

APPEAL FOR HELP AS LILY STARTS CANCER TREATMENT

collowing the devestating diagnosis of cancer, the family of seven year old Lily Sebestova are currently in Crumlin Children's Hospital where the little girl is receiving chemotherapy.

The second youngest of six children, Lily's mum Lorraine O'Sullivan Sebestova, who has worked at The Dunloe Castle Hotel for the past fifteen years has had to resign her position to care for her little girl. Lorraine's manager, Jason Clifford has created a gofundme to help the family with their expenses. "Lorraine was Restaurant Supervisor at The Dunloe and we felt we could so something to help, so we set up a Gofundme to help with their expenses", Jason told Killarney Outlook.

"She is an amazing mother and we are hoping that this fundraiser will go someway towards helping the family", he added.

Lily had her 7th birthday on the 23rd of July and 4 days later was diagnosed with a malignant tumour on her left hand. The name of the tumour is Alveolar Rhabdomyosarcoma, which is a rare cancer. Lily's path to treatment consists of 25 weeks of intense chemotherapy and radiotherapy between Crumlin Hospital and St Luke's in Dublin.

Afterwards, Lily will also require maintenance chemo, all with the hope of removing this horrible thing that is invading her little body.

Lorraine and her husband Dodi who is originally from Slovakia live in Tralee and Lily, who is due to start second class at Holy Cross Family Tralee, has three brothers and two sisters, Dean, Jack, Sabhadh, Muireann(who sadly passed away 17 years ago) and little Eli who is 3yrs old.

Lily's illness may require further treatments such as, blood transfusions or platelet transfusions", her mum Lorraine told Killarney Outlook this week.

"We would really appreciate your donation to help Lily on her journey to beat Cancer. Lily is a strong little girl with a free spirit and independent nature. She is beautiful, kind and tough as old boots", her mum added.



BROAD **WELCOME**

for equipment funding for 46 Kerry sports clubs & organisations

here has been a broad welcome for the announcement that 46 Kerry clubs and sports organisations are to receive a total of €769,547 in funding under the latest round of the Sports Capital and Equipment Programme (SCEP).

These specific grants will assist sports clubs and Governing Bodies of Sport to purchase crucial equipment necessary for the growth of their sport and it is expected that the allocation of grants for capital projects under the Programme will be announced towards the end of the year.

Priority in this tranche of funding was given to projects that will increase participation, that are located in areas with higher levels of socioeconomic disadvantage and to organisations that did not receive significant funding under the Programme previously.

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley welcomed the announcement Foley said: "I'm delighted to welcome this funding which will provide vital equipment for 46 local sports clubs and organisations across Kerry. As we have seen from watching our incredible athletes perform in the Tokyo Olympics, sport is so much more than the sum of its parts and can lift a nation just when we need it the most. This funding will also benefit participants of all levels and abilities ensuring that the health benefits associated with sports participation can be enjoyed by everyone in their local community."

Brendan Griffin, TD also welcomed the funding "I know that the Kerry clubs and organisations receiving this funding today will make great use of it to the benefit of local communities.

It is so important to encourage people to play sport, not only is it good for their physical



health but it benefits their mental health too. Supporting sports teams, clubs and organisations is also tantamount to supporting community engagement and helps to foster strong community spirit. Investment in sport is also a really worthwhile policy objective for Government from a health point of view. Society reaps the rewards through improved health of the population. This is more important than ever with the rise in obesity".

Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District and Deputy Mayor of Kerry, Councillor Michael Cahill has also welcomed funding for Sports Clubs in Kerry. REVISED COVID 19 REGULATIONS NEEDED

as vaccination programme nears completion - MEP Kelleher

ianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher had called for a complete review of all regulations and restrictions in light of the successful rollout of Ireland's Covid 19 vaccination programme.

"We can be proud as a nation about how we, as a society, have embraced the chance to receive a vaccine.

"With this opportunity, however, must come additional freedoms.

"For nearly 18 months, we have been living under a myriad of different plans and sets of guidelines, both advisory and legally binding. "It's high time that these regulations are reviewed in their entirety in light of the reality

on the ground. "The HSE has said that it expects full vaccination to be completed by the end of August, and at this point, we need a new, revised and simplified set of rules that reflects the progress

that has been made.

"Of course, we need to aware of the challenges that come with the Delta variant, but the people of Ireland must feel the bonus that comes from exceeding all expectations when it comes to vaccination uptake..

"The people of Ireland, especially our young people, have endured an awful lot. Particular

sectors, such as the music and late night : hospitality industries, as well as the arts, need to know about what happens next and crucially

"It's time the Irish people, especially our young people, got to live their lives again now that we have protected our most vulnerable citizens," concluded Kelleher.

Call for KCC to ensure locals get planning

A Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor is calling on the County Council to ensure people can get planning in their native parishes.

Councillor Michael Cahill made the call at the recent Kenmare Municipal District meeting of which he is Cathaoirleach.

Councillor Cahill proposed that the council ensures local people who are born, reared, living and working in an area can obtain permission for a family home in that same area.

"It is currently a huge issue for local people who seek to obtain planning, so that they can live and work, where they were reared" stated Councillor

"These people went to school and currently work in an area, and have bought a site in that area, and they should be able to get planning permission for a family home in that area" stated the Rossbeigh based

"Forcing people to live in our large towns and cities is denying them the human right to live and rear a family where they choose. And I am hearing that large numbers wish to remain in the areas they were reared, live and work there with their own people" said Councillor Cahill.

