he hit 29 points last weekend . Justin Wickham has taken up a scholarship at TUS Thurles having played competitively in the UK. Sammy Bah is no stranger to Killarney, he lined out with the Limerick Sport Eagles before while Miles Felletti was a mainstay of the Limerick Celtics effort these past few seasons. JIMMY BERMINGHAM

Kerry has produced many great footballers; it would have a lesser pedigree on the international soccer stage. Dublin has produced many great gaelic footballers as well, and many more international soccer stars. But as far as I know, only one man played at the pinnacle for both, and that's native Dubliner and briefly adopted Kerryman Jimmy Bermingham.

It was August 2nd, 1922, when the idealistic young 20 year old redhead who stepped off the deck of the 'Lady Wicklow' as one of 450 members of the Dublin Guard who were sent to Kerry by the Free State Government to quell the IRA-supporting local dissenters - by fair means or foul, and too often with a reliance on the latter. There were appalling tragedies at that time and far too many good people died on all sides. Knocknagoshel, Ballyseedy, Countess Bridge in Killarney....I will let a discreet veil be drawn - some of those embers still burn brightly enough to cause hurt. It certainly wasn't a popular job, especially under the command of Paddy O'Daly, former leader of Michael Collins 'Squad' but a wage of three shillings and sixpence a day was very good money at that time.

Bermingham would serve a little over a year in Kerry and would seem to have been popular. Like all of his family, he was a keen sportsman. Soccer was and had always been his first love, but organised soccer was almost non-existent in Kerry. While athletics and rowing were popular, one sport dominated all others, and it wasn't long before the

young Dubliner was kicking a gaelic football around with the best of them. Literally, the best of them – it was none other than the great Dick Fitzgerald, who was training Kerry at the time (Kevin Heffernan was the first modern 'manager') who got him to throw in his lot with Kerry.

There is an army report of the time that mentions a game against Waterford which Kerry won by 2-8 to 0-3, and "Larkin and Birmingham (sic) were the pick of the Kerry fifteen". I have no reference for a Larkin playing GAA at the time, but there certainly was a Lieutenant Larkin with the Free State soldiers stationed in Kerry, an extremely controversial figure afterwards, and that may be why those two are singled out in a Defence Forces publication.

Kerry opened their 1923 All Ireland campaign against Limerick in the Market's Field and won comfortably, 4-5 to 2-3. The team is not recorded. Jimmy didn't play in the Munster semi-final against Cork, but he was named at left corner forward for the Munster Final against Tipperary. Three Dr. Crokes players were on the team, goalkeeper Dinso Hurley, Johnny O'Mahony, and Jimmy himself.

The team that day was Denso Hurley, Tom Ryle, Toss Kelliher, Phil 'The Master' O'Sullivan, Jack Sheehy 0-2 (the following year he would win an All Ireland as goalkeeper with Kerry), M. Carroll, D Fitzgerald, Con Brosnan, Donacha O'Donoghue, O'Mahony 0-3, Jerry Begley, James Baily 0-1 (one of the legendary Ballymac brothers), Johnny O'Mahony, Martin Carroll, Jimmy Bermingham. Kerry triumphed by 0-6 to 0-3. There is no mention of Jimmy in the one point win over Cavan in the semi-final (Joe Barrett made his debut) or the All Ireland Final defeat to Dublin, where a schoolboy from the Sem was drafted in - Paul Russell would go on to become one of the all-time greats.

Jimmy Bermingham was back in Dublin by then and soon left the army. He isn't listed on the Bohemians team that won the League in 1923 but must have thrown his lot in with them soon enough. Bohs were very much considered the team of Dublins' working class and the rivalry with Shamrock Rovers was the bedrock of Irish soccer.


In 1927/28 he and his Bohs team-mates wrote themselves into history by winning the league and cup double, with outside right Jimmy Bermingham scoring 23 goals in all competitions.

In 1929 he was capped for Ireland against Belgium and was outstanding. A year later he was one of four Bohs players to be called up by the IFA. Now, that's a sentence that probably deserves an exclamation mark. The IFA, Northern Ireland';s soccer body, had

The players ended up banned by the FAI – they also ended up on trading cards, the ultimate sporting accolade at the time. It was a huge international scandal at the time. The players actually went to the High Court to object to their ban, but the judge ruled in the FAI's favour, but made both sides pay their own costs. Peace was eventually brokered. Sport was essentially a male domain in those days. The idea of letting women actually play....look, women only got the right to vote in Ireland in 1918.

