

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

KERRY COMMUNITY YOUTH SERVICE

Secures Digital Literacy Funding to Support Older Adults

Kerry Community Youth Service (KCYS) has been announced as a recipient of the Vodafone Foundation and Rethink Ireland Hi Digital Fund, securing support to expand digital literacy services for older adults across the county.

The €540,000 national fund, revealed on Wednesday, 10th December 2025, backs community projects working to bridge the digital divide for people aged 65 and over. KCYS is the sole Kerry organisation selected.

The funding will allow KCYS to grow its successful Tech & Tea programme, an intergenerational initiative that pairs Transition Year students with older adults for one-to-one digital mentoring. The programme, delivered through schools and youth clubs, helps participants learn essential skills such as using smartphones, tablets, email and online services.

Welcoming the announcement, Jennifer McHugh, Youth Information Coordinator with KCYS, said: "We're proud to expand Tech & Tea across Kerry, connecting generations by empowering young people to help older adults gain the digital skills they need to stay in touch, access services, and feel confident online. Thanks to the Hi Digital Fund, more people in our rural communities will benefit from this award-winning programme."

The need for digital support among older adults remains high, particularly in rural counties like Kerry, where confidence and access can be limited. National figures show that 41% of people over 75 have never used the internet, while significant numbers of adults aged 60–74 remain digitally excluded.

Through the new funding, KCYS will extend Tech & Tea to reach more communities throughout the county, helping older people stay connected, independent, and engaged in an increasingly digital world.

NEW HEALTH BUILDINGS STILL EMPTY

A year after it was set to open the Killarney 130 bed community nursing unit has the lights on. But there's no one home.

The new hospital is a depressing sight to pass on a dark night.

Inside the walls of the old isolation hospital sits another empty brand new facility with the taps being turned on and off.

Eight years on, a large kitchen block at the very highly rated Deer Lodge which might have cooked not just for itself but for the neighbouring nucleus of hospitals lies empty. The kitchen is fully equipped but hasn't a sausage in the large larder. In actual fact, the food for the 40 residents is being delivered.

HSE can't tell me how much the kitchen block cost only that it was part of the 13 million euro development.

I wonder how well any of the large cookers, electric equipment etc are working now having never been used in eight years.

Has no one thought this could be used to prepare meals and wheels instead of bringing them by van from Tralee?

HSE South West told me: "Catering for



Deer Lodge is currently provided by the neighbouring catering department in Killarney Community Hospitals.

This arrangement will end once the new Killarney Community Nursing Unit opens next year, and arrangements are in place for the fully equipped kitchen at Deer Lodge to take over this catering. This includes recruitment of catering staff. Flushing of drains at the facility takes place every week as is standard practice to ensure compliance with Legionella regulations.

As the kitchen at Deerlodge was developed

as part of the construction of the approved centre, a standalone figure for the cost of the kitchen is not available."

Why has this scandal been allowed? I know Cllr Marie Moloney is trying to raise the matter and seek an explanation why the kitchen block has never been used. Particularly why the Killarney Meals and Wheels service could not be accommodated in the unit instead of bringing hot food by van from Tralee.

We have been concentrating on the old buildings - when, clearly, questions need to be posed about newer ones.

SANTA COMING TO TOWN

Santa has brought a few bits and pieces to Killarney 2025 - but there's a lot left to do in 2026.

There has been a welcome - though not uncontroversial - investment in roads. The pavement works on the Muckross Road is a late present. Then there are the (controversially) new "straight and narrows" in Fossa and on the Park Road. I am not sure what to make of the large tree planting along the Fossa straightwasn't the idea to have trees at a distance from cars with all the climate change? However, as someone pointed out to me: "Fossa at long last has the feel of a village". The Rock Road has produced a runway, rather than a cycleway - I see runners more than cyclists. But at least someone is using it

Over 200 social houses are underway in Cronin's Wood. Planning is also beginning to come through for hopefully there will be affordable private housing.

The TFI link buses are a great idea - if only there were bus stops and people knew how to use them properly. I see buses circling the town with none or few passengers on board. We need to use the buses, but it beats me why you have to have a smartphone to make it easy. Put in a few bus stops please, Santa Claus.

Money for a new theatre will not be available from the URDF fund, I am told.

But the council is trying to get something from the Department of Housing for a theatre. (We hope that ship has not sailed because of grant aid secured for the Anam centre).

Unfortunately the third level college for Killarney is way down Santa's list. Minister Michael Healy-Rae is expressing "serious concern" as it is listed still at Stage 1, the very first stage of development with an indicative construction window stretching from 2027 to 2035.

"We cannot allow this project to drift for another decade," the Minister said.

Other major items that Killarney needs from Santa are Toilets and Showers for Dundag, a matter raised by Cllr Maura Healy-Rae recently.

"The absence of facilities is totally inadequate and forces people into very inconvenient situations," she said.

There is welcome renovation of the cottage alongside Muckross House where my uncle Tom and auntie Delia lived - but many more cottages owned by the NPWS need doing up.

