

Chairman of Kerry Friends of Motor Neurone Christy Lehane thanked both Elizabeth and Peggy Kelleher and especially their friend Kenneth Galvin for selecting KFMN as the beneficiary of the Ceili. As always, this money will be put to good use to purchase specialist medical equipment, supporting our six special medical nurses and all of this in mind in allowing MND patients to spend as much time as possible in their own homes. Bishop Ray commissioned 25 people as pastoral leaders at 12 noon Mass in St Mary's Cathedral, Killarney on Sunday February 9th last.

Kíllarney welcome for **LOOP WALK PLANNING DECISION**

here has been a widespread welcome in Killarney for the decision to grant

planning permission for a raised platform over a scenic walkway and cycleway in the national park that will provide spectacular views over Muckross Lake and the surrounding landscape.

The project, which will complete the existing Dinis to Torc loop, will be built on an elevated platform to maintain and protect the natural habitat beneath.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service said the most significant benefit will be on safety grounds as pedestrians and cyclists enjoying the attraction must currently travel along the busy N71 road to complete the route.

This new raised cycleway and walkway feature will connect the Dinis car park and Torc car park and it will remove any requirement for people to take a risk by travelling on the main Killarney-Kenmare road.

Currently, the only possible option is via an 800m dangerous stretch of the N71where cyclists and pedestrians are forced to share the narrow road, which contains several dangerous bends, with vehicular traffic, including tour buses.

The new development will feature spectacular, elevated views across Muckross Lake and it will be fully accessible for people with disability or mobility issues.

The planning permission was granted subject to 18 conditions. Welcoming the development, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce said the finished Dinis to Torc Loop will be yet another major attraction for locals and visitors to enjoy safely.



Following the granting of planning permission Dinis Cottage will now be accessible for walkers and cyclists by a raised platform from Torc.

"Safety was always our main concern as the narrow and winding N71 is not suitable for walkers and cyclists to travel safely," Chamber said.

"This development is well overdue having been mooted and discussed at length for more than a decade".

The loop offers one of the best ways to experience the incredible beauty of Killarney National Park with opportunities to explore historical sites like Muckross Abbey, Dinis Cottage and Old Weir Bridge.

"The new addition will offer an accessible option with gentle inclines and it is suitable for all, whether one is a seasoned hiker or just looking for a peaceful walk in nature and the project will have minimal environmental impact," the Chamber executive noted.

"We are very grateful to the NPWS and all those who worked so hard to get this project over the line and we look forward to the work being completed at an early stage".

The planning decision has also been enthusiastically welcomed by the Kerry Tourism Industry Confederation.

Chairperson, Pat O'Leary, said this piece of infrastructure is long overdue, primarily on safety grounds on such a dangerous section of roadway.

"The benefit to both locals and visitors as an amenity will be immense as it will become an iconic feature of the renowned Dinis loop route," he said.

"Continued investment in tourismrelated infrastructure in the county is critical to preserving the county's reputation as the tourism capital of Ireland. "The commitment of Kerry County Council, NPWS, Fáilte Ireland and other State bodies to the ongoing development of the tourism product in Kerry is to be commended," Mr O'Leary stated.

Irish Hotels Federation Kerry branch Chairman, Brian Lawlor, said the completed project is going to have a huge impact and it will make such a wonderful attraction more accessible to locals and visitors and much safer for everybody to use.

"With the huge amount of people that want to visit and appreciate the sheer beauty of Killarney, this really has the potential to be a game-changer," he said.

"From Killarney's point of view it's another wonderful attraction and for those that appreciate the great outdoors and splendid scenery, it is a real bonus," Mr Lawlor said.



HEALTH MOVEMENTS

Bord Pleanala has given the go-ahead for a private 90-bed nursing home and almost fifty elderly independent living units on a four acre site at the edge of the Ballycasheen junction. The main building will be up to five-storeys

And in the meantime the 130 bed community hospital is taking longer than expected despite publicity shots prior to the general election.

There is other movement on that St Finan's site - and plenty of wind now behind the idea to locate all health facilities near each other just off the N22.

The primary care centre is to be temporarily located in St Finan's, Michael Cahill TD has discovered. It makes sense to have all health including a minor injuries clinic located on the one easily accessed site, as Vera Wall and other sensible people have pointed out. Time for some joined up thinking between

HSE and council and move away from the odd proposal for the primary care centre at Aras Phádraig on the clogged Lewis Road?

