"I met Brendan Keogh on one of my visits home and he travelled to Seattle, at my request, and organised sponsorship at my golf club.

"Since then our trips have been expertly organised by SWING Golf who book us preferential tee-times, set up the schedule and coordinate our bus drivers. We have never had an issue or anything to worry about. Being friendly with Maurice O'Donoghue, we have always stayed at Scott's Hotel," he added. The US visitors take on local players when in Killarney and this year there was 100 golfers playing on the Killeen course on the first day of their visit.

Taking part in the upcoming Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle are Irish Kidney Association ambassadors from Carlow, Cork, Kerry, Monaghan, and Tipperary (listed further below) who have been personally touched by organ failure, showcasing their resilience, determination, and passion to promote organ donation while highlighting the importance of exercise and fitness before and post-transplant. The IKA hopes to inspire people to recognise its pivotal role in the Ring of Kerry Cycle history and support the charity which can be done in

Anna Pokojska, from Killarney who took up cycling after her life-changing kidney transplant in 2017 and represented Ireland at the World Transplant Games in Malaga in 2019 where she won a silver and bronze medal and Shane O'Connell, Castleisland who received a heart transplant in 2013.

Geological Survey plane collecting geophysical data over Kerry

If you are in Kerry, Cork, or parts of Limerick in summer 2024, and see a low-flying airplane, there is a good chance that it is the Tellus survey by Geological Survey Ireland, a division of the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications. The survey airplane is a white, twin propeller plane, which is easily identified by its red tail and black stripe as well as the word 'SURVEY' and registration number C-GSGF written across both sides of the plane.

Tellus is a national mapping programme to collect geochemical and geophysical data on rocks, soil, and water across Ireland. It began 13 years ago as a collaborative effort between the geological surveys of both Ireland and Northern Ireland. To gather this data, scientific equipment is fitted to a plane which flies in a grid pattern. In 2024, the survey plane will be based at Shannon Airport, and will be flying at 60 metres over rural areas – about eight times the height of a two-storey house – and 240 metres over urban areas over the coming months, as approved by the Irish Aviation Authority. It will take to the skies over counties Kerry and Cork and parts of Limerick from June until the end of the autumn, weather permitting.

Due to the low-flying altitude of the survey aircraft, anyone concerned about sensitive livestock is encouraged to contact the Tellus Freephone Information Line on 1800 45 55 65. The Tellus team will be happy to provide information on upcoming flight plans.

The 'New' Killarney Council

The new Killarney Municipal District council will not be so new. We have the same people and the deck has only been shuffled slightly in terms of votes.

While we have the same council, we do have two councillors who had been coopted and who are now comprehensively elected. They will have a new confidence and new energy. These are first count winner, retained firefighter Martin Grady who put in a remarkable performance by any standards. This is thanks too to his wider family involvement of politicos father Donal and Uncle Séan.

Then there is primary teacher John O'Donoghue. Elected on the third count. Again I saw strong involvement from his uncle, past councillor Michael Gleeson. A bit like the Healy-Raes, perhaps - politics in Kerry is a family affair.

The most important mayoral office in Kerry is the Killarney mayor.

Will the pact for mayor that kept some people out of the picture and office for mayor entirely be renewed? Ever since Maura Healy-Rae was co-opted in 2016, she has effectively been kept out of the chair. This causes bitter division. Whatever your politics, is there not a sense of unfairness about depriving someone of first citizenship who got enough first preference votes to elect not one, but two councillors?

Then there will be the massive vote which Martin Grady got. And what about Niall O'Callaghan, is he not to get a chance either? I ask the question because the question of mayor mars politics in Killarney. So, perhaps it is something the 'new' council are already looking at newly. We have serious ongoing issues to address, not least the museum

to the town.There has to be a determined strategy on St Finan's. The council engineers and the roads office engineers will have to be asked to account for the mess of the traffic in Killarney. It is not just down to Rock Road roadworks or the lack of an inner relief road. It is going on with decades.

If we have a united council, then these few issues alone could stand alone. But we need unity. And the first obstacle to overcome will be a fair share out of the office of mayor.

Citizens and Language

Almost five thousand people from over one hundred countries were in Killarney for what is a great occasion, the Irish citizenship ceremonies at the INEC.

The granting of Irish citizenship through naturalisation is governed by the provisions of the Irish Nationality and Citizenship Act

1956, as amended.

Alan Shatter introduced the ceremonies in 2011 to make them an occasion and take them out of the uncomfortable and unsuitable confines of courtroom settings.

Among the lead nations of origin this week were India with almost 1,000 and the UK with 416 applicants. These were followed by Brazil, the Philippines, Poland, Romania South Africa, Nigeria Pakistan each with over 200 applicants and and the USA which had 119.

In all the applicants are from 138 countries around the world.

Immigration which began 30 years ago had replaced a history of emigration and now one fifth of the population born outside Ireland, those at thee INEC in Killarney heard from Aine Griffin of the Department of Justice

The Irish for citizen was 'saoránach' meaning 'free' Ms Griffin, said to a spontaneous round of applause.

Retired judge Mary Irvine, explained the Latin tag 'carpe diem' - and urged the new citizens to seize the day and urged them to grasp the opportunities "the landmark event" of citizenship afforded them.