The cycleloop around the lakes is so long on the finger, we almost forget it was ever planned.

Perhaps if we are very good in 2026, we'll also get a minor injuries clinic and the new community hospital will open. We can only look forward!.

COUNCIL PASSES BIGGEST EVER BUDGET

The council budget for next year will see Euro 248 million across key programmes up 10% on this year.

There are a few stand outs that need looking at.

Payroll costs for staff will account for 41 per cent amounting to Euro 102 million of the total spend. Some 1300 staff were employed by the council at the end of last year, an increase of around 30 on the previous year - at a time when fewer basic services are delivered.

Social housing for instance is mainly provided by the many approved housing bodies and water is gone to Uisce Eireann. Refuse is largely gone too. In terms of income, State sector grants from housing to roads, environment and numerous miscellaneous services accounts for almost half or Euro 120.5 million.

The budget has been balanced thanks largely to the revenue from local property tax of Euro 17.6 million, council chief executive Fearghal Reidy said.

Last year the council members agreed on a 10 percent increase over base for three years and this provided for certainty.

The LPT allocation for 2026 in Kerry included an additional Euro 900,000 allocation to reflect the property reevaluation process.

Housing and building is again the programme of biggest expenditure (almost Euro 69 million) followed by roads and transport.

Recoupment from Irish Water for services continuing to be provided by the council will count for Euro 7.7 million euro of the Kerry local authority income. (More next week on the budget)

A husband and wife who built a hugely successful international business from humble beginnings in a shed at the rear of their home have been inducted into the Order of Inisfallen – the highest honour the Co Kerry town of Killarney can bestow. Con and Anne Stack saw their company grow from very humble beginnings to a multi-national enterprise that now employs over 600 people.

That remarkable success story was recognised at a ceremony in the historic Muckross House on Thursday afternoon when they received the Order of Inisfallen civic honour which is a joint initiative between Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and Kerry County Council

It recognises those who have made an exceptional contribution to the local economy and to the tourism industry.

When they moved to Killarney over 50 years ago, Moyvane native Con and his Ballyduff native wife, Anne, set up Killarney Plastics, having identified a market for fibre glass and glass enforced products.

The company later moved operations to an IDA supported, purpose-built unit and the remarkable dedication shown and groundwork put in by Con and Anne Stack paid handsome dividends as Killarney Plastics became global engineering company Tricel.

It evolved into a major family-led firm, delivering performance and innovation-driven solutions across the water, environmental, construction and distribution industries.

With 14 companies within the group, Tricel currently employs 620 people, 200 of whom are based in Killarney, and the company is now run by Con and Anne's sons Michael, Con, Richard and Robert.

Speaking at the awards ceremony, Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Martin Grady, said the story of Tricel is inspiring as it went from modest beginnings to international innovation, nurtured by vision, hard work, resilience and innovation.

"Despite this remarkable expansion, the Stack family has never lost sight of their roots. They have remained humble and steadfast supporters of local employment, local investment and local opportunity.

"Their commitment has ensured that generations of families in Killarney, Kerry and beyond have had the ability to thrive close to home," the mayor said.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Johnny McGuire, said all the comments he has heard since it was first announced that Con and Anne Stack were to be honoured had one common theme: It couldn't happen to a nicer couple or a nicer family.

"No words of mine could adequately describe the impact the company has made, both as a manufacturer and as an employer of over 600 people.

"Everything Con and Anne Stack have achieved in business and in life can be attributed to their dignity, their dedication, their commitment, their will to succeed and their incredible work ethic," he said.




Killarney mourns the passing of SEAMUS KIELY

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RSA Urges Public: "Think Before You Buy"

Do not gift E-Scooters, Quad Bikes or Scrambler Bikes to children this Christmas

4 December 2025 - The Road Safety Authority (RSA) has launched a new safety campaign urging parents, guardians, family members and friends to think carefully before purchasing gifts for children under the age of 16 this Christmas. Specifically, the RSA is strongly advising against buying e-scooters, quad bikes or scrambler bikes for young people due to the significant safety risks associated with these vehicles.

The RSA is reminding the public that powered vehicles are not toys. They pose real danger, particularly to children who lack the physical, cognitive and motor skills needed to operate them safely.

The new campaign has been developed in collaboration with Dr Irwin Gill, Consultant in Neurodisability at CHI at Temple Street Hospital. Drawing on real clinical experiences, the campaign uses the voices of imaginary children who have suffered injuries after falling from an e-scooter, quad bike or scrambler. These messages, placed alongside simple imagery of the vehicles across outdoor, digital and social media channels, create a direct and human reminder of the risks these gifts can pose.

The central message is clear: before buying a powered vehicle for a child, pause and consider whether it is legal, safe and appropriate. A Christmas gift should bring joy - not endanger



a child's future.

This initiative follows a separate RSA-CHI advertising campaign launched in November, warning parents not to buy e-scooters for children under 16. E-scooters are now the leading cause of traumatic brain injury among children admitted to CHI at Temple Street,

Ireland's national neurosurgical centre.