By the way, the lack of shuttle services in and around Killarney was raised by the Ballycasheen and Woodford residents in their observations on the large development near them.

Really this is something that has to be looked at. We need regular shuttle bus transport to join up Killarney which alas seems to have no centre anymore.

People are shunting between Deerpark, Lidl and the Reeks and the town seems to be everywhere and nowhere. A shuttle - from the centre - would help bring it together again.

FREE RAIL ONLY TRAVEL FOR OUR KERRY TDS WOULD BE A FIRST STEP FOR AN IMPROVED RAIL SERVICE

While we have no Luas service, interconnectedness is also a huge challenge for us in Kerry. Why is the rail line between Mallow and Killarney so slow and continuously needing repair? The line was opened in the 1850s thanks to a decade of concerted effort by Killarney business, church leaders and landlords. Which needs to be honoured.

Work on the tracks - it could be the title of a Bob Dylan album - seems constant and people having to be bussed to Mallow. Why in the 21st century a journey of 300 kms by rail to Dublin takes 3.5 hours is something we really should question. The fastest trains in Ireland are the intercity between Cork - via Mallow

- and Dublin. They can reach a top speed of 200 km an hour. That is twice the speed on the Kerry to Mallow section The top trains in Europe from Italy to Germany to France go at about 350 kms an hour.

There is a half-hearted commitment in the programme for Government for better rail. But the programme is foremost about an "All-Island" rail network. That means the emphasis will be on the Ulster networks - which is barely under our jurisdiction at all - rather than on south west Munster.

Irish Rail tell me they have a strategy for frequency improvement, and "our goal is to move to every hour at peak, with the existing every two hours at off-peak".

"Similarly, getting improved journey times on Dublin to Cork line will yield journey time savings to / from Tralee also – this is being examined in the context of the All-Island Strategic Rail Review, including any infrastructure interventions needed."

I asked about Heuston which has no general warm waiting room and am told it has "extensive concourse seating". Grand if you are a polar bear, I thought to myself thinking of freezing hours on those seats.

The real solution to improving our train services is our Government TDs. Now we have four of them. Last time I checked none, only Pa Daly used the rail service to get to Leinster House on any regular basis. Kerry TDs are furthest from Dublin and so on the biggest road expenses. Take away the expenses and issue the TDs and senators with free rail tickets, is my suggestion. We'd soon see a better rail service to Dublin.

BEYOND TIME TO DO UP OUR PUBLIC PALACES AND COTTAGES

It is beyond time to do up our publicly owned buildings - and make them habitable. I still lament the sale of the Presentation Convent. The nuns should have been approached by alert public representatives. And their own representatives should have steadied themselves and acted as the sisters in Kenmare did and offered the building to the community at a reasonable price.

The demand to do up HSE owned St Finan's or knock it should be on everyone's lips in Killarney. I think it is stressing the mental health of the town at this stage: a huge empty building looming over us and at the same time not one emergency bed in Killarney for our homeless or those being evicted.

Everyone I know brings the subject up. The council should have delisted it. It was a major error by the executive.

Then there seems to be no plans at all for the community and Columbanus, as Killarney councillor Niall O'Callaghan keeps trying to highlight.

But there are others too. All NPWS owned. I am personally distressed at the sight of my Uncle Tom's house near the main Muckross House entrance. Tom was born on Valentine's Day and was the loveliest of men and he and Delia the happiest of couples. Theirs was a proud home full of warmth and cooking and laughter and coming and going and look at it now? The roof fallen in and all dirty and disheveled. They would have been so embarrassed and appalled. There is a similar situation near the Muckross Park Hotel and the Mangerton Road with once cared for family homes. Slates gone etc.

I wonder if the Trustees of Muckross House could be inveigled upon to row in and maybe even contribute? They have an income now of Euro 10.5



million from trading and commercial activities. That is according to their latest accounts - year ended 2023- filed with the Charities Regulator. It was the Trustees who bought the Friars' Glen guesthouse and lands on behalf of the NPWS, senior civil servants told me.

A couple of bob would not go astray for the renovation of Uncle Tom's picture pink cottage and other once proud Muckross family homes too to cheer up passing tourists and locals.

Meanwhile "it is the policy of the NPWS and Killarney National Park to upgrade, refurbish and repair the old and historic houses and structures located in the Park. Works have been completed at a number of properties in the Park over the past 3 years, and plans are underway to engage in the repair and maintenance at the properties you mention," the NPWS said.

