SUCCESSFUL HUGH O'FLAHERTY CENTENARY COMMEMORATION TOUR OF ROME

Agroup of 60 Members and Friends of the Hugh O'Flaherty Memorial Society have just returned from a most enjoyable and informative 5th tour of Rome. An action packed 3 days – missing only the Papal Audience which was cancelled due to the Pope's illness.

The key event on the schedule was a concelebrated mass in the chapel of the old Propaganda Fide College, where Hugh O'Flaherty was ordained 100 years ago in 1925. This special commemorative mass was Celebrated by Archbishop John Kennedy (Vatican Holy Office), Rectors from a number of Colleges in Rome and four priests from Kerry i.e., Canon Tom Looney, Fr Donal Looney, Fr John Ahern and Fr John Joe Spring.

Special guests included the Ambassadors from the United Kingdom, Germany, Netherlands and Ireland. Included also were representatives from the O'Flaherty family and the family of Henrietta Chevalier, one of the brave women who provided safe houses for Hugh O'Flaherty's Escape Line.

Also in attendance was Princess Gesine Doria Pamphilj, granddaughter of one of the Monsignor's most important benefactors, Prince Filippo Andrea Doria Pamphilij. Those of you who have read the books and/or seen the movie The Scarlet and the Black, will recall that it was from Prince Andrea's Palace (Palazzo Doria on Via del Corso) that Hugh O'Flaherty evaded capture by the Gestapo when he escaped from

the coal cellar disguised as a coalman.

Other locations visited by the tour group included the Pontifical College Urbano (Propaganda Fide) where Hugh was educated and later served as Assistant Rector, - the German College where he resided from 1938 until 1947, - St Peter's Basilica, - the Ardeatine Caves Massacre site, - the Alban Hills & Lake Albano near Castelgandolfo and, the Acquasanta Golf Club where we met with the Monsignor's caddy Roberto Bernardini (He subsequently became one of Italy's best Golf Professionals).

The Group also did a night time coach tour of the ancient sites of Rome and on another evening, a walking tour of key places of interest. In acknowledgement of their very much appreciated support, Muckross Weavers Wool Cashmere Skellig Scarfs were presented to Princess Gesine Pamphili, to Ambassador Frances Collins and to Floriana Ferrari (Secretary College Urbano).

Finally, the Irish Ambassador to the Holy See, Frances Collins, hosted a wonderful reception for the group in the Irish Embassy to the Holy See at Via dei Corridori.

The head piece is designed and created by Fascinators by Frances owned by Mary Frances Brosnan from Killcummin.

Deirdre Burke from Beaufort set up the business in late 2018. Deirdre studied Fashion deisgn and tailoring in Mallow College of design & tailoring.

A BREAKTHROUGH IN THE RAILWAY-BUS STATION SAGA

Hats off to Cllr John O'Donoghue who has moved a mountain - or at least may move a wall!

There has been a warm reception to his and this column's idea of a way from the train to the bus station through the Outlet building.



It will save the State five million euro in an overhead bridge, if it goes "through".

There was a reply to the motion moved by John to pursue the link.

Paul Sherry, General Manager of the Outlet Centre has told the council the property owner is "more than happy" to meet with Bus Eireann and larnród Eireann to see if a solution can be found.

All parties must now put their best negotiating skills forward. Let us hope Cllr John is included. It would be transformative for the town and might benefit the Outlet Centre too. I often wonder why our train stations don't make more of themselves. Anyone who has been to Malaga and Paris will see how train stations can also be shopping centres.

Another good idea - a notice board for Killarney - is being pursued by Cllr Marie Moloney. Her idea for an electronic information board at the Market Cross may get funding. The board would be updated weekly, Marie suggests. It is being warmly received by people I speak

with. What marks today's so-called modern age more than anything is not centralisation but fragmentation. The days of turning to the inside back page of the Kerryman to find out everything from what dances or shows were on to cinema and club meetings, are gone. We are left scrambling now between different "platforms". Roll on the notice boards

BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS

History has a habit of repeating itself. Like Russian Dolls. You pull one out and the next is exactly the same. Until someone does something brave. And paints a different picture. I am beginning to wonder if what is now taking place is really a case of Russian dolls. Each day I go up the steps of Tralee Courthouse, I see the monuments to the dead Kerrymen, Protestant and Catholic who died in the Crimean War of the 1850s.

They are listed on the cannon brought back as trophies. The age of the Empire was about trophies.

Russia was getting too big for its boots and the opposing big powers the French, the English and the Ottomans declared war.

Some of the cartoon imagery is uncannily the same as now. Then it was the Russian bear being tied up in Punch; today it is a dam image with Russia threatening to overrun Europe on Facebook.

Are we seriously not questioning the waroutdated rhetoric? And why are we in Ireland being led by the nose by the same nations who led us into the Crimean and then two world wars?

We should be supporting Trump's peace



efforts. Instead we are jumping up and down about "standing by Ukraine" and worrying about mineral rights in a far off land. Bunkum and palaver!

The overblown rhetoric is what drove thousands to their deaths in the previous Crimean war; and all we gained are useless 19th century cannons stuck up outside a 19th century courthouse that itself is no longer fit for purpose. Why are we not marching with the brave step we took in 1998 with the Good Friday agreement? It was remarkable and groundbreaking. We stepped into the 21st century clutching a different trophy. We need to remind ourselves of how awesome that step was. We are not some post-colonial or even post-communist nation stagnating in the past; nor are we any longer the pawn of Empires. Why are we sliding back into their ways? We need to mark that we are the peacemakers. And on that note: Bertie Ahern for President!

