Young Social Innovators Den 2021

JUDGES **"BLOWN AWAY"** BY KILLARNEY STUDENTS

The Connected Four



A group of students, called The Connected Four from Killarney Community College presented their project for the Young Social Innovators Den 2021 in front of a panel of judges this week over Zoom and it received huge praise and an investment of \in 500 for their project.

The Young Social Innovators inititive has inspired youth from all over Ireland to focus on a social issue of their choice, make a change and to fight for what they believe in, in their local communities and further. In Killarney Community College, a group of eight Transition Year students have decided to raise awareness on the false perception of Autism, ADHD, Dyslexia and Dyspraxia and the lack of education around these conditions due to a lack of accessible resources and supporting communities. The group are called 'The Connected Four'. The students involved are Luke O' Sullivan. Rachel Griffin, Lulu Healy, Amy O' Donoghue, Eva Ryan Lynch, Keelyn O' Leary, Lauren Fleming and Jack O' Connell.

"The reason why we chose this issue is, we all know someone, either family or friend who has been diagnosed with one or more of these conditions. As for most of the members in our YSI group, they have recognized the flaws in our society. Whereas, from the inside looking out, I can confirm experience of misunderstanding and the overall lack of education in our community" Luke O' Sullivan told Killarney Outlook.

The Connected Four believe that change is needed not just because there isn't enough information on the conditions, but because there's so much stigma around these conditions.

"We must make people aware of the challenges people with Autism, ADHD/ADD, Dyslexia and Dyspraxia face. If we can educate people on how to assist people with these conditions and how the people themselves can cope; it is a step in the right direction. Educating people will help stop the prejudice and stereotypes as people will have the right information. Communities will become more accepting and helpful of others around them, and it will become normal to have a mixed variety in our society without them being looked at differently" another of the social innovators, Rachel Griffin added.

The Connected Four have very active

social media accounts including Instagram, Facebook & TikTok that are highlighting facts, myths, statistics, their online survey results and the intense research the group have completed. These social media accounts are reaching a wide audience and helping to spread their message nationally and globally. Their email is the connected four@gmail.com. A YouTube channel is also being set up by the group to voice people's experiences and knowledge from interviews they are This week, onWednesday 10th February, three of the students from The Connected Four, Luke, Rachel & Eva, had the opportunity to represent the group and pitch their project to a panel of business and community people as part of the Young Social Innovators 'Dragon's Den' via zoom. The 'Dragons' on the day were Paul Kelly from Unilever, Tim Bulter from Virgin Media and Mary Roche from Tusla. The students pitched their project and their ideas of creating a children's book of stories around the four conditions Autism, ADHD/ADD, Dyslexia and Dyspraxia aimed at Junior Infants to 2nd class with the theme of diversity. This book is aimed to instil education at an early age and break down prejudice before it begins. The three students were absolutely fantastic and the 'dragons' were "blown away" by this project. The students received a cheque of €500 from the dragons to invest in their project, potentially focusing on their children's book and content and explore how they will invest it in a way to develop the greatest impact, perhaps digitally and through social media. They have also been offered mentoring from Paul Kelly, marketing developer of Unilever, to guide them in the right direction with their book. The students are so delighted with this offer. "The passion, the knowledge, the energy that the students showed on the day left the dragons 'gobsmacked'! I am so proud of each and every one of these students and the initiative they show, even throughout lockdown, is an inspiration to all" Ms. Lorraine Crowley, YSI Guide.

The Connected Four from Killarney Community College was the only school in Kerry to pitch to the dragons this year and one of 10 projects in Munster.

"With a better understanding, the wall dividing between the people who have these conditions from the people who do not have these conditions can be broken down, bringing the stereotypes, fear and prejudice with it! Whether somebody may have one of the conditions mild, or severe, it is important we look out for all and make them feel included and heard. If no one said being different was a bad thing, discrimination would never have started. It's time to celebrate differences" Luke O' Sullivan

The commemoration events planned to mark the 100th anniversary of the Headford Ambush have been postponed due to Covid-19 restrictions.

The Ambush on British troops at Headford, near Glenflesk, was carried out on March 21, 1921, by 33 members of the Kerry IRA No. 2 Brigade Flying Column. It was the largest ambush in Kerry during the War of Independence.

"It's very unfortunate we can't go ahead with the actual centenary commemoration",

Chairman of the Commemoration Committee, Derry Healy, told Killarney Outlook.

"This is something that we've been looking forward to for many years, given its significance in Irish history. But public health must come first and hopefully we'll do it all properly in March, 2022", he added.

Thirteen died in the Headford Ambush – eight British soldiers, two IRA Volunteers (Dan Allman and Jimmy Baily) and three cattle dealers.

Headford Ambush Commemoration Postponed

A three-year-old girl was badly wounded in both legs when a bullet passed through her father's leg as he sought to shelter her.

The attack, led by Dan Allman and Tom McEllistrim, targetted a detachment of British troops due to return by train from Kenmare to Tralee.

Allman, along with Jimmy Baily, died in the attack. McEllistrim went on to be a Fianna Fáil TD.

The ambush ended when the Mallow-Tralee train arrived; it had inadvertently brought British reinforcements, and the IRA withdrew

from the vicinity of the station.

The Headford Ambush was one of the largest engagements of the whole conflict and was certainly the largest engagement between British forces and the IRA to take place in Kerry during the War of Independence.