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed the move by 21 Kerry schools to promote a smartphone-free childhood.

These schools in the Killarney region are working with parents and encouraging them to come together and support the policy of a smartphone-free childhood experience.

This is in line with the Keeping Childhood Smartphone Free policy launched by Minister Foley during her term as Minister for Education. Minister Foley visited St Oliver's National School in Killarney to officially launch the policy with all the schools taking part.

She said: "I was absolutely thrilled to meet with students and principals from the 21 schools. It's a phenomenal show of leadership by these schools as they work together to keep childhood smartphone-free."

Schools, parents' associations and students around the country have been coming together to adopt similar "smartphone free" polices to improve children's socialisation and to reduce the risks of online bullying and exposure to inappropriate material online. 

TERTIARY COURSES PROVIDE AN ALTERNATIVE ROUTE TO A DEGREE



PRIORITY

For some time now, a priority of Government has been the creation of a unified tertiary system providing pathways for progression across and between different institutions. The National Tertiary Office (NTO) was established two years ago to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI).

LINKS

A links scheme already exists between Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses and HEI's. However, the number of places available to PLC graduates in the links scheme is limited and there is no guarantee of success, particularly in sought after courses, such as nursing.

TERTIARY

Tertiary courses developed by HEIs and Education and Training Boards (ETB) offer guaranteed pathways from further education to higher education, which are driven by an applicant's career interests rather than points achieved in the Leaving Cert exam. Tertiary courses look beyond grades and points. They provide a definite path to a third level qualification where progression from further to higher education will be completely seamless. **COLLABORATION**

Munster TU (MTU) is collaborating with ETB Cork and ETB Kerry to provide tertiary courses in General and Mental Health Nursing while tertiary courses in Business, Visual Arts and Software Development are pending and may be available this year. Other Technological Universities participating in the tertiary scheme this year are TU Shannon (TUS), Atlantic TU (ATU), South East TU (SETU), as well as Institute of Art, Design and Technology, Dun Laoghaire (IADT) and National College Ireland (NCI). University College Cork (UCC) is collaborating with Cork ETB to provide a Degree in Social Work. More traditional universities are collaborating on the development of joint tertiary courses but it is not yet known whether any will be ready for 2026 entry. Tertiary courses are a wonderful development and have expanded from about thirty courses last year to an expected fifty plus courses in 2025.

APPLY

Applying for a tertiary course is straight forward. An applicant can apply directly through the course information page of the NTO website, www.nto.ie, from 1st February to late September. The website also provides a full list of courses for 2025. The tertiary course enables an applicant to start a degree at an ETB college and complete it at a university. **JOINT**

UINI

A tertiary course is a joint further and higher education degree programme. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the ETB but will complete the remainder of the course in the local higher education colleges. It varies from one year to two years studying in the FET college, depending on the course. It's expected than more than fifty tertiary courses will commence this September in area like Business, Digital Business, Business Tourism, Business Psychology, Media Production, Applied Sports Science, Nursing, Information Technology Management, Public Health, Sustainable Engineering Technology and Social work. It's fairly certain that additional degree programmes will be available before the closing date for applications.

REGISTERED

From day one of a tertiary course, students are registered at both the ETB where they are commencing their course and the partnered university. This provides the student with access to dual supports and services including libraries, sports, and other campus facilities as well as academic, health and wellbeing supports.

ENTRY

You don't need the same leaving certificate points for a tertiary course as a person applying for the same degree via the CAO. Different tertiary course programmes have different entry requirements. An applicants may be required to submit proof from other agencies to show s/he is eligible and meet the entry requirements for the course s/he is applying for. Refer to the course information section in the course page of the NTO website for those details. The course provider will be able to advise you of any additional paperwork which is required for your application. The contact details for the course coordinator can be found in the course page.

PATHWAY

Tertiary courses are a new pathway to a Bachelor's degree, at Level 8 or Level 7. The course information section in the course page of the website details the qualification available. Applications for the courses are open since 1st February. Applications for tertiary course are separate from applications to CAO and from applications for PLC Courses.

Cork/Kerry health services now and bring our facilities, etc, up to a modern day standard" said the Fianna Fáil TD.

"The South West has been let down by CAMHS, Waiting Lists, District Nurse availability, etc, and it is time that the HSE correct the imbalance and give the high standard of Healthcare to our people, that they deserve" added Michael Cahill TD.

