# Legacy projects to mark **MUCKROSS HOUSE ANNIVERSARY**

he end result of two remarkable legacy projects, undertaken to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the opening of Killarney's Muckross House to the public, will be unveiled at a very special event on Saturday next, June 14, at 7.30pm.

NEWS

As part of the diamond anniversary celebrations, two hugely significant projects were initiated by the Muckross House Research Library to reflect on the history of the landmark attraction in Killarney National Park.

The first focused on the development of traditional Irish dance which involved revisiting the traditional dance styles of North Kerry, including the enormous contribution of legendary dance teacher Jeremiah Molyneaux (1881-1965).

Between 1983 and 1985, Dr Catherine Foley, Emeritus Associate Professor with the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance in the University of Limerick, was tasked by the Trustees of Muckross House to record this important and fascinating dance legacy.

Building on that earlier work, last year she again agreed to revisit the area to determine how the dance tradition had evolved over the intervening four decades.

The project would not have been such a success without valuable contributions from respected authorities on such matters like Fr Pat Ahern, Patricia Hanafin and Justin Walsh.

The second initiative was the commissioning of a musical suite tracing

the story of Muckross House, from its completion in 1843 up to its opening to the public in 1964. The story unfolds through the medium of different musical styles and it was composed by awardwinning producer JJ O'Shea who has worked closely with the Muckross House Research Library on a number of projects.

to the public in 1964.

The concert will commence with a selection of tunes from the Muckross House Music Collection, performed by Mary Mitchell and Karl Nesbitt, followed by a selection of reels, hornpipes and jigs in the true North Kerry tradition.

Featured dancers will include five-time world dance champion David Geaney, Jimmy Hickey, Mossie Walsh and Jonathan Kelliher.

The Muckross Suite project will then be the centre of attention as the story of Killarney's most historic and important building is told through music composed by JJO'Shea and delivered by Paul de Grae on guitar and keyboard and harpist Reidun Schlesinger and they will be accompanied by Barry Lynch on uilleann pipes and Seán Abeyta on fiddle.

Admission to the concert is free of charge but advance bookings are essential on 064-6670162.

#### DEER: Mangerton venison on the menu?

Deer are over-running Inisfallen once again. There are so many sika, there is hardly a blade of grass, I am told. The NPWS assure me they are addressing the matter. This is thanks to a reader of this column who drew my attention to it. There are clearly too many sika on Innisfallen and too many deer everywhere.

Yes, there have been efforts by the NPWS. But the deer population is out of hand. The beautiful Muckross Gardens is being eaten alive. The hostas are all nibbled to the stem and there is serious damage to the dreamy hydrangea hedges which should be coming into their best now.

This is quite apart from the damage in the wild woodlands. If you visit healthy woods, you have a variety on the forest floor. Particularly deciduous or native pine woods. Here everything is eaten back and smothered in fern and rhododendron because the blueberries, the grasses, the flowers and herbs and young trees are chewed to the bone. There is no question but the deer are hungry. There isn't enough for them to eat because there are simply too many. There is a spike again in car accidents as the creatures chase across roads to see if there is any blade of anything anywhere. Yet all the while, were any enterprising butcher to set up in Killarney selling venison and the State rowed in, there is good money to be made. The deer would be kept in good condition because there would be a steady demand to be filled. Mangerton lamb on the menu is already a winner. Think how big a seller Mangerton venison would be.

#### TIME TO GET ENERGISED ABOUT MATTERS OTHER THAN CIVIL WARS AND SEXUALITY

The RTE Prime Time on the French owned nursing homes for the elderly here should have us all out on the streets. It was shocking. This is not something happening at a comfortable distance in another part of the world so we can distract ourselves. It is right under our noses. And it concerns our own.

Apart from the complete lack of human empathy, the lack of communication skills was terrifying. There was simply no human connection. It is not just these two French owned nursing homes, you can be certain.

Surely it should be a basic requirement for all care assistants to speak good English? And to have some bit of a kind nature. The other clear message was lack of training. These people were clearly not well trained. Or supervised. The great HIQA, the so-called independent inspectorate, where were they?

We have the balance wrong: Most of our care homes are privately owned, when it should be the State as the major provider.

Alas, private or State, we have the same neglect of other vulnerable cohorts: children, prisoners and the disabled, and sick lying in hospital corridors crying out for help.

Once upon a time this State handed over its care of the vulnerable to the Church. Now it is to Corporations, accountants and agency staff - and the more global the better. Ireland likes the global so its leaders can strut the high moral ground of the world stage and tut.

There is an avenue we should all be exploring to bring everyone down to earth and that is the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg. The first ever international court case in Strasbourg was brought by an ex IRA member against the Irish State in 1959. We have brought a mere handful of complaints since - on the criminalisation of homosexuality, abortion, (twice), legal separation, the use of torture in Northern Ireland; and delayed justice. It's such a pity we confine our outrage to war, sex, and law in this country. The European convention of human rights deals with much more, including basic dignity and civilised services. But we hear little about those aspects.

I suggest the following complaints to Strasbourg: the failure of the State to care for our elderly; the lack of State run childcare and creches; the overcrowded prisons and terrible facilities in courts (we could use Tralee as an example); the lack of access to basic health services - the waiting lists to see GPs in south Kerry could be used; the failure to provide mental health services the Kerry CAMHS scandal is an example; the failure to provide basic affordable housing or a homeless shelter while allowing rampant unbridled profit from tourism/refugee and landlord businesses - multiple examples in Kerry; the tens of thousands of children here going to bed hungry and the parents going hungry themselves to pay bills. Even one such judgement from Europe would focus minds. Hopefully.

