

## Ronan Keating Returns to Killarney for BBC Documentary



inger and broadcaster Ronan Keating is back in familiar surroundings this week as filming continues for his upcoming BBC Northern Ireland documentary, which follows him along the scenic Wild Atlantic Way.

Keating, who spent many childhood holidays in Killarney, has been reminiscing about his early years in the town as part of the production. Among his fondest memories are days spent on the Lakes of Killarney, and this week he relived that experience, taking to the water with his brother just as they did in their youth.

When they were younger, the Keating family spent their holidays with Pat and Joan Cahill on Flesk Bridge.

"We have always maintained a friendship and Linda, Ronan's sister is a good friend of mine, Joanne Pierce, told Killarney Outlook.

"They were a lovely family and stayed with us for many years in row", she added.

While GAA played a central role in his upbringing, Keating admitted he had never played hurling before. That changed during filming when Michael Milner and Brendan McMahon gave him a hands-on introduction to the sport, showing him the skills and techniques of the ancient game, while Eoin Brosnan, Dr Crokes Chairman presented Ronan with a full Dr. Crokes kit.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook, Karl McMahon said that Ronan Keating was a lovely guy who had plenty of time for everyone. The documentary will explore not only the Wild Atlantic Way's breathtaking landscapes but also the cultural connections and personal memories tied to Ireland's southwest. For Keating, his time in Killarney is as much about revisiting family traditions as it is about discovering new experiences.

The programme is expected to air later this year on BBC Northern Ireland.



## Geraldine O'Dwyer DONATES LATE HUSBAND MICK O'DWYER'S ALL-IRELAND MEDALS TO GAA MUSEUM

A poignant moment took place at Croke Park on Tuesday when Geraldine O'Dwyer, wife of the late Mick O'Dwyer, presented his treasured All-Ireland medals to GAA President Jarlath Burns for display in the GAA Museum.

Mick O'Dwyer, one of the most celebrated figures in the history of Gaelic football, won four All-Ireland titles as a player with Kerry before going on to manage teams to unprecedented success, most famously leading Kerry during their golden era of the 1970s and '80s. ## Sean O'Leary's Story Highlights Lifesaving Power of Blood Donation

When 200 Munster blood and platelet donors were honoured at the Irish Blood Transfusion Service (IBTS) Awards Ceremony in Cork's Rochestown Park Hotel on Friday, 5th September, it was the words of guest speaker Sean O'Leary that left the deepest impression. Sean, from Kilcummin, was once an emerging football star with a bright future on the Kerry football team. But in July 2021, on his way home from a game, his life changed in an instant when a serious road traffic accident left him with devastating injuries. Confined to a wheelchair and facing months of surgery and rehabilitation, his footballing dreams looked shattered.

During his treatment, Sean received eight units of donated blood, transfusions that kept him alive through multiple surgeries and gave him the chance to rebuild. Against all odds, he has not only returned to the game he loves paying with the Kilcummin Senior Football team.

After years of determination and recovery, Sean has returned to the pitch, defying the odds and proving the power of resilience.

Speaking to the donors gathered in Cork, he paid tribute to their selflessness:

"This ceremony isn't just about awards, it's about the generosity, kindness and humanity that blood donors show every day. Without people like you, I wouldn't be here, and I certainly wouldn't be back playing football."

The evening also recognised the remarkable commitment of donors who had reached milestones of 50 or 100 donations. achievements that can take decades to accomplish. Awards were presented by IBTS Chairperson, Deirdre Anne Barr, with the Rt. Honourable Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork, Cllr. Margaret McDonnell, on hand to congratulate honourees from across the province.

Donor Services Manager, Julianne Kelly, reinforced Sean's message, saying:

"Regular donors are the backbone of the IBTS. Your generosity has saved thousands of lives across Ireland. Without you, we simply could not meet the needs of hospitals and patients who rely on blood every single day."

Every week, the IBTS requires 3,000 units of blood to ensure a safe and steady supply for Irish hospitals. Clinics are held in communities nationwide, alongside permanent donation centres in Cork and Dublin.

### THE DEER HUNTER

Following on from my call for Edwardian style hunting parties to help rid us of the over population of deer in Killarney, comes the bounty. Rather than bringing in cash rich hunters, we would have the State paying farmers and landowners to shoot deer, is Michael Cahill's idea to tackle the deer scourge. While my Edwardian hunting parties drew a bit of adverse reaction, Michael's bounty is not going down well at all.

Basically, Michael's idea is as follows: He backs a call by farming representatives to "incentivise hunters to control deer numbers in the county, by introducing the bounty

"Similar 'bounties' were previously successfully introduced for other culls such as foxes and seals, he is to tell Minister for Agriculture, Martin Heydon.

Damien Hannigan of the Irish Deer Commission, says extra culls are not needed in Kerry - at least until the venison industry is developed. Nearly 5,000 wild deer were culled in Kerry for the 2023/2024 season Damien said. That is a 15% increase and the largest cull in Ireland. It was at no cost to the taxpayer, Damien also said.

"Without the development of our venison market there is no motivation or reason to cull more deer on top of the 78,000 deer being culled nationally each year," he said.

There has been no development of the venison market in Ireland and this greatly restricts the numbers that can be culled, he said.

Why we don't develop wild venison is of course down to the focus by the Department of Agriculture - and farm organisations - on

beef and lamb.A great shame as venison is altogether a healthier option.

### THE COST OF THE REJECTED ÁRAS PROJECT AND OTHER MATTERS

I got replies under the Freedom of Information to a few enquiries I made over the summer. I think some of these are also to come before the council by way of motions this week.

The upshot is that when it comes to rates, Killarney coughs up over ten million euro a year. And does so regularly.


I looked for the amount of money paid in rates by businesses in the Killarney Municipal District for the years 2022, 2023, 2024. In 2022, the year after the pandemic business wise, Killarney ratepayers contributed €10,444,541; in 2023 this was €10,554,983 and in 2024 the figure was €10,348,222. In effect Killarney contributes around one fifth of the total rates collected in Kerry which is around 55 million.

I also sought the amount of money collected in car park fees in Killarney and the MD of Killarney. In 2024 the amount collected in parking fees alone was €1,469,938.33. Up from €1,309,993.96 in 2022 and €1,393,823.73 in 2023.

Interestingly, the amounts released were net of VAT and excluding the income from parking fines

Overall take from parking fines and fees in Kerry in 2024 was €3.65 million. So Killarney contributes almost half of that - when the fines are included.

The real question that must be answered is how much of the money collected in Killarney is spent in Killarney? And how much is going



to Tralee and other towns to enhance their streetscapes.

One other nugget I got released to me concerns the cost of the failed Áras Phádraig project. The failed project cost close to €900,000 with consultants, salaries and other fees paid out.

Design Consultants, Salaries, and Miscellaneous amounted to €867,926. There was an estimated full-time equivalent of 9 months by Senior Engineer and Senior Executive Engineer on the project.

The spend on the billboard outside the Áras was €857.00.

Surely these figures would have given our councillors and our public, had they been available, pause for thought? Another way of looking at it of course is to have a vote before any plans are drawn up going forward. A million euros is a lot of public money, even for Killarney.

#### ALL THE PRESIDENT'S MEN?

"It's all about the numbers," as a leading Fianna Fail councillor put it to me before the secret ballot in Fianna Fail.

The preference for Dublin based Gavin is a calculated move by Taoiseach Micheál Martin. To attract the huge Dublin vote as well as mining the GAA nationally. Were Sean Kelly the candidate for FG, there's slim chance Gavin would be in the mix.