"Another issue is the fact that many of our villages do not have a Public Sewerage System while some of our towns and villages are at capacity and this needs to be addressed as a matter of priority" added Councillor



Lack of Mental Health Services for children in Kerry is a tragedy says Councillor

A Fianna Fáil Councillor has claimed that a lack of sufficient Mental Health Services for children who are intellectually disabled, and/or suffer from Autism etc, has not alone increased unnecessary suffering for these families, but has in fact brought many to the point of contemplating suicide.

"It is so tragically sad that in this day and age that

we cannot provide sufficient professional care, help and guidance, for these, the most vulnerable in our society. In fact, most of us find it impossible to discuss what some families are going through, to the extent that these unfortunate people are being forgotten" stated Councillor Michael Cahill, Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District and Deputy Mayor of Kerry.

"Many parents and children feel like prisoners in their own homes, when dealing with profoundly intellectually disabled family members. There are times when they are with them 24/7 and need to try and watch and manage them constantly. I know of parents who have installed CCTV in every room in the house, in an effort to keep track of their loved ones who are basically out of control" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"I have been contacted by many such parents who have expressed suicidal thoughts due to the perceived hopelessness of the situation that they and their loved ones find themselves. We must find respite for these patients, for their parents and for their siblings and we must ensure that professional care is available to all. These families are in crisis. I cannot stress enough, the urgency of their plight and I will be calling on the Ministers involved to deal with the issue at the highest level of priority" stated Councillor Cahill.

The cover options

Here are the main covers that a motor trader should consider.

•Road risk cover As with other forms of road risk cover the cover options are third party only, third party fire and theft and comprehensive. The policy can extend to cover vehicles owned and under the custody & control of the garage. Your policy will define the term "Vehicles" and can exclude motorcycles,

scooters and vehicles over ten tonnes. Road risk cover can include private use on request.

•Demonstration cover can be included to allow any person authorised by the policy holder to drive for demonstration purposes provided he/she is accompanied by any of the named drivers on the certificate. Some insurers can include unaccompanied demonstration cover so it is important to get expert advice.

•Material damage cover for buildings, contents and plant and machinery can be arranged as part of the package policy.

• Employers Liability covers your legal liability in the event that you are negligent and required to pay compensation for bodily injuries to an employee in the course of their employment. The premium for this section will be calculated on employee numbers, annual wages and type of work duties conducted.

•Public liability Internal Risks covers your legal liability in the event that you are negligent and required to pay compensation for bodily injuries or damage to third party property in the course of your business activities. Your annual turnover will need to be disclosed and reviewed annually.

•Products Liability covers your legal liability for injuries and property damage in connection with goods sold or supplied. Garages that offer a repair service should have the policy extended to cover "Defective workmanship/ Service indemnity".

•Business interruption covers loss of gross profit that results after an insured loss such as a fire. It is vitally important that the gross profit figure is reviewed annually to reflect the current trading conditions.

•There are many other extensions available to motor trade policies, examples would include Money, goods in transit and professional indemnity cover for arranging car finance.

•It is important to remember that vehicle lifting plant and other items of machinery may require annual inspections under the health and safety



In July, Rowing Ireland confirmed the selection of two crews to represent Ireland at the prestigious regatta held annually for European junior 18 rowers. Headford native Caoimhe was joined in the Irish crew by Lauren McCarthy Steele of Skibbereen Rowing Club, Anna Keating of Shannon Rowing Club and Giselle Coulter of Belfast Boat Club. The second Irish boat featured Evelina Zakarauskaite of Galway Rowing Club and Patti Mullin of Belfast Boat Club competing in

the Junior Womens Pair. The crews came together initially at the National Rowing Centre in Cork at the final round of selection trials in June, before relocating to their training base at Lee Rowing Club in Cork under the supervision of coaches Ray Morrison, Vivian Kelleher and Mick O'Riordan.

The Coupe Regatta is unique in its two-day racing format with each event being contested on Saturday and a repeat of the event again on Sunday, in recognition of the very hard work invested by the rowers to qualify for the regatta. The Irish quad overcame a difficult start in their heat on Saturday to finish third and qualify for the A final. A strong and determined finish saw the Irish boat move from the back of the field through to third and second place at the finish line with the Netherlands third and France first. On Sunday, the Irish guad again gualified for the A final but missed out on a Day 2 medal finishing fourth. Ireland's second crew also enjoyed great success, dominating in the Womens Junior Pair and winning gold on both days. Caoimhe was cheered on from the stands at the Ottensheim course by proud parents Micheal and Liz while the whole of Muckross Rowing Club was tuned into the live internet stream over the weekend.

Caoimhe's brother Finn was unable to travel, owing to his own rowing commitments with UL Rowing Club, where he is busy in training for the Irish Rowing Championships scheduled for next weekend in Cork.

The whole of the rowing club in Muckross is delighted for Caoimhe and the successful performances in Austria. Caoimhe has invested long hours in her training and throughout the COVID restrictions showed exceptional commitment to a testing programme involving regular training sessions on the indoor rowing machine and in the single scull out on the lake. Caoimhe's talent and rowing skill has been guided at the Muckross club with the support of a number of the club's coaches, including Marko Tot, Maurice Coffey, Elaine Daly and Noel Kelleher. Caoimhe joins a special group of Muckross rowers, becoming the 11th member of the club to race at the Coupe de la Jeunesse since 1996 and the first since 2013. Caoimhe's focus also now turns to the Irish Rowing Championships, where she will race for her club in a competitive field of single scullers at both Junior 18 and Club grades, including some of her Irish crewmates from the Coupe.