There is strong Kerry and Killarney representation in Japan today. Alongside Sarah, Ambassador Damien Cole, from Tralee, is Ireland's Ambassador to Japan, while Brietta O'Leary, from Plunkett Street, Killarney, has been appointed Vice President on the IJCC executive team. We can't forget our author Colin O'Sullivan ex Community College who is based in Japan too.

Sarah is the daughter of Michael (originally Woodlawn) and Ann. She went to Coolick national school, Presentation secondary school and then UCC, graduating with a good honours B.A. degree.

She saw an advertisement for the teaching exchange JET program in college, applied, was accepted and went to Japan in July 2008.

In March 2011 Fukushima prefecture where she was based was badly affected by the tsunami which killed in the region of 20,000 people.

It wiped out whole areas including Sarah's favourite school where she

had been just the previous Friday, killing all the teachers and pupils.

Sarah returned to Ireland briefly but insisted on going back to help with the recovery and clean up, working on the JET program for another year. Working at the coal face, her language skills improved no end and she felt a huge sense of connection with her adopted country. She joined the graduate program with Jameson, retraining in Dublin, going on to Pernod Richard, Bacardi and now Whisk-e where she leads the marketing team based in Tokyo.

Whisk-e is the leading premium spirits and craft beer import company in Japan. Sarah has been a director of the Tokyo based chamber since May 2020, was made Vice President in May 2023 and is now the first ever female President.

In a statement on the chamber website, Sarah said her main role is to lead a team to develop brands to grow in the Japanese market.

She also works alongside the top management in developing the organisation's vision, and is keen to promote what she says are the many opportunities Japan offers to Irish businesses. We wish her well.

#### **MY DOWN FIELD OF DREAMS** By Nicky Barry



# There's still a lot to play for as the State Exams reach the halfway mark

#### OPTIONAL

As the state exams approach the end of the second week, many candidates have reached or are close to the end of the road. The optional subjects now take centre stage. As the number of candidates taking these subjects is considerably less than the number taking the compulsory subjects some exam centres will close early. Candidates from these centres will be relocated to a different centre for the remainder of the exam. The number of candidates in the school environment will also continue to decrease, so it's important for candidates who still have work to do, not to feel left behind or to become impatient to get over the finish line.

#### SEVEN DAYS

Normally in the final seven days, candidates will have one or two subjects from a standard seven left to do. However, it's not unknown for students to take an eight or even a ninth subject to complete a particular vocational grouping such as Physics, Design & Communication Graphics and Applied Mathematics. So, there's still a lot to play for. There are grades and points to be earned.

#### APPROACH

Maintain your disciplined and organised approach over the remaining days. Avoid late night socialising with those who have finished the exam. Keep your distance from alcohol as you'll need a clear head and lots of energy for the task ahead. Eat well as good nutrition is important in week three to avoid energy loss. Keep your fluid levels high to avoid dehydration.

#### PERFORMANCE

Candidates have performed very well during the past fortnight. Keep up the good work and bring your exam to a successful conclusion in your remaining subjects. Use your free days wisely. Stay positive and be confident in your ability to do well in next week's papers. Take it subject by subject and bring the curtain down on a stellar performance.

#### WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT **ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?**

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. 



## **EYES IN THE SUN**

Too much sun can damage the eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems.

There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

#### UV-A

can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye.

#### UV-B

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

## What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

Macular Degeneration UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people.

#### Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

#### Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea. Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

#### Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

#### Corneal Sunburn

Corneal sunburn, called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

## Protecting your eyes from the sun

If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

## Minister Foley welcomes confirmation of €920,000 in funding for Kerry County Council to upgrade housing for people with disabilities

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of €920,000 in funding for Kerry County Council to carry out adaptations, extensions and other improvements to its existing social housing stock.

This Disabled Persons Grant will ensure homes are adapted to allow older people and those with disabilities to continue living independently, while also providing funding for major modifications such as extensions to relieve overcrowding.

This scheme funds essential home modifications for people with mobility or disability needs. These include minor adaptations like stair-lifts, ramps, and grab rails, larger projects such as extensions to reduce overcrowding as well as creating accessible spaces like a downstairs



bedroom, en-suite, or wet-room.

The funding also extends to Improvement Works in Lieu scheme which allows works to be carried out on a privately owned house where the applicant has been approved for social housing.

Kerry County Council are getting €829,127 in funding and will make a contribution of €92,125 from their own budget, bringing the total budget to over €920,000. Minister Foley said:

I welcome confirmation of this funding which will have a huge impact on the quality of life of many older people and people with disabilities throughout county Kerry."

# HSE South West provides updates on health and social care services in Kerry to Regional Health Forum

HSE South West has provided updates on a range of issues relating to the delivery of health and social care services in Kerry, to local authority members of the Regional Heath Forum.

The Regional Health Forum comprises of representatives from Kerry County, Cork City, and Cork County Councils, as well as local authorities from the South East within the functional area of each Forum.

Here are some of the issues related to the Killarney area:

#### **Disability Respite Service**

- Raised by Cllr Marie Moloney

"HSE South West Disability Services is acutely aware of the demand for respite services and has significantly invested in respite in recent years. The type and quantum of respite has been increased each year to meet the assessed needs and preferences of as many people as possible. In 2019, funding of €6.4m was allocated to respite services in Cork and Kerry, and in 2024 the allocated funding was €12.4m - representing an almost 100% increase in funding allocation for respite services in the six-year period. HSE South West Disability Services continues to invest in respite services, proactively seeking alternative respite models and using all available funding to provide respite services for all children and adults who require them. We are also working with service providers to create new residential and alternative respite supports for children and adults in 2025 and we welcome any additional funding to continue to invest in these vital services.

