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

COMMUNITY RALLIES IN 'PUSH FOR PAUL' FUNDRAISER

A week-long 350-kilometre multi-region wheelchair push in support of a Wexford man who was diagnosed with a life-altering disease in October 2019, is aiming to raise €100,000.

Paul Murphy, who living outside Killarney is living with Mitochondrial Myopathy (MM), a condition similar to Motor Neurone Disease (MND). This devastating diagnosis has left Paul wheelchair-bound, while also impairing his motor skills.

Married to Linda, with whom he has two children, Harry (14) and Sadie (9), the strength of character Paul has demonstrated in recent years has come as no surprise to those who know and love him best.

Rallying to the Murphy family's cause, 'A Push for Paul' shall see a group of Paul's friends pushing a wheelchair from Drogheda, starting on Sunday, April 21st all the way to Killarney Racecourse for a scheduled finish on Saturday, April 27th.

A graduate of Mountbellew Agricultural College in County Galway and hailing from a farming background in County Wexford, Paul has maintained contact with several of his classmates over the years.

Those decades-old links have wonderfully manifested themselves through a 2022 project which made Paul's home more accessible due to the reality of living with MM, along with April's cross-county walk, which will also raise awareness of the Irish Wheelchair Association's (IWA) outstanding work.

Event co-organiser John Heavey, a friend of Paul's who lives in County Louth, explained the motivation behind a 'Push for Paul'.

"It all came about following a conversation with Paul and Linda," he said. "Paul said he didn't know how difficult it was for a person in a wheelchair until he had to use one himself – and it wasn't something I'd devoted too much thought to prior to Paul's diagnosis. And that sparked something. Accessibility issues that wheelchair users encounter daily need to be highlighted as frequently as possible to help increase wider awareness of the issue."

John continued: "We'll be pushing a teddy called "Hardie" which is a mix of Paul's two children's names Harry and Sadie in a wheelchair in relays from Drogheda to Trim, Trim to Tullamore, Tullamore to Nenagh, Nenagh to Adare, Adare to Castleisland and then from Castleisland to Killarney Racecourse on Saturday, April 27th. This is going to be a



team event so it's not going to be reserved to one person or one group covering the entire distance.

"While we're busy training for the event, we're also hoping that interested members of the public and companies will get involved to help us realise our €100,000 fundraising target. So far, we've been blown away by the individual and corporate support we've received, which we are so grateful for."

The ambitious campaign has already exceeded the €90,000 mark, with Paul's family and neighbours in Killarney, in addition to the many friends he has made through college and rugby, all admirably doing their bit.

"My world has gone very small," said Paul. "For someone who travelled far and wide, to Australia and so on, it has been a huge and difficult change for me. Linda has been absolutely brilliant; she's made sure that we've kept going to Harry and Sadie's matches together, which means a lot to me and to us as a family. Just because I'm in a wheelchair doesn't mean I can't be a parent. But I'm keeping myself going, I'm keeping myself busy and that's very important. I have to do something."

"Back in my days studying Agribusiness at Mountbellew and playing rugby with GMIT, I could never have thought that all these years later, so many of the people I met then would still be there for me now, offering me and my family such amazing support."

Paul concluded: "On behalf of myself, Linda, Harry and Sadie, I want to sincerely thank everybody who has been involved in the campaign. The kindness that so many people have offered means so much."

Pauls wife Linda says the family have been overwhelmed with support and the goodwill shown both locally and across the country means a lot. "I would also like to highlight accessibility issues for wheelchair users, especially in social and sporting settings. We are very lucky that our club Listry has created an accessible area for Paul so he can watch his children train and play matches . The community support has been amazing but I wish to extend this to all GAA clubs all over the country . It is essential that every GAA ground from local clubs to large stadiums are accessible to all so that people can follow their sporting passion. This is a message I wish to continue to promote into the future, we have seen how Pauls world has become smaller in recent months and years, maximising quality socialising opportunities is essential.


Minister Foley announces €2.7 million in funding for primary, post-primary and special schools in Kerry

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D, Norma Foley has today announced €2.7 million in funding to support digital learning in schools and minor building works in Kerry.

€50 million in grant funding for Information and Communications Technology (ICT) will issue shortly to all recognised primary and post-primary schools across the country, while a separate €29 million in

minor works funding is being provided to primary and special schools. The ICT funding is being provided to schools to help them continue to use digital technologies in their teaching, learning and assessment, while the minor works funding can be used by these schools for maintenance and small-scale improvements to school buildings and grounds. The €50 million ICT grant represents the second

tranche of ICT funding under the Digital Strategy for Schools to 2027. Schools previously received €50m in ICT grant funding for the 2021 to 2022 school year. Minister Foley said: "I am pleased today to be announcing funding which will support primary, postprimary and special schools in Kerry and throughout Ireland to enhance both school settings and teaching and learning, to benefit our pupils and students.