SMART CITY PLANS FOR KILLARNEY

Among plans to ease the city like traffic congestion in Killarney are two stand out ideas: a ban on summer road works, and a city style bike scheme.

It will be several years before a much anticipated bypass, already delayed by more than 20 years, will be constructed, - if it does get the funding at all.

New underused bike lanes undertaken on Rock Road last summer worsened the congestion and thankfully we will not be subjected to this in 2025.

"In many ways Killarney is a victim of its own success," Councillor John O'Donoghue told the meeting of Killarney Municipal District where he set down a motion asking for solutions for the chronic congestion, including a city style bike scheme.

July would be too late to be once again discussing the huge delays getting in and through the town, John said.

Planned inner relief roads within the town would bring up to 5,000 cars out of the town, the meeting was told.

However these inner link roads between New and High Streets and Park Road to the N22 would not be in place for this tourist season.

The N22 Farranfore to Killarney Road Project - it is overdue by more than 20 years is the ultimate solution to relieve traffic congestion.

Estimated in 2021 to cost €200 million, it is only advancing to design stage in 2025. And there is still no guarantee of finance.

John had previously put forward "a city style" park and ride scheme for Killarney involving free bikes This would involve people parking on the outskirts of Kilalrney "and jumping on one of the bikes" to access the town.

Engineers told him "yes" they would now follow up on the scheme and are to contact existing bike operators.

Additional car parks and signage and a pilot bus scheme are also on the cards

Mayor of Killarney Maura Healy-Rae put forward a number of kerb amendments and slip roads and these too will be examined, the engineers said - safety allowing.

Mayor's praise for 'KERRY'S NEW POET LAUREATE'

he Mayor of Killarney has praised a local poet for his passion and dedication to his craft which really shine through in a new book of poems and photographs about Kerry that has just been published.

A former banker now concentrating on the written word, Paul Byrne described his new collection For The Love of Kerry, as a real labour of love given that he loves nature and his passions in life include the written word and capturing snapshots of the great outdoors.

The book was officially launched by Mayor Maura Healy-Rae at a reception in Killarney House and she was rich in her praise for the poet whose collection of poetry and images showcase Kerry at its very best.

"Paul has made the transition from banker to bard so seamlessly. He really wanted to capture the joys of Kerry and what surrounds us in nature to bring the spirit, soul and scenery of the county to our hearts and he has succeeded splendidly," she said.

The mayor described Paul Byrne as the new poet laureate of Kerry.

"He has managed to put our beloved county into words in a way that we can all cherish," she said.

Bishop of Kerry, Ray Browne, told the gathering at the launch that the book was a fabulous collection of photographs as well as poetry and he said Paul's words really bring the images to life

"There is a saying that what a wonderful being the creator must be to unfold such beauty everywhere in creation. Paul's poems and photographs say that out loud," he said.

Bishop Browne said the book brings to mind the three qualities that are linked together in ancient philosophy – truth, goodness and beauty – and it opens the mind of the reader to' those three qualities.

"Paul Byrne, the poet and photographer, continues a tradition that goes back centuries, back into the psalms and beyond," the bishop said.

Born in Collooney, Co Sligo in 1967, Paul's family moved to Listowel when he was just a year old and he was educated in Scoil Réalta na Maidine and St Michael's College.

After graduating from UCD, Paul's career in financial services kept him in Dublin but after 25 years involved in senior banking, and a decade in other sales roles, he moved to Killarney three years ago.

His said his new surroundings present the perfect opportunity to enjoy nature and to seek inspiration from Kerry's sheer beauty.

For The Love of Kerry features 36 original and beautifully crafted poems with some stunning accompanying images captured by Paul on his outdoor adventures and driven by his love of literature.

Much of his inspiration was found in Killarney National Park and Paul said what really drives



the One-Eyed Gunner **BOOK LAUNCH**

takes place

It was quite fitting that Saturday 8th March, was International Women's Day, as Mary O'Donoghue, launched her first book, 'Fred Healy: The One-Eyed Gunner', along with the help of Mayor of Killarney, Maura Healy Rae. Many of Mary's family, friends, neighbours, dignitaries and representatives of St. Brendan's College gathered in Killarney Library for the special occasion.

This fascinating story is told by first time author, Mary O'Donoghue, Coolcurtoga, Clonkeen. After Mary was diagnosed with oesophageal cancer and having gone through surgery in 2022, she began her recovery at home with her husband Séan, and at the same time she took a keen interest in local genealogy, and a particular interest was sparked in Fred Healy, when he was mentioned on a Nationwide programme. His name could be seen etched on the wall of the Bridewell building in Kanturk Jail. This book tells the fascinating story of Fred Healy, from his youth in Islandmore, the first local railway line, his inspirational Aunty Abbey, to his days fighting in the front line during World War I with his brother Patrick and his revolutionary efforts as a republican in the fight for Irish freedom. As the old Irish saying goes, 'tarraingíonn scéal sçéal éile' (one story leads to another) and this is very evident throughout this book. Thanks to Mary's dedication and perseverance, Fred Healy is no longer a forgotten hero.

