



uality of life, being closer to family and friends and a safer environment are the three top determining factors for people who have relocated to Kerry, according to a survey released this week.

The Kerry Relocation Survey carried out by National Recruitment & HR Services Group Collins McNicholas, in conjunction with IDA Ireland, KerrySciTech and Kerry County Council, was launched this morning in Ballygarry House Hotel, Tralee, Co Kerry.

Collins McNicholas surveyed over 250 professionals who have recently relocated to Kerry. The report includes responses from those who relocated from 15 different countries including Australia, Canada, United States, Portugal, Spain, Poland and South Africa.

Over half (51pc) of those surveyed said they now travel to work in 20 minutes or less - a much-reduced commute time compared to their previous careers.

Respondents in many cases moved to Kerry to advance their career while at the same time benefitting from a new and improved quality of life that the Kingdom can offer. 83% of respondents moved into a similar or more senior role than the one they held before moving, which highlights the opportunities that exist in Kerry.

88pc of those who responded are degree qualified or above and 71pc of respondents have 6 or more years' industry experience,

which shows Kerry is attracting highly qualified and experienced professionals.

Some of the other key findings of the survey were: 74% now enjoy a similar or lower cost of living, with 79% experiencing a similar or increased level of disposable income

89% were satisfied or very satisfied with their move to Kerry. 38% of those who moved to Kerry in the last five years were from overseas Kerry is fast becoming a hub for the science, technology, and engineering sectors, with an ever-growing demand for talent across the pharmaceutical, manufacturing, financial services and technology industries in the region. In May 2019, JRI America announced the expansion of its technology centre in Tralee along with another 100 new jobs. Most recently, Fexco opened a €21 million research and development facility in Killorglin and is set to create a further 305 jobs by 2024.

COUNCILLOR CALLS FOR

IMPROVEMENTS AT DANGEROUS JUCTION

Councillor Michael has called on Kerry County Council to carryout sight Improvement works to the extremely dangerous junction at Shanacloon Cross, Kilgobnet, Beaufort as a matter of priority. Councillor Cahill said residents in Beaufort have been highlighting this hazardous junction for many years and are most anxious that "Safety Improvement Works" are carried out at the earliest possible date. The Fianna Fail Councillor said "it is imperative that this dangerous junction is improved before any further accidents occur at this location." "This is a busy junction in Beaufort and locals are extremely concerned that someone will be seriously injured or killed at this location if action is not taken" stated Councillor Cahill.

Senior Roads Engineer, Padraic Teahan gave the following response: Minor works at this location would be suitable for funding through the Councillor Specific Municipal District



Operations fund. Any works proposed would require the permission of the landowner. An estimate can be prepared upon request.

Mr Teahan said alternatively, the location may be considered for submission to the Department of Transport Tourism and Sport under the Safety Improvement Works Scheme. However, the Road Safety Authority website indicates that there have been no recorded accidents at this junction since 2005 which does not support the case for a more significant project at this junction.

Councillor Cahill said he was aware of a couple of accidents that occurred at this location and had passed on a number of photographs in respect of same. The Rossbeigh Councillor requested that an estimate be prepared for the required works.

KILLARNEY CYCLING CLUB LOOKS BOTH FORWARD AND BACK

urrent Kerry road Champion John Brosnan was presented with the Kerry County Strip with a new dash of colour to the 2020 peloton added by club Chairman Mark Murphy

"The strip acknowledges the club's County Champion and is also a recognition of the significance of the event in Kerry cycling", Mark said.

"The County Championship is prestigious in Kerry and is important in the tradition of the sport here. Some great champions have won it since it started in 1952 and riders want their names on that trophy."

The first County Kerry Road Championship was held in Kenmare in 1952 and was just 10 miles long, reflecting the infancy of road-racing then - some riders were on fixed-wheel track bikes. It was won by 15-year-old Gene Mangan and three winners in the 1950s went on to win the Rás Tailteann - Mangan, Paudie Fitzgerald and Mick Murphy.

Mark Murphy added that presenting a club jersey with the county stripe was also a reflection of the club's strength-in-depth in recent years. Brosnan's win in 2019 was the third successive win for the Killarney club, with

Conor Kissane having winning the two years previously.

Brosnan's win came out of a five-man break that developed half-way through the 2019 race. Killarney had the advantage with three men - Brosnan, Conor Kissane and Marcus Tracey – up against two from Tralee Manor West - Cathal Moynihan and Cormac Daly. Kissane took second place from Brosnan and Cathal Moynihan came third.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

STATEMENT FROM THE NATIONAL PUBLIC **HEALTH EMERGENCY TEAM**


The National Public Health Emergency Team met last night (Wednesday 11 March) to review latest evidence of the spread of COVID-19. NPHET has made a recommendation that Ireland move to Delay Phase.