Last October, the Government gave \notin 10,000 to the local commemoration committee in Headford to help renovate the existing monument, erected in 1971, which had fallen into disrepair.

Extensive work has also been done to landscape the whole monument site which is located about 300 yards from where the actual ambush



took place.

For the first time, the names of all those who fought in the Ambush will be recorded at the site. However, due to Covid-19 restrictions, all aspects of the commemoration involving the gathering of people are postponed until March, 1922.

Funds available to re-imagining our Outdoor Public Spaces

A new funding scheme to help local authorities open up and create public spaces and facilities dedicated to the arts, culture and festivals was announced yesterday, Thursday 11th February by The Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media, Catherine Martin T.D.

The scheme will be known as the Outdoor Public Space Scheme 2021. The support will allow each local authority to adapt, equip or otherwise improve public spaces for cultural and events activities. The new scheme will take account of public health guidelines and of the needs of local arts and entertainment communities.

Local authorities are invited to propose capital projects for outdoor spaces which are flexible, innovative and facilitate year-round use. Ideally projects should respond to the challenges associated with COVID-19 and support the recovery of the creative, cultural, entertainment and events sector as well as being future-

proofed from a health and safety perspective. Projects should aim to deliver speedy results or actions with added benefits for tourism, and the hospitality sector. They should also demonstrate how they will support the Night-time Economy, a priority for the Minister and the Programme for Government. Each local authority can apply for up to €250,000 under the scheme.

New COVID Business Aid Scheme (CBAS) will provide welcome boost for struggling businesses in Kerry - Griffin

A new nationwide €60 million COVID Business Aid Scheme (CBAS) will provide a welcome boost for struggling businesses in Kerry, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said the funding for the COVID Business Aid Scheme (CBAS) was secured by the Tánaiste at cabinet this week and Kerry County Council will be responsible for administering the scheme.

Deputy Griffin said: "The scheme will support rateable businesses that were not eligible for the Covid Restrictions Support Scheme (CRSS) payment nor the recently announced Fáilte Ireland scheme, 'Survive to Thrive'.

"It will be a \notin 60m fund offering a payment of \notin 8,000 for eligible businesses, in two instalments of \notin 4,000 for January-March and April-June.

"Wholesalers, suppliers, caterers & events



companies down 75% or more in turnover – and which have a rateable premises – will benefit.

"Not everyone will be eligible, but it will provide a boost to 7,500 small and medium sized businesses who were not eligible for CRSS or the Fáilte Ireland scheme.

"Business should be able to apply by the end of February through Kerry County Council. The Scheme will be back-dated to the start of this year, to ensure businesses are able to get help in covering the fixed costs they have incurred since then.

"This new scheme is in addition to the wide range of existing Government schemes such as wage subsidies, the PUP, the CRSS and commercial rates waivers.

"We hoped that businesses would no longer need such levels of support well into 2021. Unfortunately, the pandemic continues to have devastating consequences and the Government remains committed to helping businesses for as long as they need it."

Walking In Killarney National Park

a chara,

As a regular walker and sometimes cyclist in The National Park, my attention was drawn to your Article on last week's issue under the heading "TO THE LEFT TO THE LEFT". I share the concerns expressed by this person. However, I would like to express my view on some of the of the details on the article.

It is important to understand that the section of pathway from the Cathedral entrance along the Port Road and westwards towards the Castlerosse Hotel was put in place by Kerry Co Council, operated by them and not the National Parks and Wildlife. The signage depicted in your article refers to this pathway only, and has no application to any other part of the National Park. There are several similar signs along this stretch of pathway at entrance and exit points to where cyclists and pedestrians share the same space with no segregation feature. I have no idea why they require users to walk on the left, nor have I asked them. But it does create needless confusion, which has led us to precisely here.

I am informed by Killarney National Park that they have no policy regarding which side of the roadway to walk on in the area under their control and have not erected any signage in that regard. Their concern is that people act responsibly, civilly, courteously, etc., which is sensible advice to most people. However, I have personally observed



people whom I would normally regard as 'rational' people 'losing their cool' over the correctness of their choice. The greatest passions come from such little issues. This is unfortunate, but also avoidable.

I personally choose to take my guidance from The Road Safety Authority, Section 18: Rules for Pedestrians, which operates in harmony with all other Road Traffic Acts and simplifies how we should behave on public roads (briefly) as follows:- WALKING BESIDE OR ALONG A ROAD

A. If there is a footpath, you must use it. B. If there is no footpath, you must walk as near as possible to the right hand side of the road (facing oncoming traffic).

C. Do not walk more than two abreast. If the road is narrow or carries heavy traffic, you should walk in single file.

D. The most important rule for all pedestrians is to behave responsibly, exercise care and not endanger or inconvenience other users of the road.

In the absence of Bye Laws that would guide us in our use of the National Park, I fail to understand why we should behave in the exact opposite way when we enter the Park

- which may not be regarded as a "Public" place. It need not matter and only adds to the needless confusion that the Co. Council has created in their illogical footpath/ cycle path rules – in the same Park. It is unreasonable to expect users to be in tune with the nuances and conflict it creates.

In conclusion, my simple message is that there is no regulation or guideline regarding which side of the roadway to walk on in Killarney National Park. I shall continue to walk on the right hand side and thereby comply with the simple ingrained set of guidelines provided by the Road Safety Authority and found to be sound in principle over a long time. Stay safe.