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Time for our MEPs to put hands up in their role in worsening the housing crisis

Germany's leading news magazine, Der Spiegel has published a damning critique of Ireland's housing crisis. The property and rental market has spiralled "out of control". The lack of housing is the worst since the Famine, the top selling magazine said.

'Der situation' in Killarney may be eased with the new permission for hundreds of residences in Upper Park. An Bord Pleanala decided there was no danger of over burdening the Killarney wastewater treatment plant as anglers from Killorglin feared. We shall see.

Work on the 249 dwellings - 143 houses and 106 apartments - will start immediately on the eight hectare site. Housing, as new Taoiseach Simon Harris said on Tuesday, 'remains the greatest societal and economic challenge of our generation'.

I was in the new Custom House visitor centre as outgoing Taoiseach Leo Varadkar delivered his exit speech. The Custom House had been the British administrative centre for Ireland. It was responsible for the workhouse system and for public works in the lukewarm attempt to the 19th century poverty. I glanced across the Liffey and took in a shiny new office building almost complete. Solutions to the Housing crisis stared me in the face: My Home.ie - that foundling of the Celtic Tiger - said 4.6% above asking prices were being paid for houses amid 'fierce' competition for limited supply. Other reports have detailed how office buildings are emptying and are not in demand. Turn the offices into homes! The EU now governs as the British once did, setting laws and measures and determining the economy. Yet they are lukewarm about giving the young a fair shot at life - just as the Brits hadn't the bottle to tackle the landlord class on poverty 150 years ago.

I met a couple from Valencia on the train to



Dublin. They have moved to Cork for jobs, and for housing. Housing is tight in Spain and there is no chance of a place of their own in Cork either. The European elections are coming up. Our own MEP Sean Kelly and others ought to be asked tough questions. All the main party MEPs - FG, FF, SF - have opened the doors of this country too wide these past two years and encouraged unfettered immigration from outside the EU in line with European policy against Russia. The Irish MEPs more than most have made a bad situation worse at home.

We have 100,000 Ukrainians alone and they are now competing with the young and not so young Irish for a roof. And do not the Ukrainians deserve housing dignity too?

A return to the Killarney of Culture

Pan Celtic the colourful musical gathering that was founded in Killarney 50 years ago, attracted 2,000 visitors from across the six Celtic countries to Carlow town and region last week. It was one of the most exciting and colourful Spring events of my youth. Killarney would be awash with Breton singing and harpists, choirs from Wales in the town hall ballroom and art competitions up in the Parish Hall. We have gone all out outdoors in Killarney. But have we lost sight of culture? Our Bach festival has gone too and I know from speaking with local musicians how difficult they find it getting venues and funding, especially since Covid.

But has Failte Ireland also lost sight of the importance of culture? Wander Wild for

instance got 25,000 euro in funding from the agency both this year and last year. Pan Celtic did not get one penny. Failte Ireland says it wants to encourage outdoor events that are off season.

'Wander Wild received 25,000 Euro under the Failte Ireland Outdoor Active Scheme in both 2023 and 2024. Our high impact festivals in Mullingar, Kerry, Donegal, Galway, Wexford, Cork and Cork County attract incremental international visitors who spend more and stay longer during the off-peak months. Failte Ireland has been providing capital investment to local authorities to improve their outdoor facilities and trails. To compliment this work, we developed the Outdoor Active Scheme to support and develop Outdoor Active Festivals,' a Failte Ireland spokeswoman said.

Pan Celtic was a fantastic festival and full marks to founder Con O'Connell, of Cork-Kerry Tourism and an enthusiastic committee such as the late Eileen Scott, Noel Grimes others. I was involved too in the latter days. But it couldn't be retained in a Killarney turning it face to mass tourism.

It had diminishing support and at the time practically no Irish agency funding. There had been a decline too, dare I say it, in culture vultures and historically minded people in Killarney. The drain continues - it seems to be all about brawn rather than brain in this town these days.

But it might be time to put our thinking caps on again.

Postcards from the Edge of History

Postcards from the edge: The history of Killarney tourism is writ large in the library at the moment.

I happened in as Killarney postcards from the late 1800s to the 1920s was being erected by Mary Horgan Rafferty, the founder of Vintage Irish Postcards.

Mary told me she has been fascinated by postcards all her life and her collecting has ranged across the sea to France where there are avid postcard collectors and where she has found many treasures. Killarney has older postcards than any other town and while the earliest were small and tiny illustrations, others with full pictures followed. Local photographer Louis Anthony, founder of photography in Killarney, was one of the foremost producers and hotels also published their own.

Others too were produced by outsiders and were in the form of Kerry jokes, poking fun at the local Irish, it has to be said.

Mary's grandparents' thatched house on the Dingle peninsula was one of John Hinde's iconic postcards. And she wonders if that perhaps is where her fascination and first exposure to postcards really started.