HSE South West Disability Services provide a range of alternative respite models for children and adults. These include afterschool clubs, inhome support for children and adults, outreach supports and holiday breaks for adults. These options ensure that respite is provided in the manner which best meets the needs of children/adults and their families."

#### Vacant HSE Properties in Kerry - Raised by Cllr Deirdre Ferris

"The HSE locally is working through the Land Development Agency and the Department of Public Expenditure Delivery and Reform process for the disposal of properties which are surplus to requirements.

As a matter of policy, no property is disposed of until there is absolute certainty that there is no alternative State use for that property. If, at the end of that process, no alternative State use has been identified for the property, it will be offered for sale on the open market."

#### Primary Care Centre on the grounds of the Áras Phádraig

- Raised by Cllr Marie Moloney

"The HSE wish to confirm that they are fully committed to building a Primary Care Centre on the grounds of Áras Phádraig. There have

been several previous attempts to provide a Primary Care facility in Killarney, with little positive results.

The provision of a Primary Care facility on the grounds of Áras Phádraig site was a joint venture planning application with Kerry County Council. Both the HSE and Kerry County Council officials are of the opinion that the provision of the Theatre and a Primary Care facility on the same site in an urban setting will be complementary to each development, from a planning and sustainability view point. Once planning permission has been successful, it will take approximately three years to complete."

## IRISH BANKS SHOULD DO THE RIGHT THING and pass on ECB rate cuts to fixed term mortgage holders - MEP Kelleher

"Quite frankly, I don't accept the arguments coming from Irish banks that because they were slower to increase mortgage interest rates, they don't need to pass on ECB reductions in their fixed rate mortgage business," said Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs (ECON) Committee, was commenting after the ECB reduced its interest rate by 25 basis points to a new rate of 2%.

"There are thousands of mortgage holders who took out fixed rate loans in 2021 that are coming to an end. Many of these loans had interest rates in the 2-3% range.

"If a homeowner had a mortgage for  $\in$  300,000, with 20 years remaining, at a fixed rate of 2.5%, their current monthly repayment would be  $\in$  1589. If the best rate they can get is 3.2% when

their fixed term ends, their monthly repayment will rise to  $\leq$ 1693, and their cost of credit will rise by over  $\leq$ 25,000 from  $\leq$ 81,500 to  $\leq$ 106,557 over the term of their mortgage.

"At present, it's next to impossible to get a fixed term rate for less than 3% so for these customers they will see a major rise in their monthly mortgage repayments unless the Irish banks do the right thing and offer lower fixed-term interest rates.

"Irish banks are doing very well right now with significant profits being reported. Ireland's economy relies on everyone playing their part and banks must do their part and help take the foot off the necks of hard-pressed mortgage holders.

"Unnecessarily high interest rates only create long term difficulties for banks due to some customers not being able to repay their



mortgages. The banks should be seeking to avoid this as much as possible, especially as mortgage impairments are slowly creeping up already.

"I am urging the banks to think about the big picture and give these fixed term mortgage holders a break, and to support the overall Irish economy by playing fair when the ECB cuts its rates.

"And my message to mortgage holders would be to shop around. The Central Bank has introduced rules to make switching easier, so use your consumer power and support the competition in the market," concluded Kelleher.

## EU proposals could lead to a RENTAL CAR SHORTAGE IN IRELAND which will hurt rural tourism in Kerry



Ní Mhurchú raises significant concerns about a shortage of rental cars and the impact this would have on rural tourism. Her concerns come as the EU Commission considers forcing rental car companies to switch to electric vehicles in a shorter timeframe.

As the summer season kicks off in Ireland, Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has called on the EU Commission to clarify their proposals that would force rental car companies to switch their entire feet over to electric vehicles in a very short period of time. Ní Mhurchú, who is a high-ranking member of the EU Tourism taskforce, said there is no charging capacity currently available to car rental operators at Dublin Airport, but 52% of all car rentals in Ireland originate from Dublin airport.

"Forcing car rental companies to go electric before we have the necessary infrastructure in place will damage rural tourism by making rental cars more expensive and less available"

"I am 100% in favour of the switch to electric vehicles but if we put the cart before the horse in this case, we will hurt rural tourism in areas such as Clare, Cork, Kerry, Wexford and beyond. That means lost jobs for coastal communities and that is something I cannot stand over"

Ní Mhurchú welcomed existing targets that all new cars purchased from January 2035 be zero emission cars. Her concerns are around the news that the EU Commission is now considering

the introduction of mandatory electric vehicle quotas for corporate fleets ahead of the 2035 deadline as part of legislative initiative to be published by the end of 2025. This would mean that rental car companies would have to switch to electric before the 2035 deadline.

According to Ní Mhurchú, the car rental industry in Ireland could not cope with such a burden and it would ultimately lead to less rental cars at a higher price.

"We need to learn to walk before we can run and yes, car rental companies should go electric but we need to invest in the charging infrastructure across Europe first, in particular at Dublin airport where 52% of all rentals come from. We are making strides in developing the infrastructure, with Minister O'Brien announcing a large investment in charging infrastructure last week, but it takes time."

"Irish tourism depends heavily on the car rental sector. Rental cars allow tourists to travel to remote parts of Ireland, where there isn't the necessary charging infrastructure. Tourists would be dependent on public charging points, and we just don't have enough in rural and remote parts of Ireland, as things stand"

The Car Rental Council of Ireland, cite higher maintenance costs of electric vehicles and argue that the average cost of renting an electric car is currently 33% higher than the average cost of renting a traditional car in Ireland. That average cost includes the current VRT relief.

Similar proposals to those now being considered by the EU Commission have already been rejected by the incoming German government, as well as in Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechia, Finland, Italy and Slovakia. Ní Mhurchú has called on the EU Commission to clarify their position and what impact any such proposals and new timelines would have on Irish Tourism.