Sam Waide, Chief Executive of the RSA, said: "The greatest gift parents can give this year is ensuring the safety of their children. Parents should not consider purchasing a quad, scrambler or an e-scooter for any child this Christmas."

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
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


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Killarney Legion coaches hail historic **Erasmus+ Sports Project.**

Mobility project, launched in February with the support of Sean Kelly M.E.P., club executive members and the Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership, drew to a close this week as grassroots coaches returned from the Club La Santa sports resort in Lanzarote. 10 coaches received support from the Erasmus+Sports Mobility Coach Shadowing programme, which allowed them, and 8 other colleagues to shadow coaching delivered by the Club La Santa "Green Team" professional coaches and instructors.

This was the first time a GAA club availed of Sports Mobility Erasmus+ funding with an application for funding made to the National Agency, Léargas, with the facilitation of KRSP back in October 2024. The Legion project was titled "Multisport Coach Shadowing for Multiage Fitness & Conditioning" and saw the Legion coaches learn by observation and participation in activities delivered by Club La Santa sports coaches in a wide range of activities from their sport programme.

Activities shadowed which are transferrable to the Club's on-field and off-field training included Athletics Techniques, Functional Movement, Hyrox, Crossfit, TRX, Circuit Training, Fitball, Hill Reps (V02), stretching & recovery and nutrition programmes. Coaches were also encouraged to shadow some non-transferrable coached activities which would allow them to focus on how the Green Team professional coach prepared communicated and managed delivery.

Legion coaches maintained an online journal



to record their observations, learning and upload media. The club and KRSP intend will issue certificates to reflect their learning and experiences in the project. Feedback from all the participants has been exceptionally positive. The club will be organising some coaching workshops during the winter where participants will have an opportunity to share & transfer learnings from the project.

Legion will be hosting a Léargas Sports Mobility workshop in January 2026 for any sports club who is considering a sports mobility project for 2026. The next Erasmus+ funding call deadline is in February 2026.

In its final Project report, the club has called upon the EU and Léargas, the national agency supporting Erasmus+ projects in Ireland, to expand The Erasmus+ Sports Mobility programmes to aid grassroots clubs tackle the challenges of coach recruitment, retention and development. The club is also happy to share experiences to assist other Kerry clubs get involved in Erasmus+ projects through Kerry GAA networks or via the Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership.

Legion's Project lead, Minor Coach and club Vice-Chairman Brian Looney thanked Léargas for the project support, Club La Santa's Sports Director Michael Møller and his "Green team" coaches for their generous guidance and KRSP & Coordinator Gearoid O'Doherty for their facilitation.

The O'Leary brothers' commitment is inspired by their late mother, who lived with Multiple Sclerosis for nearly 30 years before her passing in 2011.


Throughout those decades, the MS South Kerry Branch provided ongoing support, understanding, and compassion for their mother and the entire O'Leary family.

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BLEPHARITIS

WHAT IS BLEPHARITIS?

Blepharitis eyelids causes to become red, swollen and inflamed. It doesn't normally cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. TYPES OF BLEPHARITIS

There are two main types of blepharitis - anterior and posterior.

Anterior blepharitis

When the front (anterior) part of the eyelids becomes sore, this can be caused by an infection, allergy or a general sensitivity to bacteria present on the eyelids. It can also be associated with some scalp conditions, such as very dry or oily skin and dandruff.

Posterior blepharitis

Also known as meibomian gland dysfunction (MGD) is when the glands that make the oily part of your tears become blocked. Both types of blepharitis can cause dry eye or make it worse if you already have it. Many people will have a combination of blepharitis, meibomian gland dysfunction and dry eye.

RISK FACTORS

Blepharitis is more common in people over the age of 50, but anyone can develop it. This is often because the glands

that make the normal tears. particularly the oily part of the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older.

SYMPTOMS

Blepharitis can cause crusting and white scales may stick to the roots of eyelashes. Your eyelid edges may become red and your eyes will feel gritty, burning, sore or itchy. If you experience these symptoms, make an appointment with your optometrist.

TREATMENT

There is a range of products designed especially for treating blepharitis, such as sterile pads, individual moist wipes and separate cleaning solutions.

As part of the treatment, you need to remove all the crusting and debris from the edge of your eyelids and from between your eyelashes. You should use a special lid cleaning product. Treatment of blepharitis is a long-term procedure. You may not see any improvement for several weeks.

Continue the treatment twice a day for at least one month, then less often as it starts to get better. You will probably need to continue to clean your lids at least twice a week to help prevent the blepharitis from returning.

Communicate Needs - Inform visitors about

Caring for Kerry - Winter Brings Extra Challenges for Older People

The HSE South West Caring for Kerry campaign continues this week with a reminder that older people can take practical steps to stay well at home and avoid unnecessary hospital visits during the winter months. Winter often brings additional challenges for older people, particularly in maintaining health and safety at home. As part of the campaign, experts from the Older Person's Hub at Baile Mhuire, Tralee and University Hospital Kerry are sharing practical advice designed to help older people remain safe and well throughout the season.