Both Fred and Mary have fought different battles courageously and their stories have now been interwoven forever more in this valuable piece of

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NEW BOOK based on memoir of leading

Kerry republican and revolutionary

he dramatic life and times of a prominent Kerry IRA leader and lifelong republican are published in a new book by historian and author, Dr Owen O'Shea.

The memoirs of Dan Mulvihill, which he wrote shortly before he died, which remained unpublished for fifty years, chart his central role in many of the most important events in twentieth-century Ireland.

Mulvihill from Brackhill, Castlemaine, was an IRA volunteer who fought the Black and Tans, a loyal ally of Éamon de Valera – who he smuggled out of Dublin at the beginning of the Civil War – a fervent opponent of the Anglo-Irish Treaty, a member of Liam Lynch's staff in the anti-Treaty IRA, a prisoner and hunger striker, a spy and intelligence officer.

In later years, he adjudicated on the pension applications of IRA and Cumann na mBan veterans from all over Ireland and campaigned passionately for better rights and remuneration for those who took part in the fight for Irish freedom.

"Mulvihill's unpublished memoir, running to 20,000 words, first came to my attention when I was researching the Ballymacandy ambush of 1921 a few years ago. I discovered that he had tried but failed to publish the memoir before his death in 1985 and I am delighted to be able to bring his story to light.

"He was a pivotal figure in the revolution in Kerry but was also central to

national events during the revolutionary period, alongside figures like Éamon de Valera, Michael Collins, Harry Boland, Liam Lynch, Emmet Dalton and Tom Barry," said Owen O'Shea.

During the truce which followed the War of Independence, Mulvihill was appointed Liaison Officer for County Kerry, entrusted with keeping the peace in cooperation with his sworn enemies in the RIC and the British Army. During the Second World War, he spied on those suspected of supporting the British and Nazi war efforts and reported to army leader, Florrie O'Donoghue, in Dublin as part of a secret espionage network. He later served on the powerful Board of Assessors with the Department of Defence which adjudicated on the pension applications of the veterans of wars in which they had been involved.

The book will be launched on Saturday 29 March at 8.00pm at the Muintir na Tíre Hall in Milltown.

Guest speaker at the launch will be the former editor of the Irish Independent, Stephen Rae, a native of Castlemaine, who recorded an interview with Dan Mulvihill shortly before his death. Stephen Rae's grandfather, also Stephen, was a leading figure in the Kerry IRA during the War of Independence. The launch will feature a celebration of Mulvihill's life in stories, poetry, music and song.

"That Mulvihill was from my home parish and that he wanted to publish his story, makes the writing of this book such an honour," said Owen. "A self-styled maverick and committed revolutionary, he was a largely forgotten figure in Irish history until now. This is Mulvihill in his own words, unrepentant and revealing, from joining the Volunteers in his youth, to his trenchant views on the Troubles in Northern Ireland as he approached the end of his life," said Owen.

One Man's Ireland: Memoirs of Dan Mulvihill, Maverick Republican is published by Merrion Press and will be available in bookshops across Kerry from next week as well as online at owenoshea.ie and at the book launch on 29 March.





€850,000 ALLOCATED TO COMMUNITY GROUPS AND PROJECTS ACROSS KERRY

erry County Council has announced details of the allocation of €850,000 in funding support for community groups and projects across the county under the Community Support Fund for 2025. A total of 259 groups and projects received funding in 2025.

Since 2020, over €40 million was leveraged from other national grant sources as a result of the strategic allocation of resources under the Community Support Fund.

The fund, which is in its eleventh year, has now supported 2,972 projects since 2015 to the value of €8m. As occurred in previous years, some of the Community Support Fund will be used this year to target strategic projects in the five municipal districts and to co-fund projects which are in receipt of grants from other sources.

Councillors in the five Municipal Districts met during the past week to decide on the allocations and unanimously welcomed the provision of support to the recipients. Councillors congratulated all the community groups and acknowledged the tremendous voluntary work that these groups do.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable


Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

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Leaving Cert runaway grades inflation to be reduced in 2025 as CAO points set to drop

It has been confirmed that post-marking adjustment of Leaving Cert exam scripts is to be gradually reduced and eventually restored to 2019 levels. When the Covid-19 virus invaded the country in 2020, adjustments were made in Leaving Cert exam marking to compensate for disruption to the academic year. The intervention has caused unsustainable Leaving Cert grades inflation for the past five years.

The post-marking adjustment will artificially inflate results for this year's Leaving Certs by an average of 5.5%, compared to an average of 7.5%, which has been the case for the past five years. As a result, Leaving Cert exam results will be lower this year than they were for the past five years as the State Examinations Commission (SEC) begins to tackle grades inflation which saw tens of thousands of students receive bumper grades.

The extent to which post-marking adjustment can inflate grades is evident in last year's Leaving Cert results. The 7.5% upwards adjustment last year resulted in 68% cent of grades increasing. As a result, last year's Leaving Cert candidates gained, on average, about 60 CAO points more than they would have done before the pandemic. By decreasing the postmarking adjustment to an average of 5.5%, the average gain by 2025 Leaving Certs should be about 43 CAO points.

Leaving Cert students from the 2020 to 2024 Leaving Cert classes, with the bumper grades of the past five years, will obviously have a distinct points advantage over the 2025 Leaving Cert class when competing for college places. However, the vast majority of those should already have graduated or are en route through their college courses. Admittedly, a number of students who may have narrowly missed out on a greatly desired first preference

choice may feel confident enough to lodge a fresh CAO application this year.