## **Driving tips for the summer**

#### HOW TO COPE WITH EVERYTHING FROM TRAFFIC TO TRACTORS

The holiday season can mean high temperatures, increased stress levels and extra demands on your car – so here are our seasonal tips to help with the challenges of summer driving.

#### PUNCTURES

#### 1. Drive defensively

#### 2. Remove distractions



Kerry put on a masterclass against Inishowen, defeating them 6-1 in their final group match. The tone was set early as Cregan netted in the 7th minute from a Maguire through ball. Inishowen did equalise briefly, but Kerry responded instantly through Cregan again, this time bravely heading past the keeper from a long ball.

The second half was a showcase of Kerry's depth and attacking quality. Alannah Daly, Lillian Slattery, Isabelle O'Connor, and Flynn all found the net in a one-sided affair. The team clicked, confidence soared, and second place in the group was secured, booking their place in the Gaynor Bowl.

The draw paired Kerry with NERL in the Bowl quarter-finals, and it was another high-quality performance that followed.

Ava Harty's early free kick set the tone before Alice O'Connor added a second from a wellworked corner. Cregan then won a penalty just before the break, with Kirby converting to make it 3-0.

NERL pulled one back in the second half after Daly parried a long-range effort, but Kirby struck again, this time a wonderful free kick that floated into the top left corner, to make it 4-1. Though NERL scored again late on, Kerry were well worth their 4-2 win.

The opponents for the semi-final had been determined the day previous, and with Galway and South Tipperary on first, the attention

quickly turned to Midlands after a wet afternoon in that quarter final.

It was however a semi-final that ended in heartbreak. Kerry fell behind early but responded brilliantly. Kirby equalised with a well-taken header after Maguire's pressing won possession from the goal kick, she found Cregan and a slick pass saw Kirby jump highest to find the bottom right corner. They dominated much of the first half and came close to taking the lead on several occasions, only to be denied by an inspired Midlands goalkeeper.

The second half was tighter, both sides trading chances but failing to find a breakthrough. After 60 minutes, it went to penalties.

The shootout was tense. Harty, Maguire, and Kirby all converted for Kerry. Midlands, though, were unerring from the spot and led 4-3 when Alannah Crossan's effort was saved. Midlands sealed it with their final penalty, 5-3 the final shootout score.

It was Kerry's third defeat in the past three seasons, a cruel end for a team that had played with such positivity.

The Kerry Gaynor Cup team may not have lifted silverware this time, but they leave Limerick having made a clear statement. Finishing 10th overall may not reflect the full story, but those who followed the week's action will know just how close Kerry came to going all the way in the Bowl competition.

For the players, coaches, and supporters, the week will be remembered not just for results, but for growth, resilience, and moments of brilliance. And the future looks bright for Kerry on the national stage, with these girls going forward at the U15 level.

From the narrow heartbreak to the convincing high of their final game, Kerry's Gaynor Cup 2025 journey was one of proud progress, a journey worth celebrating.

### All Ireland Championship Group Stage

### Kerry 0-13 Mayo 1-4

The Kerry Ladies remain on course to retain the Brendan Martin Cup after a good win over a fairly tepid Mayo in Austin Stack Park. At the same time, you definitely couldn't say that Kerry exactly sprinted for the finish line or looked particularly assured themselves. Fair enough, players that were carrying knocks were rested and there were a number of switches made to both teams before the throw-in, but until Kerry made half-time changes, there was a bit of Sisyphus pushing rocks about the game. It wasn't really flowing for either side.

Kerry actually opened with a great score by Anna Galvin. Kerry hit the post a minute later before Siofra O'She gathered a long ball in from Caoimhe Evans and fisted it over. Siofra was obviously our main target and quickly added her second point. Kerry were looking good at this stage, and looked even better when Aishling O'Connell powered her way through to fire over. 0-4 to 0-0.

And then the game turned. I think myself that Hannah Reape was going for a point, badly needed by Mayo at that stage. But she just caught too much of the left side of her instep and it curled away. It looked to be going wide but Clodagh Keane was on it in a flash. Emma Costello managed to block her first shot but Keane just regathered and sent a precise finish past a hapless Mary Ellen Bolger.

A foul on a lively Katie Brosnan saw her notch a free, but Hannah Reape replied. Niamh Carmody – I thought she was outstanding all through, a real dynamo – made it 0-6 to 1-1. Scoring really dried up at that point, though. Both teams worked hard, but they seemed to be cancelling each other out rather than actually achieving anything. Siofra O'Shea did get in for a goal chance, but Julie Gawalkiewicz made a superb save from close range.

Sinead Walsh did kick an absolute beauty, I would say the best score so far, and she soon added another. Level pegging. Siofra O'Shea did kick one last point for Kerry, but I certainly don't think they will have been happy with that first half display.

#### Half-time Kerry 0-7 Mayo 1-3

Credit to the Kerry management. They had already brought Niamh Broderick on before the break and Danielle O'Leary and Aoife Dillane were on the field of play for the restart. That's a strong hand to draw in itself, and Kerry definitely looked a sharper outfit now. A yellow card (correct decision, but a little bit unlucky) for Hannah Reape didn't hurt, and it wasn't long before Niamh Carmody notched her second point. Danielle wasn't long at all joining her on the scoreboard - I'd consider Danielle one of the very best footballers in the country right now. Sinead Walsh scored her third point as she converted a free, but Danielle wasn't long in doubling her own tally. By the time Hannah Reape returned to play it was 0-10 to 1-4 and there was plenty to play for yet.