By last Friday, though, when Jimmy Bermingham's grandchildren came to Lewis Rd. to present the club with the Jimmy Bermingham Memorial Cup at a wonderful night of celebration, there to meet him among other club winners were All Star and All Ireland player of the game winner this year Kayleigh Cronin, Womens' gaelic football came into formal existence in 1974. Two years later Kerry were Munster U16 champions and there were three Dr. Crokes players on that team as well, Mary O'Shea, Geraldine Fitzgerald, and Trish O'Connor. The trio met up with each other for the first time since their playing days last Friday as well. That history-making Kerry U16 team would later lose out to Mayo in the All Ireland Final, while the Kerry senior ladies, powered by the phenomenal Mary Geaney, narrowly lost the senior final to Cavan. Dr. Crokes ladies were managed at that time by Jackie Looney, Gerard Cullinane, and a newly returned emigrant to New York who had just bought a Plunkett St. Pub the previous year, none other than Eddie 'Tatler' O'Sullivan. Like any club, Dr. Crokes is made up of strands as diverse as Jimmy Bermingham, Dickeen Fitz, Eddie 'Tatler', Mary, Geraldine, Trish, and Kayleigh Cronin....but all of those strands are carefully woven together into one seamless narrative.

Desmonds set out their stall straightaway, Andrea Murphy setting up Julia Curtin for a goal right at the start. Curtin exchanged frees with Rachel Dwyer before scything another goal attempt inches wide. After just nine minutes, Labhaoise Walmsley burts up the pitch and lashed home a second goal. Andrea Murphy added a point before Ellie O'Connell got Southern Gaels second score. Desmonds were rampant, though, with Aisling Leonard, Ciara O'Sullivan, Leah Griffin, and Julia Curtin (f) had Desmonds completely in command. 

night of history took place in the Dr. Crokes club rooms on Friday

When Crokes found the Kerry team of 1923 and even though the 100-year-old black and white photo was grainy she pointed him out immediately. 'There he is' that's him. He was in the back row a small figure beside a Crokes and Kerry legend Dick Fitzgerald. Thank you, Dr Crokes, for keeping his m, memory alive in Dublin and in Kerry. It is most unusual and unique I expect to know for sure that a Dub who never played GAAH(GAA) with the Dubs only with Dr Crokes and Kerry went on to win 3 International soccer Caps with Ireland, 1928,1929,1930. They are on display here tonight with other memorabilia," said Mossy Bermingham when he presented on behalf of the four Birmingham family presented the Jimmy Memorial Cup to Eoin Brosnan, chairman of Dr Crokes club at a special function in Lewis Rd on Friday last.

Nature and extent of the Proposed Works

Kerry County Council proposes to carry out Public Realm Improvements at Kenmare Place & Main Street, Killarney, Co. Kerry as follows:

The proposed project elements are:

- The conversion of the public road at Main Street to a one-way 3.7 m wide single lane road with improved footpaths, public realm and landscaping from the junction of the N71at Kenmare Place to Plunkett Street junction.
- The scheme includes for revisions to bus set down/loading bays, raised uncontrolled crossing and revised location of accessible parking.
- Associated landscaping and drainage work.

Kerry County Council as the Competent Authority has concluded that the proposed project, individually, and in combination with other plans and projects, is not one which requires an Appropriate Assessment (AA) or an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and is not likely to have significant effects on the environment.

Pursuant to Article 120(3)(b) a member of the public, may at any time before the expiration of 4 weeks beginning on the date of the publication of this notice, seek an EIA screening determination from An Bord Pleanála as to whether the proposed development would have significant effects on the environment.

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
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If you can - it is best to plant your beech hedge bare rooted as it will probably establish that bit quicker, so you have plenty of time from November until the end of March to get planting.


MONDAY NIGHT FEVER

Most folk go out socializing, over the weekend, For a pint or two or three, with a few good friends. Then these folk are inclined, to stay home on Monday nights, To give the ole bod a rest, in case they get a fright. But then there are others, who live for Monday nights, For that's the night for dancing, and it is a wondrous sight, These folk danced for many years, in the old Whitegates, Doing sets and Connemara's, with all their old mates. But sadly when Whitegates closed, they were all bereft, Until Mary Donal's opened, and it has passed the test. There's tons of space for dancing, as they whirl around the floor, Whooping like mad dervishes – and no charge at the door! It keeps the old tradition, for it's like a rambling house, As they had in Gneeveguilla, when Minnie Barry was about. Minnie had an open door, in her Quarry Cross shop, And anyone who could play or sing, was welcome to a drop. Folks come up in Mary Donal's, when the dancers take a suss, And sing an Irish ballad, or dance with a brush. These dancers have the joy of life, as they bate the floor, And long may they do so – and then come back for more!







"I promise you what I promised Moses, wherever you set foot, you will be on land I have given you. I have given you every place where the sole of your foot will tread just as I promised Moses" (Joshua 1:3).

Welcome back dear student, the Word of God declares "the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world, and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). This means everything and everyone belongs to God. A creator owns the very thing he or she created unless they sell their rights. But this victory is based upon knowledge. God said, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge" (Hosea 4:6). Friend, please don't just skim through this: study and seek out the Scriptures for yourself. As we become students of God's Word that is where the victory is. You are never too young or too old to begin. Get a Bible — buy a translation that you will enjoy reading, with large print, and language you can understand like the NIV, NLT, or Amplified Bible, and prioritise learning what is contained in the Word for you. And watch God restore you!