SECTION 39 WORKERS RAISED IN DAIL EIREANN

Deputy Danny Healy raised the issue of Section 39 workers in Dail Eireann this week.

Here is what he had to say:

What will the Government do about section 39 workers, who have been left behind for so long, regarding pay parity and conditions? They are about to strike shortly. They are calling for industrial action and I feel they have no choice but to do that because they have been promised for so long. These section 39 workers do Trojan work in Kerry around people with disabilities and all the other little problems they have. They do the very same work as section 38 workers but are not paid the same. It is not fair that two sections do the same work but one is paid less. These workers have been promised parity for so long. When will the Government honour the promise made here between 2016 and 2019?

Deputy Jack Chambers replied:

1 thank the Deputy. The Government recognises the essential work carried out by community and voluntary health and social care organisations and their staff and the reliance of the State on these organisations to deliver important supports and services in the communities we represent. The programme for Government commits to working with the voluntary sector through industrial relations mechanisms and other processes to progress pay issues affecting the delivery of disability services and the longterm viability of organisations within the sector.

Relevant Departments have proactively engaged with unions and employers on pay funding in a process facilitated by the Workplace Relations Commission, WRC. Talks at the WRC were adjourned around the time of the general election. Ministers in relevant Departments are seeking an early opportunity to restart engagement with unions and employers through the WRC to provide certainty to the sector as soon as possible.



KERRY GREENS ELECT NEW CHAIR

The Kerry Green Party had their AGM last Saturday in Scott's Hotel, Killarney. It was an opportunity for members to gather and reflect on the busy year of 2024. Although, it was not a good year for Green politics nationally, Kerry Green candidates increased their vote share by running competent candidates.

Although hardworking ministers like Malcolm Noonan lost his seat in Dail Eireann, he topped the poll in the agricultural panel for Seanad elections recently.

Malcolm Noonan, as Nature minister often visited Kerry and Killarney and increased spending during his time in Government.

'The environment of Kerry is worth protecting' says new chairman, Diarmaid Griffin. 'As a proud Killarney man, I will continue to advocate for the safeguarding of our natural environment, on which our tourism industry depends'. and meetings. Over the next year or so, attention will be on the local community and the grassroots of environmental stewardship'.

Newly elected Fianna Fail TD, Michael Cahill has called on the Minister for Transport, Darragh O Brien to urgently make provision for a new Bus Route in Kerry, which would provide a service from Beaufort via Churchtown, St. Mary's of the Angels, Meanus and onto Killorglin town. Deputy Cahill has outlined to the Minister that the demand for this service is very high, that it would cover a large hinterland, with a large population. This would be in invaluable service for the area and allow for easy access from the surrounding areas to and from St. Marv's of the Angels and to and from Killorglin and Beaufort. 





Siofra O'Shea struck for 1-4 and Danielle O'Leary for 1-3 as Kerry had too much power for a Kildare side that kept trying to the end in an entertaining game at Fitzgerald Stadium in Division One of the Lidl National Football League.

In a low scoring first half it was the home side that ruled the roost as they took a three-point lead, 1-3 to 0-3, into the dressing room at half-time.

Dooley sliced over a brilliant free off her right and after O'Connell spurned a goal chance for Kerry, Lara Curran popped over a lovely score for the visitors, the last score of the half, but it was Kerry that took in a 1-3 to 0-3 lead at the half time whistle.

Kerry were well on top in the second half as they outscored the visitors by 1-6 to 0-4 with O'Shea's goal in the 38th minute that put Kerry 2-6 to 0-4 ahead a major factor in the outcome. O'Leary's '45 fell into O'Shea's hands and the full-forward was on hand to finish low and hard past Hulgraine, her third goal in as many games.



DONEGAL RECORD **A WIN IN KILLARNEY** NATIONAL LEAGUE: Donegal 0-23 Kerry 1-18

It was actually nice. Like a lot of people, I went into the Corn uí Mhuirí match and just went across the road afterwards, a miniscule stroll to the Park to watch Kerry v Donegal. I had been very happy to get out of Celtic Park with points in the bag, even if I still think there was a little touch of larceny about it, but I wasn't overly hopeful against Donegal, who are far more up to speed than us right now. I'll say it again; February is a month for shaping and evolving a team. I'd be worried if I thought we were the finished article at this stage. I needn't have been worried about that!