But there you go: it was all duck or no dinner for Tanaiste Harris too. He wanted Heather, forgetting that the grouse season was kicking off. Will the big party strategies backfire?

There was a window to the alternatives at a marathon meeting of Kerry County Council. I was impressed by five of the baker's dozen. I don't share Maria Steen's views entirely. But she came across as sincere, professional and even open minded. Gareth Sheridan and Nick Delahanty, both 35, the minimum age for president, stood out. Nick is "generation rent" the generation that has no voice.

We who graduated in the early 1980s identify with them. We hit the worst of the Troubles, two economic crashes and many of us had to take to the emigrant boats, the odd jobs, illegal work visas, precarious employment and the shut down of the State employer; then we got another belt in our mid 20s when mortgage rates soared to double digits; in our fifties our children's allowances were stopped at 18 and college fees were introduced.

Something similar is happening now with the 30 somethings who are hammered at every turn and nowhere as cushioned as the 40 somethings.

Uncannily as in the 1980s, Emigration and Housing were key concerns on Monday.

Cathaoirleach Mike Foley (FG) as well as senior official Bridget Fitzgerald on her first day as meetings administrator came across well.

Fianna Fail's Norma Moriarty and Fionnán Fitzgerald grilled every candidate on their Irish fluency. Norma was put back in her box with a swift riposte by Lorna McCormack, social care worker and agricultural innovator.

Lorna said she had fluent Irish sign language. "We have 5,000 deaf people. Two babies are born deaf here every week," she told Norma. Touché, I thought. This State pays lip service to Irish - when really what a new president needs is Russian, Polish and Urdu, the languages heard now on our streets.

By the way, Gaza was mentioned only in passing by two candidates. And one of those was Killarney candidate Walter Ryan Purcell who impressed. Is ense the public will send a message with a kicking for the establishment. Could this translate as Connolly? All depends on Sinn Féin who ironically will now be the kingmakers.



## Ireland's First Dinosaur Fossils Inspire New Children's Book

Ireland's first confirmed dinosaur fossils have sparked the imagination of Killarney-based children's author Olivia Hope, whose new picture book The Lonely Only Dinosaur was launched this week in Dubray Books, Grafton Street.

The story, published by Gill Books and illustrated by Anna Süßbauer, draws inspiration from fossil remains first uncovered in Antrim during the 1980s by the late Roger Byrne. Although the fossils were discovered decades ago, it was only in recent years that scientists confirmed them as belonging to two species: a Megalosaurus and a Scelidosaur.

Hope was fascinated by the contrast between



the two creatures.

"The Scelidosaur was a plant-eater with bony armour along its back, while the Megalosaurus was more like a T-Rex," she explained. "They're so different that I knew immediately they would make brilliant characters — especially if friendship between them seemed unlikely."

Children's Books Ireland has already praised the title as "a firm read-aloud favourite," and early readers have been charmed by the adventures of Marsha the Megalosaurus, who sets out in search of a friend.

The Lonely Only Dinosaur is now available in bookshops nationwide.



## Kerry Stors Shine as 2025 TG4 Ladies Football

## as 2025 TG4 Ladies Football All-Stars Nominees Revealed

The nominations for the coveted 2025 TG4 Ladies Football All-Star Awards have been announced, with All-Ireland Senior Champions Dublin leading the way with 12 nominees. Runners-up Meath follow closely with ten, while Lidl National League Division 1 champions Kerry secure seven nominations, highlighting the Kingdom's strong showing this season. Galway have six nominees, Waterford three, Armagh and Cork two each, and Kildare, Mayo, and Tipperary one apiece.

Kerry's seven nominees celebrate a season of excellence under the guidance of their management team. Goalkeeper Mary Ellen Bolger leads the charge between the posts, while defenders Eilís Lynch, Aoife Dillane, and Aishling O'Connell are recognized for their defensive prowess. Anna Galvin and Danielle

O'Leary, also nominees, provide experience and leadership across the field, while forward Síofra O'Shea continues to impress with her scoring ability.

The list also features nine players who claimed TG4 All-Star awards in 2024, including Kerry trio O'Connell, Galvin, and O'Leary. Other

counties represented include Galway with Kate Geraghty, Nicola Ward, Ailbhe Davoren, and Olivia Divilly; Armagh's Lauren McConville; and Cork's Katie Quirke.

## NEWLY INSTALLED LIFE BUOYS VANDALISED

There has been widespread dismay and disappointment following the vandalism of two newly-installed life buoys along the River Flesk in Killarney.

Kerry County Council had only erected four life-saving devices on Wednesday, placing them at key points along the stretch of river between Muckross Road and Killarney Racecourse. The initiative came after two years of persistent campaigning by local residents and safety advocates, who stressed the urgent need for improved water safety measures in the area.

However, within days of installation, two of the buoys were already missing. One was discovered floating downstream after being forcibly removed from its holder, while the second has vanished completely.

The incident has been met with anger in the community, as locals point out that such reckless vandalism undermines a vital safety measure intended to protect lives along the popular riverside route.



With demand for these services continuing to

rise, fundraisers such as the Coffee Morning at Reens Life Pharmacy are essential. Every euro raised goes directly towards providing care hours, which cost the charity approximately €18 per hour.

The organisers are encouraging everyone, whether regular customers, passers-by, or visitors to the town, to drop in and lend their support. Even the price of a cup of coffee can go a long way when it's added to the community effort.








underwent a double leg amputation as a result of the accident. Despite the enormity of her injuries, those close to her say she is showing remarkable courage and determination.


Known for her energy, kindness, and mischievous sense of humour, Féile has always been a vibrant presence in her community. She adores dogs and horses, with farming a central part of her life. A keen sports enthusiast, she excelled in football, soccer, gymnastics, and horse riding, always bringing joy and enthusiasm to everything she did.

Her recovery will be a long and challenging journey. She faces further surgeries, months of intensive care, and extensive rehabilitation. Alongside the physical and emotional challenges, her family now faces significant financial pressures, including costs for specialist medical treatment, prosthetic limbs, mobility aids, home adaptations, and ongoing support. In response, Féile's community has launched a fundraising campaign to help ease this burden. Organisers say every donation, no matter how small, will go directly towards her care and recovery. "Féile is a true warrior," a family spokesperson said. "She has already shown incredible bravery. Now it's up to all of us to surround her with love, strength, and support as she faces this new journey."




## Chicks Take Flight in Muckross


## Deputy Cahill welcomes HSE Commitment to Permanent Contracts for Mental Health Nurse Graduates

ianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed the announcement by Minister of State for Mental Health, Mary Butler, that all 2025 graduate mental health nurses will be offered permanent positions within the Health Service Executive (HSE) by 19 September 2025.

Speaking following the confirmation from HSE CEO Bernard Gloster, Deputy Cahill said, "This is a hugely positive development for mental health services across the country and particularly here in Kerry. Ensuring that all graduating mental health

nurses are guaranteed permanent roles is not only a show of confidence in our future healthcare professionals, but a vital step in strengthening the long-term delivery of mental health services."

Deputy Cahill praised the focus on building a sustainable and stable workforce, noting the positive implications for both staff and patients. "Young nurses entering the system deserve certainty and support, and today's announcement delivers that. It also means that patients will benefit from greater continuity of care, which is absolutely essential in the mental health space."