Dr. Mary Randles of the Geriatric Emergency Multidisciplinary Service (GEMS) at University Hospital Kerry said.

"Simple steps taken at home can make a significant difference in staying well this winter. Good nutrition, home safety, and vaccination are key

to reducing risks and ensuring older people can remain safe and independent."

Dr Randles added: "One of the main ways you can prevent slips, trips and falls at home is making sure that your house remains free of clutter, so loose rugs, loose wires, pets – consider having a bell on a pet so you can hear them coming and you don't trip over them; and making sure you're wearing safe footwear."

She also recommended the "Take Control Reduce Your Risk of Falls" resource available on hse.ie.

Top Tips for Staying Well at Home This Winter

Stay well nourished: eat balanced meals including protein and dairy to keep bones strong, and vitamin D to help absorb calcium.

Keep a well-stocked pantry with long-life foods such as tinned fish and beans, and ensure the freezer has essentials like bread and milk.

Take advantage of services such as Meals on Wheels, which can deliver hot meals directly to your home.

Make sure prescriptions are filled in advance to avoid running out of essential medication.

Consider using a pendant alarm or falls watch, which can alert services quickly in the event of an emergency.

HSE South West is also reminding older people and those with underlying health conditions of the importance of keeping up to date with winter vaccinations, including flu and COVID-19. Vaccination remains one of the most effective ways to reduce the risk of serious illness and hospitalisation during the colder months.

Over €5.9 million for Kerry Farmers in Eco-Scheme Balancing Payments

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation that Kerry farmers will receive €5,988,458 in balancing payments under the 2025 Eco-Scheme.

The commencement of the Eco-Scheme balancing payments will bring the total paid under the 2025 Eco-Scheme since October to almost €288 million with 112,610 farmers now in receipt of an Eco-Scheme payment across the country.

Minister Foley said: "I welcome confirmation that balancing payments totalling over €5.9 million have begun issuing from the Department of Agriculture, Food and The Marine to farmers across the county of Kerry today. The aim of Ireland's Eco-Scheme is to reward farmers for undertaking actions beneficial to the climate, environment, water quality and biodiversity and these payments issuing from today are a vital income support for farm families across Kerry."

INAGURAL MEETING OF NEW LOCAL COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

The inaugural meeting of the new Kerry Local Community Safety Partnership (LCSP) took place on 2 December 2025 at the Tralee Bay Wetlands Centre in Tralee. Local Community Safety Partnerships are replacing Joint Policing Committees across the country.

The aim of the Local Community Safety Partnership is to prioritise the voice of local people in identifying and addressing community safety issues. This will occur in collaboration with a broad range of relevant stakeholders including local councillors and Council management, An Garda Síochána, community and resident representatives, business and education representatives, and a range of statutory agencies including the HSE and Túsla.

At the inaugural meeting, Cllr Niall Kelleher was elected as chairperson of the Kerry Local Community Safety Partnership and Derry Ó' Murchú from Dingle was elected as vice-chairperson.

Cllr Kelleher said: 'The future of community safety in Kerry starts with all of us working as one. This new partnership approach is being introduced to encourage greater community participation and empowerment, involving all sections of the community working together to foster greater feelings and experiences of safety in localities throughout Ireland.

'A shared approach to problem solving can ensure that potentially harmful situations do



not develop in any given community. Harm prevention and interventions

should be delivered pro-actively, by the service best placed to deliver it, and in a joined-up, integrated way with other services.

'The Partnership will take a strategic approach to their work so that issues arising can be dealt with in a coordinated manner and addressed collectively by relevant service providers in partnership with the community,' said Cllr Kelleher.

Minister for Justice, Home Affairs and Migration, Jim O'Callaghan said:

'I am extremely pleased that the Kerry Local


Community Safety Partnership has been established, and its first meeting has taken place. This marks another significant step on the rollout of these partnerships nationwide and this government's new approach to community safety.



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CAHILL WELCOMES OVER €211,000 for Kerry Under €7 Million Local Enhancement Programme 2026

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed today's announcement by Minister for Rural and Community Development and the Gaeltacht, Dara Calleary TD, of a €7 million Local Enhancement Programme (LEP) for 2026, with €211,006.90 allocated specifically to Kerry.

"The €211,000 announced for Kerry today will help fund essential small capital works, accessibility improvements, energy-efficiency upgrades, and the purchase of vital equipment that many groups rely on. These grants often allow communities to take that important

next step, whether that is improving facilities, enhancing participation, or lowering running costs," Cahill stated.

"Right across this county, we have exceptional volunteers and community groups who work tirelessly for their neighbours. This funding is recognition of that dedication and will support them in continuing their outstanding work. Under Fianna Fáil in Government, investment in rural Ireland continues to grow, and today's announcement is another clear example of that commitment"

"I would urge any community organisation with a project in mind to contact the LCDC in Kerry for guidance on applications. These grants are designed to be accessible, to target need, and to help groups deliver improvements that have an immediate local impact."