KERRY VACCINE ROLLOUT



The announcement that two mass Covid-19 Vaccination Centres will be opened in Kerry has been cautiously welcomed by Councillor Michael Cahill of Fianna Fáil.

"Having a Vaccination Centre in both Tralee and Killarney is of course a big improvement, but I believe we need to extend our reach much further into the county to ensure the very best results" stated the Kerry County Councillor. "We need to set up mini-hubs in our rural towns like Kenmare, Sneem, Waterville, Cahersiveen, and Killorglin in this Municipal District and the same in Dingle, East Kerry, Castleisland and Listowel, with refrigeration storage facilities for vaccinations to ensure the smooth and efficient rollout of this hugely important programme.""I believe that the HSE should acknowledge the vast geographical spread of our County and give favourable consideration to my proposal" said the experienced Councillor.

"Reaching all of the people living in the county, including the highly populated areas, has to be our highest priority if we are to defeat this virus for once and for all" stated the Fianna Fáil man. Youth and sport must be a priority in Covid-19 recovery - MEP Kelly

Young people and their future health and career prospects should be a clear priority across all EU policy and funding areas in the recovery plans from the Covid-19 pandemic, according to Seán Kelly MEP who is backing calls for more targeted assistance for youth and sport.

"I fully support calls for the European Commission to swiftly mobilise all funding available with direct focus on youth, such as the Youth Guarantee and Erasmus+ to support young people who are being impacted in terms of education, work and health, both physical and mental, due to less regular sports activities", the Ireland South MEP said.

On Tuesday of this MEPs voted on the Resolution which also urges Member States to ensure that national support funds, under Covid-19 recovery plans, benefit the sports sector. It also asks the Commission to explore all possible avenues to deliver additional targeted support for both amateur and professional sport with the aim of increasing the viability of the whole sector. The Commission is also being called on to fully assess the economic and social impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on sport across the Member States and, on the basis of the results of this assessment, develop a European approach to coping with



the challenges and mitigating the possible consequences.

"Sport provides our youth with much more than exercise, it is also about inclusion. Staying active is crucial for positive mental health and can be a social outlet and provides as sense of purpose for many. Furthermore, sporting clubs play a huge role in the fabric and history of local communities, especially in rural areas. We also need to pay particular attention to young people with special needs and those from disadvantaged areas who particularly benefit from organised activities in their locality", Kelly underlined.

"Sport is also an important economic sector accounting for an estimated 5.67 million jobs in the EU and 2.12% of total GDP in the EU."

The Fine Gael MEP and former GAA President has been a long-time advocate for increasing EU funding for youth sports and particularly for grassroots sports, as well as promoting education and youth engagement as a European Parliament Ambassador for CoderDojo and Erasmus for Young Entrepreneurs.

"Some restrictions were necessary to prevent the spread of Covid-19, including some sports activities and remote learning at certain times and these guidelines should always be adhered to for everyone's wellbeing. The first priority is always the health and safety of people, but as we look to the future, we need to rebuild our lives and the next generation deserve our full attention", he added.

New Fund will help Kerry Education and Training Board support adult learners across Kerry

Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said special funding for the Kerry Education and Training Board will help tackle educational disadvantage and equip adult learners will new skills during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Killarney Down Memory Lane

With an amazing 14,000 members, Killarney Down Memory Lane is a favourite page for people living both in Killarney but also all over the world. In this week's Killarney Outlook, one of the founders Enda Walshe look back at the last 9 years of looking back on Killarney and it's people

n a fine summers evening in 2012 a few members of the Legion club were gathering for a meeting in the clubhouse. The usual suspects were early with the remaining arrivals being anticipated. It afforded myself and Paddy Osborne the opportunity to peruse the photographic exhibition on display thanks to Tommy Regan. We were able to name nearly all of the people in the photos but got caught on a few. As more members arrived they filled in the blanks for us and new conversations began.

"What year was that?" and "And did we win?" It was after that meeting that Paddy mentioned to me wouldn't it be a good idea to set up a forum or website for old photos where people could post their own personal photos and maybe look for some missing piece of information that had eluded them for what seemed like an eternity. We chatted about the logistics of the concept and decided that maybe a Facebook page might be a good place to start. Next we had to decide on a name. After much debate we eventually settled on the name "Killarney Down Memory Lane". We set up the page and it went live on October 12 2012.

As the first 2 members we invited our own family and friends to join and after the opening month we had about 100 members. We were delighted!! Our initial post was from the early 1900s of a Sheep fair outside a thatched cottage in College Street.

The first year saw us add about 1, 000 members to the page and with it the old photos started to

flow. By now it was starting to gather attention and by year 2 we were up to 4, 000 members. Intrigued by its popularity there was no way in the wide earthly world we expected to hit these numbers. A full 1 hour radio interview with the late great Weeshie Fogarty followed and from then on it really went from strength to strength. We currently have 14,100 members.

Early on the membership was predominantly locally based but as word spread we found that a lot of Killarney natives who had moved to other parts of Ireland or aboard were coming on board. Facebook insights tell us that just under 50% of the membership is Killarney based, another 25% from other parts Kerry and other Irish counties, while the remaining 25% is overseas. 37 countries are represented so far including the USA, Japan, United Arab Emirates, Australia, New Zealand and most of Europe.

To say we are blown away by the support of the members and contributors is an understatement. Neither myself nor Paddy come from generations of Killarney families so the whole educational experience of the page has been very informative. It is very hard to put into words how appreciative we are of the people who bought into our idea and are now providing entertainment, memories and nostalgia for so many.