While I and others were struck by the promises of freedom, a standout for me once again was the poor English standard of some of our new citizens living here for years. I keep raising an English requirement with the Department of Justice . And I get the same answer.

"No language proficiency requirements apply with respect to naturalisation applications. There are no plans to amend the legislation in this regard," they said this week. But why not? Why do we not ensure there is communication? Every other country does in the interests of basic communication.

The cuckoos are leaving. Let me begin with a confession: I spent so long at the count in Killarney, I was writing penguin. However, there's nothing wrong with the cuckoos' inner clock. And the last to arrive will be the first to leave. We have daily report of progress on the admirable



British Trust for Ornithology Cuach Cores | BTO - British Trust for Ornithology as well as on the local Killarney National Park site.

The tracking system begun by both organisations last year is working perfectly. As I write, Cuach Cores is where I would like to be-heading for the mouth of the Rhone Valley doing a detour between Avignon and Aix en-Provence. And then he will go to the Congo.

May I reveal an unease with all this scientific meddling. I know

we value scientific knowledge more than ever. However, there is a danger with over-information. And it is not unlike the battle over AI. The danger is we are 'blinded' by science and that the mystery will be taken out of one of this precious harbinger of summer. Only 'experts' referring to websites will soon be able to talk about the cuckoo, in a way that speaks of outside science and not of inner seasons. I have monitored the cuckoo on Mangerton with close to four decades, his comings and goings, his decline in numbers but also sometimes his increase. I have feared for his survival and I have celebrated his arrival. I have come to value for his song, a bird that in my youth was presented as a good-for-nothing parasite.

The cuckoo arrives and sings and then rests up for a few days. He recovers and is deafening for a few weeks and there is silence again. Just before he departs there is a burst of song for a day or two and he is gone. I don't just mourn the cuckoo's leaving, I mourn the passing of the summer and the closer we get to the longest day in the year. I don't want to know, with respect to the British Trust for Ornithology or the Killarney National Park that my cuckoos are landing in Fermoy and are on their way to Mangerton. I want to be surprised not from a website, but from a burst of song on a misty morning in late April when it seems the world is cut off entirely. So thanks for the information, NPWS, and BTO, but is there any chance you might keep one of the last great mysteries to yourself from now on?

Sixty years on, it is time to celebrate the significant contributions of those who have made Muckross House what it is today: The guides, staff, a supportive community, the visitors and the legacy of the Bourn Vincent family. Over these six decades, thousands of people have collaborated to protect, preserve, and enjoy this unique and special property.

A programme of events and celebrations will continue throughout the summer months to commemorate one of Killarney's most iconic locations.

Muckross House was completed for the landlord Herbert family in 1843, Muckross House acquired new owners at the end of the 19th century being purchased by Lord Ardilaun.

It again changed hands, in 1911, being purchased by a wealthy American, William Bowers Bourn. The house and estate were presented to the Irish nation, in 1932, by the Bowers Bourn and Rose Vincent families. Muckross became Ireland's first National Park, in 1933.

However, Muckross House remained closed for more than 30 years. Following a campaign by people in Killarney, the Government agreed to the use of the house as a folk museum and it was officially opened as such on June 14, 1964.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power.

There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

Is intermittent fasting plus a protein pacing plan a better weight loss strategy than a simple calorie deficit plan?

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SUMMER EYES

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There is still a lot to play for as the State Exams reach the halfway mark



OPTIONAL

As the state exams approach the end of the second week, many candidates have reached or are close to the end of the road. The optional subjects now take centre stage. As the number of candidates taking these subjects is considerably less than the number taking the compulsory subjects some exam centres will close early. Candidates from these centres will be relocated to a different centre for the remainder of the exam. The number of candidates in the school environment will also continue to decrease, so it's important for candidates who still have a job of work to do, not to feel left behind or become impatient to get over the finish line.

SEVEN DAYS

Normally in the final seven days, candidates will have one or two subjects from a standard seven left to do. However, it's not unknown for students to take an eight or even a ninth subject to complete a particular vocational grouping such as Design & Communication Graphics, Physics and Applied Mathematics. So, there is still a lot to play for. There are grades and points to be earned.

FOCUS

Candidates must guard against exam fatigue in the final weeks. The buzz of the early days is gone. There is less foot fall around the exam centres. Your remaining subjects are likely to be spaced out. These subjects have to be faced. They must be given priority between now and Tuesday week. Keep a lid on your impatience and stay in exam mode. You need to be as motivated, focussed and energetic as you were on the first exam day.

SESSIONS

Eight of the fifteen exam days will have passed by this Friday evening. There are fourteen more subject sessions in the remaining seven days. The number of candidates taking these subjects

will be much less than in the earlier days of the exam. However, candidates concerned must defer any post exam celebrations. In sporting parlance, the game ends only with the final whistle. Defeat has often been snatched from the jaws of victory by one untimely lapse in concentration.

WEEKEND

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries and to plan for next week. Enjoy some exercise and fresh air to prepare for the third week. A good work out will help you to sleep soundly, to build up stamina and endurance and to maintain your concentration for the last lap. Enjoy a few good nights' rest so that your mind and body are fully alert for the remaining papers. Organise your revision sessions for daylight hours. Don't burn the mid-night oil but go to bed early. Go over the tips and predictions for your remaining subjects. Resist the temptation to spend endless hours cramming course material. Scan your notes on the eve of any remaining paper so that the key concepts are fresh in your mind.