HOW TO GET A COVID-19 VACCINE FOR 12 TO 15 YEAR OLDS

From yesterday, Thursday 12th August, COVID-19 vaccines will be offered to all children aged 12 to 15. People in this age group will get either the Pfizer/BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

Children aged 12 to 15 who are not at high risk can decide to get vaccinated now or wait until there is more information about COVID-19 vaccines and young people.

How to get a COVID-19 vaccine

Registration for this age group will open on 12 August. When registration opens, parents of 12 to 15 year olds can either:

register their child's details online to get a vaccine appointment

go with them to a walk-in vaccination clinic, when these are open

Register your child for a COVID-19 vaccine

To register your child for a vaccine, you'll need

your mobile phone number

your email address

your child's PPS number

your child's Eircode

If you do not have these things, call the COVID-19 helpline to register by phone instead.

If you register by phone, a parent or legal guardian will need to be at the appointment to give consent for the vaccine in person.

Giving consent for your child

A parent or legal guardian will need to give

consent for their child to get their COVID-19 vaccine. If you register online, you will be sent a text message with a link to give your consent before their appointment. This will be sent to the number you used to register. A parent or legal guardian will need go to the appointment in person to give consent if they:

do not give consent online

register by phone - it is not possible to give consent over the phone. The child getting the vaccine will be asked if they are happy to get the vaccine at their appointment.

Adult needed at appointment

Most children aged 12 to 15 will be vaccinated at a vaccination centre near their home.

They will need to bring an adult to their appointment. Children attending alone will not be vaccinated. Where possible, the child's parent or legal guardian should attend the vaccination appointment with their child. If the parent or legal guardian has given consent online in advance, it is possible for them to ask another adult to bring their child to the appointment. If consent has not been given yet, the child's parent or legal guardian has to be there. If the appointment time does not work, you can change the appointment.

What to bring

Bring the appointment information. This will be a text on the mobile phone used to register.

If possible, children aged 12 to 15 should bring a form of identification with their date of birth on it. This can be their passport or birth certificate.

If these are not available, any identification like a Public Services Card or school ID would be helpful also. If 12 to 15 year olds do not have any identification, the adult who brings them to their appointment can confirm their identity and their age. They should wear something that will make it easy to get the vaccine in their upper arm.

Make sure to eat before arriving as there may be a wait at the vaccination centre.

When to delay vaccine

Your child should delay getting their COVID-19 vaccine if they: have COVID-19 – wait until it has been 4 weeks since they first tested positive or first had symptoms

have symptoms of COVID-19 – they should self-isolate and get a COVID-19 test

are restricting their movements - wait until they have completed their period of restricted movements

Second dose

Your child will need to get a second dose of their COVID-19 vaccine to make sure they have full protection.

You will get a text with the details of their second appointment. They will need to bring an adult to the second appointment also.


The solution - focused approach to coaching Part 2

HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILD HAS AN EYE PROBLEM?

Some eye conditions do not i vision defects, problems with the display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

>COVID19 UPDATE

DIOCESAN COVED SUPPORT TEAM JULY 30TH, 2021 WEDDINGS

- From Thursday August 5th, 2021 the maximum number of guests permitted to attend a wedding will increase from 50 people to 100 people (current protective measures apply).
- NOTE There is no change to the social distancing guidelines, the 2 metre social distancing requirement must be observed. 100 people may only attend the church provided the current capacity of the church allows. The current capacity of the church following compliance with social distancing requirements must not be exceeded, for example, if the current capacity of a church allows for 50 people to attend then that is the number that may attend a wedding ceremony in a church even though 100 people may attend the reception afterwards.

FUNERALS

• The number of mourners permitted at funeral services is 50 people, regardless of size of venue. Attendance at wakes in private homes and at funeral homes is for family only. Related family gatherings should strictly adhere to prevailing public health advice on household mixing, including visitors to your home and indoor and outdoor dining.

BAPTISMS

- From Thursday August 5th, 2021 Baptism services may proceed and Parishes may take new bookings for Baptisms. All protective measures must be followed, and social gatherings should be avoided.
- Continue to keep numbers attending Baptisms small and limited to immediate family members.

FIRST COMMUNION & CONFIRMATION

• First Holy Communion and Confirmation ceremonies should not take place at this time. Further advice will follow on the resumption of these ceremonies when it is safe to do so.

Other Religious Services/Public Worship

- In person religious services are permitted with protective measures with a maximum attendance of 50 people. Where the size of a church allows for a capacity of greater than 50 people this may be permitted only where: -
- Social distancing guidelines are adhered to.
- The church can be divided into distinct sections (cordoned or marked appropriately) of not more than 50 persons in each section.
- •There is a minimum of 4 metres between sections.
- Each section has its own entrance and exit route.
- There are separate arrangements for elements of the service involving close contact, for example, the distribution of Holy Communion.
- Strictly no movement of people between sections before, during or after the service.

KERRY V TYRONE

Croke Park, Sunday August 15th
Croke Park, Saturday August 21st ????