In addition to the graduate recruitment commitment, the HSE has also confirmed that nurses on permanent panels will be placed in areas currently relying on agency staff, a move Deputy Cahill says will be particularly important for rural and regional areas like Kerry. "Reducing our dependence on costly and temporary agency staffing is good policy. It ensures that services are more consistent and better resourced at a local level. I know this will be welcomed by mental health teams in Kerry and beyond."

Deputy Cahill concluded by commending the collaborative efforts that led to this decision, "This is a great example of what can be achieved through constructive engagement between the HSE, Government, and nursing unions. I want to acknowledge the work

of Minister Mary Butler and all involved in securing this commitment. I have long championed for improved mental health services both as a councillor and now as a TD, and I will continue to do so. This is a significant and very welcome step forward for mental health care in Ireland."







# WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. **Annual Pension:** This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

**Approved Retirement Funds:** You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

# Councillor Cahill Raises Critical Infrastructure and Housing Issues with Taoiseach During South Kerry Visit

Councillor Tommy Cahill has brought urgent local concerns directly to the Taoiseach during his visit to South Kerry on Saturday, in a focused and constructive conversation over a cup of coffee in Cahersiveen.

During the meeting, Cllr. Cahill highlighted the serious and ongoing deterioration of roads and footpaths throughout Cahersiveen town, stressing the need for immediate and sustained investment in local infrastructure particularly from Tll. "Our roads and footpaths are not only a safety concern, they're a barrier to progress and pride in Cahersiveen town," he said. "This is a matter of basic respect for the people living here and for those visiting our community. Have no bones about it, large parts of the N70 Ring of Kerry road are of a third world country standard."

Cllr. Cahill, the youngest councillor in Kerry, also pressed the Taoiseach on the deepening housing crisis in South Kerry, with a particular emphasis on the lack of affordable housing options for families and young people in the region. He underlined the urgent necessity for more land to be zoned for residential development, and called for a review and relaxation of current planning regulations, which he says are overly restrictive and not suited to the needs of rural and coastal communities. "In towns like Cahersiveen and the wider South Kerry area, we're seeing people being forced to move away because they





simply can't find a home they can afford, or secure planning permission on land available to them to build one," Cllr. Cahill stated. "We need practical solutions tailored to our region, not a one-size-fits-all approach that ignores rural realities."

Cllr. Cahill welcomed the Taoiseach's visit as an important opportunity to raise these issues face-to-face, and said he would continue to push for meaningful action from both local and national government.

"This was not just a photo-op. I made it clear that the people of Cahersiveen and the Kenmare Municipal District deserve answers, investment, and respect. I intend to keep the pressure on our local Fianna Fáil TD Michael Cahill and on the top brass in the Fianna Fáil party until we see real change," he concluded.

# Respect Older People



Private and Public Nursing placements for older people, the opening of beds/wards including Hospice beds waiting times in A&E Departments, daycare visits, temporary respite are among some of the issues that Kerry TD, Michael Cahill will be raising with Cabinet Ministers in the preparations for the upcoming Budget. The Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People for the party has previously highlighted these issues and expects them to be addressed as a matter of priority for the sector.

"Residential Placements are allotted in many cases, far from the patients homes and families by necessity, as suitable numbers of beds are not available or the particular care needed is not provided nearby. We need to invest more in bed numbers and the employment of additional staff numbers, covering a diverse range of skills" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Our Older People have served their families, communities and their country for many years now and deserve tender loving care, with dignity and comfort" added Michael Cahill TD.

# Minister Foley receives confirmation of €52,000 in funding for Kerry ETB

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has today received confirmation of €52,000 in funding for Kerry Education and Training Board (ETB).

The funding will support leaners at risk of educational disadvantage in Kerry by providing them with skills and opportunities to progress to other areas of Further Education and Training and beyond. This includes community-based educational programmes and mentoring projects.

Minister Foley said:

"I am pleased to receive confirmation of this funding from my cabinet colleague, Minister for Further and Higher Education James Lawless. This funding will help to provide more educational opportunity for leaners at risk of educational disadvantage and will strengthen community education in Kerry. I want to acknowledge the excellent work of Kerry ETB and their important contribution to education in the county."

The funding is coming from the Reach Fund provided by Solas, the state training agency. Key target groups for Reach funding include the long-term unemployed, learners under 25 years of age and people with disabilities.

# Cllr John O'Donoghue has raised the following Notices of Motion at the recent Kerry County Council Meeting.

To again ask that the centre line be reinstated from the Abbey Cross in Muckross towards Lough Guitane for as far as is possible.

This is an extremely busy road which is heavily used by tourists, many of whom get directed across here by sat navs which brings it's own problems. The lower section of the road in particular is quite wide and since the road markings were removed, it is not uncommon to meet cars driving on the wrong side of the road. This has resulted in numerous near misses and it is only a matter of time before there is a serious accident. I had this down as a NOM in January and as we now find ourselves still waiting for the job to be done 9 months later, I again ask that this be done immediately as a matter of urgency.

That we would write to the NPWS and ask that they review the various walkways and trails throughout the National Park and ensure they are signposted.

The NPWS do a wonderful job maintaining our National Park but it has been brought to my attention that some of the walks which were previously signposted are no longer marked e.g. in the Blue Pool. I ask that they might review their walkways over the winter months and erect signs where suitable.

That we would write to Uisce Éireann requesting an update on the water quality of the River Folly and that as the River Laune was recently highlighted as being one of the 4 most polluted rivers in the country, to ask what additional measures they have carried out to identify the source of the pollution and if they have included any additional or different testing of the water in Lough Léin as the Laune drains from this lake.

The recent Environmental Agency report which listed the River Laune as being in the top 4 most polluted rivers in the country, and most likely in the top 2 most polluted rivers was a stark reminder of the challenges facing us on the environmental front. The report states that agriculture is not the culprit, but rather waste water, or raw sewage entering the river. As the Laune drains Lough Léin, it is logical to assume that the waste water from Killarney is a part of the problem. At a previous meeting

all us Councillors has with Uisce Éireann where I was assured that the Folly stream, into which the Killarney waste water Treatment Plant discharges was of good water quality. I invited the Uisce Éireann engineer offering me the assurances to meet me there and drink a glass of water from the stream, an invitation he declined. We are in the midst of major rezoning of land around Killarney which will lead to a huge amount of development in the coming year or two. This additional housing is very welcome as we are in the midst of a well documented housing crisis, but I have grave reservations despite reassurances from Uisce Éireann about the ability of the Waste Treatment Plant to handle the increased capacity. It is simply inconceivable to think that a plant built over 30 years ago would have been designed with a capacity level when first opened to still be catering to the huge increase in houses without major upgrades. I would like to know what Uisce Éireann is doing to pinpoint the source of the Laune's pollution levels and what their investigation has revealed thus far. The EPA have stated they believe that is a sewage problem and as the banks of the Laune are not that heavily populated between Killarney and Kilorglin, I can only assume that some of it must be emanating from Lough Léin itself. The recent disaster in Lough Neagh has shown that even heavily monitored lakes are not immune from disaster, and as the Lakes of Killarney are the iewel in our towns tourist crown. something similar happening here would be disastrous. All of that pales in comparison when one considers the environmental damage to ecological habitats which would take years to right. Saying all is fine is no longer good enough and I am calling on Uisce Éireann to find the cause of this pollution and rectify the situation immediately. The line that all is fine and there's nothing to see is wearing thin. All is clearly not fine and we need answers before it is too late.