In addition, if the extra college places that have been promised are made available this year, it will help to level the playing field. The last Government has already committed to easing the pressure on points requirements by making more places available in some very competitive courses. Hopefully, the present Government will make those extra places, as well as many more in other disciplines, available to 2025 college applicants.

This initiative to reduce Leaving Cert marks and grades to the organic level of 2019 is long overdue and welcomed by educationalists. While it was never going to happen last year with a general election on the horizon, its better late than never. It will eliminate the regrettable occurrences of applicants with maximum points failing to be offered their course preference because of that awful lottery system known as random selection.

It will also help to reduce the dropout rate of first year students whose inflated grades overestimated their ability to survive in their courses of choice.

Decreasing the post-marking adjustment in 2025 will bring the overall aggregate results to a point about midway between 2020 and 2021 levels. In simple terms, Leaving Cert results this year will be on average 5.5% above the 2019 results and on average 2% below last year's results. The objective then is to return to the 2019 marking system based on the candidate's own performance in the Leaving Cert exam.

The timeline for phasing out the post-marking adjustment altogether won't be revealed until later in the year. It might be done in a single step in 2026 but its more than likely to be a more cautious two step approach.

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SCRATCHED CORNEA

A scratched cornea is one of the most common types of eye injury What is the cornea?

The cornea is the clear front part of the eye. This part of the eye is packed with nerves - it has many more nerve endings than your fingertips. This is why a scratched cornea can be very uncomfortable. However, this discomfort will only last a short time while the eye heals. What should I do if I scratch my cornea?

A corneal abrasion is a common eye injury. If you are experiencing any eye pain or discomfort, or you suspect you have a corneal abrasion, you should always consult your optometrist for advice.

What causes a corneal abrasion?

A corneal abrasion normally happens after an accident or injury to the front of the eye. They are often caused by fingernails, or an accident in the home or while gardening. Sometimes, if a small piece of grit gets trapped in your eye, rubbing the eye or blinking may cause a corneal abrasion.

What are the symptoms of a corneal abrasion?

There are several symptoms associated with corneal abrasion, and you may only experience a few, but they can include:

- Pain, which may feel worse when you open or close your eye
- · A feeling that there is something in your eye or irritation

- Your eyes watering far more than usual
- Redness
- Sensitivity to light
- Blurred vision or loss of vision

How long does it take to heal?

Corneal abrasions will normally heal completely within 48 hours. If the abrasion is in the centre of the cornea, your vision may be slightly blurred. It is also normal that your eye will be a little red and you may find bright lights uncomfortable until the abrasion has healed.

Treatment

You may be given lubricating drops (artificial tear drops, gel or ointment) to make your eye feel more comfortable and help to keep it moist. You may be given antibiotic drops or ointment to stop the abrasion becoming infected. These aren't always needed.

The following may also help:

- Over-the-counter painkillers such as paracetamol will help with the
- Avoid rubbing or touching your eye as this may make the abrasion worse or slow down the rate of healing
- · Wearing sunglasses may help if you are sensitive to light

If your vision starts to become more blurred, or if the pain and redness increase, you should get advice from your optometrist. If they are not available, go to A&E.




WORKMAN'S ROWING CLUB NEWS

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A bunder built an exact brinteer mouses in an existing nousing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

Scotts Lakers qualified for the playoffs of the Dominos Men's Basketball League by virtue of a win over Tolka Rovers which looked like a banker for a long time. I'm well adjusted now to living in Killarney, the town is lovely and the people are so nice here." Rory Howe hit the opening salvo for Tolka Rovers who had former Laker Emilian Grudov in their ranks, but Rui Saravia and Darnell Snyers got the Lakers off the mark. Jack O Sullivan hit a three from the corner which Stephen Commins immediately replied to for the Metropolitans. Commins made it a double but that spurred the Lakers into action with Snyers and Jamie O Sullivan particularly lively. Blackwell and Grudov exchanged points before Snyers struck again from outside, an effort immediately replicated by Grudov. Mark Sheehan with a three and Carroll inside made it 24-22 with Mike Wallace heating up for Rovers. Oisin Spring ensured the Lakers cushion was a little healthier at quarters end with a last second effort.

The pace of the game picked up in the second quarter with Carroll striking early. Snyers was at his sniping best and with the lead pushed out to 33-23 Tolka Rovers called a time out. Spring hit a three from the corner and then followed



it up with a neat lay up from an incisive Saravia pass. At 38-23 Wallace and Rory Howe sprung into action helping to half the deficit, the shift in momentum forcing a Lakers sit down. Solid defence married to the hot hand of Mark Sheehan made it 48-36 with a little under two minutes to go in the half. Commins and Blackwell swapped baskets and made it 50-40 in the Lakers favour at half time.

Snyers and Blackwell came out of the locker rooms faster than most to extend the gap to 55-40. Elijah Faapito was trying hard for his side to get them into the game but two quick breaks saw Blackwell help to maintain the Laker advantage. Snyers and Wallace went score for score but the Lakers tails were up, highlighted by a strong finish to the quarter with Carroll and Jack O Sullivan putting the Lakers in charge and almost out of sight at 76-59.