There has been a significant increase in recent days in the number of cases detected in Ireland, a number of clusters in hospital settings with some cases in intensive care and a number of cases arising from community transmissions.

New advice provided by ECDC yesterday, highlighting that the detection of COVID-19 cases and deaths outside of known chains of transmission, is a strong signal that social distancing should be considered. The ECDC also recommended that the measures should be taken early and should be decisive, rapid, coordinated and comprehensive.

Today, Ireland introduces new measures as part of our effort to interrupt the transmission of COVID-19.

- · Individuals who have symptoms should self-isolate for a period of 14 days
- · Individuals should reduce discretionary social contacts as much as possible
- · Elderly and/or medically vulnerable people should reduce as much as possible contacts outside home.
- There should be no mass gatherings;
- a) involving more than 100 people if located indoors
- b) involving more than 500 people if located outdoors
- · Closure of museums, galleries and tourism sites
- · Closure to students of schools, creches, other childcare facilities and higher education institutions.
- · Reduction of workplace contacts, and implementation of remote working practices and teleconferencing where possible and not to travel for meetings. Work time and break times should be staggered, where possible.
- · Restriction of visiting at hospitals, long term care



settings, mental health facilities, prisons, and spacing measures in homeless shelters.

NPHET further recommends that these measures should be introduced until Sunday 29th March 2020. The impact of these measures will be under continuous review.

Dr. Tony Holohan, Chief Medical Officer, Department of Health, said; "The National Public Health Emergency Team and the Health Sector in its entirety has been preparing for the effects of COVID-19 on our population.

"Now, we need citizen's to follow these new measures and help us protect the most vulnerable in our society, help our health service treat this virus effectively and ultimately keep each other as healthy as possible."

It can take up to 14 days for symptoms of Covid-19 (Coronavirus) to show.





THE CORONAVIRUS: EMPLOYER ADVICE

Q. Do I have to pay employees absent due to the coronavirus?

- A. Anybody absent with the coronavirus will be on sick leave and should be treated exactly the same as anybody else on sick leave. If there is a policy in place it should be implemented and if no payment normally takes place then any change from that position must be implemented fairly. There is no requirement in law to pay for sick leave and this instance is no different.
- Q. Is an employee entitled to self-isolate where there are no such advices in place from the Health authorities?
- A. In the current climate there needs to be recognition that certain employees may react over cautiously. Some may have underlying medical issues that employees will not be aware of. Situations like this need to be approached sensitively. Where an employee decides to self-isolate there is no entitlement to payment. Even if a sick pay scheme is in place it is unlikely that it would cover this scenario as no medical cert would be available.
- Q. How should I deal with suppliers and other agencies like Revenue and banks in the event of either a short or long term lockdown?
- A. You should immediately contact suppliers if you wish to change or cancel orders and should also be in consultation with them regarding payments, direct debits etc. You also need, if necessary, to have dialogue with Revenue and your lending institution in relation to any issues that may arise in that area.
- (). Is there appropriate info available to alert staff and customers to best practice?
- A. Yes, all of this is available from the WHO who are the experts in this field and the HSE also has useful signage.
- Q. Will my business interruption insurance cover my losses?
- A. Highly unlikely, but it is important to check the details on your policy and ascertain if there is a level of cover. If you are in doubt check with your Broker or ask Head Office to study your policy.



A quick exercise to establish if that hunger pangs is emotional of physical is to sit with it for a few minutes. Ask yourself am I really hungry? If so what am I hungry for? Common eye conditions: REFRACTIVE ERROR

Refraction is the bending of light as it passes from one medium to another. The eye has several optical elements that, if correctly powered, focus light onto the retina at the back of the eye. However, there are four common types of refractive eye conditions where the eye is unable to correctly focus light onto the retina. These 'refractive errors' can cause vision to be blurred, and may lead to headaches and eye strain.

Myopia – short sightedness

Myopia is a refractive condition of the eye where light focuses in front of the retina. This makes distant objects appear blurry, but objects that are close are clearer.

If the amount of myopia is large enough and is left uncorrected, distance vision is poor and may lead to headaches and eye strain.

Hyperopia – long sightedness

Hyperopia is a refractive condition of the eye where light focuses behind the retina. This makes close objects blurry, and while distant objects may appear clearer sometimes they are blurry too.