APPROACH

Maintain your disciplined and organised approach over the remaining days. Avoid late night socialising with those who have finished the exam. Keep your distance from alcohol as you'll need a clear head and lots of energy for the task ahead. Eat well as good nutrition is important in week three to avoid energy loss. Keep your fluid levels high to avoid dehydration.

GOOD PERFORMANCE

Candidates have performed very well during the past fortnight. Keep up the good work and bring your exam to a successful conclusion in your remaining subjects. Use your free days wisely. Stay positive and be confident in your ability to do well in next week's papers. Take it subject by subject and bring the curtain down

on a stellar performance.

JACKIE'S ARMY TOP THE POLLS AS GRADY ENJOYS A SURGE IN VOTES



Kerry County Council is returning with several new faces - and one extra woman. Overall, though, the make-up is not a whole pile different. 'Flat' was a word I heard more than once of the 2024 election, whether in Tralee or Killarney.

Finance Fail is the biggest single party with nine councillors - one fewer than in 2019; Fine Gael has six, one fewer also. Labour has two. So if these three come together they have enough but only barely for the 17 majority. That will all be thrashed out by June 21st and election of cathaoirleach.

Sinn Fein returns with four again, and the independents on paper, number 12. But there are new blocks of independents. And first and foremost are the Healy-Raes who are not a party in name, but are bigger now than Sinn Fein.

Killarney particularly has voted to stay the same and very conservatively - despite a large increase in voter numbers and voter makeup. A much anticipated change in the Killarney electoral area did not materialize - with the seven sitting councillors, a majority independents, heading back to their seats with simply a slight shuffle in the order of election.

THE SURPLUS OF DANNY HEALY-RAE WILL NOW BE DISTRIBUTED!

Some of the key questions for Kerry 2024 were identified here in the preview of the local elections. And yes, incredibly, the Healy-Raes

managed to repeat their remarkable overguota performance of 2019 in all three electoral areas of Kenmare, Killarney and Caslteisland. All are based in Kilgarvan which means only one - Johnny - can actually vote for himself. It is a truly astonishing performance. It is not by accident. Hard work and plain speaking is what it is about, Kenmares Johnny and Killarney's Maura, both said in separate interviews in the press room in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre. There is also the matter of key supporters, past and present they said. The Healy-Rae machine has to be seen close up to be believed. What my old schoolmate and veteran Healy-Rae campaigner Mike Galvin from Ironmills called ' 'the X-factor' is there in spades. Certainly. But don't be fooled. This is a highly-oiled and professional operation. Close up, the mastery of media and technology is admirable. No party can compare. And the messaging is remarkably similar, regardless who is speaking in the Kilgarvan accent. The Kilgarvan accent is spreading and there are effectively five Healy-Raes now in the new council:Sam Locke in Tralee and Liam Speedy Nolan in Listowel. Both of these are Healy-Rae affiliates.

There was a telling moment in Killarney when Johnny's massive Kenmare surplus was being after the first count. Over the public address system in Killarney came the announcement 'the votes of of Danny (sic) Healy-Rae will now be distributed'. It went mostly unremarked amid the shouting and roaring we come to expect of the Healy-Rae elected. It was a Freudian slip: The Healy-Raes is an incredibly cohesive, homogenous and very tight operation.

BACK TO THE OTHER QUESTIONS

Killarney did not change. However the big success and surprise in Killarney was that of Martin Grady. The retained fire-fighter who fought to get on the ballot paper in the first place and who was co-opted onto his father Donal's seat only in 2023 outpolled everyone apart from Maura and was elected over-quota on the first count. His outspoken stance on immigration had much to do with it. In Fossa he picked up a surprising 53 votes, for instance. Labour's Marie Moloney also increased her vote and did so substantially, picking up on the ressurgence of Labour nationally, perhaps as well as her hard work.

SINN FEIN

The multi-candidate strategy of Sinn Féin did not pay off. Tralee returned with two seats and the only thing the party increased in Tralee is the number of teachers on the council. (Paul Daly, TD Pa's brother) is a teacher). A more cynical person would say the Daly faction of Sinn Fein has outsmarted the Ferris faction with the loss of Cathal Foley's seat in Tralee.

A similar Daly/Ferris two-candidate strategy in Killarney did not pay off either. Damien Switzer is a popular and well-known person, but clearly his party is not. Damien got just 339 votes - 35 more than Mahmud Iqbal from the Bangladeshi community. Damien's running mate Caroline Kenneally, assistant to Pa Daly, polled just 248.

There was no SF Killarney seat ; there was no recovery of the Kenmare seat by Damien Quigg - the only gain and it was a gain at the expense of Fianna Fáíl was in Dingle with Robert Brosnan who was running for the second time.

ONE IN FIVE PEOPLE IN IRELAND NOW NOT BORN HERE

The make-up of the new Kerry County Council will still not represent the strong immigrant community we have in Kerry.