The page is a pleasure to administer with only a passing eye needed for any content that doesnt befit the spirit of the page. There are numerous sites and forums out there suitable for content which is not in keeping with our page and we strive to keep KDML free of advertisements and spam. Of course the page would be nothing without the efforts of its members and some of their knowledge and insights into all things Killarney is mindblowing.

As the page has evolved sadly too some of its contributors or members of their family have sadly passed away and it offers those families, alongside the existing RIP.ie, to see their loved ones remembered fondly with a glowing tribute or maybe a story to regale. We hope that they find a comfort in those hard times.

What we have also found is the town characters, some living or some passed away, are very often the most popular on the site. Remembering the late Paddy Turner and Mike Healy (also known as Thundering Mike) are two of the most popular conversations to be struck up on the page and it says a lot about the community spirit of Killarney that they are thought of so fondly.

But the main secret of the page is that no one ever knows where the next photo is going to come from. With such a rich history and culture in Killarney there is so much to remember and to be proud of. The sense of nostalgia and remembrance is so strong in the community and in those who now live away from their hometown. It is something we, on the 12th of October 2012, could never have imagined and we are now so thankful to all the members who have made this page the success it is. It has brought home to us how big the community spirit has been, is now and will always be in the beautiful town of Killarney. Long may it last!!

ANNOUNCES CANCELLATION OF EVENT UNTIL 2022

The Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle (RoKCC) organizing committee has made the decision to cancel this year's 2021 event due to the uncertainty surrounding public health guidelines this summer.

The annual event, one of Ireland's largest charity cycling events, traditionally takes place on the first Saturday in July but was cancelled last year as a result of the pandemic.

Following internal meetings and consultations, the organizing committee felt it was best to cancel this year's event.

ROKCC Committee Chairman Garry Galvin said the decision to cancel the event had been made following a review of the current public health guidelines.

In a statement issued he said:

"Due to the continued uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 public health position together with both Government and The National Public Health Emergency Team (NPHET) guidelines and recommendations, the organising committee of the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle have decided to cancel the traditional ROKCC cycle due to be held on Saturday 3rd July 2021. "Whilst this is very regrettable, we feel it is necessary in the best interests of all stakeholders including the health and wellbeing of cyclists and our many brilliant volunteers. Those cyclists that have deferred from the cancelled 2020 event will be transferred to next year's 2022 event."

Mr Galvin added that the committee was hoping to introduce some form of virtual event to help to mitigate any losses incurred by their chosen

charity partners for this year's event: "Following on from the cancellation of the 2020 event and the cancellation of the 2021 event we are very conscious of the financial impact this is having on our charity partners and we hope to mitigate that loss in income by holding a virtual fundraising cycle in line with public health guidelines. This is currently in the planning stage and we will make further announcements in due course and hope that it will be well supported for the benefit of our charity partners."He added: "We would also like to say a sincere "Thank You" to our many cyclists that donated their 2020 registration fee, merchandise and online donations to charity as we were able to distribute over €30,000 to our beneficiary charities in December 2020.

Comfort *for Čhemo* launch new fundraising platform



With plans to build a centre of excellence for patients in Kerry, who need chemotherapy and oncological treatments the fundraising group Comfort for Chemo have launched a new online fundraising platform.

The group plan a stand-alone building which will ensure the best care available is delivered in an environment that is welcoming, reassuring, comfortable and dignified. The fundraising goal is €5 million to build and equip a start of the art, purpose-built chemotherapy unit for the people of Kerry.

"With the arrival of Covid-19 there is a greater understanding amongst people of how vulnerable cancer patients are during their treatment and how important it is to provide their treatment in an environment with the least exposure to the general public", Board member Mary Fitzgerald explained.

"In addition, we fully recognise that patients going through treatment need the support of family and friends around them and even before the onset of Covid-19, the limited space in University Hospital Kerry chemotherapy day-

ward means that it was not always possible for others to be in the treatment area when their loved ones were receiving chemotherapy", she added.

A chilling statistic is that every three minutes in Ireland someone gets a cancer diagnosis. The incidence of cancer is growing and since 2020 it is now estimated that one in every two people will get a cancer diagnosis in their lifetime. In Ireland more than 40,000 new cases of cancer or related tumours are diagnosed each year. In Ireland in the last seven years the number of people receiving chemotherapy has increased by 63%. In the last five years in Ireland the number of new people attending the oncology outpatients has increased by 58% and follow up visits have increased by 27%.

However, the outlook is good, there are more and more treatment options available and this accounts for some of the increase in numbers. Survival rates across a lot of cancers in Ireland continue to increase, research is improving, and more modern chemotherapy treatments are becoming available.

The ambitious fundraising goal of Comfort for Chemo aims to provide in the new state of the art purpose-built chemotherapy unit both privacy and dignity for patients. It will have dedicated chemotherapy suites, with a new outpatient unity, isolation facilities, compounding unit (drug preparation), and spacious clinical areas.

The stand-alone-building will also have teaching and research facilities, counselling and support rooms, treatment rooms for allied health professionals to support patients and deliver treatments and a dedicated car park.