If the amount of hyperopia is large enough and is left uncorrected, close vision may be poor and may lead to headaches and eye strain, particularly in adults.

Astigmatism

Astigmatism is where the optical surfaces are shaped more like a rugby ball than a football. This means that there is not a clear single point of focus. If left uncorrected, it can also lead to headaches and eye strain.

Presbyopia

Presbyopia is caused by a loss of flexibility of the lens inside the eye. It affects all people as they age, generally becoming problematic after 40 years of age.

Presbyopia results in the inability to focus on close objects.

Presbyopia makes it difficult to read small print, and focus on closer objects, particularly in poor liaht.

From a routine sight test we can recommend wearing an appropriate correction, such as reading glasses, or multifocal glasses.

CONNIE BROSNAN R.I.P

UGE crowds turned out in force to bid a fond farewell to popular Killarney man Connie Brosnan who passed away last weekend after a brave battle with illness. Connie, from Ross Road, Killarney, was a familiar face in Killarney town through his long association with local sports clubs and charity organisations and his dedicated work in Killarney National Park.

A great sense of sadness descended over Killarney with the news of Connie's death on Sunday and the large turnout at his removal on Monday evening and his funeral on Tuesday morning at St. Mary's Cathedral was testament to his huge popularity and the respect he earned throughout his life.

St. Paul's Basketball Club was just one Killarney sporting club privileged to have Connie as an active and committed member for many years. During the mid 1990s Connie was the team manager with the St. Paul's senior mens national league team that played under the Kerry Spring banner. He travelled all over Ireland with the team and was a popular and respected figure among the players, coaches and officials. His attention to detail and preparation for every match and away trip was incredible and knew no bounds. He was ever-present on the sideline and thoroughly enjoyed the successful days out which included a national league division one title and promotion to the superleague in 1995 with coach Joe Coughlan and the great cup run to the televised stages of the national cup during the 1996-97 season under coach Jim Nugenet.

Connie was also an active committee member during this period and was instrumental in spearheading a number of fundraising initiatives for the club. Connie was a keen golfer and his notoriety with the small ball grew even further when he was the first golfer to shoot a hole-in-one on the newly opened Ross Golf Course in 1994. His success and popularity on the golf course paved the way for the annual St. Paul's Golf Classic at Ross Golf Course. It was affectionately known as the 'Connie Brosnan' golf classic and proved to be a great fundraiser for the club for several years with Connie as the main driving force.

His interest and enthusiasm for the progress of Killarney Basketball never waned and he was delighted to welcome the return of national league basketball to Killarney in 2017. With his son Sean taking on the task of committee treasurer, Connie was more than happy to accept the role of Venue Officer for the Scotts Lakers home games in Killarney Sports Centre and did the job with tremendous dedication until recently before his health sadly declined. He was a familiar and popular figure with players, visiting teams, coaches, match officials and supporters and his gentlemanlike and

courteous approach meant that everything always ran smoothly.

Connie was a kidney transplant recipient in 2007 and went on to represent Team Ireland in golf in the World Transplant Games. His tireless work and volunteering with the Irish Kidney Association (IKA) has been well documented over the years and he was an outstanding Chairperson of the local Kerry Branch of the IKA until recently.

At his Funeral Mass on Tuesday at St Mary's Cathedral, chief celebrant Fr Niall Howard spoke of Connie's trojan work with sporting and charitable organisations in Killarney. Connie's son Sean recalled his fond memories in a moving eulogy and described him as a great father, husband, grandfather and family man. Sean also spoke of his father's passion for golf , his great association with St. Paul's Basketball Club and Scotts Lakers, lifelong support for Dr Crokes GAA Club, love of music and dedicated work with the Irish Kidney Association.

Guards of honour from St. Paul's Basketball Club and The Irish Kidney Association were provided at Connie's removal on Monday evening and Requiem Mass on Tuesday morning while the Dr Crokes GAA flag was draped on his coffin for his final journey through Killarney town to Aghadoe Cemetery. Connie's beloved wife Margaret died in December 2011 and he was the adored father of Seán and Jeannette and dear granddad to Ross and Harry. He will also be sadly missed by his son-in-law Brian Holden, daughter-in-law Mary, sister Doreen, brothers Timmy, Seán and Ger, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nieces and nephews, relatives, neighbours and many great friends.





BEWARE OF POSTING YOUR PHOTO ONLINE

Clearview AI is a brand new facial recognition tool that can take a photo of your face and find every other photo of you that exists online.

By downloading billions of pictures from Facebook, Instagram, etc., this software can find all public information about you within seconds.