There was a disappointing show in Tralee but also in Killarney for non-native Irish candidates. The substantial number of Killarney Ukrainians did not turn out - almost 600 were registered on the supplementary register alone. But clearly there is no Ukrainian unity in Killarney with their own Natalia Krasnenkova getting just 146 votes.

However, between them Iqbal Mahmud and Kamaruzzaman Abdul Kadir managed under 500 first preferences. There is definitely a start and many people would like to see the Muslim community in Killarney with a stronger voice and to be able to engage more with them. Equally, people would like to see the Polish and resident East European community represented. I have had no feedback on how they voted this time.

FINE GAEL

The anticipated Ukrainian support did not materialise for Fine Gael's first time candidate Dermot Healy in Killarney

Kenmare is one of the few places in Kerry Fine Gael had a good election.

There was concern the seat would drift given the shock announcement that Patrick Connor-Scarteen whose family have been associated with Fine Gael in south Kerry with generations was not going forward this time.

The noble Tony Donnelly backed into a corner in Waterville had a good run picking up 770 votes. He might have had a better had he had more support from the Kenmare side of things. (The less said there, the better). With strong support from Patrick Connor-Scarteen, Kenmare's Teddy O'Sullivan Casey got past the post. Fine Gael in Killarney had a good candidate in Dermot Healy and Killarney badly needs a FG business man to have a go at the Dail. But they were too late to the fray. April was too late to field a new face; The party also made a fatal error in not running one of the Bangladeshi candidates as a sweeper. Fine Gael in Killarney need to stick with someone and they could do worse now than sticking with Healy who has impressed.

FIANNA FÁIL

There here was a strong showing for Fianna Fail in Kenmare - with sitting councillor Michael Cahill elected with a powerful 2,162 first preferences on the first count; Norma Moriarty - who has run for the Dail for FF - and was the outgoing Cathaoirleach of Kenmare LEA pulled in a very respectable 1,805. But both lead candidates were slightly down on 2019. . Fiianna Fail did not have a great election south and west of the Maine - they lost a seat in Corca Dhuibhne and No-one one saw Fianna Fail's Michael O'Shea, 31 years a councillor and based in Kerry's fastest growing town, Milltown, as vulnerable.

The party also lost John Francis Flynn's seat in Kenmare LEA to independent Podge Foley. And In Killarney outgoing mayor Niall Kelleher, a single candidate , polled a disappointing 1,307 - an increase of a mere 54 votes. This was despite Niall's hard work and higher profile, both in the council and in the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

GREEN SHOOTS ONLY IN DINGLE

The Greens disappointed in Kenmare and in Killarney - the first town in Ireland to elect a green . Cleo Murphy dropped her vote in Kenmare; Diarmid Griffin in Killarney polled ten fewer than the lead Sinn Fein candidate, Switzer.

But as predicted here Peadar Fanning in Dingle was in the mix for a seat. One of the concerns I heard about Peadar coming up to the poll was how when he called to houses, he never asked directly for the number one. He simply introduced himself in Irish and in English where appropriate. Dr Peadar/Peter will have learned he needs to ask for votes next time when out canvassing!

WOMEN IN KERRY

A final word: Michelle Keane polled surprisingly well. Not enough to dent the boys' club who stuck together tightly in the face of the Keane machine - but enough to raise her own profile. She is to run in the general election and who knows how the rest of Kerry will vote for a strong woman next time out. She might need to broaden the lens a bit - the attacks on individual councillors saw them circling the wagons and while amusing, left a sting and sometimes were a bit questionable.

My own experience is Kerry is a very male county and has a particular, peculiar view of women, not unlike the view in the US, for instance. (Think of Hilary Clinton v Barack Obama). Being too outspoken seems to upset the order of things in Kerry as well as in Maine. I have witnessed a lot of strong women struck down in nasty remarks for being outspoken. We like our women quiet and respectful and knowing their place!!

Racism and homophobia will be tackled whenever it raises its head. But misogyny runs so deep, particularly if the woman does not meet the stereotype - it will take generations to root it out.

On a positive note, the new council will have a record six women.

But two whole MDs and three electoral areas are still without a woman - Listowel has no female councillor and Corca Dhuibhne-Castleisland is also, very firmly, male only territory.

TURNOUT

Turnout at 63 per cent was slightly higher in Killarney, Kenmare and West and mid Kerry than in 2019 Tralee remained at just over 51 per cent; Listowel dropped to 51 per cent from 54.24 per cent. Turnout is an issue and will have to be tackled.

After all, the next election is already underway.

Finally a word of thanks to the very efficient though painfully slow operation in Killarney and to the courtesy shown by candidates and council staff to the press. While electronic voting would be a good idea - not just yet, please.

SEMI FINAL SPOT FOR KERRY MINORS All Ireland Minor Quarter-Final Kerry 3-18 Roscommon 2-3

Kerry looked okay, but not really much more than that, in an opening game of their minor campaign where I still suspect that neither Kerry nor Cork were showing their full hand. They also had a fair battle against Tipperary in the Munster semi-final for forty minutes before finally opening up the throttle.

Then came that display against Cork in the Munster Final. That was an absolute demolition derby. There's no denying that Cork looked somewhat rudderless, but they still had to be put away, and Kerry did so with clinical and ruthless efficiency.