This week, on the 10th of February, the Comfort for Chemo board members, members of the Oncology Medical and Consultancy team in UHK, patients and guests will joined a virtual launch for the new online fundraising platform and website www.comfortforchemokerry.com Comfort for Chemo is asking everyone to get involved in their Valentines campaign this week, whereby you can send a virtual greeting to a loved one, a lift we all need in this time of lockdown. FORMIDABLE SECOND LEVEL STUDENTS' UNION LOOKS SET TO WIN LEAVING CERT EXAM CHOICE



The views of the Irish Second Level Students' Union (ISSU) made a significant impact at last week's meeting of the exams advisory group, which includes representatives of students, parents, teachers, principals, school managers and the State Examinations Commission (SEC).

The ISSU wants Leaving Cert candidates to be given a choice between calculated grades and sitting the June exams.

The ISSU is representing 120,000 Junior Cycle and Leaving Cert students at the meetings of the exams advisory group and is emerging as a powerful lobby with very definite policies. The ISSU indicated that many students are suffering from stress and lack of motivation and needed clarity on alternative options to the traditional exam. The ISSU's internal surveys show that only 4% of students support plans to press ahead with the traditional exam, while a majority wants a choice between calculated grades and exams.

Bilateral meetings between the Department of Education & Skills (DES) and education stakeholders got underway this week to prepare for the traditional Leaving Cert exam and an alternative assessment option. Discussion about the Junior Cycle exam is also on the agenda for these talks. Whether or not the traditional Leaving Cert exam goes ahead will depends on NPHET advice. If it does go ahead, a greater choice of questions will be offered to students to compensate for the amount of in-school teaching time lost last year and again this year.

The alternative assessment option will be largely based on last year's system of calculated grades with some new features added. The agreement of the teachers' unions, Association of Secondary Teachers Ireland (ASTI) and the Teachers Union of Ireland (TUI,) to any alternative assessment option will be crucial, as it will most likely require teachers to assess their students in some form.

The ASTI and TUI are participating in the bilateral meetings and continue to work constructively with all stakeholders to ensure that the traditional exam goes ahead as normally as possible and that an alternative assessment option will be put in place. Both unions were heroic in stepping up to the plate last year and did all the heavy lifting when the SEC washed its hands of the calculated grades process for fear of legal reprisals.

DES has indicated to the education partners that any alternative assessment option must include a number of features that weren't available in the calculated grades system of last year. The most crucial of those is that the SEC will take responsibility for both options this year. Adequate provision will be put in place for non-school-going candidates in any alternative assessment option. DES is also keen to include marks scored in the additional component elements of the Leaving Cert exam - coursework, orals, practical exams - in any alternative assessment option, but with the schools remaining closed, one wonders will the coursework, orals and practical exams take place at all. Timely progression to higher and further education must also be provided by both options. A spokesman for DES said discussions will be focused and immediate. with the aim of providing definite information to students as guickly as possible on when and how the exams will be held and details of the alternative assessment option.

The questions that need to be urgently answered are as follows. Is the traditional

Leaving Cert exam going ahead? What alternative assessment option is the SEC providing for candidates? Does a candidate have to opt for either the traditional exam or the alternative assessment option or may s/ he apply for both? Must a candidate use the results from either the traditional exam or the alternative assessment option in CAO points accumulation or may the best subject grade from either option be used for that purpose, as was the case in 2020? I suspect that Minister Foley will be showered with love, affection and even a few bouquets of roses by long suffering ISSU members if these questions are answered by St. Valentine's Day or thereabouts!

ONLINE PE CLASSES FOR KERRY CHILDREN LAUNCHED

Each participant will receive a live PE session twice a week for four weeks.

'This is a great way for children to keep active and to keep well while restrictions are in place. Physical activity can help young people's cognitive function and their attention. So a short bout of activity is a great way to break up periods of schoolwork or screen use, and help them focus on their work,' he said.

Pancakes are a big hit in my house we have them on some Sunday mornings and on the morning of somebodys birthday these are so easy to make and taste great

Ingredients

- 185g of self raising flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons caster sugar
- 250ml milk

60g melted butter

- 3 tablespoons of cooking oil or use fry light Method
- 1. Sift the flour, baking powder and
- sugar together and mix
- 2. Make a well in the middle
- 3. Melt the butter in the microwave slowly

4. In a another bowl crack the eggs and beat lightly, then add in the milk and melted butter and mix together

- 5. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry mix to form a smooth batter
- 6 cover with cling film and rest for 5 minutes

7. Dip some kicthen paper into the oil and wipe on to the fry pan or spray some fry light, heat the pan on a medium heat, put 2 tablespoons of the batter on to the pan and spread to for the size of your pancake, and repeat 3 time usually 4 fit in the frying pan cook for 1 minute until bubbles form and is golden brown underneath and flip them

I like my pancakes with whipped cream and chocolate chips and marshmallows.

Ensure a safe journey with these Winter driving tips from SEAT Ireland

With temperatures dropping across the country 🗄 Never use hot water to remove ice or snow from this week and further snow and ice forecast in the coming days, motorists are encouraged to drive with extra caution to prevent accidents. Tyre safety:

It is advised that drivers check their tyres all year round to ensure they are safe for the road, however during the winter months it's best to check the tyres more regularly. Ensure to check the pressure on each tyre to confirm they are at the correct level - this information should be provided by the car manufacturer.