If anyone thought this game was going to peter out they were wrong and they never told Messers Commins and Wallace. They hit eight points in three minutes with Snyers replying and initially it looked like the Lakers would hold them at bay thanks to Carroll and Oladipupo baskets. But the gap was down to eight, 82-74 when Commins hit from outside. Mike Wallace and Stephen Commins were Tolkas star turns with 28 and 26 points respectively, Elijah Faapito had 11, Rory Howe and Emilian Grudov 7 each.

The Lakers have a double engagement this weekend. They entertain the Limerick Sport Eagles in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre on Saturday night and face a trip to Tipp on St Patrick's Day to play the local Talons. With third place a guarantee it looks like an away quarter final date with Ulster University is in the offing. Titans, who currently occupy second spot in the Conference, seem to be in the box seat for that position but you must play to the final buzzer and see what it all brings. Tip off for the Eagles game is at 7.30pm.



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

GOODBYE EUROSPORT



It was probably unique to my generation. Go back to the early years of the 20th century, and you would have hard-core Kerry supporters waiting outside the telegraph office in Denny St. to find out the result of a game in Croke Park on the same day that it was played – exotic stuff. Prior to the sixties, you 'watched' sport on the radio, communal gatherings that were dependent on the famous wet and dry batteries. Micheál Ó hEithir was far more famous than any of the players that he commented on, and I personally believe that he and Seán Óg Ó Ceallacháin did more

to popularise gaelic games than anybody else, even allowing for the fervid national sentiment and cloying insularity of De Valera's brand of nationalism. Rugby, soccer, and a slow-growing phenomenon called 'basketball' (it really only began to take off in the fifties) were viewed through a certain 'traditional' prism. Cricket, sadly, has never fully recovered.

It's a strange phenomenon, and one that I have come across too often to be mere coincidence, but people from those generations can remember incidents in games from Ó hEithir's commentary better than later generations who were actually able to either attend the games or watch them on television – and I'm talking about prior to the all-pervading distraction of social media. Games were first broadcast on RTE in 1962 and it soon became standard fare for the big occasions. But televised sport on a weekly basis? Arrah, would you ever talk sense for once?

Except that bit by bit, that's exactly what happened. RTE was never a big player on the international stage but the likes of Jimmy Magee and Fred Cogley kept us hanging in there. We got to see the likes of Muhammad Ali, the all-conquering Welsh rugby team, Mary Purcell, the great Kerry and Dublin teams, Shergar (my sympathies to the family and friends of the late Aga Khan, Shergar's owner, but when I was younger, I couldn't distinguish him from the Ayatollah Khomeini, but please understand that I was young enough to think that the film 'Rocky' was a documentary). I'm not suggesting that RTE got everything right. On the famous day that Munster beat the All Blacks in Thomond, RTE's outside units were preoccupied with the launch of RTE 2 in Cork. All that remains now is Cogley's radio commentary and roughly 17 minutes of grainy black and white footage. Most of the highlights were taped over - I believe that it has added lustre to the legend. The human imagination is far more powerful than mere reality.

I'm pretty sure I was part of the first Irish generation to have both the transport facilities and television coverage to be able to watch sport regularly. Televised sport really came into its own in the seventies – arguably, so did the all-encompassing nature of celebrity culture (albeit without the eternal pervasiveness of social media). But even then your choice was much like the dinners your mother made you – the only choice was eat/watch it....or don't.

It was the nineties before the idea of pay per view took hold. The more popular English soccer clubs got together and effectively formed a breakaway league, a 'Premier League' where they would keep most of the revenue generated instead of paying to

the FA. They were partly right. The FA didn't get much of that money. It was a guy named Rupert Murdoch who absolutely cleaned up, and if the Premiership club chairmen got quietly and cleverly shafted along the way.... well, biter bit, one might say.

You see, this was not Rupert Murdoch's first rodeo. I actually had no idea who owned or invested in one of the first of these dedicated sports channels, back in 1989. That was the year that Eurosport began. Of course, by the time that BskyB started buying the rights to this 'Premiership'. Remember the whole furore over the European Super League? Now it's the 'Unify League', having been formally relaunched last December. Without a whisper of protest. Yeah, as the old saying goes, there is nothing new under heaven. There is also a certain amount of real hypocrisy when Sky commentators argue that it's elitist. Yes, kiddies, that's why ye got paid....

You rarely watched Eurosport during the day. I didn't, anyway. You'd get a bit of golf (not the moneyspinner it subsequently became, although that itself appears to be in sharp decline at the moment), cycling (it was surprisingly expert coverage for those of us who only knew the sport because of Seán Kelly and Stephen Roche), European basketball (the NBA was a whole glamorous world away, I couldn't afford the posters, let alone the sneakers. And yeah, when there are that many questions about the ethics of your production line, they are 'sneakers'. Also, good luck to all marketing gurus, but Wilt would have destroyed Michael and Kobe wouldn't ever have been stepping into Kareem either, but I digress.....

Eurosport was not glamorous. Eurosport was not even for watching in daylight, to be honest. For an entire generation in the early nineties, Eurosport was for when you stumbled in at night, carrying your dinner (snackbox with everything, and mushy peas are not a part of 'everything', we will leave that kind of culinary experiment for our friends across the water. And don't even start me on Yorkshire puddings, you'd be better off with a decent slice of bread). You always meant to just watch it for ten minutes while you were eating. Except that three hours later, you were still staring in fascination at a flickering TV screen and you had developed a serious apathy for the Norwegian curling team. I genuinely speak for my entire generation here. Many of you will deny it.....no, you'll be telling the kids. At your age I was putting in a twelve hour shift down the coalmine.....