That we would receive an update on how the new, and very welcome bus service around Killarney town is doing in terms of how much it is being utilised and also to request that once a day fixed stops with set collection times could introduced at the entrances to the estates in the town to facilitate older customers who may not have the know how to operate the app. This would also have to include a return journey from town some time later.

This new bus service is a very welcome addition to life in the town and I am curious as to how successful it is proving. A few people have mentioned to me that although it is a superb idea, were there to be one run per day into town with defined stops and times, and another one later on to do the return journey, it would make the service much more accessible to older people who struggle with the app. One loop calling to the entrances to all the major estates in the town with one or two drop off points in town, with a return journey from the same drop off points would greatly assist these people and I ask that it be considered despite it not exactly being in keeping with the idea behind the service. It would greatly enhance the experience for all and increase user levels which would in turn increase the chances of the service becoming a permanent fixture around the town.

That the Council would consider providing an island pedestrian crossing, similar to the one at the Gleneagle in the vicinity of the end of Loreto road to facilitate the large volume of people crossing the road at this point on a daily basis


This section of road, which I drive daily, is extremely busy, particularly during the summer months with people crossing the road to access the National Park or walk into Killarney along the jarvey path, or crossing in the opposite direction to go to the shop or walk up Loreto road. There is an estate at the end of Loreto Road, Rossdara which ensures many of these are young people crossing the road. I feel a pedestrian crossing of some description is badly wanted at this location, and feel one similar to the one at The Gleneagle Hotel would work well. I was delighted recently that the Council agreed to put in It would make the area much safer for Active Travel and I ask that the Council agree to my request.

To again request an update on plans to tar and line the carpark adjacent to St Mary's Cathedral as the current situation is chaotic at busy times.

This is a saga which is dragging on far too long now. Since beginning in the Council 4 years ago, I have been told that negotiations are ongoing with the landowner. I understand that the current landowner have no objection to the Council taking charge of the carpark so I cannot understand how it is taking so long. The carpark is chaotic during busy times, particularly when funerals are taking place with cars being abandoned throughout, and were it lined it would serve the duel purpose of both making the carpark safer, and also greatly increasing its capacity as were all cars parked neatly, far more could fit in. Could we please receive an update on negotiations thus far, and also was there a mention of acquiring additional parking from the same landowner adjacent to the carpark? If so what was the outcome of that discussion? I would like a commitment from the Council, if it is possible, that this situation will be resolved before the next tourist season.

# That we would receive an update on the plans to provide a footpath from Páirc Chuimín to Kilcummin village.

This is another very long running saga which goes back to when the estate was first built. I absolutely accept that this issue was not of the Councils making, but it is unfortunately up to the Local Authority to solve. Many in the Páirc Chuimín are of an age where they have young children and the footpath is urgently required to allow them safe passage from the estate to the nearby school, football field and village centre. While I appreciate it is not an easy fix, I had hoped we would have received an update with a concrete plan before now. The residents of the estate have been very patient up to now, but there is a growing sense of frustration at the lack of progress. Can I ask when are we likely to see physical work begin on this footpath and can we get a commitment from the Council to get this done as quickly as possible?

# ahead of coffee morning fundraiser

A Kerry woman who began raising money for her local hospice after the death of two loved ones, has received national recognition for her fundraising efforts.

Mary Riordan, from Glenbeigh, South Kerry, will mark 27 years of hosting a Bewley's Big Coffee Morning for Hospice this month.

Mary said she and Cris were as close as sisters and when she died, Mary helped raise her friend's children.

"I played a very close role in their lives and they're all grown up now and we still remain the same to one another," she said.

"I heard about Bewley's Big Coffee Morning when all this was happening and at the time I was running a B&B and decided to have it there and ask all my friends and neighbours."

For the last number of years, the coffee morning has been hosted in the local Centra Shop on Glenbeigh's Main Street, generously supported by owner Pat Sheahan.

Mary described the local hospice in Tralee as a fantastic unit and said she's very proud to be involved in helping to raise much needed funds.

When another friend of the family became ill and used its services, it allowed for him to be cared for at home.

"I think it's such a comfort at the end of your days," she added.

"When my friend was dying, the hospice nurses came out to him. He told me he had no problem in the wide earthly world going, that he had his time done and he was so comfortable. That's so comforting."

Mary believes people are keen to give generously when they understand how the money is spent.

"I think they are comforted by the fundraising and helping other people. It's the circle of life, really and truly." Together for Hospice, The National Hospice Movement, represents 24 Hospice and specialist palliative homecare providers supporting patients and their families across Ireland.

Fundraised income is used by local hospice services to fund new buildings, refurbishment of existing buildings, staff, extra comforts for patients and their families, and innovative patient care projects nationwide.

# INAUGURAL MASS Held at Glubba Mountain Grotto



A large crowd gathered at Cnoc Póg Ríocht, more commonly known as Glubba Mountain, in Ballyledder, Beaufort for a very special occasion - the celebration of the inaugural Mass at the mountain grotto.

The grotto, which has stood for more than 50 years, is the lasting legacy of the late Tom "Tomásín" O'Sullivan, a local man whose determination and devotion left a remarkable mark on the community.

Armed with little more than his own strength and faith, he set about the task after long working days, hauling stone, sand, and cement by hand in fertiliser bags from Keel and Kilgobnet up the mountain. After two years of tireless effort, he completed the grotto.

Not stopping there, Tom then cycled to Knock and back to collect a suitable statue to place within it. His efforts were entirely selfless, he built the grotto not for himself, but as a gift to the people of the area. A year later, he went on to construct another grotto on Cruach Mhór, on the route to Carrauntoohil.

Since Tom's passing 25 years ago, neighbours and friends, Micheal O'Sullivan, Mary Duffy (O'Sullivan), and Roisín Duffy, have carefully maintained the grotto, painting it regularly and ensuring fresh flowers are always placed on the

The inaugural Mass was celebrated by Reverend Mark Blakely, with many local people making the walk to the grotto for the special occasion. Among those in attendance were Mike O'Sullivan, John Kelliher, John Joe O'Sullivan, Joanne Prendeville, Michelle Reynolds, Maeve O'Carroll, Mike Counihan, Christina Hayes, Joan McKenna, and Dolores Prendeville.

The Mass was a fitting tribute not only to Tom's devotion and hard work, but also to the continued dedication of the local community in keeping his vision alive.

Caoimhe's selection to the Irish U23 squad follows a number of successful years on the water, racing as a junior rower in top competition for Muckross RC and more recently with UL Rowing Club. In 2021, the Headford native was a silver medallist for Ireland at the European Junior Rowing Championships while in 2023, she was selected as part of the Senior Womens squad for Ireland at the Home International Regatta. Caoimhe has also won a number of Irish Championship titles racing

In last weekend's European U23 Regatta, five crews were entered in the Womens Eight event with a preliminary race held on Saturday to decide lanes for Sunday's final. In the preliminary race, Ireland were fourth ahead of Spain, with Romania taking a commanding win ahead of hosts Czech Republic and Austria in third. In Sunday's final, the Czech hosts found another gear to beat Romania to the gold medal with Austria again taking third place. Ireland

Everyone in Muckross RC is incredibly proud of Caoimhe's achievement in being selected to the Irish U23 squad and representing club and country so well once again. It was fantastic to see Caoimhe and the Irish Womens Eight competing among the best in Europe.

Back in Killarney, Caoimhe will be swapping her Ireland gear for club colours this weekend as she races for Muckross in the historic Killarney Regatta, which is set to take place this Sunday, 14th September at O'Mahony's Point, Killarney Golf and Fishing Club.