Mayo battled hard - was there ever a Mayo side that didn't? - but Kerry had scorers and Mayo just....didn't. Sometimes the narrative of a game is just that simple. Siofra set up Danielle for her third point and scored her own fourth to put five points between the sides. Mayo were frantically ringing the changes, but to no avail. Danielle kicked her fourth point and that was that. Mayo had just scored one point in the second half. Victory for Kerry and one foot in the All Ireland guarter-final as they head up to Pairc ui Caiomh to face Cork this coming Saturday. That will be a sterner test, and honestly I think Kerry need to face and overcome a stronger test. Scoring thirteen times against a team that can only muster five of their own isn't the form of All Ireland winners. Cork will have been looking at that Munster Final against Waterford and now this game against Mayo. Whether they think Kerry are vulnerable or not is moot. It's Cork, sure they'll be asking the question anyway.

### NERVY KERRY SEE OFF CAVAN MINOR CHALLENGE All Ireland Minor Quarter-Final

### Kerry 0-14 Cavan 1-9

The result is always the bottom line, The Kerry minors are back into the last four standing. Before we pick any holes - and yes, to be blunt, there is going to be a little bit of that - I'm genuinely of the belief at that minor, winning the All Ireland might always be the immediate end goal, but it isn't the ultimate purpose. That's about the quality of games and environment, not just to help in producing footballers (which it obviously does) but also character and responsibility. It can be tough going, plenty of hard challenges along the way. But life will throw that at young people anyway; I think having a foundation to deal with that, regardless of whether a player ever kicks a football again, is worth it anyway. That does seem to be happening with these minors, and that's a good thing. That's just an outside observation, by the way. I have no more idea what's actually going on inside the dressing room than anyone. I do know some of the people involved and I think they would trust me enough to tell me if I asked, but there's a certain catch 22 about that. In a way, they'd trust me enough to tell me if I asked, because they know I wouldn't consider it appropriate for me to ask.

The reason I'm emphasizing that the overall takeaway from that game is positive is because I saw a lot, an awful lot, that worried me. Cavan had some good football, but had no real cutting edge up front, but they still could have won that game. We absolutely should have put that game to bed....and we didn't, far from it. Our defenders – David Sargent and Ronan Sheridan were immense – had to withstand a siege in the last ten minutes.

#### First Half

I know a fair few people who weren't thrilled that the game was switched back to twelve noon in Portlaoise. My understanding is that it was to allow the Cork minors to watch the Munster Senior Hurling Final. Absolutely right and fair; sure the whole country pretty much wanted to see that. I had no problem at all with it; I like being on the road early and getting home early. I'd be fine with Senior All Ireland Finals kicking off at half twelve, the extra half an hour is because I'd have time to get from Heuston Station to Croke Park by getting the early train. I'll admit that I think far too much about these things; being lazy is harder work

than ye think.

Anyway, off we go. Good football by Kerry and a very nicely worked point by Danny Murphy. Kerry wide with a slightly over-ambitious effort. Kevin Griffin with a point from almost as far out, but inside the arc. Kerry had the strong wind and they were good and direct with it.Cavan were handpassing too much, trying to circle around and find a breach. I thought Cork had tried something similar, almost probing for goal openings. I'm very old school in many ways. It's football, use your feet.

Gearóid White with a handy free and he made no mistake. Kerry with two more long range attempts,though, both wide. It looked to me – and obviously this is just speculation – as if both sides are giving that wind far too much respect. Kerry are ballooning missiles fro fairly daft range instead of picking off their scores. Cavan have only kicked one attempt and Ruairí Kennedy comfortably gathered that.

Kevin Griffin with a two point free from long distance and he nailed it. 0-5 to 0-0. When I said I'm old school in my approach to Kerry football;I really meant it. I've brought ham sandwiches with me and I'm tempted to take one out. I don't think I'll be spilling my tea in any welter of excitement.

Cavan finally got off the mark through Faolan Graham, but Ben Kelliher snapped off a real poacher's point in reply. There you go. Don't bother with those hopeful punts from long distance, lads, feed this forward line.

Cavan had begun to look more confident, though. They were doing very well in the middle third and now the ball was starting to flow better. Jake Brady, their dangerman, got their first score from play.

Maidhc Ó Sé with another long range monster that yielded no dividends and Gearóid White uncharacteristically wide from a free. I may be over-thinking it, but Kerry looked a bit shaky now. Is it just me, or were they trying to force things a bit?

Ouch. Jay Graham with a free, and he followed up with a two point free. Great kick, but it came from Kerry coughing up their own kickout. There's no way I'm singling any U17 out individually, but some of our top performers against Cork are not going well today. Cavan have their homework done on our dangermen, and they are well on top now. Thankfully, they kick a couple of wides themselves. 0-6 to 0-5 to Kerry at half-time. I'm worried. We'll be facing that big wind in the second half and Cavan look to me like a team who know how to use it. They'll be upbeat now for the second half; that was a strong second quarter for them. Not only that, but Kerry look....off...to me. Nine wides, but worse is that at least four of them were poor shots to take on. As Seamus Moynihan said once (for all I know, he may have been quoting some-one), "football is a game of inches. The ones between your ears". Kerry are better footballers than this,but it's as if they have spent so much time focussing on strategy, they are forgetting to implement the basics. **Second Half** 

Just one point in it. The first ten minutes were always going to be crucial. Thankfully, Kerry move the ball well and Ben Kelliher picks off a good point. That will settle Kerry; I imagine that management did a bit settling things as well. I'm not a big believer in roaring and shouting in half-time dressing rooms. I always think that staying calm, easing any nerves, having drinks, towels etc. Ready to go....quiet, efficient professionalism. But hey, easy for the likes of me to say.