In many ways, Eurosport was truly awful. But it was just good enough, with that little touch of eccentricity, passion, and absolute randomness, to be truly brilliant at the same time.

It has been bought out by TNT (Warner Brothers, basically). Which means prices linked to populism and clickbait for social media and braying studio laughs and..... everything that Eurosport was originally intended to be, and failed gloriously at being. I'll miss it – not least because there is no world where I am paying a subscription to watch any of that.

RUGBY Six Nations: Ireland France



I genuinely had a bad feeling about this one, and that's not being clever in hindsight. I'm no rugby analyst, far from it, but how did people not see problems looming. First off, France are a very good team. England were absolutely haunted to beat them by a single point, and that England team isn't as bad as some Irish pundits would have you believe. We have been on the crest of a wave in recent years (going for a third title in a row and a second Grand Slam to go with it, Van Morrison sang a song about days like that), and of course I have loved it, we all have. That wave might not be broken yet, but it is past its height as well. Leinster are Ireland's flagship in recent times, and frankly I think we are too dependent on them (I don't particularly believe all the nonsense spouted about D4 bias; Munster's results over the past while isn't on any perceived bias) but Leinster aren't pulling up roots these days either. Club rugby is at its strongest in France; how was that not an omen?

France were unlucky to lose to England, but by the same token, we were lucky enough to beat them after a very laboured first half. It was panel depth, not strength or skill, that actually saw us pull away late on. And then we struggled against a woebegone Wales. I'm not doubting the Dragons, they did put up a great battle and the valleys were singing for the first time in a long sequence of games (and I certainly wouldn't begrudge them) but that's Ireland struggling twice. Once might be unlucky, but twice means that you have grit in your gears. When a France side that includes Dupont - remember that pullback on Mack Hansen? How on earth do you deal with that? - are in your way, I wouldn't even be whispering about a Grand Slam just yet. Lastly, the team selection. And there's a lot of leeway for a maligned Simon Easterby there, because look at who we were missing. Mack Hansen, Garry Ringrose, James Ryan, Ronan Kelliher, Tadhg Furlong.....I also don't like this idea of a farewell for Peter O'Mahony, Cian Healy, and Conor Murray either. Brilliant players, absolutely brilliant, genuinely among the best representatives of our entire nation in my lifetime. But nobody retires at their peak. Remember Brian O'Driscoll's farewell tour? In my opinion, that ot a bit ridiculous well before the end. Announcing retirements before a crunch game or competition..... no. It'll sell tickets, but it's just heaping pressure on yourself. Meanwhile, France have Ntamack and Penaud back. Somebody crunch those numbers.

And then, shortly before the game, we lost James Lowe. That's an absolute disaster. I won't necessarily say that Lowe has been our best performer - it's an impossible question given the variety and disparity of pivotal roles within a rugby team, one of the things I love about the sport, but Lowe certainly brings a flair and an imagination that adds a huge dimension to our game (to be fair, Hansen and Keenan have that little sprinkle of stardust about them too). I want that width: despite how impressed I have been with our forwards, and I truly have, I don't want to try win a pivotal game against France, of all teams, like that. Without Lowe, I'm not sure we have any choice.

And Ireland, because they basically go out on the pitch every time with intentions of proving me personally wrong (they have never said so out loud, but I am sure of it), were absolutely brilliant in the first quarter.

A great take by Nash and Ireland go hunting. No joy, but Ireland on the front foot. France are coughing up penalties, a nice kick by Prendergast had Ireland ten metres out. Great effort by Dan Sheehan – himself and Beirne are magnificent – but just short. Penalty for Ireland, though. Personally I've always been a fan of putting simple points on the board. I learned that Alistair Campbell felt the same way when England won the World Cup – when you are in agreement with Alistair Campbell, it's time to have another look at that philosophy.

Ireland are a lot braver than me (even more than you might have imagined; if I am on a rugby pitch, I'm the guy wearing camouflage) and they go for it. Caelan Doris, another to have a great start, gets over the line but is held up. Referee Angus Gardner has another look but it wasn't really in question. Ireland are impressing here, but France aren't exactly buckling either.

Penalty for Ireland and Sam Prendergast indicates that he is going to have a go. Decent effort, but it curls off slightly and comes back off the left hand post. Decent effort by Prendergast, a bit unlucky. We have had some of the best kickers in the world in recent times. Prenderast deserves a bit of time to get there. Would Jack Crowley have nailed that? Because I genuinely do not believe that this game came down to fairly marginal calls like that one or Osbourne on the wing.

Another penalty to Ireland and a good kick by Prendergast to set us up close to the line. Only then there's an intercept by Penaud and Dupont is off. That's an awful try to concede completely against the run of play. Except that, thankfully, it's ruled out for a knock-on (in fact, the TV camera clearly catches two knock-ons; I hadn't noticed either at first look). A let-off, no doubt about it, and the big contingent of French fans are buoyant.

A nice chip and chase by Louis Bielle Biarrey – that's the kind of cleverness that I was talking about earlier on. Calvin Nash does well but that's as blatant an infraction from Joe McCarthy as you will ever see. I'm sorry to say it, I imagine that he has had a bad few days for a lad that wears his heart on his sleeve, but you are never getting away with grabbing a guy's jersey to pull him back at this level. Truthfully, that would be spotted at virtually any level. Yellow and a ten minute break; even the most die-hard of Irish supporters aren't going to argue that one.