Visibility:

Boredom Busting ideas for kids

With the Midterm approaching and you are wondering what to do the next time you hear the dreaded "I'm bored" or if you're just desperate to drag them away from the TV or iPad, try some of these fun activities:

Eat an Alphabet

Get your kids to describe how hungry they are – starting with the letter A take turns. The trick is to remember what everyone said before you. I'm so hungry I could eat an Apple. I'm so hungry I could eat an Apple and a Banana. I'm so hungry I could eat an Apple, Banana and a Cat!

Fuzz Buzz

One person counts to 10 while the rest of the players scatter. When 10 is reached everyone freezes in their spot. The person counting takes 4 giant steps towards the closest person and tries to hit them with the ball. If they hit, that person gets a letter 'S' but if they miss then they get the letter. Now it's the other person's time to count. Players get knocked out whenever they reach SPUD – hit or missed 4 times – ouch!

Fortress fun

Everyone's made a fortress right? The next rainy day that comes around, help your kids make their own supersized fortress in the sitting room. All you need is a couple of chairs or a table covered with a blanket – they'll stay busy all day long playing make-believe inside.

Make rain sticks

All you need is a cardboard tube, some dry rice, tinfoil, tape and long pipe cleaners or bent up wire hangers. Have your child colour and decorate the tube to their heart's content. Then coil some pipe cleaners or wire inside the tube and close-up one end with tin foil and tape. Now pour in some rice and secure the other end with more tin foil and tape. SIX NATIONS RUGBY

France 50 Italy 10

Meh. I'm sorry, but just 'meh'. We knew France were good, they could very well have nipped the Nations Cup off a dominant England with a young and fairly experimental team. We know that Italy haven't won a Six Nations match in the past five years, losing 28 in a row since that aberration of a victory over Scotland. So France piling on 50 points on Italy isn't really surprising, entertaining, or even interesting. Antoine Dupont does look like an absolute superstar on the horizon, but anybody would look good in a one-sided game like this. All that scoreline does is mean that, with score difference counting, every other country has to go out now and hammer Italy mercilessly. Which they will inevitably be able to do.

Fair play to France; it's a hurdle to get over, but an easy one. Italy's challenge faded into dull acceptance far to fast. Even though I accept that Italy are better than Georgia, they are closer to Georgia than of the other Six Nations teams and I would look for a promotion/relegation match between Italy and Georgia for the Six Nations spot every year before the tournament proper kicks off. I believe that it would incentivise both teams. As things stand, Italy are regressing, not getting better.

Scotland 11 England 6

That sweet chariot is swinging lower than ever. And shame on those who gloat in poor England's misfortune or find it in any way hilarious whatsoever (says he with his fingers crossed behind his back).

In ordinary times, I would be out and about on a Saturday afternoon rather than watching a game like this. I was honestly assuming that this would be another predictably one-sided contest. Which it was - but not the way that I or anyone else expected. Scotland actually beat England well in play. Beat them? I was not surprised to see Stuart Hogg pin England back relentlessly, I've always rated him. But Finn Russell? I always liked the look of him, an honest trier who is miles out of his depth but will give it everything he has. In the first half Scotland actually had an awful lot of possession, making me blink a little bit, but couldn't make it count. England lost Billy Vunipola to a yellow card Vunipola was way off the pace all day, like a lot of England's big guns - and Scotland got in for a try. There was an element of luck Jonny May doesn't drop many balls like _ that - but in fairness to Scotland they were hunting it. England were like mastiffs being attacked by poodles, seemingly full off power but simply too astonished to bring it to bear on their tormentors. What's more, they never did recover or get into their stride. For the first time in 38 years, Scotland lifted the Calcutta Cup (Scottish and English soldiers competed in rugby while joined in wanton slaughter for the British Empire in India in 1872 and established a cup between the nations to commemorate the camaraderie). Scotland scored very little, but England could muster even less.

Look, I suspect that this game was a bit of an anomaly. I've read a good bit from pundits about how Saracens not having played for a month and having been relegated meant that a lot of the English players came into this cold. A: None of ye were saying that before the game, lads (the pundits are all lads, of course) and B: I have absolutely no sympathy for Saracens after their disgraceful shenanigans, they got off very lightly. England have always been capable of an occasional disastrous performance like this, but always come back strong and are consistent in the likes of the World Cup. This is a blip and one that sees the Six Nations burst into competitive life. I still expect Ireland to beat Scotland and I expect an English backlash that will see them crush a few teams (i.e. us) before the tournament ends.

I enjoyed it all the same.

Wales 21 Ireland 16

Ah well. Look, losing the first game of the Six Nations effectively puts the kibosh on our campaign, and there's no point in pretending otherwise. It's an exercise in improvement towards the World Cup from here on in. Ireland could have won this, but we deserved to lose overall. That first catch by Alun Wynn Jones set the tone for me; Wales were up for this. Of course, playing their oldest team ever had a certain air of desperation about it and doesn't bode well for their future, but Welsh coach Pavin was desperate for a win and got it. Biggar, North, Wynn Jones...great players. Leigh Halfpenny fired them in front before Peter O'Mahony picked up a red card. O'Mahony was a great player and I've always liked him, but that was an old dog soldier's tackle – the aging legs were no longer in sync with the brain. It was reckless not malicious, but the red card aws deserved.

Ireland were a shambles for the first twenty minutes. Losing James Ryan, whom I was hugely impressed with (I previously thought him a bit over-hyped, but he is the real deal) didn't help. I thought Keenan and James Lowe were excellent; Lowe has been criticised for other players' positional mistakes in my opinion. Wales deserved to be more than 6-0 ahead.