Ben slotted a free and added another. That's Kerry four points to the good now. Alex Touhy's effort went short, but he was right to have a go. Ben slalomed his way through and rolled it..... left and wide. A goal chance. Gearóid White seems to me to be struggling a little bit (is he carrying a small knock? It looked like it) but still curls over a point. Double scores.

Cavan's turn to show what they can do. A beautiful move, in fairness to them. Jake Brady and Jay Graham combined to set up Matthew Duffy (any amount of minor teams seem to be using a nominal corner back as an auxiliary player at the moment) and he applied a great finish. 0-10 to 1-5. The game is right back in the mixer!

Kerry with an instant response, a fast and fluid move seeing influential Nick Lacey strike for goal himself, but Cian O'Connell made a terrific save.

I always worry that an opposition goal like that can swing the pendulum of a game completely, but it didn't throw off Kerry at all (a major positive). The outstanding Ben Kelliher twisted for space to pick off another point. Tadhg O'Connell, very impressive on his introduction, tok a point (I thought it was Mark O'Carroll that kicked it, as did others around me, but I'm assured that it was Tadhg). Pádraig Ó Mainnín, also off the bench, did likewise. 0-13 to 1-5. Just a lick of paint now and the job was finished.

And that's where I run into a real problem. At this position, if you can get into that position, you have got to finish it out. You can't suddenly switch tactics that are obviously working. Thanks to the new rules, you can't just smother the play by bringing everybody back into your defence (for which I give many thanks and praise, because I saw far too much of that game-killing nonsense in the last number of years). But you can stop the opposition gaining rapid momentum. Make it so that they need goals to get back into it.

Cavan, with nothing to lose, went hunting. They had been the better side in the middle third all through, but now they could have made a case for planning permission to build on it. And they started shooting.

Substitute Gary McCabe kicked a fine point.

Cavan brought on their sub keeper and brought Cian McConnell out the field. I haven't really seen it at inter-county before as a formal substitution, but I remember Kerry giving it real consideration in regards to goalkeeper Shane Ryan in preparations for the 2014 All Ireland Minor Final. Regardless, it worked, because McConnell swung over a beauty. Gamekeeper turned poacher, I suppose.

Nathan Quigley with a point. Lads, that's 0-13 to 1-8 now. And we aren't even getting the ball into their half. We need the next score, thinks yours truly....just as Jay Graham pointed over the bar. One point game.

One break by Kerry. Just one break, a clean air of heels by Liam O'Brien, and the Glenflesk marksman calmly took his score. That was vital. I still believe, not just in the moment but right now, that Kerry would have lost the game without that.

Cavan weren't done. In fairness to them, they had a fairly Dylan Thomas attitude about going gently into the night, and rightly so. Just two points in it, but that is a nervy enough lead when your defence are brilliantly bailing water. Have Kerry ever surrendered a two point lead to a last minute goal? I'll give ye a clue (because I am proud of looking up this extremely random bit of trivia). 'Eye of the Tiger' by Survivor was number one in the Irish charts at the time.

I'm not going to be making any big deal out

of it, but I have seen a couple of clickbait sites screaming headlines about 'Kerry Furious About New Rule in Minor Game'. I haven't clicked on them so I don't know what they are talking about. There was no controversy. There were no Kerry (or Cavan) supporters 'furious' during or after the game. There's far too much of this nonsense masquerading as some sort of 'analysis' nowadays, but that's because too many fools indulge the rubbish. I don't and won't. I'm not going to pretend it was a good game (it simply wasn't). But I've spoken to wiser people than myself at the game, including two referees, and that game was refereed correctly. None of that is going to bother Kerry. They have enough to be getting on with, because quite frankly, that display would not win an All Ireland. Better shot selection, lose the lull after strong starts to both halves (a repeat of the Cork game), have back-ups for midfield. As for the finish.....defence were brilliant, but absolutely had to be that. You won't get away with it again. I'm very happy with the defence. I think we have great inside forwards, our best strength is playing to the corners rather than aiming at the posts from outside. We certainly have very good options off the bench. ### AROUND THE GROUNDS

There's so much going on in terms of GAA that I'm just going to give my own thoughts on a lot of what I saw. Just so that ye understand, I did actually watch one or two things, others were just following updates on teslatoxictrumptaco. com formerly known as 'x' formerly known as 'twitter', some were just gossip from people who were there, and at least one was almost certainly a dream I had.

### **Cork v Limerick**

Loved every single minute of it. A lot of the guff about it being 'the best field game in the world' is more suitable for a tourism brochure than reality (I'd like to discuss one of these days how

the Gaelic revival after the British Empire had spent generations trying to wipe out native Irish culture saw a lot of false mythologies being cast in stone and now printed as fact) but I think it is true at the elite level. The top hurling games have always had more skill and unpredictability than the best football matches.

But the hype is getting out of control. Was the Munster Final entertainment. Oh jaysus, yes, it was absolutely gripping. I watched it on television and I couldn't sit down. I started giving advice to the players....through the television. That's a great sign of a game, it probably says a bit about me as well.

It was gripping. But was it actually great hurling? I'm less convinced. For me, Limerick started really, really well (Cian Lynch at his peak is a genuine phenomenon) but Cork took control. My sympathies always lie with referees in as far as possible, but the plain truth is I thought that he let too much go in that first half. Far too much. And as for the have-a-go heroes with the 'it's a man's game' and 'leave them off the leash'....these are the same people who whinge about referees after defeats. When frustration sets in and it inevitably kicks off, those same spoofers will be calling for the referee's head.