I do have to touch on two things. One is the stewarding, it was genuinely spectacular in both places, way above and beyond any reasonable expectations. A small thing, you might say, but it takes a lot of doing by a lot of people and it puts a smile on people's faces. The other is less welcome. That match programme for the Kerry Donegal game that thing would have been a disgrace even if it was given out for free. And it wasn't people were charged three euro for that piece of fantasy literature. You'd be closer to the starting teams on both sides if you just pulled names out of a bag at random. Not good enough. Honestly, I have felt for a long time that county boards should be fined for changes to the named team within 72 hours of throw-in. I don't think this was a deliberate attempt to hoodwink people. I think it was just laziness, and in a way, that's treating people with even worse contempt.

Arrah, it didn't spoil a good day. A freezing cold day (one person told me that it was "nice and fresh" - the sort of thing a shaved polar bear might say on a day like that).

Game on. Donegal looked very fit. Conor O'Donnell made the first break, but his fistedeffort came back off the crossbar. We were cut open a bit easy there.

Ryan McHgh with a two pointer. That's a great kick. Donegal are one of the best teams around at having defenders slip into shooting positions. It's perfectly timed and like a lot of Ulster teams, they don't really have specialists for particular positions.

Even worse, though, they are pressing very successfully on our kick-outs and it's paying rich dividends already (Diarmuid O'Connor will soon enough stamp his mark in the middle third; he has made a brilliant start to this year) with two points for Shane O'Donnell. They have a lot done; we are looking tentative at the moment, maybe even rattled. Early days, but this wasn't looking good at all.

Paul Geaney calmed the nerves with a good score. The umpires appeared to hesitate for a second, but that was clearly over. Donal Down was fouled - fairly needlessly, I would say - and it's a simple one for Seán O'Shea. I always like when our freetaker scores the first one; I think it gives the whole team confidence.

Another Kerry free, this one slotted over by Conor Geaney. Donegal don't like us running at them. One of my hopes for the new rules (cards on the table; I am a massive fan so far - the early games of the championship, let alone the league, have bored me for the last number of years) is that they bring back old school one on one defending. Less hunting in packs, please, and more skill and guile.

Shane O'Donnell fisted over. Good burst of pace, in fairness. Barry Dan O'Sullivan with a rejoinder. Barry Dan is doing well for Kerry. Dylan Geaney with another. All of the Geaneys were looking lively, no surprise there.

There's a sting. Donegal free, innocuous enough, but correct call. No big deal....except that Kerry don't hand the ball back, and it's brought forward 50 metres. I don't care whether you like the rule or not. I personally think it's asking too much to have a player hand the ball back and stand motionless while a player takes a solo and go. Just drop the ball in place - but if you knock the ball away, that's a deliberate delaying tactic and I'd be fine with the referee bring that one up. No leeway and no bluster. But that was handing a very easy score to Donegal. I'd be fair cross about that one. Ye know the rules, lads, and if ye can't grasp them, then ye shouldn't be here. Even worse, pPatrick McBrearty opted to bring it back outside the arc for a two pointer. That's a costly mistake by Kerry. We got caught with just two players in Donegal's half as well - that's a bit more forgivable, careless rather than indisciplined. McBrearty opted for another two pointer, thankfully it curled just wide.

Conor O'Donnell took a hit but recovered to notch his score. 0-8 to 0-6. I'm happy enough



with it. We aren't playing great but we are taking our chances and staying in touch.

Tadhg Morley hobbles off. A loss, of course, but I'm actually glad to see Mike Breen get game time. If he doesn't get it in these games, he certainly wouldn't be getting any later on. Mike has been very unlucky with injuries but there is no doubting his talent. Can he stake a place? I don't know, but I guarantee he won't find out without coming off the bench and on to grass. Yes, there is a certain ruthless 'sink or swim' about it, but why not? Do you think footballers like this want to stay in paddling pools?

Brilliant by Oisín Gallen. Drew two players and timed the pass to McHugh perfectly, and the wing back takes his second two pointer of the day. That one stung, no question about it. Eoghan Ban Gallagher (is that not the most Donegal name you have ever heard?) fisted over another one. Our defence is in serious trouble. Just before the break, Gallen slotted over a free. Ouch. Just as I thought we were doing okay, now we are seriously floundering. Jack O'Connor has a few things to ponder in the half-time dressing room. with Kerry suddenly trailing by 0-11 to 0-7. Can't exactly say it isn't a fair scoreline on the balance of play.