The software was already being used by law enforcement as high up as the FBI and has helped to solve a number of serious crimes and if the software comes into the hands of the public, it will be possible to take a photo of a stranger on the street, scan it, and find them online which will be a huge privacy issue.

According to the creator Hoan Ton-That, Clearview has already downloaded billions of pictures across major social media platforms and small websites.

Companies like Twitter, Facebook and Google have already sent cease-and-desist letters, but the way that the startup has downloaded images is not against the law.

NATURAL SOLUTIONS FOR AN ITCHY DOG

Allergies are most likely the culprit when a dog has itchy skin, and the major allergen categories include environmental (grass, weed, trees, dust, etc.); flea, tick, and other bug bites; and food allergies. It's always a good idea to talk to your vet to determine which of these factors apply to your situation, but in the meantime, you can try these simple techniques to help manage (or maybe even eliminate) your canine companion's allergic reactions.

Regular bathing can help too but you don't want to strip the natural oils in your dog's coat and skin (especially since that could aggravate the problem), of course, every dog is different, so you'll have to experiment and figure out what works best for yours. Try bathing them once every other week to start, and increase the baths to each week if necessary.

You can also grind up some plain oatmeal into a fine powder by using a coffee grinder or a blender. Then mix this flour into the bath to help calm your dogs' irritation. Remember, too, that oatmeal is non-toxic, so you don't need to worry if your dog starts licking it off.

If your dog has already developed some hot spots, you may consider adding some Epsom salt and aloe to the bath, which are both good for sores and wounds. If the water is too hot or too hard, you could dry your dog's skin out and cause more irritation, so just be patient with the temperature and rinsing. Don't use shampoos meant for humans either -- the pH of our skin is different than a dog's.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO DRINK BAT SPIT COFFEE?

Madagascar's Itasy province isn't normally known for any kind of high-end coffee production, but that's all starting to change thanks to a farmer named Jacques Ramarlah, who noticed unique activity with his coffee beans.

Jacques and his team of workers harvested the coffee beans out of rich volcanic soil, and he started to notice a sticky film on many of the coffee berries. He eventually realised it was bat saliva from bats chewing on most of the coffee berries during the night while they were active. Nirina Malala Ravaonasolo, the president of a local coffee group, said, "Most people here in Itasy did not have any interest in growing coffee. Today it's become our livelihood." The nibbling bats changed everything about coffee production and now a pound of coffee grinds drizzled in bat spit cost about \$110 per pound! Jacques Ramarlah is now working with 90 local coffee producers in the Itasy province who send him their beans for the bat spit "processing." With the other farmers' help, Jacques plans on increasing his production tenfold, not only for the local people of Itasy to enjoy but to also export into other countries, as well.

REFUGEES ARE GROWING CROPS IN THE DESERT USING DISCARDED MATTRESSES BOUND FOR THE LANDFILL

British scientists have succeeded in cultivating tomatoes, peppers, aubergines and herbs in the desert using discarded mattresses bound for landfill.

The innovative system, which was tested in a refugee camp in Jordan, could be rolled out to every shelter in the world, helping millions of people to thrive in barren landscapes.

Since aid workers often discard thousands of used foam mattresses in refugee camps across the globe, University of Sheffield scientists began developing foam "soils" in their labs in hopes of using old bed materials as a growing medium for crops.

The research team, led by Professor Tony Ryan, is made up of experts in hydroponics: a technique in which plants are grown with their roots resting in a solution of water and essential nutrients instead of soil. The method uses 70-80% less water than planting straight into the soil and eliminates the need for pesticides.

In the first trial of its kind, his researchers worked with a group of Syrian refugees at the Zaatari camp, which serves as a shelter to many who are already experienced farmers themselves.

Professor Ryan, director of the university's Grantham Centre for Sustainable Futures, said: "If we can make desert gardens economically and culturally sustainable in Jordan, we can ultimately roll this out around the world and help millions of refugees to thrive."

The All Ireland semi-final was more about control and charcater than football skill, simply because of the conditions. It was played on the Rathkeale Astroturf, with the supporters on both sides having to watch without the benefit of of a scoreboard and outside a large fence. It would be easy to criticise the set-up, but in fairness pitches are hard to come by with the recent weather. It was also played in a gale-force wind that hugely affected the play.