Yeah. At the time of writing, I have absolutely no clue exactly what's happening, or where it's happening, or whether spectators will be allowed. The exact number of Tyrone senior panelists infected with covid hasn't ben revealed, but Peter Canavan has claimed 17 and a possibility of more arising. I've heard every number between 11 and 21, to be honest. Certainly a lot, Tyrone have confirmed that much. With the game and the subsequent All Ireland Final already gone back a week. Tyrone have asked for a further week and, while Croke Park are currently holding their ground, the GPA have come out in support of Tyrone, saying that "their amateur status should be upheld". Now, what on earth their amateur status has got to do with any of this is beyond me. The GPA do a lot of great work in many areas.... this is not one of them. Will the game go ahead? Will preparations be thrown off by another week? Because, with things so fine-tuned at the top level, that makes a big difference to players who will have to wind down in order to wind back up. The game off would be the safest decision, without question, which would basically mean a forfeit. As a genuine and longstanding Kerry supporter, I

don't want that. I want a game. I think that Tyrone have improved an awful lot - don't mind that nonsensical game in the League semi-final, that was only ducks and drakes after five minutes, even if Gavin White surely got the Goal of the Year. take another look at their Ulster Championship but so have we. I still favour Tadhg Morley ahead of Jason Foley at full back and can we please keep Paul Geaney near to the goal, but the additions of Mike Breen and Paudie Clifford have been massive. Mike brings a bit of bulk into our defence and I felt that bulk was something we were badly lacking. We'll still struggle against the likes of O'Callaghan and Kilkenny (my current Footballer of the Year, with Paudie and Seán just behind them and Gavin White not far off) but the likes of Cathal McShane won't be able to power through us. I'd be curious to see how good of a lock picker Darragh Canavan is as opposed to a score-getter, we all know his father was a master of both forms. Colm Cooper was a brilliant score-getter, but I never saw better than him at the perfect visionary pass.

For me, Paudie has taken over as our main lockpicker, with David actually coming out and drawing defenders, leaving Seán in particular with room to work inside, and it's led to some phenomenal scores. David's lower than usual (i.e. still higher than ordinary mortals) scoring rate is not because his standards have dropped. It's

because he is being deployed in a slightly deeper role; to me his contribution is even more effective. David Moran is on track for an All Star, after a lot of unfair criticism last year, and we now have a better spread of midfield options. Jack Barry is really fulfilling his promise as a player – I have mentioned before that I always thought he he could do phenomenal things but had a hasty trigger when it came to the end result. Now we are seeing end results.

Our press on opposition kick-outs has been working superbly, but Niall Morgan can drop the ball into your half-back line, so players will have to judge carefully how far forward they can go. I wouldn't start off cautious though (please God that we never again see a defender being played as wing forward, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch looks far better in the defensive corner) - I think we should attack as much as possible early on. Tyrone's new management have broadened their blanket style, especially in attack, but they still aren't a great team at coming from a deficit. Unfortunately, no matter what team wins, it will be inevitably be overshadowed by the surrounding events. In faint, I think it has put a taint on this year's championship already; there will always bea slight question mark over the eventual winners,. That isn't remoptely fair, but that is what happens, and all we can do is deal with it and move on. C'est

I do think the game will go ahead. 'Tis like Macbeth that was so steeped in blood halfway across the river that he decided that he may as well keep going, to twist one of Shakespeare's more macabre metaphors.

I have no problem with spectators – I have felt that outdoor sports with social distancing and contact tracing have been safe for longer than the guidelines thought they were, to be honest. But I'm certainly not trivialising coronavirus. Numbers are very, very high at the moment and the delta variant certainly seems more potent. Health must, obviously (I really hope it's obvious to everyone) take priority over any football match.

Look, the bottom line is let's make sure that everyone is taken care off as best as possible, that everyone recovers and the virus isn't spread further (particularly, with a selfish tinge, into the Kerry panel).

Growing up in parts of inner city Dublin can be rough. There are large swathes of unemployment

dating back to the decline and mechanisation of the docks. Crime is a likelier option than college for many of the young people in that environment. It was an amazing feat for Philly McMahon to have roots strong enough to take him into Croke Park and win All Irelands. That, magnificent though it was, is dwarfed by the achievement of a wee slip of a girl from Portland Row. She carried a lot of prejudices on her back into the Olympic Stadium – look, Portland Row isn't a place I'd be hanging around at night, to be bluntly honest about it. But

you have as much chance of throwing this one off with a left jab as a prejudice – small chance either way.

I came across an interesting thing during the week. The most of you will know Paddy Osborne, and those of you who have read his bestseller 'Baxter's Boys' won't need to be told that he is as pure Dublin as Molly Malone. Paddy posted something on facebook before Kellie's fight about his father, and I asked him if I could reprint it here. "He made his boxing debut in the National

Stadium circa 1949 and went on to win a number of Dublin and Leinster titles as well as fighting in two All-Irelands. Just over fifteen years ago a 16 year old girl named Kellie Harrington came to him in Corinthians Bc in the heart of Dublin's inner-city and told him that she wanted to learn how to box and could he help coach her? My Dad said of course but went to her uncle Nicky Duffy who was her kickboxing coach to ask if it was okay with him. Nicky had absolutely no problem and so began Kellie's incredible boxing journey. I remember chatting with my Dad on numerous occasions about this promising young fighter who he was bringing the length and breadth of Ireland to arrange spars and challenge fights. This was at a time when there weren't as many girls or young women involved in the sport. Over the years Kellie has had many great coaches in her career as she's developed and progressed into the tremendous fighter and person that she is today. My Dad is now 82 and the current vice president of the Irish Amateur Boxing Association. He has managed numerous Irish teams all over the world including places like Russia, Kazakhstan and Bulgaria but just like the rest of Ireland he will be watching the final on the tele as a massive fan. I know he'll be bobbing and weaving and throwing every punch with Kellie as she attempts to win gold."