'I believe that postcards hold information that is not found elsewhere and should be used more by is of huge value to heritage, tourism, educationalists and designers,' says Mary who has financed the display of her postcards herself.

Vintage Irish Postcards has a Facebook page.

The Vintage Irish Postcard display continues until Saturday 13th in Killarney Library. It is accompanied by a display of Victorian and Edwardian souvenirs by Brendan O'Sullivan.

SOUTH KERRY'S YOUTH SHOW THEIR ARTISTIC POTENTIAL

Young people from across South Kerry have been showing their artistic potential recently as part of an art course organised by South Kerry Development Partnership CLG and funded through the LEADER programme.

The 10-week course, run in Killarney, Killorglin and Cahersiveen, offered young people the opportunity to learn the skills needed to produce outdoor art projects such murals. The courses were supported by the KDYS in Killarney, the Sean Scoil in Killorglin as well as Foróige in Cahersiveen who provided room space to enable them take place. They were tutored by well-known artist Mike O'Donnell and the course covered areas such as Anatomy & Figure Drawing, Colour, Digital Drawing, Typography & Lettering as well as Mural Design and Painting Techniques.

SKDP CEO Noel Spillane said that he is delighted with the outcome of the courses as it is the first time SKDP undertook such an initiative in the region. "While there are many activities for youth in South Kerry who have an interest in sports, there are much less activities for those who are not and this course provided an outlet for some of those" he said. He thanked the groups for supporting the development of the project through providing the room spaces in the three areas and said he hoped that there will be an opportunity to work with them to build on this initiative under the new LEADER programme. "I would encourage community groups out there who are potentially interested in developing murals in their areas to contact Mike and his team of young artists who may be able to assist them" Noel added.

Artist Mike O'Donnell said that the young people involved were a wonderfully creative and diverse group who were a joy to work with as young artists. "Each of them has a unique voice that is needed now more than ever" he noted and added that South Kerry is richer with these young people expressing themselves. Mike described it as a unique project that provided the young people involved with the scope and space to explore and develop their artistic talent and he hopes that many of them will develop careers in the artistic sector in the future.

A very special Killarney boy has helped the Rose of Tralee launch their new partnership with Cliona's Foundation. Sean Howard along with his parents Katie and Michael met with the Rose of Tralee, New York Rose, Roisin Wiley who is currently in Ireland as part of her role within the festival.

Roisin is now an ambassador for Clionas Foundation and will be joining a cohort of Roses and Rose Escorts in walking the Camino De Santiago to raise funds and awareness this April. All funds raised will go directly to providing financial support to the families that Cliona's support.

Cliona's is a national charity providing financial assistance directly to parents of seriously sick children with life-limiting or chronic complex care needs across Ireland to help with the non-medical expenses related to caring for their child. Since 2008 the foundation has provided financial assistance to over 1300 families.

The foundation was set up by Brendan and Terry Ring, following the death of their daughter Cliona, from an inoperable brain tumour in 2006 aged 15. Over the years, as Cliona underwent numerous different hospital treatments, Brendan and Terry were struck by the number of families, facing enormous financial hardship, on the brink of financial freefall, blindsided by non-medical expenses piling up. They saw at first-hand the enormous toll it took on these families, already struggling to cope with the nightmare of having a seriously ill child.

Joining the Roses from Arizona, Wexford, Boston New England, Toronto, Carlow will be Escorts from Mayo, Limerick, Kilkenny and the USA and co-founder of Cliona's Foundation, Terry Ring. Terry walked the Inaugural Camino for Cliona's with 36 transition year students from all over Munster last June. This year 101 students have signed up to walk the Camino for Cliona's from all over Ireland. The route the Roses and Rose Escorts will walk is 120kms, beginning in the Portuguese city of Valenca and finishing in the Spanish city at the Cathedral in Santiago De Compostela.

Speaking of the Festival's reason for getting involved with Cliona's, Festival Director Suzan said "The Rose of Tralee Festival is delighted to partner with Cliona's Foundation. The foundation is a wonderful charity who provide crucial financial support to families who are caring for a child with a serious illness. Roisin and I recently met a family supported by Cliona's and learned first-hand how much relief the financial support provides. The Rose class of 2023 are so excited to be getting involved and to be able to walk the Camino to raise awareness for Clionas Foundation, and to show solidarity with the many families all over Ireland who need this help. Supporting charitable work is very much at the heart of what our Festival

does - a Rose really can make a difference. We are thrilled to be able to shine a light on the great work Cliona's Foundation does, and to support such a worthy and meaningful cause through this new partnership".

A recent survey conducted by Cliona's shows how families with sick children are often disproportionately affected by situations out of their control, such as rapidly increasing living costs. These are parents who are in a living nightmare and the last thing they should have to worry about are bills. Cliona's survey found that in 70% of families, at least one parent must give up their jobs to care for their sick child leaving them struggling to cope. Studies have highlighted that a family will need between €10,000 and €15,000 a year to cover various non-medical costs while their child is ill.