The Local Enhancement Programme is a key measure under the Government's rural development strategy Our Rural Future, and Deputy Cahill said today's announcement



reflects the Government's ongoing focus on strengthening rural communities:

"This is investment in people, in place, and in the future of rural Ireland, and it is particularly important here in Kerry where our communities remain the backbone of local life."

Minister Michael Healy-Rae Welcomes Major Government Commitment to Begin Construction of New Tralee Courthouse

Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael Healy-Rae TD, has today welcomed the confirmation in the Justice Sectoral Plan of the National Development Plan Review 2025 that funding has been secured and construction will commence on a brand new Courthouse for Tralee.

The Sectoral Plan clearly states that a "new Courthouse in Tralee" is included in the Courts Service capital programme, with the Minister for Justice confirming that funding is now in place to begin the project and that construction will start during the 2026–2030 period.

Minister Healy-Rae said: "This is a major investment in County Kerry and in the future of Tralee. For far too long, the need for a modern, fit-for-purpose courthouse has been accepted by everyone, but action never followed. Today's publication finally changes that. The Government has now committed to moving this project forward and beginning construction in this NDP cycle."

The Minister also acknowledged the ongoing concerns locally around the future of the historic Ashe Street Courthouse:

"I know that the condition and future use of the old Courthouse is a real worry for people in Tralee. It is a landmark building and a significant part of our town's heritage. With the Government now progressing a new courthouse, we must in parallel develop a clear plan for the old building, one that protects it,



respects its history, and ensures it remains a valuable asset for the town. That process needs to begin immediately."

Minister Healy-Rae emphasised that this announcement represents a strong signal of confidence in Tralee:

"This is meaningful investment into Tralee's infrastructure and public services. Modern court facilities are essential for access to justice, for families, for victims, for legal practitioners, and for the wider community. This project will

support jobs, drive footfall into the town, and anchor judicial services in Kerry for decades to come.

He concluded: "I will continue working with the Minister for Justice, the Courts Service, and Kerry County Council to ensure that this project remains on track and that the old Courthouse is not forgotten about. Tralee deserves both a modern justice facility and a clear future for one of its most historic buildings."

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






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
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Catherine Carty Appointed First Female Chair of Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership



Also speaking after securing Harry Halwax's


services for 2026, First Team Manager Colin

Late Surge Takes Dingle Over the Finish Line MUNSTER SENIOR CLUB FINAL:

Dingle 1-19 St. Finbarrs (Cork) 0-20

In the end, it was ecstacy for Dingle and agony for St. Finbarrs. But I say "in the end" because the truth is that the Cork champions looked the better side here from start to almost finish. Note. 'almost'. Dingle still had just barely enough left in the tank for one more burst. They had a penalty call denied - I wasn't sure at the time, and it doesn't matter now - but they still had one last chance and the right man there to take it. This certainly wasn't any grand larceny. But this one was definitely won against the head.

Paul Geaney opened the scoring and Conor Geaney clipped over a nice point to give Dingle a bright start. Both teams were making tactical switches, with Mark O'Connor clearly detailed to man-mark Brian Hayes. I'm not the only one saying the Corkman has been the best club footballer on show over the past month in any province, and given Mark's role for the Geelong Cats, putting him on Hayes was an obvious decision. It was definitely needed; Hayes made a brilliant catch to set up John Wigginton-Barrett (I will bet any money that lad absolutely hated 'Downton Abbey' while in secondary school) for St. Finbarr's opening score. Dylan Geaney made it 0-3 to 0-1 in Dingle's favour.

At which point the leading man took centre stage in this drama. We all saw the danger of Hayes on the horizon. We all knew that Steven Sherlock was a good footballer; I'd have argued that he was discarded too quickly by a Cork side that never knew how to properly utilise him. But this kind of football? Sherlock simply took this game by the scruff of the throat. He fired over a two pointer (God between and all harm, when I saw him shaping for the shot, I thought "way too ambitious" - he nailed it). Tom O'Sullivan, with his usual roving commission from Dingle, picked off a point. Then up stepped Sherlock again, adding another orange flag from a free. Same kind of distance, same kind of ease.

Sherlock was beginning to find space with real ease now and his team-mates were realising it. Dingle appeared to have switched Tom O'Sullivan to picking up Sherlock when Finbarrs had possession but roving when Dingle had it. It looked 'neither flesh nor fowl' to me, not one thing or the other, but I was struggling to track the movements on either side. What's certain is Sherlock's impact as he fired over for another orange flag. 0-8 to 0-4 now, and St. Finbarr's were fully deserving of their lead at the end of the first quarter.

And then Paul Geaney scythed in and fired home from a tight enough angle. This is what he does. Honestly, there were people three years ago telling me that he should be retiring from the Kerry team. Yes, because we have so many footballers like this to spare. There's a few of ye



I wouldn't trust to boil a kettle. And if any of ye are wondering, I don't really know Paul or any of the family. None of that is me being diplomatic. There was no goal on there when he received the ball.