I did expect us to see off Roscommon, but I wasn't expecting it to be anything like as onesided as it was. Roscommon weren't putting up the kind of totals that would win a game like this and their defence seemed to be relying on numbers rather than individual skill. I was impressed, though, by Roscommon;s midfield. That showed in the opening minute, as Roscommon won the toss and promptly got in for the opening score, a free by Dean Casey.

I think that was the last time any Roscommon player touched the ball in the middle third for twenty minutes. That's not hyperbole or sarcasm. Kerry were on top in every single sector and every single duel. I think the Roscommon keeper was better at finding Kerry players with his kick-out even than Kacper Robak was – not that Kacper had to take a kickout for a very long time.

Seán Ó Cuinn lofted over two opening points for Kerry. Gearóid White added two points (1f). Gavin O'Keeffe calmly fisted over, no need to over-complicate matters.

Ronan Carroll hadn't been as dominant in other games as I feel he can be capable of, but he really came into his own here. Roscommon couldn't live with his movement, and he kicked four points (1f) on the trot. 0-10 to 0-1.

Roscommon were well out of their depth, but that isn't to take away from Kerry. They kicked their first wide after ten scores; that's fair shooting in any language.

Late in the first half, Joey McCarthy swung in a looping high ball that the hapless keeper misjudged and it ended up in the net. It's one of those days....

Jack Joy closed out the first half scoring. 1-11 to 0-1. I travelled in company, and that's about the only reason I stayed for the second half. I kind of wanted to go home. It's not Kerry's fault, most certainly not, but this wasn't enjoyable. Roscommon are very decent people – I was in Cusack Park for the minor replay in 2006 and the minor semi-final in 2017 as well. I could enjoy a contest no matter how it ended, but this wasn't any contest and we all knew that it wasn't going to turn into one.

Truth is, Kerry could have coughed up another two goals to Roscommon in the final quarter and still have cruised to a double-score win such was their dominance all through and the 13-point lead they took to the half time interval. Once again Roscommon got the opening score of the second half, this time from Stephen Tighe. Once again, it was a false dawn at best as Kerry promptly slapped over points from Gearóid White, Ben Murphy, Éanna Murphy, and Joey McCarthy. Roscommon's cause wasn't helped by a somewhat clumsy black card; I suspect a little bit of frustration. I will say that it was important that Kerry not drop in concentration. It's easy, and absolutely correct, to have sympathy up in the stand, but on the field players have a job to do and there's plenty lads on the bench who would love to take that jersey. Rightly so.

Ronan Carroll hit an absolute rocket that crashed back off the crossbar. On another day it might have been a significant moment, but not today. This game was already long over and we all knew it. With ten minutes left Eoin Collins got in for a Roscommon goal. Wayne Quillinan will be looking at that one afterwards, but I don't think the Kerry defence did too much wrong.

The response said everything. While Roscommon were, if not quite celebrating, at least showing signs of relief, Kerry were already racing back down the pitch in a seamless move that ended with Ryan O'Driscoll coolly rounding the keeper to finish to the net. A minute later the Stacks man was on hand again to drive home his second. 3-15 to 1-2.

Roscommon did pull a goal back, an acrobatic volley by Keenan Kelly that probably owed more to inspiration from Zlatan Ibrahamovich than Tony McManus. An anaesthetised crowd summoned a half-hearted cheer, but no more than that.

Kerry closed it out with the last three points from O'Driscoll, O'Carroll, and Éanna Murphy before Anthony Cox had one last forlorn point for Roscommon.

A genuinely phenomenal display by Kerry, nigh on perfection. But standing in their way in the semi-final is Derry, reigning champions and red-hot favourites from the very start of the year. Kerry won the quarter-final by a full 18 points and they are still going to be underdogs; that's what Derry are like. We might actually have done Roscommon a favour.

2022 Player of the Year, hauled Donegal level. Kerry could, and I would argue should, have been well ahead on the balance of play. We were also coughing up more frees than I liked, and they were good calls by the referee. We seemed a little rushed, a little frantic. I don't know, it's more an impression of a feeling than anything tangible.

1-3 to 0-6 at half-time, and I doubt if either management team was happy with what they had seen.

Kerry looked more purposeful on the restart, Niamh Carmody and Anna Galvin putting us two points clear. I was quite confident at that stage. I felt that we were the better team but hadn't translated it onto the scoreboard, and with Hannah O'Donoghue, Siofra O'Shea, and Louise Ní Muircheartaigh on the bench, I never felt that would be an issue over a full sixty minutes.

Shows what I know. Susanne White and Emma Dineen traded scores coming up to the 43rd minute.

And Kerry didn't score again. To be fair, it was very treacherous conditions. I'm not saying that scoring was easy; it certainly wasn't. But these are the days you should be getting it done.... and the blunt and uncomfortable truth is that Kerry didn't.

Donegal didn't score much more either, and a part of me was actually hoping with three minutes left that we might get away with this one. And 'get away' was the correct phrase. As it happened, Katie Dowds got in for one more point and Susanne White slotted a free with pretty much the last kick of the game.

Definitely a point lost rather than a point gained. Look, with the top two advancing to the quarter-finals anyway, there isn't a lot of jeopardy. This was a game that Kerry could afford to make those errors in – a loss would have been a different story. But, especially after that League Final defeat, I'm looking for a certain assuredness from Kerry at this stage. I didn't see it here.