During Róisín's visit, the Rose was delighted to meet one such family in Killarney, the Howards. Their two year old son Seán was recently diagnosed with a progressive genetic condition which means he needs a lot of care. Commenting on the visit, Róisín said: "I am very proud to be an ambassador for Cliona's and to support such a worthy cause. The Howards are such a wonderful family, Sean is a bright and loving boy. It was a real privilege to spend time with them and to learn about the love and care they give to Sean and his brother Dan. KERRY COUNTY **COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

Iith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

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

brings plenty of experience and there can be no doubt that Swords will be smarting from the league defeat.





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The People with disabilities once again forgotten by Government

The Government and the DRS trading as Re-turn who was employed by the Minister, gave no consideration to people with disabilities when designing and implementing the bottles and cans return machines.

Wheelchair users cannot access the slot for inserting the bottles and cans as it is too high and out of their reach. This was total negligence on behalf of Re-turn and indeed Minister Smyth who should have issued a directive to make provision for people with disabilities. Not only are wheelchair user precluded from using the deposit return machines but people with impaired vision also have difficulties in operating the machines as there is no braille marking on

the machines.

Many people with disabilities are very independent and lead independent lives and returning their used cans and bottles should not be an obstacle for them. They should not be forced to ask for help at these machines. Likewise, people with impaired vision should not be put in a position to have to ask someone to operate the machine for them.

People with disabilities should be provided with all necessary means to enable them to lead a normal independent life and our Government has failed them miserably on this occasion.



CLOSING DATE FOR THE UISCE EIREANN WATER & WASTE WATER REFUND SCHEME

Cllr. Brendan Cronin is reminding people that the closing date for the Uisce Eireann water & waste water refund scheme is coming

"Last year an initiative was introduced or a 12 month period whereby subject to criteria, a person building a new house could apply to Uisce Eireann for a connection refund for a new water connection and or wastewater connection under the Temporary Time Limited connection refund scheme. The closing date for this scheme is

the 24th of April 2024 and it is important for any one interested in this scheme to lodge their application as soon as possible before the April 24th closing date. This can be done on line by login on to the Uisce Eireann website and opening the Temporary Time Limited refund section where application forms and criteria are available. The standard single domestic water connection fee is €2272 and standard single domestic wastewater connection fee is €3929.

CALL FOR MINISTER TO HELP FARMERS

Danny Healy Rae, TD has called on the Minister for Agriculture and the Government to act on behalf of all farmers who are suffering immensely because of the continuous incessant rain. Many farmers are suffering cash flow problems and can't afford to buy bales of silage which are costing up to €60 a bale.

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DISAPPOINTMENT FOR KERRY IN THE LEAGUE FINAL

Armagh 2-12 Kerry 2-9

Aimee Mackin and Kelly Mallon combined for 1-9 at Croke Park on Sunday as Armagh got the better of defending champions Kerry to claim the Lidl National Football League Division 1 title for the very first time.

Having lost out by three points to the Kingdom in a NFL Division 2 decider at the same venue two years ago, this is a sweet victory for an Armagh side that were also appearing in their maiden top tier league showpiece.

A fine point by Aoife McCoy edged Armagh in front for a second time after free-takers Mallon and Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh had exchanged early frees, but the Kingdom received a massive boost when Lorraine Scanlon fired to the net on 10 minutes after a dead-ball strike from Ní Mhuircheartaigh had dropped short. This was only a minor set-back for Armagh, however, as midfielder Niamh Coleman palmed a goal of her own after Kerry netminder Mary Ellen Bolger had knocked down Mackin's attempt at a point.

An earlier Mallon score meant Armagh led 1-3 to 1-1 on the first-quarter mark and this cushion was extended when Mallon superbly split the uprights from an acute left-hand angle.

Yet Kerry never allowed panic to creep into their play and three points on the bounce from Ní Mhuircheartaigh had the sides level at 1-4 apiece during the break.

After Mary O'Connell pounced on a defensive mishap by Armagh three minutes into the second half, Niamh Ní Chonchuir comfortably fired home a second Kingdom goal.

While this looked like being a major blow for the Orchard County, but they were instead galvanised in the minutes that followed Ní Chonchuir's major. After unanswered points from Mallon, Mackin (two) and Niamh Henderson moved Armagh in front once again, the increasingly-dangerous Mackin rifled an unstoppable shot to the roof of the Kerry net on 39 minutes.

Further points from the Shane O'Neills ace

either side of the third-quarter mark suddenly left Armagh six ahead, but much-needed contributions from Ní Mhuircheartaigh (two) and Hannah O'Donoghue offered fresh life to the Kingdom challenge.

Their deficit remained at three points when centre half-back Ciara Murphy cancelled out a Mallon free with a well-worked score, but even though Ní Mhuircheartaigh added her seventh point for a battling Kerry, substitute Corrina Doyle also found the range to ensure Armagh sealed a breakthrough success.