Two penalties by Johnny Sexton (he wasn't great but he is still the best we have; it's a real worry) brought us level. Then came a moment of magic by Henshaw, a twisting dart of speed that left the Welsh defence for dead and Tadhg Beirne (limited but a great warrior) over for a try. Johnny converted and 14 man Ireland were ahead at half-time, 13-6. I have to admit that I was loving this game, not top quality, but great excitement.

George North with a great burst in the second half; Lowe did but it a little too easily. Halfpenny missed the conversion. Ireland were actually playing well here, but Wales were piling on the pressure and it eventually told as the Irish line was simply too stretched and Lou Rees-Zammit went over. This time Halfpenny slotted over and it was 18-13 to Wales. Ireland needed to score next; they didn't as a Welsh penalty put 8 points between them. 14 men to take the next two scores? I wasn't hopeful.

They gave it a great rattle, though. My heart goes out to Billy Burns - a mislaid pass cost us ground, a crossfield kick ended up in a Welsh lineout (it's not a popular opinion, but I was okay with him trying that on; it showed ambitious imagination to me and I like that in players) and his last kick was so wayward and out of touch that it ended a game we desperately needed to keep alive. Burns has been absolutely vilified in some quarters for his mistakes - arrah would ye all calm down? No player deserves that. I agree that Ross Byrne needs a look, we simply have to find a replacement for Sexton, but an underrated Jack Carty would be in pole position for me. Burns deserves and will get more chances. Allow me to make one thing abundantly clear; if Paddy Jackson is wearing green, I will be cheering loudly for the opposition every time. Bad defeat, but not that bad of a display. O'Mahony's red card was the turning point, and

the likes of Murray and Earls were surprisingly quiet. But I saw positives. Ryan and Keenan absolutely leapt up in my estimation. Lowe, Beirne, Henshaw were quality. Henderson has git and guts. We have decent players to come in (the notion that the absence of Caelan Doris was crucial is an exaggeration, to be honest, he's good but not an all-time great). I've seen Irish rugby in worse straits than this.

I don't expect us to beat France. But let's go and rattle them anyway.

The Kansas City Chiefs are the big ranchers, eager to sweep the Buccaneers out of their way. And they have The Kid. Bright, smiling, attractive to women (again, it's a cowboy trope). Lightning in his hands. He looks up to Old Tom, but you can't have two bulls in one herd. The showdown between Brady and Mahomes is inevitable.

Alright, it didn't really play out like that. The truth is that it was a very poor Superbowl game. The Chiefs never really got going, and their discipline was simply shocking. Plan A didn't work, and we never did earn what Plan B was meant to be. They got the first score on the board with a field goal, but those old Patriot partners Brady and Gronk combined fortouchdown number one. It was simply

The Weeknd (could you at least learn to spell, lad?) spent \$7m of his own money on the halftime show. God love him; you can't blame him for trying. I did feel relieved when he stopped trying, though. It was pretty bad.

The Chiefs really needed to hit hard and fast at the start of the second half. And they tried, they really did. Mahomes actually had a very good game, he couldn't be faulted. In fairness, they were missing Schwartz, Gay, and Fisher from their Offensive Line; Mahomes simply didn't have a fraction of the protection Tom Brady did. Mahomes gave it everything, Edwards Helaire and Pringle were outstanding. It just wasn't ever going to be enough against the fired up Buccaneers. At

CYCLING

Paudie Fitzgerald RIP

Sport in Kerry stems from tough traditions, and few if any can match cycling for toughness. It's as hard nowadays, by the way, cycling is a gruelling test of endurance and will power. You can ask Eugene Moriarty or Sean Lacey or Cathal Moynihan or Tom Moriarty about that.

A strong case can be made that they were even tougher in the heyday of the Rás Tailltean back in the fifties and early sixties. The toughest of them all, in my opinion the toughests sportsman ever to come out of Kerry (also, respectfully, the most eccentric) had to be the great Iron Man, himself. But no Kerry cyclist ever got an inch easily on the roads, and genial Lispole native Paudie Fitzgerald was as tough as any of them on the bike. He was good from an early age. He had to be; in pre-car days growing up surrounded by the daunting Conor

execution rather t h a n brilliance, but that perfect simplicity and synchronicity is the essence of the game and far harder than it looks. Brady was intercepted soon after, but the Buccs got lucky as a holding infringement saw it over-ruled. The Chiefs were getting caught on stupid pass interference, holding, silly stuff like that. The Buccs went for a field goal....and another stupid holding infringement saw them offered a first down instead. Brady to Gronkowski again and another conversion. 14-3 to Tampa Bay. At which point Tyrann Matthieu decides that he's going to get into Tom Brady's face. Lad, he has literally lived at this altitude for twenty years; you are already gasping for breath. You're going to psyche out Tom Brady? I'm sorry, but this is pitiful to watch. Just before half-time, with the Chiefs bizarrely killing the clock to keep play alive when they should have been regrouping, Brady finds another former Patriot in the endzone, Antonio Brown. 21-6 at half-time.

21-9, Brady found Leonard Fournett, who simply had incredible pace to power over the line. He got great cover as well; American Football uses screens as clearly as basketball and there's a subtlety to the runs that's actually very different to rugby; I'll admit that I sometimes have difficulty fully understanding the movement. 28-9, and a field goal really killed off the game.