For me, Cork were the better side overall. And I have a bit of a soft spot for Cork hurling. Limerick have dined well and often recently after a long famine. Cork haven't, and the belief around the county is almost becoming a religion – it's a little bit frightening actually. I don't actually expect Cork to win the All Ireland I wouldn't begrudge them). The fact that they came back to go toe to toe with Limerick without their most talismanic player off form - for once, it was Patrick Horgan who looked human among demi-gods instead of the other way around - is great. Penalties are an awful to win, of course, everybody agrees with that. But anyone who wants to complain can start off with how they plan to fix the calendar to render it unnecessary. And anyway, in my head, that game was a draw. But I think that was as deep as their tank can go. I think Limerick will find that little fraction extra later on. That 'later on' is what kills me about too many of these games.

Hurling games like this are brilliant, but they are not sensational. Not when there's another 'sensation' just around the corner.

### **Kilkenny v Galway**

I didn't watch it, just followed the scores. Apparently few enough people watched it, both in person or on television. Kilkenny were very good, by all accounts, but it's embarrassing how completely overshadowed the Leinster Final is by Munster. Congratulations to Ardfert native Fionán Mackessy on winning a Leinster Senior Championship.

### JOE MCDONAGH FINAL

A little case of what might have been, to be honest. I can't help looking back at the naive eejit I was at the start of the McDonagh Championship (don't feel bad – that happens to me a lot). I knew, most people did, that Kerry were in serious trouble. Too many absentees. Our most important game was going to be our first one. Everybody else was obviously going to beat Kildare, so as long as we triumphed over them, we would at least be safe. And we beat them by just a single point, with an awful lot of things going our way, and I was delighted.

We haven't won a game since and did get relegated. Kildare haven't lost a game since, and last weekend they beat Laois well to lift the Joe McDonagh Cup. And while I know that Naas have pretty much taken over Slaughtneil's mantle as the best dual club in recent years (when you look at what they have won at all grades, including colleges, in both codes in the last six or seven years, it's phenomenal) Kildare have no bigger a hurling base than we do.

### LORY MEAGHER CUP

Congratulations also to New York, who won the Lory Meagher Cup by beating Cavan on a 4-17 to 2-17 scoreline. Look, there have been a

few fully understandable grumbles about the fact that the likes of Cavan had to jump a lot of obstacles to reach the semi-finals, whereas New York were basically inserted at that point. Ah, lads. Ye don't think there were plenty of hurdles to keeping NewYork GAA going in the hard years? New York minded plenty of us in it's time. Kerry, and a lot of other counties, have done plenty of fundraising there. Particular congratulations to manager Richie Hartnett, who hails from Ballyheigue.

### SOCCER International Friendly

#### Ireland 1 Senegal 1

No, I didn't sit down and watch it. I actually forgot that it was on, to be honest, I watched it on the RTE Player the following day. For some reason, I seemed to be skipping the half and full-time match analysis (actually, the reason is because you can fast forward the RTE Player). There's just so much sport at the moment. Locally you have the U14 football leagues just finishing and the County Championship just starting, not to mention the Senior County League.Rugby, tennis, golf....and so much soccer it just blurs into one meaningless tangle. The display, apparently, was quite good. That ancient and long since tiresome cliché of 'green shoots' is yet again appearing in match reports. There's only so much false jollity a man can take.

These friendlies are very important for squads and players who get very little time to train together, let alone play. And I do believe that familiarity breeds efficiency. But as for assessing a team from the outside on the basis of a game like this? Arrah, would ye ever stop. That was basically a mix of Irish senior players and reserves against a Senegal reserve team. No Sadio Mane and the likes of Koulibaly, Mende, Gueye and Jackson on the bench? Those are the only Senegal players I could come close to naming, and don't ask me too many questions about Gueye or Jackson.

Kasey McAteer, apparently, is the latest player to be labelled as a budding star by Irish journalists. And yes, there's no question but that he was good, created a great chance after quarter of an hour for Smallbone (a very poor attempt at a finish) and just got better after that. His follow-up after the initial save for the goal was excellent; that was a poacher's instinct. But a little bit of perspective would be no harm. McAteer shining in a game like this is a little bit like a Kerry panellist impressing in the County League. It does not mean that you have found the next David Clifford or Colm Cooper. Good for McAteer, he has put himself in the conversation, but no more than that.

These are the type of games that I believe players do out of a sense of obligation as much as anything else. You can't really nail down a starting berth for the qualifiers by doing well against Senegal's B team; that just matches expectations. But you can take yourself out of the running with a poor display. Early in the second half Smallbone had another great chance but shot too close to the keeper. Good save, but I'd have expected a better strike. Manning – he was lively too – tried to follow up but the defender did enough. Nice little spark to that kind of play.

Within minutes, though, Senegal should have been level. Great header off the underside of the crossbar. In the replay – I didn't realise at first and I doubt if anybody did – Kelliher got a bare fingertip of a deflection on it. In the 61st minute we were lucky enough again as a bobbling ball hit the post and Keliher managed to bat the loose ball away. That could and probably have been the equaliser. To be fair, Senegal had started unloading the big guns by then from the bench.

Ireland had Ferguson the pitch at this stage but had switched from five across the middle to a more traditional 4-4-1-1. And I'm honestly not being disrespectful to trojan workers like Knight or Cullen, but the idea that Ireland can control a centre with two players has been disproven as nauseam. It's not happening for at least a decade.

An equaliser was inevitable and it duly arrived. Ndiaye (never heard of him) with a lovely jink and excellent cross into danger. Kelliher once again saved the first effort but Ismaili Sarr tapped in from close range. In fact, Senegal would go close again as they finished strongly, but the header whizzed just wide.

Ireland weren't bad, by any means.We have seen much, much worse in recent years. But 'green shoots'? Really? For all the praise about McAteer, I thought our best player overall was our goalkeeper. That says a lot.

No. You know what I think about it, and I know you feel the same. Let's just move on.