He extended heartfelt thanks to his home club Killarney and golf Ireland for all their support throughout the





# ALL SQUARE V COBH RAMBLERS

**Kerry FC 1-1 Cobh Ramblers**

On Friday night, Kerry FC took on Cobh Ramblers for the final time this season and for just the second time in three weeks after Kerry's impressive 2-0 win over the Cork side in the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup. Each of the four games between the two sides this season has been quite an even affair, and this one would more than likely be no different.

For the visitors, their only loss since the eleventh of July was at the hands of Kerry FC in that cup game. Since then, they have gone on to win five, draw two and lose just once. A win for Cobh is just as important as a win for Kerry FC as they look to mount as much pressure as possible on league leaders Dundalk FC in the hope that the Ramblers can catch the Louth side for automatic promotion.

For Kerry FC, they are just six points off the playoff places, and at this stage of the season, every point matters. Many around the club and supporters alike felt that if Kerry FC could match their intensity over the past three weeks, it could be an exciting end to the season ahead. The game began in a lively fashion, although it lacked quality. Just three minutes in, Kerry FC's Ewan Lee found himself in the referee's book after what was judged to be a high challenge, but seemed harsh; however, it was a sign of the aggression and intensity that would characterise much of the early exchanges.

The home side nearly snatched an early advantage in the seventh minute when Sean O'Connell's in-swinging corner almost deceived Timothy Martin in the Cobh goal, sailing just over the crossbar. For a side often criticised for struggling to convert set pieces into genuine chances, it has been a part of their play that they have worked on a lot recently, and it has started to reap the rewards.

Yet, as the minutes ticked by, the game settled into a scrappy rhythm. Passes went astray, attacks fizzled out before truly threatening, and neither side established a foothold in midfield. After twenty-two minutes, the game was described as scrappy, and that summed up the first half perfectly: plenty of endeavour, little end product.

Kerry FC's most promising moment before the break came just before the half-hour mark. O'Connell, again instrumental, slipped a clever ball into Robbie Cleary on the edge of the area. Cleary's strike looked dangerous, but Niall O'Keefe was alert to block.

The first change of the evening came before the interval as Ronan Teahan was withdrawn through injury, replaced by Arran Healy in the thirty-ninth minute. Teahan got a knock to the back, which can always be a painful one. Healy's introduction brought energy down the righthand side of the midfield three, but the half

looked set to finish goalless until Cobh finally carved out a big opportunity in stoppage time. Barry Coffey surged into the box and unleashed a shot from a tight angle, only to be denied brilliantly by Kerry keeper Matthew Connor at his near post. Connor's intervention kept the game scoreless at the break, much to the relief of the home supporters.

If the first half was characterised by caution, the second half quickly developed into an open contest. Within six minutes of the restart, Healy showed his attacking instincts with a burst down the right flank, creating space for a cross. Frustratingly for Kerry, no one was there to meet it.

Cobh soon began to assert themselves. Coffey, lively throughout, spurned a decent chance in the fifty-eighth minute when he met Samuel Bellis' delivery but headed over from a promising position. Just a minute later, the breakthrough came.

Cobh pressed Kerry high, forcing a turnover deep in Kingdom territory. The ball fell kindly to Rhys Gourdie, who demonstrated composure by sliding the ball past Connor to make it 1–0. The away supporters erupted, sensing that their side's patience and pressing had finally paid off. Kerry responded immediately with a substitution, bringing on the fresh in-form Cian Brosnan for debutant Daniel O'Connor. Brosnan's introduction injected urgency into the home side's attack, though tensions began to boil over shortly after. Cleary and Mujaguzi were both shown yellow cards in quick succession, reflecting the rising intensity.

The sixty-ninth minute saw one of the game's defining passages. Brosnan, eager to make his mark, produced a dazzling solo run, skipping past defenders before unleashing a shot that forced a superb save from Martin. From the resulting corner, the home side found their equaliser

O'Connell delivered another wicked ball into the box, and this time Oran Crowe rose highest at the near post to glance a header into the net. The eruption from the Mounthawk Park terraces matched the midfielder's passion as he wheeled away in celebration. Suddenly, the game was alive, and Kerry had belief.

The leveller nearly became obsolete just minutes later when Cobh's Cian Bargary burst into the Kerry area, only to be denied by another outstanding save from Connor. It was end-to-end football, with both sides sensing that a winner was possible.

Kerry, buoyed by their equaliser, grew stronger as the clock ticked down. In the eighty-first minute, Brosnan again caused havoc on the right wing, delivering a pinpoint cross to Joe Adams at the far post. Adams rose well but directed his header agonisingly wide of the far post.

As the game edged into its final stages, the tension was palpable. Cobh introduced Dylan



McGlade, whose quick feet nearly won the match in the ninetieth minute. The winger ghosted past a couple of Kerry defenders before rifling a shot goalward, but Connor was again the hero, parrying the ball away.

Kerry almost stole it themselves in stoppage time. A frantic goalmouth scramble saw Joe Adams' effort blocked by Jonas Häkkinen before the ball was eventually cleared. The Kingdom fans had their hearts in their mouths, but it wasn't to be.

The final whistle confirmed a 1–1 draw, a result that both sides could take positives from, though each may also rue missed opportunities.

It was a tough battle that could have gone either way, but Kerry FC have now taken points from the top two in the division in successive weeks and look to be in top form before next week's Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup Quarter Final against Sligo Rovers.



# Uncertainty about marking the 2026 Leaving Cert exam must be an issue in the Presidential election

#### **DISADVANTAGE**

As the 2026 Leaving Cert class settles in for a very important year in their young lives, they still don't know how the exam will be marked. If Minister Helen McEntee continues in the same vein as the last academic year, the 2026 class will be at a huge disadvantage. It will be a year of worry and uncertainty for Leaving Cert exam candidates because no matter how diligently they study, their exam results will be lower than the results achieved by every Leaving Cert class from 2020 to 2025, inclusively. During those Covid-19 and post Covid-19 years, all of those candidates benefitted from predicted grades, calculated grades or post marking adjustment of raw exam scores which were substantially inflated.

#### **REDUCTION**

Last year, the Department of Education, in its wisdom, decided that there would be no cliff edge approach to reducing inflated grades back down to pre-pandemic levels, which were based on candidates' exam performance only. Instead, for the past six sittings of the Leaving Cert exam from 2020 to 2025, results have been artificially inflated resulting in a huge spiral in the points required for third level courses.

#### **ADJUSTED**

A post marking adjustment of the raw scores which were achieved by 2024 Leaving Cert candidates was employed last year as a first step in deflating exam grades. 68% of individual results were increased in the post-marking adjustment. The remainder were unchanged. No marks were adjusted downwards. So, the overall results in 2024 were adjusted up by an average of 7.5%, where the range of marking adjustment was from 12.1%, added to those at the bottom of the scale, to 4.8%, added to those at the top of the scale.

#### **CONFIRMED**

The recent Round One of CAO offers confirmed

that the 2025 Leaving Cert Class lost out due to their exam results being further deflated and having to compete with CAO applicants with inflated grades from the 2020 to 2024 Leaving Cert exams. The substantial increase of 4,605 (7.6%) from 60,839 to 65,444 Leaving Cert candidates this year was also a factor. This year's class also suffered because of the record number of CAO applicants, up by a whopping 5,804 (7%) from 83,543 to 89,347.