And now France have a one man advantage, and that's huge at the top level. Dupont fires over a great pass to Bierre Biarrey and he has plenty of space to dot it down. After all of Ireland's great pressure, they are five points and a man down after 24 minutes. Thomas Ramos missed the conversion, but there's a lot more cloud than silver lining.

France are much more in it now but Ireland are impressively holding out. Some good rugby on both sides.

Dupont injured. I'm not celebrating that, nobody is going to celebrate something like that. It might suit us on any given day, and this could be an historic day, but you never want to see any player, especially one of the greatest to play the game, being carried off. Will this help us? Yes, of course. Will the 7-1 split on the French bench cost them in the circumstances? I'm not sure - that's not me being doubtful; I literally don't know. Rugby is more attritional and harder on bodies in recent times. Look, nobody is suggesting that previous generations of players were soft - Willie John, Big Moss, Gaillimh? Off with you - but sports science has evolved and continues to evolve. 7-1 sounds like a lot to me but the top professionals on the planet are happy to go with it these days. Dupont certainly wasn't taken out of it maliciously. but was there a degree of recklessness? I think we would argue the point if it happened to an Irish player.

Off the ball tackle on Tadhg Beirne – jaysus, the poor French lad is throwing snowballs at an avalanche if he is trying that on Beirne! Up steps Prendergast and that's a great kick. He isn't having the best of games, but that will settle both him and Ireland.

Except that just two minutes later Andrew Porter is pinged – that one was definitely harsh enough, I don't see how much Andrew Porter could actually do about it. Regardless, Thomas Ramos is happy to take the points and it's 8-3 to France.

Nice piece of work by Osborne to tackle Penaud and Caelan Doris almost gets it. Almost....Doris is really showing leadership here. Ireland get an advantage and Prendergast opts for the kicking tee. That's fifty metres. As far as I am concerned, the

house ain't accepting any bets on this one.... except that he strikes it beautifully and puts it over. See, that's what he can do. Yes, I think he could be faster with is all-round game, but there aren't too many kickers putting that over. Did we give Sexton such a hard time in his first year breaking through? Or O'Gara? Or Campbell? No, of course not, but we are way past the Digital Age. This is the Age of Social Media. I'm opinionated myself, but at least I am smart enough to realise that it shouldn't matter to anybody. Despite what the false monstrosity that is reality television has taught you, uneducated opinions do not come into play when there is an actual scoreboard. This one reads 8-6 in favour ofFrance. That's not too bad at all. No Dupont (and unfortunately it looks and sounds like a bad one). After Ireland's initial spell of dominance, France have played far more of the ball and looked more menacing. Two points down? Big whoop, as the young ones would say (if they were characters in a 1980s sitcom). Even with the players we are missing, we still have good players to come in and we have improved in the second half all through this championship.

Sure enough, Ireland look impressive on the restart. Nice kick by Gibson Park and France uncharacteristically mess up the clearance. Peter O'Mahony sets up the maul and Dan Sheehan spots just enough of a gap. Sheehan has a poacher's mind in a berserker's body; that's why the likes of himself, Beirne, Furlong etc. require so much focus from the opposition. Give him a fraction of space and you are already too late to stop him. Try, and Ireland in front. Lovely conversion by Prendergast -that was far from a 'gimme' and Ireland are in front by five. That's some turnaround.

For a brief few seconds, I was actually in dreamland. Five points clear and France forced to chase. Keep the pressure on, keep picking them off in the air and set up mauls... they should be creaking now.

Yep, all of that literally lasted seconds.

Because France just swept down the field and Paul Boudehent goes over. Referee Angus Gardner makes a load of friends among the Irish supporters by giving Calvin Nash a yellow while ignoring the fact that Peter O'Mahony was tackled late. I'd say leave it out lads. There's no argument about Nash, those are called all day in modern rugby. O'Mahony is a tighter call, definitely, but do you really want him taking another look at Tadhg Beirne's collision with Dupont? The gander gets the same sauce as the goose. Ramos with the conversion. France two ahead again and Ireland a man down again. Plenty of time left, but France seem to be in control of the narrative as 'Les Marseillais' rings out again. That makes for a great scene in 'Casablanca', but Lansdowne Road is a different kind of movie.

France in control now. They find Bielle Biarrey and it's another clever grubber kick. A fantastic burst of incredible pace, and Ireland are left flailing at his proverbial coattails. Over he goes and Ramos adds the conversion. This is not looking good at all. Ireland are running their bench now but there is a feeling of desperation about it. Ramos with a penalty. Nine points between them. Calvin Nash returns to the field but Ireland have an awful lot to do if they are going to turn this around.

It won't be happening. France are just coming in waves and Oscar Jegou finishes off a move that looked like an inevitable try from a long way out. Ramos slots over once again. 32-13. This isn't just a defeat, this is a clear hammering. As if to emphasize the point, Ramos knocks over another penalty. Ireland are in disarray.

Good work as Tadhg Beirne plucks a lineout and feeds Conor Murray. It would at least write a fitting end to his international career if he could get it down, however scant the consolation – but France, famous sentimentalists, are not that sentimental on a day like this.

Oh lads, Ramos gets far too much space and

off-loads to Penaud for a simple try before adding the conversion himself. Even on a day like this one, that was just too easy.