I'm not reprinting it to try and draw some kind of tenuous connection to Killarney. We Irish have a ridiculous tendency to do that, anyway. Don't be telling me about Muhammad Ali's maternal great-grandfather. 'Cassius Clay' was his slave name, remember? Rihanna Fenty (yup, that's her surname) had Irish antecedents alright – her ancestors were sent to Barbados in prison ships. Yay! What a cool history we have!

Inner city Dublin was and is a tough place to grow up. But there are real giants, people like Paddy Osborne snr. walking those streets that are the only playground you know as a child. There are giants, unspoken people of every race, creed, and gender, in every community around the whole world. Rathmore lost one recently, but more will

spring from the legacy he put in place. It's how humanity works and what the Olympics was originally meant to be about. Kellie Harrington's wasn't just an affirmation of Irish pride, though it was certainly that. It was an affirmation of humanity. Kellie wasn't our only success story of the Games. Aidan Walsh also brought home a boxing medal, a bronze, and it was only a freak accident while celebrating that win that cost him a chance at silver. Kieran McCarthy, Fossa native and currently Southern Star sports editor, wrote a bestselling book 'Something in the Water' about the phenomenal success of Skibbereen Rowing Club. He might have to add a few chapters after Fintan McCarthy and Paul O'Donovan also returned from Tokyo with gold medals. Aileen Crowley and Monika Dukarska did Kerry proud, finishing fifth in the B Final (11th overall). Aifric Keogh, Eimear Lambe, Fiona Murtagh and Emily Hegarty also won bronze in rowing. It only feels like yesterday that Sean Casey, Paul Griffin, and Cathal Moynihan were setting off for the Beijing Olympics. If I could meet up with Weeshie Fogarty again, God rest him, we'd have a great chat about the Caseys of Sneem. Weeshie was a huge admirer of the rowing and wrestling brothers.

Sarah Leahy of Killarney Valley, back from the European Championships, continued her blistering form by breaking the Munster Senior 100m record in a time of 12.08 and she added the 200m title for her second gold.

KERRY INTER-COUNTY MANAGERS DEPART

Best wishes to Laois native Fintan O'Connor, who has stepped down as Kerry Hurling Manager, and James Costello, who has stepped down as Kerry Minor Manager. Both have been very good managers - Kerry reached two Division Two finals and two Joe McDonagh finals under Fintan. He also brought in a lot of young players who have blossomed in the meantime and leaves fertile ground behind. Mind you, given Kerry's unfortunate habit of losing momentum whehn club rivalry gets going, the truth is that there is an element of poison in the chalice and it'll need a strong hand to grasp it as his successor. He was especially unlucky in his last year as Kerry was simply riddled with injuries. Fintan is and always was a gentleman to deal with and I have no doubt that his phone is ringing regularly at the moment - a lot of counties would like to have what he brought to the Kerry set-up.

James took Kerry to an All Ireland semi-final, an All Ireland Final (the hard truth is that Kerry were capable of winning both), and a one point defeat to Cork. There are a lot of things he did that I wouldn't have thought of and very little he did that I wouldn't have done and, like Fintan, he never once refused my phone calls on the good or the bad days.

Congratulations to the Kerry team on avenging last year's defeat to Laois that ended their campaign. That defeat had a real sting; Kerry had been well in front but were gradually and

inexorably reeled in and well beaten in extra-time. To say that they turned that around this time is an under-statement. Kerry won by 2-11 to 0-5, Patrice Diggin and Jackie Horgan the goal-scorers (Killarney's Kate Lynch got a point) and dominated from start to finish. Next up is a fairly daunting quarer-final against Antrim, but this Kerry team have real steel and they have a chance.

Group Two would look like an easier one but I wouldn't be so sure. People are saying that Crokes aren't quite the force they were, having seen them in this year's county league - arrah lads, throw Gavin White, Micheal Burns, Tony Brosnan, and David Shaw back into that mix. I can see them winning it. I think Templenoe will struggle to repeat their giant-killing feats of last year, ferocious talent and heart, but a low population to draw from. Kenmare Shamrocks? There's a lot of good players on that team, but Seán O'Shea is already in the pantheon of all-time Kerry greats. Paul O'Connor has gone nowhere and marking Stephen O'Brien (much more effective for Kerry than I think people realise, his tracking and workrate is huge) is like trying to catch lightning with a butterfly net. As the old sports saying has it, "you can't coach pace". Intermediate champions of last year? I refuse to even guess. Okay so, Na Gaeil are surely the overall favourites. It's a massive jump up and they won't have any secrets left by the time it comes around, but whatever team comes up will have beaten a lot of good ones along the way.

Group 2: Glenflesk, Ardfert, Spa or Castleisland Desmonds, St. Marys or Waterville

Lots of 'ifs' and 'buts'. Ardfert are struggling, while Glenflesk won promotion and have young guns beginning to shine. You're still looking to Darragh and Jeff on the scoreboard, though Patrick Darcy is pretty much ready – he transformed the U20 game against Cork on his introduction. And I do mean transformed it, he was awesome. But again, a team I'll be looking out for is St. Marys, who are riding a rising wave again, and I expect them to beat Waterville. Bryan Sheehan....in fairness, there are statues in Ireland of lesser men.