ORCHARD COUNTY HAND **KERRY LADIES A HARD Lesson** LADIES DIVISION ONE FINAL

Armagh 2-12 Kerry 2-9

Tough day at the office. The hardest thing about this is that I was fairly confident coming into it. I was (and still am) delighted with Kerry's progress during the National League in general. Kerry mixed and matched really well, able to give the likes of Louise Ní Muircheartaigh and Danielle O'Leary a bit of breathing room to deal with little niggles while giving the likes of Emma Dineen (a massive card back in Kerry's deck) and Deirdre Kearney the chance to assert themselves. In those circumstances, getting to a League Final was a big statement in itself. Sure, we were well beaten by a hungrier Armagh side on their home ground, but I felt that the more open spaces of Croke Park and Kerry's kicking speed in transition would yield a different result.

You have to give Armagh credit. They knew Kerry's gameplan perfectly and swallowed it up in an old-fashioned, unentertaining, but highly effective blanket defence. It's not necessarily pretty, it never was, but when done with this kind of intensity and drive, it's still one of the most highly effective tactics in the modern game. To begrudge it in these circumstances would be curmudgeonly at best. Armagh outplayed us and deserved every bit of their win against a full strength (I know Siofra is a major absentee, but we all knew she wasn't going to be a factor in this one) Kerry. Fair play to them; they were superb, especially in transitioning from all-out defence to rapid attack. The Kerry defence actually stood up to it fairly well overall, Mary Ellen Bolger made great saves in each half, but our engines just never fired. Or more accurately and more worryingly, weren't allowed to fire.

The first half was cagey enough. Armagh announced their intentions early, drawing a great save out of Mary Ellen Bolger before play was called back for a handy enough free for Kelly Mallon. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh replied : in kind after Hannah O'Donoghue was impeded already you could see Armagh dropping back to form a hard nucleus. Kerry were getting possession but, with Armagh dropping deep, we looked a little slow in getting it into our forwards fast enough before the space was closed off by orange jerseys.

Aoife McCoy picked off an Armagh point. Louise Ni Muircheartaigh had a free drop short, but Armagh uncharacteristically let it pinball in their square instead of repelling all boarders, and Lorraine Scanlon has been punishing that kind of mistake for years now. The Desmonds star made no mistake from close range.

I thought that might force Armagh to come out and leave little gaps for an inspired Kerry to pick at. Instead, it was the opposite. Armagh showed great composure to stay completely calm and focussed. Kelly Mallon picked off her second free. Aimee Mackin has long been Armagh's main threat – one of the best players in the game, truth be told – but Eilís Lynch shadowed her really well and got enough pressure to have the shot drop short off the crossbar. So far, so good, but disaster struck as Niamh Coleman was quick enough to fist the leather home. Kelly Mallon pointed from play and Kerry were three points down. More telling, it was genuinely reflective of the balance of play. Armagh were taking the game to us, not the other way around.

Kerry needed something and finally showed why they were in this final in the first place. A tireless Niamh Ó Chonchúir, a trench warrior all day long, picked off a point and Louise Ní Muircheartaigh -Armagh understandably maintained a very close but clean watching brief on the hard-working Corca Dhuibhne bean laoch - coolly slotted two frees. Level pegging at the break, but that was slightly flattering for the reigning champions.

Kerry started the second half brightly. A rare error in the Armagh defence saw a bad handpass snaffled up by an alert Mary O'Connell, who laid off to Niamh Ní Chonchúir for a clinical finish.

Once again, though, Armagh remained completely unruffled. In fact, they promptly took the game by the scruff of the neck and Kerry simply had no answer. We were coughing up fairly alarming turnovers under fierce pressure and running into an unrelenting orange wall. Kelly Mallon slotted another point from play. Aimee Mackin got on the scoreboard with a free. Niamh Henderson brought Armagh level. Armagh had a multiplicity of threats; Kerry weren't really producing any. Aimee Mackin put them in front. It would have been worse if Mary Ellen Bolger hadn't emerged quickly to give Niamh Henderson no angle for goal from close

Kerry sprang Danielle O'Leary from the bench in an effort to shake up a stymied half forward line. Correct decision, in my opinion, but there just wasn't any space for the Rathmore assassin to work her magic.

Instead, the hammer blow landed at the other end. Kelly Mallon had posed problems all day and more good play from her found Aimee Mackin, and, well....a player of Mackin's calibre is never going to spurn a chance like that. This time not even Mary Ellen could prevent it finding the net. The same player added two frees. To be bluntly honest about it, there was one team in this game....and it wasn't us.

Two frees from Louise Ní Muircheartaigh meant that Kerry were still clinging on by their fingertips. Four points in it and plenty of time, provided we could force the tide to turn. A lad named Canute tried that trick one time, beating the waves with his sword to no avail (Canute, or Cnut Sweynson to give his proper name, was a medieval king of England, Denmark, and Norway, and actually demonstrating to some of his more foolish thegns how little nature cared for such grandiose titles).