The Sem had that wind in the first half and struggled - long passes were completely unpredictable. It was Claregalway who drew first blood, dual Galway minor Jack Lonergan teeing up Alex Morgan for a goal. Cian McMahon and Jack Clifford (f) replied before Ryan O'Connell made it 1-1 to 0-2. With Claregalway packing their defence (the right thing to do against that massive wind), the Sem lorded possession but had to play a very patient holding game to work gaps - no point in kick-passes that would and several times did get snatched away by the wind. Cian Doyle and Harry Byrne, both of whom came out from defence to win an amount of ball, teed up man of the match Killian O'Sullivan and Cian McMahon for points respectively to square things up. It's no secret that Donie Buckley was recruited by the County Board rather than Peter Keane, and the bottom line is that Peter Keane has the helm and every manager needs the right to pick his own crew. I never agreed with the old days where Kerry selectors were elected, it meant too often that they were arguing for selection on their own regional bias rather than the overall good of the team. Rightly or wrongly, it will be Peter Keane who gets all the praise or the blame at the end of the year (and let's be honest, Kerry supporters tend to be lavish with the latter). He needs and deserves to pick his own team, both on and off the field.

Forgiveness

Last week we discussed Compassion, and an essential component of developing Compassion is forgiveness. Forgiveness is not a behaviour as such, more of an internal state of being and feeling. Something has happened to cause us to feel resentful, angry or bitter towards someone else. When we feel wronged, hurt or even betrayed we have a negative feeling towards someone or something. We know from many faiths, psychology and life in general that this baggage of negativity harms us more than anyone else, because we carry it!

The first step of forgiveness is learning to let go, as these negative feelings stand in our way of solving problems or finding a healthy way to change. It really is not simple nor easy to let go that negative feeling, but if we can understand that it releases us more than the other person it would be an excellent start. We are attached to that anxious hurt and negative internal feeling, and by releasing that negative emotion we can think more clearly and thus it allows us to be able to respond to the situation rather than just react blindly.

By forgiving, it is almost like climbing up an emotional ladder or flying above our emotional river, so that we can get some distance or perspective on those feelings and emotion. Once we forgive, we can get perspective of the emotions by feeling without getting overwhelmed, then we can learn emotional signals. By doing this we can calm down and use our logic to respond.

In order to forgive, we do need to understand ourselves better, we need to learn to deal with our raw, almost primitive feelings. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross who has written about and worked with grief for many years said that the root of all emotions is fear. These feelings of fear lead to out-of-balance anxiety and a sense of resentment which can in turn lead to aggression rather than a healthy reaction.

Many people confuse forgiveness with forgetting, or condoning or excusing offences or wrongful behaviour. It does not obligate us to reconcile with the person who harmed us, or release them from legal accountability. Instead it brings the forgiver peace of mind, freeing us from corrosive anger or other negative feelings. In this way it empowers us to recognise the pain we suffered without letting that pain define us, enabling us to heal and move on with our life.

Welcome back dear reader last week we spoke of fear of the corona virus, and how people feel powerless to defeat it, causing terror and panic as they face the fragility of life. This disease has not come from God, but from the devil who 'comes only to steal, kill and destroy', but Jesus came to bring us abundant life, and to destroy the works of the devil (John 10:10; 1st John 3:8). We mentioned last week how Jesus was whipped and beaten so that we could be healed. One of the greatest offences to what the Son of God suffered for humanity, are paintings which depict Him as a weak, helpless man, hanging on a cross with a trickle of blood coming from His forehead. This is not what God's Word says, Isaiah prophesied the death that God's Messiah would suffer, describing in detail how His beard would be plucked out - yes, plucked out! How His body would be so badly beaten and disfigured that it would be difficult to recognise Him as human when they finished with Him (Isaiah 52:14). Jesus was beaten by three different battalions before His death - that's an entire army unit each time, against one man. He was whipped with the Roman 'cat-o-nine-tails', which was a whip of leather strands with pieces of lead and bone attached for maximum torture to the victim, so that chunks of His flesh were torn out with each stripe - "by His stripes we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5). He was spat upon, rejected and despised by those He came to save. In mockery of His title the 'King of all kings', a crown of thorns was driven into His skull from where His blood poured for the healing of all mental disease, anxiety and torment. Jesus was brutalised in death so that we could be made whole and live in peace (3 John verse 2; 1st Peter 2:24). Thank God for medical professionals but friend, they are human beings like you and I, and it is only when mankind faces things that we have no answer for, that the realisation hits home of how powerless we really are in ourselves. But, "He who dwells in the secret place of the Most High shall remain stable and fixed under the shadow of the Almighty [Whose power no foe can withstand]." (Psalm 91:1 AMP). Call upon the Lord Jesus today - and receive forgiveness, peace, and healing from fear and sickness. Jesus paid the price for you with His life because He loves you!