Seán O'Shea pointed after some fluid Kerry play at the start of the second half. Dyaln eaney neatly slipped his marker and the gap is back to two points. Scoring forwards.....it's a simple game when it's played right.

High ball dropping into the Donegal square.... that's a mighty leap by Diarmuid O'Connor as he fists it over the bar. Was there a goal on? Arrah not really, no point in being too greedy. This is a lot better by Kerry.

Oisín Gallen with a great two pointer. That's a powerful weapon being used well by Donegal. With the likes of Barry Dan, Seán O'Shea, Diarmuid O'Connor, Tom O'Sullivan, Paul Geaney....we have distance shooters and I'd like to see us going for more of those. Donegal have clearly worked on getting long range shooters free on the end of moves. It's

early days for Kerry. It'll come.

Donegal won the kick-out and Ciarán Moore sprinted for goal before unleashing a rocket that crashes off the crossbar and over. Another let-off.

Ah, there's the Tom O'Sullivan we know and love! Great point.

It was a very brief respite. Donegal seem able to lift their game at will. Patrick McBrearty picked off a neat score. McBrearty is the last player I can remember making his senior inter-county debut before his Leaving Cert. - it used to be relatively common in the days where fourteen year olds were doing an adult's manual labour and walking or cycling everywhere, but life has changed and strength and conditioning has advanced far beyond former limitations.

0-17 to 0-11. Kerry were in trouble, but Kerry responded well. Graham O'Sullivan got forward for a nice score. Conor Geaney pointed another free. Cathal Ó Beaglaíoch, not long on the pitch, announced himself by splitting the posts. Seán O'Shea added another free. Just like that, Donegal's lead is back down to three points. We could take something out of his game yet.

Or maybe not. Fine score by Ciarán Thompson.

62 minutes played. The clock is ticking away. I do like the certainty of the hooter, and I think it takes a lot of pressure off of referees. There have always been psuedo-experts claiming after defeat that he referee played too much or too little injury time (I've actually made it a habit to keep the stopwatch running until the final whistle just so I know exactly how much injury time was played. That's no longer an issue, and that's a good thing.

Kerry pulled goals out of the bag, good goals, to snatch the win off Derry. They actually might be able to do it again. Paudie Clifford carries into the square and lays off for Diarmuid O'Connor to fist home. Suddenly it's just a one point game.

Two point game as Conor O'Donnell splits the posts. I was in school with a Dingle lad named Conor O'Donnell, a really nice guy, who went on to play National League for Kerry in 1995. Good footballer as well.

Seán O'Shea with a two pointer! Level pegging! I'd take a draw. Take it? I'd love it. It's the hope that kills you. Jamie Brennan with one last big kick for Donegal to win it by two points.

We can't really complain. In fact, a fairly experimental Kerry keeping a fairly seasoned Donegal side to within two points is not ad going at all. We are on the right road, albeit we have a fair distance to travel along it yet. The Dr. Crokes home ground in Lewis Rd. was a cheerful riot of colour and noise as Mercy Mounthawk and St. Brendans supporters gathered to cheer on their sides in the Munster Post Primary Corn úi Mhuirí Final. It was immediately obvious that his clash of giants was going to live up to all the billing. Straight from the throw-in, big Jamie Moynihan rose high to gather and sent a great pass into Ben Kelliher, with the winning Frewen captain coolly bisecting the posts for the opening score. Not to be outdone, Mounthawk took the kick-out fast and an equally clever long pass into Aaron Harte saw him fire over an equaliser - he might well have thought about testing Kacper Robak from that range had he wished. There was scarcely a minute on the clock already. The Sem came again with a long probing move, but ended up taking one pass too many against a resolute Mounthawk defence and David Sargent made the interception. Once again they broke fast, Ben Murphy and Cormac Bastible combining to tee up Harte for another goal chance, but this time Robak was out fast to deflect he shot for a fruitless '45. Mounthawk were posing the greater threat with long balls into their dangerous forward line and looking for an early goal a regular feature of their games along the way. It didn't take long to arrive in this game,

either, with the outstanding Ben Murphy making a surging run before passing across To Padraig O'Halloran for a simple finish. 1-1 to 0-1.

That seemed to spark Mounthawk, who began to assume control. David Sargent teed up Tomás Kelliher to fist over. Ben Murphy made a great turnover and set off on another sprint that was illegally ended, with Paddy Lane neatly slotting the resultant free. Another Ben Murphy turnover saw Lane score his first point from play. 1-5 to 0-1 - things were starting to look ominous for the Sem.