Armagh appear to have leapfrogged Cork in terms of contenders (make no mistake; Cork can still be absolutely deadly in championship football) but, as I said initially, Kerry have unearthed serious talent en route to this final. Believe it or not, the likes of Louise Ní Muircheartaigh and Lorraine Scanlon have never actually met Brendan Martin in person, and it feels like time for that to change (not that fate gets a say in these things). This result is a setback in that journey, but certainly not a full stop.

KERRY MINOR HURLERS LOSE OUT TO LAOIS LEINSTER MINOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeat was the lot for our Kerry minors as well, but this was a completely different display. The minors may well have taken confidence from their previous win over Carlow. Certainly, this seems to be the correct grade for them, with victories attainable but certainly hard to come by. That's exactly what you want to nurture a

core group of players going forward in any sport. Kerry looked the better outfit for a lot of the first half – and that was with both sides playing well. Kerry had early scores from Ivan Conway and Jake Rochford. Laois pulled one back but John Curtin and sharpshooter Evan O'Sullivan (2f) soon had Kerry 0-6 to 0-1 in front. Cian Harris made a fantastic save to deny Laois a goal but could do nothing about their next chance and it was 0-5 to 1-1. Kerry responded well, with Evan O'Sullivan's accuracy leaving them 0-10 to 1-3 at half-time, albeit having had the strong wind in their favour.

Laois, understandably enough, hit back fast with the first two points of the second half. Eoin O'Flaherty kept Kerry two points in front but another Laois goal nudged them in front.

The Queen's County (it was named in honour of Mary Tudor in 1556 - English protestants called the would-be catholic restorer 'Bloody Mary' with good reason, though her protestant half sister and heir Elizabeth was not exactly a shrinking violet either!) quickly added two points. Usually this is where Kerry minor teams are supposed to fold up the tents, having acquitted themselves honourably on the field of play. This Kerry team scorned the notion. Ivan Conway trimmed the gap by one. And then Kerry pulled a rabbit out of their hat. Liam O'Sullivan sent a long free down towards the Laois square. It broke loose and John Curtin did superbly to get a flick on it towards the path of an alert Evan O'Sullivan. Suddenly, dramatically, the net was bulging and Kerry were a point in front.

Laois responded in style, to their credit, racing down the final for a goal themselves. Kerry, now two points down, threw kitchen sink and all at them and were caught for a second goal in injury time. So be it. As well pay the same price of defeat for the sake of a lamb as well as a sheep. Kerry can be enormously pleased with their display, even if qualification now almost certainly requires a result against a strong Kildare side (Laois will be strongly fancied against Carlow).

Jerome O'Sullivan and his management team deserve huge credit for this battling display. I for one certainly hope it has put to bed any idea of the Kerry minor hurlers competing as a team in the Munster Colleges Harty Cup. We don't have a team in the A grade of that competition, but the likes of Tralee CBS, Mercy Mounthawk, and Causeway Comprehensive have established strong traditions at lower grades and I would be very strongly in favour of keeping that going as a feeder base alongside the clubs for our Kerry minors. Not that it would happen anyway - the traditional colleges like Flannans, Ardscoil Ris, Christain Brothers, Coláiste Choilm, and De La Salle Waterford would have understandable conniptions at the notion. I wouldn't blame them.

Not a lot that can be said. Kerry hurling, at all levels, is not in a good place right now. I wasn't able to make this game myself, and I didn't fancy us to win, but I really wasn't expecting a mauling like this from the Lilywhites. I was happy with that team selection - I'd have maybe had Gary O'Riordan at centre back and driving forward, but that's a minor quibble. O'Riordan was fantastic at corner back for Mercy Mounthawk in their Corn Uí Mhuirí campaign and also played very well for St. Brendans in a Kerry U20 championship where the overall quality really gave me hope. Coincidentally, a lot of that Kildare U20 team hailed for Naas CBS, although more so last year's team than the one knocked out by O'Riordan's Mounthawk team this year. In fact, O'Riordan's school team-mates Odhran Ferris, Paddy Lane, and Tomás Kennedy, as well as lads like Cormac Dillon, Charlie Keating, and Luke Crowley would have surely featured for Kerry's hurlers at the grade if they were not already committed to the footballers.

Apropos of absolutely nothing, I'm told that when Kerry lined out against Kildare in the 1903 All Ireland Final – played in November 1905, such was the championship schedule in those days before the split season! – they wore all white, including whitewashed boots and togs made out of flourbags from the Lilywhite Bakery. Hence the county's nickname.