KERRY MAKE IT THREE WINS FROM THREE All Ireland Intermediate Camogie Round Three

Kerry 0-15 Kildare 0-4

To say that Kerry have shown a complete transformation in fortunes since a tough National League campaign is already looking like a vast understatement, as they once again came back down on the M7 motorway with a big win in the bag. Last week they saw off a fancied Dublin in the capital, having been a fairly listless Antrim in their opening encounter of the group stage. This week they faced hosts Kildare in Hawkfield, a pitch a lot of this Kerry team would be familiar with, and another resounding display saw them record a surprisingly comfortable victory.

Star of the show was once again Kerry's scorerin-chief Jackie Horgan, who notched nine in total and six from play in a superb all-round display. She set the tone early on, clipping over two frees and adding a magnificent point from

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out by the sideline. Kildare rallied through their captain, Lea Sutton, who cut into the Kerry square to win a penalty. She struck the shot well but Aoife Fitzgerald blocked it and regathered quickly before winning a free and clearing her lines. It was a key moment; a real rallying call for the Kerry girls and a deflating blow for the home side. Kerry cut loose, Kate Lynch slotting over and the irrepressible Jackie Horgan adding another from play. Ellen O'Donoghue got in on the scoring act before Horgan again made it 0-7 to 0-0.

Sutton, who deserves a lot of credit as the heart and soul of Kildare's resistance, finally opened their account with a free in the 25th minute. Caoimhe Ní Bhuirceal and Sara Carroll quickly added two more and it seemed that a comeback might yet be on the cards. Jackie Horgan had other ideas, notching the last two points of the half to take her personal tally to seven and Kerry's lead to six.

Half-time Kerry 0-9 Kildare 0-3

Kerry got the start to the second half that Kildare needed, Jackie Horgan with three mote points on the trot. Another by Ruth O'Connor, one of the minor players introduced onto the senior team by manager Brian Darcy to great success, saw Kerry leading by 0-13 to 0-3 and in complete control of proceedings.

Lea Sutton scored their only point of the second half, a free in the 60th minute, but Sara Murphy had also fired over from centre back by that stage.

Aside from the win itself, a huge plus point for Kerry supporters was the sight of Patrice Diggin coming off the bench and slotting a free. Kerry have more strength in depth than they used to, but Diggin would count as a special talent and a talismanic figure in any county and her return to action is almost as much of a boost going forward as this third win on the trot for a Kerry side who seem to be really gathering steam for an assault on the knock-out stages.

Next week will really tell a lot, as Kerry welcome a Kilkenny side that put both Carlow and Antrim to the sword with relative ease to Lixnaw at 2.00pm for what should be a real cracker next Saturday.

SENIOR COUNTY LEAGUE

There's people who measure their hours by the fortunes of Kerry's inter-county teams, or maybe our national teams' success. I was on the train down from Croke Park after Kerry lost that All Ireland Final to Tyrone in 2008 - aye, it was a hard one (some performance by Seán Cavanagh, though, up there with anything I've seen). But I saw people in tears. Over a football match. I'm sorry now, each to their own, but you should be grateful for the life you are living if you think losing a football match is such a tragedy. Shakespeare wrote his best works around sex or murder, not sport - and yes, they most certainly did play a type of football back then, albeit more like rugby league with legal biting. Sounds like junior football, a few of ye are thinking.....

I follow and support Kerry, but more like a parttime follower than a devotee. I did not travel up to Navan, all though I could have, and to be honest my blood isn't beating any faster at the thought of the Louth match either. The truth is that I'll pay attention when the knockout games start. Until then it's only throwing shapes and not only are Kerry not in any danger; at no point did it ever feel that they would be. I was absolutely curious about the Cork game, I still say that Cork are on the right road and growing teeth, but losing that one would have only meant a detour, not derailed the Kerry train. A group stage to knock out four teams from sixteen in a competition where we can all name the real contenders on our fingers (and I include one-armed bandits in that) is simply ripping off supporters. And crowd numbers are showing it.

I wasn't in Navan. With a full round of the county league, I was surrounded by real, on-the-ground, actual drama.

The inter-county championship (I and my generation and those before me consider the National League to be the forge, not the finished work) is icing. I'm more of a bread and butter man myself (I number the ability to make a sort of slightly misshapen but still tasty banana bread among my greatest accomplishments).

The County League is where I live and breathe. I'm not any great club man, to be honest, but I'd identify myself by family and club before anything else. Every once in a blue moon (they are far more common than you think) someone will pose the question "Would you prefer Kerry to win the All Ireland or your club to win the Club Championship?"

Seriously? That's an actual question? I don't.... Kerry winning the All Ireland gets woven into the fabric of our stories quickly and easily. For most of my childhood, the back of the church was for quiet men, many of them bachelors, to doff their caps. They didn't so much listen to the Word of God, as share stories of the word of Mick O'Dwyer and the Kerry camp. But club? You could swap stories of your club and how things are going...but I never once told the truth in those conversations, and nor did anybody else. You didn't really give anything away about the club. Kerry was something shared by all of us. Club....is not that, although in a way it is.