Things didn't get any better for them when Jamie Moynihan spotted Ben Kelliher unobtrusively drifting behind the defence and found him with another sumptuous pass, only for Ruairí Kennedy to deny the sharpshooter with a great save from close range. A Sem goal at that stage could well have been a huge turning point, but we'll never know for sure.

It did seem to kick-start the Sem's resistance, though. Joey McCarty slotted a good free to double their tally and added another after good work by Josh Bowler.

Ben Murphy set up his midfield partner Daniel Kirby for a point and Seán Corkery almost had another, only for Kacper Robak to reach high and claw it out from over his crossbar. Nonetheless reigning champions Mercy Mounthawk must have trooped in at half-time with a sense of satisfaction and a 1-6 to 0-4 lead in hand.

The Sem were very far from done, though, and came out of the half-time dressing room with real intent. Josh Bowler opened the second half scoring with a beauty and Mark O'Carroll soon added another. Just a goal between the sides now, and potential drama looming. Once again, though, the more experienced heads of Mountahwk came to the fore. Seán Corkery changed the momentum with a good score of his own. Ben Murphy, a colossus all day long, added another, and the irrepressible Paddy Lane restored the six point gap.

Then came the real knock-out blow, Paddy Lane sending a high ball out of the clouds onto the St. Brendans' square, and Tomás Kennedy made a really stupendous catch – one worthy of his legendary namesake Paddy who lorded the intercounty skies for Kerry almost a century ago, before rolling ome. 2-9 to 0-6.

Still the Sem refused to buckle; that has never been in their nature. Cian Mulcahy had battled hard all day and he split to posts to kickstart the resistance to fate. Liam O'Brien wasn't long on the pitch when he opened his account.Paddy Lane and Joey McCarthy exchanged frees.

Great pressure by Ben Kelliher forced a kickout turnover and he flicked it across to Josh Bowler, whose left-legged volley curled just a the wrong side of the post.

The Sem were pushing hard now. Could a goal at that point have turned the narrative? I suspect that Mounthawk had another kick in them. Jamie Moynihan, their best player all year, sent another great ball into young Ben Kelliher and he was dragged down as he closed in on goal. Up stepped Joey McCarthy to the penalty spot, but Ruairí Kennedy read his intentions perfectly and managed to get his body in the way. Another great save, another goal chance gone a-begging for the Sem. Joey McCarty did pick off one last defiant free for them, but Paddy Lane with a '45 had the last say of this year's Corn uí Mhuirí Championship. For the second year in a row and the second time in their history, Mercy Mounthawk will be looking to get back to Croke Park for a Hogan Cup Final. On the strength of this showing, and indeed their form all year, I don't think anyone will doubt that Munster are sending their best representatives forward. But there's a lot of water to flow under that bridge just yet!

SIX NATIONS IRELAND 32 SCOTLAND 18

Look, I refuse point blank to dress it up. We all knew which team would be coming out of Edinburgh with the points. I'm not knocking Scotland, not with the likes of Van der Merwe, Finn Russell, Huw Jones, et al, but they haven't got the depth of Ireland. If we are being even more honest, I will say that I suspect that some Irish players may not be fluent gaeilgóirí, but to be fair, it's not like l can claim as much myself. Ireland are looking for a three-peat of the Six Nations ("threepeat". No, whether it's about the Six Nations or the Superbowl, it's the kind of phrase that would have Fr. Jack Hackett punching Fr. Ted Crilly, and rightly so) and it was never a secret that the two big obstacles were going to be England and France. Scotland have improved a lot, but they were never likely to match us for power or width.

A bit of kicking tennis early on. Ireland are content to soak up Scottish pressure and go long. Blar Kinghorn tries a chip and chase – I like the ambition but that's not going to catch us so early. Nice move by Ireland, stringing a run together. Scotland old out, but at the expense of penalties. I can't see them holding on for eighty minutes of this, especially with the power sitting on Ireland's bench.

There we go. Ireland spreading wide, lovely pass by Prendergast (this is the kind of game where I can see him thriving better than Crowley, to be honest, he has that fraction more vision for opening the play). Calvin Nash will never score an easier try, and Prendergast converts nicely. 7-0.

Great defensive steal by Rory Sutherland and Scotland get to break. They don't get far, but that's a warning note for Ireland.