#### **PRESENTED**

71,137 applicants to CAO presented Leaving Cert results from 1985 to 2025. 51,342 of those sat the 2025 Leaving Cert exam. The remaining 19,795 presented Leaving Cert results from previous years. Most of that cohort had the advantage of inflated grades when CAO college offers were being determined.

#### **CONSEQUENCE**

The State Examinations Commission (SEC) reduced the post marking adjustment of Leaving Cert raw scores from 7.5% to 6.8% this year. This was done on a bottom to top sliding scale from 10.3% to 3.1%, with a consequential decrease in grades, particularly at the top level. If the reduction continues at snail pace, it will create havoc for years to come as the Leaving Cert results will always be less than in all the years back to 2020.

#### **BLAME**

In GAA parlance, the 2026 Leaving Cert cohort is playing against the wind not just for 35mns but for the entire 70mns. The Central Applications Office (CAO) is faultless in this matter. The blame lies squarely with the Government. Presidential candidates, particularly Fianna Fáil's Jim Gavin and Fine Gael's Heather Humphreys must insist that the Government base the 2026 Leaving Cert results on candidates' exam performance alone and that candidates who apply to the CAO with 2020 to 2025 inflated Leaving Cert results will have their results adjusted to

the 2026 marking scheme for that purpose. That approach will level the playing field for all CAO applicants and consign the infamous "post marking adjustment" to the bin where it belongs.

#### **ROUND TWO**

Meanwhile the CAO issued 3,370 offers in Round Two on Monday. 2,364 Level 8 offers, and 1,006 Level 7/6 offers, were made to 3,024 CAO applicants in that round. 1,226 applicants received an offer for the first time. Applicants who received an offer in Round Two had until Wednesday last to accept their offer.



## **FRC Final Recommendations**

The Football Review Committee have done an incredible job, far more thorough and comprehensive than I or many others dared to hope. I will go so far as to say they have saved the game of gaelic football. The game was in decline. I see far more games than most people (admittedly, many of them on Clubber or GAAGO from the comfort of my own home) and last year it felt like a chore far too often. Sheer drudgery, and the declining crowds were reflecting that. The FRC have transformed that. And not just at inter-county or senior - the U16 County Championship is in full swing at the moment and it has been the best in several years, really gripping stuff. Players being encouraged to play.....it was always the mantra, but frankly more coaches were talking good games than playing them.

The success of the FRC might actually carry some-one as far as the Presidency. I'm not going into political discourse (except to point out that this is all very dramatic for the media, but not for too many others).

Last weekend they came out with their final proposals. And we did need for there to be final proposals. As good as they have been, there comes a time where rules need to be set in stone. Constant flux just creates confusion. Last weekend I was at two games where sidelines were convinced that the referee had exceeded the five second time limit on playing advantage. Yes, they had indeed, because that time limit was changed to 'at the referee's discretion'.

Just to touch very briefly on a separate issue, the introduction of the two pointer means that lining pitches is absolutely crucial, and that's been an issue a few too many times already. These are the final tweaks proposed by the FRC.

#### **Final Recommendation**

The hooter should signal the immediate end of the half, with play continuing only if the ball is in flight or a free, 45, or sideline is about to be taken.

Rationale: To prevent teams from retaining possession after the hooter to gain a free play, which has been blamed for generating slow gameplay and criticism (teams hoard possession until they have a sure shot for a score after the hooter, sometimes for several minutes).

## Two-Point Scores Final Recommendation:

A two-point score will stand if the ball is kicked from outside the 40-meter arc and goes over the crossbar, even if an opponent touches the ball in flight.

Context: This is a tweak to the scoring system, which previously allowed for two points in

certain situations where the ball was kicked from outside the 20-meter line and a specific arc.

### Goalkeeper Rules

#### **Goalkeeper Receiving Passes:**

A goalkeeper can now receive a pass from a teammate from anywhere on the field, including inside their own large rectangle or in the opposition's half, promoting more dynamic play.

#### Goalkeeper Kickout Rule:

A player cannot pass the ball directly back to the goalkeeper from a kickout without another player having first played the ball.

#### **Other Changes**

#### Goalkeeper Passes:

The new rule no longer prohibits a player from passing the ball back to the goalkeeper within their own half.

#### Advanced Mark:

The advanced mark may be taken from a kickout on or before the 45-meter line.

#### **Interference with Kickout:**

A 50-meter penalty will be imposed if an attacking player interferes with a kickout up to the halfway line.

England pretty much alway developed our best young talent for us and they cast their nets on wider waters nowadays; that's not Hallgrimmsson's problem or fault. I don't see any Irish wunderkinds luring in plain sight; we have what we have. Troy Parrott is a big absentee, I know Alkmaar aren't exactly Paris St. Germain but their in-form striker was brimming with confidence. Robbie Brady? I'm sorry, good footballer and scored some fantastic goals for us, but he's not exactly a dourly dependable defender, is he?

The key thing is to hold them, make it frustrating, bog them down in a dogfight. If we can snatch a goal against the run of play (most likely a set piece header), great, but don't concede. Get to the second half without conceding and then we can start to try opening them up. I'd be very happy with a scoreless draw, to be honest. Just hold them early on...

Jaysus. Two minutes. Seriously lads? It was a poor effort at clearing a relatively harmless ball in and Styles cleverly hooks it to Varga. One perfectly timed touch to glide it past Kelliher. Matt Doherty has been a tremendous servant to Ireland, but his mistake hung us out to dry there. That was far, far too easy. You could have just written 'RSVP' on that attempted clearance. A clever pass by Styles and a very well timed finish, not a lot Kelliher could do, but....

We are struggling. Of course we are; Hungary can sense more goals. Varga got in behind Collins to get on a Kerkez cross but couldn't quite direct the header on target – I thought he should have done better. Two minutes later it's 2-0, Sallai easily nodding Szoboszlai's corner home. Great ball in, to be fair, but again it was that bit too easy.

Ireland are huffing and puffing, but without the

slightest whiff of danger. The commentators are desperately trying to pretend that Ireland had a decent penalty call for a foul on Cullen - ah, lads, that's just embarrassing. Even Donald Trump might blush at trying that one. We are being thoroughly outplayed. Frankly, getting to the break without conceding more feels almost like an achievement. The idea of scoring one goal, let alone two, is ridiculous. We had a couple of toothless headers, but at no stage have we actually asked any questions of Hungary. Yes, Ferguson did hammer one good shot before the break, but frankly I thought the keeper was a bit over-dramatic about a bread and butter save. Kelliher's one minutes before had been more difficult - again, a perfectly weighted pass had sliced our defence to shreds. Ireland look a bit sharper as they come out for the second half. Arrah, stop throwing shapes, lads. As far as I am concerned, that horse has bolted long ago.

Excpt Jason Knight does well to pick out Evan Ferguson, who is fouled. Ryan Manning stands over the free and sends it in....keeper fists away (in hindsight, should he have caught it?) but Szmodics heads it back. Pinball in the box, basically, and Evan Ferguson manages to poke it home. Not exactly a great goal, but so what? You don't get points for artististic merit in this game.

It gets better for Ireland. Sallai, the goalscorer, gets sent off on a red card. I have zero sympathy, and I'd have less if an Irish player did it. Yes, Cullen was deliberately frustrating him (and deserved his yellow) but that was just petulant stupidity and I don't care how talented you are, picking up a silly red card like that will always cost your team. Self-control should be a very basic requirement, especially nowadays.