Club is not just the senior team and it's not just the football. The U13 Finals were on around the county this week (there's still a few on this Sunday, Na Gaeil play Milltown/Castlemaine in Mitchels at 6.30 in the Division One Final and it should be a cracker). I was at one myself on Sunday, and there's no seat in Croke Park I'd have swapped it for. And the passion wasn't just from the kids. The right type of passion, too – boisterous support without a cross word spoken to opposition players. That has to come from clubs themselves; County Boards simply can't impose that.

These games matter in a way that the results don't. If you can understand that, you don't need me to tell you what club means. It isn't any aspiration. It is simply a reality.

I follow the County League religiously. Not just my own club or our own division. All of them. There are twists and turns. It's a roller-coaster soap opera. Having a lad make an inter-county team is a huge honour for a club. Half the time it's one they would be better off without. The U20s, and Tomás Ó Sé did an absolutely brilliant job and I thank him for it, but those lads should be playing with their club in between mid-week training with the U20s. This idea of travelling up to the likes of Dublin and Galway for challenge games on weekends....arrah, I'm old school. Put them out in County League games and you'll know fast enough who can stand when standing is needed.

The rammed-through change to minor from U18 to U17 was in order to sever the ties between minor and senior. U18s can play senior,

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and that can hold up senior competitions (and to be fair, it did, and Kerry's successful runs in colleges football was also a delaying factor). But to me, their solution has been like curing an ingrowing toenail by amputating the foot. And the same people who schedule the U20 competition slap bang in the middle of the Leaving Cert. needed bother pretending that it was about avoiding exam years. I've made the point repeatedly. There's very little football available for 18 and 19 year olds. I like that Kerry have kept to a U21 championship (most counties are reverting to U21 and U18 for their domestic competitions, and with very good reason).

From the outside, you can measure the health of the GAA in a community (as opposed to marketing) sense from the County League.

When I was younger, various members of my family would go to different local games and we would (and still do) meet up on Sundays for breakfast, and the county league games are the big topic of discussion. You'd have eye witness accounts, you'd have gossip and rumours from town the night before (with evaluations of the veracity of the sources) and as for the predictions....Nostradamus would have admitted that he was completely outclassed as a spoofer. How many of ye remember Airtel? Willie O'Connor, that great Kerry PRO from Rahillys, was brilliant at putting up all the results from the day before, which basically meant that our superstitions were confirmed or denied by hard facts. Fabulous craic. Nowadays you can technically do that stuff on social media, but you can't really. None of those conversations were actually about the cold hard facts. 'Might have been' was at least as important as 'is'. The avenues of information were more important than the actual information.

I don't normally write about the County League on a weekly basis in this column. You can't, not and do it justice. The same can be said about the English Premiership, except that in a world of European Superleague, Middle Eastern sports-washing, ever-declining FIFA credibility, and an ongoing decline in Irish soccer both on and off the playing fields, it feels more and more like an irrelevance to a majority of people. You knew as well as I did who was going to win the Premiership this year; feel free to go back and look at my opening prediction last year if you want.

I could take the soft option and write up the things I read in the columns of newspapers that masquerade as sports though they are mostly gossip columns – again, feel free to check how many 'sports' stories in today's papers actually relate to 'sport'. Note: Roy Keane, Caitlin Clark, Gareth Southgate's selection process, Erik Ten Hag's job prospects, John O'Shea's job prospects, Joe Brolly regaling us with the latest GAA celebrity who had a pint with him and agreed with everything that Joe said....these are not sports stories. I refuse to indulge in that kind of nonsense.

I'll only discuss the County League when I have something to discuss. And now that we are close enough to endgame, I think it's worth looking at who is where, who is likely to be taken an elevator, and most importantly, in which direction....

Division One

By far and away the biggest result of last weekend is Dingle's narrow win over Rathmore. I didn't see it, but it sounds as though they could actually have won by more. That impacts the top, in that Dr. Crokes retain their county league crown. The Crokes team of recent vintage is easily and undeniably the best club side since Stacks in the mid 1970s or the Mitchels in the early 60s or Dingle twenty years before that, arguably better than any of them. The County League isn't that barometer, but winning it without the likes of Shane Murphy, Gavin White, Tony Brosnan, Charlie Keating, Tom Doyle.....

The real intrigue is at the other end. Dingle and Milltown/Castlemaine play in a back game next weekend. Loser goes down. I don't expect Rahillys to lose to Ballymac in their last game, given that Ballymac have nothing on the line, but Dingle could still pip them by beating both Milltown and Spa. Milltown themselves have An Ghaeltacht in the last round; I suspect both sides could already be doomed at that stage. If Milltown do beat Dingle (I'd be surprised; Dingle have been picking up points after their poor start) then that might, just might, be winner survives.

Division Two

Tight at the top, and a bit more clear-cut at the bottom. At the top Stacks have a back game against Templenoe and then a last round against an already relegated Na Gaeil. There's no way that they are losing both, and probably neither. Stacks are going straight back to Division One, quite possibly as champions. Beaufort have Listowel in the last round, and Listowel are safe but out of contention. Beaufort are also certainties for promotion (they top the scoring chart with a lot to spare). Glenbeigh/ Glencar join those two in Division One if - and it's a big enough if, they beat Gneeveguilla. With that back game against Na Gaeil in hand, Gneeveguilla are still in contention, so that one will be very interesting. Fossa and Kenmare play each other in the last round and the winner has an outside chance of a promotion play-off, but I can't really see it happening.