Yellow card for van der Merwe for impeding Calvin Nash. I say 'impeding' because to be fair there wasn't much in it, but he knew what he was doing at the same time. That's a good decision. Ireland end up with a maul and actually get over the line, but can't touch it own. That's magnificent defending by the Scots, it really is, and they do it a few more times.

A bad clash of heads. Scotland are down a man and they have just lost Graham and Russell. To make it worse for them, their superb defending is undone by a soft and careless penalty and Prendergast puts it

over. 10 to 0.

On the half hour mark, combination good by Gibson Park and Prendergast slices Scotland open and Caelan Doris powers over. Prendergast adds the two points. 17-0. I can't see Scotland coming back into this. Tough out, brave as always, but Ireland have that little bit more in every aspect of the game.

Duhan van der Merwe would grace any team and that's a superb finish. Good play by Scotland, but I think maybe we were napping a small bit. He shouldn't be getting in from there - then again, mass multiplied acceleration.....I bv won't lie, I'd have been gettin well out of his way! 17-5. Kinghorn is very close with the conversion effort, but

no cigar. Nonetheless that's a big, and badly wanted, confidence boost for Scotland just before half-time.

Nice and direct by a wind-assisted Scotland on the resumption. Blair Kinghorn slots an early penalty. A rugby match might break out here yet!

Great break by Scotland. Was that a knockon by Henshaw? Hmmm....accidental while making an honest attempt to tackle....a small but lenient, to my thinking. Scotland are putting the pressure on big time now, and Blair Kinghorn confidently sends another penalty over. 17 – 11. This is starting to get very interesting.

Spilled restart by Scotland and suddenly Ireland are streaking forward. This is clinical. One slight misstep by Scotland, and suddenly Ireland are parked right on their doorstep. Great pressure by Ireland and it's Lowe who finally gets over. That one looked inevitable from a long way out. Another good kick by Prendergast and it's 24-11.

Wales up next. Wales aren't in a good place either – we can complain about the dominance of Leinster, but domestic rugby in Wales is really struggling. I'd fancy Ireland for that one as well. To be honest, the Six Nations (well, five for most of my lifetime) has always been ripe or a shock result, but the advent of professionalism has made it a little more predictable. We'll see.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.







"..Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit says the Lord... do not despise the days of small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin" (Zechariah 4:6+10).

Welcome back dear student, last week we spoke about how precious and fleeting our time is. Nowadays, it's all about goal setting, results and dreaming big. Achieving milestones and completing wish lists bring a feel-good factor. But how to go from 'zero to hero' catches many. Discouragement can set in when things don't work out and desires aren't accomplished. A lot of dreams are stunted from trauma, causing some to not be able to 'look forward' with hope. Unresolved emotional pain can impact one's destiny. Some turn to addictive substances or destructive behaviours for comfort – habits then dominate, and life spirals out of control. Watching others getting on, doing life successfully, may spawn jealousy and self-hatred. 'Why can't I do that...what's wrong with me?' Comparison is a deadly disease. It's gotten worse with social media. Now people promote toned bodies, five-star homes, designer pets, cars and lifestyles: you name it and it's there – constantly. For anyone not on the same ladder of 'success' looking at all these glossy reels can drive them further into despair, and the cycle worsens. Anxiety, depression and low self-esteem become strongholds as a result.

In Philippians chapters three and four, Paul the apostle makes inspiring observations. Even though things didn't work out as he thought they should (he was in prison) Paul was actively learning through his trials.... 1) That it is possible to be content even in difficult situations - conditions don't have to dictate whether one enjoys life or not, because circumstances can change. ...2) Past experiences and hurts need to be processed with God then released and left behind, so that one can move forward, untangled, and unrestrained. ...3) Leaning on God's strength, by understanding His Faithfulness to the promises in His Word, causes us to be able for anything life throws at us – "I can do all things through Christ Who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13; Proverbs 3:5-8). ...4) What God ordains He provides for, so when we follow Jesus' leading and obey His Word – God's will over ours - the Lord will look after every need... "my God shall supply all your needs through His Power in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19; Matthew 6:31-34).

The place of promise is the place of provision. Why did God refer to Himself as the Good Shepherd? (Ezekiel 34:11-31) Jesus revealed Himself as the Good Shepherd Who knows His sheep, calls them by name, leads and protects them (John chapter 10). And Psalm 23 is surely the most perfect picture of rest in God's Presence. "The Lord is my Shepherd (to feed, to quide and to shield me), I shall not want" (Psalm 23:1 Amplified Bible).