Mark O'Connor showed his class as well, notching a point to square things up. Brian Hayes wasn't letting him off unanswered, and split the posts himself a minute later. Steven Sherlock curled over another stupendous score from well outside the arc. Paul Geaney with a free pulled one back but Dingle were definitely struggling and Sherlock struck again with a two pointer free and added a white flag just before the break. It felt to me that Dingle were only clinging on and hoping for that whistle and a chance to regroup. 0-14 to 1-6 to the Barrs, and deservedly so.

Dingle again made a strong start to the second half, Dylan Geaney clipping over two fine points. Back came Sherlock with a point from play and he added yet another two point free.

Conor Geaney with a free. Paul was departing the fray after taking an accidental bang to the head. A return looked unlikely.

Sherlock with a free. 0-19 to 1-9. Twenty minutes left, and Dingle were obviously going to need every second of it.

Was it that Dingle abandoned caution and just went all-out for scores? Did St. Finbarrs go a little bit conservative and snatch at a couple of chances with that big lead? Human nature accounts for both. Regardless, Dingle began to claw their way back. Dylan Geaney fired over a

Tom O'Sullivan and Brian Hayes swapped points again. 0-20 to 1-12.

Dylan Geaney with two frees. Both pressure kicks but well inside his range and he calmly steered them over. Barrs were struggling now. Scoring chances without reward. Paul Geaney in on goal once again....was that a foot block? It's the old debate. Was his foot going to block a ball already in motion, or was he going to impede Paul's kicking motion? You can argue either way. I felt that it was far enough away from the actual kick to give the benefit of the doubt - but it's easy for me to be judicial sitting typing on the laptop. Ye know yereselves; I wasn't doing any shouting at the time!

Dylan Geaney with a two pointer. Dying seconds now. Two wides for the Cork side, Sherlock wayward with a difficult one that would probably have sealed it. No matter. All St. Finbarrs had to do is hold possession. Like I say, a year ago it would have been a lot easier, but it's a different game now. St. Finbarrs caught for over-holding. Did Ian Maguire hold it too long? Yes. It's that simple. And a Barrs player absolutely did try to impede the free being taken quickly. Everyone can debate that all they want - he picked up the ball and he pulled it away when a Dingle player reached for it. Pundits love to make hay out of these - I can't listen to the likes of Sky Sports anymore, I really can't, and don't even get me started on the podcast 'banter' nonsense. Decisions like these are digital. Did he do it? Yes or no? Yes, he did.

Brought up. Correctly. And because it was brought up, Dylan Geaney had the option of kicking it outside the arc.....

It was a difficult kick. Very difficult. But in these circumstances and with the form Dylan had been showing? I think all of us, Cork and Kerry alike, knew full well where that ball was going even before he kicked it.

Tough on St. Finbarrs. They could have won this; they should have won this. I really do feel sorry for them. But, without wanting to salt any wounds, they had chances to win it that they couldn't take and they made a late and costly error. Even tougher on Steven Sherlock, who gave a performance for the ages. The man of the match award was only a formality and a cold consolation. I will say that Jimmy Barry Murphy in his interview afterwards reminded everybody what real class looks like. Irish people throw the word 'legend' around too often, but sometimes it really is the one that applies.

Dingle won't, and shouldn't, care how they got over the line. Munster champions for the first time in their history, and they did it in the most dramatic way possible.

There was a sense over the last two or three years of Ballymac being on the rise, especially with the emergence of young players like Donal Daly, Daire Keane, Jack Joy, Niall Collins, and current Tralee CBS midfielder Máirtín McKivergan. However, for a lot of the games that I saw, by far and away the most influential player was midfielder Aidan Breen. I was told that he had been in training with the Kerry senior team at one stage - I was told it because I asked the question, and I had a reason for asking. Ballymac doesn't have the population base historically to be plying their trade in Division One, but they have always batted above their weight and deserved to be there. That meant, of course, that they were carrying the favourites tag into every Kerry Junior Premier Championship. And they were always going close....without getting over the finish line. Usually the bridesmaid, never the bride. Ironically, the year that they did go on to win it, is the year that they actually got relegated to Division Two. And somehow, since that relegation, they seem to have gone on from strength to strength. Last Saturday, of course, they were swimming in their deepest waters yet, a first ever Munster Junior Final against Cork champions Buttevant.

It was the Cork side who had the wind at first and they made quick use of it, Kevin Lenahan and David Hanlon (tpf) putting them four points in front with just two kicks.

Then Ballymac started revving their engines. Micheál Reidy, Darragh Broderick, and Breen (whose clever drifts into attack to draw focus and free space have obviously been polished on the training ground) with two frees were back level. Breen made a great turnover and found Donal Daly already accelerating...before Buttevant could react, it was in the net. Seamus Madigan and Conor Hanlon replied to leave Ballymac leading by just one at the break, 1-4 to 0-6. But with that strong wind.....