Group 3: Glenbeigh/Glencar, Rathmore, Currow, Intermediate Final Loser

Currow just about survived last year and I don't really see them as much stronger this year. Obviously whoever loses last year's final will be the likely favourites, a quick chance to make up for losing the final would see them out of the blocks hungry – unless their fuel reserves are depleted by a rushed ending to last year's campaign. Rathmore are still a great team, but have they quite the firepower of old? I'm not certain. And Glenbeigh/Glencar are always and ever dark horses, and especially hard to beat at home. This one will go down to the proverbial wire.

Group 4: An Ghaeltacht, Laune Rangers, Milltown/ Castlemaine, Na Gaeil or Beaufort

Group of death, basically. Four great teams, all of whom are on an upward curve. Laune Rangers and Milltown/Castlemaine both got promoted, Na Gaeil (see previous) or Beaufort are going to be among the overall favourites, but An Ghaeltacht for me are a bit of a sleeping giant about to wake up – a really solid seam of underage talent. Liam Ó Rocháin and Liam Higgins' great work at the foundations will be supporting another generational layer!

Junior Premier

Group 1: Brosna, St. Pats Blennerville, Keel, Annascaul or Castlegregory

Castlegregory really impressed me last year – moving Alan Fitzgerald out to midfield was a surprise move that opened space for sharp corner forwards, while the O'Gradys, Jimmy especially, are becoming serious sharpshooters. Great minors coming through as well. But I don't see themselves or Keel having the panel depth for such a fast, sharp campaign, Keel dropped down into Division Four. Brosna have a match-winner in Paul Walsh, whose form looks right back to its best, but St. Pats Blennerville have several scoring threats and I can see them coming through here.

Group 2: Ballydonoghue or Gneeveguilla, Finuge, Ballymac, Listry

I expect Lixnaw to last into the latter stages of the hurling, which won't help Finuge. The great days of the Galvins, Fitzmaurices, and Corridans are pretty much over (but what a legacy) and I don't see them in contention. Ballymac's Aidan Breen is one of the best club footballers in Kerry, in my opinion, but they used to rely a fraction too much on him. That doesn't seem to be true anymore, they have gone into Division One for a reason. The team to beat. Listry have a small pick that they get the most out of, but three games on the trot like this is a big ask. Ballydonoghue were relegated from Division Two, but they have played more odften against higher quality teams and I expect that to come to the fore if it's them. Gneevequilla, as I've said, are a team that I think are on the rise after a couple of reasonably fallow years.

Group 3: St. Marys or Waterville, Skellig Rangers, Churchill, St. Senans I can't help thinking that either Jack O'Shea's old stomping ground or Mick O'Dwyer's will see the winners emerging here and looking to spring right back up to Intermediate. Skellig have great players, but not enough youth – depopulation is a massive problem for all the South Kerry teams. Churchill are a solid outfit, but Ivan Parker still does most of their scoring. St. Senans have laboured a bit in the County League, narrowly escaping relegation from Divison Three, and I can't see them going all the way.

Group 4: Fossa, Firies or Ballyduff, Listowel Emmets, St. Michaels/Foilmore The days of Bally/ Foilmore blazing trails look over, at least for now - again, depopulation is the cause. Listowel Emmets are on the way back big time - I see a bit of a resurgence in North Kerry football, albeit there isn't the spread for two county championship teams there. Ballyduff - always very solid - will have already put a lot into the hurling championship and it might deplete their resources too much (might not, of course!). Firies and Fossa have been very close in recent years in terms of the county league. Fossa, blew teams away last year with amazing scorelines and, of course, they have the brothers. Which brothers, Jimmy? Arrah, will you stop. I'll be watching out for them.

Junior (really the Novice, but we aren't supposed to call it that now)

Group 1: Beale, Kilgarvan, Sneem/Derrynane or Valentia, Ballylongford or Moyvane

I'd be concentrating on Beale here. Valentia – God be with the days of Mick and John O'Connell, when they ruled the skies – can barely field a team. They'll pull out all the stops for the championship, but they haven't a lot of stops left to pull. Sneem/ Derrynane aren't much better for numbers. Ballylongford and Moyvane are solid outfits, but can they actually put enough on the scoreboard for the likes of Beale? Kilgarvan are dark horses. With an absolutely full and fit contingent they are as dangerous as anyone, but one small injury to anyone could scupper their chances. It's that tight. Group 2: Annascaul or Castlegregory, Cromane, Tousist, Renard Rob Wharton is one of the most under-rated footballers in the county and Renard

are a dangerous side to come up against. Tousist don't have the numbers for three hard games on the trot. Sean O'Sullivan and Donnchadh Walsh have been incredible footballers for Kerry - but they aren't immortal. I see Annascaul or Castlegregory winning this group - it'll be the battle for the other spot that should be fascinating. Group 3: Ballyduff or Firies, Cordal, Asdee, Lios Póil Asdee had a very good league but I can't see them in the hunt for the title. Lios Póil have still to face a relegation battle against Knocknagoshel to see if they can stay in Division Four – a win in that one would see them primed for a good start here and another tough team to beat on home ground. Cordal were very, very unlucky last year and I can see them going further this year. But again, either Ballyduff or Firies will be the team to beat.

Group Four: Tarbert, Duagh, Scartaglen, Knocknagoshel

Looks like trips to North Kerry for Scartaglen. Tarbert, especially, was always an absolute fortress for their team – Tarbert will be worth watching out for anyway. Duagh are solid with being spectacular; I don't think they have quite enough in the bag. Knocknagoshel are well capable of beating anyone on their day – whether they could maintain it over a series of games is the question. All that said, with the likes of Eddie Horan hopefully fit enough to join his brother and a lot of good young players now established as seniors, Scartaglen just about get my nod.