Ogbene and Taylor on. Honestly, with an extra man I'd have been tempted to throw Mikey Johnston in there and tell him to go for it (he'd go for it anyway; that's how he plays and why I'd be slow to start him in games like these). Ireland are looking the better side now and creating half chances. The goal just won't come, though. With two minutes of normal time Evan Ferguson's header actually deflected wide off O'Brien. We don't really deserve a draw. Who am I kidding? After that deplorable first half, we don't remotely deserve a draw. But again, 'deserve' is not in the game's vocabulary.

Manning has been putting in decent balls all night and just at the start of injury time, it pays off. This time it's Idah who is there to head home.

Was it a good performance? God no, it was brutal stuff altogether. That first half....ouch. And for that matter, we only improved to adequacy in the second; Hungary had that one in the bag and let it get away. But that's a great result against one of the top contenders.

A number of wise sages have pointed out that realistically we now need to beat Armenia twice to really be in the hunt. I don't know how they somehow imagined a world where we wouldn't have to beat Armenia twice to qualify. The odds are stacked against us, we aren't a great team. But we are moving in the right direction after that rocky start. I'll gladly take it.

#### **EILEEN GLEESON**

If the FAI were to step onto a haystack, they'd pierce themselves with a needle. It always seems to be one step forward and two steps back....except without the step forward. Eileen Gleeson is the latest former employee to take a case against them. I'm not sure about the argument that she was paid less than the mens' manager. For one thing, the ladies' game simply doesn't generate the same revenue or come with the same public scrutiny. There is no question about the women getting far worse treatment than the men, and had to go on a publicly supported strike to even get that much. There could be an argument that it's the same role, but she wasn't bringing the same experience and she did sign a contract. Also that the FAI simply don't have a lot of revenue anymore, cutting back in the face of poor international results and an understandable distrust by Government after so many failures. Then again, when the FAI very carefully shafted Vera Pauw on extremely dubious grounds - an unsubstantiated story in The Athletic (it was once only second to Le Monde, but its standards have dropped like America's tariff economy since the 2022 takeover by the New York Times) about requiring fitness of club players and a rumoured belief by the players who managed one goal in a World Cup campaign, and that one direct from a corner, that they were secretly Brazilian in nature. It has since turned out that they...aren't. Eileen Gleeson did not want the job; her expertise was as Head of Women and Girls Football and she made very clear at the time that she wanted to stay in that role, at which she was considered excellent. I do remember her clear reluctance to leave a long-term and rewarding role for a more short-term focussed and high pressure one (especially given how Vera Pauw was treated) and the guarantee, much stated at that time on both sides, that she would be free to return to it at the end of her managerial tenure. That's a huge sticking point for the FAI. But when you add in the history of their treatment of the ladies' game....l can see that being a big topic of conversation. Also the ongoing investigation into allegations of abuse over the years and the multiple players' complaints about the FAI's response....well, their internal investigation has been in the air for guite some time. Chickens are not migratory birds and that one is waiting to roost - I doubt if the FAI would be comfortable with that discussion in court. I suspect that, much like Cathal Dervlan and plenty more before him, there will be a settlement here.

#### **ARMENIA 2 IRELAND 1**

Let's not. There's no need or point in dissecting this one. I didn't really expect anything off Hungary; at best I thought maybe a scoreless draw. Scoring two goals, especially after that horrendous first half, felt like a bonus.

Armenia? I'd have given Dundalk FC a fair chance of taking something off Armenia. They literally haven't won a game in two years. They conceded five to Portugal in their opening game.

We actually started well. Armenia looked like a



side shorn of confidence. One goal would open the floodgates. Except that we didn't have it in us to score that one goal. Not aggressive enough, not clinical. A lot of hit and hope and far too little linked up play. No cohesion, especially in midfield. I don't know if we had an attacking strategy.

By the end of the first half, it was Armenia who were scenting blood and going hunting. The penalty concession was unlucky, to be fair. He stuck a leg in but was a fraction too late, hard to be too critical. I didn't even think the ball in was all that dangerous. But there's no question about contact, clear penalty, and Armenia 1-0 up going in at half-time. At best, this is going to be a battle now.

But hey, Ireland were hugely improved in the second half against Hungary, the same again and we'll be okay.

2-0 early in the second half. Lovely through ball, but the defending was shocking. Textbook stuff

Evan Ferguson, who tried hard all night – the service he got from midfield was shockingly awful – did pull one back. Was that going to spark an Irish revival?

Arrah stop. You couldn't spark this tepid lot with a blowtorch. If anything, Armenia could and probably should have won by a lot more.

There was a lot of criticism and complaints from the RTE panel. But I think the situation is even worse than we are pretending. I think Heimas Hallgrimmsson is doing a decent job. The players are trying. There isn't any hidden Messi or Mbappe who isn't being selected. We just don't have any quality midfielder and our players aren't good enough to play positive. Caution and timidity are our watchwords. I've always said that Robbie Brady isn't good enough at actual defending to play full back. But it turns out that we don't have anybody better, and that's not changing any time soon. Would Troy Parrott have made a difference? Only in the sense that we'd have had two players up front not getting any ball to feet. As for the World Cup? Well, they do say it's the

hope that kills you. That's the one problem that

we don't have now.

#### KILLARNEY LEGION

Our Senior Men bowed out of the Kerry Petroleum Intermediate Club Championship but not without a rousing comeback which almost salvaged the game. 

# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

# ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

Aisling Ghobnait promises to be an immersive performance celebrating her story through towering puppetry, ethereal dance, music and elemental fires. The fantastic MOTHÚ performers will channel the industrious and sacred energy of Gobnait's beloved bees and nine illuminated white deer will embody the vision that once led Gobnait to Ballyvourney. The Season is a time set aside by Christian churches around the world to give thanks for the gift of creation and to act to protect and heal it.


All parishes are invited to take part in the exciting program planned and the wide range of resources available.

As Sunday 21st September is International Day of Peace, the Diocese is suggesting this date as a most appropriate day to celebrate the Season during weekend masses, in planting a tree or taking steps to set aside part of the church grounds for biodiversity.

As the Season draws to a close, some parishes hold a blessing event for pets on or around the 4th of October.

Another diocesan event planned is an afternoon workshop on September 21st in Fossa Parish in collaboration with the diocesan Justice Peace and integrity of Creation (JPIC) committee. All parish representatives and



interested individuals are invited to attend to share experiences, gather knowledge and resources and celebrate the Season of Creation. All parishes are asked to submit notice of their event, no matter how small, to be included on a calendar of events on the diocesan website: www.dioceseofkerry.ie

# Citizens Information

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

#### **KYR re Free Energy Upgrades (Warmer Homes Scheme)**

The Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) provides free home energy upgrades to homeowners who get certain social welfare payments. These upgrades help improve the energy efficiency and warmth of your home and are also known as the Warmer Homes Scheme.

The scheme prioritises the oldest and least energy efficient homes. You can apply for the free upgrades again if you've already had work done under the scheme, but your home would benefit from more upgrades. To access the scheme again you must still meet the qualifying criteria.

#### The scheme covers these home energy upgrades:

• Attic insulation • Wall insulation - including cavity wall, internal wall and external wall insulation • Draught-proofing • Lagging jackets • Energy efficient lighting • Energy advice

New central heating systems and replacement windows are also occasionally covered by the scheme. Your windows will only be replaced if your walls are being insulated at the same time and the existing windows are single-glazed windows. The SEAI decides if replacement windows are needed on a case-

Since 1 January 2025, if you qualify for a new central heating system, the scheme will not cover a new fossil fuel boiler, such as an oil or gas boiler. However, it will cover renewable heating systems such as a heat pump

#### Who qualifies for the scheme?

You must own your home and be living in it. It must have been built and occupied before 2026. Your home must have a BER of C,D,EF and you must be in receipt of a qualifying social welfare payment. The fuel allowance is one of the qualifying payments. You can contact your local Citizens Information Centre to check if you are on a qualifying payment.