You could make a strong argument for the Olympics, but does it really? I don't think it has the same audiences in attendance or in viewing figures.

I expect I'm marking myself as part of a particular generation (let's not do that 'Millenial', 'Gen X', 'Gen Z' box-ticking nonsense) when I saw that the Olympics have never had the same lustre since those clips of a snorting Ben Jonson looking more like a bull than a human being in Seoul.

No, the World Cup is simply bigger. Even the US has gotten in on the act. The Superbowl is

big, but it's not the World Cup Final. Soccer is also much more popular in terms of juvenile participation than you think – the political term of 'soccer mom' is more literal than people think. By the way – and this is a little bugbear of mine – the whole "Europeans call it 'football' and take offence at it being called 'soccer' " thing was nonsense from the very start. Urban myth, it never happened. English people have called it 'soccer' from the start, deriving from 'Association Football' as opposed to 'Rugby Football' which was also growing in popularity at the time.

At almost any time in its long and illustrious history (you have to say "illustrious in a sentence like this; it's a rule) having a World Cup played in the US would have been a masterstroke. But my own belief is that the US was already beginning to have real fears about immigration, especially from its Southern border, by the end of the sixties, and those fears have only grown since. Soccer was perceived as a latino game. American football is America's favourite game at around 40% (ironically, since the sixties, when franchises starting to form one coherent competition), baseball at around 12% (declining faster than you think but still huge), and basketball (just behind it). Roughly 6% of American follow soccer to some extent. But that's growing, and the MLS, seen mostly as a nice retirement package for top players previously, is really gaining credibility. Of course, there is no concept of promotion or relegation - the idea of capital investment with such risks attached is incomprehensible in their economy. David Beckham took a bigger gamble than most people realise with that investment into Inter Miami.

This isn't going to be any diatribe. I think it's relatively uncontroversial to say that FIFA has very little credibility as an actual sports organisation. If nothing else, the failure to invest money into....well, anything other than themselves, but particularly growing the game in countries like the US or India, shows that, Awarding the World Cup to Qatar was, in its own way, spectacular. That was not so much sportswashing as baby with the bathwater kind of stuff. It was ridiculous.... but everybody, including all the countries that intended wearing rainbow armbands in support of LGBTQ rights and pundits who travelled to Qatar to condemn people being in Qatar in such circumstances (the Garys, Neville and Lineker, being prime examples), took the money on offer and hushed up. This World Cup is going to be worse in that respect. Gianna Infantino has already acknowledged that this World Cup needed Cristiano Ronaldo far more than Cristiano needed this World Cup. Don't worry about the 'rule book', Cristiano, that's only a suggestion box. Let me take care of that for you... Can America do that? Remember, it was the US sports authorities who unabashedly exposed FIFA corruption and brought down the fall of Sepp Blatter (who personally picked his protege Gianni Infantino as his successor). But that was a very different US. Nowadays?

In its current state? Let's be honest. The World Club Cup was an overblown disaster from start to finish, and the US was more stable back then, not less. Supporters didn't know in time where their teams would be playing, so a lot of stadia were nigh on empty. Almost every visiting team

was critical of the extreme heat and a lot of games were delayed by lightning – that's going to be an even bigger issue next year.

Dynamic pricing. FIFA take a decent cut, ranging from 5% to 15%, out of every transaction. And you don't know where your team is going to be playing – Donald Trump has already stated that he is considering removing games from troubled (i.e. 'democrat') cities. FIFA have a vested interest in keeping people in the dark until the last minute to push prices up.

Public transport is going to be a problem. You are talking about venues thousands of miles apart in some cases. A lot of stadia aren't near train stations. That doesn't sound like a big deal? Think about Lansdowne Road. Getting out after matches isn't too bad these days, is it? Now, take away the dart station. See the difference?

I did say that the heat could be a problem. But so could ICE. As in, difficulty getting visas and the possibility of people being seized and, at best, expelled, by people without warrants or badges and their faces covered. And when I say 'expelled at best'....

The one thing we can be sure of is that there won't be any violence. After all, didn't FIFA do themselves proud by giving their inaugural

In theory, Mexico and Canada are also hosting this World Cup. Neither of those is a problem. Neither of those is also getting the slightest mention. The good news is that if Ireland qualify (and that particular 'if' is so big it's probably visible from space), our group stage would mostly be in Mexico.

Can the US handle hosting a World Cup next year? Much more to the point, does it really want to?

I really, really doubt it.

Sem Retain Frewen Cup in Thrilling Finish FREWEN CUP FINAL:

Utility Trust St Pauls Lakers made their exit from the National Cup when they came a cropper to a more physical Templeogue side who probably had a little bit more variety off the bench and a better spread of scoring. It's fair to say that the Lakers did miss the presence of both Jack O'Sullivan and Rui Sariava and had both or either been available it would have afforded Coach Luke O'Hea great options.