The fourth quarter had an inevitability about it, but it still had two magic moments, both of them summoned by Mahomes. He produced an absolutely amazing pass while actually being swung around in a sacking - Pringle in the endzone just barely failed to make the catch. A minute later he did it again while under the same pressure; this time it was Williams who couldn't quite nail the catch.

Tom Brady now has seven Superbowl rings. That's more than any team in history.

BUECANEERS

In the end Mahomes, just like Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers earlier this season, had to give way to the old master. Mahomes, who like Brady would be drafted in baseball before choosing American football, was just six years old when the Patriots quarterback first lifted the Lombardi Trophy. 43 Year old Tom Brady (he has no intention of retiring) doesn't consume coffee, processed flour, dairy, or gluten, tomatoes, mushrooms, olive oil, and very little meat. His bedtime is usually 8.30pm. He now has seven Superbowl rings. That's more than any team in history.

Pass and broad Slea Head you learned how to cycle fast and hard. Fuelled by his mother's breakfast of porridge followed by raw eggs and sherry (a lovely recipe, methinks, if you left out the eggs and porridge), young Paudie quickly developed a name as a dedicated trainer. He was a little too naive in his first Rás in 1953, attacking too early and burning out while cuter heads bided their time. In 1954 he was doing well and expected support from fellow Kerrymen when he made a burst; he quickly learned that sentiment is fine in stories but has no place on the roads where champions were forged. In 1955 his team-mate the great Gene Mangan won; Paudie would have been right up there but for a bad crash.

It looked the same story in 1956. It was a tough Rás anyway, heightened by political tension; Irish cycling was acrimoniously split at the time between 32 county and 26 county associations. Paudie and co. were unapologetically Irish when it didn't have much international recognition. Paudie came off early in a crash and was badly scrambled, his father pushed him to finish the stage. Paudie's class responded to the challenge, he finished the stage second to Mangan and in real contention. That was Nenagh; the next stages were his own roads into Kerry. Paudie was first into Tralee and then Kenmare the following day. Then it was back to Nenagh. Himself and another cyclist led all the way but argued, tussled, and actually squared up to each other at one point. They hit upon a funeral cortege in Mitchelstown - Paudie went left of it, his rival went right. Paudie, purely by luck, had the clearer path and broke clear of the town. He ended the day in yellow and held it all the way into the finish line in Dublin. Paddy Moriarty won that stage to give Kerry the team victory in one of the greatest Rás Taillteanna of them all. Paudie Fitzgerald was Kerry to the core. He passed away this week; may he rest in peace.

LONELINESS IN **OLDER ADULTS**

At SouthWest Counselling Centre we are meeting more and more elderly people who are feeling isolated and alone. What strikes me is that whilst there is a lot of emphasis on help and support for younger people there is less awareness of the availability of supports for older people. As we all know, life is an on-going journey that can present challenges at any stage along the way. Bereavement, loneliness, declining health, fear of crime and loss of loved ones through emigration are issues that many older people are dealing with. Counselling can provide a clear space to do this and offers support and gives us. a fresh perspective on things.

Many older people are feeling lonely and isolated due to a lack of social contact and connection. Social isolation has been shown to have a detrimental effect on health and well-being. It is vital therefore that we stay connected, and whenever possible reach out to others and remain actively involved in life. As social beings, most of us feel the need for social contact and relationships. Therefore I would encourage someone who is feeing lonely to establish what opportunities for social connection already exist in their community. It doesn't matter initially whether they get anything out of the actual activity, as they may meet someone of like mind and it is a great opportunity for social connection.

There are many activities in which they can join when lockdown has been lifted. It may be useful to research options now and plan for normal times again. Adult education classes can be a great way to meet like-minded people whilst also acquiring new skills. They can also help to boost our confidence and make social interaction more pleasurable. Getting involved in Community Action Groups, Local History Groups or Sporting Activities can all be very enjoyable. Participating in local church activities, organised outings or book clubs can also help to feel more connected to others. Treating ourselves to massage or reflexology can also help to relieve loneliness. Another useful activity is letter writing, perhaps for a worthy cause - such as Amnesty International, Technology forums such as the internet may provide relief from boredom and loneliness. Perhaps you could enlist the help of a young person to learn these skills. If you are feeling lonely, reach out and talk to someone today.

When you apply to the Central Applications Office (CAO) for a college place, you must indicate on your CAO application that you wish to be considered for HEAR. To qualify for HEAR, you must meet certain indicators or criteria related to your financial, social and cultural circumstances. For example, your a medical card, attending a school in the DEIS (Delivering Equality of Opportunity in Schools) programme and living in a disadvantaged area.

You must apply to the CAO by 1 February 2021 and complete supporting documents must reach the CAO by 15 March 2021. Late applications are not accepted.

You should start preparing your HEAR application as soon as possible. You will need to gather supporting documents, such as information from the Revenue Commissioners, a statement

HEDGING

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance. Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through, it reduces its velocity. Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil.

- To choose he right hedge for your garden here are a few pointers to think about: The type of soil you have.
- How exposed the garden is, i.e what direction is it facing?
- The eventual height and width the hedge will be

Does it need to be evergreen?

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want, its time to prepare the soil. Start prepping the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year round but the ideal time is between November and March as all heding plants will be dormant at this time. What that means is that when you go to buy your hedging plants they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure that when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. If you have missed the bare rooted season at the end of March you can plant container grown bedging all year round. *Next week I will focus on trees.*