Given that Jordan was one-handed from birth, it could easily have kept him out of most social activities, especially sport, from a young age. Instead it was the exact opposite, and he knows who to thank for that. "I suppose my competitive nature to drive on comes from my very supportive family always encouraging me to get involved in things, and when I got involved, in sport especially, I was always the type of guy that wasn't satisfied with what I had achieved or where I was at. So initially it started off with basketball, which was my main sport and my main discipline before I got involved in high jump, mainly because of my father being a basketball player for the National League team in Killarney. So I was always around that sort of environment of basketball. For my first couple of years I was always the type of guy that was left out onto the sideline. People would rarely pass me the ball simply because, obviously, I look different to everybody else. That was something that, I suppose, really fuelled me you know, 'these people don't really believe in me, so I'm going to prove these people wrong'. Nine years after my first ever basketball session, I became the first one-handed basketball player to represent their country nationally in the world. People thinking I can't do something and I go and do it, that really drives me and fuels me."

Jordan has pretty much always had the drive to succeed from a young age. But the truth about the elite level of sport – and it doesn't get any more elite than Tokyo 2021 – is that willpower on its own is a basic requirement but no more than that. No matter what your mind wants, your body must be able to do it – telekinesis doesn't work. And for some-one whose body weight is irregularly distributed because of only having one arm..... well, perfect technique is even more crucial. Every sport has its own techniques, few more so than the high jump. Probably the most evolutionary sports moment of the modern Olympics is the Fosbury Flop, and it's one of my favourite sports stories.

Fadó, fadó, as all good stories begin, a young lad in PE class in an American High School (they invest more in PE in school than we do, and I believe that they reap enormous health benefits across the population as a result – that's no complaint, they simply can afford bigger budgets) was instructed to do a scissors kick. This was a handy young lad at sports, but he was just terrible at the scissors kick, couldn't grasp the concept - no shame in that; I'm fairly brutal at them myself, ye'll be surprised to hear). Young Dick, for that was our hero's name,

stuck manfully to his guns. He never did become great at the scissors kick, the straddle, or the belly roll. But he did notice, with some surprise, that in the process he was somehow out-jumping everybody else on the track team. He continued to practise this unorthodox method. Everybody else used the straddle roll - essentially, flat and lifting your legs - not least because landing spots previously had generally been filled with sand, and your spine was not the first part of your body you wanted to have meet that. In the 1960s though foam mats were becoming available. Dick won the NCAA Championships and Olympic qualification in 1967, but the world wasn't paying much attention. Until Mexico City in the Summer Olympics. Out he walked, accelerated....and turned his back to do effectively a salmon leap over the crossbar. Hah? What's yer man playing? People laughed. Except that he cleared every attempt. Dick Fosbury was the new Olympic Champion and world record holder. Nowadays practically every high jumper uses the Fosbury Flop.

Including Jordan. And every high jumper needs a top quality coach. And that was where a chance meeting changed his life.

Local athletes who aspire to the very top level are very lucky to the Killarney Valley Athletic Club Arena down at St. Brendans College. Except that in the case of Jordan and his coach Tomas Griffin, it wasn't really luck.

I wouldn't be alone in feeling that athletics is somewhat under-appreciated in a country that reserves most of its passions for team field sports. Athletics is possibly too all-embracing and accessible for people to grasp how difficult the top levels are. Tomás Griffin has basically lived his life at that level. Tomás is an International competitive sprinter and long jumper across three decades. Tomás has held several Irish records both as a junior and a senior. He held the Irish indoor 50 meter sprint record of 6.12 seconds set in Bratislava, Slovakia. He previously held the Irish indoor long jump record of 6.84 meters. Tomas represented Ireland internationally as far back as 1989 in the CSIT games and has continued through 3 decades to compete as a World Class International athlete, representing Ireland in both World and European Championships in Age group categories. He has a personal best of 10.86 seconds over 100 meters and 7.12m in the long jump. In other words, Tomás Griffin meeting Jordan Lee was a bit like Pierre Curie meeting Marie Sklodowska.

"He just saw me wandering around the track one day in Castleisland in An Ríocht, and I was constantly hitting the bar with poor technique and just constantly flopping and getting mad at myself. I was with my stepdad at the time. Tomás offered to give me a hand for the rest of that session and that's how we started a relationship and he wanted to coach me at a serious level. But the one thing he said to me – and it's something that I always use – is that you have to give 100% or nothing. It's a quote that I stick by. If you're going to do it, give it 100%, or else don't do it at all. After that things really started progressing and going up in my direction."

"You definitely couldn't deny our passion" Lee says with a smile. "Myself and Tomás, we were actually physically labouring in Killarney to complete and finalise the Killarney Valley AC Arena, which is our new track that just opened. We were with the workers. We had track layer all over our hands. It took me about two weeks to scrub it off, considering I didn't have the use of my other hand to do it. So the proof was there."

Jordan has only been competing in the high jump for three years, and for all that time he has had one main target. The target may have shifted slightly because of covid including a one year delay, but the goal remained the same. Last Wednesday morning he boarded a plane, and a bit over twenty four hours later he will be arriving in Japan to compete at the high jump in the Paralympics. When he started off on this journey, it seemed like an audacious ambition from the outset – but Jordan isn't any ordinary athlete in many ways, and he hasn't been alone on this journey.