If you don't have a BER for your home, the SEAI will do a free BER to check that your home meets the qualifying criteria of having a BER of C or lower.

#### Are there any costs associated with the scheme?

You will not be charged for work done under this scheme. However, if you sell your home within 5 years of getting the work done, you need to tell the SEAI. You should inform them in writing at least 30 days before your property is sold. The SEAI may ask you to repay some or all of the grant. This is at their discretion.

#### How does the scheme work and how do I apply?

There are 4 steps to this process:

- Apply for the scheme online or by completing an application form and sending it back to the SEAI. You must ensure you meet the qualifying criteria above when applying. You can use the SEAI online portal to check if you qualify. You can get an application form from your local Citizens Information Centre (CIC).
- Have an SEAI surveyor check your home is suitable for the works and recommend upgrades. The SEAI will do this if you qualify.
- Get the works done by a contractor appointed by the SEAI
- Get the works assessed by the SEAI once the works are completed. This will include a new BER assessment and may involve a quality inspection.

#### How do I apply?

You can apply online, download and complete the application form or ask the SEAI to post the form to you. You can also contact your local Citizens Information Centre (CIC) for an application form. You must meet the qualifying criteria. You can use the SEAI online portal to check this.

You need to provide evidence that you qualify for the scheme. Full details of the information needed are on the application form.

If you are getting a qualifying payment other than Carer's Allowance, you no longer need to get the Department of Social Protection to complete part of the application form. The SEAI will check your

If you qualify for the scheme because you are getting Carers Allowance, you must also complete the Carer's Allowance Confirmation Form, which you can download or get from your local CIC

#### Are there other options for people who do not qualify for the free upgrades?

If you do not qualify for the free upgrades, the SEAI provides other grants to help with the cost of upgrading the energy efficiency of your home. The National Home Energy Upgrade Scheme provides grants to bring your home up to an energy efficiency rating of B2 or above, using a private company to manage the work. Or, you can get individual energy upgrade grants, if you only want to do certain upgrades, and would prefer to manage the process yourself.

# Minister for Health Encourages Public to Apply for



**GP Visit Card** 

The Minister for Health, Jennifer Carroll MacNeill TD, is today encouraging members of the public to consider applying for a GP Visit Card, an important initiative designed to ensure greater access to essential

healthcare services across the country.

As of 1 August 2025, there were over 750,000 GP Visit Card holders throughout the country who can visit their GP free of charge, removing a financial barrier for many individuals and families in accessing care.

To work out if you qualify for a GP visit card the (Health Service Executive) HSE look at your income, personal circumstances and expenses. It's possible that you may qualify for a GP visit card even if the amount of money you earn is high. If your expenses are also high, you could still qualify.

The Healthy Ireland Survey 2024 showed an average of over three private GP visits a year per person. Based on Healthy Ireland visitation data, annual savings of approximately €600 for a family of four, €300 for a family of two and €200 for an individual can be achieved.

Minister Carroll MacNeill said:

"Good health begins with good access. We know that the cost of GP consultations can sometimes discourage people from seeking help when they need it. For those eligible for a GP Visit Card, it removes this obstacle and helps support individuals and families in managing their health

"GP Visit Cards for people age 8 to 69 are means tested. Your income, personal circumstances and your expenses are taken into account in the application to see if you qualify."

The GP visit card scheme is open to a broad range of applicants. For most, eligibility is based on income thresholds and family circumstances. Children under 8 years of age and those aged 70 or more are automatically eligible for a card.

Many people are not aware that they may qualify, and the Minister for Health urges everyone to review the criteria.

Minister Carroll MacNeill added:

"I'd particularly like to encourage students and parents whose children are pursuing third level education to have a conversation about applying for a GP Visit Card. Eligibility is determined based on the individual income of the applicant, and some students may not be aware that they qualify. The application process is accessible and can be completed on the HSE website."



"As we speak, Gaza is on its knees and Israel bombards Gaza City. Meanwhile, activists like Kitty O'Brien face police brutality for standing against these atrocities.

We cannot give up on a two-state solution, we cannot stand idly against annexation and we cannot stand by violence when peace is possible. "Free the hostages and free Gaza", Mr Kelly said



"Then shall your Light break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up speedily; your Righteousness shall go before you; the Glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard" (Isaiah 58:8).

Welcome back dear student, last week we spoke about the Glory of God which is God's Manifest Presence. The Godhead consists of the Father, His Son, and His Holy Spirit – three individual Persons, yet they are One. The Father is our Creator; the Lord Jesus is the Word of God made flesh — our Saviour; and the Spirit is the Presence of God given as a gift to live inside of every believer. Messiah Jesus gave His Life so that we could be forgiven and saved - washed in His Blood and made whole. Holy Spirit reconnects us to the Father and guides us onto the right path. He is God's Wisdom to us when we need direction. He is our Comforter when we are worried or in pain, He is our Helper when we are in trouble. He is our Advocate or Attorney when we need deliverance. He teaches us and disciplines us from the Word of God, for He is the Revealer (John 16:5-14). He is the Greatest Friend you will ever have. He never leaves us or forsakes us, so that God is constantly with us in every situation. He shares our joy and our sorrows. He sees it all and knows it all. He bestows the indescribable Love of God upon us and through us. The Lord Jesus said, 'out of your belly shall flow rivers of Living Water' (John 7:38). That's the Holy Spirit — He is the Life-Giving River of God's beautiful Presence.

Jesus promised that He would not leave us orphaned (John 14:15-27). This is what He meant - that God Himself would come to live inside of each one of us in the Person of His Spirit so we would never be alone or isolated. People often experience loneliness in this world. But those who know God's Holy Spirit never feel alone. Sure, there may be difficult circumstances - we live in a fallen world filled with brokenness, but there's a confidence that brings unshakeable trust, hope, and joy from the Presence of God's Spirit. These things are hard for the intellect to fathom. "The things of God are spiritually discerned" (1 Corinthians 2:14). The Word describes it as 'foolishness to the flesh' meaning faith operates outside of our reasoning (1 Corinthians 1:18). That's what faith is: believing and trusting in One greater than ourselves. And the Bible tells us that the Greater One lives inside of us, and He overpowers the spirit of the world (1 John 4:4). Satan and his demons are fallen angels. They have no bodies and so they're looking for dwelling places to inhabit. When people do awful and demented things, most folks wonder 'why would someone do something like that?' It is because of demon spirits oppressing that one's life and character. These have been given legal access through sin, sexual immorality, disobedience, bitterness, or unresolved anger, engaging in evil deeds, watching, or dabbling with the occult: witchcraft, satanic music or rituals, involvement in false god idolatry, or new age mysticism. All these are corrupt influences of Satan using the flesh to entrap people. The more one engages, the more demonic the impact. Oh, to be led by the Spirit of God! (Romans 8:5-17). The miracle of Salvation comes by calling upon the Lord Jesus, repenting for sin and turning from living to please the flesh (Romans 10:9-13; 2 Corinthians 5:17-21) . Now washed in the Blood of Jesus, the believer is reconciled back to God: a new creation in Christ, filled with His Spirit, protected, empowered, and transformed - healed and set free. Hallelujah!