### Ireland O Luxembourg O

In a way, I'm actually happier about the game against Luxembourg. A little bit more of a grasp on reality, I think. Yes, both sides were poor, and that's fone. Once again, these games are all about the learning curve, not the shop wndow. Heimar Hallgrimmson has to play the game of pretending that our opinons matter – but this was about the team learning, not the public. And it was poor – dear God, it wsa fairly dreadful. I watched it on television, if I had paid for a ticket, I'd be a lot less more content.

This was not the Senegal game. This was, frankly, a more honest measure. And I think it's fair to say that Ireland didn't show up well. The same old story, lots of hff, not much by way of puff. That's grand; a work in progress. There was a disconnect between our forwards amd midfield. Ferguson and Parrott are both very highly talented, but either they need to get more involved in games or they need to find a way to bring themselves into it. I don't know how to do that – but I'm not getting paid to figure it out,either. We are poor enough, that's the cold reality of it, and that's okay. Everyone is a professional and trying their best – this was a poor game but the fact that nobody is trying to pretend otherwise is actually kind of refreshing.

### **Kennedy Cup**

Ever since their history-making win in the Kennedy Cup back in 2015, Kerry have pretty much bee in a slow decline. The tournament seedings are based on three year averages and Kerry entered this year's competition from the second pot. The knockout stages are yet to unfold as I write, but the simplest measure is that under manager Danny Diggins, Kerry are already guaranteed to finish in the top eight.

The first game always sets the tone and Kerry's convincing win over North Tipperary laid down a great marker – anything less than a win in that game, and you are left always chasing lost ground. Kian Cronin made the breakthrough after 22 minutes and deep in injury time, Joe Joy wrapped up a 2-0 win to get Kerry off to a strong start.

Kerry made a blistering start to the Tuesday with a 3-0 victory over South Tipperary. Kerry always looked the better side and had already left two chances behind before captain Joe Joy of Listowel Celtic fired them in front with a brilliant individual goal.In the 27th minute an unfortunate Tipperary defender attempted to deal with a dangerous ball into the box from Joy, only to end up turning it into his own net. 



# KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossy misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

### SUMMER BEDDING

Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground, and although Garden Centres are closed, many of the supermarkets are carrying stock. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the ground the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn. As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding to put the taller ones at the back. If you want to do a summer display of bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petunias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and alyssum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an overall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in afterwards.

### **DEPUTY DANNY HEALY RAE RAISES VACENT COUNCIL HOUSES IN THE DAIL**

I thank Deputy Gould and Sinn Féin for tabling this very important motion. There is no shadow of a doubt that houses in the local authorities are taking too long to turn around. There was one house in Killarney I fought tooth and nail over. From the day it first came up here, it took over five years to get that house in Marian Terrace turned around. There was vermin and everything else gone into it. I was shocked the other day to hear



the Taoiseach say a house should only take four or five days to turn around. He is right that maybe that is what it should take, in some instances, like the two houses in Kilgarvan that people left a few months ago. What happened then? Some crew came along, took off the roof, took out the chimney and they are still at it, putting in an underground heat pump or whatever it is. The houses are riddled. Under my own nose in Kilgarvan village, that is what is going on. It is wasting money. I believe the two houses will cost more than €100,000 each to turn around. They are gone over now to another village in east Kerry and they went around to 18 houses to tell them they are fitting heat pumps. This is a waste of money when there are other houses to be turned around. It is wasting good money. One poor woman rang me and said "Danny, they're talking of taking out my little fireplace and taking down the chimney. That's all I have after all my years and I want my little fire." I have been on to Kerry County Council. This is wasting money, while other houses around the parish and around different parishes in Kerry are having no work done to them. That is ridiculous. It is taking 64 weeks to turn around a house in Kerry and the Taoiseach thinks it will only take five days. He is ambitious but I do not think he will bring it down to that. He is a good man and he is trying his best.

"This is the reason I speak to the crowds in parables: because while having the power of seeing they do not see, and while having the power of hearing they do not hear, nor do they understand and grasp spiritual things" (Matthew 13:13 Amplified Bible).

Welcome back dear student, I've been thinking a lot lately about over-reactions. It's a battle. Often we over-react when we don't fully listen or understand the situation. Reactions are learnt behaviours: influenced by loved ones or developed from traumatic or fearful experiences. Jesus taught in parables to describe God's Kingdom ways. He said that people who wanted to understand Truth would listen to what they were hearing and would grasp what was being explained. The Word of God tells us that the things of God are spiritually discerned (1 Corinthians 2:14). There are multitudes who have perfect hearing and sight in this world, but they do not listen to, or will not look for, the things of God. Their minds and hearts are closed, their spiritual senses dulled. "You shall know the Truth and the Truth shall set you free" (John 8:32). God's Word is Truth (John 17:17). Many have tried unsuccessfully to read the Scriptures by using only their intellect to understand, rather than their hearts being connected to God's Spirit. We need the ministry and gentle guiding hand of the Holy Spirit Who teaches us all things. Jesus promised the Holy Spirit will reveal the Truth of Who Christ is to us (John 16:14-15). So, when we study the Word we must pray first. Then, when something, or someone triggers the button - the response is an explosion. We can all over-react and not listen. But angry people are often just looking for a reason to nail someone. Others must walk on eggshells around them. It's very serious. Many are in relationships where they're careful to not 'poke the bear'. An exhausting way to live. Sometimes children feel their parents don't listen and the consequences can leave scars (Ephesians 6:4). Equally, long suffering parents can find their children won't listen to advice or warnings and get into trouble as a result (Proverbs 19:11-20). There's no manual on 'navigating through life' because everyone is unique, but God's Word does give us principles to live by to bring victory and hope - if we will press in to hear, see, and obey God's plan (Joshua 1:5-9). 