"My family have always been very supportive of anything I have done, my mother Mary, my stepfather Dermot, my Dad Jarlath, and my brothers and sisters and all my extended family. I can never say enough about how much help and support Tomás Griffin is to me. Myself and Tomás are travelling out together, and he's far more than just my coach. I've been lucky as well to have great support from Killarney and all of Kerry as my horizons have broadened, they have helped me every step of the way. I've also been lucky to have Circle K Ireland sponsoring me since 2019 and I'm delighted that the likes of Kellihers Garage in Tralee helped me so much along this way, Tim and the lads are always great to deal with."

It isn't quite down to business from the moment the plane alights. "We'll be spending the first week in a holding camp in Norita, about half an hour away from the Village itself, acclimatising. Then we'll move into the Village itself, where we'll get to experience



the buzz and excitement. I think it's a good move by the Irish team manager, James Nolan, to give us that bit of space to get our bearings before we move to the Olympic Village."

"There are eight of us on the team, four men and four women. You have people like Jason Smyth, the second fastest Irishman ever – he ran the 100 metres in 10.20 seconds. You also have Michael McKillop, nine times World Champion, possibly the greatest Paralympian ever. It's great to have people like that beside you. Like me, they love to cross over and compete successfully in able-bodied competitions and I'd like to continue that legacy when they eventually do step down."

"I'm sure Japan is going to be very different from our culture and a great experience. I wouldn't think about it too much, it's something that's out of my control anyway. I'm just looking forward to the games. Japan actually has a great understanding of paralympic sports, they have a great awareness of the interaction between human physiology and technology. They have a great enthusiasm for the Games; I honestly think that Tokyo could have been as big a success as London 2012 if crowds were allowed at events."

Of course, that isn't remotely possible. One threat above all others hangs over athletes these days, and not just athletes. "I am in a careful bubble, mainly just my family. I have to be very careful. If I get covid, I am of course straight off the team, there can be no question about that. And the covid testing is so sensitive you can get a false positive, that's another risk. But look, there's no point in being obsessive about it. You can only do the best you can."

Mind you, that particular cloud came with a silver lining for Jordan. "I've been able to work and improve on a number of things such as my run-ups and my technique. I'm after getting much faster and stronger since the start of the pandemic. Back then I was squatting 100kg using a support frame, now I'm doing 200kg without the frame. Obviously it's great to be able to get stronger and faster, but it brings its own challenges as well. The change in muscle distribution and movement means that you have to change technically as well. I've worked hard on both and I feel that I'm close to 'clicking', producing the best kind of performance I can."

Certainly Jordan's form in the European Paralympic Championships is a good sign. He came fourth in possibly the strongest field ever for the event, with Russian Georgii Margiev taking the title. Most people would see that as a massive achievement, but the standards Jordan

sets himself see it as one that got away. "I ended up fourth but I was just one centimetre away from second," he says a little ruefully. "Look, I can seem a bit harsh, I suppose, when I achieve things, but I'm just focussed on improving and concentrating on the next step. One thing that every top athlete needs to have is confidence in themselves, and Jordan is willing to back himself when the chips are down. "I'm the type of guy that definitely doesn't get overnervous. I get excited more so. I think every athlete has some bit of nerves, whether they want to admit it or not, and I think that's something that's okay as well. But in terms of competition, and when I'm in the call room twenty minutes before the competition starts, I'm always the guy that's at the front of the line, because I always want to make my presence sort of known around the field in a nice, genuine way. I'm the first guy marking my approach, the first guy taking my warm-up jump, so I sort of lay down my territory. At the end of the day we all get on well but it's a competition. I'm not anybody's friend, I want to jump the bar and I want to compete to the very best of my ability. That's always been my mentality. When it comes to competition, I'm just very motivated by success and by the possibility of performing to my very best. To be honest, I've just turned 21 and I'm lucky to live the life I do, so I think it's important for me to remember that every now and again."

Jordan has focussed firmly on his goal for

three years. Essentially, it will all culminate in a combined jumping time of thirty seconds. It's that fast. "In a way, qualification is nearly harder for the Paralympics, because you have to qualify for the final straightaway. There are no heats. There will be 8 to 10 of us lined up in the final."

"I don't focus on other athletes too much, I concentrate on my own efforts, but I'd know the rankings and have a fair idea who to watch out for. You have to - the high jump is very strategic. Someone whos PB is 190 is likely to start at around 175cm, some-one whose PB is 2m is likely to start at 190cm. If two jumpers finish at the same height, it goes to countback and that involves how many jumps you took i.e. how low you started at (more is better, but saps a lot of energy) or how many attempts you took (less is better). I remember being at the University Games and myself and another competitor just had no idea which one of us was in the medals! Thankfully, it was me, but it could just as easily have gone the other way."

You would think that Tokyo is a very long way from Killarney. 9803Km to be precise. Over twenty four hours on a plane.

That's nothing. Jordan Lee has travelled much further and much longer. In the end it will come down to a matter of seconds and millimetres. Jordan will be trying to do everybody in Kerry proud. He doesn't know that he already has.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

BACK TO SCHOOL CLOTHING AND FOOTWEAR ALLOWANCE

Question: am getting the COVID-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment. I have one child starting school in September. Can I qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance?

Answer: Yes, you can. To qualify for this payment which helps with back to school costs, you must be getting a social welfare payment or taking part in a training, employment or adult education scheme. People getting the COVID-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment, the Working Family Payment or the Back to Work Family Dividend can qualify. Your application will be means-tested and your total family income must be below a certain level for your family size.