This, unfortunately, was a hammering. It was 0-2 apiece early on but the writing was already on the wall (since I'm in the mood for whimsy and don't really want to write about the actual hurling, I'll point out that the saying comes from the Old Testament Book of Daniel, where a mysterious hand writes on the wall during the feast of Belshazzar prophesying his end at the hand of the Persians). By half-time Kildare led by 2-9 to 0-4 and there was a whopping 21 points between the sides at the finish. Kerry have one game left but frankly, the result is entirely moot before the sliotar is even thrown in. A few years ago Kerry were absolutely dominating the B grade and I was wondering how we could turn that progress into A grade currency. Those days seem a lot closer to the zenith than the nadir in days like this one!

made Kerry FC a very hard team to beat. We : still aren't a high-scoring team anyway, but we are always good enough to create at least one goal and nick another. The key difference with last year is that the defence as a while are much more assured. Last year we had a little bit of a soft underbelly, always capable of spilling a ball or neglecting the back post or skewing a clearance. That isn;'t happening this year and that gives midfield a platform to look forward as well as minding the house. I genuinely feel that people under-estimate the element of trust in soccer matches in particular - one of the delights of soccer as a game is that just one small error can carry a huge price tag. Goals are at such a premium compared to other sports (one score apiece is actually the most common result worldwide in soccer, with one nil being second) that the risk/reward ratio is perfectly balanced. A team that concedes soft goals is on the rapid road to nowhere.

Kerry have been there before, but Kerry are rising. Longford dominated the early possession but, not for the first time this season, Kerry's defence kept their formation and controlled the access channels perfectly. There were no last gasp tackles or spectacular fingertip saves on the Kerry side; they simply weren't required. In fact, it was Longford's keeper who had to be sharp to deny Daniel Okwute's speculative effort and then a stinging effort by Kennedy Amechi, with Seán O'Connell not far away from heading home the resultant corner.

The opening goal arrived after half an hour, Daniel Okwute smoothly laying off to Ryan Kelliher, who intelligently found Steven Healy with time to measure his pass to the advancing Seán McGrath. Neat play, nicely controlled, and the midfielder deftly turned on the proverbial sixpence and picked, and more crucially, found his spot. 1-0 Kerry FC. 50 games for Kerry, and McGrath has featured in every single one. That goal execution amply demonstrates why.

Kerry took almost complete control of the remainder of the half. Ironically, it was Longford who actually had the best scoring chanced, a good diving header by Luke Wade-Slater that skinned just wide. Fair play to the lad for having a

great go at it but let's not pretend to be neutral – even more fair play to him for missing it!

Honestly, this was far better than I was really expecting. Maybe not quite what any Irish supporter was really hoping, but let's be honest, unless your bottle of water turned into wine in your hand, that kind of miracle was never going to happen.

The Lionesses took us to town from the start and frankly, if they were a little bit more clinical, they could have been well out of sight by the halftime whistle. Unlike France, who ran direct at us, especially down the left wing, England spread the ball around a lot more and drew us out. It worried me from the off - a high defensive line leaves space behind and England's attackers have more pace than our defence. Mind you, stay back in your shell and a team on top can always pick you off it's a balance between robbing Peter and paying Paul, so I certainly wouldn't call it a strategic malfunction. The bottom line is that they are simply better than us, more clinical with their first touch, more aware of positional possibilities, and really, really good at closing down the opposition. They are one of the best teams in the world; we are decent aspirants. That's the reality.

Ireland technically had the first chance, Katie McCabe (Ireland's talisman was closely guarded all night) swung in an early corner, but it was comfortably gathered. England took over, sending in some inviting crosses but not quite able to finish. It had a certain inevitability about it, though; that kind of pressure always tells before too long. Sure enough, with eleven minutes gone, Lucy Bronze heads a cross down across the goal. Patton got a touch but hadn't time to control it and it spilled out to Lauren James, who made what was actually a technical enough strike look easy. England 1 Ireland 0. It's going to be a long night.

Very long. England double their advantage just seven minutes later when Ruesha Littlejohn concedes a penalty. Despite some grumbling from Irish supporters, it's a blatant call. If you run at the player in possession windmilling your arms...well, I'm sorry, but that's hand to ball all day, not the other way around. It doesn't matter whether you meant it or not; that's not a natural position for your arms. Alex Greenwood sent Courtney Brosnan (the goalkeeper was actually Ireland's best player on the night, which is a telling enough statement in itself) the wrong way. Just

over quarter of an hour played and Ireland were 2-0 down. If you told me that it would be the final score-line, I'd have happily shaken your hand on the deal there and then.

It would be easy to say that we were showing England too much respect, but that's almost always a cheap shot. They were taking that much respect for themselves, completely nullifying any move we made, and there wasn't a lot we could do about it.

Half an hour in, England get another penalty. That was a harsher call, I don't think Louise Quinn could have done a lot about it, but if it had been an England player, I'd have been listening for the whistle. This time Greenwood hits the post – a real let-off. We got to the break without conceding anything else...but only just. The truth is that only one team played in that first half, the other one spent the whole time fighting fires.