The game was tight in the first half but the Dublin side made their move in the third quarter, where they outscored the Lakers 28-18 and that was the game changing moment . Templeogue defended smartly, putting a variety of markers on Steve Kely who was the subject of very close attention while the presence of Wilfred Omorusi, Conor Gallagher and Hector Parras inside at various stages meant under the basket was like Times Square.

The Lakers had made the better start with Sam Grant and Kelly to the fore and led at half time 52-50 after the first quarter finished level 26-26. A feature of that quarter was the remarkable shooting of eight three pointers inside the first five minutes, shared equally between the sides, a statistic that was never going to be maintained. Kelly had some success also driving to the basket but the Dubliners sealed off that avenue with the towering presence of Gallagher and Omorusi and some tactical fouling. They had the better of the third period with Adam Tighe, relative of Kerry GAA County Board Chairman Patrick O Sullivan, hitting two crucial threes which prised open that bit of daylight. From there on the Lakers were always chasing the game, something they tried valiantly to do to the bitter end.

As mentioned the game opened in a blaze of long range accuracy with Mikey Gormley and Evan Cook on target for the hosts. Steve Kelly and Sam Grant stayed in tow with them and that helped the Lakers into a 13-12 lead. Templeogue then introduced Omorusi off the bench and his athleticism immediately paid dividends with eight points. That was tapered though by the ongoing contribution of Grant and Kelly and with Eoin Carroll also chipping in, the quarter ended as it finished, level, at 26 a piece.

The Lakers made a good start to the second quarter with Marko Bencic on court,



displaying his ability from beyond the arc and also pulling down some offensive rebounds. Kelly was also in good order and when Bencic hit his second three, the Lakers led 39-32. But Cook stepped forward for Templeogue and his trickery alongside Omorusi brawn got them in front again, 42-40. But Grant and Kelly were continuing to combine, one Grant basket particularly memorable for a brilliant Kelly assist. The duo helped the Lakers into a half time advantage, albeit a small one, 52-50, with Gallagher and Gormley prominent for Templeogue.

Grant, Carroll and Mark Sheehan, with a lovely left hand finish, gave the Lakers a positive start to the second half but Templeogue were looking like a team that had figured out how to win the game. Gallagher was using all his experience, Cook was refreshed with a sit down while Millan Lopez upped his input. Sam Grant did have the score of the game when he stuffed home after a sublime Bencic pass but the one thing the Lakers didn't cater for was the appearance of Adam Tighe. At a crucial moment he hit two three pointers and with Gallagher and Omorusi getting joy inside the home team were able to take the lead and open the biggest gap of the day, ahead now 78-70.

The one thing the Lakers didn't need was Templeogue and Cook netting early in the fourth but that's what happened, twice, and that pushed the lead out to 12 . Grant with a three and an inside shot made it 86-75 with five minutes on the clock as the Lakers chased the game. They did have some good opportunities but it was almost as if the ball refused to go in. Having said that, Kelly did chip the lead down to eight, 88-80 , with just under four minutes to go but Hector Parras hit a three to put the kibosh on that . Gormley and Omorusi put the finishing touches to the scoreline and despite late points from Carroll the game was done at 95-84.

Sam Grant top scored with 30, Steve Kelly had 29, Eoin Carroll 17, Marko Bencic 6 and Mark Sheehan 2.

For the winners Evan Cook shot 24, Wilfred Omorusi 22, Millan Lopez 13, Michael Gormley 10, Hector Parras 7, Adam Tighe 6.

The Lakers are back on the road to Dublin again this Saturday December 13th when they travel to the Tolka Rovers Sports Complex for a date with the hosts. After a slow start the Lakers have climbed up the table and with a congested look near the top any form of the winning run can shoot you into contention. Tolka have a 6-3 winning record and will be keen to add to their total. Tip off is at 7.30pm. WANTED

HEDGING

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance. Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity. Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil. to choose the right hedge for your garden here are a few pointers to think about

- 1. The type of soil you have.
- 2. How exposed the garden is, i.e. what direction is it facing.
- 3. The eventual height and width the hedge will be.
- 4. Does it need to be evergreen.

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want it is time to prepare the soil. start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around, but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time. What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. Now is the perfect time to plant hedging, however if you wish to wait until the end of March you can plant container grown hedging all year around. Next week I will focus on trees.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

with the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry

County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.




This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mts when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.



"The Lord is my Light and my Salvation – whom shall I fear? The Lord is the Refuge and Fortress of my life – whom shall I dread?

So, these are two opposites: the shadow of the valley of death versus the Shadow of the Shepherd of our souls. "Be merciful to me O God for in You my soul takes refuge, in the shadow of Your wings I will take refuge, 'til the storms of destruction pass by" (Psalm 57:1). Friend, in God's Shadow is safety and provision - a place where you're seen, loved, directed, comforted, and refreshed. It is a warm place. The language used in Psalm ninety-one describes a picture of a mother hen as she protects her baby chicks under her wings from predators. "For You have been my Help, and in the shadow of Your wings I will sing for Joy" (Psalm 63:7; Psalm 98; Luke 2:10). 'Joy to the world the Saviour is born'. Hallelujah!