At the bottom Na Gaeil and John Mitchels are going down. Unfortunate for them, and this hasn't been a good couple of years for Tralee teams generally (at underage and colleges level, they are as strong as I can remember, phenomenal talent coming through). Desmonds play Templenoe in the last round and will be hoping that Ardfert lose to Mitchels to force a relegation play-off. Again, it's a fairly unlikely scenario.

Division Three

Usually the tightest division of them all (also the one with the longest journeys). Firies are the story of the division. I never expected them to burn through it the way they have, five points clear of their nearest challengers and already guaranteed champions. Who joins them is the question, and that is still very much up for grabs. Churchill have 12 points but they play

Tarbert, who are on 11. Tarbert at home...we called it Fortress Tarbert when I was younger (they jumped four divisions in five years back then, spearheaded by Pat O'Driscoll).

Keel are playing Cordal, and they are both on 11 as well. Personally I think the winners of Churchill/Tarbert and Keel/Cordal go straight up, but there's a good few permutations and potential play-offs there....

At the other end Knocknagoshel, on 5 points, need to win their own game away to Annascaul and hope that four other results, including the back game, go their way. Annascaul are on 7 points; they will be desperate for a win themselves and could be in a play-off even if they do. Mathematically it's possible for Knocknagoshel, but about as likely as winning the lottery. Currow are away to Reenard and at home to St. Marys. Win both and they are safe. Lose both and they are gone. Anything in between, and they'll be sweating....l'll be surprised if there isn't some sort of play-off needed here to decide things.

Division Four

It's extremely straightforward here. Unbeaten Senans are champions after seeing off Beale last weekend. That result will also cost Beale promotion, having been real contenders all along. Instead Brosna and Castlegregory both go up to Division Three. They can't be caught in the last round.

At the other end it's also fairly straightforward. Cromane and Lios Póil are gone, no matter the result in their final games. St. Michaels/ Foilmore host Cromane in their last round and can expect to win that, but they need Waterville to simultaneously lose to Moyvane in order to force a play-off. Moyvane are safe and Waterville are at home, so I suspect that Bally/ Foilmore have too steep a hill left to climb.

"Lord, my heart is not proud; my eyes are not haughty. I don't concern myself with matters too great or too awesome for me to grasp. Instead, I have calmed and quieted myself, like a weaned child who no longer cries for its mother's milk. Yes, like a weaned child is my soul within me. O Israel, put your hope in the Lord - now and always" (Psalm 131).

Welcome back dear student, 'Fear Is A Liar' is a song by Zach Williams and it's so true. Fear paralyzes, hinders and stunts (Psalm 143:4). When someone endures trauma or pain that person may be emotionally, mentally, and physically affected opening them up to torment, oppression, dread of the future, or a negative mindset. Fear is a lack of Love – specifically, the Love of God. "There is no fear in Love; but Perfect Love casts out fear because fear involves torment. But he who fears has not been made perfect in Love." (1 John 4:18).

Recently we studied the 'fear of the Lord' - that is reverence and love for God: obedience to His Word, bringing God's blessings and joy. The devil uses 'fear' to terrorise and destroy. The fear of the Lord is positive and productive, but Satan peddles his fear to bring dysfunction. The Lord Jesus said... 'My sheep hear my voice, and they follow me...they do not follow the voice of the stranger' (John 10:5-27). Do you recall 'stranger-danger'? Parents warn their children so they don't fall for the cunning deception that a predator could trick the child with.

Jesus warns about listening to the enemy's voice. We hear the Lord's voice as we study and get to know His Word. The Bible is not to be read as a novel or literature – it's much deeper (1 Corinthians 2:14). "The Word became flesh and dwelt amongst us" (John 1:14). The Word is a Person – Jesus, and we get to know Him by looking into His eyes – His Word. It's a relationship that no one can take away from you friend. And the more you grow to know Him, the less you will fall for the stranger's fearful voice. Jesus exposed the devil's character – a murderer, thief, liar, and a deceiver (John 8:44). Satan uses dirty tactics to pull people under. Lies, slander, accusation, shame, manipulation, aggression, and strife: to name a few. The Psalm above is quite short, but punchy. There's growing up required to live an overcoming life. Pride keeps us from addressing areas of weakness in character, but facing the Truth brings growth. Often our struggles are rooted in some underlying fear.

This Psalm pictures the growth of a child. A tiny baby has a cry that is piercing – when he or she is hungry - you better have that milk ready because they want it NOW! But as the child grows and gets understanding, learning to feed him or herself, they start to relax a little, gaining some patience and self-control. Fear of not being fed isn't as big a problem as when they were newborn – they know where the food is now, and how to help themselves. We must grow spiritually as well as physically to succeed in life. Sure, there may have been difficulties in the past, but by humbling oneself in repentance before God, and believing His Word there is huge breakthrough (John 14:1; Mark 5:36). No longer do we need to succumb to the fear and lies of the enemy, but instead we learn to trust that God will work everything out for good - as we live in obedience to Him. His loving voice brings us into safe pastures (Psalm 23): "…He leads me by still waters".