Final minute, and Cian Healy finally scores an Irish try. Our most capped player ever, and on almost any other occasion, the Irish supporters would give him the send-off that he and that score deserve....but this is not that day.

This doesn't feel like that World Cup quarterfinal. Comparable in terms of occasion maybe (I believe that the Six Nations is our bread and butter, i.e. our most important barometer, the World Cup is cake, and Autumn Tests...ho hum) but that felt like a 50/50 game that just slid out of our grasp. This....this feels like a genuine downswing. I hope that I am wrong.

Some days – most days, to be fair – it's about the result. And the blunt truth is that Kerry are struggling at the moment. Player turnover is just too high, no team can produce results on a consistent basis in these circumstances. But some days really are about the performance, and the fact that Kerry lost his one was probably the least significant thing about his match. Because Kerry really did step up to the plate, and that is what matters. Normally I'd be cynical about a statement like that, dressing up reality to appease fans, but that's not the case here. I'd have liked us to win, but any talk about maintaining an outside chance of a League Final and promotion....are you deranged? We would be absolutely mullered in Division One; it would set us back years. I would be throwing games rather than have us go up in hse circumstances; that's the plain truth, and anybody who thinks otherwise is wearing blinkers or asking Stevie Wonder for directions. No, I desperately wanted to see Kerry stand up and be cunted, we haven't

Darren Delaney denies Down a goal with a brilliant save - big moment -but Darren Delaney takes the point. Level again. Podge Boyle and Luke Crowley nudge Kerry into a 0-15 to 0-13 lead at half-time, maybe a tiny bit flattering on the balance of play, but Kerry have been superb here. There's a refreshing confidence about both teams. Can Kerry maintain it?

Yup. McCrickard and McGrattan notch the first three points of the second half but Podge settles the ship with a free. McCrickard and Luke swap scores. We lost Seamie Foran to a second yellow. No arguments, McGrattan had his number all day long. It happens.

Rory Mahony forced a brilliant save out of the Down keeper. Two minutes later it was Kerry captain Oisín Maunsell's turn. He had a quiet day by his own high standards, but when the chance arose, he took it beautifully, and this time Stephen Keith had no chance. 1-17 to 0-17. Too early to say that any shock was on the cards, but Kerry are genuinely hunting this one and it is great to see.

Down scored the next two points. Paudie O'Connor pointed for Kerry but Finn Turpin cancelled it out straightaway. Pearse Óg McCrickard brought the sides level. PodgeBoyle pointed, Down replied. Podge slotted another free – I don't think he missed a single scoring chance all game. McGrattan replied and McCrickard nudged Down in front. Paul Sheehan off the bench starts doing damage – I was surprised to see him starting on the bench, he was always Down's best player against us, but I assume that he was carrying a knock - picked off his first score.

Kerry weren't done. Podge slotted two frees. I'd take a draw. I'd be thrilled with a draw.

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"I cry out to God Most High, to God who will fulfil His purpose for me" (Psalm 57:2 NLT)

Welcome back dear student, sometimes when things are difficult you might think... 'oh, what's the point!'. Another phrase.... 'there's no point!' means, you might as well give up: this is something you will not master or get through. Not in God's vocabulary! (Matthew 19:26; Philippians 4:13). THE point is, God has put you on this earth for such a time as this. THE point is, God has a plan for your life, but the kingdom of darkness will throw everything to try to defeat you. THE point is, God will fulfil His purpose if you lean upon Him and call upon the Name of Jesus (Romans 10:11-13; Proverbs 3:5-6). The Lord Jesus is the point - the 'Way, the Truth and the Life' and in order to be made right with God we must get to know Jesus, His Word, and His ways, to enter into God's Salvation - forgiveness, relationship, protection, provision, and blessing (John 14:6). He devised a scheme, tricking King Xerxes into making an order to have all the Jews in Persia exterminated on a certain day in March. But Mordecai and Esther and all the Israelites cried out to God in prayer and fasting. Then Esther did a very brave thing. She was very fearful - because going into the king's presence uninvited could get you killed. But Mordecai made a comment that changed her mind. He told her 'Esther perhaps this is why God has made you Queen — for such a time as this, to save your people?' (Esther 4:14-16). The book of Esther is well worth a study friend, it's a classic good vs evil study to fill you with hope; especially needed in today's crazy world I believe. God did use Esther to save her people, and the king ordered the wicked Haman be hung on the gallows that he had constructed to kill Mordecai on. Today is the festival of Purim, when Jews all over the world celebrate this victory from destruction and annihilation. God fulfilled the purpose for which Esther was born. Her life didn't have a good start, but God elevated this humble girl to a great role and turned around the destiny of two nations to bring redemption. God will always defend His people Israel.

Friend, you may have endured hard times; you may not have fitted in, or felt loved or courageous before, but if you believe in the Lord Jesus, you now belong to God's family (Ephesians 2:14-18). You are a child of the covenant-keeping God! He will fight to defend you, and He never changes (James 1:17-18). The New Covenant was sealed with the death and resurrection of Jesus — the Lamb of God who took away all our sin. This free gift of right-standing with God was exchanged for our sins, paid for with the Blood of Jesus (Hebrews chapter 10). The result is the power of sin, death and curse is broken, and freedom is delivered to those who believe. Destruction is not your portion, blessing is!