The third quarter saw the same pattern, England dominating, but Ireland just about doing enough to hold them out. In the 65th minute Courtney Brosnan made a superb save. Gradually, though, Ireland seemed to finally be growing into this game. Katie McCabe sends a good ball into Louise Quinn, who sends a wicked one across the England square. Nobody could get a final touch, but that was a real chance and a refreshing whiff of sulphur. Five minutes later Hayes got a head to McCabe's corner, but couldn't power it past Hampton. It's too late for Ireland to realistically get anything from this game, but a goal would be a massive boost to morale.

It didn't happen, but to be fair, it wasn't for the lack of trying. Ireland played more actual football in the last twenty minutes than the seventy before it, powered by McCabe and Megan Connolly sending the ball straight into the danger-zone. Shades of Jack Charlton's simplistic approach? Well, why not? POMO ain't pretty (most definitely not), but it's fine as an underdog strategy, and we were massive underdogs here. Let's face it; we got nailed when the draw was made, and we all knew it. I was expecting a score-line like 5-0. I actually think Ireland can be reasonably proud in the circumstances, and I think England, who could yet be haunted by that draw against Sweden, will actually be a little disappointed with their overall execution. I'll take it. We are where we are.

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STATE EXAM CANDIDATES MUST NOW FOCUS ON JUNE'S WRITTEN EXAMS

WRITTEN EXAMS

Just over seven weeks remain before the state exams get underway on Wednesday, 5th June. The Leaving Certificate exams, the Junior Cycle exams and the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) exams will run until Tuesday, 25th June, Monday, 17th June and Thursday, 13th June, respectively.

GRADES

The H/O/F grading system and the CAO common points system have been very successful since first introduced in 2017. The grades cover multiples of ten percentage points and 625 points is the maximum attainable CAO score. Grades from H1 to H7 are awarded points at Higher Level, grades from O1 to O6 merit points at Ordinary Level, while grades F1 and F2 are awarded points at Foundation Level by certain institutions.

JUNIOR CYCLE

At Junior Cycle level, in addition to classroom-based assessments (CBA) during second and third years, students complete a state exam after three years and are awarded a Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement. All Junior Cycle subjects have undergone syllabus change and no Junior Cycle exam lasts longer than two hours. In addition, all subjects are now examined at common level except for Irish, English and Mathematics, which are still offered at both Higher and Ordinary levels. Six grade descriptors - Distinction (90% to 100%), Higher Merit (75% to < 90%), Merit (55% to < 75%), Achieved (40% to < 55%), Partially Achieved (20% to < 40%), Not Graded (0% to < 20%) – are used in the Junior Cycle exam.

OPTIMISM

Candidates can approach the state exams optimistically because they are well prepared by a dedicated teaching force. The national results achieved each year in the state exams are very impressive. In addition, places in further and higher education courses, apprenticeships and traineeships are very plentiful in a buoyant economy. At this stage, there will certainly be more places available than there will be applicants to take up these places. More employment opportunities are available to school leavers as the economic continues to

thrive. However, if the trend of previous years continues, the vast majority of Leaving Cert exam candidates will continue in education as the changing nature of the work environment means that employers are looking for staff with qualifications at craft, traineeship, degree or post-graduate level.

CERTIFICATION

The stigma of failure has long gone from the state exams. Back in the day, failure in Irish meant overall failure. Thankfully, those days are far behind us. Every candidate's performance is now acknowledged by individual certification. Leaving Cert exam candidates' main aim nowadays is to achieve the minimum entry requirements, the specific course requirements and the points for their preferred courses. The State Examinations Commission (SEC) also provides a range of exam supports, known as Reasonable Accommodations at Certificate Examinations (RACE), for candidates with physical, visual, hearing and learning difficulties in order to remove, as far as possible, the impact of the disability on the candidate's performance in the exams. This facility ensures that no candidate for the state exams is disadvantaged because of a disability.

GOOD MANAGEMENT

Despite all the media hype about exam pressure, all you need is a cool head, a positive attitude, optimum use of the remaining weeks, good personal and time management, plenty of nutritious food, rest and an exercise programme to burn off any excess stress. Approach the exams with confidence, do your best during the remaining weeks and at the actual exams. Then forget about them and enjoy the summer. Exams should be kept in perspective. They are just another milestone on the eventful journey through life.

SCHEDULE

With the oral exams now concluded and practical coursework, project work and study reports, due to be completed during the next few weeks, exam candidates have a great opportunity to bank precious marks. Course work in Music, Home Economics,

Art, Construction Studies, Fincery, Religious Education, Politics & Society, Geography and Engineering will all help candidates to ease into exam mode. The Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) Link Modules written exam takes place on Wednesday, 1st May. The written exam in Leaving Cert Computer Science will take place on Wednesday, 22nd May. In the few remaining weeks, the written papers become the major focus of attention as the June exams draw ever closer.
